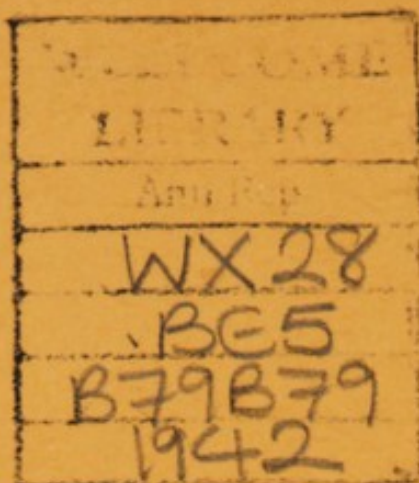

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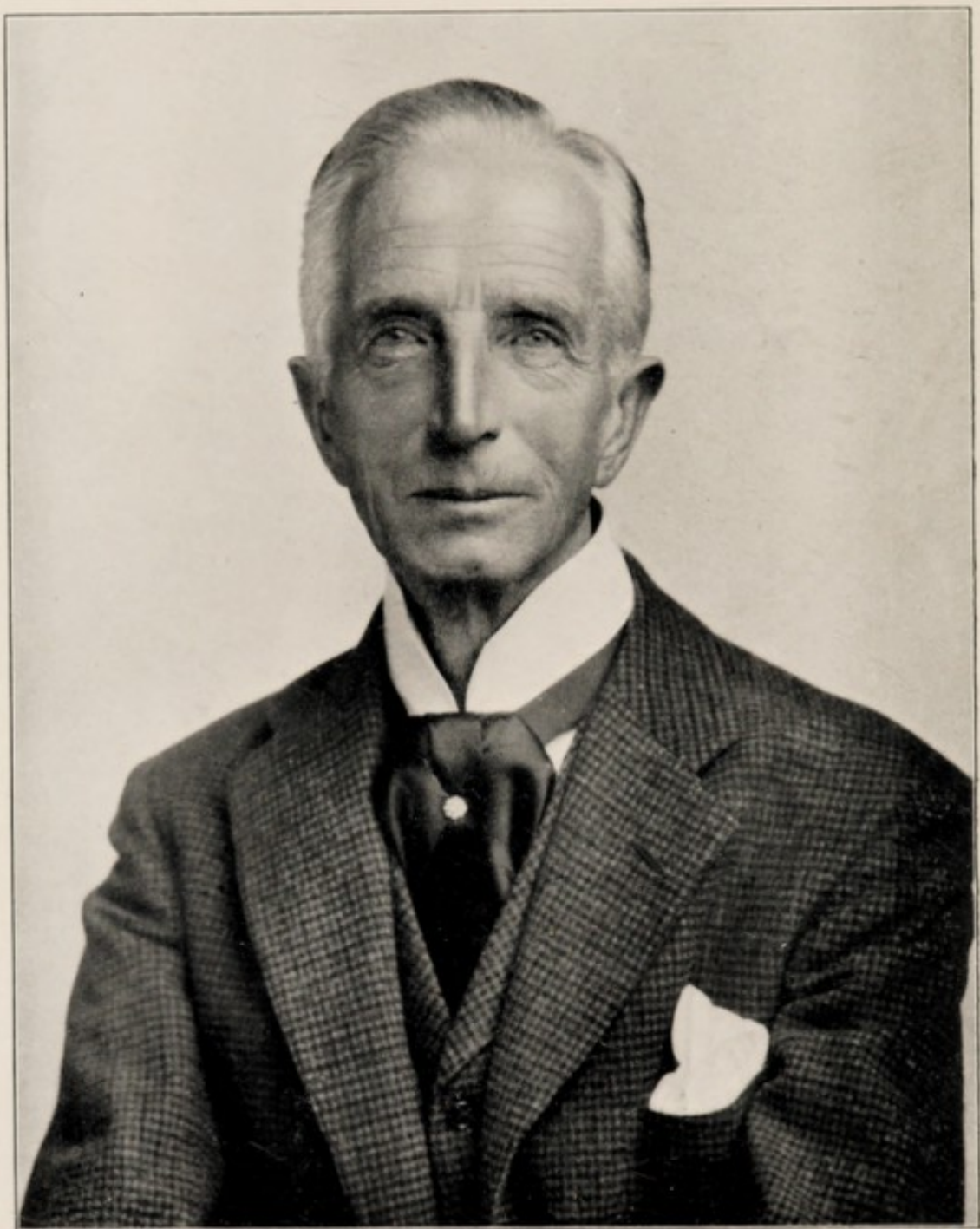

Annual Report for 1942.

The Board of Management have pleasure in presenting to the Governors the Annual Report for 1942—the 118th Annual Report.

Obituary.

The record of work accomplished during 1942 will always be overshadowed in the memory of his colleagues and a host of his friends, by the passing of George E. Priestman, J.P., on the 20th April, 1942. Mr. Priestman devoted all his interest outside that which his business demanded to the welfare of his fellowmen through the religious and charitable organisations of his native city. To the Bradford Royal Infirmary he gave the greater part of his leisure during a busy lifetime, and the present splendid Hospital building and Nurses' Home are a tribute to his energy and foresight in playing a major part in furthering the extension scheme. For his long and untiring labours for the Royal Infirmary and for other charitable organisations he was created an Honorary Freeman of the City of Bradford in 1934—the highest honour which his native city could give him, and one which he richly deserved. A Christian gentleman of the highest type, Mr. Priestman's kindness, courtesy and quiet dignity were apparent to everyone who met him, and the loyalty and earnestness with which he served the cause of the Infirmary and his warm-hearted pride in its work, were a source of inspiration to his colleagues. Like many members of the Priestman family he spent a lifetime in social work designed to ameliorate the conditions of working-class people. He will be remembered with affection, and his memory will be honoured by thousands of his fellow-citizens who have benefited by his labours.

The Board have decided to take steps to perpetuate the memory of their late Chairman. Improved conditions for Nurses, including shorter hours, and also the imminent opening of the Regional Radium Institute, have made necessary the consideration of additional accommodation for the Nursing Staff. The erection of an extension to the Nurses' Home had been commenced in 1939, but war conditions

made it impossible to continue the work. It is proposed as soon as possible to complete this building and to name it "The George E. Priestman Memorial Nurses' Home." The Lord Mayor of Bradford, Councillor James Harrison, J.P., has promised his cordial support of the scheme, and a Committee has been appointed who expect shortly to launch an appeal for the necessary funds. It is confidently hoped that the effort to preserve the memory of a very notable Bradford citizen will meet with a generous response.

During the year, the deaths have also occurred of Mr. J. W. Gordon Butterfield—a former Chairman of the Finance Committee—and Mr. W. H. Suddards, J.P., the Chairman of the Royal Eye and Ear Hospital, and a subscriber to the Royal Infirmary.

Patients Treated.

During the year there have been increases in the numbers of both In-patients and Out-patients treated, as will be seen by the following brief extract from the Statistics on pages 17-18—

This additional work has been accomplished in spite of the need throughout the year to reserve beds on the top floor wards for emergency casualties.

During the year the Infirmary was inspected by General Mitchiner, D.D.M.S. Northern Command, who expressed himself as highly satisfied with the arrangements which had been made for dealing with possible emergencies.

The numbers on the Waiting List have been increasing, and in order to ease the position the use of a 40 bed ward at Highroyds Emergency Hospital has recently been granted and Infirmary patients are now being treated there.

Effect of Recovery of Income Tax on Subscriptions and Donations

If a Subscriber is prepared to enter into a Covenant to pay a fixed annual sum out of his taxed income, for a period of seven years or during his life-time, **or until the termination of the present war, whichever period shall be the shorter**, then as Income Tax is now at the rate of 10/- in the £ the Infirmary would be enabled to recover from the Inland Revenue Authorities an equivalent amount to that subscribed.

If the Subscriber is assessable to Sur-Tax, the deduction of the gross amount of his subscription would result in a reduction of the Sur-Tax payable.

The additional and improved accommodation at the Auxiliary Hospital at Rawdon is invaluable in this connection; there is now provision for over 100 patients.

The majority of the patients at the Auxiliary Hospital are those who have had their operation at the Infirmary, and are transferred to Rawdon after a few days.

Finance.

Once more the Board is gratified to be able to report a satisfactory year financially, and further financial details are dealt with in a report by Mr. Allan Welch, Chairman of the Finance Committee. Attention is particularly invited to the great assistance given by the Bradford and District Hospital Fund. The contribution has been increased willingly and enthusiastically by workpeople from 2d. to 3d. per week, and during the year the Infirmary has received from the Fund the sum of £38,211/16/7. There is reason to expect that this amount will be still further increased in the future, and the Board would express their very grateful thanks to the Bradford and District Hospital Fund for the work which it has accomplished.

During the year a gift to the Endowment Fund of £1,000 was received from Mr. and Mrs. W. H. Waite in celebration of their Golden Wedding. A gift of £500 has been received from the Directors of Messrs. Hepworth and Grandage Ltd. in memory of the late Mr. George Edwin Hepworth, and £500 by Legacy from the late Mr. Edwin Parker. Ceremonies were arranged at which named beds or cots were handed over by the relatives and received on behalf of the Infirmary.

In the interests of economy, no list of subscriptions or donations is to be published in this Annual Report, but any required information is available on enquiry to the House Governor.

Economy Campaign.

During the year an Economy Campaign has been organised with the object of saving fuel and other important war commodities. A competition for the best economy suggestions was organised, for which Mrs. Sinkinson kindly provided five prizes. "Economy Slogans" suggested by members of the Staff are displayed on notice boards at the Infirmary. One outstanding result of the campaign has been that more than 150 tons of coal have been saved, compared with the previous year's consumption.

Improvements and Extensions.

The Regional Radium Institute, which forms a block of the Infirmary, is now almost complete and ready for occupation. It contains 56 beds for the treatment of cancer and other cases. When it is in use the 20 beds of the Duke of York Home which have been used as the Radium Department, will be freed for the general use of the Home.

As a war emergency precaution three storage tanks for drinking water have been erected in the grounds, and emergency cooking apparatus has been provided.

During the year Canteens have been developed for the employees of the Infirmary, and now all employees are able to enjoy a lunch at the Infirmary at a very reasonable charge.

Committees.

A matter of interest has been the appointment of Mrs. Sinkinson as the first Lady Member of the House Committee. During the year, Mrs. Sinkinson has made many effective contributions to the discussions, and has proved a most valuable member of the Committee.

During the year, an innovation has been introduced by inviting representatives from firms contributing to the Bradford and District Hospital Fund to attend the meeting of the Visiting Committee each month. This has provided an opportunity for many who were not closely acquainted with the working of the Infirmary to obtain a better conception of the work which is done and the service which is rendered, and has been much appreciated. The scope of the experiment is to be widened in the future.

The work of the Ladies' Committee, the Ladies' Linen League, and the Samaritan Society has continued unabated during the year, and the very sincere thanks of the Board are due to the members of these Committees for the excellent help which they continue to render.

Honorary Staff.

War conditions have compelled a further reduction of the services of the Honorary Staff. Dr. J. A. Price, Honorary Assistant Physician, Mr. James Dawson, Honorary Assistant Surgeon, and Dr. A. Bigham, Honorary Dermatologist, have joined the Forces during the year. Dr. R. Langley is acting as locum Honorary Assistant Physician in place of Dr. Price, and Mr. F. W. Goyder has returned to the active staff to take charge of the Orthopædic Department and the Massage Department in Mr. Dawson's absence. Dr. Forde, Clinical Assistant to the Skin Department, is in charge of the whole of the work of that Department.

The Board of Management are glad to know that, after his serious illness, Dr. Franklyn is sufficiently recovered to enable him to supervise again the work of the X-Ray Department.

War regulations have caused a reduction in the number of our Resident Medical Staff from 10 to 7, but an additional post of Clinical Assistant to the Skin Department has been created. This has meant more work for the Resident Staff, and in order to relieve them to some extent, six general Practitioners have undertaken afternoon Casualty Duty. The Board greatly appreciate this additional help.

Conclusion.

The Board would like to express their very grateful thanks to all those bodies who have performed voluntary work at the Infirmary during the year. Auxiliary Nurses have done valuable work inside the Infirmary, and the British Legion has provided a rota of Emergency Stretcher Bearers for each night since the beginning of the war.

More than the normal difficulties have been encountered during the year in maintaining an efficient staff at the Infirmary. The National Service Acts have made many calls upon the trained staff (no fewer than 28 members of the Administrative, Technical and Works Staffs are now serving in the Forces), and it has been no easy task to replace the old and to train new staff. The Board appreciates the way in which Mr. H. Trusson, House Governor and Secretary, and Miss A. E. Merry, the Lady Superintendent, and all members of the Staffs of the various Departments have met the added calls on their time and energy.

The Press—particularly the "Yorkshire Observer," "Bradford Telegraph & Argus" and the "Yorkshire Post" have always been ready to assist with publicity, and the thanks of the Board are tendered for all the help that has been received in this way.

Amongst others whose names should be mentioned with grateful thanks are the Local Clergy and Sick Visitors, the Auditors, Messrs. Boyce, Welch & Co., the Solicitor, Mr. T. Hubert Firth, and the Chairmen and Members of the various Committees of the Infirmary, all of whom have devoted their time and talents to the furtherance of the work of the Infirmary.

It may be that in the near future the Infirmary will have further calls upon its services, and the Board would take this opportunity of appealing for the support of all those living in the district for their help in maintaining and enlarging the vital work which the Infirmary attempts to perform.

It is estimated that £75,000 will be required to complete the present Home, provide more suitable accommodation for the Nurses, and extend the Home to allow for the required increased number of nurses to staff the Regional Radium Institute.

Training School for Nurses.

Ladies' Committee and Ladies' Linen League

Report for 1942.

The Ladies' Committee of the Bradford Royal Infirmary have pleasure in presenting their Report for 1942.

They regret that, owing to war conditions, their activities have to some extent been curtailed; it no longer being possible for members, especially those living at a distance, to pay the usual number of visits to the patients. However, the interest in the Ladies' Linen League has been maintained, and it is gratifying to note that subscriptions during 1942 have increased. The expenditure on new linen has been considerably less, thanks to the economical care of the Infirmary staff and also to a gift of linen from the American Red Cross. But sooner or later much larger stocks will have to be bought, and the Committee would therefore appeal for a continuance of present subscriptions.

Once again the Committee take this opportunity of warmly thanking all those who have helped the Ladies' Linen League.

Samaritan Society.

Report for 1942.

The presentation of the Samaritan Society's 59th Annual Report marks the close of another year of very useful work on behalf of the more needy patients of the Infirmary. From the funds at the disposal of the Society it has again been possible to give very necessary assistance to these patients by means of extra food, the provision of surgical appliances and dentures, and the payment of ambulance and taxi fares.

Help given by the Charles Priestley Fund to tuberculous patients has included the provision of two spinal jackets, bedding and clothing, milk, and convalescent treatment, though it is to be regretted that this latter help is somewhat restricted by war conditions.

The demand made by the patients upon the Library facilities is ample proof of their appreciation of the untiring efforts of Mrs. McEwan and her helpers, who report that 2,185 books have been issued in the men's wards, an increase on last year of 296; and 2,855 in the women's wards, an increase of 508.

The Duke of York Home has been built to meet the needs of those members of the community who, when ill, do not wish to have treatment in the wards of a charitable hospital, but who cannot afford the charges of ordinary Nursing Homes. The site is about 600 feet above sea level, in one of the healthiest parts of Bradford.

The Home, which is equipped with all the most modern appliances for dealing with medical or surgical cases, contains accommodation for 70 patients, mostly in single rooms. No infectious, mental or normal maternity cases can be admitted.

Patients may be admitted after consultation with any member of the Honorary Medical Staffs of the three Voluntary Hospitals, and St. Luke's Hospital, in Bradford.

Medical Fees are entirely a matter to be arranged between the patient and the Physician or Surgeon.

CHARGES.

From five guineas upwards a week, according to accommodation. These charges include maintenance, nursing and dressings.

EXTRA CHARGES.

Special or extra nurses.

Massage treatment, stimulants and specific prescriptions.

A theatre fee of £1/1/0 will be charged to surgical patients who are in the Home for not more than one week.

The personal laundry of patients must be arranged and paid for by the patients.

No responsibility for money or other valuables belonging to patients will be accepted unless handed in for custody, and an official receipt obtained. It is hoped that valuables will not be brought into the Home.

The visiting hours are 3-0 p.m. to 4-30 p.m., and 7-0 p.m. to 8-0 p.m. daily. Not more than two visitors can be admitted to the same patient at a time.

It is requested that no presents or gratuities be offered to any member of the nursing or domestic staffs, the acceptance of such being forbidden by the Rules.
