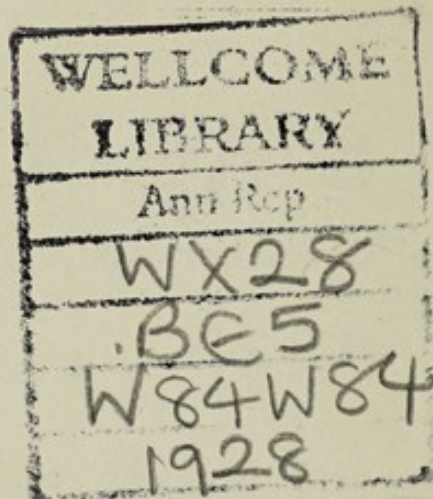

The Committee will present their Report, and the Hon. Treasurer will produce his Accounts, made up to the 31st December, 1928, duly audited. The other business to be transacted is as follows:—

(1) *Amendment of Rule 4, paragraph 2 to read as follows:—*

“The Committee shall consist of, etc., and two Representatives of the Woking Contributory Scheme Committee (all of whom shall be ex-officio members), and fifteen ordinary members elected by the Governing Body.”

(2) *Election of President. Sir Laurence Halsey retires but is eligible for re-election.*

(3) *Election of Vice-Presidents. Mr. R. N. Stevens and Mr. John Proffitt retire, but are eligible for re-election.*

(4) *Election of Hon. Treasurer. Mr. Archer Thomson retires, but is eligible for re-election.*

(5) *Election of Hon. Auditor. Mr. F. M. Lintott retires, but is eligible for re-election.*

(9) *Election to fill five vacancies on the Committee:—Rev. Clifford Banham, Mr. Raymond Johnson, Dr. Lawrie, Lt.-Col. Phayre, and Mr. W. G. Whitbourn retire under the rules, and are eligible for re-election. The following nomination has also been received:—Mr. N. Gordon Unwin.*

(7) *Appointment of Mr. R. Grainger Bullock as an Hon. Governor of the Hospital.*

(11) *Other matters (if any) relating to the Hospital or its administration submitted by the Committee for consideration.*

Resolve that the action of the Committee in permitting certain legacies and other items within the scope of Rule 11 to be applied in defraying equipment and General Fund liabilities be approved.

REPORT.

The Committee present their 36th Annual Report for the year ended 31st December, 1928. The Hospital was without a Children's Ward during the first eight months of the year, but the new Children's Ward was opened for patients early in September, and the new ground floor Adults' Ward on the 1st January, 1929. The Hospital therefore now maintains six public and three private wards, providing 49 beds at their full capacity.

The Out-Patient Department consists of the following clinics: Medical, Surgical, Ear, Nose and Throat, Eye and Dental. The Committee have pleasure in announcing that Dr. A. E. Gow, F.R.C.P., of St. Bartholomew's Hospital, has accepted the invitation to become one of the Honorary Consulting Physicians to the Hospital, and that Mr. Perkins, F.R.C.S., of St. Thomas' Hospital, has accepted the appointment of Honorary Consulting Orthopædic Surgeon to the Hospital.

The Committee regret that Dr. Berthold Thorne Thorne has found it necessary to resign his position as one of the Honorary Anæsthetists on the Hospital Staff, and they wish to place on record their high appreciation of his many past services. Miss M. Mills, M.B., B.S., has been appointed temporarily an Honorary Anæsthetist in the place of Dr. Thorne Thorne.

RESIDENT MEDICAL OFFICER.

The increasing work in the Hospital has necessitated the appointment of a Resident Medical Officer. Dr. Helena M. Gambrell, M.B., B.S., has been chosen to fill the post, and she took up her duties on the 1st January, 1929.

United Service Fund.

The free beds for Ex-Service Men and their Dependants were used by 6 Patients during the year, who occupied the beds for 130 days.

British Red Cross Society, Woking Division.

V.A.D. SURREY 20.

Commandant: Mrs. Cecil Carington.

The members assist daily in carrying out the clerical and orderly duties of the Curative Post, besides helping in First Aid work at sports and other meetings.

CURATIVE POST, BOUNDARY ROAD.

Officer-in-Charge: Mr. T. D. Moorhead.

Mr. Moorhead has left Woking and handed over the charge of the Post to Lt.-Col. Phayre as a temporary measure until a successor can be found.

Three fully-trained Masseuses carry out treatments under the orders of Dr. Roberts, including Massage, Electrical, Radiant Heat, Violet Ray Light, and Swedish Remedial Exercises.

During the year there have been 269 cases, 3,738 attendances, and 4,257 treatments.

The lack of sufficient accommodation hinders the work.

ORTHOPÆDIC CLINIC.

Officer-in-Charge: Mrs. Russell (January-October) ;

Miss Carslake (November-December).

Surgeon: Mr. Foley (January-February) ;

Mr. Walton from March.

The Clinic has suffered a great loss in the resignation of Mrs. Russell owing to the serious illness and subsequent death of her husband. Mrs. Russell started this clinic in 1922, and through her self-denying efforts 867 patients have attended the Clinic, many of whom have received such advice from the surgeon and treatment in the Curative Post, Hospitals, etc., that much suffering has been alleviated, and many cures have been effected. Miss Carslake, who has had considerable experience as an Almoner, has been appointed Officer-in-charge in succession to Mrs. Russell, and we feel confident she will carry on the work in the same spirit of devotion as has been shown in the past.

During the past year Mr. Foley attended 8 Clinics, and Mr. Walton 18, at which there have been 754 attendances. The Clinics are held on alternate Tuesdays (2.30 to 6 o'clock). Doctors may send patients to Mr. Walton for examination free of charge, but subsequent treatment is charged for on terms to be ascertained from Miss Carslake.

Motor Ambulance.

V.A.D. SURREY 21.

The Motor Ambulance is under the command of Major H. H. Powell, O.B.E. During the past year, under Section Leader Pitcher, the Ambulance has travelled 4,912 miles, in response to 634 calls, carrying 658 patients. Members are always detailed to attend Football Matches, Sports and other Public Entertainments, to render First Aid if necessary.

New Honorary Governor.

The Committee recommend that Mr. R. Grainger Bullock, the Chairman of the Woking Carnival Committee, be appointed an Honorary Governor of the Hospital in recognition of the extremely valuable financial assistance given to the Hospital by that Organisation.

New Wards.

The new wards referred to in the 1927 Report have been completed, and the Children's Ward on the first floor, the gift of Mr. W. S. Patterson, of Ridge End, Hook Heath, was opened for the reception of patients early in September. The accommodation consists of six beds and six cots, with an Observation Ward containing one bed. There is also a Ward Kitchen and all other necessary offices. Attached to the Ward is a delightful Balcony, where the young patients secure all the benefits of sunshine and fresh air. Many little ones have enjoyed the amenities it offers since the ward was opened.

The equipment of the ward was also given by Mr. Patterson, and this has been tastefully carried out in blue and white. The Committee wish to place on record their most grateful thanks and deep appreciation of Mr. Patterson's munificence. He has named the new Children's Ward the "Alice Mary Ward."

The ground floor ward of the new Block, which was opened as a Men's Medical Ward on 1st January, 1929, contains eight beds with one additional bed in an attached Observation Ward. It also has an outside verandah and all the usual offices. The Ward has been equipped with taste and efficiency to suit modern requirements, and it forms a valuable addition to the Hospital.

The thanks of the Committee are due to all those who have in any way contributed to or helped in the completion of this new ward. Especially must mention be made of Colonel Mathews, the chairman, and Mrs. Crofts, the indefatigable Honorary Secretary of the Appeal Fund Committee.

Naming of Wards, Beds, etc

Four Wards have been named, viz.: The "R. N. Stevens," the "J. H. Jacobs," the "War Memorial," and the "Alice Mary," leaving two Wards still unnamed.

Twelve beds have been named, viz., nine in the General Wards and three in the Children's Ward.

Under Rule 11, the Committee may from time to time agree with any person to assign on such terms as the Committee may think fit the name of any bed in the Hospital for a term of years provided that not less than £52 10s. shall be paid, for any term

not exceeding ten years, and not less than £105 for any longer term not exceeding 20 years.

During the past year Mr. N. Gordon Unwin kindly gave £52 10s. to name a bed in memory of his mother, "Maria Unwin."

Anyone desiring to defray the cost of maintaining the Hospital or a Ward in the Hospital for a particular day may do so, and a notice to that effect will be placed in the Hospital on the day. The daily expenses may be estimated at £18 or £3 per Ward.

Affiliation Scheme.

As stated in the last report, this Hospital has been approved by the General Nursing Council as a training school for nurses in affiliation with the East Surrey Hospital, Redhill. A Lecture Room, with appropriate equipment, forms part of the new block, and it is now in daily use. Throughout the past year probationers have been preparing for the preliminary examination under the tuition of Members of the Honorary Medical Staff and the Sister Tutor. The first batch of candidates will sit for this examination in February, 1929, and those that pass will be transferred to the East Surrey Hospital, where they will continue their training.

Hon. Treasurer's Report.

The Hon. Treasurer's Accounts and Financial Statistics are appended as usual.

The accounts this year are presented in a somewhat different form, because all Voluntary Hospitals have been requested to adopt the King's Fund Unified System as revised in 1926 in order to facilitate the preparation of statistics.

Under the new arrangement all extraordinary income is brought into the annual account of receipts and expenditure, and carried in the balance to the balance sheet, without passing through a capital and reserve account. The balance sheet itself shows plainly the resulting financial position of the Hospital as regards Assets, Liabilities, Endowments and all Special and General Funds, and therefore has many advantages.

The statistics show that although the bed capacity of the Hospital was substantially less than in 1927 or 1926, through the Children's Ward being closed during the greater part of the year, the number of beds used daily and the number of patients

admitted and treated were substantially greater. This was only rendered possible by the constant use of emergency beds as a temporary expedient.

The demands upon the Hospital's accommodation necessitated the opening of the new Ward and the appointment of the R.M.O. as from the beginning of 1929. The resulting extra expense will be considerable. No doubt it will be partly met by the contributors under their scheme, but the Finance Committee reckon that the voluntary income of the Hospital must be increased by at least £750, if a deficiency in the accounts at the end of the year is to be avoided.

Readers are earnestly requested to bear these figures in mind and to make a point of informing their friends of the really pressing needs of this, the chief charitable Institution of the neighbourhood.

Special Receipts.

The Committee acknowledge with gratitude numerous contributions from many sources received during the past year in aid of the Hospital:—

The substantial sum of £238 1s. 2d. was contributed by the Hospital Saturday Fund.

Alexandra Rose Day Collection resulted in a contribution of £46 10s.

A sum of £70 was received from the League of Mercy, for which the committee are very grateful.

The Woking Carnival Committee organised a Carnival, which was held in June of last year, and most generously presented the whole of the net proceeds, which amounted to £1,285 19s. 2d., to the Hospital.

The Woking Post Office Staff continued their weekly collections on behalf of the Hospital, with a very satisfactory result.

The Annual Pound Day held in November brought in £32 12s. 6d. in money and 2,100 lbs. of most acceptable groceries, together with vegetables, fruit and other hospital necessities. Schools (Elementary, Church and Private) contributed largely to this collection.

Several substantial contributions received during the year are duly recorded in the accounts, and are acknowledged with the best thanks of the committee.

Many and varied gifts were presented to the Hospital, which have been regularly acknowledged in the public Press.

Messrs. R. Pain and Sons and Mr. H. Quartermaine have continued to give their voluntary services, the former in connection with the heating and hot-water supply, and the latter in connection with the lift machinery.

To the members of the local Toc H special thanks are due for undertaking throughout the year the regular collection and delivery of specimens from the Hospital to the Pathologist.

Contributory Scheme.

The Contributory Scheme, inaugurated at the close of 1927, has been an unqualified success. It has been of substantial benefit not only to the contributors but also to the Hospital, and the very special thanks of the Committee are due to those who organised and helped it forward.

The Committee of the Contributory Scheme supplemented the payment due under the arrangement set out in last year's Report by a complimentary grant of One Hundred Guineas, with the result that a total sum of £1,519 15s. 9d. has been received by the Hospital from the Contributory Scheme on account of the past year.

Contributory Patients received the following treatment during the year:—

278 In-Patients.

582 Out-Patients (including 230 Casualty and 60 Tonsil and Adenoid cases).

205 X-Ray cases.

The average length of stay of each Contributory In-Patient was $17\frac{1}{2}$ days.

The Organising Secretary, Mr. R. Gough, of 12, Clarence Avenue, Woking, will be pleased to give particulars of the Scheme to all who are eligible to join.

Collection of Tin Foil.

The Collection of Tin Foil has been continued throughout the year, and a large amount has been given, for which the sum of £31 19s. 10d. has been realised. The Committee gratefully acknowledge this additional help, and special thanks are due to the scholars of the Elementary Schools who have enthusiastically assisted in the Collection.

Contributions, large or small, of tin foil, silver paper, metal tubes and all such material, will be welcomed. They may be sent to the Assistant Secretary, or put in the Box very kindly

presented by "Gugnunc" Tony Bridge for that purpose, which will be found outside the north entrance gate of the Hospital.

The Ladies' Linen Guild.

The Linen Guild in 1928 collected 1,086 articles of Linen and £113 in money on behalf of the Hospital.

The Children's Ward was equipped throughout by the Guild with Hair Mattresses, Pillows, Linen, Blankets and Screen Covers; and Linen and Blankets were provided for all the beds of the new ward opened in January. During the three years of its existence the Linen Guild has collected 2,462 articles of Linen and £250 in money. The Guild had a balance of £31 in hand at the end of the year.

There are three new Vice-Presidents: Mrs. Cockerill for the Pyrford District, Mrs. Hawkins for the Byfleet District, and Mrs. Reynolds for the Park Road District.

The Committee renew their thanks to Mrs. Pim, the Hon. Secretary, and to all those who have contributed to the work of the Guild during the past year.

Christmas at the Hospital.

On Christmas Day an Early Celebration of Holy Communion was held in the Hospital for Patients and Staff, at which the Rev. G. H. Isaacson officiated.

Thanks to the untiring endeavours of the Nursing Staff, assisted by many kind friends, the patients enjoyed a happy Christmas, as many as were able partaking of an excellent dinner, while the occupants of the Children's Ward were entertained by a Punch and Judy Show.

Conclusion.

Finally, the Committee desire, on behalf of the Governors, to thank the members of the Honorary Staff for their invaluable services, without which the Hospital could not be carried on; the Nursing Staff for their devotion to duty; and the members of the Ladies' Committees for all their most helpful work; and also to acknowledge with great gratitude the continued support and assistance received from a large band of generous benefactors, far too numerous for individual mention.

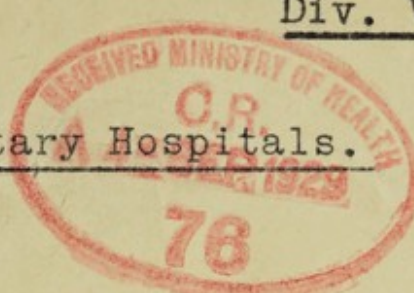



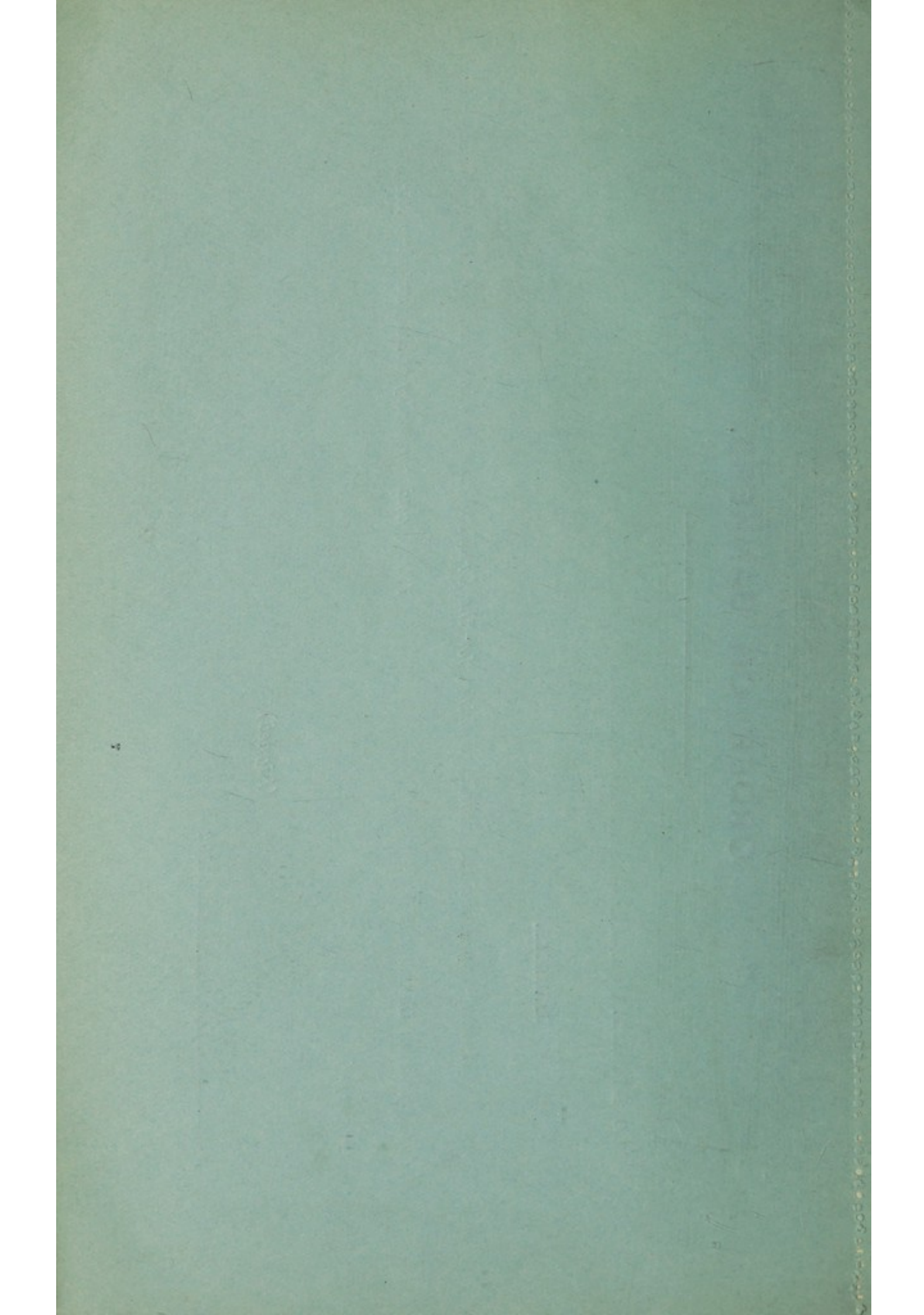

Extracts from Rules and General Regulations.

- I.—Except in cases of urgency, every patient admitted shall be provided with decent clothing and proper change of linen.
- II.—No person shall be eligible for admission to the Hospital who is afflicted with any disease which is considered infectious, with epilepsy or insanity, or with any disorder not likely to be soon cured or mitigated by treatment. Lying-in cases cannot be treated in the Hospital.
- III.—The Committee shall have power to admit private patients to the Hospital on such terms as they may think desirable.
- IV.—Friends of patients may be admitted to the Hospital to see them, unless considered inadvisable by the doctor in attendance, on Wednesdays between 5 30 and 7 p.m., and on Sundays, between the hours of 2 and 4 in the afternoon, or by special permission at other times. No more than two visitors can be admitted to see any one patient at the same time. All patients shall be discharged at the end of one month after admission, unless a member of the medical staff certifies that there is a probability of cure or considerable relief. No patient shall remain for more than two months without the special leave of the Committee.
- V.—Subject to the regulations of the Hospital, patients may be visited by any Clergyman or Minister of Religion whom they may desire to see.
- VI.—On no account will friends of patients be allowed to give them articles of food or drink. Any contribution of this kind left at the Hospital must be handed to the Matron for the patients—if considered suitable.
- VII.—Patients will be required to obey all orders of the Medical Officer or of the Matron.
- VIII.—Patients refusing to comply with the Rules and Regulations of the Hospital, or behaving themselves in a disorderly manner, shall be liable to expulsion.
