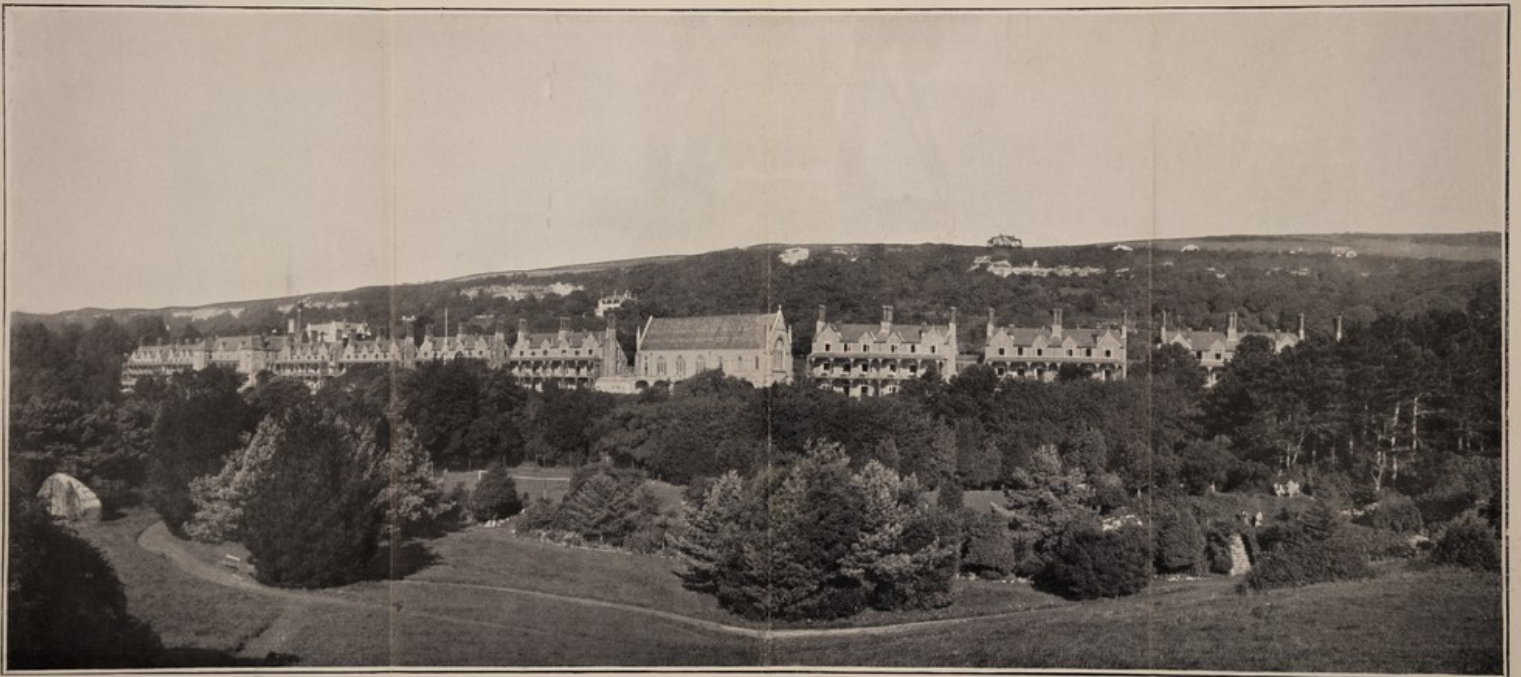

## GENERAL APPEAL.

1.—The Board of Management of THE ROYAL NATIONAL HOSPITAL FOR CONSUMPTION AND DISEASES OF THE CHEST ON THE SEPARATE PRINCIPLE beg to call special attention to the claims of this Hospital, and to solicit, on the following grounds, the generous support of the benevolent :—

2.—It is in the truest and widest sense of the words  
**A National Institution.** It opens its doors to  
**A** applicants from all parts of the British Isles,  
**National** without distinction of sex, creed, or religious  
**Institution.** denomination. There is accommodation for 163  
 patients.

3.—The Hospital is under the Patronage of Their Majesties  
 The King and Queen Mary. Her late Majesty  
**Royal** Queen Victoria signified her gracious approval  
**Patronage.** and appreciation of its objects by granting to it  
 a royal charter of incorporation in 1885. Her  
 late Majesty was also graciously pleased to honour the  
 Hospital by a personal visit on February 11th, 1888, and  
 to express approval of the arrangements for the comfort  
 and treatment of the Patients. A Block of Houses has  
 been named "The Queen Victoria Block" after Her late  
 Majesty. His late Majesty King Edward VII graciously  
 visited the Hospital in 1902, and inspected the whole of the  
 Institution. Her Majesty The Queen visited the Hospital  
 on 5th August, 1920, and was graciously pleased to send her  
 autographed portrait and that of His late Majesty King  
 George V, in commemoration of this visit. His Majesty  
 The King opened the Thomas Lampard Green Nurses'  
 Home on 22nd July, 1926, and also inspected the Hospital.



4.—This Hospital is situated in one of the loveliest and most sheltered spots of the Undercliff of the Isle of Wight, the climate of which is most suitable for the treatment of the special diseases for which the Hospital was established. On the west the site is protected by a row of high trees, and is somewhat under the shelter of the Undercliff in the distance ; on the north it is backed by woodland sweeping up to the Undercliff range in the background ; on the east shelter is afforded by the rising ground in front of Steephill Castle ; and on the south or sea aspect, which the sitting and sleeping rooms face, the undulating nature of the ground offers considerable protection, and yet allows charming views of the sea, which is distant about three hundred yards.

The grounds cover over twenty acres of a well-drained land, sloping generally towards the sea, laid out as terraces, lawns, pleasure grounds, flower and vegetable gardens, in which, in accordance with the now generally accepted treatment, the patients are encouraged to take exercise and engage in such labour and occupation as, in the judgment of the physicians, is suited to their respective powers and conditions of health, a course which has proved most beneficial.

5.—Founded in the year 1867 by Dr. Arthur Hill Hassall, the Hospital was designed and erected on the separate or cottage principle, now universally acknowledged to be the best method of hospital construction, and one possessing most important medical and sanitary advantages. It now comprises eleven separate blocks of buildings, affording accommodation for 76 men and 87 women, IN SEPARATE BEDROOMS.

6.—It is universally admitted that good and proper food is essential in cases of Consumption. Therefore the greatest care is taken with the dietary of the patients, and especially with the milk, which is *pasteurised*, and is of the purest character obtainable.



7.—It is unnecessary at the present day to enlarge upon the fact that Consumption is one of the most prevalent distressing and fatal of the maladies to which our fellow-countrymen are subject. Though specially a disease of the poor, no class of society is exempt from it. It particularly affects cities, ravages the ranks of dwellers in crowded areas, and of workers engaged in sedentary occupations. It is not surprising, therefore, that the Hospital has been fully occupied from the day when the first Block of Houses was opened, and there are usually many applicants waiting for admission. Over 38,000 In-Patients have already received the benefits of the Hospital. These facts prove that the Institution has, from the first, supplied a great public and national want.

8.—The Patients admitted are chiefly in the incipient or early stages of the disease, and the results achieved have been very gratifying and encouraging, many of the inmates having been enabled, upon return to their homes, to resume their usual occupations. They express themselves as most thankful and satisfied with their treatment at the Hospital.

9.—The Board, in common with the majority of hospital managers of the present day, being of opinion that a payment of some kind by the Patients is desirable, require £2 per week towards the cost of maintenance, which averaged £3 12s. 3d. a week in 1937.

10.—An earnest invitation is extended to all who can do so, to pay the Hospital a personal visit, which, it is felt, will enhance the satisfaction and pleasure felt by all connected with this work of charity. The Board of Management take pleasure in the fact that many hundred visitors have expressed very high approval. A large number of distinguished philanthropists, members of the medical profession (including foreign physicians), and others



who take interest in charitable work, have specially visited the Hospital, and in some instances, plans have been requested with a view of erecting, elsewhere, Hospitals on similar principles.

11.—Patients are received from all parts, and about one-half the number come from the Metropolitan area. **Patients received from all parts.** The Hospital has, consequently, afforded great benefit to the inhabitants of this Kingdom, and London especially—a fact recognised by most of the City Livery Companies and by the Council of the Metropolitan Hospital Sunday Fund, who award grants to this Institution.

### Maintenance of the Hospital.

Since the war medical and surgical knowledge has been applied much more intensively to consumption, as to all disease, and the staffing and equipment is much in advance of pre-war days. Although patients contribute £2 a week, there is a large proportion of the cost of treatment to be met by voluntary gifts. There is no Government aid. King Edward VII Hospital Fund for London can only help work done within eleven miles of St. Paul's Cathedral, so the Hospital can only exist by Annual Subscriptions, Donations, and Legacies, all of which are most anxiously requested to maintain this truly national charity.



## RATES OF SUBSCRIPTION.

The Bye-Laws relating to the qualifications and privileges of future Governors are printed *in extenso* on pages 50 to 53.

A Donation of Fifty Guineas (either paid at one time or at different periods within three years) constitutes a Life Governor ; an Annual Subscription of Five Guineas, an Annual Governor.

One payment of Five Guineas does not constitute an Annual Governor, it being the intention of the Royal Charter that an Annual Governor shall be one who will continue the same yearly ; as by Clause 9 of the Charter the amount required to constitute a Governor for one year is a Donation of Ten Guineas.

Donors of the sum of £525 are entitled always to have one patient in the Hospital, subject to the Rules, etc.

The Board of Management are prepared to set apart one Bed in perpetuity (to be named, if desired, after the Donor) in return for a gift of £1,000, with the Right of Presentation to that Bed by the Donor during life, subject to the Rules of the Hospital, the Donor also having the power to bequeath the Right of Presentation to any one person he or she may appoint.

## Governors and Subscribers.

*The following revised Rates of Subscriptions came into force on the 19th March, 1903, but Subscribers and Donors previous to that date will continue to receive Letters on the old scale :—*

- £5 5 0** ANNUAL SUBSCRIPTION constitutes a Governor with ONE Letter of Recommendation ANNUALLY.
- £10 10 0** DONATION constitutes a Governor for ONE year with ONE Letter of Recommendation.
- £52 10 0** DONATION (either paid in one sum or within 3 years) constitutes a Life Governor with one Letter of Recommendation annually.
- £52 10 0** ANNUAL SUBSCRIPTION or  
**£525** DONATION entitles the Governor to the privilege of a Presentation Bed, i.e., of having always one Patient in the Hospital.
- £1000** DONATION entitles the Donor to the Right of Presentation to one Bed (to be *named* if desired after the Donor, or "*In Memoriam*," in perpetuity), the Donor also having power to bequeath the Right of Presentation to any one person whom he or she may appoint.

Executors or Trustees having discretion to select the charitable Institution to be benefited are entitled to nominate one of their number to receive the privileges such person would have been entitled to if the actual donor of the contribution.

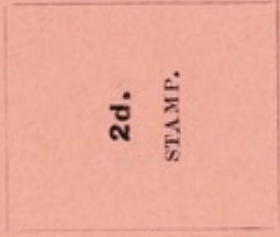

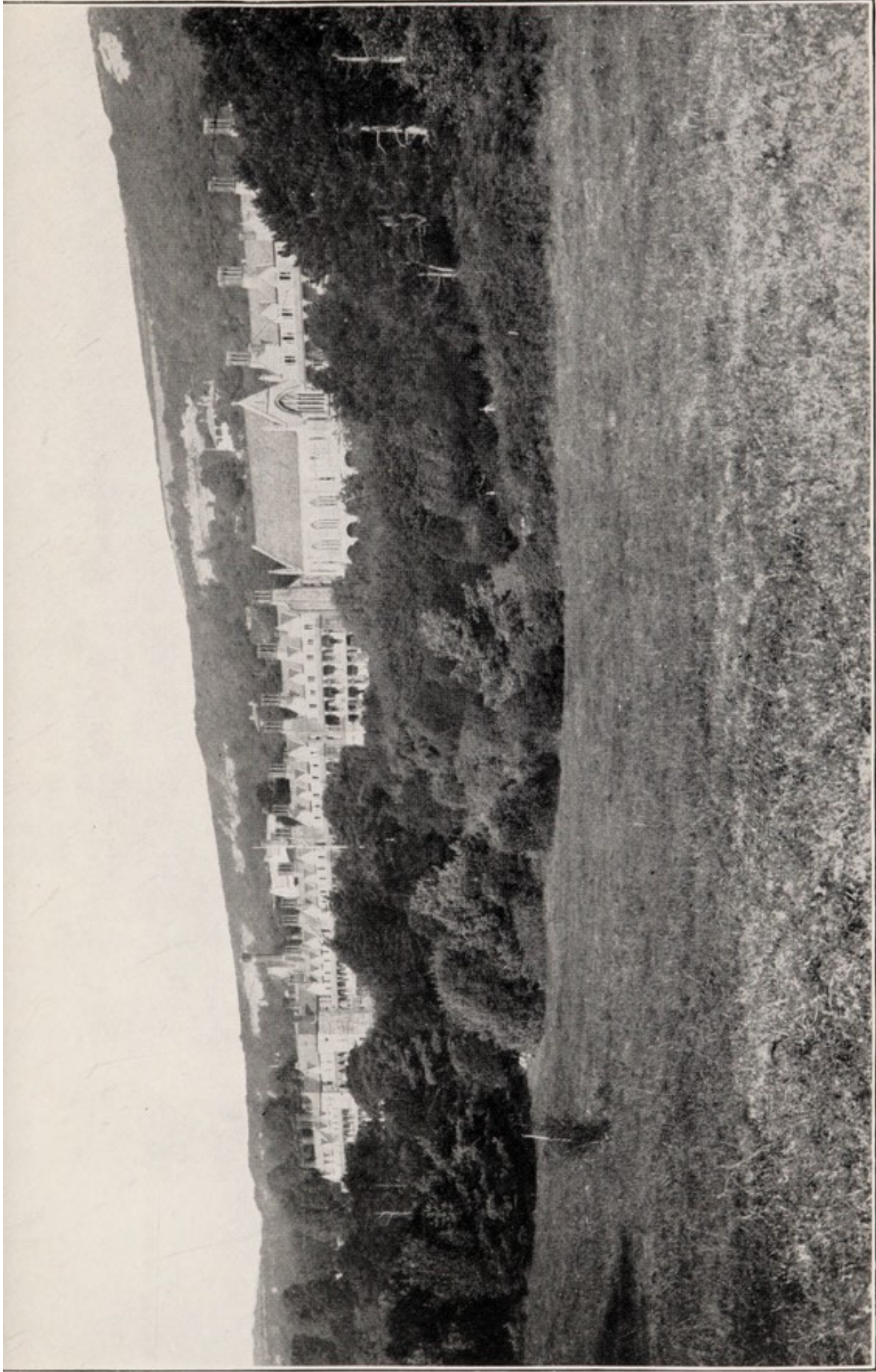

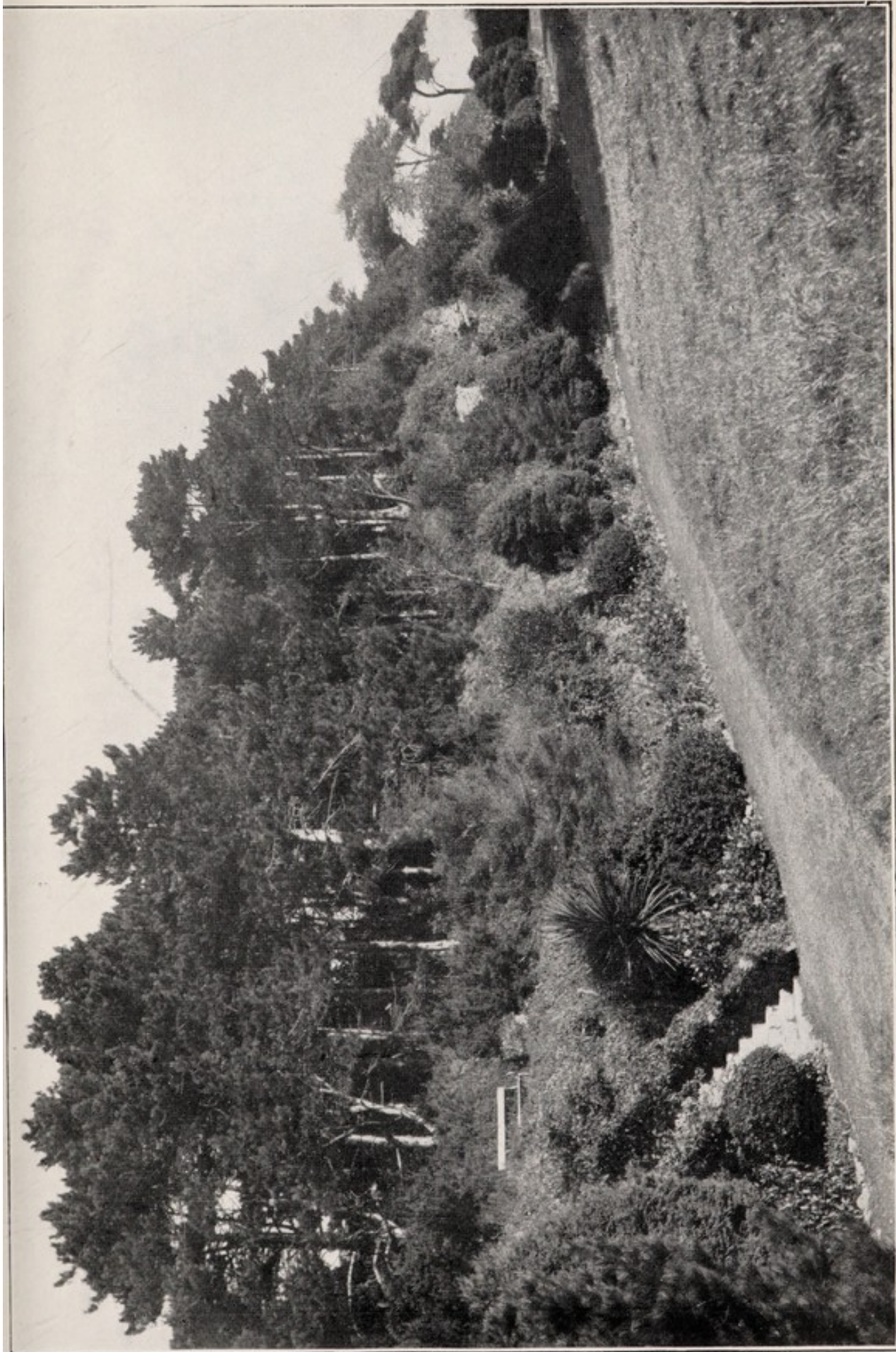




A VIEW OF THE HOSPITAL FROM THE GROUNDS, SHOWING DOWNS IN BACKGROUND.



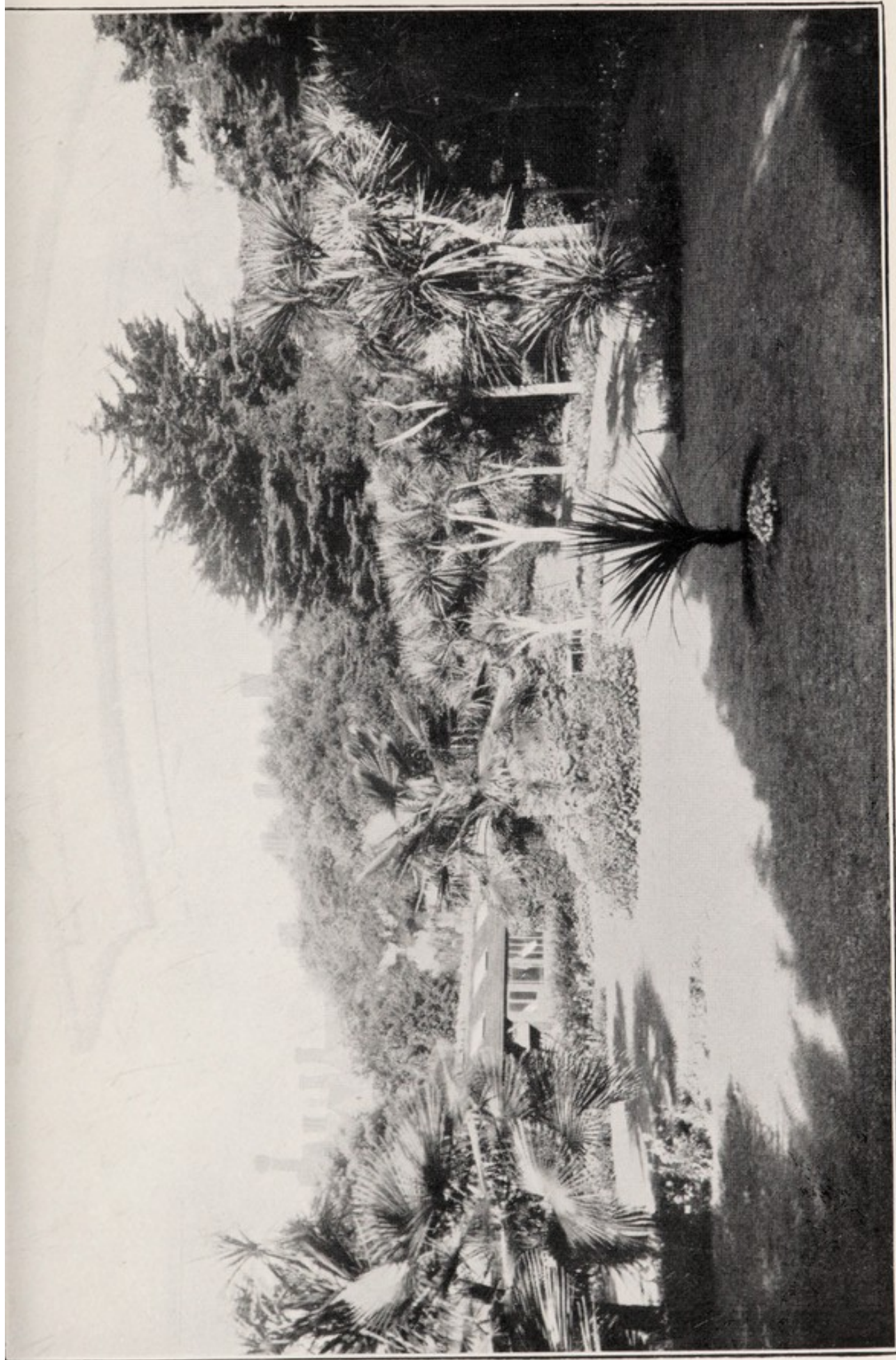




A VIEW OF THE GROUNDS (*facing the sea.*)

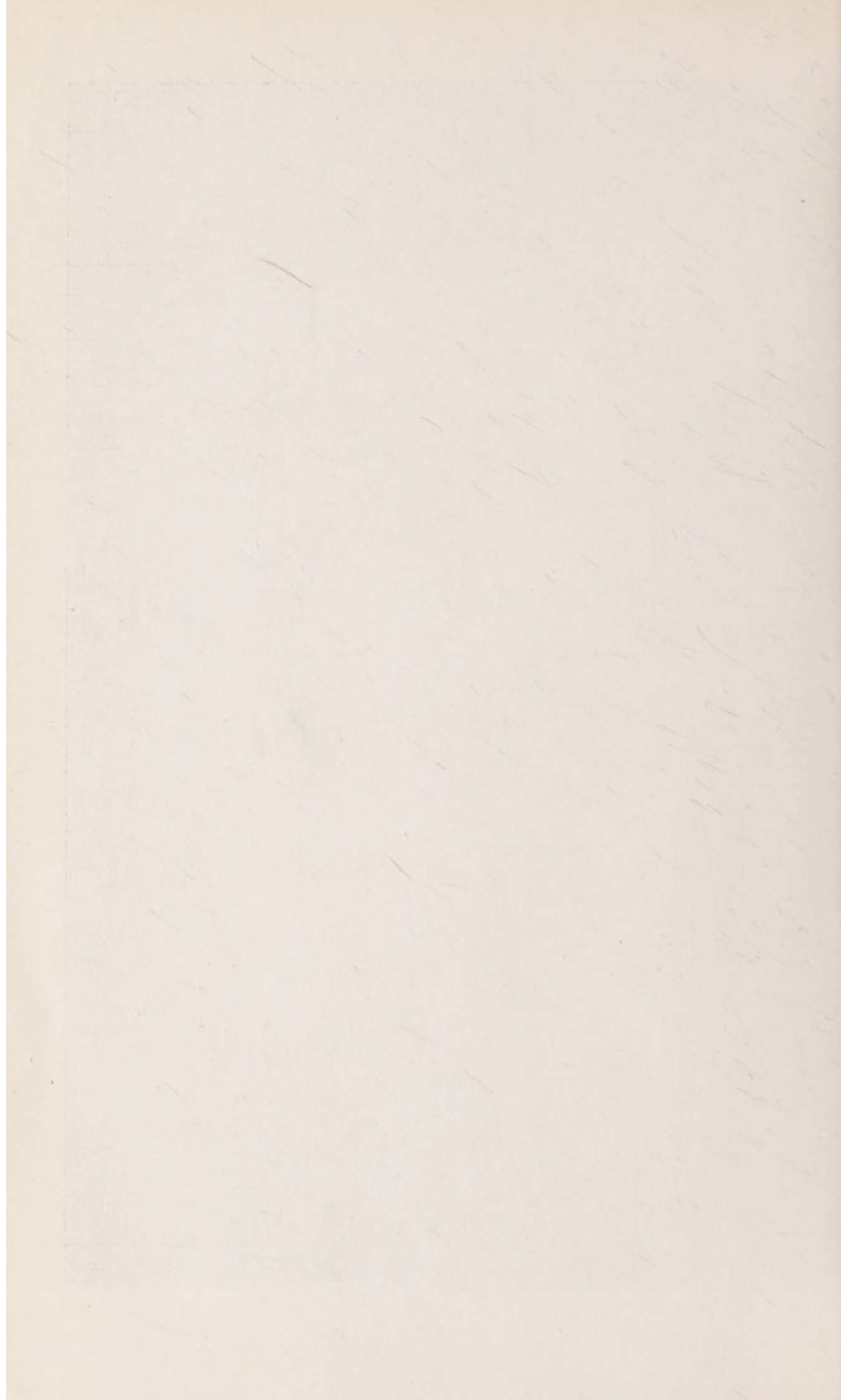

## MEDICAL REPORT, 1937.

During the year there were 399 applications for admission to the Hospital, of whom 323 were accepted as suitable for treatment. 329 cases were admitted, and all beds were full throughout the year. The waiting list averaged 4 men and 7 women, and the average period of waiting was from one to three weeks.

316 patients were discharged during 1937. 11 patients were discharged as not suffering from Pulmonary Tuberculosis. 9 stayed less than 10 days and so are not included, leaving 296 CASES OF PULMONARY TUBERCULOSIS, on whom the following report is based:—

173 patients had Tubercle Bacilli found in their sputum on admission, and 92 (53.2%) of these were discharged “ Negative.”

(The Follow-Up of patients discharged in 1934 showed that after 3 years of those discharged “ Fit for work,” 80% were doing a full day’s work, and 11% doing part-time work; of the “ Fit for light work,” 82% were doing full work and 1% doing part time; and of the “ Unfit for work,” 40% were doing full work and 10% light work. At the end of 3 years from discharge, 65% of all patients discharged during 1934 were doing full work and 12% were doing light work.)

### RESULTS OF TREATMENT CLASSIFIED ACCORDING TO CONDITION ON ADMISSION.

(The classification adopted is “A” for all cases in which tubercle bacilli have never been found, and “B1, 2, or 3,” according to the severity, in all cases in which tubercle bacilli have at any time been found.)

All patients were treated on routine Sanatorium lines. In addition 142 received Special Treatment such as Collapse Therapy and Gold Salts. Nearly all cases required rest in bed at first. All cases discharged Fit for Work or Light Work reached full walking exercise of 6 miles a day, and 12 patients were able to do work in the gardens while in Hospital.

The average length of stay in Hospital was 184 days.

#### ARTIFICIAL PNEUMOTHORAX.

This was attempted in 86 cases, and a pleural space was found in 72. 14 of these were abandoned soon after induction because only a contra-selective collapse could be obtained, and 4 had to be abandoned because of pleural effusion and obliterative pleurisy. A successful collapse was obtained in 54 cases. Adhesions were divided in 28 of these cases, and the Phrenic nerve avulsed in 7. 7 patients had bilateral pneumothorax.

31 patients were admitted with an artificial pneumothorax. 2 of these were abandoned because the lesion was Quiescent, 3 because the collapse was contra-selective, and 2 obliterated. The remaining 24 were maintained, and adhesions were divided in 4.

Of the 76 patients discharged with an artificial pneumothorax, 48 had Positive sputum on admission, and only 7 were Positive on discharge.

31 pneumothorax cases developed a pleural effusion and in two cases Tubercle Bacilli were found in the fluid.

Of the 32 cases in which adhesions were divided 15 developed a pleural effusion sufficient to cover the diaphragm, of these 9 absorbed spontaneously, 4 required aspiration and were discharged free of fluid, and 2 were purulent. One patient had a Hæmothorax and this was converted into an oleothorax.

## PHRENIC CRUSH AND AVULSION.

This was performed on 33 patients :—

7 in order to improve the collapse in artificial pneumothorax.

9 for obliterating or abandoned pneumothorax.

6 for unilateral cases in which pneumothorax had failed.

11 for unilateral cases as the treatment of choice.

28 of these cases were admitted with positive sputum and 12 were discharged Positive.

## THORACOPLASTY.

10 cases had thoracoplasty performed : 4 by 1 stage only, 3 by 2 stages, 3 by 3 stages. All of these had Positive sputum before operation. 8 were discharged Negative and in one the sputum was still Positive though much reduced. One patient died.

## REGULATIONS AS TO ADMISSION OF PATIENTS.

1.—This Hospital is established for the treatment of Patients suffering from Tuberculosis or other Diseases of the Respiratory Organs.

Children under 12 years of age cannot be accepted as patients.

2.—The cases eligible for admission are those which are in an **INCIPIENT OR EARLY STAGE OF DISEASE.**

3.—Persons eligible for admission are those who are not able to meet the cost of maintenance and medical treatment in a private Sanatorium. They must not be in receipt of parochial relief.

4.—Applicants for admission should be provided with a Letter of Recommendation, obtainable from a Governor, or Subscriber, and send the same with the reports thereon, duly completed, to the Secretary, at the Offices, R.N.H.C., 18, Buckingham Street, Strand, London, W.C.2. There is no other form of application for private patients.

5.—The payments required are as follows :—

(a) From patients presenting a Letter of Recommendation, £2 per week, payable fortnightly in advance, the first fortnightly payment to be made to the Steward at the Hospital upon admission.

(b) From a Public Authority (County or Borough Council, etc.), 49/- per week, payable monthly; or in respect of a patient presenting a Governor's Letter of Recommendation 42/- per week, payable monthly.

**NOTE.**—The payment of £2 per week will not be accepted by the Hospital from a Public Authority on behalf of a patient's maintenance.

**A Guarantee Fee of £1** must also be deposited with the Steward by every patient. This sum will be returned to the patient on leaving the Hospital, subject to the right of



retaining the same, or any part thereof, for payments due to the Hospital, or for damage done.

6.—Candidates will be eligible for admission in the order of their applications, by Letter of Recommendation, or nomination of a Public Authority.

7.—The time during which Patients are retained in the Hospital varies, according to the necessity of each case. The term of residence is decided by the Medical Superintendent, acting in consultation with the Medical Visitors, and Patients must understand that no period of stay is guaranteed. Cases found to be unsuitable cannot be retained. A Patient, admitted with a Governor's Letter of Recommendation, cannot be retained beyond eight weeks from the date of admission, unless a second Letter of Recommendation be obtained ; or payment is made under Regulation 5 (b).

8.—A Patient cannot be re-admitted until at least twelve months have expired from the date of his or her departure from the Hospital, unless the case be specially recommended by one of the Honorary Physicians or by the Medical Superintendent.

9.—No Patient shall be eligible for re-admission to the Hospital who has been dismissed on a former occasion for breach of any of the rules or regulations, except with special permission of the Board of Management.

10.—All Patients will be required to conform STRICTLY TO THE RULES framed for the internal management of the Hospital ; *c.f.* pages 18—23, copies of these rules are exhibited in each Block.

11.—Patients must defray their own travelling expenses. No responsibility can be accepted for care of patients during the journey to or from the Hospital.

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N.B.—All communications concerning patients after their admission, should be addressed to the Medical Superintendent at the Hospital, Ventnor.



## RULES TO BE OBSERVED BY PATIENTS.

Patients will appreciate that rules and regulations are never made without object, the object being twofold :—(1) The better order and running of the Institution ; and (2) (also embraced in 1), the welfare of the patients, individually and collectively.

### EXERCISE AND GRADE WORK.

No patient should take walking exercise before breakfast.

Patients must realise that exercise or work is part of treatment and must be strictly adhered to. Those on walking exercise must take the prescribed exercise in two portions with an equal period of rest in between. Having finished their exercise they must return to their Blocks and rest. By REST is meant REST ON A REST CHAIR.

Patients on grade work should work steadily and not spasmodically for the prescribed period, return to the Block when the bell rings, and prepare themselves for meals or rest hour as the case may be.

Patients on 2 x 30s. exercise or grade work will make their own beds, sweep and dust their rooms and help generally on the Block if required.

### SMOKING.

Smoking to excess is obviously bad for any individual, especially so for those suffering from chest conditions. Smoking is permitted at the following times :—

After breakfast until the bell rings at 9.30.

„ dinner „ „ „ „ 2 p.m.

„ supper in moderation.

Saturday and Sunday afternoons in moderation.

BED PATIENTS MAY SMOKE FOR HALF AN HOUR AFTER EACH MEAL, BUT AT NO OTHER TIME.

The above applies to all male patients whether on rest or exercise, and smoking at other times is strictly forbidden.

No smoking is permitted on the North Drive, nor in any room or corridor of the Blocks, except sitting-rooms.

### GAMES.

Patients on 2 x 15s. exercise and over are permitted to play all outdoor and indoor games. Those on less than 2 x 15s. are prohibited from playing outdoor games and are limited to sedentary games.

Games may NOT be played in the mornings, but at the following times only :—

After mid-day dinner until the exercise bell rings.

After afternoon rest hour until supper.

After supper until 8.30 p.m.



(Patients are asked to remember that the equipment for the various games has been provided at no small cost, and they are requested to take an interest in the care of this equipment and to return everything to the place allotted to it when finished with. Any breakage should be immediately reported so that everything may be kept in a state of good repair and replaced if necessary.)

### CARD GAMES.

No card games may be played in the grounds otherwise than on the lawns in front of the Blocks.

Except with special permission, Whist or Bridge Drives are not to be held.

Patients are not allowed to play card games in other than their own Blocks, unless permission has been obtained for a Whist or Bridge Drive.

Packs of cards are to be in charge of the Chairmen of the Blocks and must be returned to the Sisters each evening after use. This also applies to billiard balls.

### GAMBLING.

No gambling in card or other games is permitted, and infringement of this rule will render patients liable to dismissal.

(NOTE.—In observing strictly the rules laid down, patients will render great assistance to the staff in the carrying out of their duties and the general running of the institution will be a pleasant and easy matter.)

### GENERAL CARE OF BLOCKS, Etc.

Patients must exercise every care with regard to buildings and general equipment and electric light. They must not tamper in any way with electric light, wireless, or any equipment of the Hospital.

Tidiness, both outside and inside the Blocks, must be observed. All rubbish must be deposited in the receptacles provided. Rest chairs, cushions and rugs must be brought in from the lawns at night.

### SPUTUM.

All patients must use the sputum cups provided whilst on their Blocks. Those patients who are up and about must carry with them one of the flasks provided and must use it on all occasions when necessary. Patients must not use their handkerchiefs to expectorate into, nor must there be any spitting about the grounds or premises whatsoever. Anyone found doing this will be summarily dismissed.

### PAPER HANDKERCHIEFS.

Patients must not make use of any handkerchiefs other than the paper handkerchiefs issued.



### VISITORS' PASSES.

The official visiting days are Saturday and Sunday from 2 to 4 p.m., and for these occasions no passes are required. Visitors at any other time must be provided with a special pass issued by the Medical Superintendent; applications for such to be made to the Medical Superintendent through the Sister of the Division.

Visitors are not permitted in the mornings.

Visitors on week-days are permitted in the afternoons from 2 to 4 p.m. only as follows:—

For those patients on rest, every afternoon with permission.

For patients on exercise or grade work, two afternoons per week only.

CHILDREN UNDER TWELVE YEARS OF AGE ARE NOT ALLOWED TO VISIT THE HOSPITAL IN ANY CIRCUMSTANCES.

Patients must await and take farewell of their visitors on the Blocks.

### USE OF NORTH DRIVE.

The North Drive must not be used by patients except as follows:

MALE PATIENTS may use the North Drive when going to and from Chapel, Hospital Shop, X-ray room, General Office (Block IX), the entrance gate when on pass, and, in the case of Block VI., when their presence is required at the Consulting Room.

FEMALE PATIENTS may use the North Drive when going to and from meals, Hospital Shop, X-ray room, General Office, Block IX., and the entrance gate when on pass.

### HOSPITAL SHOP.

The Hospital Shop is open as follows:—

FOR MALE PATIENTS:—9.10 a.m. to 9.30 a.m.

FOR FEMALE PATIENTS:—1.0 p.m. to 1.30 p.m.

### FOOD AND DRINK.

Food and drink must not be brought or sent into the Hospital, with the exception of fruit and sweets. Alcoholic liquors are strictly forbidden.

### BOUNDS.

Any patient found breaking bounds will be liable to dismissal.

There must be no communication of any kind between male and female patients. Any infringement of this rule will render the patients concerned liable to dismissal.

### COMPLAINTS.

Any patient having a complaint to make will kindly report to the Sister in charge of the Division, who will bring the question to the notice of the Medical Superintendent for investigation.



Any patient in the Dining Hall who has a complaint to make must do so, immediately after the meal, to the officer in charge of Hall.

Punctuality in attendance at the Dining Hall for meals must be observed.

### PASSES.

Patients on 2 x 30s. exercise or grade work are allowed a pass out of the Hospital from 2 to 5 p.m. once a week.

Applications for any special passes must be made to the Medical Superintendent through the Sister of the Division.

Chapel passes are permitted to patients of other denominations than Church of England, provided that such patients have reached 2 x 30s. exercise or grade work.

### FEEES.

A Guarantee Fee of £1 must be deposited with the Steward by every patient on admission, together with a fortnight's payments in advance, and thereafter fees must be kept paid up a fortnight in advance. The Guarantee Fee will be returned to the patient on discharge, subject, however, to the right on the part of the Hospital of retaining the same or any part thereof for payments due or for damage done. The first payment is collected on admission, and future payments may be taken or sent to the General Office, Block IX., at the following times daily:—

Male Patients :—9.15 a.m. to 9.30 a.m.

Female Patients :—11.15 a.m. to 11.30 a.m.

### NOTICE OF LEAVING.

All patients must give one week's notice in writing to the Medical Superintendent of their intention to leave the Hospital; failing this, payment in lieu of notice will be required.

### LETTERS OF RECOMMENDATION.

Letters of Recommendation hold good for a period of eight weeks each.

Patients are responsible for obtaining and handing in Letters of Recommendation as they become due.

### EXTENSIONS OF TREATMENT.

Applications for extensions of treatment must be made on the forms provided for that purpose. These must be filled in and sent to the Medical Superintendent for his consideration, as follows:—  
During the fifth, ninth, thirteenth, and seventeenth weeks of treatment.

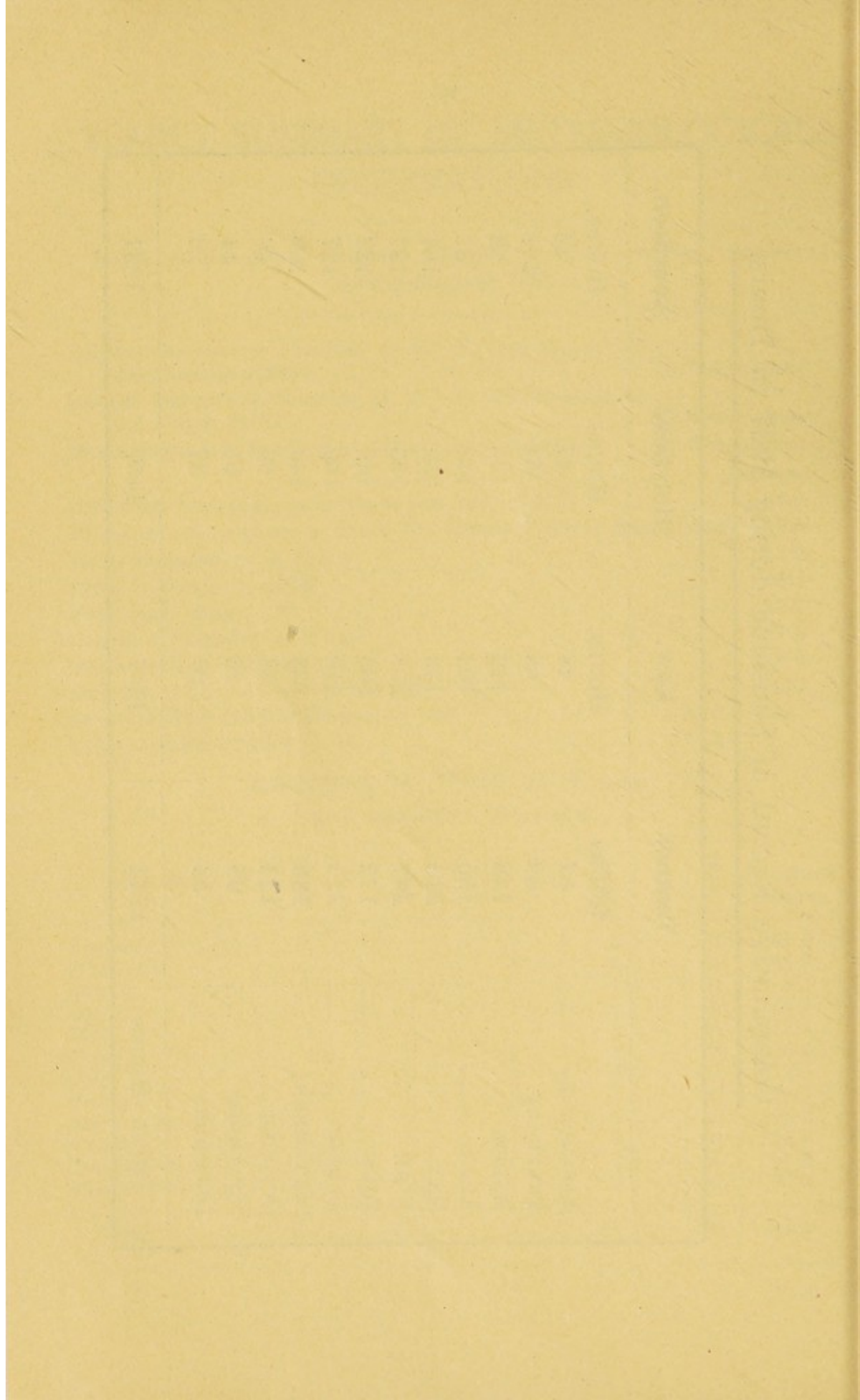

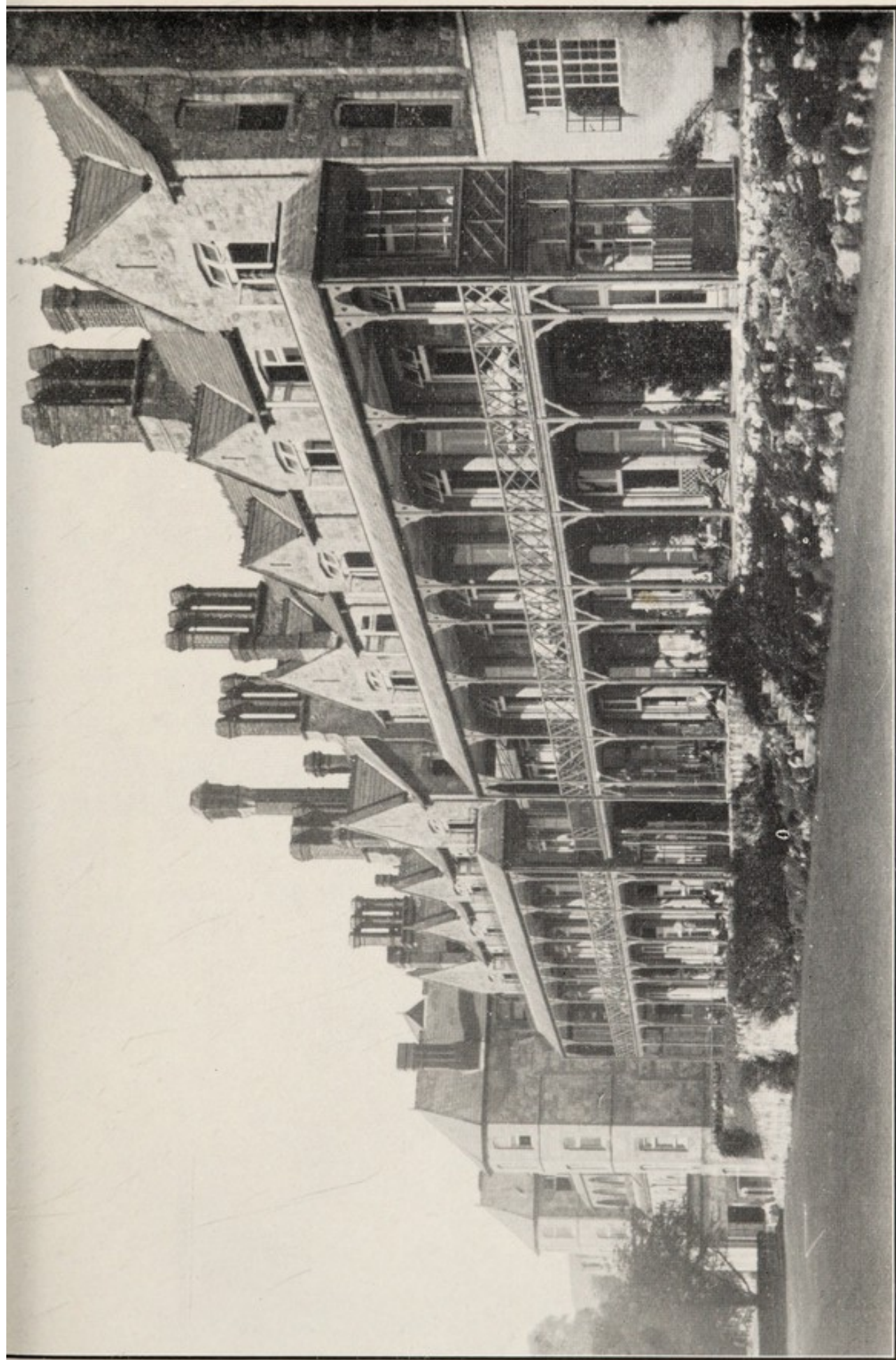

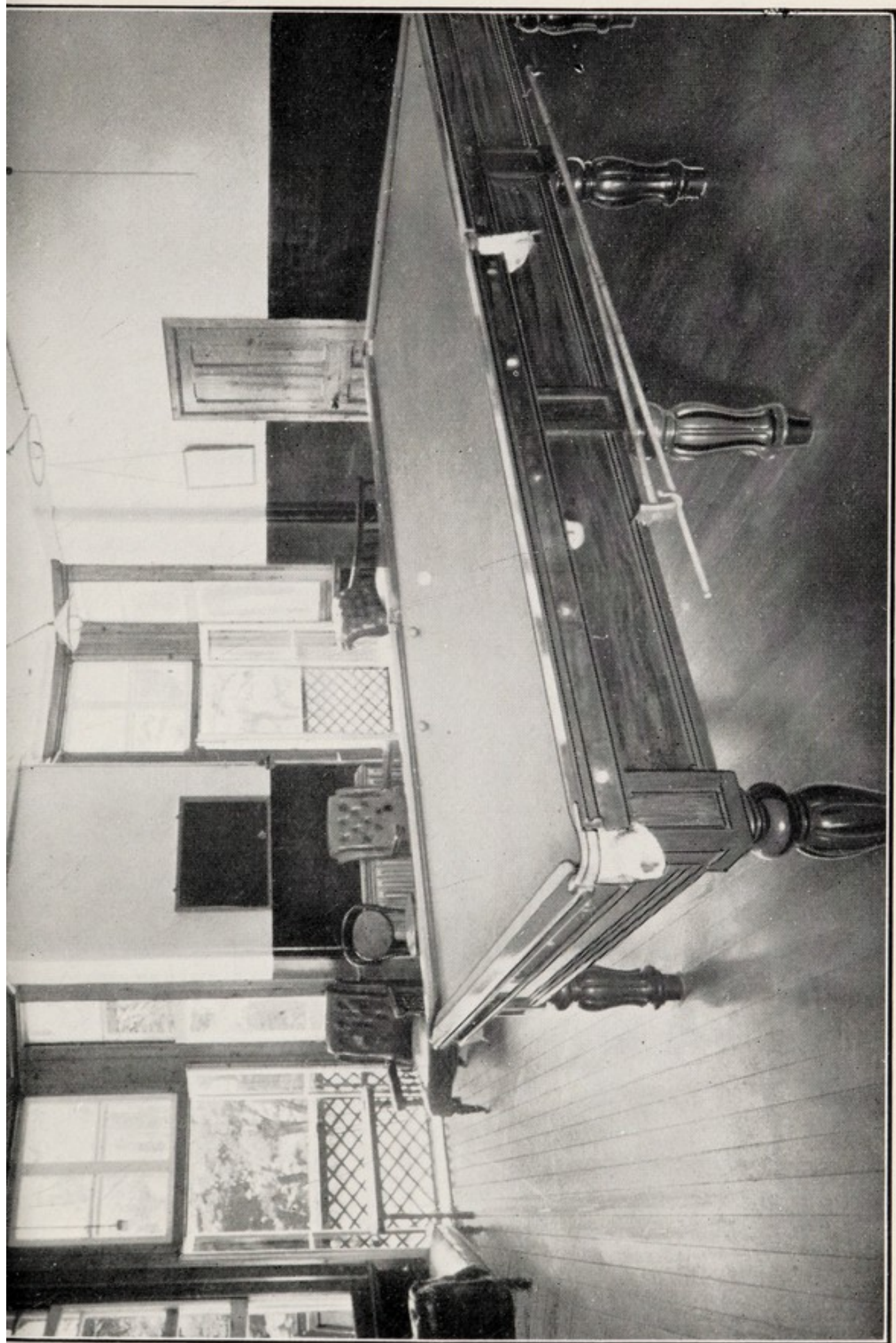

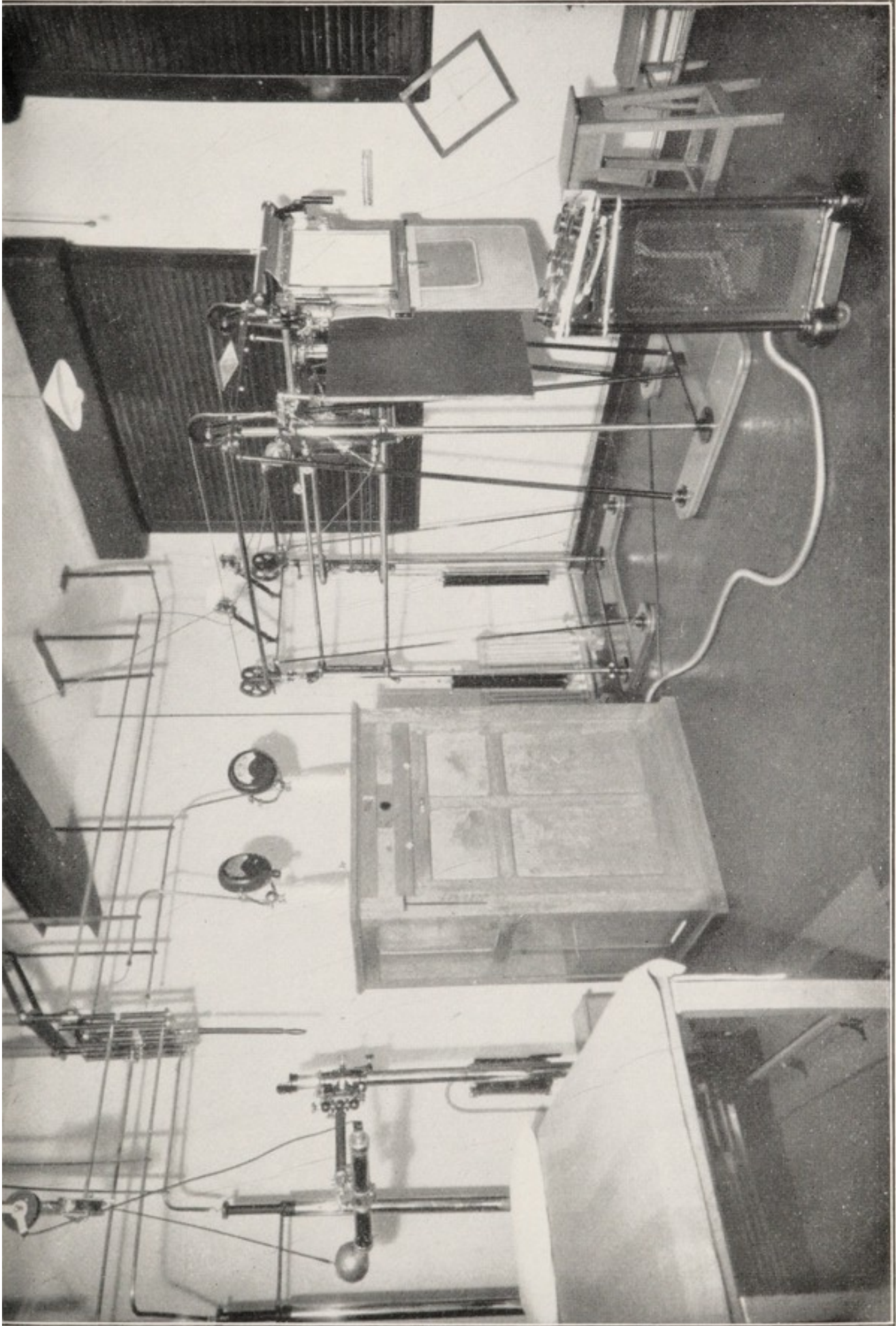

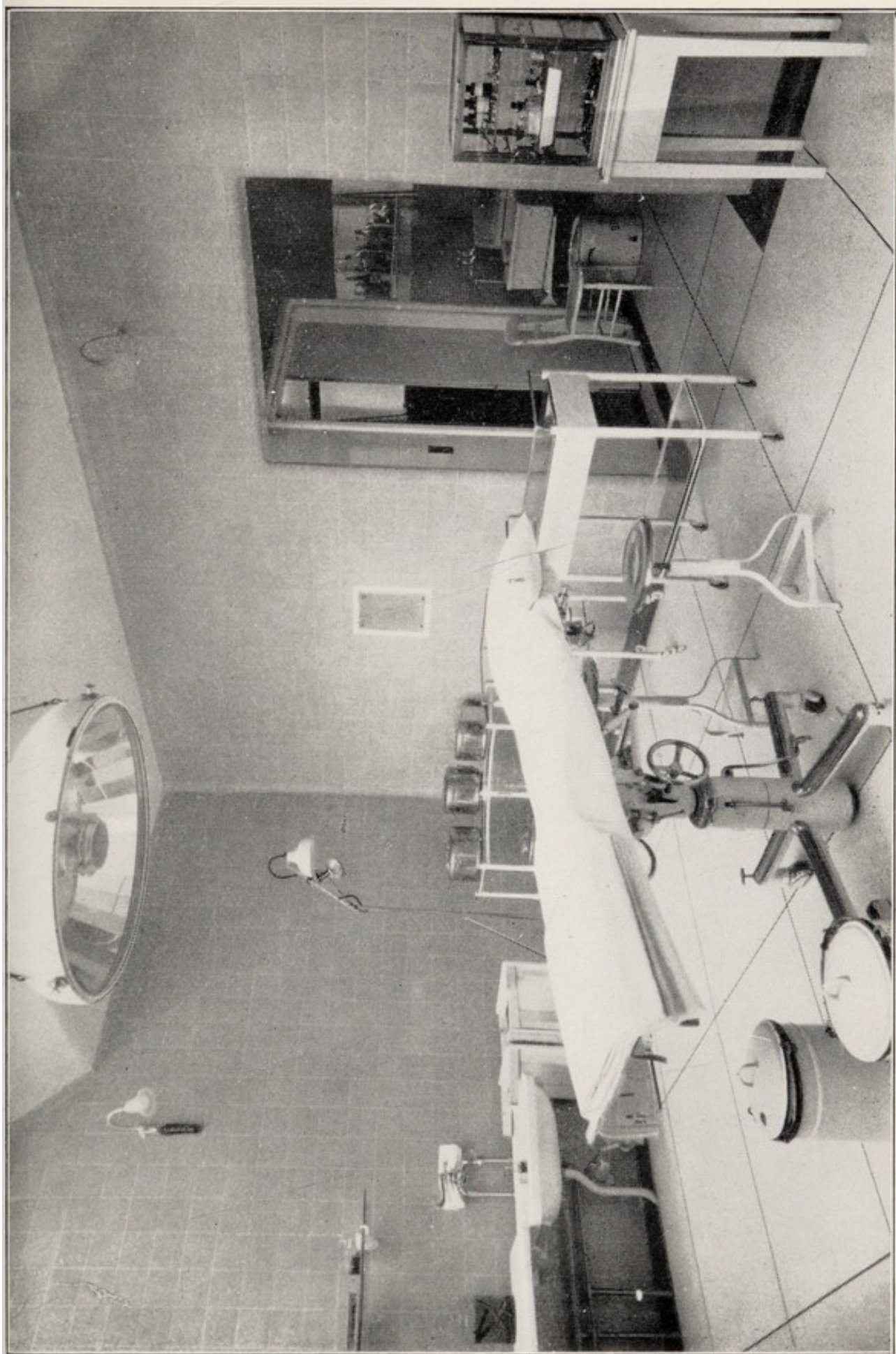

It is with great pleasure that we record the continued gracious Patronage of Their Majesties The King and Queen and of Her Majesty Queen Mary.

The year ended with an excess of expenditure over income of some £725. This was however anticipated by the Board of Management as much work which was undertaken towards the close of 1936 had to be paid for in 1937. That this deficit was not larger is due to the loyal support of all friends of the Hospital and especially to the following whose gifts the Board wish particularly to acknowledge :—

**Finance.** Total income shows a decrease of almost £2,000, but this was expected as there was no Broadcast Appeal during the year and the Hospital could not reasonably expect so large a revenue from Legacies. Annual Subscriptions show a decrease, although there was an increase in the actual number of subscribers; the explanation of this seeming anomaly lies in the fact that certain large firms who subscribe in proportion to the number of their Staff treated by the Hospital, have not had to make so much use of our services. The Board, however, are assured that this is not due to any dissatisfaction with the



treatment afforded. Donations show a very welcome increase of nearly £800 and the Board are very pleased to note that many of those who responded to the wireless appeal in 1936, again sent donations in 1937. The increase in payments from Patients and Public Authorities is accounted for by the fact that additional beds were available in the annexe built by Mr. Nunn when constructing the lift shafts.

On the expenditure side of the accounts, Provisions show a considerable increase due to the increasing cost of living. Electricity shows an increase due to the installation of passenger lifts and to the ever-increasing use of X-Ray apparatus. During the year a cinematograph was purchased and performances are given once a week in the Recreation Room ; these performances are much appreciated by Patients and Staff and the enjoyment provided is, the Board feels sure, full compensation for the increased expenditure on Entertainments.

During the year the Hospital decided to adopt the Federated Superannuation Scheme for Nurses and Hospital Officers ; this is a contributory pension scheme which, while greatly appreciated by the Staff, will in the long run prove an economy to the Hospital ; at present however, it is responsible for the increases in salaries of Nursing and Lay Staff. The increased cost of Printing and Stationery is due to the installation of a new system of accountancy rendered necessary by the increasing work of the Hospital. During the year Block 10 was renovated and redecorated, a new water main was installed, and the main chimney of the Boiler House repaired ; this accounts for the increase in Renewals and Repairs, while the external painting of the whole Hospital explains the rise in Cleaning and Painting.



**Additions.** The installation of the passenger lifts mentioned in the last report was completed early in the year and they have proved of the very greatest value. No sooner had this work been done than Mr. Nunn undertook the reconstruction of the garage, linen room, and Hospital shop. These were housed in large wooden huts along the North Drive, and Mr. Nunn has replaced them with excellent brick and stone structures, set further back from the drive so as to allow of more room for the turning of cars and tradesmen's vans. In addition Mr. Nunn has undertaken many smaller, yet extremely valuable alterations and improvements, and it is quite impossible for the Board adequately to express their appreciation of his wonderful generosity in the Hospital.

**Executive.** The following members of the Board who retire by rotation, being eligible, offer themselves for re-election, namely, Dr. Robert Armstrong, Mr. Cuthbert Burgoyne, Mr. A. Tudor Edwards, Dr. Arthur G. Phear, C.B., Dr. R. L. Rawlinson, Mr. W. J. Thompson, Mr. C. D. Wilkinson, and Sir Frederick W. Young.

**Honorary Medical Staff** During the year Dr. G. H. Shaw, Pathologist in Ventnor to the Hospital since 1930, was compelled to resign owing to ill health and the Board deeply regret that he has since died.

Once more the Board place on record their appreciation of the invaluable work done by the Honorary Medical and Surgical Staff, and by the Honorary Medical Referees.



**Staff.** In their last report the Board referred to the increasing work of the Medical and Nursing Staffs and during 1937, efforts have been made to lighten this burden. A new Consulting Room for the Medical Superintendent is being built on Block IX, in order that as many patients as possible may come to the Medical Superintendent instead of his having to go to them. In addition, it has been found necessary to engage a fourth resident Medical Officer: this has entailed the building of a new dining room adjacent to the Medical Officers' sitting room. During the year the Board, in an effort to reduce the hours of duty for Nurses, sanctioned the engagement of four additional nurses: the engagement of these nurses enabled a 48 hour week to be put in operation, but with the present nation-wide shortage of Nurses, it is not always possible to maintain a full Staff.

The Board wish to take this opportunity of thanking all the Staff, both at Ventnor and in the London Office, for their excellent work during the past year.

**Conclusion.** The year has again been one of considerable achievement, both from the lay and medical sides of the Hospital. The buildings and equipment of the Hospital are in a high state of efficiency while the results of treatment as shown in the Medical Report are extremely satisfactory.

There is however, a definite and unavoidable tendency for the cost of treatment to increase and the Board ask all supporters of the Hospital to endeavour to interest their friends in the very necessary work which is being done. Though the campaign for National Fitness may do much good it will unfortunately be many years before this Hospital becomes unnecessary. In the meantime, the greater our Funds, the more work we can do.



THE SIXTY-NINTH ANNUAL GENERAL MEETING

The Secretary read the notice convening the meeting.

The minutes of the previous meeting dated 12th July, 1937, which had been circulated, were confirmed.

In moving that the Report of the Board of Management and the Audited Statement of Accounts for the year ended 31st December, 1937, be received, adopted and circulated amongst the Governors, Subscribers and Friends of the Hospital the President said:—

“The accounts for the year showed a deficit of some £700 but you may remember that when addressing you last year I forecast a considerable deficit for 1937 as much of the work undertaken in the latter half of 1936 had to be paid for in 1937. As the Honorary Treasurer will be dealing with the accounts in detail I will only say that I consider the position satisfactory, and that the increasing number of Subscribers is most encouraging.”

The President reminded the meeting that, last year, he had referred to the shortage of Nurses and had expressed the opinion that hours of work must be curtailed. He then said that during the year under review the Board of Management had sanctioned the employment of four additional Nurses in order to reduce the Nurses' hours of duty to 48 hours per week, but that this, unfortunately, had not had the desired effect as the difficulty of obtaining Nurses was greater than ever, and he felt that Nurses, in addition to shorter hours, desired greater freedom to live their own lives when off duty. A further move to improve the position of our Nurses had been the joining by the Hospital of the Federated Superannuation Scheme for Nurses and Hospital Officers, a contributory pension scheme (the Hospital paying two-thirds and the individual one-third of the premium) which allows of migration from one Hospital to another. Thus a Nurse under this scheme may, at the age of 55, draw a pension although she may not have been with any one Hospital for more than a year or two.

The President then said:—“Two years ago I mentioned that it would be very interesting if we could keep in touch with our ex-patients and see how they fared after leaving the Hospital. During the latter half of 1937 experiments had been made in collecting information and these were so successful that in January, 1938, it was decided to institute a properly-organised “follow-up” on all patients who had left the Hospital since January, 1934. The results will be published annually, commencing next year, and should be of great interest to us all. It has already been discovered that of the 354 patients discharged in 1934, 65% are doing a full day's work whilst a further 12% are doing part-time work, a very satisfactory evidence of the value of the treatment afforded by the Hospital.”

The word “treatment” reminded the President of another development, namely, the appointment of a fourth Medical Officer. The work entailed by modern methods of treatment had grown so enormously that our previous Staff of three Doctors was becoming very much over-worked and so the Board of Management had appointed an additional Doctor in September last.



In conclusion the President said :—" The four things I have mentioned, namely additional Nurses, the Pension Scheme, the " follow-up " system, and the employment of a fourth Medical Officer were all necessary and in keeping with the steady development of the Hospital. They mean, however, additional expense and remembering the rising cost of living which is affecting our Bills for provisions, and also our wages bill, we must realise that our expenditure is likely to increase considerably. The number of our supporters grows every year, but does not grow fast enough, and I would ask all of our friends to endeavour to enlist as much support for us as possible. We cannot stand still, we must progress, and to progress we need every bit of help and encouragement we can get."

COLONEL LEAF, in supporting the motion, referred to the very valuable work which MR. NUNN had continued to do during the past year, the most striking item of which was the erection of permanent buildings for the linen-room, Hospital Shop, and garage ; he had also undertaken many improvements in the grounds for which it was impossible adequately to express appreciation. During the year a cinematograph had been installed and the weekly performances were much appreciated by both patients and staff.

MR. BURMESTER, in seconding the motion, said that the President had already said that the deficit was largely due to work of 1936 being paid for in 1937. He then gave explanations of the various fluctuations in income and expenditure which are incorporated in the report of the Board of Management.

The motion was then put to the meeting and carried unanimously.

MR. CUTHBERT BURGOYNE proposed, MR. W. J. THOMPSON seconded, and it was unanimously agreed that MR. J. W. STANLEY BURMESTER, F.R.I.B.A., be re-elected Honorary Treasurer for the ensuing year.

It was proposed by MR. S. HAROLD HARGROVE, seconded by COLONEL Z. G. BURMESTER, and unanimously agreed that the following members of the Board of Management, who retire by rotation, be re-elected, namely :— DR. ROBERT ARMSTRONG, MR. CUTHBERT BURGOYNE, MR. A. TUDOR EDWARDS, DR. ARTHUR G. PHEAR, C.B., DR. R. L. RAWLINSON, MR. W. J. THOMPSON, DR. C. D. WILKINSON, and the HONBLE. SIR FREDERICK W. YOUNG.

MR. HARRIS proposed, MR. JOHN BURGOYNE seconded, and it was unanimously agreed that SIR W. HARRY PEAT, K.B.E., of the firm of Peat, Marwick, Mitchell & Co., of London, Fellow of the Institute of Chartered Accountants, be re-elected Honorary Auditor for the ensuing year, and in passing this motion it was also resolved to pass a very hearty vote of thanks to SIR W. HARRY PEAT for his services.

In proposing a very hearty vote of thanks to the Honorary Medical and Surgical Staff and to the Honorary Medical Referees throughout the Country, the HONBLE. L. W. JOYNSON-HICKS said that it was impossible to over-estimate the value of the services rendered by these gentlemen. He felt that the Salaried Staff would be the first to join in this vote of thanks as he knew how much they appreciated the help, encouragement and advice received from the Honorary Staff. MR. OLLERENSHAW seconded the motion which was carried unanimously.

DR. SYMES-THOMPSON, in replying, stated that despite the drawbacks of an old building the Board and Governors could rest assured that the work of the Hospital bore favourable comparison with that of any Chest Hospital in the Country. He knew that he was speaking for his medical colleagues when he said that it was a pleasure to work with a Board of Management as sympathetic and a Staff as keen as that attached to this Hospital.

LORD EBBISHAM proposed a vote of thanks to the Staff, which was carried unanimously, and to which the Medical Superintendent replied.

LORD EBBISHAM felt that he could not let the meeting close without proposing a vote of thanks to COLONEL LEAF and MR. NUNN who were indefatigable in their work for the Hospital. This was carried with acclamation.

The meeting terminated with a very hearty vote of thanks to LORD EBBISHAM for his kindness in presiding.

## THE HAMILTON TRUST FUNDS.

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The "Frederick Fund" and the "Hamilton Fund" were established through the generosity of the late Mrs. Frederick Hamilton; the former by Deed of Gift, dated 5th September, 1872, for the purpose of "receiving gratuitously, subject to the rules of the charity for the time being, clergymen holding Evangelical opinions and of Christian character, and widows of clergymen, or unmarried daughters of clergymen, or other deserving persons of respectable character, who cannot well afford the expense as patients in the said Hospital." The latter was received in 1891, in accordance with her Will, for "the purpose of receiving gratuitously into the Hospital poor persons of respectable character."

Forms of application for the benefit of these funds are issued to Governors of the Hospital only, and may be obtained by Governors from the Secretary on application at the London Office, 18, Buckingham Street, Strand, London, W.C.2, and, when filled up, must be returned to the Secretary, together with a Governor's Letter of Recommendation and a Medical Certificate (the forms for which can also be obtained from a Governor). They will be considered in rotation, and the most deserving cases selected by the Board of Management.

## EXTRACTS FROM THE ROYAL CHARTER OF INCORPORATION.

### *Incorporation.*

1.—For the purpose of maintaining and carrying on or extending its work and objects a Corporation consisting of a President and Governors shall be and is hereby Founded and Constituted by the name and style of “The President and Governors of the Royal National Hospital for Consumption and Diseases of the Chest, on the Separate Principle,” and shall by the same name have perpetual succession and a Common Seal. And by the name aforesaid to sue and be sued, and to do all other matters incidental or appertaining to a Body Corporate.

### *President.*

4.—On the occurrence of any vacancy in the office of President of the said Hospital, the Governors of the said Hospital at the next or any subsequent General Meeting of the Governors to be held as hereinafter provided, shall have the power to elect some person to supply such vacancy, who shall hold office for one year, but be eligible for re-election at the next subsequent and following Annual General Meeting of Governors.

### *Governors.*

5.—A vacancy in the office of President shall not affect the existence or title of the said Corporation, or the powers of the Board of Governors thereof.

6.—The several persons who are Governors of the said Hospital at the date of this Our Charter shall be Governors thereof during their lives or until resignation or disqualification.

7.—Every person elected or becoming in manner hereinafter provided a Governor or Honorary Governor of the said Hospital shall immediately become and be either for life or for a limited time a member of the said Corporation, with the right of exercising all the privileges belonging to a Governor.

17.—Persons who have conferred signal benefits on the Hospital may on the recommendation of the Board be elected Honorary Life Governors at the Annual Meeting of Governors.

18.—The privileges of Governors and Honorary Governors shall be fixed, prescribed, and varied as the Governors in Annual Meeting shall from time to time determine, and they shall be empowered from time to time to make and vary By-laws for the above purpose.

19.—The foregoing provisions as to the qualifications and privileges of Life and Annual Governors shall be subject to any alteration to be made under any By-laws relating to the said Hospital to be made as hereinafter provided.



# BY-LAWS

OF THE

## ROYAL NATIONAL HOSPITAL FOR CONSUMPTION AND DISEASES OF THE CHEST

ON THE SEPARATE PRINCIPLE

IN RESPECT OF

*Qualifications and Privileges of Governors and Honorary Governors.*

7.—The qualifications for becoming a Governor, the periods for which the respective qualifications last, and the privileges during those periods shall be as follows :—

8.—Executors or Trustees of Wills who contribute to the Hospital, under a power giving them discretion to select the Charitable Institution or Institutions to be benefited, shall be entitled to nominate one of their number to receive the privileges such person would have been entitled to if the actual donor of the contribution.

9.—Any clergyman, minister, or other person who has by collection obtained for the Hospital sums amounting to not less than One hundred Guineas within three years, may be elected a Governor for life, or any less period, with the privilege of recommending one patient annually for every One hundred Guineas collected, but not exceeding three patients at any one time.

10.—The privileges of Governors shall be exercised subject to any "Regulations as to admission of Patients" from time to time in force.



11.—Every Governor (including an Honorary Governor) shall have, at a General Meeting of Governors, the same number of votes as the number of patients he is entitled to recommend in the year in which the Meeting is held, but not exceeding three votes in all. A Governor entitled to have always one patient in the Hospital shall have three votes, and a Governor entitled to have always three patients in the Hospital shall have five votes.

12.—In the case of a Firm, Corporation, Company, or Society being a Governor, a member of the Firm or officer of the Corporation, Company, or Society may be deputed to attend the General Meeting of Governors, and to vote in the name of such Firm, Corporation, Company, or Society.

13.—The Board may at any time grant special privileges in consideration of a donation of not less than One thousand Pounds. Such privileges need not be of the nature prescribed by these By-laws, and they may be granted either to the donor or to some other person nominated by the donor for the purpose but in no case shall they confer the right to more than five votes.

14.—No Governor shall be entitled to vote at any General Meeting unless he shall have been qualified as a Governor for the period of six months

15.—No Annual Governor whose subscription is in arrear shall be entitled to recommend a Patient, or vote at any General Meeting.

16.—Annual Subscriptions shall be considered to fall due in each year on the date of payment of the first subscription.

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## ANNUAL SUBSCRIPTIONS.

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An Annual Subscription of £5 5s. constitutes the qualification of a Governor, and it is the intention of the Royal Charter that an Annual Governor shall be one who will continue this subscription yearly.

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## ISSUE OF LETTERS OF RECOMMENDATION

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Letters of Recommendation are issued as they become due to Governors, who are respectfully requested to be so good as to reserve their Letters (as far as possible) for those patients in whom they are directly interested.

Governors are reminded of the great advantages available at this Institution (with its unrivalled situation in the Undercliff of the Isle of Wight) for patients who are unable to meet the usual cost of treatment, at a private sanatorium.

Letters not required will be gratefully received at the London Office. Deserving applicants will thus be assisted in obtaining admission to the Hospital.

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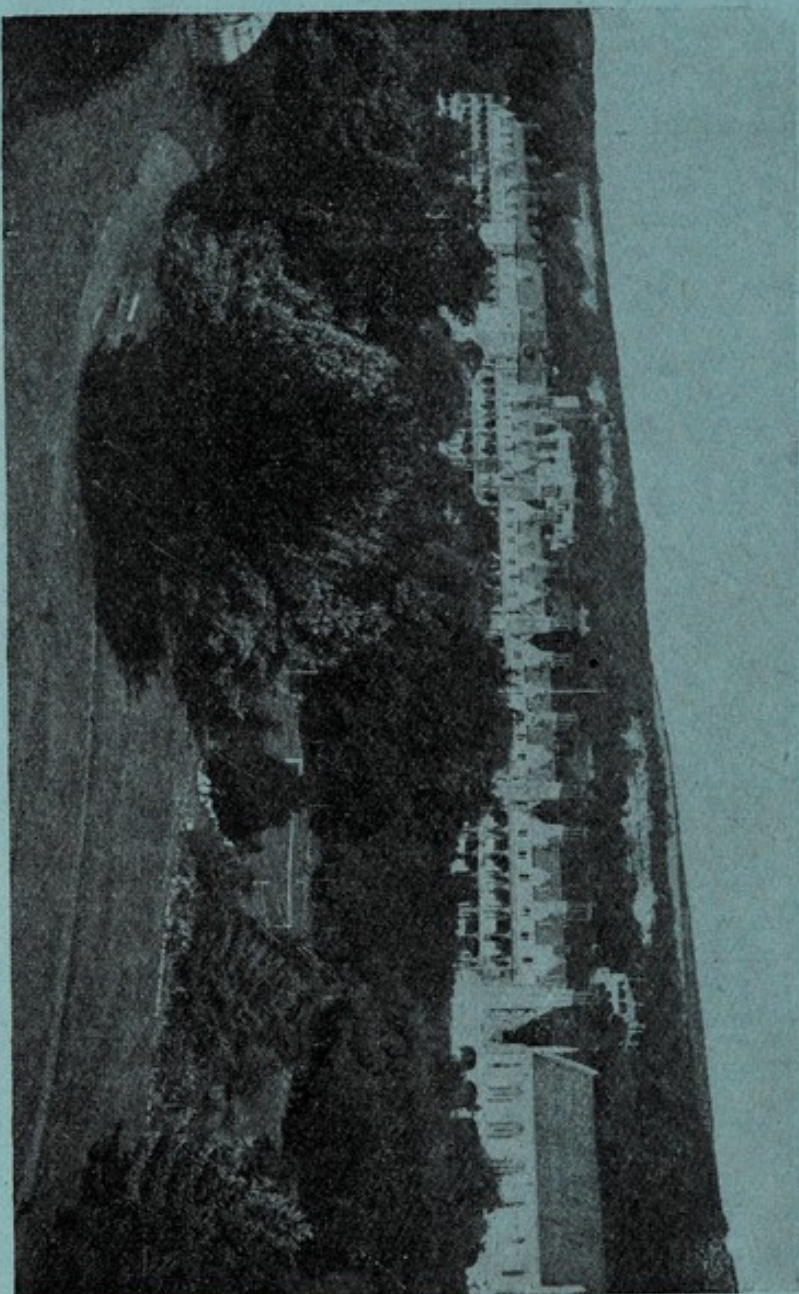
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
