

# THE 111th ANNUAL REPORT of the Committee.

### To the Governors and Friends of the Hospital.

The Committee have pleasure in submitting the Annual Report for the past year. The year 1938 has been one of marked improvement and progress in several directions.

### BROADCAST APPEAL

On the 13th February, a Broadcast Appeal was made by our President, Lord Willingdon, with the twofold object of raising funds to improve the kitchens and to provide adequate accommodation for the Nursing Staff. Although the result of the Appeal, which amounted to £431 10s. 10d., was somewhat disappointing, the sincere thanks of the Committee are tendered both to Lord Willingdon, for his kindness in broadcasting on our behalf, and to the many kind friends who responded, and the Committee are proud to announce that both the aims of the Appeal have been realised.

### NEW KITCHEN.

For many years the Committee have had constantly before them the great need for extending and improving the apparatus and the conditions in the Hospital kitchens.

After careful consideration, it was decided to construct a gas equipped kitchen under the new wards. The alterations and decorations were carried out by Messrs. T. Francis and Son, and the equipment supplied by the Dover Gas Company, who very kindly gave us appliances to the value of about £40, for which we thank them very much. A long-needed refrigerator was installed, and, through the kind efforts of the pupils of Oakleigh House School, an electric potato peeler was added. In September last, at the time of the international crisis, it became very evident that certain precautions must be taken to safeguard the patients and staff at the Hospital, and also, in the interests of all the community, that preparation for future eventualities should be carried out. On the urgent recommendation of the Hon. Medical Staff, structural alterations were carried out to convert the old kitchen and scullery into an emergency Casualty Department and Operating Theatre, which would be splinter and gas proof.

Another heavy item was the cost of fitting dark blinds, wire netting and cellophane to all windows.

During the crisis in September the Earl and Countess of Guilford offered the Committee the free use of their Mansion at Waldershare

Park as a hospital in the event of war. Since then the mansion has been viewed, and is considered an ideal building for a hospital. The Committee have accepted, and wish to express their grateful thanks to Lord and Lady Guilford for their most generous and patriotic offer.

### NURSES' HOME.

For some time past the accommodation for the Nurses has been very inadequate and unsuitable and on several occasions probationers have decided not to train at Dover Hospital on this account. In November last, the Committee were fortunate in acquiring a Lease of the R. V. Coleman Convalescent Home at Buckland for use as a Nurses' Home. The building is a modern one, and provides separate bedroom accommodation for 30 nurses, and has numerous bath rooms, a recreation room, and sitting rooms. The Nurses moved into their new quarters on the 1st December, and it is hoped that some of the difficulties in obtaining suitable staff will thus be overcome.

A hearty vote of thanks is again extended to all the members of the Hon. Medical Staff for their valuable services so freely given during the past year, for without such skill and devoted attention the benefits of the Institution could no longer be maintained. The following doctors are included in this expression of appreciation:—Dr. J. R. W. Richardson, Dr. W. B. Laird, and Dr. C. P. K. Toland (Hon. Physicians); Mr. T. J. Cobbe, Mrs. G. M. B. Toland and Mr. J. Brown (Hon. Surgeons); Dr. D. W. McLean (Hon. Ophthalmic Surgeon); Mr. C. H. Adamson (Ear, Nose and Throat Department); Mr. J. Brown (Orthopædic Department); Dr. A. C. Rusack (Radiologist); and Mr. F. P. Sturdee, L.D.S. (Hon. Dental Surgeon).

The Committee also wish to thank the following for their loyal services:—The Resident Medical Officers, Matron and the Nursing Staff, Miss Young (Masseuse), Miss M. Johnston (Radiographer), and Mr. G. Petchey, M.P.S. (Dispenser).

The Committee take this opportunity of placing on record their sincere appreciation of the immense amount of splendid work performed by Dr. J. A. Menzies during a period of 36 years. Dr. Menzies was appointed Hon. Ophthalmic Surgeon to this Hospital in 1903, and for many years treated cases not only from Dover and district, but from Deal, Sandwich and adjoining villages. Not only the Committee, but a very great number of patients, have just cause to be intensely grateful to Dr. Menzies for his highly skilled attention and care. It is now proposed to place Dr. Menzies' name on the list of Hon. Consulting Medical Officers.

### THE MEDICAL REPORT.

The Medical Report for 1938 shows a small decrease in the number of In-patients, and a continued and more substantial decrease in Out-patients and Casualty Cases, together with a

consequent decrease in the number of dressings and of Out-patient attendances. On the other hand, it will be observed that the attendances in the Specialist Departments have been very well maintained, which is satisfactory, as the provision of specialist treatment is one of the main objects of a hospital.

With regard to the cost of treatment, it will be noted on looking at the Abstract of Accounts that there has again been a considerable but unavoidable increase in salaries of Nursing and Domestic Staff, due to the curtailment of working hours and the ever-increasing problem of obtaining nurses. The natural outcome of this is the increase in cost of treatment in each department.

### THE FINANCE OF THE HOSPITAL.

The total income for 1938 amounted to £10,302 10s. 5d., compared with £9,159 15s. 10d. in 1937—an increase of £1,142 14s. 7d.

We have received, with deep gratitude, a most welcome contribution of £700 from the Mayor's Hospital Fund. This splendid gift has enabled the deficit on the ordinary income and expenditure account to be greatly reduced, and the Committee extend their sincere thanks to the Mayor and to all who have helped to make the contribution possible.

The Annual Fête, which this year was supplemented by a successful Carnival, again resulted in a large amount being handed over to the Hospital, the sum of £800 being received—an increase of £175 on last year. The Committee wish to express once again to the Fête and Carnival Committees and the many helpers their gratitude and their hearty congratulations on the success of their efforts.

The receipts from the Wireless Appeal have already been referred to.

The "Peace Thank-Offering Fund" amounted to £74 1s. 6d., and has been deducted from the cost of the air raid precautions taken during the crisis in September. There was still, however, a balance of £213 5s. 8d., which had to be met from general income.

The total expenditure for the year amounted to £10,968 9s. 10d., which is an increase of £471 4s. 11d. over 1937. This leaves a deficit on the year's working of £665 19s. 5d. As against this, legacies have been received amounting to £1,125. There is an urgent need for greatly increased income from ordinary sources to meet the growing expenditure, and the Committee very much regret that some legacies have again to be appropriated for general purposes.

During the past year the League came to our assistance and defrayed the cost of the Linen which was purchased outright from the Coleman Home for the use of the Nurses.

With each succeeding year, the services of the League become more indispensable, nor must the valuable work of the weekly Sewing Party, conducted by Mrs. Dixon, be overlooked; and, in expressing our thanks to the President, Members and Subscribers of the League, the Committee hope for their continued help, and wish them every success in 1939.

### OBITUARY.

It is with great regret that we have to record the death of Mr. E. W. Ewell, a member of our General Committee. Mr. Ewell will long be remembered for his excellent work in the X-ray Department. After the death of Dr. Howden in 1923, Mr. Ewell worked as Radiographer in charge of the Department until 1934, when Dr. Garton came to Dover and was appointed Radiologist at the Hospital. The Committee record their appreciation of Mr. Ewell's work and his many kind services to the patients, and his general interest in the work of the Institution.

The Committee sustained a further loss by the death, in August last, at the Hospital, of Miss A. G. Petley, who had been a member of the Committee for fourteen years. Her work for the Hospital and her interest in Hospital affairs was greatly appreciated.

### STAFF.

In August last, Dr. Marinker and Dr. Whyte resigned, and Dr. P. Wilson and Dr. A. Beare succeeded them as Resident Medical Officers. Sister Thornley left us in October, after thirteen years' service, in order to take up the post of Matron at St. Helier's Hospital, Jersey. The Committee would like to thank Miss Thornley for her past services, and to congratulate her on her new appointment.

Lastly, the Committee wish to place on record their appreciation and thanks to all who have assisted the work of the Hospital by service, donations and gifts. # ANNUAL REPORT, 1938.

Your Committee have pleasure in presenting to you the Annual Report for 1938.

During the year ending December 31st, the amount collected was £2,519. Of this, £2,356 was handed over to the Treasurer of the Hospital, an increase on the previous year. During the past year, 1,213 of our contributors and their dependents received treatment at the Hospital.

In September, Messrs. Currys held a Radio Exhibition at the Town Hall, and very kindly gave permission to the Committee to make a small charge of admission for the last three days. The takings amounted to £22 4s. 6d., and the Committee wish to place on record their sincere thanks to Messrs. Curry and their Staff, and to the Matron and Nurses who so kindly assisted.

Funds are still urgently needed, not only for the current expenses of the Hospital, but also to bring all its equipment up to the high standard required by modern medicine and surgery. The Committee are confident that all contributors will continue their efforts, and appeal to them to do their utmost to obtain additional contributors, either as Box Holders or through their Employers.

The Box Stewards took their usual prominent part in the Hospital Fête held in August, and nearly £100 was handed in by them to the Fête Treasurer. Our thanks are due to them and to many friends who so kindly helped us.

The issue of Household Boxes is increasing, and more Stewards are required. The Committee appeal to those ladies interested in Hospital work, with time at their disposal, to assist them by becoming a Steward. Any information required can be obtained from the Secretary's Office, at the Hospital.

The Committee once more desire to express their sincere thanks to the Box Stewards and Workers in aid of the Hospital, and trust to receive their continued support in the current year.

The President and Committee of the Linen League have pleasure in presenting the Twenty-first Annual Report of the year ending 31st December, 1938.

The Hon. Treasurer's Account shows a balance of £4 13s. 2d. The Linen League was fortunate in receiving the following unexpected donations:-Part proceeds of Rummage Sale, per the Countess of Guilford, £25 Os. Od.; donation, anonymous, per the Countess of Guilford, £5 0s. 0d.; Collecting Box, per the Countess of Guilford, £1 10s. 6d.; Royal St. George's Golf Club, per the Earl of Guilford, £35 0s. 0d.; donation, Open Golf Championship "Advertising Rights," per the Earl of Guilford, £5 5s. 0d.; Poland Charity Fund, per the Mayor of Dover (Alderman J. R. Cairns, J.P.), £2 2s. 0d.; Donation from the Mayoress's (Mrs. Cairns) Charity Fund, £1 1s. 0d.; Donation, British Legion Entertainment Committee, per Mr. Hambrook, £1 1s. 0d.; Café Chantant (cancelled owing to September crisis), donations towards same, £28 3s. 5d.; collected by Mrs. J. Walker, the Grand Hotel, £2 4s. 7d.; collected by Mrs. Cameron, £2 2s. 0d.; collected by the Linen League Sewing Party, per Mrs. Lawrence, £1 3s. 4d.; donation, The Scottish Laundry, Ltd., per Mr. Armstrong Payn, £2 2s. 0d.; Messrs. Killick and Back, per Mr. Taylor, 5s. 0d.; the Bodsham Fruit Store, per Mr. and Mrs. Blackman, 5s. 0d.; making a total of £112 4s. 7d. The Committee do sincerely thank all these kind friends for their generous help and support.

Subscriptions amounted to the sum of £104 6s. 0d. This is an advance of £25 during the last two years, but it still means that the income the Linen League can depend upon annually is just half the amount needed, if the equipment necessary for the upkeep of the Hospital beds is to be adequately supplied.

The balance carried forward for 1938 amounts to only £4 13s. 2d. The Committee does, therefore, beg that Members do all in their power to enlist the interest and help of their friends, and, if possible, add a few new names to the list of subscribers.

The Linen League was fortunate last year in buying goods at very reasonable prices from the auction sale at the Bevan Nursing Home, Sandgate, Matron went to the auction and got very good value for the sum of £21 13s. 6d. (See List.)

At Christmas time the Coleman Convalescent Home became the "Hospital Nurses' Home," and the Committee were again fortunate in purchasing all goods such as blankets, towels, quilts, curtains, etc., at a valuation for the sum of £61 19s. 9d. (See List.)

As a Christmas gift, the Linen League Committee presented each nurse for use in her own bedroom a bright coloured quilt and cushion.

The usual three Meetings have been held since the last General Meeting, when the needs of the Hospital were discussed and, as far as possible, supplied.

The Committee would like to thank Mrs. Dixon and Mrs. Llewellyn Langley for so efficiently organising the Working Party, which meets at the Hospital every Thursday to mend the torn linen and garments; also the following ladies:—Lady Bomford, Mrs. Cameron, Mrs. Dunford, Mrs. Eade, Mrs. Everett, Mrs. Lawrence, Mrs. Pelham, Mrs. Sharp, Mrs. Simmonds, Mrs. Slater and Mrs. Willis for their kind assistance.

The special thanks of the Committee are due to Mrs. Lawrence, who very cleverly realised that all the tiny scraps and pieces left over from the mending could be sold to the Buckland Paper Mill. Already the sum of £1 3s. 4d. has been collected in this way.

Mrs. W. E. Pearce, of Barton Road, very kindly presented the Working Party with a treadle machine; and the Misses Falloon, Temple Ewell, gave the Nurses a machine for their own use in their new Home.

The President would like to express the appreciation the Linen League feels to Mrs. Cundell, at St. Margaret's Bay, and Mrs. Chidwick, at Kearsney, for all the arduous work involved in the long list of subscribers from each of those places.

The linen collected by Mrs. Cundell has proved of inestimable value to the Hospital, and the Committee would be grateful if, perhaps, others could help in this way. A few of the Members have very kindly volunteered to have collecting boxes in aid of the Linen League in their homes. These boxes have already produced the sum of £3 15s. 1d. If anyone interested in the League would like to help in this way, would they kindly communicate with the Secretary?

Before concluding the Report, the President and Committee would like to thank all those who so generously help support the Linen League, both by gifts of money and garments, and so enable the League to maintain its useful work at the Hospital.

# ROYAL VICTORIA HOSPITAL, DOVER, LINEN LEAGUE.

The LEAGUE is formed for the following purposes:-

- (a) To provide House Linen, Garments, etc., for the use of the patients of the Hospital;
- (b) To take up any other work in connection with the Hospital which, from time to time, may commend itself to a General Meeting of the League.

### RULES.

- 1.—VICE-PRESIDENTS to subscribe not less than 5/- annually. To find at least four Associates. To supply Associates with patterns. To see that each Associate or Working Member sends in her work not later than 1st December. To forward the work with a complete list of articles, to the Matron, not later than 7th December. All subscriptions to be sent to the Hon. Treasurer by 1st December.
- 2.—Associates to subscribe not less than 2/6, and to give two garments annually. Patterns of garments (which must be followed accurately) to be obtained of the Vice-Presidents. All work and subscriptions to be forwarded to the Vice-Presidents not later than 1st December.
- 3.—Working Members to make (at least) two garments annually; all materials will be supplied by the League, through the Vice-Presidents. A voluntary subscription of not more than 1/- will be welcome.
- 4.—Those who do not wish to give linen or garments to be Honorary Members; to subscribe not less than 5/- annually. Gentlemen may become Honorary Members.
- 5.—All work to be exhibited at the Hospital once a year, at the Annual General Meeting in February when possible.
- 6.—Vice-Presidents, Associates and Members to prepay carriage of parcels.
- 7.—The President, Hon. Treasurer, Matron, Hon. Secretary, and at least three Vice-Presidents or Members shall together form an Executive Committee. They shall be elected annually at the General Meeting to be held in February. One ordinary Member of the Committee shall retire in rotation in each year, and shall not be eligible to serve again until the following year.
