

REPORT.

The Committee present their 35th Annual Report for the year

ended 31st December, 1927.

The Hospital was working to the full extent of its capacity, viz., 5 Wards with 36 beds and 3 Private Wards up to the 31st August, when the Children's Ward was closed owing to building operations, arrangements having been made to treat urgent cases in the General Wards until the new Children's Ward shall be completed.

The Out-Patients' Department consists of the following Clinics: Medical, Surgical, Ear, Nose and Throat, Eye, and

Dental.

The Committee have pleasure in announcing that Dr. Kenneth Scott, M.D., M.R.C.P., has accepted appointment as one of the Hon. Physicians to the Hospital.

Mr. W. Baly Jepson, M.R.C.S., L.R.C.P., and Miss Joan Cave, M.R.C.S., L.R.C.P., have been temporarily appointed

additional Anæsthetists on the Hon. Medical Staff.

With deep regret, the death is recorded of Mr. T. Elliott, who was a member of the Hospital Saturday Organization for over 30 years, and served for some time past as one of its Representatives on this Committee.

The free beds for Ex-Service Men and their Dependents were used by 16 Patients during the year, who occupied the beds for 348 days.

British Red Cross (20th and 21st Surrey V.A.D.).

V.A.D. SURREY 21 MOTOR AMBULANCE. Commandant: Major H. H. Powell, O.B.E.

During the year the ambulance travelled 5,339 miles and carried 503 cases. The hours of attendance of members at football matches, sports, and other public gatherings for the purpose of rendering First Aid aggregated 4,900.

V.A.D. SURREY 20.

Commandant: Mrs. Cecil Carington.

The members assist daily in the performance of clerical and orderly duties at the Curative Post.

CURATIVE POST.

Officer-in-Charge: Mr. T. D. Moorhead.

Two fully trained Masseuses carry out treatments under the orders of Dr. Roberts—including Massage, Electrical Radiant Heat, Swedish Remedial Exercises, and Violet Ray Light Treatment.

During the year: Cases treated 225, Attendances 3,361, Treatments 4,010.

ORTHOPÆDIC CLINIC.

Mr. W. B. Foley, F.R.C.S., attends every other Thursday for the examination and treatment of patients. During Mrs. Russell's absence abroad, Miss Carslake has kindly consented to act as Honorary Almoner, and is in charge of the Clinic. Doctors may send patients to Mr. Foley for examination free of charge, but subsequent treatment is charged for on terms to be ascertained from the Honorary Almoner.

During the past year Mr. Foley has attended 26 Clinics, at which there has been an average attendance of 32. Since the Clinic has been opened there have been 739 patients, 354 of whom

have been dealt with in 1927.

Retirement of President.

The Committee deeply regret having to announce the decision of Mr. R. N. Stevens not to offer himself for re-election as President. He took a most prominent part in the starting of

tion, and has ever been its principal benefactor.

Mr. Stevens is about to give up his residence at Woodham Hall, and the members of the Committee feel sure that all the Governors will join them in wishing him many happy years of retirement in his new abode in the Isle of Wight.

Sir Laurence E. Halsey, who is well known in the district, on being approached, has signified his willingness to accept the Presidency if so appointed by the Governors, and the Committee feel that it will be greatly to the advantage of the Hospital to secure his services.

The Committee suggest a slight alteration in the Rules of the Hospital so as to enable the election of more than one Vice-President, and will propose the election of Mr. R. N. Stevens as the first additional Vice-President under the new rule.

New Hon. Governor.

After being a member for 26 years consecutively, Mr. C. E. Watkins has retired from the Committee. In recognition of his many and great services, the Committee are recommending his appointment as an Hon. Governor of the Hospital.

Naming Wards, Beds, etc.

Three Wards have been named, viz., the R. N. Stevens' Ward, the J. H. Jacobs' Ward and the War Memorial Ward, leaving one still unnamed.

Fourteen Beds have been named, viz., nine in the General Wards and five in the Children's Ward.

Under Rule XI. the Committee may from time to time agree with any person to assign on such terms as the Committee may think fit a name to any bed in the Hospital for a term of years provided that not less than £52 10s. shall be paid for any term not exceeding ten years, and not less than £105 for any longer term not exceeding twenty years.

During the past year Mrs. Chandler kindly gave £52 10s. to name a bed in memory of her late husband, Mr. George Chandler.

Affiliation Scheme.

The Hospital has now been approved by the General Nursing Council as a training school for Nurses, in affiliation with the East Surrey Hospital, Redhill.

Under the scheme Probationers will spend the first 18 months of their four years' training at the Woking Hospital, then two years at Redhill and the last six months at Woking. They should then pass their final State Examination to enable their names to be placed on the General Nursing Section of the State Register for Nurses. A Sister Tutor has been engaged for their instruction, a special lecture room with appropriate paraphernalia is being provided, and members of the Medical Staff will give lectures.

New Wards.

Early in the year Mr. W. S. Patterson, of Ridge End, Hook Heath, offered £3,000 for the erection of a permanent Children's Ward with a sun balcony, connected up with the main Hospital building, to take the place of the isolated Army Hut, kindly lent by the Red Cross Society, which has been hitherto used temporarily for the purpose.

This generous offer was gratefully accepted, and the Architects, Messrs. Pite, Son and Fairweather, were instructed to pre-

pare plans.

It was recognized that it would be necessary, or, at any rate, most desirable to have the new Children's Ward on the first floor level, superimposed upon a ground floor Casualty Ward, in accordance with the original designs for the enlarged Hospital. This necessitated the erection of at least the structure of the Casualty Ward on the ground floor, which is already badly wanted, and will soon be a necessity, if the Hospital is to cope with the ever-increasing number of Casualty Patients which come to the Hospital for treatment.

The estimates for the ground floor Ward worked out at about $\pounds_{2,000}$ for the framework alone, or $\pounds_{3,300}$ if completed forthwith (exclusive of equipment).

Another generous anonymous donation of £300 provided the cost of extending the first floor corridor and of erecting a Lecture Room for Nurses, which is rendered necessary by the new Nurses' Training Scheme.

Col. Mathews, the Chairman of the Urban District Council, with unhesitating willingness, undertook the organization of a Public Appeal for funds to erect the Casualty Ward, and his efforts, assisted by an influential Committee and by Mrs. T. A. Crofts, their indefatigable Hon. Secretary, soon justified the

Hospital Committee in putting the whole building scheme in hand. It is progressing satisfactorily, and is due for completion in the summer.

The assistance rendered by the promoters—Messrs. S. W. Colman, F. W. Cook, H. B. Evershed and S. H. Parker—of the very interesting and successful Trades' Exhibition, held last Autumn, demands special mention. They arranged to devote the whole of the admission money to the Appeal Fund, and, as the result of this and of other internal efforts, they were eventually able to hand over no less than £322 11s. 10d. towards the building scheme.

Hon. Treasurer's Report.

The Hon. Treasurer's Accounts and Financial Statistics for

the past year are submitted herewith.

The figures of the Receipt and Expenditure or Maintenance Account, when compared with those of 1926, show some fluctuations, but the general trend has been upwards to a nearly similar extent on either side, and the final deficit is somewhat larger.

The bed capacity of the Hospital during the year was somewhat less than in 1926 in consequence of the closing of the Children's Ward last August for rebuilding, but the number of patients actually admitted and treated to a conclusion during 1927 was substantially larger than in 1926.

The average cost of each patient was 6s. per head per week larger than in 1926. The average amount received from each general ward patient was less by 9s. per head, but the average weekly contribution of each Patient remained practically the

same, viz., 14s. 4d. per patient per week.

Special attention is called to the recurring and increasing annual deficit on the Maintenance Account. In 1926 it was £416 and in 1927 £458. It has been necessary, at any rate for the time being, to provide £588 11s. 1d., viz., a large portion of the former and the whole of the latter deficit, out of the capital funds of the hospital.

It is essential that the residents in Woking and the District should realise that the present income of the hospital is sadly deficient and that it must be substantially increased if the needs of the neighbourhood are to be met. The extra Casualty Ward now in course of erection is badly wanted, but a further increase in the income will be imperative if it is to be opened and used.

If only the Governors and their friends would visit the Hospital and see it at work and induce their friends to do likewise, the present difficulties might soon be solved by the increased interest resultingly stimulated.

Mr. N. Lawrie and Mr. P. Ritchie organised a very interesting Cinema Entertainment, which materially added to the success of the fund.

An increased contribution of £95 was received from the

League of Mercy.

The Woking Football Club, when organising a summer Carnival, generously presented to the Hospital the whole of the street collection, which amounted to £94 9s. 1d.

The Woking Post Office staff continued its weekly contribution scheme, which resulted in no less than £38 14s. being

contributed towards the maintenance of the Hospital.

The Annual Pound Day, held in November, produced the following results: £31 3s. 7d. (less expenses £1 13s. 6d.) in money and 2,500 lbs. of groceries, etc., together with vegetables, fruit and other hospital necessaries, including some linen. Schools (Elementary, Church and Private) contributed largely to the collection.

Many and varied gifts were presented to the Hospital, which have been regularly acknowledged in the Public Press. Messrs. R. Pain and Sons and Mr. H. Quartermaine continued their voluntary services, the former in connection with the heating and water apparatus of the Hospital, and the latter in connection with the lift machinery. The local branch of Toc H has undertaken the daily collection and delivery of pathological specimens. Mr. Muller Rowland has continued his daily gift of one gallon of graded milk from his Dairy Farm, and Mr. Alfred Brown has made his third special donation of £50 towards the maintenance expenses.

Contributory Scheme.

During the latter part of 1927 a Public Meeting was called, at which an independent Committee, consisting of five representatives from the Hospital Committee and 15 other members, was constituted to frame and launch a Hospital Contributory Scheme

The Contributory Patients are to be subject to the rules of the Hospital, and are not to be entitled to any priority over noncontributory patients either as regards admission or otherwise.

The arrangement is experimental for one year, but it is hoped that it may be a success and eventually be a great benefit to

the maintenance fund of the Hospital.

An Organising Secretary, Mr. R. Gough, of 165, Walton Road, Woking, has been appointed by the Scheme Committee, and all particulars and details may be obtained from him.

Collection of Tinfoil.

In response to an appeal towards the end of the year by the Hon. Secretary, a large amount of tinfoil has been collected by school children and others in the district, and sold for the benefit of the funds. From this source £5 os. 5d. has been already received up to the end of the year.

The Committee gratefully acknowledges this additional help and interest, especially to the scholars of the Elementary Schools,

who have enthusiastically assisted in the collection

Contributions, large or small, of tinfoil, silver paper, metal tubes and suchlike materials will be much appreciated. They should be sent to the Assistant Secretary at the Hospital.

Ladies' Linen Guild.

The Linen Guild in 1927 received 268 more Articles of Linen than in 1926 and £25 more money. After the purchase of Quilts, Blankets, Curtains and Floor Cloths, the Guild had a cash balance of £85.



On Christmas Day an early celebration of the Holy Communion was held in the Hospital for Patients and Staff, at which the Rev. G. H. Isaacson officiated.

The dinner on Christmas Day was greatly enjoyed by the Patients, and the usual tea for Patients and their friends took place on Boxing Day. The tea, given by kind donors, was followed by a visit from "Father Christmas," who distributed presents from numerous kind friends.

On the following day the Patients were given an enjoyable entertainment by the Nursing Staff.

Conclusion.

Finally, the Committee desire, on behalf of the Governors, to thank the members of the Honorary Staff for their services, without which the Hospital could not be carried on; the Nursing Staff for their devotion to duty, and the members of the Ladies' Committees for all their work, and also to acknowledge with great gratitude the continued support and assistance received in so many directions from a large band of generous supporters, far too numerous for individual mention.



Extracts from Rules and General Regulations.

- I.-Except in cases of urgency, every patient admitted shall be provided with decent clothing and proper change of linen.
- II. No person shall be eligible for admission to the Hospital who is afflicted with any disease which is considered infectious, with epilepsy or insanity, or with any disorder not likely to be soon cured or mitigated by treatment. Lying-in cases cannot be treated in the Hospital.
- III.—The Committee shall have power to admit private patients to the Hospital on such terms as they may think desirable.
- IV.—Friends of patients may be admitted to the Hospital to see them, unless considered inadvisable by the doctor in attendance, on Wednesdays between 5 30 and 7 p.m., and on Sundays, between the hours of 2 and 4 in the afternoon, or by special permission at other times. No more than two visitors can be admitted to see any one patient at the same time. All patients shall be discharged at the end of one month after admission, unless a member of the medical staff certifies that there is a probability of cure or considerable relief. No patient shall remain for more than two months without the spec al leave of the Committee.
 - V.—Subject to the regulations of the Hospital, patients may be visited by any Clergyman or Minister of Religion whom they may desire to see.
- VI.—On no account will friends of patients be allowed to give them articles of food or drink. Any contribution of this kind left at the Hospital must be handed to the Matron for the patients—if considered suitable.
- VII.-Patients will be required to obey all orders of the Medical Officer or of the Matron.
- VIII.—Patients refusing to comply with the Rules and Regulations of the Hospital, or behaving themselves in a disorderly manner, shall be liable to expulsion.
