



# REPORT

# for Year ending December 31st, 1947

The Board of Management have pleasure in submitting their Report on the work and finances of the Hospital for the year ending 31st December, 1947.

This will probably be the last Annual Report which they will present because the National Health Service Act is expected to come into operation on the 5th July next when the Hospital will, with others, be taken over by the State and be managed by other bodies set up under the Act.

#### THE DEVELOPMENT OF THE HOSPITAL.

The development of the Hospital's activities continued during the past year, notwithstanding the many difficulties arising from shortage of materials and labour and the national need to restrict capital expenditure.

Many projects were undertaken. Some are completed, some are in hand and others await the necessary licences.

A modern type X-ray diagnostic unit was purchased for the Devonport Section and the opportunity was taken at the time to remodel the Department. This work has now been completed and results in an efficient and up-to-date X-ray service.

Work was started on the following additions and improvements:—

- The provision of a surgical (or medical) equipment room and the installation of a bedpan washer and other utility equipment in each Ward unit at the Greenbank Road and Devonport Sections.
- The provision of an extension to the existing Radiotherapeutic Department at Greenbank Road to meet the needs of the ever-increasing number of patients requiring this special treatment.
- The conversion of the former North Friary Nursing Home to a hostel for 24 Night Nurses.
- A new Ward kitchen for the women's general surgical Ward at the Lockyer Street Section.

The difficulties of building and materials are fully realised but the problem of providing additional and improved accommodation for the Nursing Staff is an all-important one if the Hospital is to maintain its existing services. Application has been made to the Ministry of Health for the erection of temporary recreation rooms at Greenbank Road and Devonport.

The work of the Physiotherapy Department has far outgrown the accommodation available and lack of space imposes great inconvenience on patients and staff. Nothing less than a completely new Department of adequate dimensions will solve existing difficulties. This, however, will not be realised for some years and the Board are exploring the possibility of providing some additional accommodation in the garage at the rear of the North Friary Nurses' Home.

The Board's schemes for providing a Pathological Laboratory adequate to meet the needs of the area served by the Hospital, and for alterations to an empty Ward unit at Devonport have been deferred until the national building situation is easier.

Throughout the year, at three-monthly intervals, an Acoustic Specialist visited the Ear, Nose and Throat Department to give advice to those patients requiring hearing-aids.

#### CO-OPERATION IN SERVICE.

In addition to maintaining the existing good relationships with Ministries, Associations, other hospitals and with committees whose aims and interests are similar, the Board have made new contacts. This is in accordance with their aims to increase the efficiency of the medical and nursing services and to raise still higher the standard of work and teaching.

The Joint Admission Bureau established by the Plymouth Public Health Committee and the Hospital ensures the immediate admission of all acute medical and surgical cases occurring in the City with resultant benefit to patients, doctors and hospitals' staffs.

Following the recognition of the Hospital as the Administrative Centre of the Cancer Service of Devon and Cornwall, the Director, Dr. Duncan Wood, F.R.C.S., established his headquarters at Greenbank Road and was accorded a warm welcome.

Through the kindness and courtesy of the Church Trustees and voluntary helpers a Hospital Buffet was opened in the School Room of the Greenbank Road Methodist Church on Monday, 24th November. It is much appreciated by patients and their friends attending Hospital and fulfils a long-felt want.

In co-operation with Bristol University, full support has been given to the Government's Scheme for providing post-graduate training facilities for medical practitioners who have been released from the Services.

Representatives of the Board attended meetings of the Devon County Area Committee and Council of the British Hospitals Association. They have thus kept in touch with the developments of hospital policy.

#### NATIONAL HEALTH SERVICE.

The 5th July, 1948, is the date fixed by the Minister of Health for the commencement of the National Health Service.

Responsibility for providing the Service will rest with the Minister who will be advised by a Central Health Services Council and will, in so far as the hospital and specialist services are concerned, delegate his functions to Regional Boards.

The Regional Hospital Boards have been appointed by the Minister and the Board are glad that two of their number have been appointed to the South Western Regional Hospital Board, namely, Mr. C. P. Brown and Mr. J. W. G. H. Riddell. They feel sure that their experience of voluntary hospital work and management will be of great value.

A Regional Committee has been appointed with delegated powers to act for the Board in Devon and Cornwall.

To provide for the day-to-day management of hospitals grouped into units, the Regional Board is required, after consulting various interested local bodies, to appoint Boards of Management. These Boards will act as the agents of the Regional Board to whom they will be responsible.

As a first practical step towards the transfer of the hospitals to the Minister of Health on the "appointed day", the Hospital has furnished returns of all its material assets as well as statements giving particulars of all its endowments.

The Boards of Management will be entitled to receive future gifts and legacies of money or property and to administer such gifts in accordance with the wishes of the donors as trustees on behalf of their group of hospitals. It is certain that all the needs of medical science cannot be met solely by the Treasury and that there will always be scope for the employment of these gifts in furthering scientific research and in providing comforts and amenities for patients over and above those likely to be provided by the State. It is to be hoped, therefore, that testators and others will continue to help in these special ways.

The Board wish the new Health Service every success which will not, however, be assured merely by its resting on a foundation of national financial support, but rather by the vitality which it derives from continued public interest. They trust that those who have been loyal friends to the voluntary hospitals in the past will continue to interest themselves in the welfare of the institutions which minister to the sick and injured.

#### FINANCE.

The total Ordinary Income amounted to £142,466. Apart from creditable increases in Church Collections and in contributions from Patients and their Societies, the Voluntary Income has fallen off considerably. The reduction is attributable to the thought that the Hospital is soon to be taken over by the State and to the view held by some that it has not now the same need of help.

It should be emphasised, however, that the Hospital will still be dependent on voluntary contributions until it is taken over by the State.

Special thanks are due to the Plymouth and South West Hospitals Contributory Scheme Committee, Officers, Group Secretaries and Collectors for their excellent contribution of £26,803. The ending of this Scheme on the 5th July provides an opportunity here to acknowledge the regular and understanding service of our friends during the past twenty-five years. Their services have been much appreciated; they have performed an essential task and done it well.

Total Ordinary Expenditure amounted to £165,957 and was £29,996 more than in 1946.

The increase was accounted for by the rising cost of provisions, drugs, dressings, instruments and appliances; bedding and linen; increased charges for laundry and heating services; larger expenditure on hardware and crockery; increases in salaries and wages as recommended by National Joint Committees for certain categories of nursing, administrative, professional, technical and domestic staffs; and, by expenditure on a large accumulation of essential renewals and repairs.

Excess of expenditure over ordinary income was reduced to £16,341 by the transfer from Free Legacies Account of £7,149.

Through the support, interest and generosity of generations and the work and enthusiasm of the medical, nursing and other professions, "The Prince of Wales's" will contribute to the National Service a modern and well-equipped Hospital with material assets in buildings, equipment and endowments worth hundreds of thousands of pounds, and the intangible asset of one hundred and eight years of experience and service.

#### HONORARY MEDICAL AND SURGICAL STAFF.

The Board again tender to the members of the Visiting Medical Staff their thanks for the invaluable and ungrudging service which they rendered to the patients during the year. They also take this opportunity of placing on record their warm appreciation of the services which members of the Staff have given to the Hospital and its patients over varying periods of years, and their thanks for much valuable advice which they have placed at the disposal of the Board from time to time on matters of a medical administrative nature.

- Mr. G. C. F. Robinson tendered his resignation as Senior Honorary Surgeon in February. The Board placed on record their high appreciation of the valuable service which he rendered to the Hospital over a period of thirty-eight years.
- Dr. T. A. A. Hunter, Honorary Assistant Physician for Diseases of Children, resigned consequent upon his appointment as Medical Officer of Marlborough College.

Members of the Visiting Medical and Surgical Staff were promoted and certain new appointments made during the year as follows:—

- Mr. G. C. F. Robinson, Honorary Surgeon, to be Honorary Consulting Surgeon.
- Mr. C. F. Mayne, Honorary Assistant Surgeon, to be Honorary Surgeon.
- Mr. A. B. Concanon, Temporary Assistant Gynæcological Surgeon, to be Honorary Assistant Gynæcological Surgeon.
- Dr. F. E. Pilkington as Honorary Physician in Psychological Medicine.

#### OBITUARY.

It is with deep regret that the Board have to record the death of Mr. Arthur Spry, Appeals Secretary to the Hospital for six years. The Minutes of the Board record the high esteem in which the Members held his memory.

The loss of a very dear and close friend of the Hospital took place in July by the death of Mr. F. T. Ackland. Mr. Ackland served the hospital as Clerk of Works for fifty years and retired in 1946. It will be remembered that the Hospital has a permanent memorial to Mr. Ackland in the "Ackland Rehabilitation Centre" named after him in 1946.

#### NURSING.

The Nursing Staff of the Hospital numbered 203, of whom 124 were in training.

The Board congratulate the Sister Tutors, the Ward Sisters and the candidates on the results of the State Examinations. Thirtyfive Student Nurses qualified in 1947.

In view of the general acute shortage of nurses, the Board are pleased to report that the flow of recruits into the Training School has been well maintained and that much additional work has been undertaken.

Nurse C. M. Blundell was elected the representative of the South Western Area Student Nurses' Association of the Royal College of Nursing.

The Report of the Working Party on the Recruitment and Training of Nurses was received with interest and its findings and recommendations studied. The Board feel that it is only right that matters concerning the welfare of the Nursing Staff should receive their constant attention.

Among the inovations of the year the employment of a number of Ward Orderlies made it possible to relieve the Nurses of some of the purely domestic duties previously carried out by them.

## PRIVATE PATIENTS' DEPARTMENT.

This Department was fully appreciated and used by people of moderate means who were not eligible financially for admission to the General Wards of the Hospital.

During the year 967 patients were admitted and the average number resident daily was 26.59.

This has been and will be used for showing films of interest to the Medical Staff, for instructional purposes in the Nurses' Training School, and also films of a lighter character for the benefit of the Staff and those patients who are well enough to enjoy the performances. Attendances offer proof that in this respect alone the gift is much appreciated.

Cordial thanks are again expressed for the services of all Clergymen and Ministers of Religion; the Lockyer Street Ladies' Committee and the Devonport Charities Entertainments Committee for their gifts in kind and for loyal and faithful service; the Committees and Staffs of the Crownhill and Pearn Convalescent Homes; the members of the three Linen Leagues for their valuable service in providing so much of the linen in everyday use at the Hospital; the Honorary Librarians whose services are so much appreciated by the

patients; the Officers and Members of the National Council of Social Service; the Cripples' Aid Association; the St. John Ambulance Association; the Liaison Officer of the British Red Cross Society and Order of St. John; the City Police; the W.V.S.; the local Press for their co-operation, and the numerous friends who have assisted the Hospital.
