THE 112th ANNUAL REPORT of the Committee.

To the Governors and Friends of the Hospital.

Owing to the War, in which this country has been involved for the past seven months, the work of Hospitals looms large in the public eye, and the Committee feel more than ever justified in taking this opportunity in presenting their Report for the year of bringing the needs of this Institution, which is our premier local charity, to the attention of the inhabitants of Dover and its neighbourhood, at the same time earnestly appealing, not only for a continuation, but for an increase of the support and interest accorded to the Hospital in the past.

It is recognised that constant demands are now being made on the charitable on behalf of our sailors, soldiers and airmen and their dependents, as well as many others who are suffering by reason of the war, but it must be agreed that on that account it will never do to allow our own Hospital to become inefficient or to languish for lack of support or sympathy.

Taking it for granted, then, that the work of the Hospital is essential, the Committee base their claim for special consideration at this time on two grounds—firstly, because of the excellent work that has been carried on in the past; and, secondly, on account of the efforts that are being made to keep the Institution thoroughly efficient.

The year 1939, now under review, started well as regards the work of the Hospital. The Nurses were installed in their new Home, and the new kitchen was proving satisfactory. War clouds, however, soon gathered, and in February the Committee decided to accept the generous offer of the Earl and Countess of Guilford of the free use of Waldershare Mansion as a Hospital in case of war. This plan was submitted to the Ministry of Health, who expressed their approval, and details with regard to the general working and transfer of patients were arranged. In the meantime we were approached by the Local Authorities, who wished to install a First Aid Post in our Out-Patient Block, and this Department was accordingly taken over on the outbreak of hostilities. At the same time, the In-Patients were transferred to Waldershare Mansion, together with nearly all the staff, and the Nurses' Home has been taken over for a Military Hospital. The Out-Patient work is being carried on in the main building near the Casualty Department, and the X-Ray, Massage and Administrative Departments continue in the old main block with a skeleton staff residing at Dover.

Mrs. G. Clark and ladies from the Garrison and many others gave great assistance in moving patients to Waldershare, and the Committee tender their sincere thanks and appreciation to all who worked so willingly at a time of great stress. Mrs. G. Clark most generously provided the Hospital with a Ford Utility Car, which was converted into an Ambulance, and which has been of the greatest service during a very trying winter. Mrs. Stevenson very kindly offered to drive the Ambulance in a voluntary capacity, and her services are very much appreciated.

The Committee wish once more to acknowledge publicly their great debt of gratitude to the Earl and Countess of Guilford for the loan of the Mansion as a Hospital at a time of strain and anxiety, and for their many additional gifts and acts of kindness.

Mrs. Arthur Harby, who was the Hon. Treasurer for many years, has rendered very valuable help in consenting to act temporarily as Assistant Hon. Treasurer at a time when the book-keeping is necessarily more arduous.

Mrs. H. W. Youden has given her services daily since the outbreak of the war, in the X-Ray Department. Having previously made herself familiar with the work, she became invaluable when the severe weather prevented the regular staff from attending, and the Medical Staff and patients, as well as the Committee, are most grateful to her.

Among many others, the Committee wishes to thank Miss Ching for her assistance with the housekeeping; Mr. P. Elford for driving members of the Committee and staff to Waldershare on many occasions; the Rev. H. Saumarez Smith and the Rev. J. W. Horsley for acting as Hon. Chaplains at Waldershare; auxiliary helpers and others who have given their services in so many ways.

HON. MEDICAL AND SURGICAL STAFF, &c.

At the outbreak of the war the Honorary Staff was deprived of two members, Dr. W. B. Laird and Dr. C. P. K. Toland, who joined H.M. Forces, and the Committee were glad to co-opt the services of Dr. G. W. Hinchliff and Dr. M. Koettlitz, to whom they are very grateful. The Committee fully appreciate the additional burden imposed on the Honorary Staff in visiting their patients at Waldershare, and thank them for their loyal co-operation.

A sincere vote of thanks is once more tendered on behalf of the Committee and patients to the following regular members of the Honorary Staff:—Dr. J. R. W. Richardson, Dr. W. B. Laird, and Dr. C. P. K. Toland (Hon. Physicians); Mr. T. J. Cobbe, Mrs. G. M. B. Toland and Mr. J. Brown (Hon. Surgeons); Dr. D. W. McLean (Hon. Ophthalmic Surgeon); Mr. C. H. Adamson (Ear, Nose and Throat Department); Mr. J. Brown (Orthopædic Department); Dr. A. C. Rusack (Radiologist); and Mr. F. P. Sturdee, L.D.S. (Hon. Dental Surgeon).

The Committee also wish to thank the following for their willing service, often given under difficult conditions:—The Resident Medical Officers, Matron and the Nursing Staff, Miss Young (Masseuse); Miss M. Johnston (Radiographer); and Mr. G. Petchey, M.P.S. (Dispenser).

Sincere thanks are also due to Matron and the Nursing Staff for their co-operation in training a number of Auxiliary Nurses; and to Mrs. S. Walker, who gave her services in a voluntary capacity for about six months at Dover as Housekeeping Sister.

MEDICAL REPORT.

The Medical Report for 1939 shows a decrease in the number of In and Out Patients treated, due, in part, to the fact that in September there was a general falling off of attendances and admissions were greatly restricted.

The Orthopædic Department is the only one showing an increase of attendances, and this is due, no doubt, to the abnormal number of fracture cases treated as a consequence of "Black-Out" accidents.

Last June, following an urgent appeal from the Ministry of Health, our Blood Transfusion Service was greatly increased by the addition of a number of volunteers who offered their services as blood donors—and some of these have already been called upon. The Committee thank Mr. J. Hewitt for his great assistance in organising the Service and all volunteers, donors and helpers connected with this valuable and necessary work.

Owing to the increase in expenditure and the smaller number of patients treated, the average cost of treatment has, naturally, risen.

THE FINANCE OF THE HOSPITAL.

From a perusal of the Income and Expenditure Account, which is circulated with this Report, the result of the year's working shows a deficit of £627 13s. 9d. This is after using up the legacies received during the year and the balance of the Mayor's Special Appeal Fund, which are items of income falling under the heading "Extraordinary Income." Had the Hospital not been fortunate enough to receive these sums during the year 1939, the deficit on the accounts would have been £2,321 9s. 11d.

Owing to the war, the expenses of the Hospital have been increased. Under the heading "Extraordinary Expenditure," it will be seen that the air raid precautions have cost £385 16s. 5d., which, together with the salaries paid to auxiliary nurses, amount to £523 18s. 2d. It is hoped that this expenditure will be recovered from the Ministry of Health, and, as shown in the accounts, interim payments of £464 13s. 7d. have already been received.

Allowing for the extra expenditure owing to the evacuation of the Hospital to Waldershare and to other war expenses, the accounts show little difference from those of 1938. For the future, however, the financial position of the Hospital cannot be said to be good. It was fortunate that another very successful Annual Fête and Carnival was held before the outbreak of hostilities. Should it not be possible to hold such an event in 1940, and with the increase in prices generally, the Hospital will have to rely more than ever on the generous support of the voluntary subscribers.

It will be observed from the Balance Sheet that all the legacies not invested have now been spent, and a debit balance of £27 9s. 11d. is carried forward to 1940. During the year 1939 the Hospital received the sum of £443 16s. 5d. from the Mayor's Special Appeal Fund, which, together with the contribution of £700 received in 1938, brings the total received from this fund to £1,143 16s. 5d. The Committee again wish to thank most sincerely the Mayor and Mayoress and all those who have made the appeal such a splendid success by their generous gifts and by their help in organising events to raise money.

The Committee also wish to thank all the many and willing helpers who have by their efforts provided funds for the Hospital. The Fête and Carnival Committee, under the chairmanship of His Worship the Mayor (Alderman J. R. Cairns), the Hospital Workers' and Box Joint Committee, Alexandra Rose Day Committee, and Pound Day Committee need special mention for their splendid efforts.

The expenses of the Hospital have been considerably lightened by an item which does not appear in the Hospital accounts. When the Hospital took a lease of the R.V. Coleman Convalescent Home the Trustees of that Institution arranged to apply part of the available funds of the trust in paying for patients from the Hospital who were unable to afford to go to Convalescent Homes. The number of patients the Trustees have assisted in this way is five, and the amount expended exceeds £66. This has been a great benefit both to the patients concerned and to the Hospital in enabling patients to leave the Hospital earlier than would otherwise have been possible, and by this means reducing the waiting list. The Committee wish to record their grateful thanks to the Trustees of the R.V. Coleman Convalescent Home for this generous assistance.

Mention is made in other parts of this Report of the untiring assistance given to the Hospital by a large number of voluntary workers whose efforts have also helped to reduce the Hospital expenses.

DOVER HOSPITAL WORKERS' & JOINT BOX COMMITTEE.

In spite of adverse conditions, this Committee, under the chairmanship of Mr. P. T. Hart, has not only maintained its total contributions to the Hospital Funds, but has actually beaten its own record by over £100 during 1939. It will be admitted that this is a noteworthy feat, and, while thanking the Chairman, Officers, Committee, Collectors and members of the Fund, these ladies and gentlemen should also be congratulated on the fact that this valuable organisation has not suffered so much as might have been expected through the National Emergency, but that it still appears in a sound financial state. This state is, no doubt, due not only to the enthusiasm and energy of all concerned, but also to the fact that the general public realise how essential is the need to maintain an efficient Hospital in their midst. It is anticipated that Collectors and Subscribers will rally to our side during the months to come and give ungrudgingly in the true voluntary spirit, which is still the proud tradition of our country.

The Office of this Committee at the Hospital being required last September for the use of a First Aid Post, fresh accommodation was provided, by courtesy of the Charity Trustees, at No. 22, Castle Street, where there is a Committee Room in addition to an office.

LINEN LEAGUE.

Once more the Linen League has maintained its invaluable work on behalf of the Hospital, and the sincere thanks of the Committee are again extended to the Countess of Guilford for all her personal work and interest, and also to her Committee, Treasurer and Secretary, and to all her supporters for their continued interest and their many gifts in cash and kind. The Working Party was continued till the outbreak of war, when, owing to the removal of Dover College, Mrs. Dixon left the Town.

Mrs. Llewellyn Langley was asked to organise a Working Party on a larger scale in connection with the Central Hospital Supplies Depôt under the W.V.S. This organisation meets twice a week at the Hospital, and many members of the old Working Party attend and thus a nucleus of our former workers is kept alive. A certain amount of sewing is undertaken for the Hospital as well as for the Red Cross, and this is much appreciated.

The Committee also wish to thank Mrs. Barlow and Mrs. Bellamy for the many hours they have spent in caring for the linen, etc.; and also the ladies of Toc H who undertake the mending at Waldershare.

RESIGNATION.

The Committee have to report the resignation of Mr. Wm. Woodruff from the General Committee, after twenty-one years. Mr. Woodruff has always taken an active interest in the affairs of the Hospital, and was a member of the Finance Committee, in addition to being a generous financial supporter. Among other things, Mr. Woodruff was particularly interested in the Annual Pound Day organisation, and the Committee take this opportunity of thanking him for his continuous help and sympathy in many directions.

CONCLUSION.

Lastly, the Committee welcome this opportunity of expressing their thanks to all those who have helped the Hospital in any way during the past year by service, donations or gifts. Special mention should be made of those who are standing by to help in case of emergency, and to the following:—To our Chaplain, the Rev. J. Embry, and to those who assist in our weekly services; to the Auditors; to the Hon. Treasurer; to the Hon. Secretary; to the General Secretary; to Toc H; to the Hon. Librarians; to the members of the St. John Ambulance; and the Police and the Press.
