

# ANNUAL MEETING

#### Saturday, 8th March, 1947

The 121st Annual General Meeting of the Royal Bath Hospital and Rawson Convalescent Home was held on Saturday, 8th March, 1947.

The Right Hon. Viscount Mountgarret (President) presided. Among those present were the Mayor of Harrogate (Ald. H. Hesselwood), Coun. J. S. Tennant, M.A., Herbert Crowther, Esq., O.B.E., J.P., LL.B. (Chairman of the Board of Management), Dr. G. L. Kerr Pringle, M.C. (Vice-President), Stanley Barnes, Esq. (Hon. Treasurer), J. S. Holmes, Esq., J.P., A. V. Milton, Esq., F. F. Wagstaffe, Esq., A. Woodhead, Esq., A.M.I.C.E., C. J. Simpson, Esq., J.P., and Mrs. Simpson, Dr. W. Yeoman, Dr. T. Glen Reah, Dr. Muriel Keyes, Colonel V. J. Greenwood, W. H. Freeman, Esq., M.C., T.D., B.A., A. Apologies for absence were received from the Right Hon. The Earl of Harewood, K.G., G.C.V.O., D.S.O., Major Christopher York, M.P., Colonel W. F. Collins, D.S.O., Dr. R. P. J. Rutherford, Mrs. J. J. Norton, M.B.E. (Huddersfield), Mrs. E. Shaw, C.B.E., J.P. (Sutton-on-Forest), Mrs. Wainwright (Huddersfield), Miss M. H. Freeman, the Secretary Merseyside Hospitals Council, the Secretary Scarborough Hospital Contributory Scheme, the Secretary Workmen's Welfare Committee, Head, Wrightson & Co. Ltd., Thornaby-on-Tees.

Lord Mountgarret, moving the adoption of the various reports, suggested that consideration be given as to whether, with the passing of the National Health Bill, alternative procedure under the Rawson Home Trust Deed would not be more applicable. He understood that on April 1st, 1948, all property of Hospitals and Convalescent Homes becomes vested in the Minister. Until then, Trustees were free to operate their Trusts in whatever way is best for their Institutions.

They could continue to feel proud of the Hospital as being worthy, in every way, of the position which it filled and of the town in which it was born. If, as they hoped, it became a main Hospital for Rheumatism in this region, its future would undoubtedly be assured. Mr. Stanley Barnes (Hon. Treasurer) who moved the adoption of the Accounts and Balance Sheet, stated that for the first time for many years there was a deficit on the year's working. This was largely due to big increases in Salaries and Wages, as to which they had no option since they were obligatory. They had, to some extent, reduced the gap by realising some of the savings from past years. They had not, by any means, yet come to the end of their resources and he was not unduly disturbed as to their future outlook.

Mr. Wagstaffe seconded the resolution and the Accounts were adopted.

The Mayor (Ald. H. Hesselwood) proposed a vote of thanks to the Chairman and Members of the Board of Management and the re-election of the retiring Members, Alderman J. S. Holmes, J.P., A. V. Milton, Esq., and Mrs. C. J. Simpson, and that H. Linley Bown, Esq., Col. H. Horan Brown and W. J. Moxon, Esq., be elected to fill vacancies. He knew that a great deal of hard work was put in by the Committee and at a considerable sacrifice of time and trouble. He felt sure that, when the time came to hand over the Hospital, the Board would have nothing to fear as to the way it had conducted the affairs of the Institution.

**Coun. Tennant,** seconding the resolution, deplored the passing away of voluntary service in a materialistic period.

Mr. Crowther, replying to the vote of thanks, referred to the rise of over  $\pounds 6,000$  in expenditure during 1946, most of which was due to increases in Wages and Salaries laid down by new Wage Scales. The position was impossible when some people called the tune and expected others to pay the piper.

The past year had been one of great activity and, despite many inevitable disappointments and delays, much had been accomplished. When it became certain that all Hospitals were to pass to the Ministry of Health, two courses were open to them; either to accept the fact and decide that, during the period between then and the "appointed day" they would merely carry on the daily routine work, doing nothing except what was absolutely necessary, or, they could proceed with the work for which the Grey Cross Fund was started and so make the Hospital an efficient and integral part in the scheme for treatment and research formulated by Leeds University. They had decided on the latter course and this had involved the expenditure of much thought, work and money. They had committed themselves to an expenditure of some  $f_{15,000}$ . As for the greater part of this expenditure Ministry of Health permits had been required, it seemed a reasonable inference that the Hospital was destined to play an important part in the treatment of Rheumatism in the North East of England. It was the aim of the Board, during the next twelve months, to complete all the work now in progress, so that when the "appointed day" arrived they could hand over a highly efficient and well-equipped Hospital of which they could be justifiably proud and equally confident that they had not tarnished the traditions handed down to them by a long line of devoted men and women over the past century and a quarter.

Mr. Milton moved a vote of thanks to Mr. Stanley Barnes and his re-appointment as Hon. Treasurer. He said that the Hospital's present satisfactory condition was largely due to the care he had given to the administration of its finances. They could hardly imagine the Hospital without Mr. Barnes as its Treasurer.

Dr. Pringle seconded the motion which was carried and Mr. Barnes thanked the Meeting for his re-election.

Mr. C. J. Simpson moved a vote of thanks to the Members of the Hon. Medical Staff and their re-appointment for the ensuing year, with the exception of Dr. C. Trist Gasking, Dr. Henry Mathers and Dr. Sinclair Miller, who have resigned, and that Dr. T. Glen Reah and Dr. B. C. Nicholson be appointed Hon. Physicians, and Dr. W. Mercer Jones and Dr. R. C. Lawrence be appointed Hon. Anaesthetists.

He said that Harrogate owed its position to its Spa treatments, and for the effective use of these was dependent upon the skill of its doctors. The fortunes of the town were closely linked with the interests of the Hospital which had done much to make its benefits known throughout the country. He paid a tribute to Dr. Yeoman for the great amount of work he had put in during the past year to bring the Hospital into closer touch with Leeds.

Mr. J. S. Holmes briefly seconded the resolution, which was carried.

Dr. Yeoman, in returning thanks for himself and his colleagues, spoke in some detail of the work they were setting themselves to do and of the position the Hospital might be expected to occupy when the National Health Act came into force next year. He thanked the Board for the sympathy and support they had given to help the Staff to put their projects into force. Mr. A. Woodmansey moved and Mr. Haighton Smith seconded the re-election of Messrs. Lowrey, Weston & Whalley, Chartered Accountants, Leeds and Harrogate, as Auditors for the coming year.

Mr. Crowther moved, Mr. Woodhead seconded, and Dr. Yeoman supported, "That this Meeting desires to express its affectionate regard for Mr. E. P. L. Dixon, who is shortly to retire from the position of Secretary to the Board of Management and to record its grateful appreciation of his devoted services for twenty-seven years, during which time the claims of the Hospital have been paramount in his life, as he allowed nothing to interfere with that high sense of duty which has ever been his stern monitor.

"It recalls that this was particularly manifest when hostilities commenced in 1939, when, without demur, Mr. Dixon left his home in Knaresborough, and came to live in the Hospital, in order to be on the spot in the event of any untoward happenings, and that this residence continued all through the long years of the war.

"Being desirous of retaining the benefit of his intimate knowledge of all the affairs of the Hospital, this Meeting requests Mr. Dixon to accept a seat on the Board of Management, as from April 1st, 1947.

The Meeting is gratified to know that Mr. Dixon is in good health, and wishes for him many years of happy retirement during which he can devote himself more fully to the many pursuits, the enjoyment of which, has previously been subordinated to the interests of the Hospital.

Mr. Dixon thanked the Meeting for the honour they had done him in inviting him to join the Board of Management and for the consideration shown to him throughout his term of office by all those with whom he had been associated.

Mr. Herbert Crowther thanked Lord Mountgarret for his kindness in coming to take the Chair at very short notice. Dr. Pringle seconded the vote of thanks, and Lord Mountgarret replying, said it was a pleasure to preside at a Meeting where such a friendly family atmosphere always prevailed.

# **Report of the Committee of Management.**

#### To the Right Honourable The Earl of Harewood, K.G., G.C.V.O., D.S.O., and Subscribers of the Royal Bath Hospital and Rawson Convalescent Home, Harrogate.

Your Committee has pleasure in presenting its 121st Annual Report, but again regrets that, as the paper restrictions have not yet been relaxed, certain regular features of pre-war years have again been omitted, figures, however, showing age groups and occupations (men only) appear for the first time.

The number of admissions compared with those of the previous year show a marked reduction in the case of men patients. This is primarily due to the necessity of temporarily closing the Fox-Thomas Wards. This work has made slower progress than was expected owing to the difficulty in obtaining the necessary material, but despite this, the Wards are being used.

The past year has witnessed changes and developments on an almost unprecedented scale and though progress has, in some respects, failed to come up to expectations, much has been done towards accomplishing the schemes which, twelve months ago, were only in outline. In respect of increasing the accommodation for the Nursing Staff, plans have been prepared which unfortunately, owing to restrictions, cannot further be proceeded with, and alternative plans are now in preparation.

In the Autumn of the year, Orthopædic work began and much valuable work has already been done. This may be expected to develop considerably during the next twelve months in conjunction with the Rheumatic Clinic recently established at the Leeds General Infirmary.

Work on the new Electrical and Occupational Therapy Departments has been slow owing to the time which has been taken to deliver the necessary materials. If only this handicap can be overcome, progress should be rapid, as the foundations have been completed for some time. Towards the end of last year the Hospital received notice of a Legacy by the late Mr. Egbert Fox-Thomas of a sum far exceeding any previously bequeathed in the history of the Hospital. Up to the present  $\pounds 18,000$  has been received on account, and this will be dedicated to the maintenance of the Orthopædic Wards to be known as the Kathleen Fox-Thomas Wards.

In the middle of June a successful Post Graduate week-end was held at the Hospital. The attendance was quite encouraging. Several of those present expressed appreciation of all that had been done to interest them in the work of the Hospital, and of the various papers contributed by members of the Honorary Medical Staff.

Your Committee reports that the scheme of establishing an experimental Bath House in conjunction with the Royal Baths has been submitted to the Scientific Committee of Leeds University, with a view to its being included in their larger scheme for Research which is now under consideration.

An arrangement has been entered into with the Harrogate Corporation whereby the Borough Analyst, Mr. A. Woodmansey, has been given facilities for working in the Laboratory in conjunction with Dr. J. V. Wilson, who was appointed part-time Pathologist in succession to Dr. Sinclair Miller, who retired in the autumn under the age limit, after many years honorary service. Your Committee desires to place on record its appreciation of Dr. Sinclair Miller's labours in helping to establish the Rheumatism Research Fund and inaugurating the Pathological Laboratory work of the Hospital from the most modest beginnings.

In view of the imminence of the "appointed day" when the Ministry of Health will take over the Hospital under the National Health Services Act, your Committee is doing all in its power to ensure that the Hospital shall be handed over in a really high state of efficiency. Two items will suffice by way of illustration; enlarged and improved quarters for the Administrative Staff, and a new X-Ray outfit at a cost of about  $\pounds 4,000$ . For sixteen years the present plant has given good service, but it is felt that for a Hospital of this type the most up-to-date equipment is essential.

The Ladies' Sewing League has suffered a serious loss through the departure from the town of Mrs. Carter and Mrs. Howells. Both these ladies have been indefatigable in their efforts on behalf of the League and their stimulating example of zeal and regularity will be greatly missed. In these circumstances the members have decided that they will no longer promote efforts to raise money for the purchase of linen, etc., but will confine their energies to working on material provided. It will be seen from the accounts that they have made a gift of £580 to the funds of the Hospital, and for this most substantial sum and for the work done throughout the year 1946 your Committee desires to tender its most sincere and grateful thanks.

#### PERSONAL

Your Committee records with regret the unexpected death of one of its members, Mr. H. Angus, in March. Mr. Angus had not long been a member of the Board and it was confidently expected that the Hospital would have the benefit of his advice for many years to come. In his place your Committee submit for election Mr. H. Linley Bown, whose experience as an architect will be of great value at the present time. It is cause for congratulation that Viscount Mountgarret has accepted an invitation to succeed the late Sir T. S. Lawson Tancred, Bart., as a Trustee of the Rawson Convalescent Home. This appointment is a singularly happy and appropriate one, since it is to the generosity of the late Miss Rawson, that the Convalescent Home owes its origin.

After seven strenuous years the Matron, Miss E. C. Baynes resigned her position, and retired to live in the South. Throughout the years of war Miss Baynes faced with characteristic courage the constant succession of problems and difficulties with which she was confronted, and it is greatly to her credit, that, throughout these harassing times, she succeeded in maintaining the essential services of the Hospital at a satisfactory level of efficiency, and the debt of the Hospital to her is no light one. Your Committee has good reason to believe that it has made a happy choice in Miss M. N. Copley as her successor. Miss Copley has quickly adapted herself to her new environment and has shown herself a capable and sympathetic administrator who brings to her various tasks pluck, commonsense and good temper.

The resignation of the Rheumatism Research Fellow, Dr. D. H. Collins, by reason of his appointment as Reader in Clinical Pathology at Leeds University evokes a feeling of mixed gratification and regret. It is good to know that the value of his work here has led to such recognition. At the same time, the loss of his services to the Hospital is a severe one, and it will not be easy to find such a genial and brilliant successor.

After twenty-six years of loyal and devoted service, Mrs. Hessey retired from the post of Electrical Operator. During that period she gained the respect and affection of patients and Staff alike, and your Committee desires to pay tribute to the efficient and unassuming way in which she invariably discharged her duties.

Your Committee has accepted with regret the resignation of Mr. W. H. Freeman who has deemed it incumbent upon him to withdraw from the Board. His loss is the more regretted when the long, devoted and honourable services of his father to the Hospital as the Honorary Treasurer for twenty-five years are taken into account.

It is with regret that your Committee said good-bye to Miss A. M. Laing at the end of the year. Miss Laing had for nine months been in charge of the Occupational Therapy Department, which she has directed with conspicuous ability and enthusiasm, but your Committee felt that they could not stand in the way of her accepting the offer of a training course in America. They have been fortunate in obtaining a qualified successor in Miss G. Holtby.

#### FINANCE

Although, broadly speaking, income has been satisfactorily maintained, considering the decreased number of beds occupied, expenditure has continued to soar. This will be found chiefly under the Salaries and Wages items. These spectacular increases are due to the scales published from time to time and the Hospital has no option but to accept them, if it is to retain its Staff. Although the Treatment, Nursing and Domestic Staffs are the outstanding instances of these increases, practically every Department has been affected, and it has to be pointed out that in many instances the latest increases have only become operative since October 1st, hence the burden to be borne in 1947 will be considerably heavier than in the year under review.

With the idea of reducing in some degree the everwidening gap between receipts and expenditure, your Committee called an extraordinary Meeting of Subscribers for Saturday, 21st September, to obtain their sanction for certain increased charges. This was readily given. Indeed the only criticism forthcoming was that the increases erred on the side of moderation, and might well have been heavier than those proposed.

It will be seen in Statistical Table "B" that the weekly cost per patient has risen by no less a figure than  $\pounds 1$  2s. 6d. Apart from the increases in salaries and wages already referred to (12/8.6) the chief factors were sharp rises in new equipment, purchased for the Electrical Department ( $\pounds 496$ ), Electricity ( $\pounds 42$ ), due to the improved lighting in Wards and Day Rooms, and further improvements in this direction, will, it is expected, be in operation by next winter. As the cost of each patient per week now amounts to  $\pounds 3$  19s. 3d., and the highest rate of payment is only  $\pounds 2$  12s. 6d., it will be seen how great a strain is put upon the Endowment Funds of both Institutions.

After obtaining advice and guidance from the Ministry of Health, your Committee purchased annuities for Mrs. Hessey, Electrical Operator; F. Amos, Engineer; F. Bellwood, Gardener; and E. P. L. Dixon, Secretary; all of whom had served the Hospital for more than twenty-five years, but, by reason of age, had been debarred from participation in the Superannuation Scheme, when it was adopted by the Hospital in 1938.

To all those who have given their support to the Hospital in any form during the past year, your Committee desires to offer its sincere thanks, particularly to the members of the Sewing League, both individually and collectively and to Mrs. Clark for the very regular and efficient manner in which she has discharged, frequently single-handed, the duties of Honorary Librarian.

The League has again got through much useful work.

# **Report of the Hon. Medical Staff.**

The Hon. Medical Staff of the Hospital have pleasure in presenting their Annual Report.

Much work and thought have been put into the year's efforts preparing the Hospital to take its place in the Regional Scheme for Rheumatism, which will come into full operation under the new National Health Service. Our wish has been to prepare this Hospital so that it can take its place as a Regional Centre in the National Scheme for the treatment of, and research into, the Rheumatic group of disorders.

It is proposed to include in this region most of the East and West Ridings of Yorkshire with Leeds University as the centre, and therefore the Royal Bath Hospital should eventually become the main Hospital for Long Stay Rheumatic cases. When, therefore, restrictions on building are removed, it will be necessary to increase the number of beds for purely bed patients.

As Dr. Collins has now been appointed Reader in Clinical Pathology in the University of Leeds, he has resigned his position here as our Research Worker and his place is in process of being filled. This most important part of our work has been in abeyance owing to the war, but we are assured by officials of the Ministry of Health that Rheumatism Research is considered a priority matter. Apart from this work, the Medical Staff have recommended a larger Orthopædic Department and Mr. Broomhead has been to America to see their latest methods in the Orthopædic Treatment of Rheumatic deformities. This work is increasing and we now have, in addition to the Resident Medical Officer, a Resident Surgical Officer who is qualified to help in this type of work. The Resident appointments are recognised by the Central Examining Board as suitable ones for candidates to hold who wish to qualify for the Diploma in Physical Medicine.

We wish to thank the Board of Management for the support they have given to all improvements suggested by the Hon. Medical Staff, and for the energetic manner in which they have tackled the alterations necessitated by the enlargement of the scope of work which the Hospital now undertakes.

There have been some alterations in the Hon. Medical Staff during the year and we wish to record with regret the resignations of Dr. Gasking and Dr. Mathers. At the same time we wish to welcome on the Staff, Dr. Nicholson and Dr. Reah, and are happy to report that we now have two Anaesthetists, Dr. Mercer Jones and Dr. Lawrence, who each hold the Diploma of Anaesthetics. Dr. Sinclair Miller, who was Honorary Pathologist to the Hospital for over twenty years, has retired and his place has been taken by Dr. J. V. Wilson, whom we welcome as his successor. We particularly regret Dr. Miller's retirement, as he was largely responsible for the building of the Laboratory and was a most energetic worker in the formation of the Research Department. It is a cause of gratification to his former colleagues that the Board of Management have marked their appreciation of his services by appointing him an Honorary Consulting Pathologist. Three Clinical Assistants, Dr. Hawson, Dr. Carlyle-Gall and Dr. John Ward, have been appointed, and we feel that their help is invaluable and that they are gaining experience for fuller future work in the treatment of Rheumatism.

We should like to take this opportunity of thanking our late Matron, Miss Baynes, for her valuable help in the past, and at the same time to wish her successor, Miss Copley, much happiness in our Hospital. We can never thank the Nurses enough for their work which has been remarkably well done, notwithstanding the fact that they have been in short numbers. It has meant extra work for them, but they have, as usual, given their time cheerfully and efficiently.
