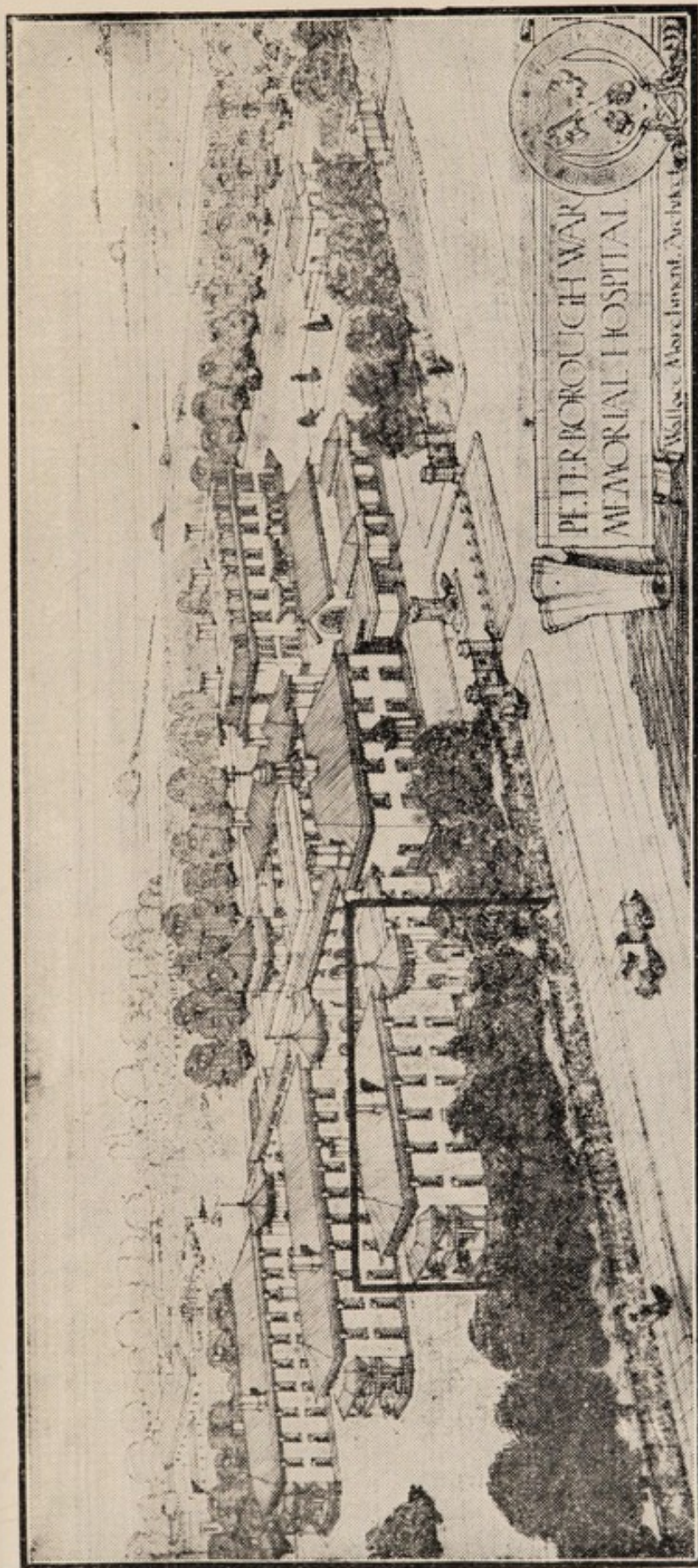

THE ONE HUNDRED AND THIRTEENTH
Annual Meeting of the Governors
 OF THE
 Peterborough and District Memorial Hospital,
 (Formerly the Peterborough Infirmary and Dispensary).
 ON FEBRUARY 27th, 1929.

Present: Mr. I. WHITSED, in the chair, and about 80 Governors.
 The Minutes of the last Annual Meeting were read, confirmed, and signed.

The Treasurer, Mr. J. A. Bagshaw, read the Financial Report.

Mr. I. Whitsed read the Report of the Management Committee.

Dr. Alec Walker read the Report and presented the Tables of the Medical Board.

It was resolved as follows:—

1. Upon the proposition of Mr. H. J. Amies, seconded by Mr. J. Coles:

That the Reports of the Management Committee, of the Treasurer, and of the Medical Board, be adopted and be printed and circulated with the Annual Report; and that the thanks of the Meeting be given to those ladies and gentlemen who formed the Management Committee and the Sub-Committees for the past year and to Mr. I. Whitsed for his Report.

2. Upon the proposition of Mr. G. H. Boden, seconded by Mr. Jabez Bird:

That the thanks of the meeting be given to the Medical and Surgical Staff of the Institution for their services during the past year and that—in accordance with Law 68, which directs that “The interest accruing from the Medical Officers’ Fund shall from time to time be disposed of by vote at a meeting of the Governors in presents to the Honorary Acting Staff of the Charity”—the interest for the year 1928 amounting to £50 9s. od. be presented to the Treasurer of the Medical Board, to be disposed of as the Board thinks proper.

3. Upon the proposition of Dr. J. N. Collins, seconded by Mr. G. P. Strickland:

That the best thanks of the Governors be given to Mr. and Mrs. Samuel Austin, of Cleveland, U.S.A., for their generous gift of 5,000 dollars, for the endowment of a Bed, “to be reserved, whenever possible, for the inhabitants of the villages of Orton Waterville and Ramsey Heights,” and to the representatives of the late Mr. Ben Irish, of Sawtry, for the Legacy of £270.

4. Upon the proposition of Mrs. H. J. Warwick, seconded by Mr. J. L. George:

That in according their best thanks to the Clergy and Ministers who have made collections from their several congregations during the past year, the Governors desire to express their sense of the great benefit to the Institution of a united appeal on its behalf on some Sunday in the year, from the pulpits of the several Churches and Chapels in the Borough and District, which appeal has this year produced the sum of £628 18s. 5d., an increase of £42 2s. 10d. on the previous year's collections, and the Governors suggest that St. Luke's Day, or Sunday following, be the acknowledged Sunday for "Hospital Sunday".

5. Upon the proposition of Mr. Joseph Stephenson, seconded by Mr. A. Rose :

That the best thanks of the meeting be accorded to the following Organizations and Societies for their splendid financial support during the past year :—The Peterborough and District Workpeople's Hospital Fund, Whittlesey, Chatteris, Benwick, Titchmarsh, Ramsey, Wimblington, March, Thorney, Doddington, Manea, Whaplode Drove, Moulton, Rings End, etc., and to those ladies and gentlemen who assisted in collecting the contributions of these organizations.

That the thanks of the Governors also be given to those Clergy, Ministers, and others who have kindly visited the sick in the Hospital and to those ladies and gentlemen who have sent various donations, flowers for the decoration of the wards, and other articles for the comfort of the patients during the past year.

6. Upon the proposition of the Rev. G. W. Elliott, seconded by Dr. H. Clapham :

That the best thanks of this meeting be given to the President (the Hon. Mrs. Pelham) and the members of the Peterborough and District Hospital Ladies' Association for their valuable assistance during the year.

Upon the proposition of the Rev. R. M. Gibson, seconded by Mr. R. True, Mr. G. C. W. Fitzwilliam was unanimously re-elected President for the ensuing year.

It was proposed by Mr. J. A. Bagshaw, and agreed, that the following be and are hereby elected Vice-Presidents for the ensuing year.

REPORT OF THE MANAGEMENT COMMITTEE.

For the Year ended December 31st, 1928.

Mr. President, My Lords, Ladies and Gentlemen,

A year ago, when I read the Annual Report of the Management Committee of the Old Infirmary, I referred to the early opening of the New Hospital. Since that reference, as you are all aware, we transferred (in July last) the whole of the patients, staff, and the work of the old institution to this present up-to-date and splendidly equipped building.

The task of removing the patients, etc., was most efficiently carried out by our own staff, very ably assisted by the St. John Ambulance Brigade, and with the help of vans kindly lent by The Co-operative Society, Mr. M. Hooke, Mr. Alexander Thomson, and Messrs. J. W. Williamson and Son, and no time was lost in settling down in the New Hospital.

Few people, I think, realize the magnitude of the work now carried on by the Hospital. Our present staff consists (besides our honorary acting staff and the clerical staff) of two resident Medical Officers, Matron, Assistant Matron, Night Sister, Theatre and Private Ward Sister, Surgical Sister, Medical Sister, Masseuse, Dispenser, seven Staff Nurses, twenty Probationers, Head Porter, Assistant Porter and Night Porter, Engineer, Assistant Engineer, Gardener, Hall Boy, Cook and twelve Maids, Head Laundress and five Assistants.

You will recognise that, for the smooth working of an Institution of this size, it is essential it should be well organised. I am pleased to be able to bear personal testimony to the splendid and efficient organisation and to the able and skilful manner in which the whole staff carry out their several duties. Although these are not always pleasant, still always they are carried out with kindly and sympathetic attention and in a very bright and cheerful manner. It is, indeed, a very busy place both day and night.

We have now had half a year's working in our new quarters, and I think you will agree with me it has more than come up to general expectations.

Our Secretary's estimate of the cost of running the Institution seems to be pretty accurate. We shall require some £12,000 annually for the maintenance of the Hospital, and, from the way funds are coming in and with the amount we hope to raise from the Maintenance Quota system which will, I contemplate, shortly be arranged, I feel we need not be unduly alarmed at the financial outlook.

The year under review has been an extremely busy one, and the following meetings have been held :—

Our income has increased some £1,200, but our expenses have gone up some £1,700, and we closed the year with an adverse balance of £541 2s. 10d. Mr. Bagshaw, the Treasurer, has explained our financial position in more detail in his report.

I would, however, like to refer to the generous gift of £1,000 from Mr. and Mrs. Samuel Austin, of Cleveland, for the endowment of a bed, and to the legacies received from the representatives of the late Mr. Ben Irish, of Sawtry, £270, and the late Mr. Richard Graham Walker, of London, £5, which sums, except the last named, have been duly invested through the Official Trustees of Charitable Funds.

X-Ray Apparatus.

This very necessary additional equipment, costing just over £550, was generously given by the Medical Board, Mr. Alderman J. W. Williamson, and from the balance standing to the credit of the Roll of Honour Fund.

The Theatre Equipment.

This was generously undertaken by the L.M. and S. Railway Traffic Department Staff.

The whole of the Wireless Installation was supplied by the liberality of the Old Deaconians' Association.

It will be remembered, too, that Messrs. Baker, Perkins, Ltd., gave the whole of the Laundry Equipment, and that Messrs. Barford and Perkins Ltd., gave ten Sterilizers for the wards.

All these additions are most gratifying.

In the Old Infirmary our maximum number of beds was 75. Here in the new building it is at present 103, and will be 150 when the Children's Wing is opened. In consequence we are now recognised

by The General Nursing Council for England and Wales as a complete training school for nurses.

The daily number of beds occupied was 74.17, compared with 63.90 in 1927.

The average stay of each patient in Hospital was 26.94 days (29.12 in 1927).

As far as it has been possible to allocate the expenditure to the different departments, the average cost of each In-patient works out at £6 5s. 11d., and each Out-patient at 11s. 6d.

In view of the fact that part of the year's work was at the Old Infirmary and part in the New Hospital, I refrain from making financial comparisons with previous years, as it would be rather misleading; but at the next annual meeting figures for a complete year in the new building will no doubt be given for that purpose.

PETERBOROUGH AND DISTRICT MEMORIAL HOSPITAL.

Report of Medical Board for 1928.

Mr. President, My Lords, Ladies, and Gentlemen,

The year 1928, perhaps the most notable in the history of our Institution, has witnessed our transference from the Old Infirmary in Priestgate to the well designed, well equipped and commodious modern Hospital, upon the possession of which we congratulate Peterborough and District.

In submitting their Annual Report to the Governors the Medical Board desire to thank all the members of the various Committees, constituted in the many towns and villages in the District served by the Hospital, who, by their enthusiasm, perseverance, and unremitting energies, have been so largely instrumental during the past few years in organizing the District to make the sustained efforts which have been necessary to raise the large sum required for the building and equipment of this Hospital. The greatly increased accommodation has given the Management Committee the opportunity of making the very necessary additions to the Honorary Medical and Surgical Staff to which the Chairman has referred in his report and we trust that these will materially add to the efficiency with which our work is carried on and to the benefits rendered to our patients.

We have to deplore the retirement, under the Laws of the Institution, of Dr. J. N. Collins from the Acting Surgical Staff, but, as Consulting Surgeon, we hope for many more years to have the great benefit of his long experience and skill and of his continued interest and good will which have been such an asset to our Board.

In August Dr. T. H. Gillison was appointed House Surgeon in place of Dr. G. Milledge, who resigned the post after ten months of very efficient service, and in September Dr. J. S. Westwater was appointed House Physician as it became evident that one Resident Medical Officer could not alone cope with the work of our enlarged Hospital. Both these gentlemen have carried out their duties to our entire satisfaction.

To the Matron, Assistant Matron, and the greatly enlarged Nursing and General Staff we tender our thanks for the very efficient way in which their arduous duties have been fulfilled.

In spite of the increase in the number of beds at present available, our accommodation for In-patients continues to be inadequate and we are eagerly looking forward to the early opening of the Children's and Male Accident Wards.

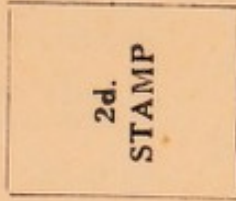

- Law 6.—(a) Every donor (including donors before the 12th July, 1927, to the Charity previously known as the Peterborough Infirmary and Dispensary) of £21 and upwards at one time to the funds of the Charity shall be a Life Governor of the Charity.
- (b) Every person individually contributing £1 1s. and upwards for the funds of the Charity in any year shall be a Governor during the ensuing year.
- (c) Every company, firm, association, or society, contributing to the funds of the Charity in any year not less than £2 2s. 0d., either directly or through some channel authorized by the General Committee, shall be entitled to nominate by writing, delivered to the Secretary-Superintendent, representative Governors to hold office during the ensuing year as follows: One for £2 2s., two for £15 10s., three for £26 5s., four for £52 10s., and one for each additional sum of £52 10s.

Unless subscriptions are renewed, contributors and their representatives under sub-headings (b) and (c) cease to be Governors at the expiration of twelve calendar months from the end of the period covered by their last subscription.

By-Law.

The Donors referred to in this Law are those whose Donations are given to the Maintenance Funds of the Charity, and the "persons, companies, firms," etc., under sections (b) and (c), are such as give their contributions annually, and these will be treated as subscriptions for the purpose of allotting Letters of Recommendation under Law 7. Contributions given by persons individually under section (b) are the person's own private contribution, and are not in any way collective contributions.

Law 7.—Every Governor and Representative Governor shall have the privilege of voting at the annual and special meetings of the Governors, and of recommending patients for treatment by signing Letters of Recommendation allotted to them. Every life Governor as defined in Law 6 (a) shall have two Letters allotted to him annually in respect of each twenty guineas of his donation. Every Governor, as defined in Law 6 (b), and every company, firm, association, or society, as defined in Law 6 (c), shall be allotted two Letters in respect of each guinea subscribed.

Law 56.—No person shall be admitted as a patient without a Letter of Recommendation except in case of accident, or emergency, in which case a Letter must be obtained as soon as possible. Every Letter shall be endorsed with an undertaking to be signed by the patient, or by relatives or other persons responsible for the patient, agreeing to pay any charge which may be made under Law 3. The Honorary Acting Staff, or the Resident Medical Staff in their absence, shall decide which patients shall be admitted as in-patients. Notwithstanding the provisions of Law 2, no person who in the opinion of the Medical Officers is considered incurable, unlikely to receive substantial benefit or who is otherwise undesirable, shall be admitted or retained as a patient except in very special circumstances approved by the Medical Board.

Law 58.—Patients desirous of making any complaint must do so to the Secretary-Superintendent in writing, and he will bring the subject before the House Committee for investigation.

Law 61.—The annual subscriptions shall be due and payable either to the Bankers of the Charity (by a Banker's order) or to the Secretary-Superintendent, on the 1st day of January in each year.
