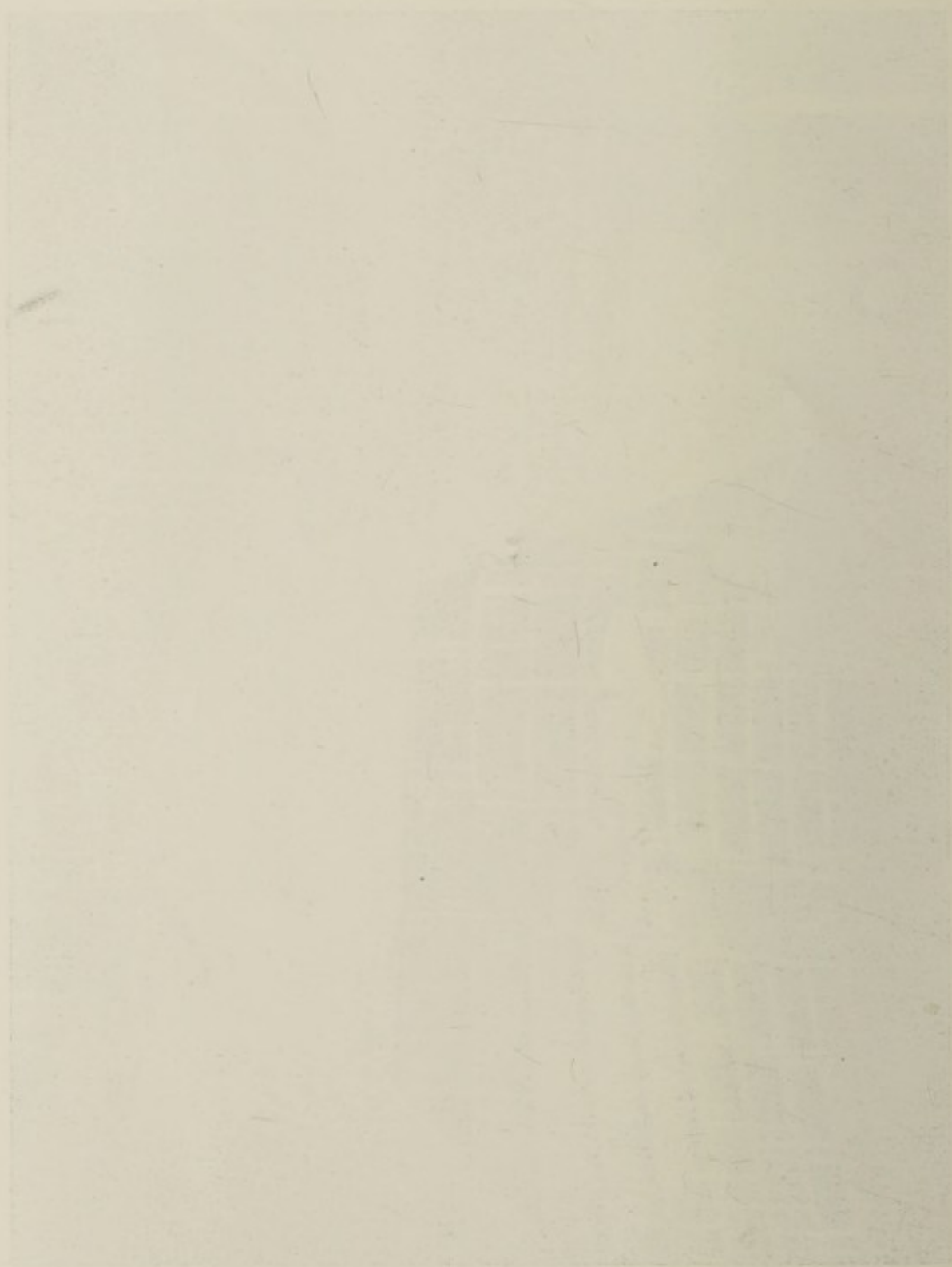


MALE WARD.



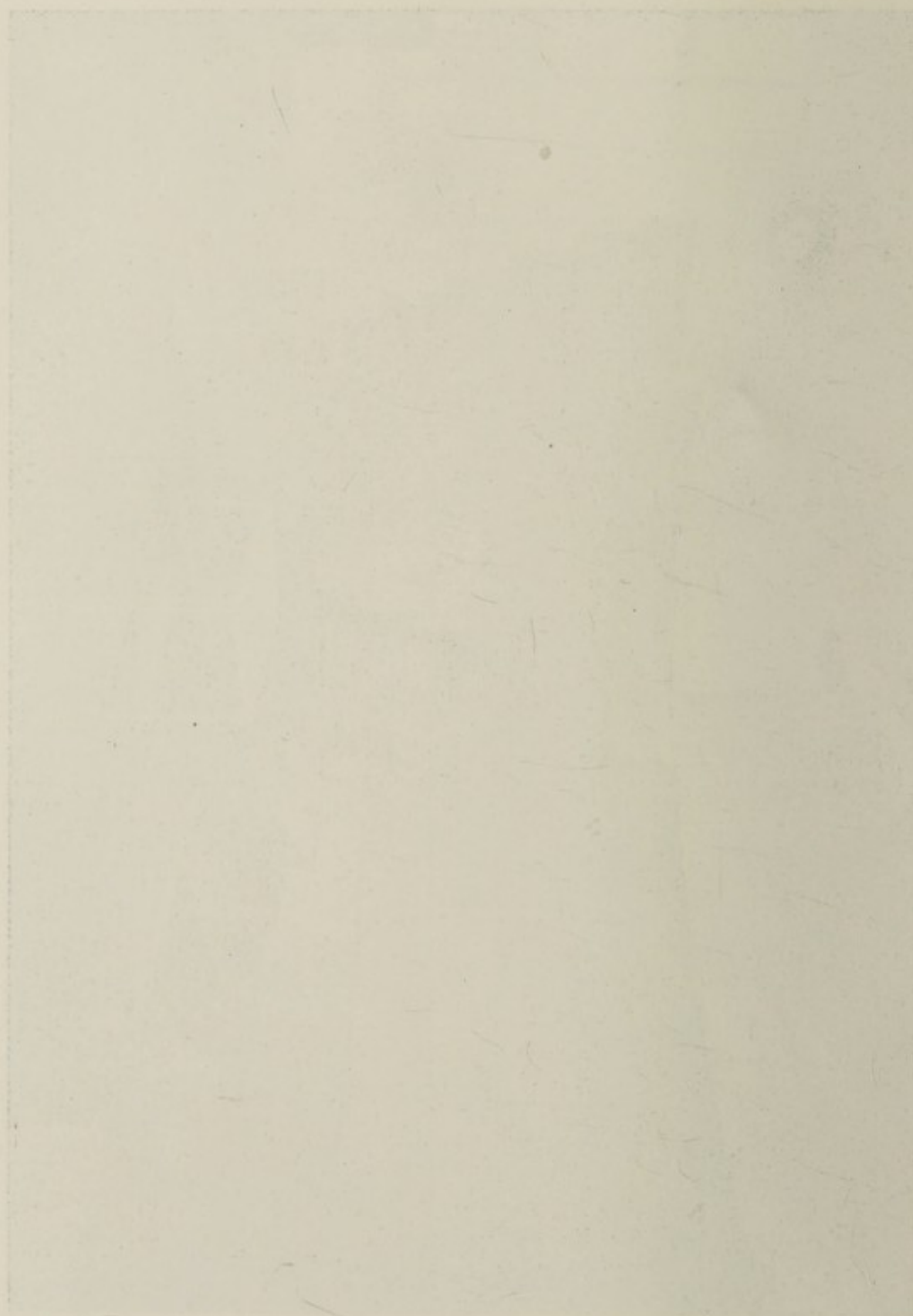


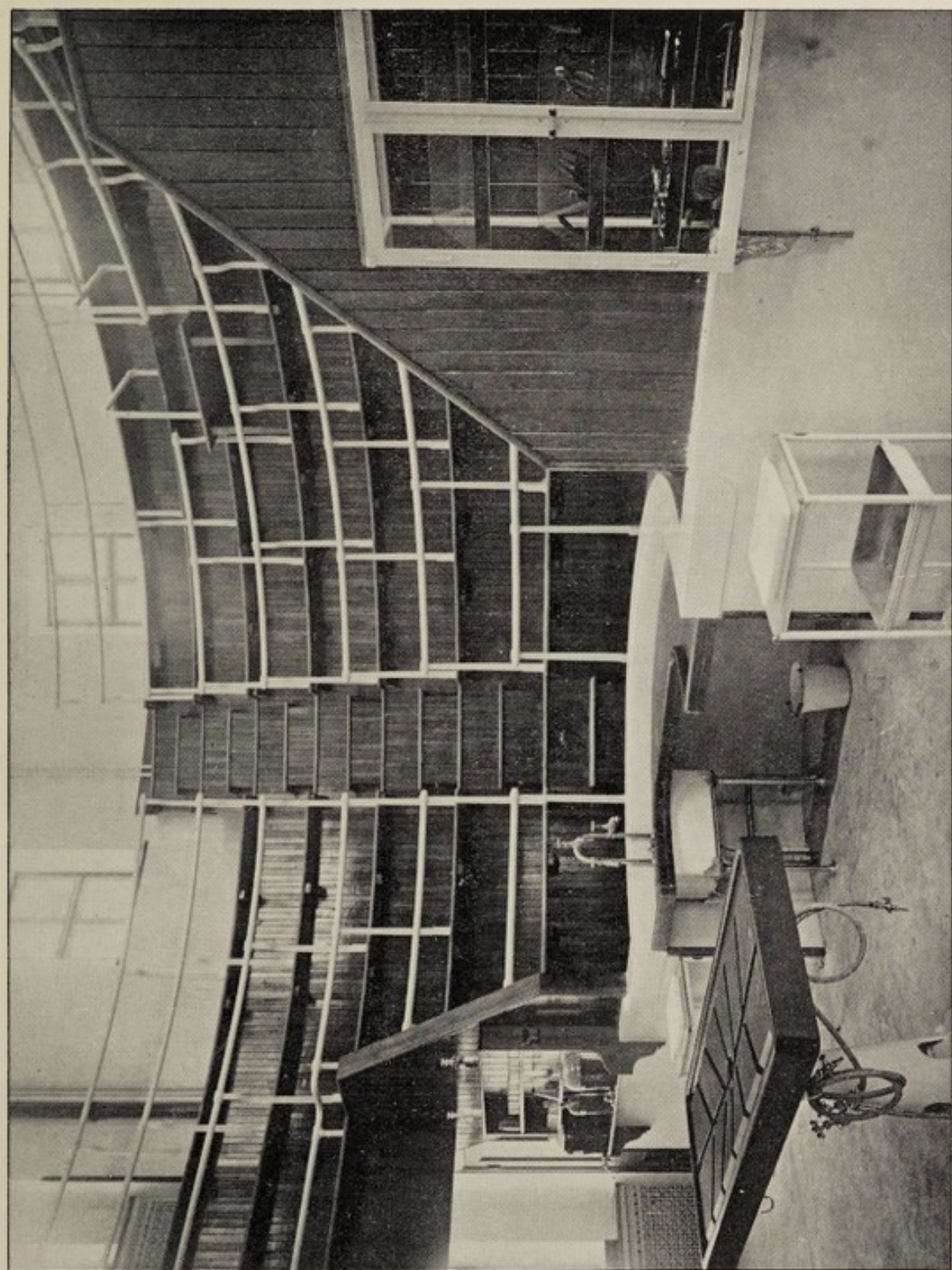
OPERATING THEATRE.



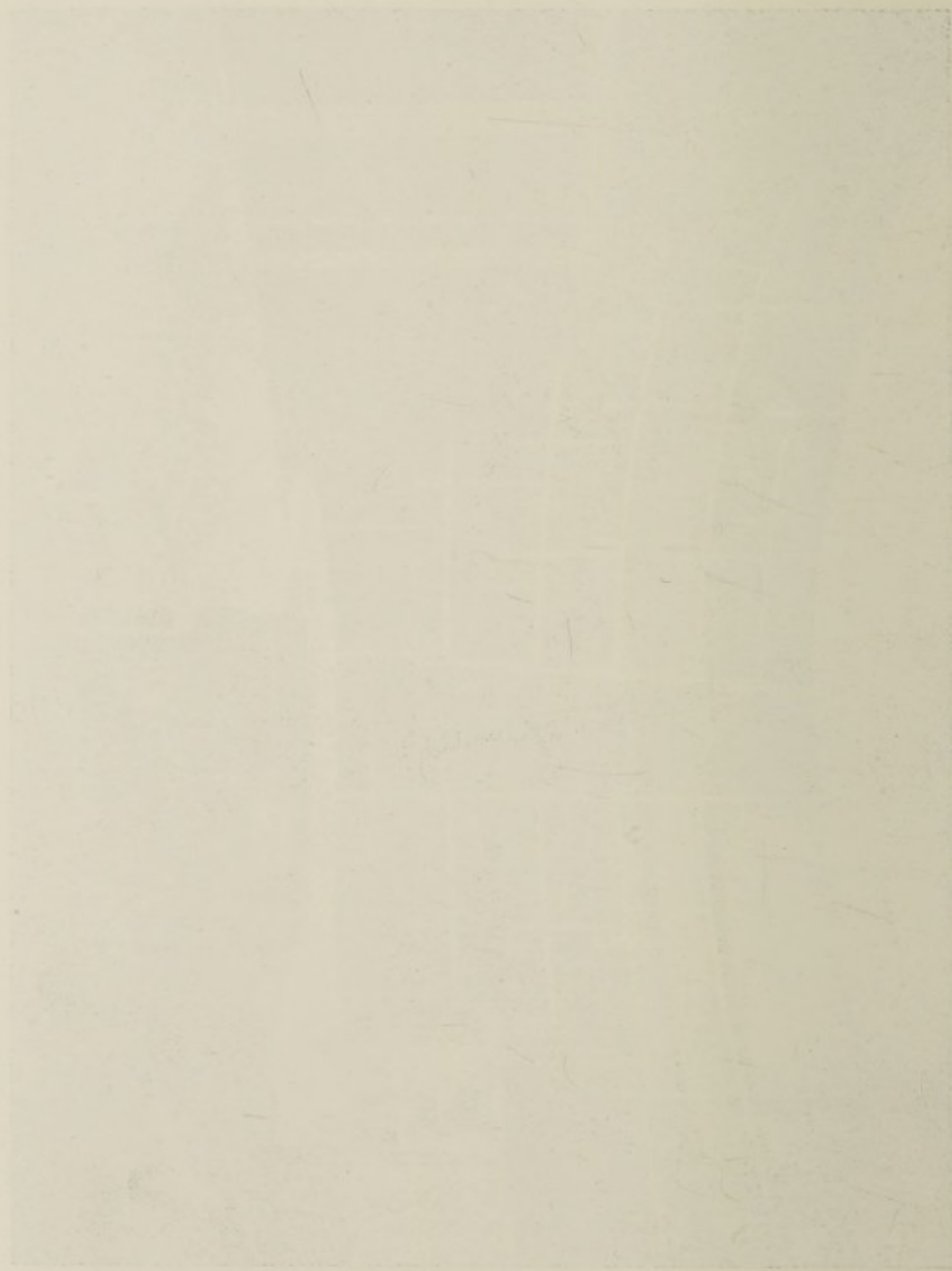

To the Governors of

The Royal Victoria Hospital :

GENTLEMEN,

I have the honor to submit herewith the first Annual Report of the Royal Victoria Hospital.

The hospital opened its doors on the 2nd January, 1894, with accommodation for 146 patients. On the 5th October, by the opening of three more wards, the capacity of the hospital was increased to 180 beds, distributed as follows: Medical Department, male 30, female 30, children 10; Surgical Department, male 30, female 30, children 14; Gynæcological Department, female 20; Private wards 16.

There are three wards, with 80 beds, yet unopened. When these are occupied the hospital will be at its full capacity of 260 beds.

Until the 14th April, the work of the hospital was carried on under the direction of Drs. Stewart, Roddick and Adami; on that day the following appointments were made to the attending staff: Dr. James Bell, surgeon; Dr. F. Buller, ophthalmologist and otologist; Dr. W. Gardner, gynæcologist, and Dr. F. W. Hamilton, assistant physician; and on the 16th October, Dr. A. W. Gardner was appointed assistant gynæcologist.

The attendance of patients at the out-door department has been quite large, and greatly in excess of what was anticipated.

The Pathological Building was opened in October, and has proved an invaluable addition to the hospital, its arrangement and equipment being most suitable and complete in every respect.

There have been admitted into the hospital during the year, 1570 patients ; of these 1345 were discharged ; 776 cured, 401 improved, 97 unimproved, 71 not treated, 84 died, and 141 remained.

Of the 84 deaths, 20 took place within 48 hours of admittance.

The death-rate for the year has been 5.9 per cent., or, after deducting those who died within 2 days after admittance, 4.5 per cent.

There were 861 males, 709 females ; 1017 Protestants, 501 Roman Catholics, 52 other religions ; 1102 free patients, 300 public pay patients at fifty cents per day, and 168 private patients.

The average number of days in hospital per patient was 29.3 ; the medical being 29, the surgical 29, the gynæcological 32.4, and the eye-and-ear 25.6 days per patient.

The largest number of patients in the hospital on any one day was 180, the smallest 7, this latter being the number admitted on the first day of its opening.

The number of out-door consultations for the six months ending 31st December, was 4792 :—medical 1795, surgical 990, eye-and-ear 1310, diseases of women 697.

The income for the year amounted to \$70,480.54, while the expenses were \$65,134.72, as set out in the accompanying statement.

The cost per patient per day was \$1.42. This, however, is higher than it will be hereafter, the expenditure for management and domestic purposes having been necessarily almost as large for the small number of patients in the hospital at the commencement as will be incurred when the hospital is fully occupied. Other expenses incidental to the first year, also contributed to this result.

The heating and ventilation of the buildings have been most satisfactory during the past year ; the large wards have been very free from odor, and the temperature quite as high as was necessary. On the 24th February last, when the outside temperature reached as low as 20° below zero, the ward thermometers registered from 67° to 70°. The lighting of the buildings by electricity produced by the hospital plant, has also been very satisfactory.

The expenditure on the fuel necessary to produce these results has been large, but in view of the detached character of the buildings, the large quantity of air passing through the wards and corridors, and the lavish amount of light, it is easily accounted for.

To meet the probable financial requirements of the hospital over and above its fixed income, the founders, Lord Mount Stephen and Sir Donald A. Smith,

K.C.M.G. on the 18th June last very generously contributed \$20,000 each, which as will be observed by the accompanying balance sheet, has been more than sufficient to cover the expenditure.

The thanks of the hospital are due to the ladies and gentlemen mentioned in the accompanying list of donations for the presents received from them during the year, and also to Miss Angus, Mr. and Mrs. E. S. Clouston, Miss Duck, Miss Esdaile, Mr. A. Hodgson, Miss Paterson, Mr. Henry Robinson, Mrs. Shaughnessy, and Mr. D. Watson for their kind assistance at the Christmas festivities to the patients.

I append statements of the work done in the hospital during the year.

To the Board of Governors

Royal Victoria Hospital.

GENTLEMEN :

The First Annual Report of the Training School in connection with this Hospital must of necessity be brief, as the School has been organized so short a time.

In January last we opened with twelve nurses—graduates of different schools—but the number of patients admitted during that month being greater than was anticipated, the staff was rapidly increased.

In March the class for pupil-nurses was organized, and probationers accepted. It was not deemed advisable, however, to begin the lecture course until October.

From October 1st, 1894, to January 1st, 1895, the following lectures have been delivered :

Three on Physiology, by Drs. Adami and Martin.

Three on Hygiene, by Dr. Craik.

Five on Diseases, by Dr. Stewart.

The nurses' library has been generously supplied with medical works by members of the Board, and with lighter reading, for hours "off duty," by Mr. S. Coulson.

During the year we have received 350 applications for admission into the Nursing School ; of these, thirty-four were accepted as probationers, and twenty-six retained as pupil-nurses.

Twenty-three graduate nurses have also been engaged at different times, six coming for post-graduate course of a year. Ten are still remaining with us.

The health of the school has been uniformly good, no case of serious illness occurring during the year.

As the practical training of the pupils depends so largely on the head nurses, and the general tone of the school is materially influenced by them, the plan of selecting head nurses from amongst graduates, and appointing pupils in exceptional cases only, is considered the best method of organizing a school, and the one which we have adopted and hope to retain as its advantages become apparent.

As an important part of the work for the coming year, I would strongly urge the necessity of a Diet Kitchen, where the nurses may receive practical instruction in preparing food and delicacies for the sick. This branch of training is universally recognized to be of the utmost importance in a nurse's education, and no school is complete without it.

In order that the training to be obtained here may be equal to that of the best schools anywhere else, we hope that this necessary addition may soon be included in our course of instruction, thus enabling us to send out nurses who will be doubly valuable to patients, both amongst the rich and poor.

Rules.

RULES RESPECTING THE ADMISSION OF PATIENTS.

Patients residing in the City or Parish of Montreal, and especially those who are in indigent circumstances and wholly or partially unable to provide medical treatment for themselves, may be admitted to the benefits of the Hospital ; such as are unable to pay for their maintenance as "free patients," and such as are able to pay as "pay patients," for such consideration as may be arranged with the Superintendent on their admission. Patients from other districts, when it is deemed advisable by the Chairman of the House Committee, may be admitted on similar terms, on the recommendation of a member of the Medical Board.

Patients suffering from severe accidents or serious illness shall be admitted to the Hospital at any hour of the day or night. Other patients shall be admitted at such hours as may from time to time be decided upon. They must apply in person at the Hospital, when they will be examined and passed for admission by the House Physician or Surgeon on duty ; or, if unable to apply in person, they shall be visited at their homes by one of the House Physicians or Surgeons.

Any member of the Medical Board may send to the Hospital such patients from the City as he may see fit, with a written order for admission.

No patient shall be admitted to the Hospital whose case shall be considered incurable, or infectious, or who is insane, or whose case does not require the particular benefit of an indoor practice.

No children under two years of age, except in cases requiring special treatment, shall be admitted into the Hospital.

RULES FOR VISITORS.

Visitors will be admitted to the wards on Sundays from 3 to 4:30 p. m., and Wednesdays and Fridays from 3 to 4 p. m., and at no other time except by special permission of the Superintendent.

No more than two visitors will be admitted at once, to see any patient.

Visitors must observe perfect order and propriety while in the hospital ; must confine their visits to their immediate friends ; must not stop or loiter in the halls, corridors or offices, or on the stairways, and must leave the building promptly at the end of the visiting hours.

RULES RESPECTING RELIGIOUS MINISTRATIONS.

Clergymen, ministers of religion, and the authorized representatives of religious bodies, shall be admitted to the wards upon terms of equality for the purpose of visiting and extending religious ministrations to the sick inmates of their own creed or denomination, at such times and under such conditions as in the judgment of the Superintendent will not unduly interfere with the medical or surgical treatment and care of the patients ; they are, however, to confine their conversation to persons of their own creed or denomination, and to refrain from addressing or distributing books or pamphlets to other patients, unless by special invitation of the same when conveyed through, or with the sanction of, the Superintendent.
