REPORT

for Year ending December 31st, 1944

. In the interests of economy the Report is again in abbreviated form.

All the details omitted are available at the Hospital for the information of any Governor.

THE HOSPITAL'S WORK IN WAR-TIME.

Throughout the year the bed complement of the Hospital was 476. Before the invasion of Europe the Ministry of Health still further limited the number of beds that could be occupied at any one time. This made it necessary to restrict civilian admissions to acutely ill cases only. In spite of this limitation, the number of In-patients treated was 6,553. The Board are thankful that the Hospital experienced no further air raids during the year. It can now be stated that of all civilian air-raid casualties in Plymouth admitted to hospital since the outbreak of war, 82 per cent. were treated at our Hospital.

New Apparatus.

Owing to war-time restrictions it has not been possible to carry out any considerable renewals and repairs. An additional Deep X-ray Therapy Set to cope with the increasing number of patients and a new Diagnostic apparatus with all the latest improvements have been ordered. Treatment cubicles were added to the Physiotherapy Department at Devonport, where over-bed lighting was also installed.

Co-operation.

In addition to maintaining existing relationships with Ministries, Associations, other Hospitals and Committees whose interests are similar, the Board have made new contacts. This is in accordance with their chief aims, viz., to increase the efficiency of their Medical and Nursing Services and to raise still higher the standard of work and teaching.

The Board readily agreed to help the National Radium Commission by starting a new system of records for cancer cases on the 1st of October. The Hospital thus undertakes a more detailed study of the problem of cancer and makes further research into new methods of treatment. Believing that there would be mutual advantages to the Plymouth Public Dispensary, the Hospital, and the patients they serve if there were closer contact and co-operation between the two Institutions, joint meetings were held to consider this matter. As a result, the Governors of the Dispensary have agreed with the Hospital to provide a twelve-hour-a-day service for minor casualties and living quarters for a house surgeon.

On the invitation of the Board a representative of the Nursing Council for England and Wales discussed with the Nursing Committee problems in connection with the Hospital's Training Schools for Nurses, now and in the future.

This contact with the General Nursing Council will be of assistance in the work of student nurses' training, the standard of which the Council has described as very satisfactory.

The Board would like to take this opportunity of thanking the Managing Committee of the Pearn Convalescent Home and the Home Trustees for their valuable co-operation in asking the Charity Commissioners to approve of Compton Leigh House being used as a Preliminary Training School for nurses from the Hospital. The General Nursing Council informed the Board that a fully equipped Training School must be provided as soon as possible and the strong support of the Pearn Home Managing Committee in furthering this is much appreciated.

Representatives of the Board have attended meetings of the South Western Hospitals Regional Council and the Devon County Area Committee and Council of the British Hospitals Association. They have thus kept in touch with the developments of hospital policy.

A National Health Service.

The Minister of Health has initiated discussion of the White Paper proposals for a comprehensive Health Service with representatives of Voluntary Hospitals and Local Authorities with a view to finding an acceptable basis on which these bodies may co-operate. All approve wholeheartedly of the aim. It is only the methods and machinery that are controversial. The discussions are continuing.

All would wish to raise the efficiency of the Hospital services to the highest possible level. Your Board, in common with the managing body of every other Voluntary Hospital, believe that the general health of the nation and the well-being of each individual patient are matters of paramount importance. They also believe that these will only be achieved by a scheme in which (a) there is co-operation on an equal footing between the Voluntary and Local Authority Hospitals, and (b) the status and freedom of Voluntary Hospitals are preserved.

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CANCER ACT, 1939.

Under the requirements of this Act, Local Authorities were asked to submit schemes to the Minister of Health for his approval. Meetings of the Local Authorities in the South-West were held during the year under review and a draft Agreement was discussed by representatives of the radium-holding Voluntary Hospitals of Devon and Cornwall. Another joint meeting will be held to agree the document before its submission to the Minister of Health.

The intention is to utilise fully the resources of the Voluntary Hospitals and to provide a regional service whereby every sufferer from this disease will have the best treatment. The Prince of Wales's Hospital will be asked to function as the administrative centre for the proposed Cancer Scheme in the South-West.

REHABILITATION CENTRE.

In last year's Report it was stated that the Board were well ahead with their plans for staffing a Rehabilitation Department to expedite the return of patients to full working capacity.

At the end of the year a Physiotherapy Department was established at 27 Mildmay Street. More modern equipment was added, and during the year 995 new patients were dealt with, and a total of 39,530 treatments given, representing an increase of 4,406 over 1943.

Through the kindness of the Trustees of the Greenbank Road Methodist Church the Hospital obtained the use, rent free, of a hall in Hospital Road which, with the help of the Ministry of Health, was equipped for remedial and group exercises. The Plymouth Public Health Committee was invited to make use of the facilities provided by sending patients from the City Hospital to the hall and utilising the services of the Hospital's panel of Occupational Therapists. The Board hope to increase the usefulness and scope of this work during the coming year by providing a more spacious room.

Finally, an Occupational Therapy Section was set up to work with the Physiotherapy and other Departments as a complete unit. No praise is too high for Miss Kendall, of the Plymouth School of Art, and for her band of willing voluntary lady helpers who give much of their spare time to instructing patients in handicrafts. These lessons are very popular and patients take keen interest in them.

The responsible Staff of this Rehabilitation Centre consists of Physicians, Surgeons, and Specialists. Physical Training Instructors and Chartered Physiotherapists work under the direction of Mrs. Moysey, C.S.P., to whose consistent enthusiasm much credit is due for the rapid progress of the Department.

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PENICILLIN.

A limited supply of Penicillin was made available by the Ministry of Health for the treatment of selected patients in a number of local hospitals. The Hospital's Pathologist was appointed representative of the Regional Adviser in Pathology and is available for consultation and can supply Penicillin for suitable cases.

It may be expected that as the production of Penicillin increases it will be easier to obtain for the treatment of more civilian patients.

FINANCE.

The total Expenditure on maintenance was $\pounds 94,015$, against $\pounds 86,113$ in 1943, while the total Ordinary Income for the year was $\pounds 93,215$, compared with $\pounds 94,989$.

Interim payments for the maintenance of beds for the Emergency Medical Service amounted to £30,188, a decrease of £4,983 as compared with 1943. With the end of hostilities there will be a big decrease in the future income from this source.

The Board are gratified to be able to report that Subscribers and Donors have generously continued their support and extend sincere and heartfelt thanks to all who contributed to the Appeal made by Commander Anthony Kimmins, R.N.

The increase in Expenditure is only to be expected in the prevailing circumstances, and further increases are almost bound to occur. The increase in the salaries of the members of the Nursing and Domestic Staffs has resulted in a heavy financial burden. It must also be remembered that practically nothing has been spent on renovation and decoration. So, when times are back to normal, there will have to be faced a large accumulation of essential works involving substantial expenditure.

Total Expenditure exceeded the Ordinary Income by £800. Page Ten All the free Legacies received during the year and amounting to $\pounds 8,987$, were placed to the credit of the General Fund Capital Account.

GIFTS FROM WAR RELIEF ORGANISATIONS.

The Hospital has again received many gifts in kind from "Bundles for Britain" Incorporated of the U.S.A., the American War Relief Society, the British Red Cross Society, the Canadian Red Cross Society, and the Lake Shore Lions Club of Canada. These gifts were exceedingly valuable and appropriate at times when supplies were difficult to obtain. The Board is exceedingly grateful to these Societies for their generous and thoughtful help.

HONORARY MEDICAL AND SURGICAL STAFF.

The Board desire to express to the members of the Visiting Medical and Surgical Staff their gratitude for the manner in which each member continues to give so freely of time and professional skill, in spite of the increased strain on those who remain for duty at home. The Board appreciates also the continued assistance of many temporary members of the Medical and Surgical Staff, some of whom are now rendering regular routine assistance.

The death of Miss Osborne is reported with keen regret. Miss Osborne was a member of the Greenbank Road House Committee for many years and the Committee record their appreciation of her valued services.

It is with deep regret that the Board also records the death of Mr. J. Bone, a member of the House Committee, Devonport. He took a great interest in the work of the Hospital and rendered most valuable service.

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BOARD OF MANAGEMENT AND HOUSE COMMITTEES.

After three years' service as Chairman of the Board of Management Dr. C. D. Lindsay tendered his resignation. In accepting it regretfully the Board placed on record their gratitude for his valued services during a difficult period in the history of the Hospital.

The Board unanimously elected Mr. C. P. Brown as their Chairman, and are grateful to him for consenting to serve.

Mr. F. E. Bowden found it necessary to resign the Vice-Chairmanship of the Board after seven years' service. The Board thanked him for kindly and efficiently carrying out the duties and are glad that the Hospital continues to derive the benefit of his services as a member.

Mr. C. S. C. Prance was elected Vice-Chairman for the ensuing year.

The resignation for health reasons of Mr. E. N. Parson was accepted with regret and with best thanks for his past invaluable services.

Mr. A. R. Cocks tendered his resignation on giving up membership of the Plymouth and South-West Hospitals Contributory Scheme Committee, and the Board wish to record their thanks for his keen interest in the work of the Hospital for so many years.

The Board welcomed Mr. W. J. Gilbert, who was elected by the Governors, and Mr. T. H. Stanbury, who was nominated by the Plymouth and South-West Hospitals Contributory Scheme Committee.

Messrs. E. E. Bennett, W. Fitzgerald, J. H. Freeman and J. F. Warren were nominated by the Contributory Scheme Committee to serve on the Greenbank Road House Committee ; and Mr. G. Dolley and Mr. T. H. Stanbury on the Devonport House Committee.

CONTRIBUTORY SCHEME.

The Board record their appreciation of the splendid support which the Hospital continues to receive from the Plymouth and South-West Hospitals Contributory Scheme. The appeal of the Scheme Committee to all contributors to increase their contributions from 2d. to 3d. has been most successful, and the Board congratulates the Members of the Committee, Officers, Group Secretaries, and Collectors on the splendid result achieved. The record sum of £30,569 5s. 3d. allocated to the Hospital for 1944 was £4,562 12s. 6d. more than was received during 1943.

LETTERS OF RECOMMENDATION.

Letters of Recommendation were abolished in March. Every subscriber was informed that in view of the expense of providing and circulating "Letters", the Hospital was discontinuing the

method, and that should it be desired to get a patient into Hospital the staff would, on receipt of the subscriber's card or brief note, give prompt and careful attention to the case.

During the year the Board appointed a special Sub-Committee to study the problem of Hospital dietary, with particular reference to the method by which food is conveyed from the kitchens to the Wards.

The difficulties of conveying hot meals to the Wards were overcome by the installation of nine food conveyors, which retain heat with only the slightest temperature drop after being disconnected from the electric supply. Five food boxes were obtained for Wards without lifts.

The Board have pleasure in reporting that the total cost of these conveyors and the necessary electric wiring was defrayed by moneys received from the Plymouth Contributory Scheme, Mrs. Andrews of Plympton, the Lockyer Street Ladies' Committee, Mrs. Judd of Torpoint, and Miss Down of Cawsand.

NURSING.

The Nursing Staff of the Hospital numbered 177, of which 126 were in training, and 13 were successful in passing their State Final Examination.

Leave of absence was granted to Sister J. Cole, who won a scholarship covering the cost of special training, and to Sister E. Peto to enable them to attend a special course of training with a view to qualifying as Sister-Tutors.

Nurses' Representative Councils were established and constituted on the lines suggested by the Royal College of Nursing. The Board were glad to give their Nursing Staffs this power of selfexpression and believe that it will be productive of good results.

The Board accepted gratefully a generous offer made by Mr. W. E. Beckly to place at the disposal of the Hospital, rent free, a fully furnished top floor of No. 25 Woodland Terrace. This sleeping accommodation for eleven Nurses was needed urgently and is a great help.

It is interesting to note that in connection with the "Salute the Soldier" Week the Hospital's Savings Group target of $\pounds4,000$ was doubled. Great credit for this magnificent achievement was due to Miss Paske, who is the Group Honorary Secretary and Sister-Tutor.

PRIVATE PATIENTS' DEPARTMENT.

Increased use was made of the Wards for private patients. Many people of moderate means who are not eligible for admission

to the General Wards of the Hospital on financial grounds took advantage of this service.

During 1944, 511 patients were admitted, and the average number resident daily was 22.7.

STAFF CHANGES.

The Board have to report the resignation of Miss I. M. Ratcliff, Matron to the Lockyer Street Hospital, who was married in June. Miss Ratcliff was the recipient of tokens from the Medical Board, House Committee, and from the Nursing and Administrative Staffs of the Hospital, to mark the esteem in which she was held.

Miss E. M. Wallis, appointed and welcomed as Miss Ratcliff's successor, was Assistant Matron at Exminster Emergency Hospital.

After many years' service Mrs. E. E. Soltau, Chief Physiotherapist, tendered her resignation. In accepting this the Board here record their appreciation of her loyal and devoted services to the Hospital and its patients.

The Rev. Erett was appointed Chaplain to the Devonport Hospital in the place of the Rev. J. M. Key, whose resignation was reported a year ago.

THANKS.

It is in a spirit of thankfulness that the Board express their deep gratitude to the many friends of the Hospital for their public spirited interest in its work of cure and relief.

They desire to express to the Nursing, Administrative and other Staffs their deepest appreciation of the work loyally carried out during the year.

They desire also to thank the Chaplain and all Clergymen and Ministers of Religion ; the Lockyer Street Ladies' Committee, and the Devonport Entertainments Committee for their work and gifts in kind ; the Committees and Staffs of the Crownhill and Pearn Convalescent Homes for their help during a very difficult year ; the members of the three Linen Leagues, the Honorary Librarians who organise the libraries of the Hospital; the Officers and Members of the National Council of Social Service; the Cripples' Aid Association; the St. John Ambulance Association; the British Red Cross and Order of St. John War Organisation ; the Liaison Officer of the British Red Cross Society and Order of St. John; the City Police; the W.V.S.; the Plymouth Voluntary Blood Transfusion Service; the Fire Watchers and Stretcher Bearers who have attended the Hospital with unfailing regularity; the local Press for their help in widely making known the work which has been accomplished and in bringing the needs of the Hospital before the public ; and to all those who have assisted the Hospital in any manner during the past year.

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Whilst reference here can only be made to certain special contributions, the Board wish to extend hearty thanks to all donors, organisers of special efforts and their numerous friends and helpers.
