# Royal Manchester Children's Hospital

## PENDLEBURY

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### 117 YEARS OF SERVICE

**T**HE Royal Manchester Children's Hospital had a very modest beginning, though it is believed to have been the first General Hospital for Children in the British Isles.

It was founded in 1829, by several benevolent men, among whom was a physician, Dr. John Alexander, a 30 year old surgeon, Walter Barton Stott, and Daniel Grant, one of the Cheeryble brothers immortalised by Charles Dickens, when a small dispensary was established in Back King Street, Manchester, for the free treatment of sick children. Though resources were strictly limited, the income barely reaching £60 a year, upwards of 1,500 cases were treated annually, without any change of organisation, until the year 1852.

In that year a new era in the history of the Institution commenced when a small Hospital, with accommodation for six patients, was established in North Parade for the treatment of urgent cases; a venture which proved so successful that in 1858 it was decided to transfer the Hospital to Bridge Street, where there was accommodation for 25 beds. Ten years later, in 1868, a suitable building was erected in Gartside Street for Out patients, and soon the two establishments were dealing with 350 In patients and 7,000 Out patients annually.

By 1870 the scope and importance of the Hospital was such as to permit of the consideration of still more ambitious plans. This year six acres of land were bought in Pendlebury, on a "bright and airy hillside," and the first portion of the present Hospital to be erected was opened in 1873 with 84 beds.

There were obvious advantages in selecting Pendlebury as a suitable site, though at the time many disagreed with the proposal to place the Hospital at so great a distance as four miles from the city simply to give patients the benefit of more pleasant surroundings.

The completion of the original plans took place in 1878 and, with subsequent extensions, accommodation was thus increased to 180 beds.

It is interesting to note in passing that after examining the plans about this time, Florence Nightingale thought that the Hospital must be one of the best constructed in Europe.



A notable addition to the scope of the Hospital was made in 1897, when the Convalescent Home at St. Annes-on-Sea was opened with accommodation for 30 children.

In 1907, a new Out patients Department was established in Gartside Street, on the original site, at a cost of £32,000, to which extensions were added in 1922.

The value of the Hospital's work received well deserved recognition in 1923, when its title was altered, by Royal Command, to the Royal Manchester Children's Hospital.

In 1924 a new Nurses' Home was built to which a large extension was made in 1937. This separate building in the Hospital grounds provides very modern accommodation for the Nursing Staff. Each Nurse has her own bedroom, and there is a large recreation room where a Nurse may entertain her own friends on occasion.

Two other additions within recent years, which have enabled the Hospital to increase its already notable services, are the Zachary Merton Convalescent Home, in 1936, with accommodation for 40 semi-convalescent children, and the Isolation Block in 1937, with 12 beds, making the present total number of beds available 262.

A Preliminary Training School for Nurses was established in 1943.

The number of Patients admitted to Hospital, and attending the Out Patients' Department in 1945, make an interesting comparison with the figures for 1868, viz. :—

The aim of the Hospital now, as in 1829, is to give sick children the best medical and nursing treatment and every possible means is employed to ensure their safe and speedy return to normal life.

In all the years of its existence, the Hospital has trained thousands of Sick Children's Nurses, and has provided instruction to a great many Medical Students.

A walk through the wards of the Hospital will convince the reader of the importance and essential nature of the work we have been doing for so long. It is the intention of the Board of Governors to continue to make every effort to provide the finest possible service for sick children and they are ready to co-operate fully with all agencies concerned in any new scheme of re-organisation of medical services.

# ANNUAL GENERAL MEETING, 1946

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The One Hundred and Seventeenth Annual General Meeting of the Governors, Subscribers and Friends of the Hospital, was held on Monday, March 18th, 1946, at 3-30 p.m., in the Recreation Room of the Nurses' Home at the Hospital.

The Lord Mayor of Manchester (Councillor Hugh Lee, J.P.) presided and he was supported by the Rt. Hon. Lord Derby; the Lady Mayoress of Manchester; the Mayor and Mayoress of Salford; Mr. T. Barnes (Chairman of the Finance Committee, Manchester and Salford Hospital Saturday Fund); Mr. F. S. Stancliffe (Chairman of the Board of Governors); Mr. R. J. Garrard (Vice-Chairman); Mr. J. Sillavan (Hon. Secretary); and Dr. J. F. Ward.

Other members of the Board and Medical Board present were:—Mr. C. A. Bickmore, Mr. H. E. Bowman, Mr. C. W. E. Cary, Mr. C. T. Gerrard, Mr. J. M. Hollis, Dr. C. P. Lapage, Mr. J. F. Linney, Mr. R. Ollerenshaw, Mr. A. V. Sugden, Mr. G. A. T. Tuchet-Jesson, and about one hundred and twenty subscribers and friends.

The Lord Mayor extended a hearty welcome to the Rt. Hon. Lord Derby on his attendance at the meeting.

Reference was made to the sad loss to the Hospital in the death of the President the Rt. Hon. Lord Colwyn, P.C., and the meeting stood in silence as a tribute to his memory.

The Notice convening the meeting was taken as read.

The Honorary Secretary referred to letters of apology from subscribers and friends who were unable to attend.

The Minutes of the Annual General Meeting held on March 19th, 1945, as printed in the previous Annual Report, were taken as read.

Mr. James Sillavan (Hon. Secretary), presented the General Report.

Mr. R. J. Garrard (Vice-Chairman), presented the Statement of Accounts on behalf of the Hon. Treasurer, the Hon. H. Con. Smith.

Dr. J. F. Ward presented the Report of the Medical Board.

At this stage of the proceedings the Lord Mayor of Manchester addressed the meeting, stating, with reference to the proposed New Health Service, that the community would suffer considerably if voluntary organisations were not encouraged in the future.

On moving the adoption of the Annual Report, Mr. F. S. Stancliffe spoke on the jeopardy in which Voluntary Hospitals now found themselves, in view of the impending threat of nationalisation, and indicated the vital necessity for Voluntary Hospitals, as such, to be represented in the New Health Service, the need for which had long been recognised by them. There could be no reason for taking over the assets of Voluntary Hospitals unless the Trustees had failed in their duty; and he believed that nothing but harm could result from handing over their management to the State, since the voluntary system is human and encourages enterprise. In the paramount



interest of the patient, therefore, he urged the efforts of all to preserve the humanity of the Voluntary Hospital System.

117th ANNUAL REPORT  
FOR THE YEAR ENDING DECEMBER 31st, 1945

Before starting upon the task of recording the events of the past year, we have to refer with the deepest regret to the death of our revered President, Lord Colwyn, which took place at his home in Colwyn Bay, on January 26th, 1946, a few days after his 86th birthday.

The career of Frederick Henry Smith, First Baron Colwyn, is one of which Lancashire is justly proud. He was an important figure in the First World War and was rightly honoured for his outstanding services to the Nation, but it is for others to tell of those services. Our task is to speak of the lovable man who was our President for a quarter of a century, and of his abiding interest in all that concerned the Hospital.

During the past few years increasing age and bodily infirmity had kept him away from the scene of his former activities and there must be several now connected with Pendlebury who do not remember the time when his was a regular presence at our functions.

In those days it was his delight to preside at our not too formal Annual Meetings, to speak of what had been done, to draw attention to that which was still to be done and thank individually as far as possible, and in a way peculiarly his own—those who had played a part in the work. He possessed the rare gift of making those to whom he was speaking feel that they were the people he was most anxious to meet at that moment. Many indeed felt that their annual chat with the President of the Hospital was a full reward for much hard work and a spur to future efforts.

It is no exaggeration to say that he inspired the work and helped to make the success of the Hospital. Its continued success will be his most fitting memorial and one that he would most have desired.

His public benefactions, not least among these his gifts to Pendlebury, were many and various; the tale of his secret and private generosity will probably never be fully known.

He was always completely natural, entirely unspoiled by success and leaves behind him the memory of a great and good man who set a fine example. There are many who will long remember with gratitude, words of shrewd and kindly advice and quiet encouragement and the warm humanity which shone from his eyes as he talked. His passing leaves a place in our hearts which it will be hard to fill.



The year through which we have passed has been the most memorable year in the history of our Country, resulting in victory over our enemies and before we pass on to the Hospital and its affairs, we wish to record our profound thankfulness for this deliverance, our abiding gratitude to all those through whose efforts Victory was made possible, and our proud remembrance of all who have lost their lives in the service of our Country.

It is our hope that we may be worthy of their sacrifice and that we may each play our part in helping to build a new and better world upon the ashes of the world that has been destroyed.

A new government is in power and vast schemes of National Welfare are being brought before Parliament at an ever-increasing pace, but even yet the Voluntary Hospitals do not know their fate, though report and rumour more or less well-informed are rife.

There seems to be no doubt, however, that before long there will be radical changes in the service of the National Health, changes which will affect us greatly, but this period of waiting does not seem to be the time to sit down and passively await the unknown. The whole position has been carefully considered and the Policy of the Hospital is still to press on, to plan and to look ahead. During the war years, many of our plans for improvement have had to be shelved, but these are now being brought up to date in the light of all that we have learned in the past six years.

We still hold fast to the two cardinal principles that the interest of the patient is paramount, and that there must be an equal partnership for the Voluntary Hospitals in the planning of a Comprehensive National Health Service.

### **CHILD HEALTH INSTITUTE**

There is still little visible progress to report but much is going on behind the scenes. With a view to establishing closer contact with the University and with the cordial approval of the Vice-Chancellor, a member of the University Council, Professor H. S. Raper has been elected to a seat on the Board of Governors.

### **UNDERGRADUATE AND POST-GRADUATE INSTRUCTION**

The Hospital is hoping to play a valuable part in this important branch of Post-war teaching. Fears had been expressed that travel to and from the Manchester Royal Infirmary would perhaps militate against the value of Pendlebury as a training centre, but in practice it has been found that present arrangements are working out very satisfactorily.

### **DEATHS**

During the past year we have lost through death, two old and valued friends of the Hospital. Mr. Peter Eadie and Dr. Arthur Sellars. Mr. Eadie had not been seen at our meetings for some time, due to ill health and advancing years, but he was Chairman of the



Board in 1924-1925 and his cheerful generosity and lively wit and humour are still remembered. Dr. Sellars was Pathologist to the Hospital from 1919 to 1925, and to mark his great services to Pendlebury he was elected a member of the Honorary Consulting Staff on his retirement.

#### **BOARD OF MANAGEMENT**

We have to record with regret that Mr. G. A. T. Tuchet-Jesson, M.B.E., having left the district, has temporarily withdrawn from active participation in the Hospital's affairs, though he still retains his seat on the Board. Few Members of the Board have given such long and devoted service to Pendlebury. For more than a quarter of a century, as an ordinary Member of the Board, as Honorary Secretary, Chairman of the House Committee and Chairman of the Board, he has been one of our most active members and he leaves secure in the knowledge that his services to the Hospital have been recognised and appreciated by his colleagues. We are glad to know that as a Trustee and Vice-President of the Hospital, the benefit of his wise counsel and his unrivalled knowledge of the Hospital are still as ever at our disposal.

To the great regret of her colleagues, Mrs. J. Orr has found it necessary to resign from the Board, through illness. Her past services to Pendlebury are gratefully acknowledged.

Mr. Charles A. Bickmore, Mr. Harold Bowman and Mr. W. E. Thompson, have joined the Board during the past year and have already made valuable contributions to the Hospital from their respective specialized knowledge and experience.

#### **HONORARY AND SALARIED MEDICAL STAFF**

It is with great pleasure that we are able to record the return from active service with the forces of Dr. John F. Ward, one of our Senior Honorary Physicians, Mr. D. S. Poole Wilson, Honorary Urological Surgeon; Mr. Neville A. J. Young, Honorary Aural Surgeon and Mr. I. Copeman, Honorary Assistant Dental Surgeon. During the past year, Mr. R. W. Wyse has, in accordance with the terms ruled by the British Medical Association, been appointed Acting Assistant Surgeon.

In accordance also with the ruling of the British Medical Association, Mrs. Florence Cavanagh has been appointed Honorary Assistant Aural Surgeon.

Dr. H. M. Morris also has returned to civilian life and has resumed his post as Radiologist, this necessitating the resignation of Dr. J. Wraith from her appointment as Acting Radiologist. While welcoming Dr. Morris's return, we offer our sincere thanks to Dr. Wraith, for her valuable help in time of need.

We must at this stage send our warm thanks and appreciation to all members of the Honorary and Salaried Medical Staff, who have in the face of great difficulties and much overwork, helped to maintain the high standard of the Hospital during the war years.



## **PATHOLOGICAL DEPARTMENT**

Since our last report, Dr. H. Lederer has been called away for service in Czechoslovakia, the country of his birth. He had thrown himself with enthusiasm into the life of Pendlebury and his valuable services to the Hospital in setting up the present Laboratory are gratefully acknowledged. While expressing our disappointment at the somewhat early and unexpected termination of his connection with the Hospital, we extend a hearty welcome to Dr. H. W. Dalton, who has been appointed to succeed him.

## **DISPENSARY AND OUT-PATIENTS' DEPARTMENT, GARTSIDE STREET**

As foreshadowed in our last Annual Report, Sister McMurtrey has gone into retirement: she finally left the service of the Hospital on May 30th, after more than 30 years of devoted service, as Sister-in-Charge. She carries with her the goodwill and good wishes of all. A presentation was made to her by the Board of Governors to mark their high appreciation of her service and character.

Miss Violet E. Gill has been appointed to the post of Sister-in-Charge at Gartside Street.

Another well-known figure and devoted servant of the Hospital has been lost to us during the past year in the retirement due to serious illness, of Mr. A. Teesdale, Dispenser, after 37 years of loyal service. He was in years well past retiring age, but with characteristic courage and cheerfulness, had seen us through the war years. His retirement is a great loss to the Hospital and we wish him many years of renewed health in which to enjoy the leisure he has so richly earned. He takes with him into retirement the friendship and goodwill of all who knew him. To commemorate his outstanding record of service, a presentation was made to him by the Board of Governors.

Mr. D. S. Smith, M.P.S., formerly of Worksop Victoria Hospital, has been appointed to succeed Mr. Teesdale.

## **SEASIDE HOME, ST. ANNES**

Now that the war is over and transport facilities are to some extent restored, it is hoped that it may be possible for us to visit more regularly this important outpost of the Hospital, whose good work is greatly valued. To Miss Jones and to Dr. Hamilton we extend our grateful appreciation of the difficulties they have so cheerfully surmounted during the war years. Following the death of Mr. H. W. Booth, a new Member of the Board of Governors has made the Convalescent Home his special care and attention.

## **ZACHARY MERTON HOME**

With the knowledge and approval of the Trustees, part of the building is at present being used as accommodation for the Preliminary Training School, which means that this Home for Convalescent Patients is at present being employed only at half capacity. This, however, is one of the things that cannot be helped in the present



state of affairs, where the greatest good of the greatest number must be our criterion. In view of the present National shortage of Nurses, it is highly important that Pendlebury's reputation as a Training School for Nurses should stand high.

### **AMERICAN AMBULANCE**

We have to record with gratitude the valuable gift of an Ambulance from the forces of our great ally the United States of America. It is hoped, at some time in the near future, that it may be possible to have this decorated on lines similar to the ambulances already in use.

### **NURSING**

The Nursing Training School continues to function with considerable success in spite of great difficulties. Plans are in existence for the building of proper accommodation for the school, so that it may have a home worthy of its importance. The Nursing Committee continues to meet at regular intervals, and much good work is being done.

The acute shortage of bedroom accommodation has received close attention and to ease the situation the Board have purchased house property Nos. 102 and 114 Manchester Road, Swinton, which are in close proximity to the Hospital. One is already in occupation by staff and the other is in course of preparation.

The Sisters' and Nurses' Representative Councils meet at frequent intervals and have put forward several useful and valuable suggestions, which have been of great help to the Committee.

The literary aspirations of the Nursing Staff have again found expression in the welcome re-appearance of their own magazine. It is hoped that this pleasant feature of Hospital life will continue to receive the support it deserves.

### **CATERING**

Great care and attention has been given to the question of catering, and we can say with confidence that of the many difficulties that we have had to face as a result of the war, none has caused more constant anxiety. The National food situation, the way in which the Hospital has to be worked, and the many odd and different times at which meals must be served and the shortage of staff, have all combined to present a daily problem of formidable proportions. We cannot yet say that the problem has been solved to the satisfaction of the Board, but the formation of a Catering Sub-Committee presided over by a member of the Board of Management, has done much towards attaining that close co-operation, without which the feeding in an institution such as Pendlebury can never be completely satisfactory.

### **LADIES' AUXILIARY FUND**

It would not have been surprising if this fund had ceased to exist during the war, for it is well known and recognised that the housewife has borne the brunt of the hard battle on the Home Front. In spite, however, of every discouragement, the fund has continued to flourish and during the past year the sum of £3,543 12s. 10d. has been collected for the Hospital.



Our grateful thanks are here expressed to all who have helped, but we must also add our deep and whole-hearted admiration of the public-spirited courage which has kept the organisation going during the past six years. It is not our custom to mention by name members of the Board of Governors actively engaged in the service of the Hospital, but we cannot refrain from making sympathetic reference to the serious accident sustained by Mr. C. F. Harwood, Honorary Secretary to the Council, whose members will be glad to know that he is now convalescent.

#### **ACKNOWLEDGMENTS**

A regular feature of all annual reports is the expression of thanks to the members of the Salaried Staff, for their services during the year under review, but it is in no ordinary, or formal sense that we now express our thanks for their great services during the entire period of the war, to all members of the Salaried Staff—Administrative and Nursing—at Pendlebury, Gartside Street and St. Annes. The difficulties they have had to face have been great and often disheartening: more often than not they have been an almost overwhelming tax on patience, endurance and nerves. Such difficulties have been common to us all, but that the Hospital has continued to function as it has done has been not only a great achievement, but a sound and solid contribution towards Victory, in which all, whatever their degree, may share an equal pride.

As in past years our appreciative thanks are due to Messrs. Sale, Lingards & Co., Honorary Solicitors and to Messrs. Halliday, Pearson & Co., Honorary Auditors, whose help has been invaluable.

Last, but not least, a word of thanks is due to all those who have rendered willing service to the Hospital during the past year and indeed throughout the war years. Considerations of space make it impossible to mention them all by name, and there are many whose names we have not been allowed to know, but we can assure them one and all that their help has been of immense value to our patients and is gratefully remembered.

#### **MANCHESTER AND SALFORD HOSPITAL SATURDAY AND CONVALESCENT HOMES FUND**

The Board of Governors again wish to place on record their very grateful thanks for the increasing support given by the Chairman, Executive Committee and Members of this Fund, for the treatment of patients. The allocation for the year amounted to £4,278 0s. 0d. and in addition, £16,169 2s. 6d. was received in respect of treatment of members.

#### **MANCHESTER AND SALFORD MEDICAL CHARITIES FUND**

The annual contribution and proceeds from Alexandra Day amounted to £601 6s. 6d. In addition, contributions were received for services to patients and annual subscriptions. The Board express their appreciation and thanks to all who have contributed to this result.

# 53rd ANNUAL REPORT

FOR THE YEAR 1945

The Executive Committee has pleasure in presenting the Fifty-third Annual Report of the Ladies' Council.

It is with deep regret the death is recorded of Mrs. Edith Ellison, who for twenty-four years held office as President of the Rusholme and Victoria Park District Committee. Her enthusiasm and devotion for the cause she had so much at heart were truly remarkable, and her passing will be keenly felt.

It has not yet been possible to obtain a successor for this District.

An unusually large number of changes at other districts have also occurred during the year :

Miss D. E. Greaves, Honorary Secretary of the Lytham St. Annes Branch, has resigned her office, and has been succeeded by Mrs. G. Openshaw, with a new Committee, whose efforts during the past year have met with unprecedented success.

Mrs. Arnfield, President of the New Mills District, having removed to the South of England, has resigned her office, and has been succeeded by Mrs. Higginbottom.

Mrs. A. A. Cooke, of the Kearsley District, and a Member of the Executive Committee, has resigned after many years of devoted service.

Mrs. R. Findlay who was appointed President of the Heaton Moor, Heaton Mersey and Heaton Chapel District in 1940, when Mrs. M. Brittain was compelled to withdraw by circumstances arising from the war, has now resigned, and Mrs. Brittain resumes her former office.

Mrs. N. Wilson has accepted office as Honorary Treasurer of the Farnworth District, in succession to Mrs. A. Nuttall.

Miss G. M. Emerson, Honorary Secretary of the Radcliffe and Whitefield Committee, has resigned and has been succeeded by Mrs. Dearden.



Mrs. Gladwell, President of the Whaley Bridge District, has resigned from office. A successor has not yet been appointed.

Miss E. D. Willis has accepted office as President of the Whalley Range District, in succession to the late Mrs. Schneider.

Mrs. Andrew, Honorary Treasurer of the Worsley District, has resigned, and for the time being, Mrs. Taylor, President, will take over her duties.

Space will not permit any detailed reference to the very valuable services rendered by those good friends who have of necessity, and much to their regret, had to relinquish their offices, and the Executive Committee takes this opportunity, with the support of the Board of Governors of the Hospital, to place on record its deep sense of gratitude to all who have so generously given of their time and energy to a noble and glorious cause.

The activities of all districts during the past year have again been most successful. The total contributions received amounted to £3,543 12s. 10d. as compared with £3,426 6s. 2d. during 1944, an increase of £117 6s. 8d.

It is most pleasing to record that the 1945 contribution exceeds any previous year since the inception of the Fund in 1893, with the exception of the year 1921, when the annual contribution was augmented by the proceeds of a Bazaar held at the Free Trade Hall.

This result is evidence of the determination on the part of the public that the medical charities shall be the last of our age-long institutions to suffer from the effects of war. It is only by their many willing contributions, however humble, that members of the Public can prove the warmth of their charity and their sense of responsibility towards those who labour for the sick and suffering.

The Royal Manchester Children's Hospital is not merely a charitable and philanthropic organisation of local reputation, but an Institution assuming almost national importance. The large measure of support it receives not only from Manchester and Salford, but from surrounding counties, bears testimony to the confidence of the Public in its management, its efficiency, and its results.

To the Presidents, Committees, and Collectors of all the contributing districts, the Executive Committee tenders its very sincere thanks for the valuable help which their endeavours continue to render to the Hospital.
