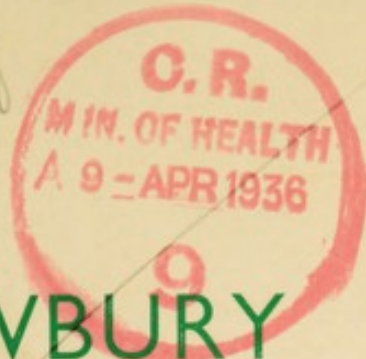

THE FIFTY-FIRST ANNUAL REPORT

of the Committee of the Newbury District Hospital for the
Year ending 31st December, 1935.

THE WORK OF THE YEAR.

In admitting 577 new patients and in giving first-aid, without admission to our Wards, of 125 cases of minor accident, the normal amount of work has been done.

The number of beds occupied each day was on the average 32.03, a slight increase on the preceding year.

CONTRIBUTORY SCHEME.

The number of Scheme Members admitted continues to increase, and the Hon. Officials and Collectors are to be congratulated on the maintenance of their keen interest in their work and the efficiency with which it is carried out. While they reap no pecuniary advantage from their labours, they see the benefits secured to the members when admitted as patients, and know how materially they have strengthened the financial position of the Hospital.

INCOME AND EXPENDITURE.

Thanks are once more due to our subscribers and others for their continued financial assistance, which, in combination with our other sources of income has enabled us again to record a successful year.

EXTENSIONS

This Hospital was opened in 1885 and having now attained its Jubilee it is hoped that within a few months the plans adopted by the Committee some years ago, when it was faced with the necessity of increasing the number of patient-beds by 50 per cent., of providing accommodation for a numerically larger staff, and of modernising the equipment and certain portions of the buildings, will be carried out to completion.

Lack of the requisite funds prevented the execution of these works as a whole in 1928, and it was resolved to take two steps, instead of one, in converting the Institution into a more modern Hospital of a size more suitable for its present-day work.

Experience has proved that the first step, taken in 1928, was a wise one, and the second, at the conclusion of which the Hospital will appear as a completed and fully equipped one of 65 beds, was commenced early in 1936.

The cost of these changes has been estimated at nearly £23,000, towards which sum the Trustees have, with the sanction of the Subscribers given at a Special General Meeting, handed over to the Committee the whole of the free funds in our Capital Account, reserving only the Endowment Funds, in accordance with the terms of the Foundation Deed. This will leave a deficit of about £7,000, which it is hoped to raise during the summer of 1936 by means of appeals to our friends in the Borough and District.

In our report for 1934, we wrote as follows:—

We generally have a waiting list of would-be patients whom we are unable to admit, and the courses open to them are to continue to wait until there is a vacant bed, to apply for admission to the Royal Berkshire Hospital in Reading, which has its own problem of a waiting list, or to go into the County Council Hospital.

The Royal Berkshire Hospital is willing to give of its best service to patients from our Borough or district who are in need of service beyond the powers of the smaller District Hospital, but that cases, which could equally well be treated in the latter, should be sent to them for want of a few extra beds is neither fair to the County Hospital nor creditable to the local one.

Is Newbury prepared to accommodate the sick asking for admission to its Hospital?

OBITUARY.

It is with great regret that we record the death of Mr. R. P. Elliott, who had been connected with the Institution since 1926, during eight years of which time he served upon the Finance Committee. Of a very kindly disposition, he was always willing to further the progress of the Institution, in which he took a keen interest.

HON. MEDICAL and NURSING STAFFS.

Mr. L. Powell, M.B., B.Ch., was appointed Hon. Consulting Aural Surgeon, and Drs. Boulton, Fawcett and Wood as Hon. Anæsthetists.

Towards the end of 1935, Miss M. Salway intimated her desire to retire from active service as our Hon. Masseur, and the Committee accepted the position with regret. Miss Salway has for 21 years done much valuable work on behalf of our patients, and we would particularly recognise her work during the whole time of the War.

Once more our thanks are due to our Matron, Miss Johnston, the Sisters, Nurses and Probationers for a year's work cheerfully and efficiently done.

MANAGEMENT.

Much to the regret of your Committee, Mr. J. A. H.-C. Borgnis, for private reasons, retired from participation in the affairs of the Hospital. He had, for many years, willingly placed his services as architect at their disposal, and had been responsible for much work, efficiently done, in connection with the buildings.

At the Annual General Meeting held in 1935, Lieut.-Col. Gore, Major Tilney, and Messrs. R. P. Elliott, W. H. Paine and J. H. Thompson were re-elected for another period of service on the Committee, and at the similar meeting to be held in April, 1936, Mrs. Rayner, Miss Elliott, Mrs. Holliday and Mrs. Charrington, with Dr. W. B. Heywood, will retire, but, being eligible, offer themselves for re-election.

OUR HELPERS.

A reference to the list of Subscriptions and Donations will show the names of those to whom our thanks are due for providing the means whereby the Hospital may be carried on from year to year. To those who have assisted by sending gifts in kind our thanks are given; to the Ladies' Linen Guild (whose report appears on another page), which will bear a considerable share of the cost of equipping beds and bedrooms, to the Members of the "Groceries Scheme," whose very valuable work is continued, and to those who send produce, books and magazines.

We express our gratitude to the Hon. Medical Staffs for continuing their labours for another year; to the Hon. Chaplain, the Clergy and Ministers of the neighbourhood; the Hon. Solicitor for much assistance in legal matters during the year; the Proprietors of the *Newbury Weekly News*; to the voluntary drivers of the B.R.C. Ambulance; and to all who have in any way assisted the Hospital.

December 31st, 1935.

During the year 1935 the following operations were performed at Newbury Hospital:—

MAJOR OPERATIONS ... 129

Included in these were 44 operations for the removal of the appendix, all being successfully carried out.

MINOR OPERATIONS ... 254

Of these, 98 were for removal of Tonsils and Adenoids.

Fifteen operations were performed by visiting surgeons.

Practically all these operations were performed under general anæsthesia and there were no fatalities.

For the successful results of these operations and rapid convalescence, a word of praise is due to the unremitting care of the Nursing Staff.

RULES OF THE NEWBURY DISTRICT HOSPITAL.

1.—The Newbury District Hospital is intended for the treatment of cases of sickness or accident occurring in Newbury and the neighbourhood which cannot be equally well treated at the home of the patient. Ordinary maternity cases are not admissible.

No person shall be eligible for admission who is of unsound mind, or suffering from any infectious or incurable disease, or in an advanced stage of consumption. This rule does not preclude the admission of cases of enteric fever.

2.—The property of the Hospital shall be vested in Four Trustees, and whenever the number of Trustees shall, from any cause, be reduced below Three, the vacancies shall be filled at the next Annual, or at a Special General Meeting of Qualified Subscribers.

3.—All donors of £50 at one time shall be Vice-Presidents; all donors of £25 shall be Life-Governors. These shall be deemed to be Qualified Subscribers.

Donors of £200 in one sum, or in two sums at separate times, shall have the privilege of naming a bed in the Hospital, and £200 given at one time by man and wife shall confer a like privilege. A gift or legacy of £1,000 shall endow a bed in perpetuity.

4.—Annual Subscribers of not less than 5/- and of not less than six months' standing as subscribers shall be deemed qualified subscribers as long as they continue their subscription. They shall be entitled to attend the Annual and all Special General Meetings summoned under these rules, and to vote thereat; they are also qualified to serve as Honorary Officers or as elected Members of the Committee.

The Newbury, Hungerford and Thatcham Groups of Centres under the Royal Berkshire and Associated Hospitals' Aid Committee Contributory Scheme shall each be entitled to nominate one representative, who shall serve as a member of the Committee.

Each centre within the said groups, which has during the previous year collected for the Scheme not less than £100 shall be entitled to nominate one representative for each £100 so collected; such representative shall have the privileges of a qualified subscriber. Centres in which the sums collected fall short of £100 may combine to obtain like privileges.

5.—The Honorary Officers of the Hospital shall be: A President, who shall, if he be present, preside at all General Meetings; a Secretary; a Treasurer; a Chaplain; and as many Medical Officers as the Committee shall from time to time direct.

6.—The Management of the Hospital shall be vested in a Committee consisting of:

- The Trustees;
- The Honorary Officers;
- The Mayor of Newbury;
- Three Nominees of the Hospital Saturday Fund;
- Two Nominees of the Newbury Chamber of Trade;
- The Newbury, Hungerford and Thatcham Nominees of the Contributory Scheme;
- One Nominee of the Trades and Labour Council;
- Two Nominees of the Ladies' Linen Guild;
- And not less than 12 or more than 15 elected qualified subscribers, of whom one third shall retire each year in rotation, but shall be eligible for re-election.

7.—The Annual General Meeting of qualified subscribers shall be held as soon after the end of the financial year as the accounts for the year have been audited, and, if possible, not later than March. All members of the Committee may attend and vote.

At this meeting there shall be presented the Annual Report of the Committee, the Statement of Accounts, and a Report of the Medical Officers.

This meeting shall also elect the Honorary Officers, other than the Honorary Medical Staff, and any Members required to complete the Committee including the elected members who retire by rotation.

It shall also appoint a paid auditor for the ensuing year.

It may also transact any other business brought before it.

Special General Meetings may be called by the President, or the Committee, or at the request in writing of seven qualified subscribers.

Fourteen days' public notice shall be given of all general meetings.

Voting shall be by show of hands, and the decision of the Chairman as to the result of such voting shall be final.

8.—The number of vacancies, including any caused by death or resignation, to be filled at the Annual General Meeting, and the names of the outgoing members who offer themselves for re-election shall be stated in the Report presented to the Annual General Meeting, which Report shall be sent to all Qualified Subscribers not less than seven days before the date of the meeting.

The names of any new candidates willing to serve on the Committee, with the names of the proposers and seconders, shall be sent to the Hon. Secretary not later than the day before the date of the meeting.

9.—The Committee shall meet at the Hospital monthly and at such other times as may be considered expedient. They shall also meet immediately after the Annual General Meeting for the purpose of electing a Chairman and Vice-Chairman, and of appointing a Finance Sub-Committee

Not less than seven days' notice of each monthly meeting shall be sent to each member of the Committee. Ten members shall form a quorum.

Special meetings may be called by the Chairman, or at the request in writing of five members. Not less than four days' notice shall be given of such meetings.

10.—The Finance Sub-Committee shall consist of not less than seven members, of whom the Chairman, Secretary, Treasurer, and one Trustee shall be four. The Treasurer shall be Chairman of this Sub-Committee, which shall meet monthly to review the financial position of the Hospital, to pay accounts, to review estimates for proposed work and to consider what steps are to be taken from time to time to raise funds for the Hospital. Four members shall form a quorum.

The Committee may also appoint from its members such other Sub-Committees, either temporary or permanent, as it may consider expedient, and may from time to time delegate to any person or persons any special powers or duties in the nature of inspection or inquiry.

11.—The Committee shall have full authority to transact all business connected with the Management of the Hospital, to regulate the constitution of the Medical Staff, to appoint and dismiss the Matron and other paid officers and servants.

The Committee may fill casual vacancies arising during the year by appointing qualified subscribers to hold office until the next Annual General Meeting, when such members shall be required to retire, but shall be eligible for re-election.

They may also make and alter any bye-laws and regulations, provided that such bye-laws and regulations shall not be inconsistent with these rules.

12.—The Accounts of the Hospital shall be audited annually by the Auditor, and shall be printed and circulated to the members of the Committee three days before the next following meeting of the Committee.

13.—Any proposal for the expenditure of the capital funds of the Hospital shall be submitted for approval to a meeting of the Qualified Subscribers of the Hospital, and shall be mentioned in the notice calling such meeting.

14.—The Medical Officers of the Hospital shall be appointed by the Committee; such Officers shall be qualified Medical Practitioners resident within two miles of the Hospital, and shall retire on reaching the age of 65, but shall then be eligible for appointment as Consulting Medical Officers.

The Committee shall have power also to appoint Consulting Medical Officers from such members of the Medical Profession as they may deem expedient.

The Medical Officers and the Consulting Medical Officers shall give their services gratuitously to all patients treated in the ordinary wards of the Hospital, except to those who are paying the full cost of their maintenance, but in the latter case a Consulting Medical Officer shall not be entitled to charge a fee for his services unless the circumstances of the patient are certified by the Committee to be such as would permit such a charge.

No more than one member of a partnership shall be on the permanent Medical Staff, but one member of a partnership may be a Consulting Medical Officer, notwithstanding that his partner may be on the permanent Medical Staff.

Further, any qualified person may be attached to the Hospital as Anæsthetist, Skiagrapher, or in any other special capacity without charge of beds as the Committee may elect.

15.—The Medical Officer shall attend the patients in accordance with such bye-laws, regulations or allotment of beds as may be from time to time made by the Committee.

If any Medical Officer is unable to attend a patient, he shall arrange with one of his colleagues on the medical staff to attend in his stead; but the latter shall give up the case on the return of the former.

16.—The nursing of the patients and the general domestic arrangements of the Hospital shall be entrusted to a Matron, who shall have charge of the house and premises, and of all provisions, stores, instruments, etc., and shall keep a record of all her receipts and disbursements. She shall have power to engage such nurses, probationers and servants as the Committee may consider desirable.

17.—Patients shall be admitted to the Public Wards by a certificate of a medical practitioner, and those whose circumstances permit of it shall be required to make such contributions to their maintenance as the Committee may decide.

No such contribution, however, shall be demanded from a member of the Hospitals' Aid Association, whose payments thereto are not in arrear, so long as the Hospital remains connected with that Association.

18.—The Private Wards, on such terms as the Committee may approve, shall be available for the reception of patients, who may be attended by their own medical practitioner, provided that the Hon. Medical Staff shall have prior claim to such accommodation for their patients.

19.—Every requisite, with the exception of personal clothing, shall be provided by the Hospital.

Patients shall not receive food or drink from any other source without the sanction of the Medical Officer in charge of the case.

Patients shall come supplied with decent clothing and a proper change of linen.

Patients shall not be allowed to remain in the Hospital more than one month, except on the recommendation of the Medical Officer in charge of the case, nor more than two months except by special permission of the Committee.

20.—No alteration shall be made in these Rules except at an Annual or Special General Meeting, and seven days' public notice shall be given of the intention to propose alterations and of the place where the proposed alterations can be seen.

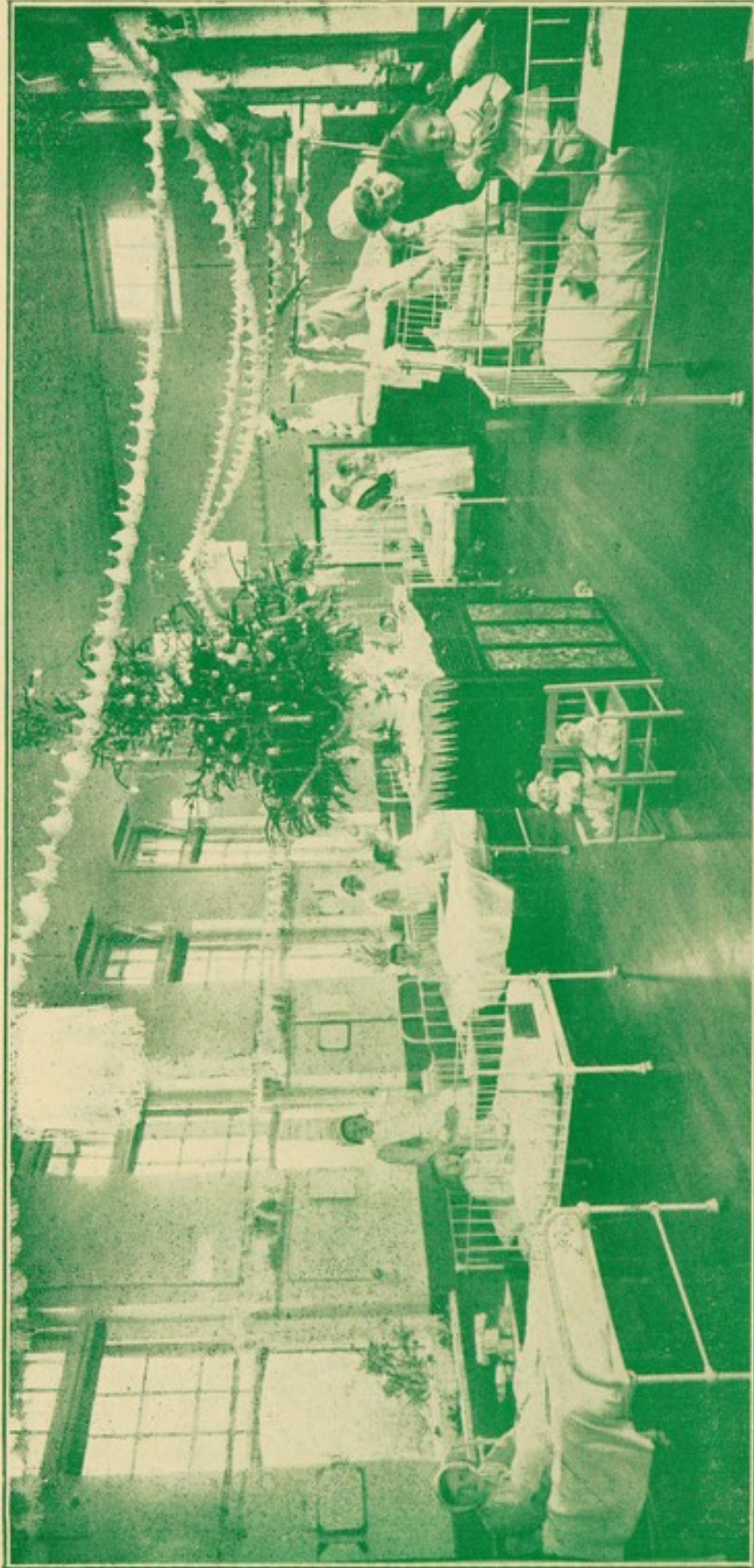
