REPORT

The present is the Fifty-second Annual Report, Statement of Accounts, and General Lists for the year ended 31st December, 1947.

The total number of patients entering the Hospital during the year was 840 (including 302 cases of accident and 127 patients X-rayed). 820 were cured, ten died, ten were transferred to other institutions and three remained in Hospital at the end of the year.

Adding 838 (the number of new patients for the year) to 9,941, the figure brought forward from the previous year gives 10,779 as the total number of patients admitted to the Hospital since its foundation. It will be observed in the accounts that the total income for the year (including donations, but excluding balances and transfers) available for the maintenance of the Hospital was £2,042 compared with £2,630 for the previous year. The cost of running the Hospital was £3,008 compared with £2,665 for 1946.

The sum of all the days spent by each patient in the Hospital was 3,502, giving an average length of stay of just over four days. The average cost of each patient was just over 17/2d. a day, and just over £6 0s. 2d. a week. The Committee are glad to express once more their appreciation of the conscientious care of all responsible, especially the Matron, for the efficient maintenance of the Hospital.

During the year under review, death has deprived the Hospital of two loyal supporters. Miss Dowson had been a generous subscriber for many years and, with her late sister, had for over twenty-one years, acted as Joint Honorary Treasurer. Although the late Rev. Dr. C. C. Weeks had not been for long a member of the Committee, he took great interest in the work, and his medical knowledge was most useful, especially to the House Committee.

Since the end of the year the Committee have also lost by death the help of Miss E. M. Huntington, C.B.E., who had been a valued subscriber since 1916; a member of the Committee for thirty years, and of the House Committee since 1920. During this long period Miss Huntington's time and thought had been freely available to the Committee, and her presence and support at the meetings would be greatly missed by the members.

The Premises Committee referred to in the last Report have met four times during 1947, and, in spite of great difficulties (shortage of labour and controls) have been able to remodel the storage accommodation and the laundry. Plans have also been prepared for enlarging and improving the Nurses' Quarters and for increasing the storage accommodation for fuel.

The Trustees have given favourable consideration to an application from the Pershore and District Sports Club for the purchase of the sports field adjoining the Hospital. The consent of the Ministry of Health has been received and it seems likely that the Charity Commissioners may also agree to the proposal.

The Hospital will become a part of the National Health Service as from 5th July next and this will be the last Annual Report of the Committee to the Subscribers and Governors. The Committee relinquish their work with great regret and at the same time desire to express their warm appreciation of the confidence and generous support of the Hospital's many friends. They also express the hope that the beneficent and useful work of the Hospital, which has existed for so many years, may long continue for the benefit of the community.

The Committee are most grateful to the many kind friends of the Hospital for their generous and most useful gifts, which have materially assisted in its maintenance.

The Committee desire once again to express their thanks to the Medical and Nursing Staffs ; to Mrs. Hine for managing the Linen League in succession to Mrs. le Fleming after many years able service and to Miss G. Akers for organising "Pound Week."

They also wish to express their appreciation of the good work done by the officers—Mrs. Mumford, Honorary Secretary of the House Committee, and Mr. Feek as Joint Honorary Secretary with Mr. W. F. Pugh, who also acts as Honorary Treasurer. It will be recalled that at the last Annual General Meeting Mr. Feek, who had been Honorary Secretary for thirteen years, expressed the opinion that the Hospital would be better served by the appointment of a younger man but a happy solution was found in his appointment jointly with Mr. Pugh.

The whole Committee retire on the day of the Annual Meeting, but are eligible for re-election.

PAYMENTS FOR PATIENTS

Each Patient or nearest relative will be asked to sign a Form of Admission.

The fees for Patients shall be as follows :

Patients with a Letter of Recommendation will be charged 10/6 per week.

Private Patients in the General Ward will be charged £2 2s. per week.

Private Patients in a Private Ward will be charged £6 6s. per week.

The above charges for Private Patients do not include the cost of stimulants, dressings, or special nurse if the case necessitates.

The House Committee have the power to vary these charges.

The charges for Private Patients in either Ward are in addition to their Medical Attendant's usual fee.

RULES

Copies of the Rules of the Institution may be obtained upon application to the Hon. Secretary.

BYE-LAWS

- (1) No person suffering from an infectious or incurable disease can be received into the Hospital.
- (2) Every patient must bring decent clothing and a sufficient supply of personal linen. All patients shall have their personal linen properly washed at their own homes or elsewhere at their own expense, so often as the Medical Officer or Matron shall require.
- (3) Patients' friends shall be allowed to visit them on Sundays and Wednesdays, between the hours of 2.30 and 4.30 o'clock p.m. but on no other day of the week without leave of the Medical Officer or Matron, and not more than three persons can be allowed to visit the same patient in one day.
- (4) Patients shall strictly observe the hour appointed for all arrangements of the Hospital.
- (5) No patient shall go beyond the garden without the special leave of the Matron.
- (6) No male patient shall enter the female wards, and no female shall enter the male wards, without the special permission of the Matron.
- (7) No smoking shall be allowed within the House, except with the special permission of the Medical Officer.
- (8) No patient shall use bad language.
- (9) All patients whom the Medical Officers deem able shall assist in the work of the Hospital.
- (10) Each patient must strictly obey the directions of the Medical Officers and the Matron on pain of instant dismissal.
- (11) General visitors shall be admitted on Tuesdays and Fridays, between the hours of 2.30 and 4.30 o'clock p.m.
- (12) Patients, except in cases of accident or acute illness, shall be admitted only on Mondays and Tuesdays between the hours of 9 a.m. and 11 a.m.
- (13) In cases requiring prolonged treatment at the Hospital, patients must apply to the House Committee for their names to be re-entered on the register after each period of eight weeks.

N.B.—Donors of Letters of Recommendation are requested to make careful enquiries before recommending any patient for admission to the Hospital that such patient has not been in recent contact with any case of infectious disease.
