Although, owing to the War, the Bed complement has been temporarily reduced, the Hospital, which ministers to many thousands of Patients every year, still costs about £500 per week for administration and increased cost of maintenance, mainly due to greatly increased charges for Provisions, Drugs, Lighting and Fuel.


Towards this outlay, it receives only about £50 per week from Invested Property—the balance consequently has to be found from voluntary sources.



REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE OF MANAGEMENT FOR 1943.

To the Governors of the Corporation.

The Committee of Management submit their 127th Report. During the past year the work of the Hospital has continued to increase in all its branches and many thousands of Patients, from all parts of the Metropolis and Country have been treated.

As from the 1st October, 1943, the bed complement has been raised from 54 to 76, the balance of 24 beds to complete the normal number of 100 will be made available as soon as conditions permit.

EXPENDITURE.

The cost of maintenance and administration shows an increase of £2,473 over the preceding year, due in the main to increased salaries and wages under the Rushcliffe Scale of Nursing Salaries, the Hetherington Report recommending increases to domestic workers and also to rising costs of commodities.




GENERAL INFORMATION.

London Ophthalmic Hospitals Group.—A Joint Committee of Members nominated by the five constituent Hospitals was formed some time ago for the purpose of post-war planning and providing a more adequate Eye Service in the London Area. This has now been strengthened by the appointment of Mr. Sidney Parkes, of Lloyds Bank, who has been nominated by the King Edward's Hospital Fund as an independent Chairman.

On the recommendation of the Committee of Award, Mr. D. J. Pierse, M.B., B.Ch., D.O.M.S., was awarded the above Scholarship for one year as from the 1st January, 1944.

The Committee of Management again desire to convey their sincere thanks to the Honorary Staff who have rendered valuable services. They have been helped by several former Consultants who have voluntarily come back to the Hospital, to replace those Members who have been called up for the Forces.

The Committee also wish to thank the Resident Medical Officers, the Matron, Nursing, Executive and Domestic Staffs for their services in spite of war-time difficulties.

The Ladies' Committee, under the Chairmanship of Lady Mersey, have also given useful help, for which the Committee are very grateful.

The Committee wish to take this opportunity of recording their high appreciation of the services of the Secretary, Captain J. H. Johnson, who has now completed forty-five years in the Hospital. The good work done by this Hospital is very largely due to the industry, tact and sympathy that has been shown by him during this long period; and when the Hospital was rebuilt fifteen years ago, the satisfactory financial assistance received from the public was mainly the result of his persistence and energy.

In conclusion, the Committee of Management wish to express their gratitude for the generous financial support received from the public, when so much help is also being given to various war charities.

Through war taxation, everyone has to economise; but the Committee hope that this old established and important Hospital will again receive in 1944 at least the same measure of help which it has received in 1943.


