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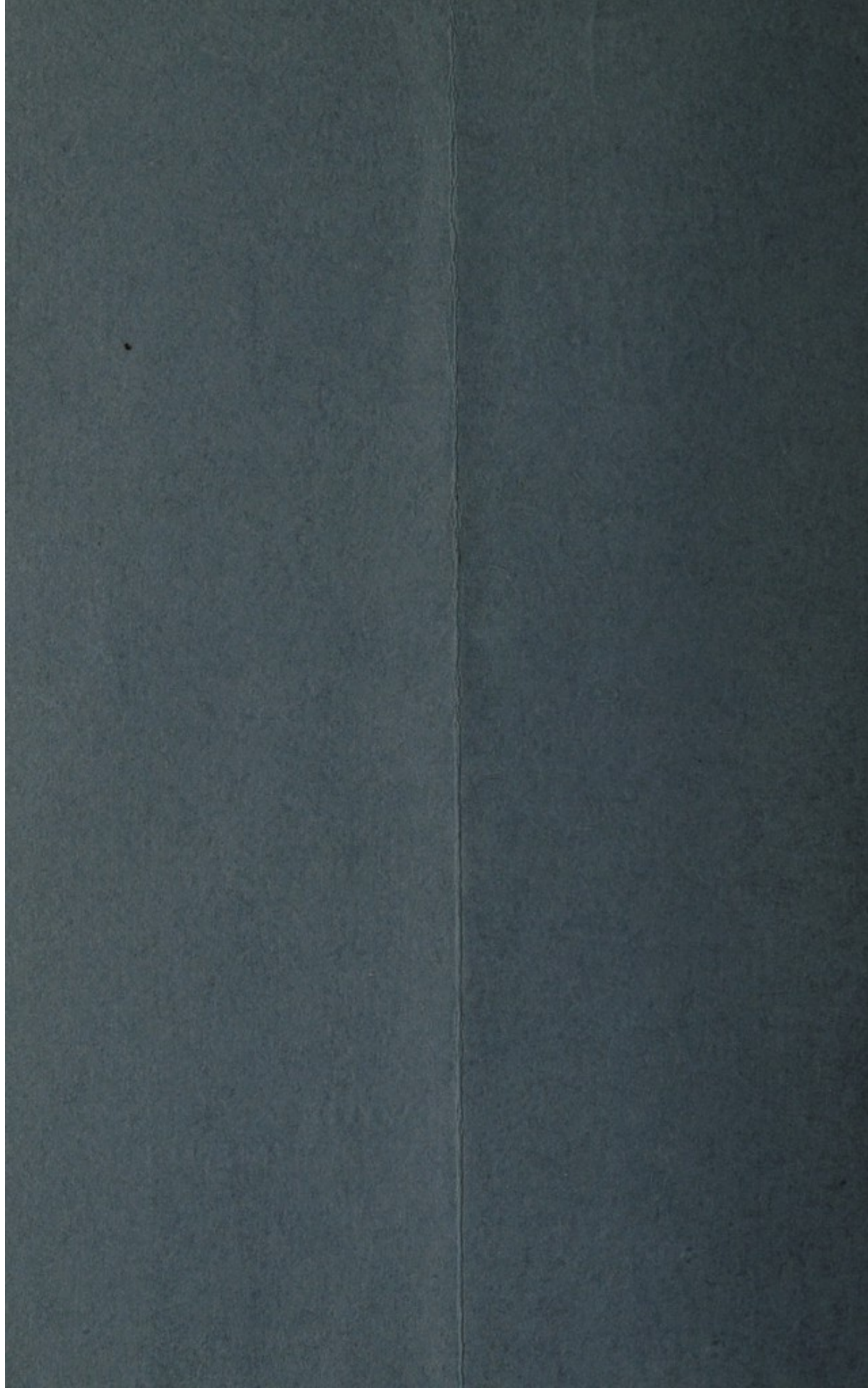

Report of the Committee

**Presented at the Annual Meeting of Subscribers held
on 31st March, 1948.**

The Committee have pleasure in presenting the following Report on the administration of the Hospital during the year 1947.

Again we have had a very busy year. Admissions reached the record total of 1,234 and the daily average bed occupation of 51.07 has only once, during the last war, been exceeded. Attendances at the X-Ray Department 3,380, and the Physiotherapy Department 6,637, surpassed last year's record figures. Major operations numbered 743. So much work has meant for the Medical Staff, the Matron and Assistant Matron, and the nursing, ancillary, clerical and domestic staff a very heavy burden, and we wish to express our thanks to all of them and to members of the V.A.D. and G.T.C., who have helped them.

2. During the year Dr. Athelstane Hill and Dr. H. W. Allen resigned, and Dr. W. Devereux Forrest, Dr. J. R. Simpson and Dr. H. Scott Forbes joined the medical staff as Consultant Physician, Dermatologist and Psychiatrist respectively.

Whilst we were fairly successful in maintaining, with the aid of non-resident part-time nurses, our strength of trained nursing staff, increasing difficulty is being felt in obtaining enough student nurses for training and carrying on routine duties in the wards. This is a matter of serious concern since this falling off in the supply of junior nurses not only affects efficiency now, but is bound to result in a shortage of trained staff in years to come. In furtherance of our policy of close collaboration with the Torbay Hospital arrangements were completed during the year for the trans-

ference of our affiliation from the Royal Devon and Exeter Hospital to the Torbay Hospital and applicants for posts of student nurses at our Hospital now undergo their preliminary test at that hospital. At the close of the year the strength of the nursing staff, exclusive of the Matron and Assistant Matron, was six sisters, five staff nurses (three part-time and non-resident) and thirteen student nurses. To implement the recommendation of the Rushcliffe Committee that nurses' working hours should not exceed ninety-six a fortnight, it is estimated that at least eighteen student nurses are needed. We would therefore appeal to the younger generation to consider the claims of the nursing profession. It is public service of the greatest benefit to the community. We would also remind them and those who advise them as to their future careers that the conditions of service, the prospects and salaries have all been greatly improved during the last few years.

Since our last report there has been no improvement in the position regarding domestic staff and we have had to rely largely on non-resident daily workers whose hours do not fit in with hospital routine as well as those of resident maids.

3. We record with regret the passing of Dr. R. F. Higgin, who for thirty years served on the honorary medical staff; of Miss E. K. Haydon, for many years an honorary masseuse and keen supporter of the Linen League; and of Mr. H. W. Hawker, Mr. W. Burnett and Mr. W. J. Seward, all of whom gave valuable help on the Committee. We were also sorry to lose, through their departure from the town, the services of the Rev. A. E. Adams and the Rev. J. A. Durling, both past Chairmen of the Hospital Committee, and through pressure of business of those of Mr. N. W. Larkworthy, whose place as a representative of the Contributory Scheme has been taken by Mr. F. Northcott.

4. On July 29th, 1947, "The Laurels," Powderham Road, was formally opened by Mrs. Walter Hext as an additional Nurses' Home, and we are glad to be able to report that recently we have been able to bring into use the hut in the grounds for housing the Physiotherapy Department. We have already remarked on the continued growth of the work done in this department which was rapidly outstripping the accommodation available for it in the main hospital building, and we should like to take this opportunity of expressing to Miss Wells our appreciation of the very hard and efficient work put in by her under most difficult conditions.

In the wards each bed has been provided with a head-phone for wireless reception, a great improvement on the old system of loudspeakers.

5. The Joint Board comprising representatives of the Torbay and Newton Abbot Hospitals and its Staff Committee have held several meetings during the year and have shown their use in bringing about closer co-operation between the two hospitals.

6. Although our ordinary income was maintained at about last year's level it proved quite inadequate for meeting an increase in expenditure caused partly by enhanced cost of salaries and supplies and partly through our policy of bringing our equipment up to date as far as practicable so that when the hospital is handed over to the State it may be accounted worthy to play a useful part in the National Health Service. To meet the inevitable deficit on our current account we were compelled to sell some of our free investments, many of which, however, represented savings accumulated during the years of the last war.

In accord with the joint recommendations of the British Hospitals Association and the British Association it was decided, with effect from 1st July, 1947, to pay salaries to visiting specialists and consultants.

In spite of bad weather which precluded the holding of the usual Fete, the Hospital Saturday Fund was able to hand to us the sum of £450, a tribute to the far-seeing policy of its organisers in spreading their efforts throughout the year. The Newton Abbot Hospital Contributory Scheme gave us £3,800, an excellent result having regard to the fact that the Scheme had to be closed during the year to would-be new members on account of the probable coming into force of the National Health Service Act next July. As this is likely to be the last report to be made to subscribers we would like to remind them of the debt of gratitude we owe to the organisers and supporters of the Hospital Saturday Fund and the Contributory Scheme. These organisations have contributed respectively £19,665 and £44,700 to the Hospital since their inception, and it is hardly too much to say that

had it not been for their substantial and regular support it would not have been possible to carry on the work of the hospital in years gone by without incurring serious debt. Our thanks are also due to members of the Linen League, whose gift of £100 in cash and linen to the value of £5 10s. 0d. this year marks the close of an association which has been of material benefit to the finances of the hospital. Another effort to which we should refer with gratitude is the collection of Queen Victoria Bun Pence. No less than £628 has been handed over to the Hospital since the inception of that scheme by the late Dr. Haydon in 1938.

It is also our duty to place on record our recognition of the support of many testators, subscribers and donors who since its foundation on the present site nearly fifty years ago, and in the earlier days of the Cottage Hospital which preceded it (1874 to 1898) have given practical expression to their appreciation of the work done by our hospital for the people of Newton Abbot and its neighbourhood. Finally, a tribute is due to all those who in time past have given their services voluntarily in a professional or secretarial capacity, or in many other ways, amongst whom we should mention the names of Dr. Edgar Haydon, honorary physician 1884 to 1942; Mr. D. R. Scratton, honorary secretary 1874 to 1902; and Mr. H. H. Rickard, honorary secretary 1911 to 1932.

7. As for the future, subscribers are probably aware that in accordance with the provisions of the National Health Service Act our hospital, with its endowments, with the exception noted below, will pass to the Minister of Health on "the appointed day" which, so far as is at present known, will be 5th July, 1948. The endowments of the Tudor Convalescence Fund will not, however, pass to the State but will remain vested in the trustees, who will be free to administer the trust in accordance with the terms of the bequest. Under the Act non-teaching hospitals are to be administered, subject to the general control of regional boards, by management committees to be set up by the regional boards for hospitals or groups of hospitals. Thus this hospital will come under a group management committee to be set up by the Regional Board for the South West, whose headquarters are at Bristol. On this Management Committee it is likely that we shall be represented. It is further understood that group management committees will be free to appoint house committees to deal with the routine management of hospitals within their groups. Through representation on the management committee and through a house committee, if one is appointed, we hope that

opportunity will be offered for some form of voluntary service, and that thereby the interest of the people of Newton Abbot and district in this hospital will be maintained.

8. In conclusion, the Committee would like to express their appreciation of the valuable services of the Hon. Secretary and Hon. Treasurer. Mr. H. F. Ball has been Secretary since 1933, except for the period when he was on War service. This office is both arduous and responsible. It involves more than acting as Secretary to the Committee for a great deal of other work in connection with the hospital has to be discharged. There are returns to be made, contacts to be maintained not only with the hospital personnel but with many other bodies who are interested in the welfare of the hospital. Mr. Ball has given freely of his time and capacities. His interest, his careful guidance of the Committee, his ability to deal with technical problems, his entire devotion to the well-being of the hospital, have all contributed to the dignity of the office and to the efficiency with which he has discharged these tasks.

Mr. Edgar Moss, our Hon. Treasurer, was associated with the hospital very soon after he came to this town. He has seen the work of Treasurer greatly extended. His manifold duties have been fulfilled with ability and enthusiasm. He has also placed at our disposal his knowledge as a banker when questions of investment or sale of securities have had to be undertaken. Prudent and far-seeing, we owe him a great deal. To these two officers and to many other voluntary helpers who are often to be seen in the hospital we express our grateful thanks.

Services to Newton Abbot Contributory Scheme Members.

During the year under review 486 members of the Contributory Scheme were treated to a conclusion as in-patients, the average period of stay being 15.19 days. 1,037 and 361 attended the X-Ray and Physio-Therapy Departments respectively, 1,636 received attention at the Casualty Ward, and the Dental Department and the Ophthalmic Department dealt with 25 cases and 122 cases respectively, and 168 attended the Ear, Nose and Throat Department.
