CHAIRMAN'S FOREWORD

THIS ANNUAL REPORT, besides recording the work of the Hospital during the year 1944, records also the steps taken by the Governors to bring into force a new Constitution of the Hospital. Under this Constitution, the Hospital is now closely associated with the Royal Victoria Infirmery. Its new Committee of Management, whose names appear on page 3, is a Joint Committee, including members appointed by the House Committee of the Infirmery, and it shares with the Infirmery the services of the same administrative officers.

The Hospital, however, preserves its own identity. Its funds constitute a separate Trust and it appeals for support in its own name, both to old and to new subscribers. The urgency of its need for increased income is fully explained in this Report. All subscriptions and donations will be paid into its Trust Account with Lloyds Bank, Grey Street, and may either be sent to the Bank direct or to the House Governor, c/o The Royal Victoria Infirmery, who will transmit them to the Bank.

ANNUAL REPORT, 1944

The Committee of Management present to the Governors of the Hospital the report of the work done during the year ended the 31st December 1944.

Patients Treated.

The number of In-Patients treated during the year was 2,779, an increase of 418 compared with the numbers in 1943. Out-Patients attended in their own homes numbered 274, an increase of 36.

The total attendances at the Pre-Maternity Clinic were 6,718, a decrease of 2. 1,116 patients attended the Post-Natal Clinic, an increase of 117. 2,052 babies were born during the year, an increase of 415 on the figures for 1943.

Finance.

The Total Income for the year amounted to £19,778 : 7 : 6, an increase of £1,369 : 0 : 2 over the total income for 1943. The Total Expenditure for the year was £25,541 : 12 : 1, an increase of £4,189 : 3 : 10, making a deficit on the year of £5,763 : 4 : 7.

The Bank Overdraft at the 31st December was £7,512 : 12 : 7 and outstanding accounts amounted to £2,200 : 4 : 9.

During the year the holding of £2,500 2½% National War Bonds was sold in order to keep the overdraft within reasonable bounds

Against the deficit at the end of 1944 your Committee are glad to report that early in 1945 the Hospital received the following legacies and donations.

A legacy of £5,000 from the late Mr. Thomas Wilson.

A legacy on account of £1,200 from the late Miss Matilda Ufford.

A legacy on account of £50 from the late Miss C. Adamson.

A special donation of £300 from the Workmen of Messrs. Vickers-Armstrongs Ltd.

A gift of £824 : 11 : 2 from the Newcastle upon Tyne Inner Wheel Club.

Your Committee are very grateful for these legacies and gifts as they will give much needed help to the financial position of the Hospital for the current year.

P-president.

On being appointed President of the Hospital, Dr. Ranken Lyle resigned his position as Honorary Secretary. Your Committee are sorry to report that in June Dr. Lyle had a fall and fractured a thigh. Your Committee are glad to know that he is now better and they wish him a speedy and complete recovery.

Agreement with Northern Counties' Orphanage.

The new agreement with the Orphanage for the lease of the Girls' house as well as the Boys' house was concluded early in the year. The commencement of the new agreement was dated back to the 1st August 1943.

The new wards in the Boys' house began to be used in January 1944 and all were in full operation shortly afterwards. Since then considerable improvements have been effected in the accommodation of both houses. The Hospital now has 96 beds.

34 Eslington Terrace.

As this house was no longer required as a Sisters' home it has been sublet during the year.

Appointments to Committee.

Councillor Mrs. H. V. Grantham was appointed a representative of Newcastle Corporation in the place of Alderman J. Pearson. The following were co-opted members of the Committee of Management, Prof. J. C. Spence, Prof. R. V. Bradlaw, Prof. F. J. Nattrass and Mr. G. Waggett.

Medical Appointments.

Dr. M. Taylor has been appointed Pediatric Registrar to the Hospital and Dr. Gerald Isaacs Resident Medical Officer. This Hospital will share Dr. Taylor's services with the Babies' Hospital. Mr. Stanley Way's appointment as Junior Gynæcological and Obstetric Registrar was extended for a further year. Dr. I. E. McCracken was appointed Hon. Physician in Preventive Medicine in the place of Dr. J. A. Charles.

Northumberland County Council.

A new agreement was made with the Northumberland County Council for the maintenance of patients. As from the 1st April, the Council agree to pay the Hospital the sum of 8/- a day for every patient from the County area, such payment to be in lieu of all charges to the patient.

Registration of Hospital.

During the year the Hospital was registered as a Nursing Home in pursuance of Section 187 of the Public Health Act.

Esse Cooker.

Your Committee approved the purchase of an Esse Cooker, at the cost of £347 : 19 : 0 with the necessary utensils in addition. The cooker has been installed since the expiry of the year under review.

Negotiations with R.V.I.

Before the war your Committee had agreed in principle that the Hospital should join in the Combined Hospitals Scheme on the Castle Leazes site. More recently the

Hospitals concerned in the scheme have negotiated Heads of Agreement under which their administration, after the building of the new Hospital Centre, would be largely entrusted to a Joint Hospital Committee.

Your Committee have come to the conclusion that, in present circumstances, it would be desirable to advance the operation of this scheme, so far as this Hospital is concerned and they authorised your Chairman to negotiate with the Royal Victoria Infirmary with this end in view. As the result of these negotiations Heads of Agreement have been drawn up with the Infirmary and have been approved by your Committee and by the Governors of the Hospital at a Special Meeting in November. They have also been approved by the House Committee of the Infirmary. A report of the Special Governors' meeting will be found on another page. Later your Committee approved a proposal that the eventual agreement between the Maternity Hospital and the Royal Victoria Infirmary should, when concluded, be dated back to the 1st January 1945.

As a result, the Royal Victoria Infirmary have been able to render already most valuable administrative assistance to the Hospital.

Water
Supply.

The National Fire Service have examined the water supply at the Hospital and report that it is adequate in case of fire. Fire drill for the staff has been arranged to be held once a month.

Sterilizer.

A new sterilizer costing £116 was purchased during the year to replace one which had been worn out.

Students
and
Nurses.

35 Nurses and 84 Students received training during the year and the following Nurses received prizes under the Heath Bequest, Nurses F. R. Glass, K. Maslen, V. Smith, M. Patterson, E. M. Ackley and A. Ogle.

Civic Visit.

The Lord Mayor was unable to visit the Hospital on Christmas Day, but the Lady Mayoress (Mrs. Thomas Clements) the Sheriff (Alderman E. G. King) and Mrs. King and the Deputy Sheriff (Councillor W. McKeag) and Mrs. McKeag made a tour of the wards and their visit and good wishes were appreciated by all.

Hospital
Birthday.

Owing to shortage of staff and transport difficulties, the Ladies' Committee decided not to hold a reception on the Hospital birthday. People were asked to send gifts and the sum of £77 : 8 : 0 in money and goods to the value of about £5 were received. Grateful thanks are accorded to all those who assisted.

Thanks.

Your Committee warmly thank Mrs. R. S. Wight, Chairman and the Members of the Sewing Guild for the work they have done during the year.

Sincere and grateful thanks are also due to the Honorary Staff and the Nursing, Administrative and Domestic Staffs for the work they have done with depleted numbers and under difficult war-time conditions. The work of the nursing staff this year deserves quite special recognition. The increase in the number of wards and the additional strain and discomfort involved in the extension of the Hospital into a new building have made working conditions particularly hard and exacting. This transitional period is now happily past, and both patients and staff are beginning to feel the benefits of the increased accommodation, but the transitional difficulties could not have been surmounted at all if it had not been for the devotion and perseverance of the whole staff, and the patience and ability shown by the Matron, Miss Tannahill, under conditions sometimes of great discouragement.

The financial needs of the Hospital are still urgent and your Committee again ask for the renewed support of all those who in the past have so generously helped to maintain the Hospital.

ANNUAL COURT OF GOVERNORS

23rd MAY, 1945.

The Annual Court of Governors was held at the Hospital at 3 p.m. on Wednesday, the 23rd May, 1945.

The Rt. Hon. Lord Eustace Percy presided and there were also present, Mrs. Sweet, Miss Oliver, Mr. G. Waggett, Mr. E. P. Shield, Mrs. R. S. Johnson, Miss Tweddle, Alderman Miss M. Taylor, Alderman Mrs. Mason, Prof. E. F. Murray, the Rev. E. Mitchell, Dr. W. Hunter, The Matron, Miss Tannahill, Sister Foster, Sister Cope, Sister D. English, and the House Governor, Mr. R. S. Johnson.

The notice convening the meeting was taken as read.

Regrets for not being present were recorded from Sir Angus Watson, Mrs. Norbert Merz, the Viscountess Ridley, Councillor Mrs. Davidson, Mrs. Oubridge, Dr. R. Craig, the Dowager Viscountess Allendale, and Mrs. Webster, O.B.E.

The Minutes of the Court of Governors held on the 25th May, 1944, were taken as read and signed by the Chairman.

As the Annual Report of the Committee of Management had been circulated to those present, it was agreed that it should be taken as read.

The Report of the Honorary Obstetric Physicians and the audited accounts for 1944 were also taken as read.

LORD EUSTACE PERCY referred sympathetically to the absence of the President, Professor R. P. Ranken Lyle, who, he said, was unable to attend owing to indisposition. Lord Eustace then paid tribute to the Matron and Staff who, he said, had worked excellently during a heavy and difficult year.

Dealing with the Annual Report for 1944 and the Audited Accounts for 1944 which he moved, Lord Eustace Percy drew attention to various legacies and donations. A gift of £824 11s. 2d. had come, he said, from the Newcastle upon Tyne Inner Wheel Club. "For this," said Lord Eustace, "we are extremely grateful, as it has enabled us to equip and furnish a new operating theatre and Labour Ward. Also, there is a special donation of £300 from the workmen of Messrs. Vickers-Armstrongs Ltd., which has enabled us greatly to improve the equipment in other ways, particularly in the interests of the babies. Then there are the three legacies, especially the legacy of £5,000 from the late Mr. Thomas Wilson.

You will see that, in spite of the fact that towards the end of last year, we were obliged to cut down bookings, our total number of indoor patients is the largest on record. We have beaten the number of 1938 by four. I think we shall feel the wind of our cutting down bookings in the first months of 1945. In this connection I would like to say this: This Hospital has got not only to act as a teaching hospital, but has got to serve as a supplier of all deficiencies in maternity beds in the counties of Northumberland and Durham. It is worth while just giving some rather more detailed figures than appear on page 5. The total number of in-patients we received last year from the geographical County of Northumberland, including its minor maternity and child welfare authorities—Ashington, Bedlington, Blyth, Newburn, Gosforth and Wallsend totalled 762. From Newcastle itself we received 499 patients, and from the County of Durham, including its minor maternity and child welfare authorities, and including the Borough of Jarrow for this purpose, we received 1,367 patients. This is the measure of the service we are glad to do and have to do for the neighbouring areas. There is not even in Newcastle provision for dealing sufficiently with all cases. Gateshead, which has greatly increased its maternity provision in recent years, still sent us 139 patients in the year. That burden of supplying the deficiencies of all neighbouring areas does throw a heavy burden on this hospital and makes it quite exceptionally important that this hospital should be able to keep up its service both for Newcastle and still more for the neighbouring areas."

In seconding the adoption of the Report and Accounts, Mr. E. P. Shield referred to "the constant struggle between income and expenditure" and pointed out that the total expenditure for 1944 showed an increase of £4,189. Income during that year had increased by £1,369, but unfortunately expenditure had increased more rapidly. However, the Hospital had been very fortunate. Legacies mentioned in the Report totalled £6,250 and since these were received a further £500 had been forthcoming, making £6,750 in all.

"I wish to express my regrets at the absence of our President. We should have been delighted to see him here" added Mr. Shield, who concluded by paying tribute to Matron and the Medical and Nursing Staff for their services during the year.

The Annual Report and Audited Accounts for 1944 were adopted.

LORD EUSTACE PERCY then said "There is another matter I want to mention to the Governors. This is a sad occasion, because the House Governor is retiring after 16 years' service with the Hospital. We are all very sensible of what we owe to Mr. Johnson, and we are very sorry that the time has come when he feels that he must leave our service. There are other people

in this company who have worked much longer with Mr. Johnson than I have, but during the short time I have been Chairman I have relied very greatly on him for everything, and his retirement will be a very serious loss to the Hospital. We would like to extend to you, Mr. Johnson, our very best thanks and to express our regret that the time has come for you to leave us."

MR. JOHNSON replied: "My Lord, ladies and gentlemen. Last month I received a letter from Lord Eustace telling me to put this question of retirement on the agenda for to-day. Lord Eustace added in his letter, 'I hope you will not mind if we take the opportunity of saying what we think on this occasion.' I have wondered quite a few times since then whether it would mean brickbats or bouquets. I thank Lord Eustace for putting my mind at rest. After sixteen years I am going to miss the Hospital a great deal, and I would like to take this opportunity of thanking everyone for their many kindnesses to me during this time. There have been a lot of changes both on the Committee and the Staff. Of the 1929 Committee I think there are only about six or seven active members now serving, and on the Staff Miss Tweddle is the sole survivor. The chief bugbear has been the lack of £ s. d. I remember, some years ago, Dr. Lyle used to say that a hospital which had an overdraft was doing well, but when the Chairman of the Finance Committee also has the dual role of genial but somewhat stern manager of the bank where the overdraft is kept it is not quite such a good thing as Dr. Lyle made out. When the new Joint Committee gets into its stride I think the prospect of the future of the Hospital is very bright. There are three things which I hope very much will come about. They are that when the new hospital is built on the Castle Leazes site it will not lose its identity as the Princess Mary Maternity Hospital; that it will soon become one of the best known hospitals in the North, and lastly that it will become a famous hospital for the training of midwives and students."

The following Elective Members of the Committee of Management were appointed for the ensuing year:—Lord Eustace Percy, Chairman; Mrs. C. B. Fenwick, Mrs. Norbert Merz, Mrs. Renwick, Lady Ridley, Mrs. Webster, O.B.E., Professor R. Bradlaw, R. Burns Dick, Professor F. J. Nattrass, J. W. Parrish, Professor J. C. Spence, G. P. Taylor, and T. D. Young.

In moving the election of officers Alderman Miss M. Taylor expressed regret that the "re-election" of Mr. Johnson was not also being moved. "I have been very much impressed by his great attention to detail" she said, adding, "Put a question to Mr. Johnson and he has always known the answer." Miss Taylor concluded by asking whether the ladies and gentlemen she was proposing would be elected later on the Joint Committee.

Lord Eustace Percy replied that the Joint Committee could not as yet be finally constituted. There was to be another meeting of the old Committee of Management.

In seconding the election of officers Mr. G. Waggett said that it would have been better if, that afternoon, there had been a bigger attendance of workmen's representatives. He appealed for an increase in workmen's subscriptions to the Hospital. "This Hospital is doing much for the benefit of the workman, through his wife," he declared, adding that he had looked through the balance sheet and had noticed the small subscriptions that were being given by different firms on Tyneside.

"As little as they could do would be for them to increase their subscriptions to this Hospital and help it to get out of its financial difficulties," he said.

LORD EUSTACE PERCY then moved the following : (1) "That, in view of the assistance already rendered to the Princess Mary Maternity Hospital by the Royal Victoria Infirmary, the Joint Committee provided for in the Heads of Agreement be now constituted as the Management Committee of the Hospital, and (2) That the following be the nine Foundation Members of that Committee : Mrs. C. B. Fenwick, Mrs. Norbert Merz, Mrs. Renwick, Mrs. Webster, O.B.E., Mr. J. W. Parrish, Mr. G. P. Taylor, Mr. T. B. Newton, Mr. G. Waggett, and Mr. E. P. Shield.

Mr. E. P. Shield formally seconded the resolution, which was carried.

Lord Eustace Percy then called for any other business and wondered whether the meeting would like to hear a report on the medical side of the Hospital.

Professor Murray said that he had not come prepared to make a statement but could bear out what had already been said. He had always felt that, medically, the Princess Mary Maternity Hospital had passed through a most extraordinary phase. At the beginning of the war the Hospital was idle for a month. Beds were wanted, and there were no beds to give. The health authorities were tackled, and the Hospital was allowed to re-open about thirty beds.

"That thirty was a farce," Professor Murray continued. "Now we are actually working at the pre-war level and have been doing so in a building which was built up piecemeal. I remember that frightful lull when there was a shortage of nursing staff. They were all being taken into war service. That was a problem. We had to cut down admission. This lasted fortunately only a few months. Now Matron has practically a full staff and our numbers and results now compare most favourably with our late pre-war years. I think that the people who have borne most of

the brunt are Matron and the nursing staff. But thanks are also due to the medical officers and residents and to the Committee of Management who, with really every possible depressing factor against them, especially finance, have piloted this Hospital through a very difficult phase.

On the motion of Professor Murray a vote of thanks to Lord Eustace Percy for presiding at the meeting was carried unanimously.

REPORT OF SPECIAL COURT OF GOVERNORS

15th NOVEMBER, 1944.

A Special Court of Governors was held at the Hospital at 3-30 p.m. on Wednesday, the 15th November, 1944.

The Rt. Hon. Lord Eustace Percy presided and there were also present Councillor G. P. Kell, Mrs. C. B. Fenwick, Mrs. Webster, O.B.E., Alderman Miss M. Taylor, Mr. G. Waggett, Prof. Farquhar Murray, Alderman Mrs. Mason, Doctor and Mrs. McKeon, Lady Eustace Percy, Mr. E. P. Shield, Mr. T. D. Young, Mrs. Ranken Lyle, Miss Spalding, Mr. Harvey Evers, The Matron, Miss Tannahill, Sister Foster, Sister Cope and the House Governor, Mr. R. S. Johnson.

Regrets for absence were recorded from Prof. Bradlaw, Sir Angus Watson, Dr. Ranken Lyle, Mrs. A. E. Morgan, Dr. T. Craig, Lady Ridley and Councillor W. Smith.

On the proposal of Lord Eustace Percy the resolution convening the meeting was taken as read.

LORD EUSTACE PERCY moved the following resolution :—
“That an agreement be concluded with the Royal Victoria Infirmary for joint action and administration on the lines contemplated for the constitution of the eventual Hospital Centre and that the following Heads of Agreement be approved in principle for this purpose :—

(1) The administration to be under the direct management of a Committee entitled the Princess Mary Maternity Hospital Committee which shall operate as a Standing Committee of the R.V.I. House Committee.

(2) The Committee to be constituted as follows :

(6) The agreement to include a clause defining the policy of the R.V.I. and the Princess Mary Maternity Hospital Committee in regard to the future finance of the Maternity Teaching Hospital.

The resolution was seconded by Mr. E. P. Shield. Alderman Miss Margery Taylor moved as an amendment the addition of the words: "the agreement to include a clause defining the policy of the Royal Victoria Infirmary and the Princess Mary Maternity Hospital Committee in regard to the future finance of the Maternity Teaching Hospital."

Lord Eustace Percy accepted the amendment.

The resolution as amended was adopted.

On the motion of Mr. George Waggett a vote of thanks was accorded to Lord Eustace Percy for presiding.

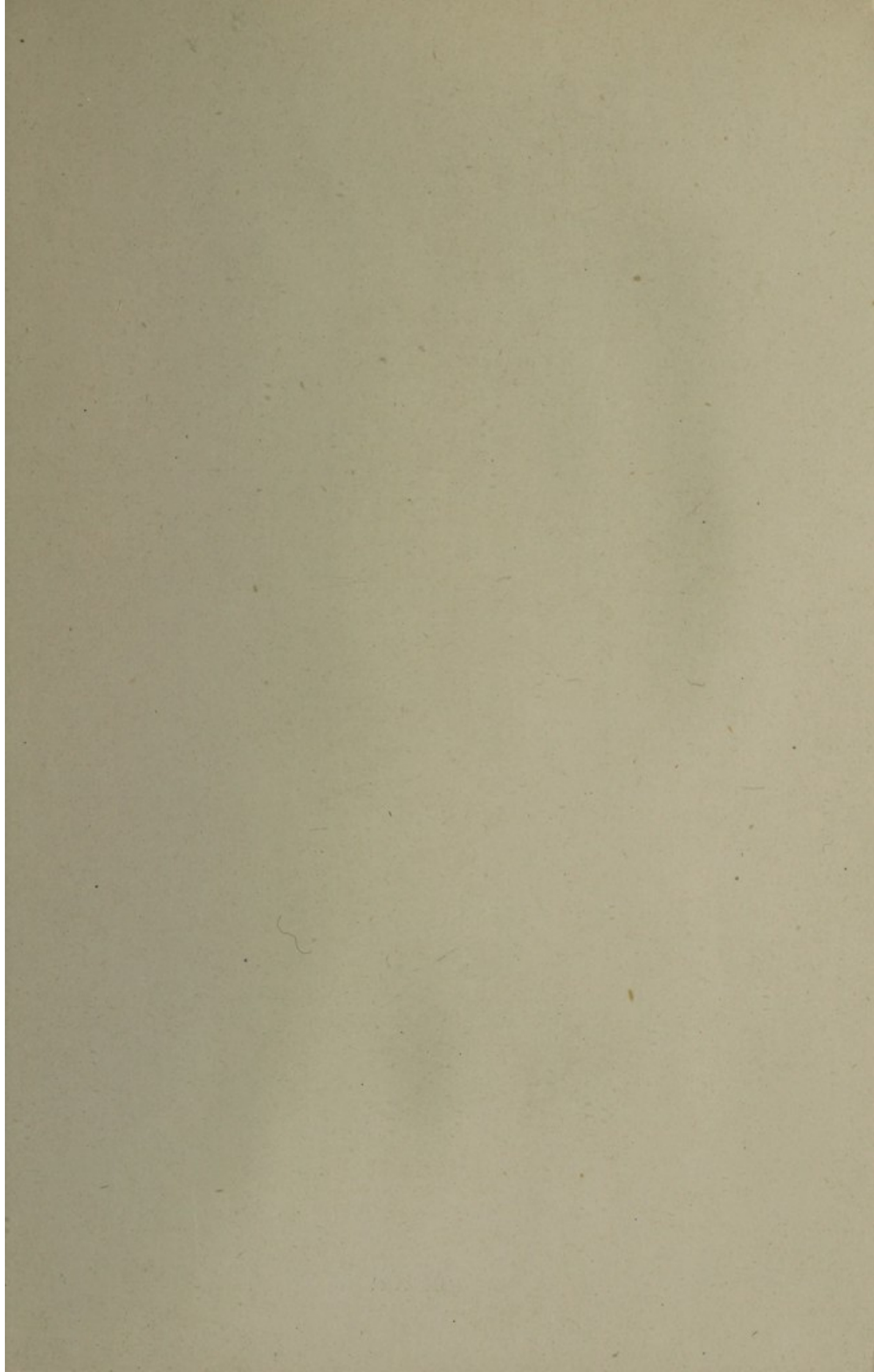
