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

THE CHAIRMAN'S REVIEW, 1941

FOREWORD.

War-time difficulties have delayed the publication of the Annual Report, and so my review deals with the affairs of the Hospital to the date of going to press.

ROYAL VISIT.

On 1st May, 1942, the Hospital was honoured by the visit of Her Majesty the Queen. Her Majesty made an extensive tour of the whole of the Hospital, and later expressed entire satisfaction with the work being done. The visit gave great encouragement and satisfaction to patients and staff, and is indicative of the personal interest of the Royal House in our Hospital services. The Board is most grateful.

THE WORK OF THE HOSPITAL.

One of the most pleasing features of the work of the Hospital is that, despite the increased work, the waiting list of patients is lower than it has been for years. This is because of the assistance rendered by the Ministry of Health Emergency Medical Service in accepting for admission to E.M.S. Hospitals a large number of our patients. We should prefer to deal with these cases at our own Hospital, but the accommodation is not sufficient, a certain proof of the need for more beds when the time arrives for any extension of the Hospital Services of the area.

If the average daily number of in-patients is added to the average number of patients seen each day in the Out-patient and Special Departments, it will be seen that no fewer than 460 people were seen each day of the year.

The Hospital has continued to treat soldiers, air-raid casualties, and transferred sick under the E.M.S. both in the wards and Out-patient Department, in addition to the ordinary work of peace-time.

FINANCE AND ACCOUNTS.

The accounts again make satisfactory reading. Despite the additional cost of maintenance and the improvement effected in equipment, there is a balance of £9374, being excess of income over expenditure for the year. This is already earmarked for the expenditure on the new boilers.

The increased income is largely due to the generous grant of £3012 from the Divisional Hospitals Council in respect of our portion of the total grants to Voluntary Hospitals by the Local Authorities of Berks, Bucks and Oxon, the increase of £2041 from the Windsor, Slough and Associated Hospitals Contributory Scheme, the increased amount due from the Ministry of Health for E.M.S. work, and additional receipts per the Almoner from grateful patients.

Our thanks are especially due to the Local Authorities for their grant, and to the Committees and voluntary workers of the Contributory Scheme for the large increase in the amount allocated to this Hospital. The Scheme has almost doubled its income in the last four years.

The increase in expenditure is accounted for by the inevitable rise in the cost of provisions, drugs, dressings, fuel and salaries and wages.

MEDICAL.

In the death of Dr. F. Hathaway the Hospital has lost the services of its Senior Surgeon. Dr. Hathaway was one of the original trustees of the present Hospital, and his long service as a Surgeon must have resulted in great benefit to the thousands of patients who came under his care. To commemorate his memory, a public subscription has been opened with the object of establishing a "Hathaway Nurses' Welfare Fund", and a suitable tablet is to be erected in the Nurses' Home. During his lifetime Dr. Hathaway always did his very best to obtain improved conditions for the nursing staffs, and the memorial will therefore serve the dual purpose of recognizing his surgical skill and his regard for the welfare of the nurses.

The following special departments have been added to the out-patients' service:

Psychological Medicine, under the charge of Dr. Henry Wilson; Speech Clinic, under the charge of Miss Languth.

In the Pathological Laboratory changes have taken place because of the transfer of the E.M.S. Sector Laboratory from this Hospital to Staines. New equipment for our own Laboratory had to be purchased, and Dr. E. Sayle has been appointed full-time Assistant Pathologist. The work grows very rapidly in this important section of the Hospital Service.

The demands of military service make it increasingly difficult to fill vacant posts on the house staff, and the position will, without doubt, become worse. This throws added responsibility upon members of the honorary staff, who have rendered such invaluable services to the Hospital during a most difficult year.

NURSING.

During 1940 the salaries of the Nursing Staff were brought into line with the recommendations of the Ministry of Health, to whom we, in common with other Voluntary Hospitals, are indebted for their contribution towards the additional cost. The Hospital does not find any difficulty in obtaining probationer nurses.

It has been decided to appoint a Sister to take charge of the Nurses' Home, these duties having been undertaken by the Assistant Matron in the past.

DOMESTIC.

War service has made many staff difficulties.

Despite rationing, the standard of food for both patients and staff has steadily improved, due to more efficient control and staffing of the kitchens. The various controls of commodities, food, drugs, dressings, linen, steel, rubber, crockery, etc., all have their repercussion on the work of the Hospital, which is so varied in character that practically everything which affects the outside world in any way affects the Hospital.

ENGINEERING.

We have at last been able to start to build the new boiler house which has been needed for so many months. The cost of the new building and of the new boiler plant will be over £11,000. It may seem to many to be the wrong time to launch out in such a large improvement, but it would have been impossible for the work of the Hospital to continue for another winter under the conditions of that of 1941-2. Constant breaking down of the heating services made the work in the Wards and Out-Patient Department at times almost impossible, and the Board are very pleased to know that there is every possibility that the new works will be completed in the autumn of this year.

EQUIPMENT.

To improve the out-patient service the following equipment has been obtained:

New seating accommodation;

Indicators to denote the Clinics;

Plaster Trolleys;

Sterilizers in Casualty Room and E.N.T. Room;

New Examination Tables in Casualty Room;

New Instrument Trolleys and Dressing Cabinets;

Lights in Examination Cubicles.

In the Operating Theatres new sterilizers are being provided, and the emergency lighting and fire alarm system improved to meet the changed conditions of war time.

In the wards additional blood transfusion stands and resuscitation cradles have been provided and further instruments and appliances bought.

A.R.P.

The Hospital has taken part in A.R.P. exercises to the complete satisfaction of the A.R.P. Controllers of Windsor and the County of Berkshire. On one occasion seventy casualties were dealt with in less than two hours, and the arrangements made in anticipation of an emergency proved effective in practice.

The Gas Decontamination Centre for seriously injured gas casualties is now ready for use. It is fully equipped and the staff are available if needed. The Centre is under the control of Dr. Sayle.

All plans are in hand for evacuation in case of air-raid damage or an invasion. The Hospital is sectionalized and will be ready to move at any time within twenty-four hours, each section having its complement of staff, equipment, drugs and emergency food rations.

WAR DAMAGE ACT.

Although there is no obligation on the part of the Board to insure under the War Damage Act against damage to buildings, the Act does not cover Hospitals for damage which may occur to the contents of the buildings, and so at considerable cost the Board decided to insure to the full extent of our risk, basing our premium on the amount covered for fire insurance. We felt that this was necessary to protect the subscribing public against the possibility of a complete cessation of the work because of lack of funds to affect replacements.

POST-WAR HOSPITAL POLICY.

The Minister of Health recently made a very important statement on the policy of the Government in relation to post-war Hospital Service. Mr. Ernest Brown in his remarks endorsed the policy of regionalization, with which this Hospital has been associated even before the establishment of the Nuffield Provincial Hospitals Trust.

It is to be profoundly hoped, however, that the present Voluntary Hospital Services will be allowed to become equal partners in whatever scheme may eventually be devised, as for many years they have provided the major Hospital Service available to the people of the country.

A true regional partnership for a planned Hospital Service is to be welcomed, but it should be built on the foundations of the best in any district, whether that best be found in the Voluntary Hospitals or in those institutions controlled by the Local Authorities. We feel that there is a certain ground for apprehension and a need for a clearer statement of intentions through the medium of the regional machinery being set up in various parts of the country under the auspices of the Nuffield Provincial Hospitals Trust.

REGIONALIZATION.

The Hospital continues to play its part in the Berks, Bucks and Oxon Regional Council.

I have still the honour to be its Vice-Chairman and a representative of the Region on the Central Provincial Hospitals Council. I am also Vice-Chairman of the Council's Administrative Advisory Committee. The Secretary of the Hospital serves as a member of the Council and on the Administrative and Contributory Scheme Advisory Committees.

It is to be hoped that in the future planning of the area the tendency will not be the over-centralization of specialized services, but rather development in several parts of the region, so that the service may be more readily and easily available to the general public.

CLOSING REMARKS.

This Hospital is in urgent need of a new Out-patient Department, but permission to build cannot be obtained until after the war.

We need more ward accommodation to deal with greater demands by an expanding population.

The kitchen and storage accommodation require completely new buildings.

The advent of the war has certainly prevented many of these necessary alterations being carried out.

The financial need is still great and the appeal to the generosity of old and new friends as urgent as ever. We all realize the importance of war charities in the country's united effort, yet it is to be hoped that the Voluntary Hospitals with their record of service in treatment and training both of doctors and nurses will not be allowed to go short at a time when they are more needed than ever.

Meantime, our grateful thanks to all our many friends and supporters.

OBITUARY.

The Hospital has lost by death a number of generous friends and supporters, among them being:

Lady Edward Spencer Churchill;

Mr. H. F. Goodford;

Canon Lewis Evans.

Lady Edward Spencer Churchill was a respected member of the General Committee and a welcome visitor to the wards of the Hospital. Very few knew of all the pleasure she gave to many of the patients on the occasion of her visits or of the help she gave to the Hospital in other ways.

It is fitting that there should have been formed a small Committee to raise by public subscriptions sufficient to endow a bed in this Hospital as a permanent memorial to her work here. It is learned on going to press that the total amount of £1000 has been subscribed.

Mr. H. F. Goodford was one of the trustees of the Aldem's Charity and for many years a member of the Finance Committee. His services will be greatly missed.

Canon Lewis Evans, a member of the General Committee, always gave of his best in his administrations to the patients.

The Hospital is poorer by the loss of these generous friends of the Voluntary Hospital System.
