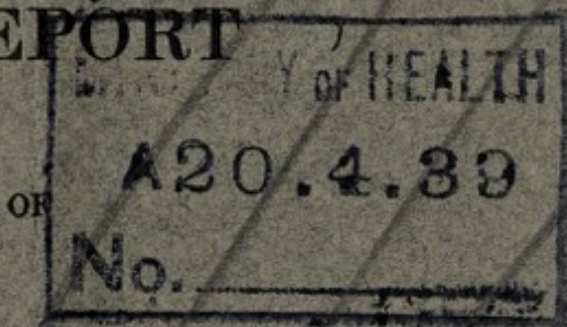

REPORT OF COMMITTEE FOR 1938.

In presenting the 71st report of the activities of St. Leonard's Hospital, the Committee of Management are glad to record the completion of the King George V. Memorial Wing; and other improvements, including new Clinical room, Mortuary, two Sluice rooms and additions to the Sterilising facilities.

The Official Opening took place on May 21st, the ceremony being most graciously performed by Her Highness Princess Helena Victoria, in the presence of Lord and Lady Loch, the Mayor of Sudbury (Councillor C. H. Hitchcock), the Town Council, the Bishop of Dunwich, the Recorder, the County Medical Officer of Health, the Architect (Mr. H. Munro Cautley, who kindly provided the presentation key), and a large number of Subscribers. The Committee responsible for the arrangements are to be heartily congratulated on the success of this occasion.

In connection with the year's work of the Hospital, the Committee desire to express their keen appreciation of the generous assistance given to the Institution in various ways by its supporters in Sudbury and the surrounding district, more especially at the present time in view of the splendid response which has also been accorded during the last three years to the Special Building Fund Appeal. Extra expenses have had to be met this year in many directions, and must be faced in the future, in connection with the extended accommodation and additional services now available, and the accounts now presented reveal an excess of Expenditure over Ordinary Income of £510 17s. 5d., a situation which is naturally causing the Committee much concern. They feel, however, there is reason for great satisfaction in the completion now achieved of that expansion which had been so much desired, and are confident the necessary further support will be readily forthcoming.

During the year the following legacies were received and are gratefully acknowledged:—Mr. George Savage, £100; the James Henry Stephens Bequest, £50, per Lloyds Bank Head Office; and, on account of Mr. Akerman's legacy, £1,500 in cash, and a transfer of £1,742 8s. 1d. in Consols. The estate is not yet settled, but the total amount of this legacy will be approximately £3,500. The Committee authorised the Trustees to utilize these legacies in order to meet the balance of the debt on the Building Fund.

The sum received during 1938 from the Contributory Scheme (£2,330 6s. 6d.), was substantially higher than in previous years by reason of the re-organisation which took effect on August 1st. Owing to the development of Hospital treatment and the growth of the Contributory Scheme movement since this Scheme was started nearly 16 years ago, the services available at St. Leonard's (and at other larger hospitals in cases of special need) had been gradually

improved and extended for the much greater comfort and convenience of those of its members who require hospital assistance. Larger benefits naturally involved increased expenditure, and the means of meeting this situation were very carefully considered by representatives of the Management and Contributory Scheme Central Committee with the co-operation of the Hon. Medical Staff. As a result of this valuable work, the rules have now been revised, the scale of extended benefits more clearly defined and the contributions of Single members increased to 2d. weekly. Though the revision has not yet been in operation for a full year, it may already be said that the new arrangements are working very satisfactorily, and it is confidently expected that the Contributory Scheme will continue to play its full part in helping to meet the expenses of the Hospital.

Among the patients admitted were twenty-one who had met with road traffic accidents. With two others remaining from 1937 these accident cases involved treatment and maintenance for a total of 620 days (at an estimated cost of £340), and 49 treatments for Massage, etc. The sum of £4 18s. 0d. was received in all from five of the patients concerned. Five other cases (353 days) are still unsettled.

At the annual general meeting last year, the resignation of Mrs. G. Stafford Allen, after 23 years' service on the Committee, was received with regret. Mrs. M. E. Webb was appointed to succeed her.

By the death of Mr. W. Kerby Perry, the Hospital lost a friend of many years' standing; he had been Hon. Dental Surgeon since 1914.

Among services rendered and gifts, in cash and in kind, during the year, the Committee acknowledge with gratitude:—

The interest of the Clergy and Ministers of all denominations; the services of local V.A. Detachments; of Toc H; and of the Radio Supply Company.

The continued work of the Extension Fund Appeal Committee, the further subscriptions to that Fund, and gifts of furniture and equipment for the New Wing.

The support of Subscribers and Donors, and of Officers and Members of the Contributory Scheme.

The help of the League of Mercy, the Churches and the Schools, and of organisers of Entertainments.

Gifts in connection with Pound Day, including 1,265 lbs. of groceries.

Gifts of eggs, fowls and game, fruit and vegetables, flowers, magazines and books, tinfoil, used stamps, etc.

The publicity kindly given to Hospital news and needs by the *Suffolk & Essex Free Press*, the County Cinema, the Gainsborough Theatre and many others.

Once again the Committee desire to express their appreciation

of the services of the Hon. Medical Staff and Surgeon Dentist, also their thanks to Matron and Nursing Staff, for the high level of work maintained. Further, the Committee are most grateful to Mr. F. G. Steed, Hon. Solicitor, and to Messrs. L. G. Redford and R. Fenn, joint Hon. Treasurers, for their co-operation

The following members of Committee retire in rotation and are eligible for re-election:—Mrs. Burke, Mrs. Ramsay, Messrs. C. H. Hitchcock and S. G. Wheeler.

CONTRIBUTORY SCHEME.

ANNUAL REPORT.

YEAR ENDING JULY 31ST, 1938.

The accounts for the fifteenth year of the Contributory Scheme show a small reduction in the amount collected as compared with the previous year. This, however, was due to an adjustment in the method of recording payments in certain cases and not to any falling off in the support of members.

A year ago the Central Committee announced the revision of the Rules of the Scheme, a clearer definition of the extended benefits which had been made available, and an alteration in the rate of contribution for Single members. It was arranged that these changes should take effect from 1st August, 1938, and the adjustment referred to was made at the end of the year now under review for convenience of administration only. It did not affect the amount eventually collected for the Hospital.

The record of the services rendered by the Hospital to members requiring its assistance is as usual an imposing one. The number of members on July 31st, 1938, was 6,224, of whom 275 received free in-patient treatment and maintenance during the year for a total of 4,337 days. In addition there were 102 visits of members for X-Ray examinations, dressings, etc., and the Massage department dealt with 57 members (of whom 46 were treated as out-patients), giving in all 1,186 treatments. These particulars refer only to treatment given at St. Leonard's. A number of members were also enabled to obtain Specialist advice and treatment in other hospitals, a form of additional benefit to Contributors which is clearly of great value.

The Committee of Management wish again to express their grateful thanks to all Voluntary Workers on behalf of the Scheme, particularly to the Secretaries and Collectors, the regular performance of whose duties forms the foundation of its existence. Thanks are also due to all members of Committees who help in the administration of the Scheme, to owners of premises used as Paying Centres, and to employers who allow collections to be made at places of employment.
