EXTRACTS FROM RULES.

The East-End Maternity Hospital, formerly The East-End Mothers' Lying-in Home, was founded in 1884 as The Mothers' Lying-In Home, Shadwell, E.

OBJECTS OF THE INSTITUTION.

To maintain in the East of London a Hospital (which is entirely un-sectarian) for the treatment of poor married Women during child-birth, also for training midwives and nurses for attendance on the poor at their own homes. Women who are unable to enter the Hospital are attended in their own homes.

Privileges of Subscribers and Donors.

1. Donors of ten guineas are entitled to recommend in every year three patients; and one patient for every additional sum of three guineas contributed.
2. Subscribers of one guinea and upwards are Governors for the current year of each Subscription, and are entitled to recommend one patient for every guinea subscribed.
3. Public bodies may exercise, through their duly authorised representative, their privileges as Donors or Subscribers, such privileges as Donors to continue for three years from the date of the Donation.
4. No Annual Governor or Subscriber may recommend patients, or vote at any meeting, unless his or her subscription for the current year be paid.
5. No Governor may vote on any question in which he is personally concerned.
6. New Governors shall have the power of recommending patients, and every other privilege, from the time of their becoming Governors, except that of voting on any question relative to the election of officers, which they cannot do until their second subscription shall have become due and been paid (Donors of thirty guineas or more at one time excepted).
7. All subscriptions shall become payable annually on the date of the first subscription.

Honorary Life Governors.

1. The Committee may elect as an Honorary Governor for life one of the executors of any person giving by will a benefaction to the Hospital to the amount of one hundred pounds or upwards, and such executor shall be entitled to all the privileges of a Donor of ten guineas. The Committee may also elect as Honorary Governors persons who have rendered essential service to the Hospital.
2. All Clergymen and Ministers preaching in aid of the funds of the Hospital shall have the same privileges as Donors of a sum equal to the amount collected.
3. Every person who, by individual exertion, shall collect any money for the Hospital, shall be entitled to the privileges of a Donor of a sum equal to the amount collected.

Report of the Committee of Management

For the year ending

31st December,

1938.

The Committee have pleasure in presenting their Report for the year 1938.

We are grateful to those who have helped us so generously this year, especially Alexandra Day Fund, The Bernhard Baron Trust, Sir Percy Shepherd and the Corporation of the City of London.

The annual Meeting was held at the Hospital in May and was attended by a large number of supporters, who were addressed by Lady Hailsham, Lord Goschen, Dr. Oxley and Lady Ebbisham.

The Hospital was inspected on behalf of King Edward's Hospital Fund for London by Dr. McAdam Eccles and the Hon. Ian Lawson Johnston. We have to thank the Fund for a grant of £500.

For us, in many respects, 1938 has been a year of poignant sadness, for Death has robbed this Hospital of two of its oldest and most faithful friends—I refer to the late Lady Hirst and the late Mr. Samuel Greenlees. Our deepest sympathy goes out to their relatives and friends. Lady Hirst was a woman of the tenderest disposition, widely known for her charitable works among the poor. She took a profound and life-long interest in this Hospital, which owes much to her constantly repeated benefactions. She was, in the best sense of the phrase, a "Lady Bountiful," particularly so in regard to the East End Maternity Hospital, and we miss her sadly. Mr. Samuel Greenlees had been associated with the management of this Hospital for fully thirty years, and, for a large portion of that period, he was our enthusiastic and capable Hon. Treasurer. His benefactions to the Hospital were on a munificent scale, and, amongst many other things, he will be remembered especially for his generous assistance in the

renovation of the Ward which now bears his name, as the "Samuel Greenlees Ward." To lose him has been indeed a heavy blow, and we shall treasure his memory.

In many other respects, 1938 has also been for us a year of unprecedented change, for, in September last, we bade farewell to Miss Margaret Anderson, O.B.E., who retired after over thirty years devoted service as Matron to this Hospital. To pay tribute to Miss Anderson's many outstanding qualities, both of mind and character, would be to go beyond the scope of this Report, but it is our earnest wish that she may long enjoy the leisure she has so fully earned. In September also we extended a hearty welcome to our new Matron, Miss Alice Sleight, who came to us with exceptionally high qualifications for the post and who has more than justified our confidence in her.

In November, we said good-bye to our Secretary, Mr. Haray Page, who had served this Hospital faithfully for over seventeen years. We wish him a happy and prosperous future. Mr. Page was succeeded in the Secretaryship by Miss Jean Murray, who, greatly to our regret, felt compelled, for family reasons, to resign after only a few months tenure of the appointment. Miss Murray has been succeeded by Captain P. E. Cayley.

At the time of writing, we have to deplore yet another severe blow, suffered by our Committee through the resignation of the Viscountess Goschen, which is due to indifferent health. Lady Goschen has been associated with the management of this Hospital since its beginning. The East End Maternity Hospital owes much to Lady Goschen's unfailing generosity and active support. We are indeed grateful for all she has done, and for her promise of continued interest.

The Committee are glad to welcome six new Members, namely, the Hon. Mrs. Gamage, Mrs. Stoneham, Major L. Greenlees, Captain H. Brierley, M.C., Dr. V. J. F. Lack, and Dr. W. H. F. Oxley. The Hon. Mrs. Gamage is a daughter of the late Lady Hirst, and Major L. Greenlees a son of the late Mr. Samuel Greenlees. Captain H. Brierley, M.C., is the joint Secretary of the London Hospital, whilst Dr. Lack and Dr. Oxley are the representatives of our newly-constituted Medical Committee.

It is to be feared that our expenditure is likely to rise again considerably this year, for many things have to be renewed and our lack of essential modern equipment is still

very great. Maintenance costs seem also likely to rise, and the financial situation facing the Committee is a most anxious one.

Our needs are ever-increasing and the times grow ever more difficult. The Committee therefore earnestly appeal to all subscribers to continue their valued support and to do all in their power to persuade their friends and acquaintances to come to the assistance of the Hospital. We also venture to beg those subscribers whose subscriptions may have been allowed to lapse to reconsider their attitude and to help us if they possibly can.

The Committee are grateful to the Staff—both nursing and domestic—for the efficient manner in which they have carried out their duties.

REPORT OF THE MEDICAL OFFICER

FOR THE YEAR ENDING 31ST DECEMBER, 1938.

Ladies and Gentlemen,

During the year the following patients have been treated :—

The hospital had a very satisfactory year. All the mothers attended recovered except two who were seriously ill, with some intercurrent disease.

We have to thank Queen Charlottes' Hospital for their kindness in admitting three cases of pyrexia. We also thank them for their very great help, in making bacteriological examinations for every woman, in the hospital, and on the district, who had a rise of temperature, after having her baby.

The arrangements for admission to hospital of women living in Dagenham, continues to be much appreciated, and this particularly applies to those old patients of ours, who have recently removed to there.

Extracts from Regulations for Pupil Midwives for Part 1 of C.M.B. approved training course.

Candidates may be single, married, or widows, must not be under 21 years or over 40 years of age. They must fill in and sign the Form of Application, which may be obtained from the Secretary, and produce a certificate of moral character and a medical certificate of health, and must be re-vaccinated if not already done within the last 5 years. A Registration Fee of £1 must be sent with the application, which will be deducted from the Fee for the Course on entry, or be returned if the application be refused. In the event of a Candidate failing to fulfil her engagement, this Fee will be forfeited.

The Pupil Midwives are specially prepared by the Doctors and the Lady Superintendent for the examination of the Central Midwives' Board Part I, the Examination Fee for which is paid by the Pupil Midwife.

The fees for Pupil Midwives, which are to be paid to the Secretary in advance, and which include Board, Lodging and Lectures, are—

Part I Six months' course (Trained Nurses only) £25

NOTE:—Under Agreement with the Ministry of Health, a reduced fee is charged to Nurses who comply with the Regulations of the Ministry governing the training of Midwives. To do this a Nurse must declare her *bona fide* intention to practise as a midwife in England or Wales, or have been for not less than three years in full-time employment as a Health Visitor, or have completed successfully a course of training approved under the Regulations for the training of Health Visitors.

A personal interview is desirable if possible.

MATRON'S REPORT.

FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31ST DECEMBER, 1938.

It is with extreme trepidation that I have approached the writing of this, my first contribution to the Annual Report, knowing full well that the E.E.M.H. has in the past established a tradition which it has become my privilege to uphold. It is no easy task to follow in the footsteps of such a distinguished predecessor as the Ex-Matron, Miss Margaret Anderson O.B.E., who served the E.E.M.H. so faithfully and unselfishly for over 34 years, and who retired from Office last year, in September 1938.

It is easily understandable that there should be minor adjustments to be made in taking over any new Office, and soon after assuming my duties here I realised that some slight re-arrangement of the administrative work of the Hospital might be advisable if I were to carry on the excellent tradition of the E.E.M.H. In planning these alterations in the Hospital administration, I was deeply impressed by the sympathetic and helpful attitude of my Committee, under the Chairmanship of The Lady Ebbisham, and I would like to take this opportunity of thanking Lady Ebbisham and the Hospital Committee for their generous support and understanding. In this respect also, I must pay tribute to the advice and co-operation of our Medical Officer, Dr. W. H. F. Oxley, F.R.C.O.G., who has devoted so much of his life and abilities to the welfare of the East End Mothers.

In November 1938, the Hospital lost the valuable services of Dr. Philip Oxley, who had been attached to the Hospital for a number of years, and who has forsaken London to practice in the Provinces.

Miss Edith Spetch was appointed Assistant Matron in December 1938, and I feel that we were indeed fortunate to

secure the services of this highly trained Nurse and extremely capable Administrator.

Sister Symons, an old servant of the Hospital had unfortunately to relinquish her post as Sister Tutor on account of ill-health.

I would like to mention the splendid team work which I have found to be such a pleasant feature in the working of this Hospital, and I have had occasion to compliment the Sisters and Nurses repeatedly for their unselfish devotion to the Mothers and Babies, personal consideration being subservient to the needs of their Patients. To the Domestic Staff, under the watchful eye of Miss Lucy Ablett, I tender sincere thanks for their help and unfailing co-operation.

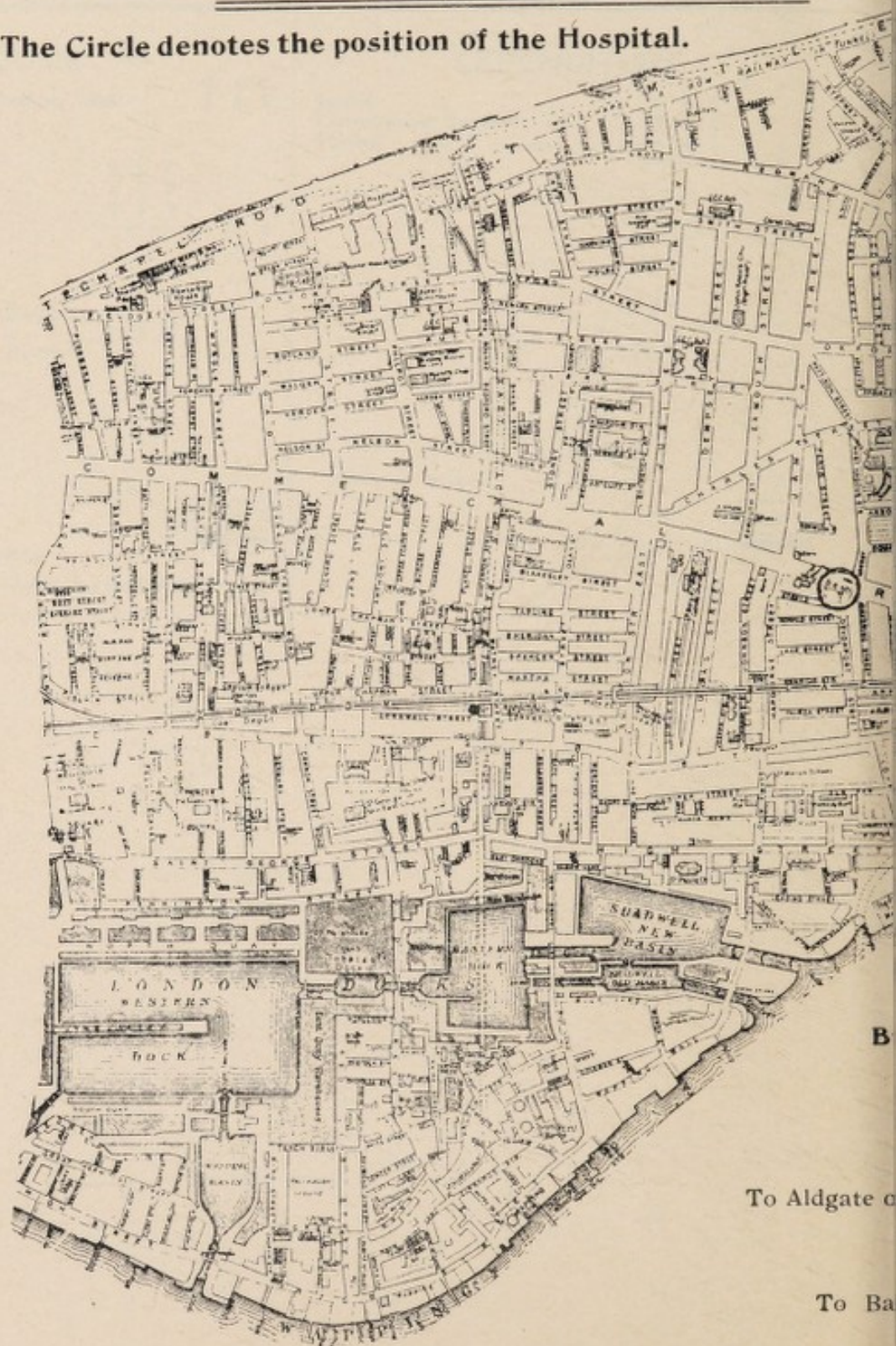

The Circle denotes the position of the Hospital.

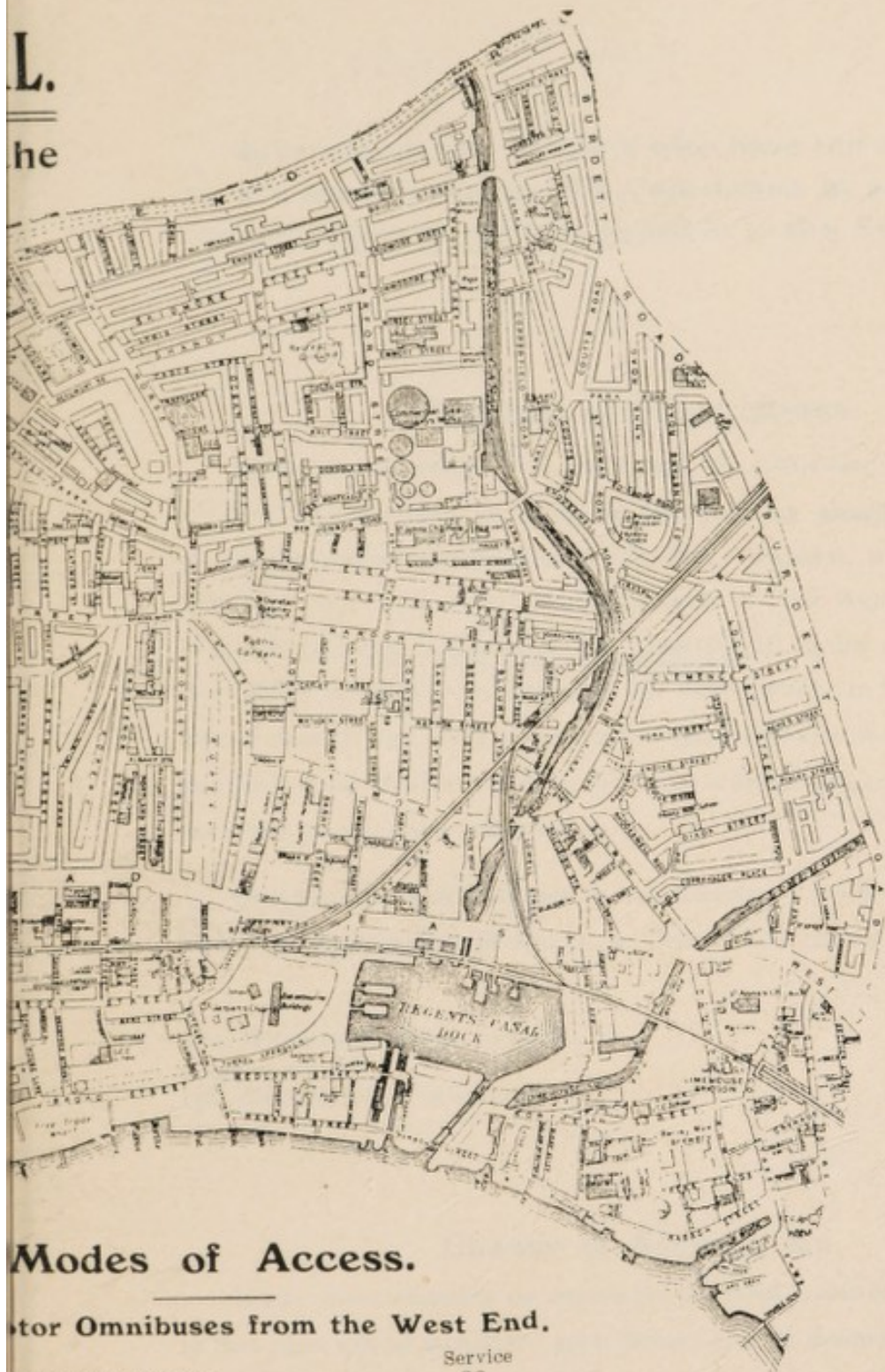
