

Obituary

MISS GERTRUDE LEES, A.R.R.C.

It is with great regret, and with a feeling of real personal loss to all who had the privilege of knowing her, that we have to record the passing of Sister Gertrude, on 3rd February, 1941.

She had devoted the whole of her nursing life to St. John's, so that it would be difficult to think of the hospital as not connected with her dignified and gracious personality.

Coming to the Hospital in 1892 she worked there with the greatest devotion, first as a lady pupil, then as one of the Nursing Sisters of St. John the Divine, and finally became Matron of the hospital in 1912.

Throughout her long service she maintained by her wonderful example and influence the high tradition of St. John's, the foundation of which had been laid by her predecessors. Greatly beloved, not only by her patients, who were so helped and comforted by her in their time of suffering, but also by her nursing staff, to whom her high sense of duty, ready sympathy in their difficulties, and deep religious convictions, were an inspiration and education and which brought out all that was best in their work and character.

She had already talked of retiring when, in 1914, the Great War started, and she decided she must carry on and "do her bit", though the additional work entailed was almost too much for her, and she never recovered in her later years from the strain of that time.

The British and Belgian soldiers who were sent to St. John's were all devoted to her, and even up to the last she had letters from many of the men who had been under her care. Few people know how much practical help she gave to many of them after the War. She was awarded by His Majesty King George V the decoration of the A.R.R.C., and received the medal of Queen Elizabeth of the Belgians.

Miss Lees retired in 1925, after a long and honourable career, taking with her the respect and affection of all who knew her, having maintained the great traditions of the hospital which, one hopes, may last as long as St. John's exists.

In the years that followed, her greatest interest and joy were centred in her old hospital, and she was never so happy as when she came down from her home in Kensington to visit St. John's and see her old friends. Who can forget her at the Annual Meetings, of the Nurses' League, surrounded by many of her old staff, whose loyalty and affection were always hers?

One cannot think of a better ending to this short tribute to her memory than by quoting the words of one of our greatest surgeons who had worked with her for many years. His words were, "She was a wonderful woman, and it was a well-spent life."

In December, 1940, was taken from us MISS PURCELL, who from the year 1900 was closely connected with the hospital in that her father then joined the Committee, becoming Chairman in 1904, which year also saw the inauguration of St. John's Hospital Guild, which from then on was to occupy so much of Miss Purcell's life. She took a very active share in beginning it and became its honorary secretary in 1911 and continued to fulfil that office until she died. I think it is true to say that she was the life of the Guild. No effort was spared by her to attract new members and to retain keenness in those already enrolled. She will long be remembered by us all.

THE 57th ANNUAL REPORT.

The Governors beg to present their Fifty-seventh Annual Report, which, by direct instruction from the Ministry of Supply, is, on account of paper shortage, of the briefest kind.

During the year 52 beds and the Out-patient Department were kept open for civilian sick and 50 beds were reserved for the Ministry of Health. On no less than nine occasions was damage done by bombs to one or other of our buildings. The most severe was in December, 1940, when Westbank, attached to the Nurses' Home was completely destroyed and Cedar Lodge, housing the Massage and Dental Departments, so badly shattered that it can no longer be used. The Out-patient building at the bottom of Morden Hill was also severely hit, but this we have been able to repair.

We should like to state that throughout all these trials the staff have behaved in a manner that we should expect and that the services to its people were never interrupted for more than a week in the wards and a fortnight in the Out-patient Department.
