The 67th Annual Report

OF THE

COTTAGE HOSPITAL, IVER.

In presenting the 67th Annual Report, the Committee wish to record their appreciation of the generous support the Hospital has received during the past year, and to thank all subscribers and helpers.

The Committee are most grateful for a collection of £70 7s. given as a thankoffering for the restoration to health of His Majesty the King.

The Hospital has again proved most useful to the neighbourhood. There were 131 in-patients, the same number as in the previous year; but the out-patients showed a big increase, being 241, totalling 1,247 visits, as against 173, totalling 636 visits, in 1928.

The special department for the eye continues to be much appreciated. There were 54 patients during the year. The Committee take this opportunity of expressing their gratitude to the Hon. Consulting Ophthalmic Surgeon and also to the Hon. Consulting Surgeon for the ear, throat, and nose department.

The total ordinary expenditure for the year was £1,166 1s. 9d. compared with £865 8s. 7d. in 1928.

Two emergency beds have been added, bringing the total number available to ten beds and two cots.

It was found necessary for the efficient working of the Hospital to increase the nursing staff, and in June a staff nurse was appointed in addition to the two assistant nurses.

Miss Russell Edwards resigned in March, after a year's hard work for the Hospital, often rendered more difficult by shortage of staff. Miss L. E. Barnett came as Matron on April 30th, and her unfailing kindness and skill have been much appreciated by both the patients and the Committee.

On his departure for Kenya Colony in April, Mr. C. J. W. Hodgson resigned the position of Hon. Treasurer of the Hospital. His resignation was much regretted, and the Committee sincerely thank him for all the time and trouble he devoted to the accounts of the Hospital. They feel fortunate in securing his brother, Mr. N. S. Hodgson, to fill his place.

The Hospital lost another most valuable worker in August, when Mr. Buckingham resigned from the Committee, of which he had been a member since 1923. During that time he was chairman of the Finance Committee, and did a vast amount of work for the Hospital, particularly in connection with the box collections. His help will be much missed, and the Committee record their gratitude to him.

Pound Day was a great success. The Committee are indebted to all who helped and gave so generously. They much appreciated the gifts from the County Council Schools:—Iver, girls—£1 2s. 7d. and goods 186½-lb.; boys—3s. 2d. and 78-lb.; infants—£1. Iver Heath—£1 5s. 4d. Langley Central Schools—1s.; Grade V.—2s. 6d. and goods 208-lb. Colnbrook Girls' School—2s. and goods.

The collecting boxes again show an increase—£89 13s. 7d. as against £87 14s. 10d. in 1928. The Challenge Cup was won by the "Fox and Pheasant," Iver, with £14 9s. 11½d.; and the Comforts Fund Cup by the Montague Arms, Langley, with £9 2s. 6d.; the Village Club, Langley, was again third, with £8 14s.

The Committee's thanks are offered to all boxholders, and to Mrs. Janes, Mrs. C. H. Gane, the Ascot Car Collection Committee, the Bucks Constabulary Sports Committee, Mrs. Mewburn-Watson, Mrs. Rigden, the Iver Heath Horticultural Society, the Salt Hill Society, the Langley Allotments and Gardens Association, Iver Heath Football Club, Mr. Plume, Iver Hospital and Playing Fields Entertainment Society, Mr.

C. H. Gane, the Richings Park Players, Uxbridge High School, Miss H. Baker, the management and employees of Messrs. E. B. Reed and Co.'s Brickfields, Messrs. Lowe and Shawyer's Nurseries, Messrs. Smith's Brickfields, Messrs. Boyer's Wharf, Messrs. Janes Brothers, and Richings Park Estate Office, for contributions resulting from collections and entertainments; to the churches that have given collections; and to all collectors of silver paper.

The Comforts Fund has provided the Hospital with a portable X-ray apparatus. This was badly needed, and is proving very useful. The Committee of the Fund worked very hard to organize a "draw" which raised £166 9s. The Hospital owes them a big debt of gratitude for the many gifts they have provided—the X-ray apparatus, the redecoration of the two wards, kitchen and scullery, and for a Challenge Cup for box-holders. The Committee particularly wish to thank Mrs. Janes for all her work on behalf of the Hospital.

Through the kindness and generosity of the Matron, Miss Barnett, the Comforts Fund Committee, and other friends, a very enjoyable Christmas party was given for the child in-patients and out-patients of the year.

The Committee wish to express their very sincere thanks to the Hon. Consulting Surgeon, the Hon. Medical Officers, the Hon. Masseuse, the Matron and her staff for their valuable services; to Mr. N. S. Hodgson, the Hon. Treasurer; and to Mr. Gerald Brown, the Hon. Auditor, for his kindness in once more auditing the accounts. The Committee greatly appreciate all that they have done for the Hospital.
