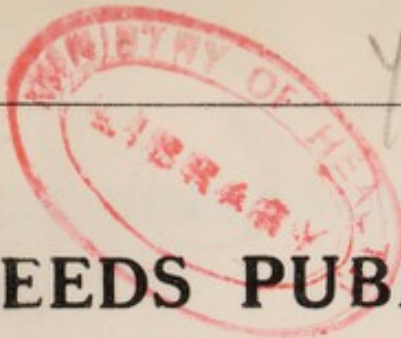

ONE HUNDRED & ELEVENTH ANNUAL REPORT.

THE Board of the Leeds Public Dispensary and Hospital, in presenting its One Hundred and Eleventh Annual Report, desires to express its high appreciation of the continued confidence and loyal support from all classes of the community in the City and surrounding areas.

PATIENTS

The following table gives an analysis of patients treated during the year with the figures for the two preceding years for the purpose of comparison. These statistics show a large increase, both in the number of Outpatients and Inpatients, and the resources of the hospital have never been more severely taxed.

254 cases were treated as a result of accident due to motor traffic, an increase of 40 on the previous year. 3,252 operations were performed, and 2,777 Radiological Examinations were made. Attendances in the Ear, Nose and Throat Department numbered 15,049; Eye Department 6,637; Radiological Department 1,124; Massage Department 4,114. In the Almoner's Department assistance, financial and otherwise, was arranged through the medium of outside agencies in 258 cases; 94 patients were sent to Convalescent Homes; 208 patients were assisted to obtain surgical appliances, and 276 cases received financial assistance from the Samaritan Fund. Dressing cases totalled 46,272 and 1,301 Visits were made to patients in their own homes.

FINANCE.

The Ordinary Income for the year amounted to £12,065 8s. 11d., as compared with £11,699 8s. 9d. for the previous year, and the Ordinary Expenditure £12,660 13s. 6d. as compared with £12,004 12s. 7d. The balance due to the Treasurer at the end of the year was £4,944 11s. 7d. as against £4,200 4s. 0d. at the close of the previous year.

The amount received from Annual Subscriptions was £1,040 15s. 0d.; Dividends and Interest £2,232 18s. 1d.; Donations £1,144 2s. 3d.; Congregational Collections £147 7s. 6d.; Patients Donations £388 9s. 0d.; Leeds and District Employers' Hospital Fund £639 18s. 9d.

From the Leeds & District Workpeoples' Hospital Fund the sum of £5,800 was received, an increase of £450 on the previous year. The Board is grateful for this splendid help and the upward tendency of the contributions made by the workers in Leeds and the surrounding districts is very gratifying.

IMPROVEMENTS AND ADDITIONS.

The efficiency of the Institution has been increased by the installation of additional apparatus in various departments.

A new Laboratory is in course of erection and will be completed by the end of the present year. This extension, which will be fitted up with the latest equipment, will give the improved accommodation which is badly needed.

A new department has been made by the establishment of a clinic for the treatment of Rheumatoid Arthritis. The results achieved have been published in the leading medical journals, and received favourable comments. The Board records with satisfaction the keen interest of the Honorary Staff in modern research work.

Brass tablets have been placed in the Women's Ward indicating that beds have been endowed in perpetuity by the legacy of Miss E. A. Jackson, late of Leeds.

has long been evident that accommodation for certain sections is insufficient, as the waiting lists testify, but before the present number of beds can be increased, the accommodation for additional nursing and domestic staff must be taken into account.

The provision of "pay beds" for persons of moderate means has also received the consideration of the Board, but was deferred until the time is more opportune.

VISITS.

Visits have been paid to the Institution by parties representing varied interests in the City, and the Board extends an invitation to other bodies to visit the Hospital and obtain a first-hand knowledge of the work

BOARD AND PERSONAL.

Mr. John W. Birks was elected to the Board and House Committee.

Sir George W. Martin and Col. A. D. Sharp were appointed representatives to the special Committee of the Leeds Voluntary Hospitals Council.

Mr. Harold Gilliat was appointed to serve with Sir George W. Martin on the Committee of the Leeds & District Employers' Hospitals Fund.

Dr. S. G. Bedford was appointed Clinical Assistant to Dr. S. J. Hartfall.

It is a matter of great satisfaction to the Board that the public services of the Chairman, Sir George W. Martin, have been recognised by the bestowal of a Knighthood.

THANKS.

The Board desires to record its high appreciation of the work of the Honorary Staff who so ably bear the responsibility of maintaining and advancing the essential services of the Institution.

Cordial thanks are again extended to the many donors of gifts in kind, the Public Assistance Committee, the Press, the City Police, Collectors of Silver Paper, and many agencies by whose efforts better work has been made possible. To the friends who made possible the providing of Christmas Dinners to needy families, the Board is especially grateful.

CONCLUSION.

The work of the Hospital has been increasing rapidly during the past few years, and the extensions referred to will, of necessity, impose an additional financial burden on the Institution. The Board, however, is assured that these increased activities will bring a greater measure of support in order that the highest standard of efficiency, combined with economy, may be maintained.
