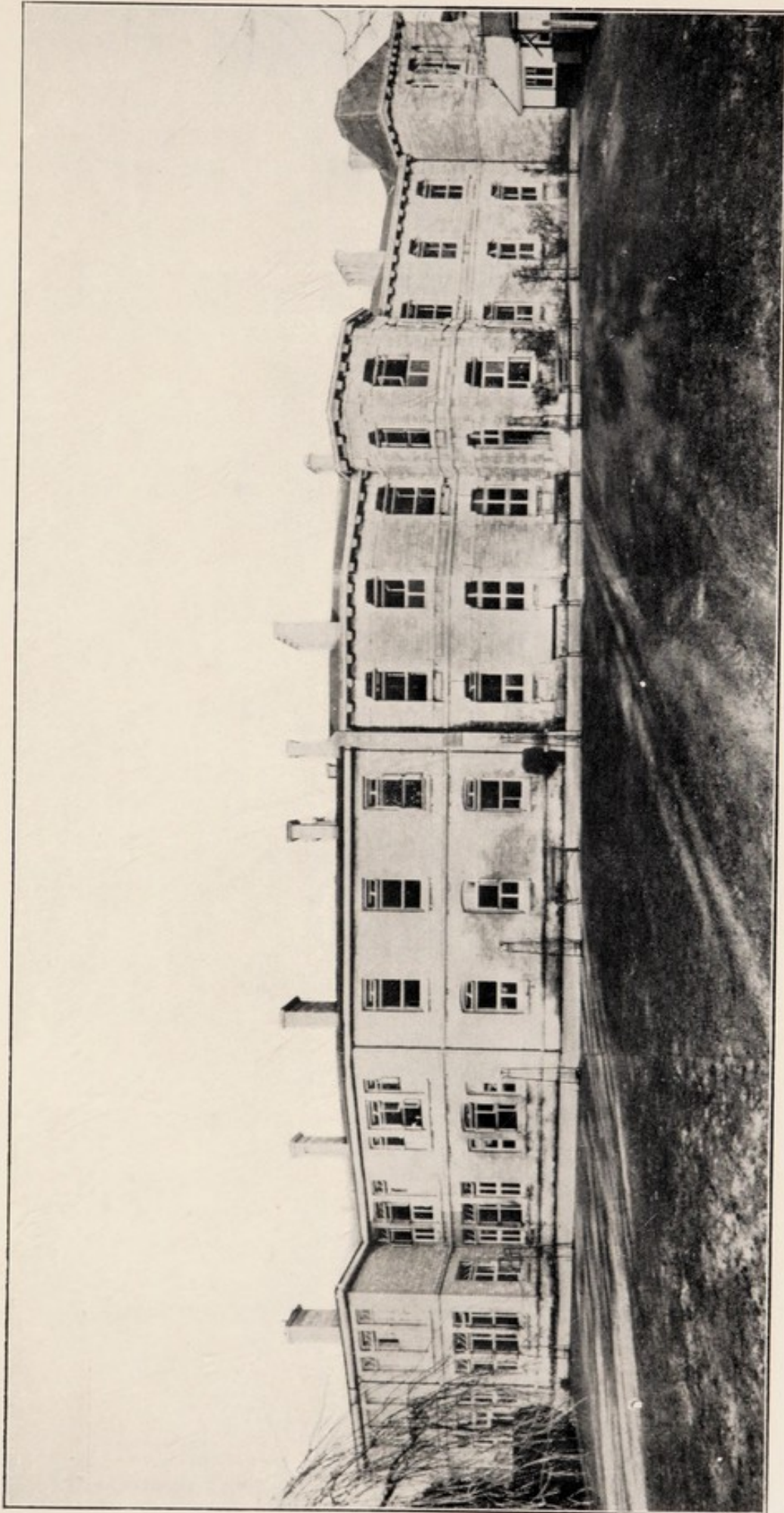

Report of the Committee of Management.

THE COMMITTEE OF MANAGEMENT have the honour to present to the Governors of the Royal National Sanatorium for Consumption and Diseases of the Chest, Bournemouth, their 84th Annual Report.

During the past year, the good work of the Institution has been fully maintained, and it is gratifying to the Committee to be able to record that, as in former years, a large number of patients have left the Sanatorium fit to resume their normal occupations and activities. Unfortunately, a certain proportion were found upon admission to be in a more or less advanced stage of the disease, yet many of these, although slow to respond to treatment, eventually improved in health with their lives undoubtedly prolonged. Every consideration has been given to the comfort and happiness of the patients, and the many expressions of gratitude which have been received show that these efforts have been fully appreciated.

The average number of patients in the Sanatorium daily throughout the year was 94.4, and the average period of treatment was 19 weeks and 4 days.

Of the 251 patients admitted in 1938, nearly one half came from the London area, and the remainder from all parts of the country.

A classification by the Medical Superintendent of the results of treatment appears in his Annual Medical Report on page 15.

The Committee have the pleasure of recording that the sound financial position of the Institution has been maintained and strengthened by the exceptionally large amount of £2,767 received in legacies (£2,267 bequeathed by the late Miss Margaret Davison, and £500 by the late Miss Jane Cameron).

The expenditure in 1938 exceeded that for 1937 by £219—an increase of 2 per cent. This may be considered very satisfactory, having regard to a small increase in the prices of many commodities, and to the fact that it has been necessary to raise the salaries of the nursing staff in conformity with the general increase throughout the country.

The average cost of each patient per week was £2 4s. 9d. as compared with £2 3s. 11d. in 1937.

The Committee have to record with great regret the retirement of Miss Edith Ellis from her position as Matron, which she had held for 21 years, after having previously been Sister for four years, making a total of 25 years in the service of the Sanatorium. During the whole of that time, Miss Ellis carried out her duties in an extremely able and conscientious manner, and entirely to the satisfaction of the Committee and Medical Staff, and was always unsparing in her efforts to secure the comfort of the patients and the smooth and efficient working of the Institution. The Committee have been extremely sorry to lose her services, and those who worked with and under her also greatly regret her departure. In consideration of her long and excellent service, the Committee have granted her a pension in accordance with the special scheme which was adopted for the benefit of certain members of the staff who were ineligible, by reason of age, to join the Federated Superannuation Scheme for Nurses and Hospital Officers at the time when the Sanatorium became affiliated to the Scheme.

A large number of applications was received for the vacancy caused by Miss Ellis's retirement, the selected candidate being Miss E. Botteley, formerly Assistant Matron of the Manchester Sanatorium, Abergele.

The following members of the Committee retire by rotation but are eligible for re-election:—

The Committee regret the loss of several supporters of the Sanatorium who have recently passed away, including S. G. Asher, Esq., Mrs. C. Gordon Canning, C. G. Montefiore, Esq., Miss L. Sleath, and Mrs. Holt Skinner.

The Committee desire to express their gratitude for the financial support which they have received during the past year, for the welcome contributions to the Christmas Festivities Fund, and many useful gifts in kind. They are also grateful to those who gave their services in entertaining the patients during the winter months.

The Committee desire to express their most cordial thanks to the Medical, Surgical and Dental Officers for their continued valuable services, and to the staff generally for their efficient co-operation, which has enabled the Institution to carry on its work so successfully.

Annual Meeting of Governors

THE ANNUAL GENERAL MEETING OF GOVERNORS was held at the Sanatorium on Friday, May 5th, 1939. Brigadier-General Sir Henry Page Croft, Bart., C.M.G., M.P. (President), in the Chair.

Colonel W. Roberts Thomson, moving the adoption of the Committee's Report and Audited Accounts for the year 1938, said that during the year under review, 345 patients were under treatment, including 251 new cases admitted. 252 patients were discharged with most satisfactory results in the great majority of cases—particularly amongst those in the early stages of the disease, of whom 88 per cent. left with the disease in a quiescent state and with a reasonable prospect of permanently restored health.

The great demand for the services of the Sanatorium was shown by the fact that, of the 95 beds available, the average number occupied daily throughout the year was 94.4. The longest period of treatment was 47 weeks and the average 20 weeks.

As would be seen from the accounts, the Institution continued to maintain a healthy financial position. In the past year they had been exceptionally fortunate in receiving two legacies amounting to a total sum of £2,767. One of these (the largest legacy so far bequeathed to them) was left by the late Miss Margaret Davison, of Bournemouth, whose father, the late Dr. James Davison, was Honorary Visiting Physician to the Sanatorium from 1889 to 1927.

The sound financial condition of the Institution was very welcome to the Committee, as it enabled them not only to meet the ordinary maintenance expenditure, but also to carry out improvements and to provide the new equipment and appliances which from time to time became necessary to keep up a high standard of efficiency. As an instance of this, they were now faced with the necessity of installing a new X-Ray apparatus, the existing one being obsolete and not up to the desired standard for modern chest work. The cost of this new apparatus

would be somewhere in the region of £800 to £900. Consideration had also to be taken of the probability of increased maintenance expenditure. Although fluctuations of prices had not been great during the past few years, there had been a gradual and continuous increase in the prices of several commodities (bread, milk, fuel, etc.). Additional expenditure had also been incurred by the general rise in nurses' salaries, with shorter working hours.

The retirement of Miss Ellis, as Matron, was greatly regretted by the Committee and by all associated with the work of the Sanatorium. For 25 years she had given very excellent service, and the successful working of the Institution, and the contentment of the patients and of the staff under her, had been very largely due to her thoughtful and untiring efforts. He was sure they all wished Miss Ellis many years of happiness and comfort in her well-earned retirement.

To fill the vacancy caused by Miss Ellis's resignation, the Committee had appointed Miss Edith Botteley, who was formerly Assistant Matron at the Abergele Sanatorium, under the Corporation of the City of Manchester.

Colonel Thomson said he also regretted to announce the approaching retirement of another old and valued member of their staff—Miss K. G. Summers—on the completion of 42 years' service as cook. The dietary of sick people, particularly so in the case of tuberculous patients, was a very important part of their treatment, and in her work of serving well-prepared food, Miss Summers, throughout the exceptionally long period of her service, had shown herself extremely skilful, thoughtful, and efficient. The success of her unsparing efforts to please had been shown by the many and frequent expressions of satisfaction made by the patients with regard to the quality, quantity, and variety of the food provided in the Sanatorium. He was pleased to add that, in recognition of her long and faithful service, the Committee had granted Miss Summers a pension, under the special scheme referred to in the Report.

The Report recorded the loss of several of their supporters who had passed away during the year. To the names mentioned, he greatly regretted to add that of Miss H. M. Prescott, who had died a few weeks ago. Miss Prescott was the daughter of the late Rev. O. K. Prescott, who was their Chaplain for over thirty years, and a member of the Committee of Management for thirty-eight years. Both she and her father

had taken a very warm interest in the Sanatorium—an interest which they maintained up to the time of their deaths.

In conclusion, Colonel Thomson expressed the Committee's gratitude for the financial and other assistance which they had received during the past year, and their appreciation of the loyal collaboration of the whole of the staff, which had enabled their work to be continued so successfully.

The motion was seconded by Mr. Barclay Reynolds, and carried unanimously.

It was proposed by Dr. Hutcheson and resolved that Colonel L. J. M. Deas, M.B., F.R.C.S., I.M.S., and Mr. R. A. Barclay Reynolds, the members of the Committee retiring by rotation, be re-elected.

On the motion of Dr. Hutcheson, it was resolved that Mr. Edward Bicker be re-elected Auditor for the ensuing year.

The President, moving a vote of thanks to the Medical, Surgical and Dental Staff, said that they were all grateful for the devoted services which their staff had always given to the great work of the Sanatorium. He thought that perhaps the general public were not always quite aware of the tremendous assistance given by the medical profession at small recompense to hospitals and institutions throughout the country, for those least able to afford what was provided for their benefit.

Sir Henry associated himself with the regret that had been expressed concerning the retirement of Miss Ellis as Matron, after a quarter of a century's excellent service, and welcomed Miss Botteley upon her appointment in succession to Miss Ellis.

Referring to the improved conditions for the nursing staff, the President expressed his satisfaction that it had been possible to make some alleviation at both ends by the adoption of shorter hours of duty and higher salaries.

Commenting upon the financial position of the Sanatorium, Sir Henry said it was extremely gratifying that, in spite of the fact that for the last three years we had been burdened with taxation up to war level, there were so many who felt that it was up to them to give great service by annual subscriptions and also in the form of bequests, in order to show what was, perhaps, the finest system of medical relief and effort of any nation in the world.

He then proposed a most cordial vote of thanks to the Medical, Surgical and Dental Staff, and all associated with the work of the Institution, of which he was proud to be President.

The motion was carried unanimously.

Dr. Watson Smith moved a very hearty vote of thanks to Brig.-General Sir Henry Page Croft for presiding at the Meeting, and for the great interest which he maintained in the Institution, which gave them all encouragement in their work. Sir Henry had been good enough to say that he was proud to be their President. To this he could say that they were all proud to have him as President.

The motion was carried with acclamation.

Sir Henry Page Croft, responding to the vote of thanks, expressed his pleasure to be again amongst comrades working for high ideals.

The Meeting then terminated.

Medical Report for the Year, 1938

DURING the twelve months ended the 31st December, 1938, 251 patients (124 men and 127 women) were admitted to the Sanatorium.

During the same period 252 patients (125 men and 127 women) were discharged.

The Classification of all cases discharged during the the year is divided into—

Class T.B. Minus. Cases in which tubercle bacilli have never been demonstrated in the sputum.

Class T.B. Plus Cases in which tubercle bacilli have at any time been found.

The latter class is further sub-divided into three groups, as follows:—

Group I. Cases with slight constitutional disturbance, if any, e.g., there should not be marked acceleration of pulse or elevation of temperature except of very transient duration. Gastrointestinal disturbance or emaciation, if present, should not be excessive.

The physical signs should be limited to an apical lesion of one upper lobe not extending below the second rib in front, or not exceeding an equivalent area in any one lobe. If these physical signs are present in more than one lobe, they should be limited to the apices of the upper lobes and should not extend below the clavicle and the spine of the scapula.

No Complication (tuberculous or other) of prognostic gravity should be present. A small area of dry pleurisy should not exclude a case from this group.

Group III. Cases with profound systemic disturbance or constitutional deterioration with marked impairment of function either local or general and with little or no prospect of recovery.

All cases with grave complications, whether tuberculous or not, should be classified in this group; e.g., diabetes, tuberculosis of larynx or of the intestine.

Group II. All cases which cannot be placed in Groups I. and III.

The following terms are used to describe the condition of patients on discharge from the Sanatorium:—

Quiescent. Cases which have no symptoms of tuberculosis and no signs of tuberculous disease, except such as are compatible with a completely healed lesion and in which sputum, if present, is free from tubercle bacilli.

Arrested. This term is applied only to cases which have been "quiescent" for a period of at least two years. No case should be discharged as "cured" until arrest of the disease has been maintained for a period of three years after the period of two years "quiescence."

Improved. Cases short of "quiescent" in which the general health is fair and the symptoms of tuberculosis have materially diminished.

No Material Improvement. All other patients.

The following table which shows "RESULTS of TREATMENT" does not include the cases (8 men and 3 women) who were under treatment less than two months.

Consideration of the above table of results of treatment shows that, compared with 1937, there has been a slight fall in the number of Group 2 and 3 cases admitted, these forming almost exactly 50 per cent. of the total of tuberculous patients treated. The figures emphasise in a striking manner the value of treatment being instituted in an early stage of the disease. Thus, of all cases in Class T.B. Minus, 89 per cent. were discharged with the disease quiescent, and in Group 1 patients the figure was 87 per cent. For Groups 2 and 3 the figures were 15 per cent. and nil respectively.

In these days of specialised treatments of pulmonary tuberculosis by both medical and surgical means, it is of the utmost importance not to underestimate the value of the Sanatorium régime which still plays an essential part in the cure of the disease. It consists, in brief, of an ordered routine of open air life, nourishing diet and carefully graduated physical exercise with regular periods of rest.

As a preliminary, a period of complete rest in bed of varying duration is required by most patients.

As the health improves and any fever or symptoms abate, the patient is allowed up for an increasing number of hours, until up all day. Walking exercise over increasing graduated distances is next prescribed, and its effects observed. At the same time occupational therapy suitable to the patient's condition is given, and is varied so that increasing amounts of physical work are performed. In the earlier grades, work consists chiefly of light domestic duties, such as dusting and polishing, while in the final stages gardening, involving fairly heavy manual labour may be undertaken.

It cannot be over emphasised that the object of this routine is the treatment of the disease, and not the performance of the work for its own sake. The value of this work also lies in the mental relaxation it affords, while it also serves as a most useful guide when advising patients regarding suitable employment after their discharge from the institution.

In those cases where specialised treatments are required, full use of these has been made.

Artificial Pneumothorax The value of this technique in the treatment of selected cases has now been fully established, and wider use of it has been made during the past year. In all, 54 cases (24 men and 30 women) have been so treated; that is approximately 22 per cent. of all cases admitted with pulmonary tuberculosis. Of these cases 44 were performed for unilateral disease, while in 7 the treatment was combined with a course of injections of Sanocrysin for early exudative disease in the opposite lung. In three cases bilateral pneumothorax has been performed.

Where a satisfactory clinical collapse of the lung was prevented by adhesions, these were examined, and, where practicable, divided by cauterisation.

In addition to the refills given to our own cases, we have continued this treatment for a large number of out-patients referred to us by their Local Authorities. Many of these cases are making a temporary stay in Bournemouth, but, as many of them remain for long periods in the district, this work has now assumed considerable proportions. Arrangements are made to suit the convenience of individuals, particularly those patients who are working in the neighbourhood, and are only able to attend out of business hours.

Surgical Treatment In those cases where artificial pneumothorax was impracticable or undesirable, other methods have been adopted to rest the diseased part.

Of these, the operations of crushing or evulsing the phrenic nerve have been chiefly employed, and the results from the former, and less drastic method, of crushing, have been so encouraging that this operation is being more widely used than heretofore, although in some cases it has been necessary to convert a crush into an evulsion at a later date in order to ensure permanent rest for the diseased area. In our experience, the advantages of the less drastic operation fully justify its use in many cases, even as a preliminary to possible evulsion.

The operations performed in our own theatre during the past year may be summarised as follows:—

In two cases major surgical measures (thoracoplasty) were necessary, and the patients were transferred to an appropriate centre under our Consulting Thoracic Surgeon, and later re-admitted for completion of their Sanatorium treatment.

Gold Therapy The use of gold salts has been continued for the treatment of certain cases, and during the past year 29 patients have been so treated with satisfactory results. In no case has any severe toxic reaction been observed, but the necessity for individual assessment and grading of the doses for each patient so treated must be emphasised if this result is to be attained.

The Ear, Nose and Throat Department All patients are examined for any signs of disease in the upper part of the respiratory tract or ear. If any lesion is found, frequent examinations are made, and suitable treatment instituted.

The X-Ray Department The pressure on this department has become very heavy, partly owing to the increased surgical work performed, and also the ever-growing number of artificial pneumothorax cases receiving refills, all of whom are carefully controlled by screening at each visit, and frequent radiographs, Bronchograms, using lipiodal, have been found of assistance in diagnosis in certain obscure cases sent in for investigation. All patients are filmed on admission and again shortly before discharge, while serial controls at frequent intervals are now almost a routine procedure.

The Laboratory Routine use is made of the blood sedimentation test, using the standard Westergren method, at frequent intervals during treatment; combined where necessary with other blood investigations. These examinations have been of great value both in prognosis and in assessing the response to treatment.

Lectures Simple lectures have again been given at frequent intervals to teach patients something of the disease from which they are suffering, and assist them to maintain their health after discharge. They are also trained in the simple precautions, which, when observed, reduce to a minimum the risk of infection of others with whom they come in contact in their everyday life. The need for regular Dispensary supervision after discharge is particularly emphasised.

Social Activities During the winter months, the weekly cinematograph show, with the other pastimes provided (billiards, whist drives, wireless, gramophone; and, in the summer, croquet), have all played their part in maintaining a cheerful atmosphere, without which the best results cannot be attained.

In conclusion, it is a matter for satisfaction that a considerable correspondence from former patients shows that many are once more able, after leaving the institution, to resume their places in the community, and continue in employment, while maintaining the improved health obtained from their treatment at the Sanatorium.

INSTRUCTIONS TO CANDIDATES

FOR

ADMISSION TO THE SANATORIUM

The objects of the Institution are to afford a temporary Asylum for In-patients afflicted with Chest Diseases, who (1) being convalescent may yet require further medical treatment and change of air to establish their health ; or who (2) may be labouring under such an incipient form of disease as to afford reasonable hope for their obtaining benefit from a temporary residence in a dry and salubrious climate.

Applicants under the age of 16 are ineligible for admission.

Applicants for admission must forward to the Secretary a medical certificate giving full details of their state of health. A form of certificate may be obtained from the Secretary.

On the Applicant's case being approved of by the Medical Authorities, his or her name will be entered upon the books **for admission in the order in which the application is received**, due notice being given to the Applicant when the time for admission arrives.

Patients' Payments.—The weekly charges are as follows :—

- (a) "Uninsured persons" (with the exception of those recommended by a Public Authority), on the nomination of a Governor, or of a Donor of £5, at 15s. 0d. per week, which shall cover all ordinary expenses, except for laundry.
- (b) Persons recommended by an Insurance Committee, County or Borough Council, or other Public Authority, at 45s. 0d. per week ; or, if provided with a Letter of Recommendation from a Governor or from a Donor of £5, at 37s. 0d. per week.

The time during which Patients are retained in the Sanatorium varies, according to the necessity of the case, at the discretion of the Physician ; but after the lapse of eight weeks, should the Physician consider it desirable that a Patient, who has been admitted with a Letter of Recommendation, should remain longer, a fresh Letter of Recommendation must be procured.

As the condition of the teeth is of great importance in the treatment of Consumption, applicants should have them examined by a Dentist. Carious teeth must be attended to before admission.

Persons suffering from Tuberculosis who are insured under the National Insurance Act, for whose treatment the local Tuberculosis Authority (County or County Borough Council) is responsible, are not admitted on the terms quoted in clause (a) of the above paragraph relating to Patients' Payments.

QUALIFICATIONS AND PRIVILEGES OF GOVERNORS

Every Donor of £31 10s. 0d., or upwards, at one time, or at different periods within three years, becomes a Governor for Life.

Every subscriber of £3 3s. 0d., or upwards, per annum, for not less than three years in succession, becomes a Governor.

A Donation of £5 entitles the Donor to one Letter of Recommendation.

Every person making a bequest of £100, or upwards, to the Sanatorium, may nominate a Life-Governor; and in the event of no such Nomination being made, the Executor first mentioned in the will shall be entitled to the privileges of a Life-Governor.

Any person who shall have collected £50 for the benefit of the Sanatorium shall become a Life-Governor.

Every Governor is entitled to one vote at meetings of Governors, and to one additional vote for every additional Donation of £50 or Annual Subscription of £10, provided that in no case the number of votes to be acquired by any Governor shall exceed five.

Persons becoming Governors by Donation or Subscription are entitled to recommend one Patient annually for every Donation of £31 10s. 0d., or Annual Subscription of £3 3s. 0d. Annual Subscribers of £3 3s. 0d., and upwards, are entitled to recommend patients from the date of their first payment if they undertake to continue such subscription for not less than three years in succession.

Hospital Saturday and Sunday Funds are entitled to one Letter of Recommendation for each £10 given.

Firms, Public Companies, Corporations and Societies making a Donation or Donations amounting to Thirty Guineas within three years shall have the privilege of a Life-Governor for fifteen years.

Any person who shall collect £31 10s. 0d. for the benefit of the Sanatorium, shall have the privilege of recommending one Patient annually during five years.

Ministers of religion are entitled to recommend one patient for each collection in a place of worship of £5 5s. 0d.

Each Letter of Recommendation is available for one year only from date of issue.

Donors of £500 may name a Ward in perpetuity

Donors of £100 may name a Bed in perpetuity

Every information will be afforded by the Secretary at the Institution, who will receive Subscriptions or Donations.

FREE BEDS

The "Aubrey" Bed confers no nomination, but sets free from weekly payments one male patient already in the Institution, and is in the gift of the Vicar of St. Peter's, Bournemouth.

The "Falls" Bed also confers no nomination, but sets free from weekly payments one female patient already in the Institution, and is in the gift of the Vicar of St. Peter's, Bournemouth.

The "Fenwick" Bed sets free from weekly payments two patients, either male or female, already provided with nominations, for twelve weeks in each year for fifty years, from 1899. Not to be canvassed.

The "Mostyn" Bed nominates and sets free from weekly payments one male or female patient for twelve weeks in every year.

The "Pannel" Bed nominates and sets free from weekly payments one male or female patient for twelve weeks in every year, and is in the gift of Charles Hugonin, Esq., Netherwood, Fleet, Hants.

The "Scrimgeour" Bed nominates and sets free from weekly payments one male or female patient for twelve weeks in every year, and is in the gift of Mrs. Scrimgeour, Wispers, Midhurst.

The Trustees of the Delmar Charitable Trust have the right to nominate one male or female patient for the whole time the Institution is open.

The "Agnes Mather" Bed is available for the free treatment of male or female patients for a total period of three months in each year.

Appeal

The Committee for the Management of the ROYAL NATIONAL SANATORIUM FOR CONSUMPTION AND DISEASES OF THE CHEST desire to draw public attention to the claims of this charity for general recognition of its beneficent work for a most deserving class of the community.

The Sanatorium is, as its title implies, a NATIONAL INSTITUTION. Patients of both sexes are received from all parts of the United Kingdom, chiefly from London and our great industrial centres.

The benefits of the Sanatorium, the Committee venture to think, are too well known and appreciated to need much comment, but they would remind the charitable that some 400 poor sufferers are relieved each year, a large proportion of whom receive permanent benefit and are able to return to their occupation and to the support of themselves and those depending upon them.

The Committee would emphasise the fact that the strictest economy is exercised in the management of the Sanatorium, and they venture to state that in this respect it will compare most favourably with any Institution of its kind. They have always, however, insisted that everything should be done to ensure the comfort and proper treatment of the patients, especially with regard to the diet; indeed, the patients often voluntarily express their great satisfaction with the quality, quantity and variety of the food provided.

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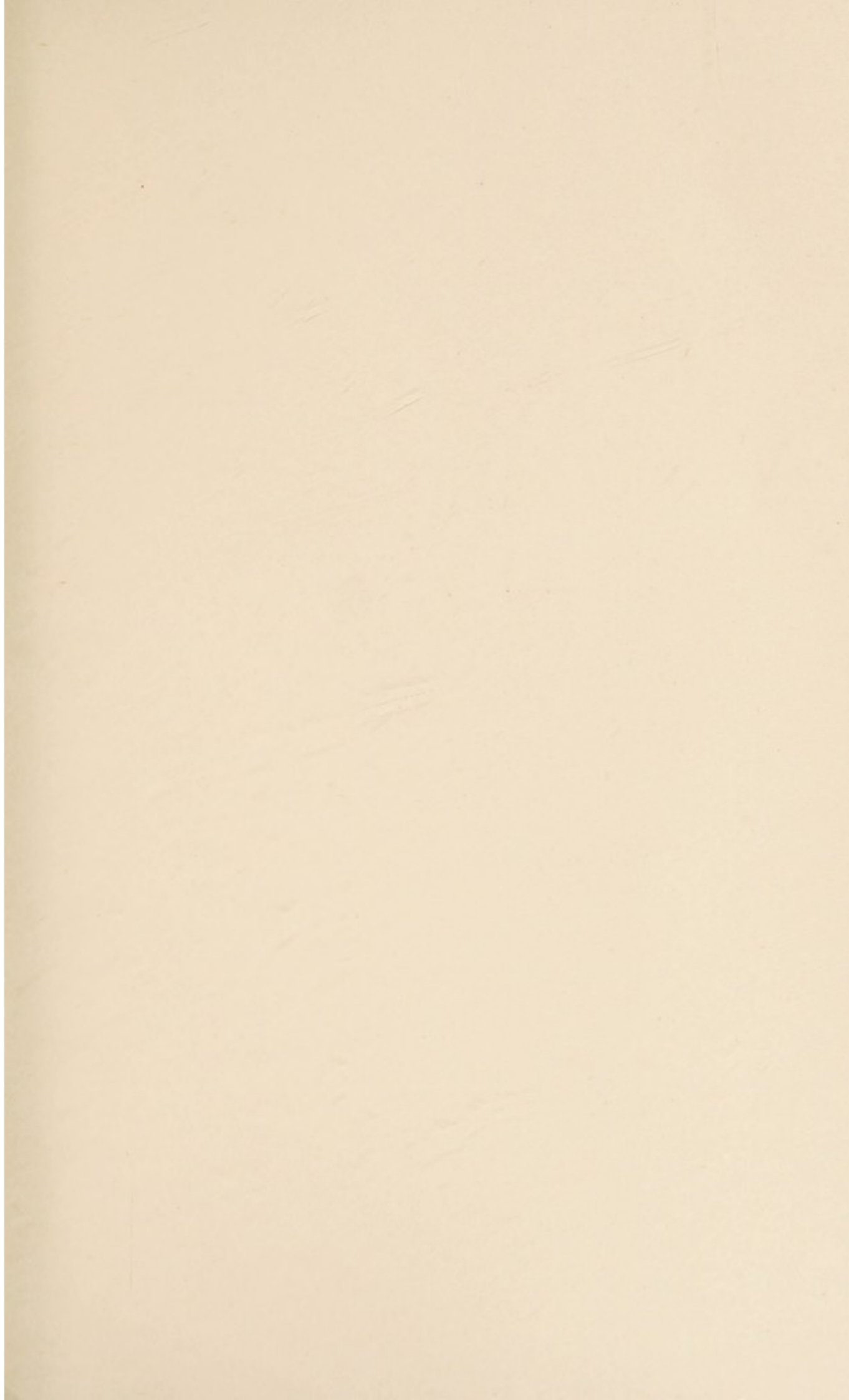
