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





The Royal Manchester Children's Hospital.

The Hospital was founded in 1829, in Ridgefield, Manchester. In 1852, a small Hospital was established in North Parade. Owing to want of room, and the desirability of having a special Ward for Infectious Diseases, the Hospital was removed to Bridge Street in 1858.

The Old Dispensary was built in 1868.

In order to enable the patients to have the benefit of better air, the land at Pendlebury, on which the present building stands, was purchased at a cost of $\pounds 450$ per acre, and the Hospital was opened in 1873.

By means of a Bazaar held at the Free Trade Hall (which raised $\pounds 24,000$) and other generous gifts, the Hospital was completed and formally opened on 30th January, 1878.

Appealing in 1904 for the purpose of erecting a new Dispensary at a cost of $\pounds 20,000$, the Residuary Legatees of the late Mr. GODFREY ERMEN provided the Board with $\pounds 12,000$ to complete the amount required, and the new "GODFREY ERMEN MEMORIAL DISPENSARY" was opened on 7th March, 1907. The Residuary Legatees gave a further $\pounds 5,000$ to provide a new Massage Department, which was opened in 1922.

The CONVALESCENT HOME at Lytham St. Annes was presented to the Hospital in 1897 by Sir WILLIAM AGNEW, Bart.

In 1919, £10,000 was received from the late Mr. JESSE HAWORTH.

In 1920 a grant of $\pounds 20,000$ was made by the Committee of the National Relief Fund.

In 1923 the name of the Hospital was altered to the Royal Manchester Children's Hospital by gracious command of His Late Majesty King George V.

In 1924 a new Nurses' Home was opened on 8th December, by the Earl of Derby, K.G., P.C.

In 1927 £5,000 was received from the late Mr. Charles E. Craston.

In 1927-8 £18,000 was received from the late Mrs. Hannah Heynssen and the late Miss Rosina Lipman.

In 1930 £6,556 was received from the late Mr. Joseph Hugh Monk.

In 1930 The Westwood Estate, approximately five acres, was purchased for the sum of $\pounds7,500$.

In 1935 the sum of £32,819 1s. 2d. was received from the estate of the late Mr. John Edward Vates. In 1936 the Zachary Merton Home was opened by Mr. R. M. Holland-Martin, C.B., Chairman of the Zachary Merton Trustees. Funds for the erection of this building, the new lodge, and east boundary wall were provided by the Zachary Merton Trustees at a total cost of $f_{22,000}$.

In 1937 an extension was built to the Nurses' Home at a cost of $f_{10,300}$. The Home, including the new wing, was named The Colwyn Home as a tribute to the Right Hon. Lord Colwyn, P.C., President of the Hospital. In this year a new Isolation Block was also erected. The opening ceremony was performed by Mr. A. J. A. Orchard, representing the Lancashire and Cheshire Miners Welfare Committee, who contributed $f_{3,000}$ towards the total cost of $f_{4,300}$.

The Lancashire Boilers which had served the Hospital for over 50 years were replaced in 1937 by two new "Economic" type Boilers and the Boiler-house and Enginehouse Plant was completely modernised. The total cost involved was $f_{8,678}$ 16s. 10d.

ANNUAL MEETING, 1942.

THE One-hundred and thirteenth Annual General Meeting of the Governors, Subscribers, and Friends of the Hospital, was held on Wednesday, 18th March, 1942, at 3-30 p.m. in the Recreation Room of the Nurses' Home at the Hospital.

THE LORD MAYOR of Manchester (Mr. Alderman Wright Robinson, J.P.) presided and he was supported by the Lady Mayoress; the Mayor of Salford; Mr. Alan D. Robertson, Chairman of the Board of Governors; Mr. F. S. Stancliffe, Vice-Chairman; Mr. James Sillavan, Honorary Secretary; Dr. T. N. Fisher, Chairman of the Medical Board; Mr. G. A. T. Tuchet-Jesson, M.B.E., Chairman of the House Committee; the Reverend Charles Reed; and Mr. John Coatman, North Regional Director of the British Broadcasting Corporation.

Other Members of the Board and Medical Board who were present were:—Messrs. T. Foulkes, C. F. Harwood, J. W. Hudson, R. Ollerenshaw, and A. V. Sugden, Mrs. A. L. Dunn and Lady Stewart and about 80 Subscribers and Friends.

The Lord Mayor conveyed to the Meeting the apologies of the President, Lord Colwyn, for his inability to be present.

The Notice convening the Meeting was taken as read.

Mr. James Sillavan, Hon. Secretary, referred to letters of apology from many friends and supporters who were unable to attend. The Minutes of the Annual General Meeting held on 17th March, 1941, as printed in the previous Annual Report, were taken as read.

Mr. James Sillavan, Hon. Secretary, presented the General Report.

Mr. G. A. T. Tuchet-Jesson, M.B.E., in the absence of the Honorary Treasurer, presented the Statement of Accounts.

Dr. T. N. Fisher presented the Report of the Medical Board.

The Lord Mayor of Manchester, followed by The Mayor of Salford, addressed the Meeting with a few well-chosen words on the value of Hospitals and the Medical and Nursing professions.

113th Annual Report

FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31st DECEMBER, 1941.

Owing to the necessity for economy, this year's report will be found lacking in many of its customary features. We trust, however, that our many friends will realize the necessity and forgive the omissions, especially as we can assure them that the year through which we have just passed has been one of progress and activity.

Our labours have been all the more profitable in that we have been spared attention from the enemy, whereas a year ago it seemed possible and indeed probable that we should be called upon to endure an anxious and dangerous time. Let us be duly grateful.

We have nevertheless continued to take all reasonable precautions for the safety of our patients and staff, and our policy is the same as it has always been, namely, that the word "Pendlebury" shall stand for all that is best in Children's Hospitals in this country, and it must be said with pride that progress could not have been made without continued splendid team work by all members of the Honorary, Medical, and Lay Staffs of the Hospital in the face of ever-increasing difficulties arising out of war time conditions. We gratefully acknowledge the devotion to duty of each and every member of the Staff.

CO-ORDINATION OF HOSPITAL SERVICES.

As these lines are written the question of Regionalization, or as it is now to be called Co-ordination of Hospital Services, is receiving the serious consideration of the Manchester & Salford Voluntary Hospitals Council & Statutory Committee. It will no doubt be remembered that in 1937 the Voluntary Hospitals Commission under the Chairmanship of the Right Hon. Viscount Sankey, P.C., foreshadowed the desirability and necessity of a form of Regionalization, and now the Nuffield Provincial Hospitals Trust—founded by Lord Nuffield at the end of 1939 has issued an imposing and closely reasoned brochure entitled "A NATIONAL HOSPITAL SERVICE", this being a plea for the unification of all Hospital services, Municipal and Voluntary.

This is not the place in which to examine or discuss in detail the ably argued case put forward in that publication, but it can be said that there appear to be the alternatives the abolition of the Voluntary Hospitals as such, or their inclusion as an integral part of a National System.

MATRON.

We have to report with regret that at the end of 1941, Miss M. R. Walker, R.R.C., who had completed 37 years of Nursing Service, of which the last 17 years had been spent as Lady Superintendent of this Hospital, retired on pension. Miss Walker was devoted to Pendlebury; her knowledge of the children was unique: it was her proud boast that she knew the name of every child in every ward. As was perhaps to be expected from one of her activity of mind, she has taken on an important wartime post as Matron of Morland Hall Red Cross Convalescent Home, Penrith, Cumberland. She leaves behind many friends and takes with her the good wishes of all.

To fill the vacancy caused by the retirement of Miss Walker the Board have appointed Miss Ena D. Stevens as Matron of the Hospital. Miss Stevens comes to us with considerable experience, some part of which has been acquired at a Municipal Hospital, experience which may in time stand us in good stead in connection with the proposed Co-ordination of Hospital Service, which will mean ever closer co-operation with the Municipal Hospitals.

NURSING SALARIES.

In August, 1941, it was unanimously agreed to adopt the recommendations of the Memorandum issued by the British Hospitals Association in the case of Probationers and Staff Nurses, and Senior members of the Nursing Staff have since participated on the same basis. It may be said that this reform would have been carried out long ago of our own volition had it not been for the heavy financial problem involved, a problem which naturally falls with particular weight on a Voluntary organization.

DOMESTIC STAFF.

The salaries of domestic staff have been dealt with on similar lines, and we have been particularly glad to do so, as neither the Sankey Commission nor the British Hospitals Association have made recommendations in connection with this important hospital service, though the desirability has long been realized by Hospital Boards generally.

ALMONER.

In September last the Board appointed Miss K. R. Turner Almoner of the Hospital—a new appointment— and the important work which has already been carried out by Miss Turner has amply justified the step taken.

LONG SERVICE.

The Board record with regret the death on November 3rd, 1941, of an old and valued servant and friend of the Hospital, William Corbett, Gardener for over 50 years. A man of sterling worth and attractive simplicity of character, he had been in retirement for some years, but had always closely identified himself with the Hospital's interests, and was ever a welcome figure at all our functions. He is much missed and the sincere sympathy of all connected with Pendlebury goes out to his widow.

Report of the Medical Board

FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31st DECEMBER, 1941.

TO THE BOARD OF GOVERNORS OF THE ROYAL MANCHESTER CHILDREN'S HOSPITAL.

My LORD, LADIES AND GENTLEMEN,

During the past twelve months the work of the Hospital has become adjusted to war time conditions, and has been well maintained, in spite of the continued obligation to reserve beds for the reception and treatment of possible air raid casualties.

The Emergency Medical Service has continued in a state of preparedness for action in collaboration with the local Authority and other Hospitals in the area.

Large scale improvements which were in contemplation, in particular, the much needed extensions at the Out-patients' Department, have of necessity had to be deferred until better times. The importance of increasing the efficiency of the Hospital services in line with modern practice has not been neglected however, and the Medical Board welcome the opening of a Hospital Almoner's Department. This will greatly facilitate the after-care of patients, and the provision of convalescence and other amenities, so that the children are assured of receiving full benefit from their treatment at the Hospital. With the assistance of the Almoner, it is also hoped to introduce an improved system of keeping patients' medical records, though this is handicapped in scope at present by the necessity for economising in the use of paper.

The Psychological Clinic, established in 1938 in response to the demand for special study and treatment of children suffering from mental and emotional disturbances, is proving a valuable addition to the Hospital services. The staff of the Clinic includes the Psychiatrist, who is the Medical Director, the Educational Psychologist, and the Psychiatric Social worker. The Psychiatrist interviews parent and child and, with the assistance of the reports of the other two members of the team decides what treatment is necessary. Many problems can be disposed of by advice only. Children found to be mentally defective are not accepted for treatment. A relatively small number require a prolonged course of treatment, and this tends to be a limiting factor in the number of children who can be treated at one time. A high proportion of the children attending the Clinic have shown very satisfactory results and the mothers, on whose co-operation so much depends, have themselves profited greatly from their visits.

The Speech Clinic, initially established for the post-operative correction of speech defects originating from cleft palates and other nose and throat conditions, has also developed into a valuable auxiliary service. The careful training in establishing normal speech in such disabilities as stammering, lisping, delayed speech and associated troubles has given most encouraging results. The relationship of such defects to unrecognized forms of deafness, and in many cases to deep seated emotional disturbance, has become increasingly manifest and opens up a wide field of interesting research.

During the year we have lost the services of Mr. Rowbotham, our Consulting Neurological Surgeon, on his taking up an appointment elsewhere. Until the opportunity of appointing a successor arises, we are fortunate in being able to avail ourselves of the services of the Neurological Clinic at the Manchester Royal Infimary.

The Medical Board would like to record their thanks to Miss Walker, the retiring Matron, for her many years of devoted service to the Hospital. They extend a cordial greeting to Miss Stevens on taking up the duties of this Office.

Again our thanks are offered to our assistants in all departments for their ever-willing help at all times.

We should also like to record the generous gesture of the University of Toronto in presenting to the Hospital a years' issue of the "American Journal of Diseases of Children", a publication which it would otherwise be difficult to obtain in this country under present circumstances.

Forty-ninth Annual Report of the Ladies' Council, 1941

THE Executive Committee has pleasure in presenting its forty-ninth Annual Report.

It is gratifying to be able to record that amid all the distractions and anxiety arising from the war, the Hospital continues to receive the whole-hearted support of the various Committees and their helpers. During the past year there has been marked activity in many districts, and the splendid results achieved are most encouraging.

The total contributions received for the year amount to $\pounds 2346$ 16s. 1d. as against a sum of $\pounds 2055$ 1s. 7d. received in 1940. Thus it will be seen that not only has the level of total contributions been maintained, but increased by the sum of $\pounds 291$ 14s. 6d. This is really a most satisfactory achievement, and congratulations are accorded to all concerned.

Prior to the war a number of districts depended largely on special efforts, such as bazaars and other social engagements for the raising of funds to support their local Cots; but those who formerly organized these efforts are now so fully engaged on work of national importance that various committees of this Fund concerned have found it necessary rather to appeal for direct financial support, and it is therefore doubly gratifying to find how generous the response has been. Many illustrations of this might be cited were it not for the risk of invidious distinctions. Sufficient therefore to say that in a number of more fortunate districts the volume of subscriptions so received has compensated for the deficiencies of those which have suffered more directly from the burdens imposed by the war.

It is with much regret that the resignation of Mrs. A. L. Dunn, President of the Didsbury District Committee, through ill health and the war, has to be recorded. Mrs. Dunn first became connected with the Ladies' Auxiliary Fund in 1904, and has thus completed 38 years of voluntary service for the cause she has had so much at heart. In 1920 Mrs. Dunn was elected a member of the Board of Governors of the Hospital, and until recently, served on various Committees, a truly remarkable record of devoted service which cannot be adequately expressed in words. It is also with regret we have to record the resignation of Mrs. S. H. Brittain, President of the Heaton Moor, Heaton Mersey and Heaton Chapel District Branch since 1936. Mrs. Brittain has now left the district., and we take this opportunity of expressing sincere thanks for her valuable services in the past. Mrs. R. R. Findlay, who has been a member of this Committee for many years, has been elected to fill the vacancy as President, and Mrs. Leech as Hon. Secretary.

Special mention must also be made of the achievement of the Radcliffe and Whitefield District Committee, which again heads the list of district contributions with the magnificent sum of ± 269 3s. 6d. Miss Emerson, President, and her loyal band of workers are heartily congratulated.

The Executive Committee welcomes Mrs. A. Beaumont, who has taken over the Presidency of the Worsley District in succession to Mrs. Roscoe who has now left the district. Mrs. Taylor has been appointed Vice-President, and Mrs. Andrew continues as Honorary Secretary and Treasurer, an office she has held for many years. The Committee has been revived and its first year's working has been most successful.

In the midst of the great struggle in which the nation is now engaged, it is pleasing to note that the welfare of children has kept its place in the forefront of public attention. The preservation of child life with ever improving standards of health was never more important than at present, and developments are rapidly taking place, not only for the mere treatment of disease, but also for the elimination of the causes. Such is the work of the Royal Manchester Children's Hospital, whose proud record of service has covered over a century of time.

It is therefore with assurance that the Executive Committee expresses its belief that the important national work which the Hospital is doing, not only for children of the present, but of future generations, will receive the continued confidence and support of all fellow citizens.

In conclusion, the Executive Committee desires to express its sincere and cordial thanks to all Presidents, Officers, Members of Local Committees and the numerous collectors who have worked so splendidly during the past year.
