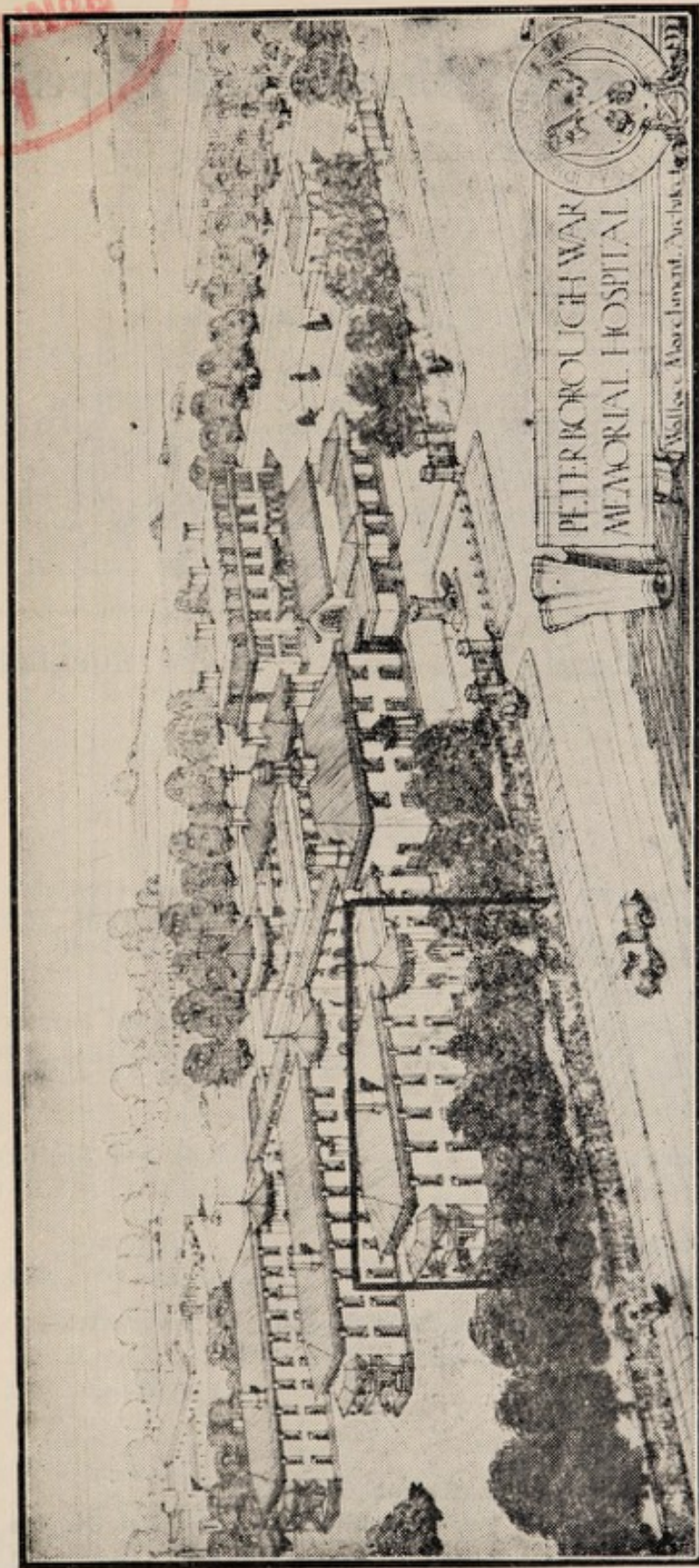

THE ONE HUNDRED AND TWELFTH
Annual Meeting of the Governors

OF THE
 Peterborough Infirmary and Dispensary,

Held at the Guildhall, Peterborough,

ON FEBRUARY 22nd, 1928.

Present: Mr. I. WHITSED, in the chair, and about 110 Governors.

The Minutes of the last Annual and the last Special Meeting were read, confirmed, and signed.

The Chairman called the Governors' attention to the interesting fact that, after 112 years, the Old Infirmary and Dispensary was that day to be wound up in the same building as that in which, on December 15th, 1815, it was started.

He then gave a short history of the Institution.

Mr. I. Whitsed read the Report of the Management Committee.

The Treasurer, Mr. J. A. Bagshaw, presented the Financial Report.

Dr. Joe Walker read the Report of the Medical Board.

It was resolved as follows:—

1. Upon the proposition of the Mayor (Ald. T. I. Slater), seconded by Mr. F. G. Brown:

That the Reports of the Management Committee, of the Treasurer, and of the Medical Board be adopted and be printed and circulated with the Annual Report; and that the thanks of the Meeting be given to those gentlemen who formed the Management Committee for the past year; and to Mr. I. Whitsed, Mr. J. A. Bagshaw, and Dr. Joe Walker for their Reports.

2. Upon the proposition of the Rev. G. W. Elliott, seconded by Mr. H. W. Bennett:

That the thanks of the meeting be given to the Medical and Surgical Staff of the Institution for their services during the past year and that—in accordance with Law 36, which directs that "The interest accruing from the Medical Officers' Fund shall from time to time be disposed of by vote at a Meeting of the Governors in voluntary presents to the Honorary Acting Staff of the Charity"—the interest for the year 1927 amounting to £50 9s. 1d. be presented to the Treasurer of the Medical Board, to be disposed of as the Board thinks proper.

3. Upon the proposition of Mr. H. B. Hartley, seconded by Mr. J. L. George:

That the best thanks of the Governors be given to the representatives of the late Mrs. Mary Jane Richardson, of War-

boys, for the Legacy of £475 11s. 6d., and to the representatives of the late Mrs. S. E. Whitwell for the Legacy of £6 (further dividend on S.S. and B. Bank, Ltd., Shares) bequeathed by her will, and of the late Mrs. F. L. Sinclair (formerly of Peterborough) for the Legacy of £500, for the endowment of an Emergency Bed, to be called "The Sinclair Bed".

4. Upon the proposition of General Strong, seconded by Miss Kirkwood :

That, in according their best thanks to the Clergy and Ministers who have made collections from their several congregations during the past year, the Governors desire to express their sense of the great benefit to the Institution of a united appeal on its behalf on some Sunday in the year from the pulpits of the several Churches and Chapels in the Borough and District, which appeal has this year produced the sum of £586 15s. 7d. (a decrease of £43 4s. 10d. on the previous year's collections), and the Governors suggest that St. Luke's Day, or the Sunday following, be the acknowledged Sunday for "Hospital Sunday".

5. Upon the proposition of Dr. H. Clapham, seconded by Mr. J. A. Bagshaw :

That the best thanks of the meeting be accorded to the following Organizations and Societies for their splendid financial support during the past year :—The Hospital Saturday Fund, Whittlesey, Chatteris, Benwick, Titchmarsh, Ramsey, Wimblington, March, Thorney, Doddington, Helpston, Manea, The City Military Band, etc., and to those ladies and gentlemen who assisted in collecting the contributions of these organizations.

That the thanks of the Governors also be given to those Clergy, Ministers, and others who have kindly visited the sick in the Infirmary and to those ladies and gentlemen who have sent various donations, flowers for the decoration of the Wards, and other articles for the comfort of the patients during the past year.

6. Upon the proposition of Dr. J. N. Collins, seconded by Alderman J. W. Williamson :

That the best thanks of this meeting be given to the President (The Hon. Mrs. Pelham) and the Members of the Peterborough Infirmary Ladies' Association for their valuable assistance during the year.

This concluded the last Annual Meeting of the Governors of the Peterborough Infirmary and Dispensary.

REPORT OF THE MANAGEMENT COMMITTEE.

For the year ended December 31st, 1927.

Mr. President, My Lords, Ladies, and Gentlemen,

It is with a certain amount of regret that I submit for your consideration the Report of the Management Committee for the year 1927, as this is the last Report that will be presented to you of the working of the Peterborough Infirmary and Dispensary, which has been in existence since the year 1815.

From to-day the Charity will be administered by a new Committee, and the title of the Institution, which shortly will be housed in the new Hospital now in course of erection, will be "The Peterborough and District Memorial Hospital". The Old Infirmary and Dispensary as such will, therefore, cease to function after this, the last, meeting of the Governors.

Meetings.

During the year 1927, the following meetings have been held:—

- Four Statutory Quarterly Meetings of the Management Committee.
- Six Special Meetings of the Management Committee.
- Twelve Meetings of the Visiting and Finance Committee.
- Two meetings of the "New Secretary" Sub-Committee.

Income and Expenditure.

The year under review has, on the whole, been a satisfactory one, although you will be sorry to hear that the income was lower than the previous year by about £125, and the expenditure higher by £37.

We closed the year with an adverse balance of £35 8s. 5d. which result, in view of the decrease in subscriptions of £280 os. 2d., and in Congregational Collections of £43 4s. 10d., was not so serious as we thought, at one time, it might be.

One very pleasing feature is that donations from Grateful Patients have increased, in fact, the total amount from this source is double that of the previous year.

and these amounts have been invested through the Official Trustee of Charitable Funds.

In-Patients.

The demand for beds in the Infirmary still continues to be great.

The daily number of beds occupied was 63.90, as compared with 65.54 in 1926.

The average stay of each patient in the Hospital was 29.12 days (27.31 days in 1926). Each of the 75 beds has been occupied by 10.68 patients as compared with 11.68 last year, and the monthly occupancy has been as follows:—

As far as it has been possible to allocate the expenditure to the different departments, the average cost of each In-Patient works out at £6 1s. 3d. (£5 11s. 5d. in 1926), being an increase of 9s. 10d. per In-Patient, and this is accounted for by the average increased stay in Hospital of such patients.

Out-Patients.

The total number of Out-Patients and Casualties treated was 2,847, being an increase of 95 over the 1926 total, largely attributable to the increased number of motor accidents.

The average cost of each works out at 11s. 4d., as compared with 11s. in the previous year.

The Committee.

It is with much regret that the Committee records the death of one of its members, viz., the Rev. Canon Manvell, who will be remembered for his good work and the warm interest he took in the welfare of the Institution and its patients.

Another loss to the Committee was occasioned by the resignation of Mr. G. Sutcliffe upon his leaving the City to take up an important appointment in London. He, too, took a great interest in the Infirmary, and the Committee wishes to express appreciation of his services.

Secretary.

It is with very deep regret that we have to record the death during the past year of Mr. A. C. Taylor, who had held the office of Secretary and Dispenser for no less than 47 years. During this time he proved himself a most capable and loyal officer of the Institution, in which he took the greatest possible interest. We shall all remember with gratitude the personal sacrifices and suffering that Mr. Taylor made and endured in connexion with his pioneer work as an X-ray operator, and we desire to place on record the sympathy of all the Governors with Mrs. Taylor and her family in their loss.

The post of a successor was duly advertised and many applications were received. After full consideration by a large and representative Committee, Mr. Frank A. C. Taylor was elected to succeed his father in this important post, and we feel sure that he will ably perform the increased duties which must inevitably fall upon the Secretary of the New Hospital.

Infirmary Ladies' Association.

During the past year the approximate value of the linen contributed by the members of this Association and presented to the Infirmary was £52 11s. 1d., and the Committee spent £74 5s. 10d. on extra blankets, linen, re-making of mattresses, etc., for the Wards and Patients.

The Association has generously undertaken to equip with linen and blankets the whole of the beds in the two Women's Wards at the New Hospital, and the Association also hopes to equip the Private Wards in the same way.

The Management Committee wishes to record its grateful thanks for this generous help, and to express its indebtedness to the President (the Hon. Mrs. Pelham), to the Hon. Secretary (Miss Kirkwood), and to each Member of the Ladies' Association.

New Hospital.

It is anticipated that the New Hospital will be opened within the next few months, as the building is now rapidly nearing completion.

When this occurs, it will mean that there will be a very material increase in the annual expenditure as compared with that of the present Infirmary, and to meet such expenditure additional subscribers are very much needed.

Your Committee realizes that an increased list of annual subscribers would mean an increased interest taken in the Hospital, and a more certain source of income.

Old Infirmary Building.

It has been decided, acting on the advice of local auctioneers, to offer the Old Infirmary and Grounds for sale by Public Auction early in May next, when it is hoped that a substantial amount will be realized from this very eligible and centrally situated property.

Conclusion.

A great and beneficent work has undoubtedly been carried on at the Old Infirmary, and many patients must be extremely grateful for the care and treatment that they have received there.

The Management Committee feels that it cannot conclude its report without making some reference to the splendid work that has been performed for so many years by the Medical Staff, Matron, Sisters, Masseuse, Radiographer, and Dispenser, and all the other Officers of the Institution, and to place on record its high appreciation of all that they have so ungrudgingly done for the benefit of the Patients.

PETERBOROUGH INFIRMARY AND DISPENSARY.

Report of Medical Board for 1927.

Mr. President, My Lords, Ladies, and Gentlemen,

In presenting their Report the Medical Board desire in the first instance to express their high appreciation of the services of all those members of your staff that work under their direction.

The large number of road accidents has increased the emergency work considerably, and has taxed our resources for In-Patient accommodation to the uttermost, for the greater part of the year. We shall welcome the move to the New Hospital, where there should be ample room for our present needs.

The total number of Patients treated during the year was 3,429.

The In-Patients numbered 801 (last year 876) of which 139 were Medical (last year 177) and 662 Surgical (last year 699).

The deaths on the Medical side were 24 (17.26 per cent.) last year 17; on the Surgical side 62 (9.36 per cent.), last year 62.

The Major Operations were 582, last year 556.

The Minor Operations were 210, last year 233.

The Medical Out-Patients were 515 (last year 437).

Surgical 688 (last year 608).

Minor Casualties 1,365 (last year 1,390).

The usual detailed tabular statement will be published in the Annual Report.

Dr. W. A. Kemp was appointed House Surgeon in January and held office until October, when he was succeeded by Dr. G. W. Milledge, and we desire to record our appreciation of their very thorough and efficient work.

We desire to record our profound regret at the loss of our late Secretary, Mr. A. C. Taylor, who devoted so many years of his life and sacrificed his health in the service of this Hospital.

We congratulate Mr. F. A. C. Taylor on his success in being selected from many candidates to fill the post so ably held by his father. We feel fully confident that he will prove a worthy successor.

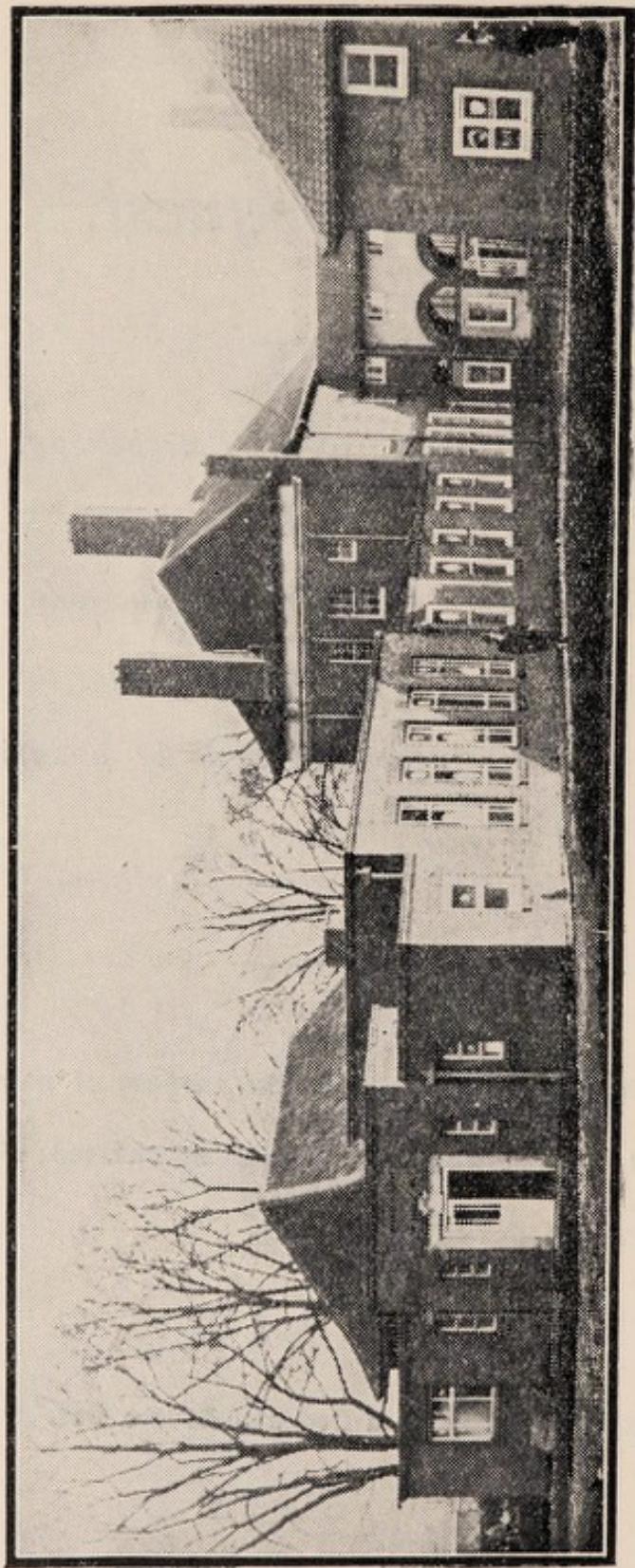

PETERBOROUGH & DISTRICT MEMORIAL HOSPITAL.

- Law 6.—(a) Every donor (including donors before the 12th July, 1927, to the Charity previously known as the Peterborough Infirmary and Dispensary) of £21 and upwards at one time to the funds of the Charity shall be a Life Governor of the Charity.
- (b) Every person individually contributing £1 1s. and upwards for the funds of the Charity in any year shall be a Governor during the ensuing year.
- (c) Every company, firm, association, or society, contributing to the funds of the Charity in any year not less than £2 2s. 0d., either directly or through some channel authorized by the General Committee, shall be entitled to nominate by writing, delivered to the Secretary-Superintendent, representative Governors to hold office during the ensuing year as follows: One for £2 2s., two for £10 10s., three for £26 5s., four for £52 10s., and one for each additional sum of £52 10s.

Unless subscriptions are renewed, contributors and their representatives under sub-headings (b) and (c) cease to be Governors at the expiration of twelve calendar months from the end of the period covered by their last subscription.

By-Law.

The Donors referred to in this Law are those whose Donations are given to the Maintenance Funds of the Charity, and the "persons, companies, firms," etc., under sections (b) and (c), are such as give their contributions annually, and these will be treated as subscriptions for the purpose of allotting Letters of Recommendation under Law 7. Contributions given by persons individually under section (b) are the person's own private contribution, and are not in any way collective contributions.

- Law 7.—Every Governor and Representative Governor shall have the privilege of voting at the annual and special meetings of the Governors, and of recommending patients for treatment by signing Letters of Recommendation allotted to them. Every life Governor as defined in Law 6 (a) shall have two Letters allotted to him annually in respect of each twenty guineas of his donation. Every Governor, as defined in Law 6 (b), and every company, firm, association, or society, as defined in Law 6 (c), shall be allotted two Letters in respect of each guinea subscribed.

- Law 56.—No person shall be admitted as a patient without a Letter of Recommendation except in case of accident, or emergency, in which case a Letter must be obtained as soon as possible. Every Letter shall be endorsed with an undertaking to be signed by the patient, or by relatives or other persons responsible for the patient, agreeing to pay any charge which may be made under Law 3. The Honorary Acting Staff, or the Resident Medical Staff in their absence, shall decide which patients shall be admitted as in-patients. Notwithstanding the provisions of Law 2, no person who in the opinion of the Medical Officers is considered incurable, unlikely to receive substantial benefit or who is otherwise undesirable, shall be admitted or retained as a patient except in very special circumstances approved by the Medical Board.

- Law 58.—Patients desirous of making any complaint must do so to the Secretary-Superintendent in writing, and he will bring the subject before the House Committee for investigation.

- Law 61.—The annual subscriptions shall be due and payable either to the Bankers of the Charity (by a Banker's order) or to the Secretary-Superintendent, on the 1st day of January in each year.

Subscriptions for the year are now due, and may be paid to Mr. Frank A. C. Taylor, the Secretary-Superintendent, at the Hospital; or to Messrs. Barclays Bank, Ltd.
