

REPORT FOR 1893.



N presenting their Report for 1893 the Committee desire to thank their friends and subscribers for the welcome and continued help afforded them during a very anxious and

trying time. It had been hoped that with the acceptance of the plans for a new hospital, prepared by Messrs. Salter & Adams, matters would have at last run smoothly. Such, however, was far from the case. The County Council refused to allow the line of frontage which was taken by the Architects, and it became necessary to modify the plans. This was done in due course, and the sanction of the County Council was obtained. A few builders were then selected, and invited to tender for the erection of the new building, according to the specifications prepared by the Architects, who had estimated the cost at £10,500. The tenders

were all remarkably close, showing that they had been well considered, but were largely in excess of the estimate. The financial position of the Committee did not warrant their accepting any tender at such an increased cost, and there was nothing left but to instruct the Architects to do their best to reduce the amount without impairing the efficiency of the hospital to any appreciable degree. Everything that could be done was done, and the Building Committee spent many hours over the task, being anxious not to economise by the use of indifferent or unsuitable materials. It was found impossible to satisfy these conditions and yet build to the full extent at first contemplated. The decision was, therefore, arrived at to slightly diminish the area of the building, while leaving it perfectly easy to extend it when a future opportunity oc-This being settled, certain other econocurred. mies were effected by reducing the sum intended to be spent on pure decoration, and by postponing the execution of the non-essential parts of the plan, such as the porch, &c., which, however desirable they may be, can be left for the present without any great detriment to the Hospital. The result of all this labour and care was to reduce the cost to £10,979, and a contract at this sum was signed with Messrs. Patrick, a well-known firm of builders, who now have the work in hand, and are bound to complete it by the end of 1894. As, however, everything must be thoroughly dry before the building is used as a hospital, it is not likely it will be opened for the reception of patients till early in the summer of 1895. The Out-patient Department is being worked under difficulties, but it is believed it will not be necessary to close it for more than about a month, while a few alterations are made for the purpose of connecting it properly with the new building.

As considerable modifications have been made in the plan originally proposed, and which was printed in the last report, the Committee think it well to insert now the amended plan so that all who are interested may clearly see the lines on which the Hospital is being rebuilt. The elevation, though less decorative than had at first been contemplated, is of a pleasing character, and will improve greatly the appearance of that part of Paddington Green.

The Harrow house, which was taken to accommodate in-patients as far as possible, has proved most valuable as will be seen from the appended exhaustive report of the Registrar. It has combined to a large extent the functions of Hospital and Convalescent Home, the house at Wembley having to be closed on September 29th, owing to its being in an unfit condition for the children to remain. In severing their connection with Wembley, the Committee wish to express their warm thanks to Dr. Goddard, who so kindly acted as Honorary Physician to the Home and took so much interest in it. Nor are they unmindful of the friendly sympathy shown to the Home by many of the residents.

A very successful photograph of some of the

children at Harrow was taken by Dr. McIlraith, the late House Surgeon, who has kindly allowed the Committee to reproduce it.



As will be seen from this picture, the house is situated in quite open country, the garden at the back abutting on pasture fields. The fresh air and general surroundings are powerful aids to recovery, and the children quickly feel the effects, their complaints being cured, or greatly alleviated in much shorter time than is found possible in

London. The house is less than ten minutes' walk from the Harrow Station of the London and North Western Railway, so it is easily accessible, and the Committee hope that not a few of their friends may find their way down in the course of next summer. They feel sure the visitors will be pleased with the place, and will be warmly welcomed by the nursing staff and children.

Among the donations received during the year may be specially mentioned the following: -Baron de Hirsch, £300; "A Friend," £500; Life Endowment of the "John Palmer Stocker" Cot by Miss C. Boucher, £300; Christ Church, Lancaster Gate, £239 10s. 8d.; Mr. George Hanbury, £100; Mr. John Cunliffe, £50; Miss Green, £50; and the Trustees of Smith's (Kensington Estate) Charity, £50. A Concert, kindly arranged by Miss Stewart, produced the very handsome sum of £121 3s., while two Toy Symphony Concerts, which some ladies were good enough to organise, realised £66. The proceeds of a Sale of Work at 81, Lancaster Gate, generously arranged by Mrs. Elliott Cooper, amounted to £68. To these kind friends, and to all who have contributed in various ways to promote the interests of the Hospital, the Committee again tender their most grateful thanks.

The Committee thankfully acknowledge the heavy obligation they are under to the Medical and Surgical Staff for their valuable services gratuitously rendered. Nor must the admirable and efficient manner in which the Matron and Secretary

continue to discharge their respective duties be passed over without full recognition.

The Members of the Managing Committee who retire by rotation this year, according to the Constitution of the Hospital, are Lieut-Col. H. Bentinck, Mr. Henry Seton-Karr, and Dr. T. C. Kirby. Being eligible, the Committee have much pleasure in proposing their re-election, and trust the Governors will accept the proposal.

The Committee must once again urge on all who are interested in the Hospital to do their utmost to help, and to induce others to help, in enabling the Hospital to be reopened as free from debt as possible. To ensure absolute freedom, a further sum of £5,000 should be raised. No doubt this seems a large amount, but it is hoped the sight of the new building steadily rising into existence, may stimulate all to special efforts. The aid already given has been most valuable, and is gratefully recognised, but more remains to be done. Will all who read this report kindly bear this in mind.

He will gladly forward a copy of this report to any one who wishes to have one, and furnish all information in his power at any time.

REGISTRAR'S REPORT FOR THE YEAR 1893.

The total number of patients treated in the Harrow Hospital during the year 1893 was 189. Of this number 162 were sent home cured or relieved, 8 died, and 19 remained in the hospital on January 1st, 1894.

It was found to be impossible to send all cases requiring indoor treatment to Harrow, owing to the length of the journey, and some were, therefore, transferred to other hospitals or sent home. But where no risk was incurred, many children acutely ill, and for whom home treatment presented very little prospect of success, were taken to Harrow, and in no case have ill results accrued. On the contrary, improvement, as a rule, followed much more quickly in the fresh country air than was usual at the hospital in Paddington Green. Amongst the affections which seemed to yield rapidly to treatment at Harrow may be mentioned bronchitis, pneumonia, empyema, acute and chronic rheumatism, strumous and tubercular diseases, and the various sequelæ of influenza. Although the numerous and serious complications of influenza amongst adults are now well known, it is not so generally recognised that amongst children many insidious and debilitating affections are to be traced to the same source. These were frequently present in the patients sent to Harrow, and were most successfully treated there.

The question of the treatment of surgical cases after the closing of the hospital was a difficult one, as it was impossible to carry out major operations at Harrow. This matter was satisfactorily arranged by the kindness of different members of the surgical staff, who admitted the graver cases into the other hospitals with which they were connected, and then transferred the patients as soon as possible after operation to Harrow. In these cases, also, it was very noticeable how quickly wounds healed and health was restored.

One great advantage in connection with the Harrow Hospital is that the patients spend the whole day out of doors during a great part of the year. To the town children this was a source of unmixed enjoyment, and it was not long before their faces compared favourably with those of the children born in the neighbouring village. If any further argument were needed in support of the continuation of the work at Harrow it will be found at the Out-patient department at Paddington Green, where mothers are now attending

with the request that their children may be sent to Harrow, as they have seen for themselves the good results obtained in other cases there.

The Out-patient department at Paddington Green continues to be very well attended. During the past year there were 11,758 new cases, and the total number of Out-patient attendances was 31,823. A large part of the work in this department consists in the instruction of mothers regarding the proper feeding of their children. In too many cases infants are fed on those articles which are cheapest and most widely advertised, and much ill-health is traceable to this cause. Printed instructions regarding diet, exercise, clothing, and domestic hygiene are supplied to the mothers, and have been much appeciated. At present the work is being carried on under considerable difficulties, owing to the diminished accommodation during the alterations, but it is hoped that this will be remedied by the end of another year.

EXTRACT FROM THE CONSTITUTION OF THE HOSPITAL.

Objects.

To afford Medical and Surgical relief to the Children of the poor, under the age of 12 years for boys, and 14 for girls:

- a. By admission to the Hospital.
- b. Through the Out-patient Department.

To promote the advancement of Medical Science with reference to the diseases of childhood.

To diffuse among all classes of the community, and chiefly among the poor, a better acquaintance with the management of infants and children during health or sickness, and to assist in the education and training of women in the special duties of Children's Nurses.

The In and Out-patient Departments of the Hospital shall be entirely free, but patients shall be invited to contribute voluntarily to the funds so far as they are able.

Covernors.

Every contributor of two Guineas or more annually to the funds of the Hospital shall, so long as his subscription is continued, be constituted a Governor, and shall be entitled to one vote at the Annual or any Special Meeting, but a new Subscriber to the amount aforesaid shall not be so entitled unless his subscription for the current year has been paid at least three calendar months before the day of the meeting.

Every donor of 20 Guineas, or more, at one time to the Hospital, and every collector of 50 Guineas, or more, at one time, and any one Executor, to be nominated in writing—if there is more than one, all the Executors, or if there is no Executor who accepts the office, the Administrator of every Will—giving a legacy amounting to £100, or more (after deducting Legacy Duty, if any,) to the Hospital, shall be constituted a Life Governor, and shall have one vote at the Annual or any Special Meeting next succeeding the receipt of such donation or contribution, provided it has been paid not less than three calendar months before the day of the meeting, and at all subsequent meetings.

No Governor shall, under any circumstances, be entitled to more than one vote at any Meeting.

Annual Meeting.

In the month of February in every year, or as soon after as may be, a General Meeting of the Governors and other Contributors to the funds of the Hospital shall be held, of which notice shall be given within one calendar month of the day of meeting, and at least a week previously to such Meeting, in two or more Daily London Newspapers.

Five Governors, at any Annual Meeting, shall form a quorum.

Contributors who are not Governors shall be entitled to be present and take part in the proceedings at the Meeting, but not to vote.

At the Annual Meeting the Managing Committee shall submit a Report of the working of the Hospital, together with an audited financial statement and balance sheet for the year ending the 31st December then last past.

At such Annual Meeting the Governors shall elect the Auditors for the current year, and three Members of the Managing Committee in place of those retiring.

Hubscriptions.

The Annual Subscriptions shall be payable in advance for the current year, such year to be computed from the quarter day next preceding the Subscription, and no Subscriber in arrear shall be entitled to any privilege arising out of his or her Subscription until it has been paid.

Every Donor of £300 or more at one time, and every Subscriber of £30 or more annually (but in the latter case so long only as this Contribution is kept up), shall be entitled to have a Cot named according to such Donor's or Subscriber's pleasure during his or her life, and every Donor of £1,000, or more, at one time, and every Subscriber of £100, or more, annually, for a period of at least 10 years, shall be entitled to have a Cot named according to such Donor's or Subscriber's pleasure in perpetuity, but in every case subject to the approval of the Committee.

The Committee shall have power to accept any Donation or Bequest which may be made to the Hospital subject to any special restrictions, or for any special purposes annexed to the Gift by the Donor.

Management.

The General Management of the affairs of the Hospital shall, subject to the powers hereby conferred on the Governors, be vested in the Managing Committee.

Committee.

The Committee shall consist of not more than 25, nor less than 10 Members, of whom not more than 4 shall be representatives of the Medical and Surgical Staff.


