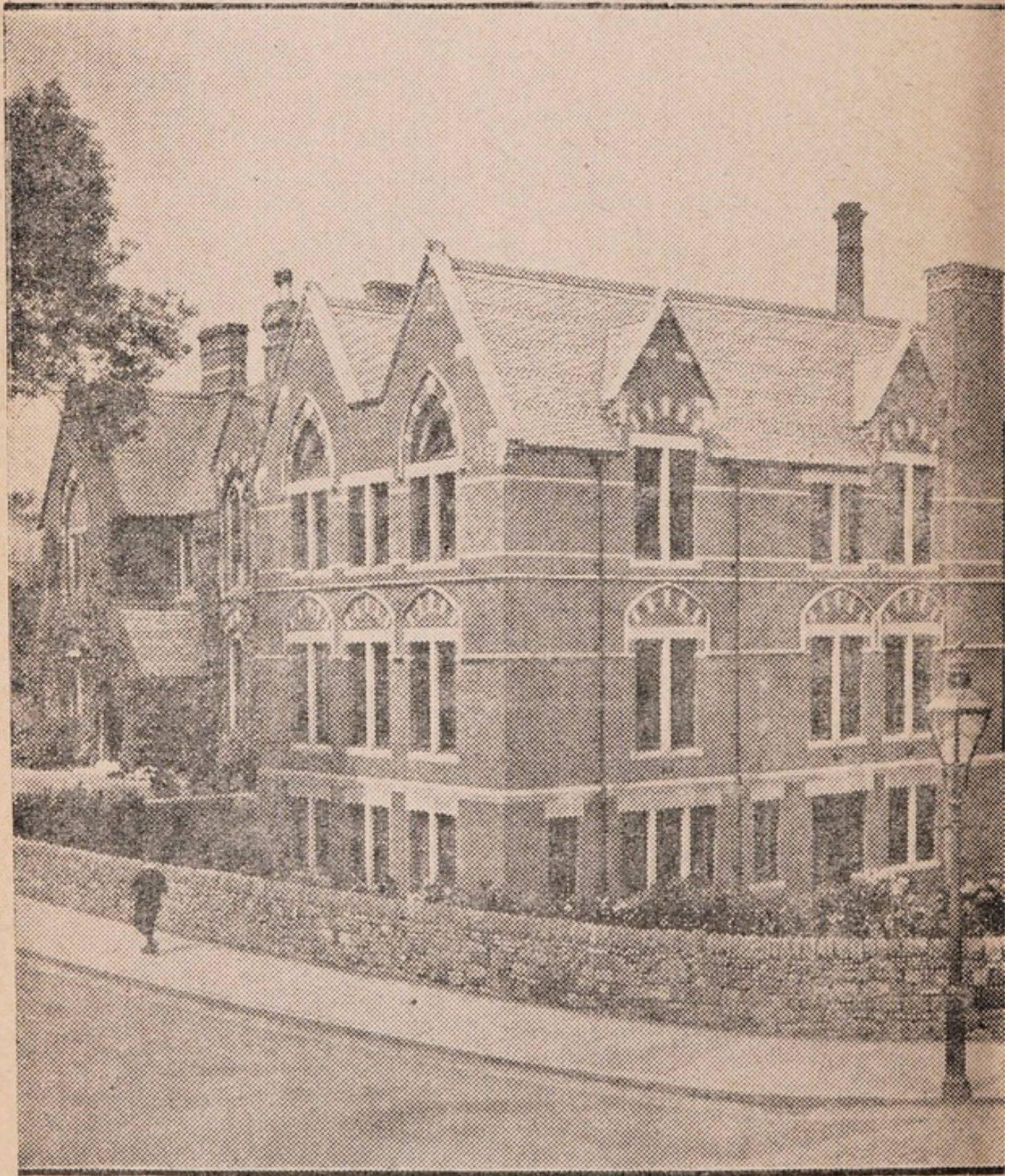

Hospital Sunday, May 21st, 1939

It is hoped that COLLECTIONS will be made at every place of Worship in the Town and District.

PATIENTS may be visited by their friends on Sundays and Wednesdays, between the hours of 2 p.m. and 4 p.m.

The Trustees recommend the following form of clause to be inserted in the Will of Testator or Testatrix bequeathing a Legacy to the Hospital.

“ I bequeath to the Trustees of the Memorial Cottage Hospital Leek, the sum of _____ free of duty to be paid together with the duty thereon out of such part of my estate as can be lawfully bequeathed for charitable purposes* such sums to be invested, and the income therefrom to be applied to the current expenditure of the Hospital,* and declare that the receipt of any three of the Trustees for the time being of such Hospital shall be sufficient discharge for the same.”

If the Testator wishes the Legacy to be used for the current expenses of the Hospital, or for any special expenditure, the following words should be substituted for those within the asterisks. “Such sum to be applied to the general purposes, improvement, or extension of the Hospital or to the—(insert name of Special Fund)—Fund.”

Subscriptions for the current year became due on the first January last, and the Committee respectfully request the Governors and Subscribers to pay the same as early as convenient to the credit of the Hospital at the District Bank, Leek, so that Recommendations may at once be sent to them and to enable them to exercise their privileges as subscribers or governors as the case may be. Collections in mills, etc., should be paid to the credit of the Hospital and Convalescent Fund Committee at the District Bank, Leek. All workpeople's recommendations sent in any year are available to the 30th June in the following year—e.g., a recommendation sent out on the 2nd March, 1938, is available until 30th June, 1939, and recommends for collections in places of worship are available for twelve months from the date of the collection.

Sixty-Fifth Annual Report

For the year 1938.

The Committee have pleasure in submitting their 65th Annual Report and Statement of Accounts being that for the year ended December 31st, 1938, and they desire to express their thanks to the Subscribers and Friends of the Hospital without whose help and support the benefits of the Hospital would be materially reduced.

The number of patients treated during the year was 369 and they were in for a total of 5906 days, giving an average period for each patient of 16 days as against 17 days last year. The average cost per patient, per week, was £3 13 5, as compared with £3 6 8 for 1937.

In the X-ray Department 547 Patients have been treated during the year and of this number 345 received free Recommends from the Hospital and Convalescent Fund Committee, which Committee have most kindly provided a new Shock-proof Portable X-ray Apparatus, for which our Committee tender sincere thanks and appreciation.

The ordinary income for the year, inclusive of special receipts, was £3393 11 1 and the expenditure was £3303 11s., and a further £84 12 5 for X-ray work.

Legacies of £100 from the late Mr. Henry Salt : £3566 from the late Mr. R. S. Milner : £720 from the late Miss Eliza Ann Deaville and the late Miss Hannah Deaville, have been received.

The Committee much regret to report the death of Miss Annie Raynor who was a member of the Committee for 35 years and a Trustee for 7 years and who did a considerable amount of work on behalf of the Hospital, also of Mr. William Hassall who had been a Trustee of the Hospital since 1924.

NEW HOSPITAL APPEAL FUND. A list is enclosed showing the amount subscribed to the NEW appeal to the end of April 1939, viz. £7984. It was hoped that building operations could have been started by the end of April but the Charity Commissioners stipulate that the result of our present appeal must reach the sum of £10,000 before their sanction can be given to commence operations.

An urgent appeal is therefore made to all intending contributors to the fund, to kindly pay in their amounts before the end of June.

Only £2,000 is now required in order to enable the Committee to proceed with the work during the present summer season and it is fervently hoped that by the end of May the fund will have reached the required figure of £10,000 thus making the total sum available £25,000 towards the £35,000 required to build and equip our much needed new Hospital.

The Committee wish to express their sincere thanks to all those who have already subscribed to the Building Fund Appeal Account at the District Bank and also to the local firms, their employees, and to all other bodies who have made special efforts on behalf of the Fund.

The Committee once again desire to place on record their deep appreciation of the excellent services rendered during the year by Mr. Eric Young and all Members of the Honorary Consulting Staff, to Dr. Harper the Honorary Radiologist, to Mr. H. J. Arundel the Honorary Solicitor, and to the Honorary Auditors Mr. George Clay and Mr. H. H. Goodwin. To each one the Committee are much indebted for their services.

The Members of the Ladies Linen Guild have again during the year rendered excellent services and the Committee tender to them their thanks and appreciation of the great help so freely given.

The Committee wish to express their appreciation and thanks to all Donors of gifts "in kind" and to all who assisted in any way to make the Christmas Festivities enjoyable, and also to the Matron and Staff for the excellent work done during the year.

Property, etc., belonging to the Hospital.

The original building of the Hospital was completed in 1870 by and at the sole expense of Mrs A. E. Alsop, in memory of her late husband, James Alsop, Esquire, and was erected on a site containing an area of 830 square yards.

She also erected the Memorial Archway in 1892.

The following plots of land were subsequently acquired and a new wing added to the Hospital in 1909.

Land adjoining and containing an area of 1,412 square yards, being three plots of land now laid together and respectively containing 444, 487, and 481 square yards, together with the Laundry erected on part of the plot of 444 square yards.

The above-mentioned sums of Stock have been transferred under order of the Charity Commissioners, dated 16th and 26th October, 1894, into the name of "THE OFFICIAL TRUSTEE OF CHARITABLE FUNDS" in trust for the Charity, and by a letter dated 17th November, 1894, the Secretary of the Charity Commission acknowledged that the New South Wales Stock has been duly transferred and by letters dated 17th January, 1895, and 14th January, 1897, he also acknowledged that the certificates for the other sums of Stock had been forwarded to him for registration and for final deposit at the Bank of England.

The before-mentioned Stocks and portions of the above-described land were purchased by means of the following donations, legacies, and sums, or some of them, bequeathed or given towards the endowment for the benefit of the Charity, viz. :

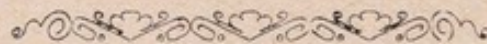
