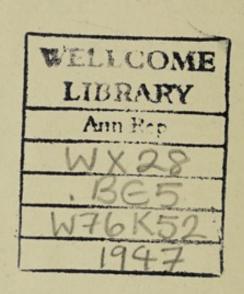

The Annual Report 1947

1. THE FUTURE

Last year we indulged in retrospection by surveying the progress made by the Hospital since its foundation. To-day all eyes are turned to a future which is not as yet clearly defined. Perhaps this is as well, for that which is not rigid has the advantage of flexibility. It is to the advantage of such a venture as a National Health Service that it should be resilient in order to take advantage of new thought and ideas, new methods and new people. As long as this flexibility is maintained the new service will have the loyal support of all who desire to give of their best for the benefit of the Hospital patient.

It is with pleasure that we have received the notification that the local Hospital area of this part of the North-West Metropolitan Region is to be called the Windsor Group, and that the group is comprised of those Hospitals which have so readily joined together in the past in order to co-ordinate the needs of the district. This Hospital will be ready at all times to join with the other Hospitals in order to achieve an integrated service.

2. THE POSITION ON 5th JULY, 1948

It is advisable that all our Subscribers and Committees should know how the Hospital will stand on and after the vesting day for the National Health Service. The North-West Metropolitan Regional Hospital Board under the Health Service Act is already in existence and is charged by the Minister with the responsibility for the Hospital service in the Region.

The Board is responsible for the formation of the Local Hospital Management Committees for Hospital Groups within the Region. Ours is the Windsor Group and it will have a Local Hospital Management Committee responsible for the day to day management of all the Hospitals in the Group. At its discretion certain Hospitals will have House Committees to which the Local Hospital Management Committee may delegate certain of its powers. Although on the 5th July, 1948, the Local Hospital Management Committee will be the responsible body for finance, management, staffing and co-ordination of the Hospitals in the group and on that same day our present Board and Committees should cease to function, it is possible, in order to affect a smooth change over to the new system, that we may be asked to carry on for a short time as we are now, acting as the agents of the new Committee.

If we should be requested to do so then it is hoped that in the interest of the patients our present Board and Committee Members will agree to do so.

The position may be clarified by the date of the Annual Meeting.

5. THE MEDICAL WORK AND STAFFING IN 1947

The Joint Selection Committee for Medical appointments has continued to function during the year. The following appointments have been made:

Mr. A. S. Dill Russell, M.B., B.S., F.R.C.S. Hon. Asst. Surgeon.

Dr. J. R. D. Webb, M.R.C.S., M.R.C.P., D.P.H. Hon. Asst. Paediatrician.

Dr. J. R. D. Webb, M.R.C.S., M.R.C.P., D.P.H. Hon. Asst. Paediatrician. An additional feature in Medical Education has been arranged for June of this year with the approval of the Ministry of Health and the British Postgraduate Medical Federation—a Postgraduate Course for General Practitioners has been arranged. The Course is spread over 14 days and includes lectures and demonstrations by members of the Honorary Staff. The course is free of charge to any General Practitioner who cares to attend. We are greatly indebted to the Members of the Medical Staff who have agreed to give their services free and it is hoped that the course will be well attended, for it is of great importance that the General Practitioners should have the opportunity of keeping in touch with modern hospital methods and progressive medical thought and practice.

The Board of Management welcomes Mr. R. Vaughan Payne, M.Chir., F.R.C.S., on his return from Service in the Royal Air Force.

The increasing work in three departments has made it necessary to take steps to add to the staff. Advertisements have appeared for the following posts:

Physician in charge of Physio-therapy.

Assistant Radiologist.

Chief assistant to the Accident Service and Orthopaedic Service.

The first is an appointment to this Hospital only, the second in conjunction with Maidenhead and Iver Hospitals and the third with Maidenhead, Taplow and Iver Hospitals.

On 1st April, 1948, a mobile team for obstetric emergencies was brought into service. The team will go to any part of East Berkshire with the necessary apparatus to deal with cases of obstetric emergency when it is impossible to have the case brought into hospital.

At the request of the Berkshire County Medical Officer a Chest Clinic has been started. The Clinic is held in the Out-Patient Department on the second Tuesday in each month. It is staffed by the County Medical Officer until the appointed day.

6. THE NURSING WORK OF THE HOSPITAL DURING 1947

A development has taken place in the Group Preliminary Training School for Nurses. During the year the Canadian Red Cross Memorial Hospital at Taplow expressed a desire to send students to the School. To do this requires larger premises than those at present provided by this Hospital and if the necessary permits can be obtained the enlarged school will be accommodated at "Bray Court," Maidenhead. Negotiations are taking place regarding a lease and permits for redecoration and adaptation of the house are being sought from the Ministry of Health.

7. THE DOMESTIC WORK DURING 1947

A Domestic Supervisor has been appointed and the department is now better staffed than for some years. Certain labour-saving devices have been installed, the Domestic Sitting Room has been re-furnished and re-decorated and the Domestic Bedrooms are being redecorated.

We still need more Domestic Staff.

8. ADMINISTRATION AND MANAGEMENT

During the year our Chairman, Sir Owen Morshead, has been appointed by the Minister of Health to serve on the North-West Metropolitan Regional Hospital Board. This has caused great satisfaction to the Board of Management. The Board records with much regret the death of Sir William Collins. We paid tribute to the late Sir William's great qualities and generosity in our last report, suffice it then to say that his loss to this Hospital and to the wider hospital sphere in which he displayed such interest will be very great.

9. CATERING

Much publicity has been given to the standard of catering in Hospitals. Reports by various bodies have been presented to the Ministry and the general public. It is a source of pleasure to the Board that the remedy recommended, namely that the Catering Department should be under the control of an experienced Catering Officer, has been in force here since 1939. The system has proved a great success. It must, however, be realised that supplies of food and the variety which can be given are causing concern. Foods which were at one time free of control could then be used to give variety to the diet, but the policy of placing many of these on points without any increase in the number available has made the situation difficult and complicated. Catering is a skilled job in these days and we are fortunate in the Staff we have and especially in the experience of the Catering Officer, Mr. P. Fisher.

10. ENGINEERING AND MAINTENANCE AND ADDITIONS TO PROPERTY

Much work on deferred maintenance has been done during the year. Our own works staff have completed the redecoration of the main kitchens, ward sluices, ward kitchens, Operating Theatres and many of the smaller rooms. Permission has been granted for the erection of a new Plaster Room and the relaying of the floors of the Out-Patient Department. This work is proceeding. Application has been made to the Ministry of Health to proceed with the following works:

1 An Additional Boiler and extensions to the Boiler House with provision for new steam mains.

This has been made essential because of the added load on steam and hot water services due to the installation of new and better Dressing and Instrument sterilizers, bed-pan washers and crockery sterilizers.

2 Sterile Room, Oxygen Store and Ether Store.

The Sterile room is needed in order to prepare penicillin and other sterile preparations under proper conditions.

The Oxygen Store and Ether Store are required because of the need for greater fire precautions.

3 Additional Fire Precautions advised by the National Fire Service.

At the invitation of the Board a survey of the Hospital was made by the Fire Service. In order to comply with their wishes certain work requiring licences is essential. This is the subject of the present application to the Ministry.

4 Laundry Building, Covered Way to the Nurses' Home and Library.

These works are joined together in one contract. The Laundry Building is required to make possible a central collecting point for dirty linen and for the proper checking in and out of laundry to the Wards and Departments.

The Covered Way is to replace one which is dilapidated and leads from the Hospital to the Nurses' Home.

The Library is to accommodate under proper conditions some 1,000 books for the use of patients.

5 Electrical Wiring.

We are advised that the whole hospital is in need of new wiring from fuse boxes to all lighting points. This is costly, but essential.

The cost of all these works will be approximately £30,000.

11. FINANCE

The following table summarises the position of the Hospital to 31st December, 1947. The adverse balance from 1st July, 1947, to the appointed day, 5th July, 1948, will certainly be proportionately more. All this is due to rising costs and the falling off of income from various sources.

12. CONTRIBUTORY SCHEME

The amount received from the Windsor, Slough and Associated Hospitals Contributory Scheme is £17,329 11s. 2d., and from other Schemes £4,782 9s. 6d.

The Hospital is grateful to the Committees and Collectors for the loyal manner in which they have continued to work while knowing that their services would not be needed after 5th July, 1948. For years these devoted helpers have served the Hospital with no reward except the knowledge of a work of real worth well done. To many, instead of thanks, has come criticism from unreasonable members. They can, however, be assured of the thanks of those who have had the onerous task of providing funds to carry on the work of the Hospital.

13. THE NEW HOSPITAL SITE

It was reported last year that a Joint Committee of the Hospital and the Slough Hospital Committee had agreed to obtain a site for the new Hospital on the Wexham side of Slough.

Since then, with the blessing of the Joint Committee and of the North-West Metropolitan Regional Hospital Board, the site of Wexham Park has been acquired by the Slough Hospital Committee. The purchase includes the mansion, which for the present is to be rented to the Canadian Red Cross Memorial Hospital at Taplow, as a residence for their Night Nursing Staff.

The new Hospital will be the concern of the Local Hospitals Management Committee, the North-West Metropolitan Regional Hospital Board and the Minister of Health. Nevertheless it is good to know that such a valuable and convenient site has been acquired on reasonable terms. We can only hope that the construction of this urgently needed Hospital will not be long delayed.

14. THANKS TO ALL

This is our last Annual Report, and the Board of Management wish to record their thanks to the following:

1 The Honorary Medical Staff.

Our debt to these cannot be repaid by words or measured in money value. The progress and the work of the Voluntary Hospitals has been made possible in the past by the free gift of their skilled services; but the old order changes and a new era dawns. It is to be hoped that under the new system of medical staffing all that is best in medicine may be preserved and made available to the patients. We are grateful for all that the Honorary Staff system has provided and to those who have been members of our staff. We remember no less the long succession of Resident House Officers by whom they in turn have been loyally supported at all times.

2 The Members of Committees of the Hospital and our Subscribers.

To all these we say "Thank You." Whether the assistance given has been by personal service or by monetary contribution it has been invaluable. We hope that as the new service develops and the opportunities for such services grow, as they must, there will still be people ready to further the work of the Hospital.

3 The Staff.

To Miss Schofield the Matron, together with her devoted team of Sisters and Nurses; to Mr. Weston, their diligent and respected Secretary, and all who share with him in the administrative and clerical work of the Hospital; to the engineers, the porters, the kitchen and domestic staff and the gardeners—to all who have lived in the service of this Voluntary Hospital the Board of Management would offer their appreciative thanks. They will have new employers after the 5th July, 1948, but not a new task; their skill and ability, their loyalty and willing service will still be the deciding factor in whether the new service is to be successful or otherwise. These will surely be given, for if there has been one characteristic of the staff as a whole, it has been their personal regard for the welfare of the patient before and above every other consideration.
