Mr. John Welch, President, was in the chair.

The notice convening the Meeting was read.

Apologies from the following for non-attendance were tendered to the Chairman :--Mr. Basil Pickard (owing to illness), Lady Ashton, The Earl of Sefton, The Earl Peel, Lord Richard Cavendish, Dr. and Mrs. Bury, Mr. and Mrs. Procter, Mrs. J. W. Pickard, Sir Thomas Tomlinson, The Bishop of Lancaster, Mr. and Mrs. H. Cross, Mr. Frank Storey, and 38 other Governors.

Dr. J. A. Gibson moved, Mr. W. H. Keeffe seconded, and it was unanimously resolved :--

"That the Report of the Committee, now presented, be received and adopted."

Mr. James Helme moved, The Rev. P. Anderson seconded, and it was unanimously resolved :--

"That the Accounts and Auditor's Report, now presented, be received and adopted."

Mr. C. W. Dean moved, Dr. P. F. Mannix seconded, and it was unanimously resolved :--

" That Mr. Basil Pickard be elected President of the Infirmary for the ensuing year."

Mr. Welch then left the Chair, and in the absence of the newlyelected President, Dr. Gibson moved, Mr. Alderman E. C. Parr seconded, and it was unanimously resolved :--

> "That Mr. Welch be elected Chairman for the remainder of the Meeting."

On behalf of the President, the Chairman read the Presidential speech, which was received with acclamation.

His Worship the Mayor (Councillor Mr. V. H. Cross) moved, Mr. J. Stuart Oglethorpe seconded, and it was unanimously resolved :

# The One Hundred and Fifty-Ninth Annual Report.

## For the Year ended 31st December, 1939.

In presenting the Annual Report for 1939 the Committee would refer to the several changes which have occurred in their numbers and in the officers of the Infirmary.

They record with deep regret the death of Mrs. Bardsley, who was associated with the work of the Infirmary for so many years, and had always taken an intense and very helpful interest in everything connected with the welfare of the Infirmary and its staff. The Committee's sincere sympathy is extended to the bereaved family.

To fill her place the Committee have elected the Very Rev. Canon R. O. Brimley, who is one of those submitted for re-election this year.

At the last Annual Meeting Dr. Gibson, who had served on the Committee for many years as a representative of the Medical Committee, was, on his retirement from active participation in the medical work, elected as a Governors' representative, and as Chairman of the House Committee has continued his untiring devotion to the welfare of the Infirmary.

Mr. H. Cooper has taken the place of Mr. H. Parker as a representative of the Workpeople's Committee.

In pursuance to an alteration in the Rules, to which reference will be made later, Mr. Alderman E. C. Parr, Mr. Alderman W. M. Simpson, and Alderman Mrs. A. E. Helme have been appointed to represent the Lancaster Corporation.

All these new members have already proved their value to and interest in the Infirmary, and we hope that we may long have the benefit of their experience and advice in the Management.

The Committee are happy that Dr. Bury has recovered from the illness which overtook him before completing his Presidency last March.

Mr. Procter also has returned to his old activities after his recent operation, and we are very glad to welcome him back, particularly as he has just completed 21 years of extremely valuable service to the Infirmary, as Hon. Treasurer.

At the last Annual Meeting, Messrs. E. R. Simpson and Ed. Derham, to whom we are indebted for a long period of valuable help,

retired from the office of Honorary Auditors, Mr. Harry Cross, A.C.A., being appointed Professional Auditor.

#### **Reorganisation of Management.**

The Committee decided that, with the increasing work of the Infirmary and complexity of its administration, the system of Management which had served so well in the past was no longer efficient, and the Rules and By-laws have been altered under which a reorganisation of Management has been carried out.

The new Committee system has proved satisfactory and has greatly facilitated the work of Management.

The altered Rules also provide for the Lancashire County Council and the Lancaster Corporation each to nominate three representatives to serve on the General Committee.

The Institution will also benefit greatly by the alteration in the Rules to permit of unearmarked legacies being made available for capital expenditure (as on new buildings) instead of always being placed to the Endowment Fund.

#### The War.

The impact of the War has profoundly affected the work, finances and organisation of the Infirmary. In the early months of the year, preliminary steps were taken in the matter of Air Raid Precautions and Emergency organisation to ensure that when the time came all necessary action could be taken as speedily as possible. Shortly before the outbreak of War instructions were received from the Ministry of Health to carry out these precautions, and, without loss of time, the most vital parts of the Infirmary were well protected against the possible effects of blast and bomb splinters by extensive sandbagging. Grateful thanks are due to the Boy Scouts and Military for the assistance given to the outdoor staff in this work.

Inside, the window glass was protected against splintering. Owing to long delay in delivery of materials, ordered before September, the "Black-out" was at first improvised under great difficulties, but subsequent improvements have made it completely satisfactory. As a result of the Black-out requirements, ventilation of the Wards was at first considerably restricted, and extra expense was incurred to overcome this.

Rooms have been made gas-proof for the Children's Ward and Maternity Ward.

Provision has been made in co-operation with the Ministry of Health for the treatment of Air Raid casualties. Under the Ministry's Emergency Hospital Scheme the number of beds in the Infirmary has been expanded from 140 to 225. The extra 85 beds, with the necessary bedding and other equipment, have been supplied by the Ministry. Some of these have been accommodated in the main Wards, and others in the Sisters' Dining-room and Day-rooms, which have been adapted as Emergency Wards. Further, on Friday evening, 1st September, in order to release beds for possible air raid casualties, every patient who was fit to be moved was sent home, and with the aid of a fleet of private cars, organised by the Lancaster Brotherhood, this evacuation was carried out quickly and smoothly. In view of the Ministry of Health's responsibility for providing adequate Hospital accommodation for War casualties, the Infirmary, in common with all Hospitals throughout the country, has to submit to a certain amount of direction from the Ministry, as far as concerns its part in the Emergency Hospitals Scheme.

In the expansion of the Nursing Services, the Infirmary has co-operated with the Medical Officer of Health in the training of Nursing Auxiliaries, a large number having been given a course of practical training.

It will readily be appreciated that the above factors have involved very considerable reorganisation of the Infirmary, and have imposed a great deal of extra work and responsibility upon those concerned with the administration, not only in the preliminary organisation, but in the daily running of the Infirmary.

Fortunately we have not yet been called upon to treat Air Raid casualties, but the Public can be assured that if the need does arise the Infirmary is prepared to treat them to the limit of its resources.

All these precautions and emergency arrangements have involved the Infirmary in very considerable expense, and so far the Ministry of Health have only undertaken to bear a proportion of the cost of the protection scheme and other special work, so that a substantial burden has fallen upon the Infirmary Funds. The Committee feel that the Government ought eventually to be persuaded to bear the whole of this special expenditure, but for the present our financial position is very severely affected. This is but part of the financial effects of the War upon the Infirmary.

#### The Work of the Year.

The demands made upon the services of the Infirmary have been unprecedented, and, with the exception of a period at the beginning of the War, extra beds have been used daily. For the first few weeks of the War admissions to the Infirmary were limited to emergencies, but in spite of this and of the fact that each of the Wards was closed in turn for redecoration, the number of in-patients admitted was 3,155 as compared with 2,702 in 1938, an increase of 453, or nearly 17 per cent. These figures are all the more remarkable when it is remembered that the figures for 1938 were a record.

The increase in the work of the Out-patient and Special Departments is even more striking, the total number of attendances being 60,602, as compared with 46,047 in 1938, an increase of 14,555, or 32 per cent. Detailed figures of patients and work done will be found on pages 24 and 25. Special mention must, however, be made here of the new Departments which the Committee have established during 1939.

#### ORTHOPTIC CLINIC.

This Clinic was opened in June, and has done very valuable work in the correction of squint and other muscular defects of the eye. Most of the patients have been schoolchildren, as it is in the early years that the treatment is most effective, and in a number of cases this distressing physical defect, which frequently results in blindness of one eye, has been cured.

#### CHIROPODY CLINIC.

Later in the summer a Chiropody Clinic was opened. Chiropody is now recognised as an important branch of auxiliary medical treatment. It is not only important for its positive cures, but also for its preventive work, as efficient attention by a Chiropodist to minor foot trouble in children will often prevent serious developments in later years.

#### RADIUM SERVICES CLINIC.

This Clinic was established in the autumn, in co-operation with the Holt Radium Institute, Manchester. Patients are examined at the Clinic by a Specialist from that Institute, and where treatment is required, it is carried out either at the Infirmary or at the Holt Radium Institute, according to the circumstances of each case. It is hoped that this Clinic will, by obviating the financial and mental strain which long journeys often entail for the sick, lead to the earlier diagnosis and treatment of cancer, whilst the chances of cure are greater, and so reduce the number of malignant cases. In addition, this Clinic will be of great advantage in affording comfort to persons who fear that they are the subjects of cancer, and who can be reassured that their symptoms are due to some other much less serious cause. The Committee are looking forward to the time when this consultative clinic will form an important part of the Government's National Cancer Scheme.

### ELECTROCARDIOGRAPH DEPARTMENT.

Towards the end of the year this department was established, largely through the generosity of the "Lancaster Guardian" and its readers. It is invaluable for the accurate diagnosis of heart conditions, and assists the physician to ascertain the exact nature of the complaint, and so enables the most effective treatment to be given.

#### IRON LUNG.

By the generosity of Lord Nuffield, a Both Respirator has been acquired, and is available when needed.

#### EMERGENCY MATERNITY UNIT.

The Committee have established in co-operation with the Lancaster Corporation and the Lancashire County Council, a Mobile Emergency Maternity Unit, whereby a Surgeon and a Midwife, with all necessary equipment, are always available to attend expectant Mothers at home, if called upon by the patient's doctor.

#### Extensions.

MATERNITY DEPARTMENT.

At the outbreak of War revised plans for the building of a Maternity Home of 50 beds, as reported last year, were awaiting the approval of the Ministry of Health, which, however, has been withheld, so that there is little prospect of the home being built in the near future. The inadequacy of the accommodation in the present Maternity Ward has, however, become so acute that the Committee were faced with the alternative of restricting admissions or of making some additional beds available for Maternity Cases. It has been decided to adapt a room near the Maternity Ward as a six-bedded Ward for additional cases, but this is not likely to overcome the urgent necessity for proceeding with the building of the new Home.

#### BROMLEY WARD.

Alarmed at the length of the waiting list, 200 as compared with 107 a year before, and the delay in the present Maternity Ward becoming available for general Hospital beds, the Committee decided to build a Ward of 32 beds on the land recently purchased, and have pressed on with this in spite of the War, hoping that it may be ready this spring. The entire length of the Ward faces south, and a large verandah has been added, so that in fine weather all patients who are fit to be moved can be wheeled out to the open air. A corridor connecting this new Ward with the main building is being built in verandah style, with a number of shelters abutting on to the Richmond Gardens, for the use of convalescent patients, and so to add to the amenities of the Gardens. During the autumn, Dr. W. J. D. Bromley, a former House Surgeon who had always retained a very great interest in the Infirmary, died, and a legacy left by his Sister became available, as well as a share of his own estate, and it has been thought appropriate to devote these legacies, as permitted under our changed Rules, towards the cost of the building and equipment of this new Ward, which the Committee have decided to name "The Bromley Ward," and the cost of which is estimated at £8,500.

#### NURSING STAFF ACCOMMODATION.

Extra Nursing Staff have been engaged during the year, and still more will be required for the Bromley Ward. Instead of building new Nurses' quarters, as a temporary measure three adjacent houses near the Infirmary have been rented, to accommodate 24 Nurses.

#### Finance.

#### MAINTENANCE ACCOUNT.

The accounts, which will be found on pages 30 and 31, show a very serious financial position. The total income for the year was  $\pounds 25,611$  19s. 6d., and the total expenditure was  $\pounds 29,886$  7s. 1d., leaving a deficit of  $\pounds 4,274$  7s. 7d. We started 1940 with an accumulated deficiency of  $\pounds 4,939$  7s. 11d., and the gap between our income and expenditure gets wider each month.

The expenditure has been drawn up on a double period basis, to show separately the financial working for the peace time period from 1st January to 31st August, and the War-time period from 1st September to 31st December. This division of the accounts is not only informative to the Committee and Governors, but is an essential preliminary to negotiations with the Ministry of Health for payments in respect of the cost of the Emergency Casualty Service.

Expenditure is £5,728 12s. 6d. more than for 1938, due to three main increases—(1) in the tremendous amount of new work undertaken; (2) in the number and rates of pay in the nursing and other Staff; (3) in the consumption and price of nearly all food and household and medical stores, some of these last having already advanced by 100 per cent. since the war started.

The average cost of maitaining a patient in the Wards, taking 1939 as a whole, was about 10s. per day, as compared with 9s. in 1938. The cost to-day is even higher.

Turning to the Income side, we regret we cannot report a corresponding increase in Voluntary Gifts. We recognise, however, the additional financial burdens which have been thrust upon all our subscribers by reason of the War, and sincerely thank all those who have continued to subscribe to the best of their ability, and the Ladies' Collecting Committee who have worked so hard to maintain the volume of their collections. Income for services rendered to patients, quite apart from the contributions of the Government towards the emergency casualty service, is substantially more. This is due to four main causes :-- Improved and extended financial arrangements with local authorities in respect of work done by the Infirmary for which those authorities are responsible (mainly Maternity services and School Medical services), the revised charges to Private Patients which came into effect from 1st September, the greater number of patients treated, and the increase in the amount per patient per day collected from the Public Ward Patients.

The contribution shown as received from the Government for the emergency casualty service was an interim payment made in accordance with an agreement between the Ministry of Health and the British Hospitals Association War Emergency Committee, which, owing to the casualty service not being required to the extent anticipated, is substantially in excess of the actual cost. That excess will be recouped by the Ministry, and is shown as a suspense account with the Ministry of Health pending a settlement. The Ministry of Health have agreed to pay the Infirmary the full cost of maintenance of Service patients, children evacuated under the Government's Scheme, and Air Raid Casualties, and also the cost of maintaining a reserve of beds for potential cases in the above categories. We wish to emphasize, however, that the Government have not undertaken to give the Infirmary any financial assistance whatever in respect of its normal work for the Civilian sick.

No report on the finances of the Infirmary would be complete without reference to the Workpeople's Committee. This Committee have worked very hard indeed to maintain collections from members, and have co-operated with the General Committee in every possible way. In addition to the  $\pounds 8,880$  for maintenance of members, they have donated  $\pounds 100$  from their Jubilee Cot Fund. Our special thanks are due to them for their very effective help.

#### BUILDINGS AND EQUIPMENT FUND.

The expenditure shown on this account for the purchase of the Springfield Park Estate, the purchase of substantial additional equipment and payments in respect of the Bromley Ward, have left the Building Fund with a temporary overdraft of  $f_{0.800}$  3s. 5d. Negotiations are still in progress with the Ministry of Health for payment to the Infirmary in respect of the land which was to be used for the purpose of the Maternity Home, and it is anticipated these will shortly be successfully concluded.

### GENERAL PURPOSES FUND.

No new legacies have been received during the year specifically bequeathed to the Endowment Fund, but the following legacies received during the year have been credited to the General Purposes Account :—

A notice of a legacy of  $\pm 500$  has also been received from the Executors of the late Mrs. Bardsley.

#### Special Work Undertaken.

The Committee has had to undertake considerable expenditure on special work over and above the normal maintenance of the Infirmary.

Some of the old fire escape apparatus was no longer considered efficient, and in view of this, and of the possibility of additional emergency exits being required because of air raid damage, it was decided to carry out considerable repairs and additions to the fire escape staircases, and to instal additional chemical extinguishers. This work was completed early in the summer, at a cost of  $f_{200}$ .

The paintwork throughout the building, both outside and inside, was in a very dilapidated state, as very little repainting had been done for a number of years, and it was therefore decided to carry out extensive re-decoration. The external painting was done during the early part of the year, and Mr. Alderman Parr very kindly undertook the preparation of the specification and the supervision of the work. When during the summer the internal painting was undertaken, the services of Mr. Parr were not available, but the Committee were fortunate in obtaining the assistance of Mr. Ambler, who has very long experience in this kind of work, and who drew up the detailed specification, and supervised the work. The opportunity was taken to change the old colour scheme, which had not been varied for many years, and very pleasing colour schemes have been adopted in the corridors, wards, and special departments, which have greatly lightened and improved the appearance of the Infirmary, an improvement which is appreciated alike by patients, visitors, and staff. One of the Wards was in the hands of the painters at the outbreak of War, and our thanks are due to Mr. Ambler and the Contractors for their co-operation in enabling us to have the Ward back in service in a very short time.

Another very great improvement which has been effected is the laying of a rubber surface to the ground floor corridor, in colours to harmonize with the general colour scheme. The noisiness of this part of the Infirmary, due to the old tiled corridor, had been a source of disturbance to the patients and concern to the Committee for some years, and the Committee regard the cost of the rubber flooring as money very well spent. The re-decoration and flooring involved us in an expenditure of  $f_{1,265}$ .

The Wireless Installation throughout the Infirmary has been overhauled, and an appeal for new headphones to replace the many defective ones met with a very generous response.

As an additional means of relieving the tedium of a long stay in the Wards, an efficient Library Service has been organised, and we are very much indebted to Mr. Bland (the City Librarian) and his assistants for undertaking this work, which is greatly appreciated by the patients.

The telephone service has been much improved, and a special service for private wards has been installed, whereby private patients can have the use of a telephone in their Ward, for which a charge is made.

The Committee has been put to a very great expense in connection with the main kitchen. Much of the equipment had been in use for so long that its efficiency was much reduced, and with extensions about to be undertaken, and the expansion of the Hospital under the Ministry of Health's Emergency Hospital Scheme, improvement of the kitchen service was imperative, and the main kitchen has been almost entirely re-equipped at a cost of  $\pounds474$ , and should now be able to provide for additional numbers.

of the Infirmary; to the many blood donors whose unselfishness has enabled many lives to be saved; to the Lancaster Brotherhood for arranging transport for blood donors and for patients when required; to the Public Authorities and their Officials; to the many Ladies and Gentlemen who have given flowers, fruit, eggs, books, toys and other gifts; and to all other Subscribers, Donors and Helpers.

#### Medical Staff.

The Committee have once again to place on record their deep appreciation of the services of the Honorary Staff, which have been maintained at a high standard. During the year the following appointments were made : Dr. Cliff (formerly Assistant Honorary Physician) as Honorary Physician ; Mr. McFadzean (formerly Assistant Honorary Surgeon) as Honorary Surgeon ; Dr. McKeon and Dr. Wilkie as Assistant Honorary Physicians. Dr. McKeon is also in charge of the Electrocardiograph Department. To these Gentlemen the Committee extend a sincere welcome, and to all the Honorary Staff sincere thanks for their loyal and invaluable services, which have been all the more arduous during 1939 owing to the increased amount of work required, often under very difficult circumstances.

We have to record the temporary loss of Dr. Cliff, Honorary Physician, and Mr. Geddes, Assistant Honorary Surgeon, who have been called up for Military Service. The best wishes of the Committee go with them, and we hope that in the relatively near future it will be possible for them to resume their work here.

We also thank the House Surgeons for their very hard and loyal service during the year.

#### Other Appointments.

Mr. Maurice Midgley, Member of the Incorporated Society of Chiropodists, as Honorary Chiropodist.

Miss Jean Bickerton, Member of the British Orthoptic Society, as Orthoptist.

Both the above are new appointments, and the members are on the National Register of Medical Auxiliary Services.

Mr. Frank Emmett, Ph.C., as Pharmacist, in succession to Miss M. Hodkinson, Ph.C., who resigned on her marriage. Miss N. P. Leighton as Almoner. Miss Leighton has served the Infirmary for many years as Senior Clerk.

### Administration.

Much of the year was occupied in settling plans for War-time conditions, and the speed and precision with which these were put into effect afford ample testimony to the efficiency of the administration for which Mr. F. A. Milnes is responsible, and of the Nursing Services, under the able direction of the Matron. Attention to many circulars from the Ministry, and their requirements in the keeping of new records and accounts, have increased the office work very considerably, necessitating increases in the office staff, and to all these the Committee are indebted for much ungrudging service.

#### The Future.

This Report indicates the ways in which the Committee has attempted to meet the ever-increasing demands which the people of this locality make upon their Infirmary. The accounts show the increased expenditure which this has entailed, and the opening of the Bromley Ward (so that the waiting list may be reduced) will add a further  $\oint 6,000$  a year for maintenance, and in order that such extensive provision can be continued on a voluntary basis, it is imperative that every class of the community should increase its financial support. It would be inopportune to expect further financial co-operation with the Public Health Services for the present, so the Committee must rely upon each and all to do everything possible in the future to carry on the long and honourable tradition of the Infirmary that suffering shall find there the most modern and efficient services available.

#### REPORT OF THE MEDICAL COMMITTEE.

The past year has seen a continuation of the steady increase in the work done in all departments of the Infirmary, and the establishment of two new clinics. The Radium Services Clinic conducted by Dr. Nuttall, of the Christie Hospital and Holt Radium Institute, now enables cases requiring Radium Therapy to be seen and examined at Lancaster, and their further treatment arranged for.

Earlier in the year the Lancaster Guardian was entirely responsible for the collection of the funds which have gone to the purchase of the most recent model of the Cambridge Electrocardiograph. This magnificent addition to the Infirmary's equipment is now proving a most useful aid in the diagnosis and treatment of cases of Heart Disease attending the Heart Clinic conducted by Dr. J. A. McKeon.

New appointments made during the year are as follows :---Mr. J. McFadzean, F. R.C.S., to the post of Hon. Surgeon ; Dr. Wilkie, M.B., D.P.H., and Dr. J. A. McKeon, M.D., Assistant Physicians.

Mr. M. Midgley has also been appointed as Hon. Chiropodist.

On the outbreak of war in September, it was found necessary to arrange to retain the services of House Surgeons about to retire; thereby bringing the number up to five. This increase being a war measure, rendered essential by reason of the addition of 85 "war" beds, which might be called into use for air raid or other casualties at short notice. We regret, however, that our Senior House Surgeon (Dr. J. Ross) has now completed his year of service with us, and would like to place on record our appreciation of his unselfish devotion to duty, and of his exceptional efficiency throughout his term of office. We extend to him our best wishes in his forthcoming Fellowship examinations.

We also wish to express our gratitude to all the other House Surgeons, who have worked most keenly and in great harmony during the year, to the great advangate of Patients and Hon. Staff.

The War has already imposed a great additional strain upon the resources of the Infirmary in respect of the treatment of evacuees and members of various military units in the area served by the Hospital. This additional work has been somewhat hampered by "Black-out" conditions. Developments arising out of the war have also given our Superintendent-Secretary and his Staff an immense amount of extra work, which has been undertaken along with the expansion of work which was occurring quite apart from the War emergency. All this has been dealt with with efficiency and dispatch, and we wish to express our deep appreciation of this great effort.

Though they have retired from the Active Staff, we have been most grateful for the valuable help rendered during the year by Dr. J. A. Gibson and Mr. W. George, whose devoted service has been of inestimable value in very many ways. Their knowledge and experience of the needs of the Infirmary has been a most valuable asset in our deliberations in Committee.

The accommodation of the Hospital having been severely strained during the year, we are pleased to see the new extension now taking shape, and we look forward to the opening of the new ward, knowing that it will go far to meet a much needed increase in the number of available beds.

It is also a matter of great regret that we learn that owing to the need for war economy the building of the proposed new Maternity Block has had to be deferred.

In conclusion, we desire to express our very sincere gratitude to all members of the Nursing Staff, the Staffs of the X-Ray Department, the Massage and Electrical Department, and other Special Departments, and the Clerical and Domestic Staffs, for their devoted service throughout the year.

#### OBSTETRICAL AND GYNÆCOLOGICAL DEPARTMENT.

The decision of the Ministry of Health to hold up the building of the new Maternity Block owing to the War, has been a severe blow to the department. During the past year the resources of the Maternity Department have been stretched to the utmost. Unless one is in close touch with the work, it is difficult to realise the anxiety and worry of running the Obstetric Unit under the present condition of too few beds. However well staffed, equipped, and organised the Department may be, the difficulties inseparable from inadequate accommodation impose an added burden on the staff. On many occasions during the last year there was actual overcrowding in the Ward which, however regrettable, could not be avoided, as it was caused by cases which necessitated operative interference, and these cases could only have been sent away with a certain amount of risk to the patient's life.

The War has tended to hasten a more or less natural process, that is, the making of Lancaster a centre for all the difficult midwifery of the district, as, owing to the difficulties of transport, practically no abnormal midwifery in the surrounding area is now sent away to Manchester or Liverpool, but comes instead to Lancaster. The fact that fifty-seven Cæsarean Sections have been performed in the hospital in the past year will give some idea of the The amount of abnormal midwifery which is being dealt with. General Committee have realised the position, and have done their best to help by turning the Sisters' Dining-room, which is very close to Ward 4, into a small ward-annexe for the Maternity Section. This room will hold six beds and will be opened for the use of Ward 4 in the near future. This will materially assist to overcome overcrowding, but does not solve the unsatisfactory arrangement of having one general ward for both acute cases and those which have had ante-natal supervision. It will be a tragedy if the building of the new Maternity Ward is indefinitely postponed, for if this war is going to be a long war, it is vitally important to preserve and take care of the children of the future.

The demand on the Maternity Ward is going to be heavier this year than ever before, owing to the influx of wives of Civil Servants, Air Force Staff, and employees at the new local industries, &c., to Morecambe and district.

As regards the Gynæcological Section, there is little to be added to the report of last year. The demands on the department are getting even greater, however, and the waiting-list still grows, although the building of the new Bromley Ward will in part ease this tension. A pressing need, however, which has been very noticeable in the recent spell of cold weather is the necessity for a new Out-Patient Department. The Out-Patient facilities, especially as regards gynæcological patients, are still very inadequate and unsatisfactory.

Both in connection with Obstetrics and Gynæcology, it can truthfully be stated that even in war-time, economy carried to the extent of unsatisfactory medical care is no true economy, as the health of a nation is one of its most precious assets.

#### ORTHOPÆDIC DEPARTMENT.

The feature of this year's work has been the increase in the number of cases treated by the department, and the difficulty which has been experienced in having orthopædic waiting list cases admitted for operation. The work throughout the hospital has increased to such an extent that even before the emergency regulations came into force this difficulty was causing inconvenience and sometimes hardship to patients who had been on the waiting list for over twelve months.

This state of affairs will, I hope, be somewhat relieved by the opening of the new wing this year, but even with this valuable addition the number of available beds will be none too many for the requirements of the area. It is hoped, however, that the chances of admission of certain painful, as well as the dangerous, orthopædic cases will be increased.

Some idea of the work done by the Nursing Staff may be gathered by considering the following summary. The figures are for the year 1939, and apply to the Orthopædic Department only.

The last two items are of particular interest, as they give a great deal of tedious and difficult work for the nursing staff—work which is not always realised and allowed for. The bandages now vary in width from 4-inches to 7-inches, but if 6-inches is taken as an average, then actually 27,360 yards of plaster bandaging is made. As it is all torn, stripped, rubbed and rolled by hand in the theatre and Out-patients Department, it is obvious that this is a considerable task for already busy departments, especially the Out-patients Department, where, although the work has increased, the staff has remained as it was a year ago.

Another point worthy of note is that the Orthopædic Waiting List is usually 25 per cent. of the total Hospital Waiting List.

The advisability of segregating the in-patients must again be emphasised, as only by having orthopædic cases grouped together can the loss of valuable time and bed space be avoided by skilled nursing and the efficient co-relation of the various ancillary services.

The thanks of the department are due to the Nursing Staff and to the Staffs of the Physiotherapy and X-Ray Departments, for their co-operation and help in treatment and diagnosis.

#### (2) ORTHOPTIC DEPARTMENT.

Thanks to the munificence of Mr. Halliday, we were able to open the Orthoptic Clinic on 12th June, 1939, and Miss Jean Bickerton was appointed as Orthoptist. Miss Bickerton was trained at the Birmingham Eye Hospital, where she took the Diploma of the British Board of Orthoptics, and is a registered Medical Auxiliary. She was later Assistant Orthoptist at the Coventry and Warwickshire Hospital. The Department has done very valuable work since its inception, although the full development of the work has been very much retarded owing to the War. Arrangements could not be made with the Public Authorities until the Department was open. Shortly after arrangements had been completed with the Public Authorities for the sending of Schoolchildren to the Clinic, the War started, and all School Medical Services were temporarily closed. It was not until November that Schoolchildren began to be referred for treatment to the Orthoptic Clinic. These figures, therefore, relate mainly to the last two months of the year. #### X-RAY DEPARTMENT.

There has been a still further increase in the number of Diagnostic cases dealt with in the X-ray Department during the year 1939. The total number is 4,713, being an increase of 1,152 on the previous year. This increase is a natural consequence of the increased number of patients treated at the Infirmary during the year; and in particular the considerably increased number attending the Orthopædic Clinic. The treatment set was out of use for three months of the year, also part of the previous year. A comparison of the nine months period of 1939 and 1938 shows that the work in this department has been well maintained (1,166 attendances, as compared with 1,598). Thus it is apparent that the work of the Department continues to progress, and the recent additions to the staff have proved fully justifiable.

#### PATHOLOGICAL DEPARTMENT.

A summary of the Pathological work carried out during the year ended December 31st, 1939, shows a considerable increase on the work of 1938—4,019 specimens were dealt with, as compared with 2,644 for the previous year.

#### REPORT ON THE NURSING STAFF.

There have not been any changes in the Administrative Nursing Staff during the past twelve months.

Sister Kenyon left in March, to take a Midwifery post in Preston; and Sister Rowe, who trained at the Royal Lancaster Infirmary, returned as Junior Night Sister.

Sister Sandbach left in May to be married; and Sister McLaughlin was appointed to the post she relinquished—that of Junior Theatre Sister.

Sister Wright had four months leave of absence in the Spring, to take her Housekeeping Course of training; and Sister Griffiths, whose Midwifery Teacher's course was curtailed because of the War, returned to be in charge of the Maternity Ward in October.

Several of the Nurses in Training were released by the Committee from their agreement shortly after the outbreak of War, as they were to be married—Nurses Knowles, Chapman, M. Gibson, and Hingston. To them and to Mrs. Towers (S. Sandbach) we send our good wishes.

Eleven Nurses entered for the Final State Examination during 1939, 10 were successful in their first entry, one Nurse failing in one subject. Eleven Nurses entered for the Preliminary State Examination, and all were successful on their first entry.

The Infirmary Certificate was granted to eight Nurses who had successfully completed their training. The Nursing Staff much appreciate the renewed kindness of the Medical Staff, in the giving of Lectures to the Nurses.

Early in May a course of 96 hours practical training for members of the Civil Nursing Reserve was commenced at the Infirmary, and several such courses were continued throughout the year. Forty-eight local ladies took advantage of these courses, and 40 certificates of Training were granted. We were pleased to have these Auxiliary Nurses with us, and hope still to continue with new recruits, so long as may be required.

IN-PATIENTS (except Children) may be visited by their relatives and friends as follows :---

Public Wards— Wednesdays from 2-30 p.m. to 3-45 p.m. Saturdays from 2-30 p.m. to 3-45 p.m. Semi-Private Patients, Maternity Ward— Daily from 3 p.m. to 4 p.m. and from 6-30 p.m. to 7-30 p.m.

Private Patients-

Daily from 11 a.m. to 12 noon. and from 2 p.m. to 4 p.m. and from 6-30 p.m. to 7-30 p.m.

Visiting will not be allowed at any other times except with the written permission of the Superintendent-Secretary or the Matron.

Each Patient will be allowed not more than Four Visitors on each Visiting Day, but not more than Two Visitors will be admitted to see the patient at one time.

In the Maternity Ward, each Patient will not be allowed more than TWO ADULT VISITORS on each Visiting-day. Children are NOT ALLOWED to visit in the Maternity Ward.

In the interest of the Children, Visitors are NOT ALLOWED in the Children's Ward.

Any Patient desirous of spiritual advice or consolation shall notify such desire to the Matron, by whom arrangements will be made in accordance with the wishes of such Patient.

Patients who are in a serious condition may be visited by their relatives and friends at any time.

Admission to the Private Wards is by arrangement between the Patient and Member of the Honorary Medical and Surgical Staff.

ByE-LAW 83.—Except in cases of sudden accidents or acute medical or surgical cases, no person shall be sent to the Institution for admission as an IN-PATIENT unless and until the sanction of the Honorary Medical Officer for the day, or, in his absence, of the Resident Medical Officer, to such admission shall have been obtained. In the case of a person residing or being outside the municipal boundary for the time being of the City of Lancaster, whose admission as an In-patient is desired, a certificate must be forwarded to the Resident Medical Officer from a Medical Practitioner, stating the nature of the complaint, and whether, in his opinion, it is a case which might properly be admitted into the Institution, and upon receipt of such Certificate, the Honorary Medical Officer for the day, or in his absence, the Resident Medical Officer, will decide whether the case is a proper one to be admitted, and when the person can be received. Any person sent to the Institution in contravention of this by-law shall be liable to be refused admission.

### Hospital Benefit for Persons with Small Incomes.

Subject to the Rules relating to the Admission of Patients, the Committee have arranged to provide Maintenance and Nursing for Persons with small incomes (not eligible under the Workpeople's Scheme, and hereinafter called Contributors) and their dependents, whilst undergoing Treatment in the Institution, on payment of a quarterly subscription in advance of 3s. 3d. by a Contributor whose income does not exceed  $f_{200}$  a year, or of 5s. ) by a Contributor whose income does not exceed  $f_{300}$  a year.

The term "Dependent" means the husband or wife and young children of a Contributor, and his or her aged parents, if living with and dependent upon them.

The term "Young Children" means those under 16 years of age; and also any Child who has not begun to earn his or her own livelihood.

"Income" means the joint income of husband and wife when the Contributor is married.

Payments to be made at the Infirmary, either by post or personally, between II-0 and I2 on any Monday, Wednesday, or Friday. All postal communications must have the word "Scheme" written on the left hand top corner of the envelope, and must have enclosed a stamped envelope for reply.

Every Contributor must be a member of the Scheme for three months before being able to obtain the benefit of this scheme, and no one can claim the advantage of the scheme who is in arrears.

All outside the scheme (except the poor and needy) are expected to pay such sum per week whilst In-patients as (in the opinion of the Committee) their means justify.

The cost of Maintenance and Nursing works out at about 9s od. per day, and any sum up to that amount may be charged to persons who do not acquire the *Right* to Free Maintenance and Nursing by being Contributors.

The Hon. Medical Staff receive no fees for their services

### THE ANNUAL REPORT.

The Committee has much pleasure in presenting the 51st Annual Report (the 18th dealing with the Scheme).

The Committee regret to announce the death of Mr. G. P. Wood, Carnforth, and beg to state that Mr. Jackson and Mr. Creswell have been appointed collectors for that district.

Mr. C. Connor, another valuable worker for a good number of years, passed away also during the year, and Mr. F. Nutter has been appointed Collector at the C.M.H.

Mr. Ormandy has been appointed as Collector at Hornby; Mr. A. L. Bell, late Collector at Hornby, having gone to reside at Tunstall, and has kindly consented to continue to collect in that district.

We have been approached by many members to continue with our efforts to raise subscriptions to the Cot Fund, which is now still open.

An appeal was made last year, and is still being continued, to endow a Cot in the Children's Ward.

Last year's efforts to this Fund resulted in raising  $\pm 103$ , of which  $\pm 100$  has already been handed over to the Infirmary.

During the year the Committee have handed over to the Maintenance Account the sum of  $\pounds 8,880$ , the same amount as last year, in addition to the  $\pounds$  roo handed over for the Cot Fund, which brings the total amount to  $\pounds 8,980$ .

The amount paid to other Hospitals was £360 12s. 6d., being £39 4s. more than last year.

Maternity Benefits have also been paid to the amount of £18.

We again draw the attention to the eligibility of Benefit, which is Three Months for Medical and Surgical Wards, and the Maternity Wards Twelve Months.

The Maternity Ward is for abnormal and Surgical Cases, or where the home conditions are unsuitable.

Contributors' attention is particularly drawn to the fact that the Workpeople's Contributory Scheme is for treatment in the Wards of the Royal Lancaster Infirmary, therefore, Patients must first be admitted to the Royal Lancaster Infirmary, and be approved by the members of the Infirmary Medical Board before being sent to other Hospitals or Infirmaries, otherwise the Scheme cannot accept any liability. Patients who are in a position to join the Contributory Scheme, and have not done so, will be called on and expected to make payment towards cost of maintenance whilst patients in the Infirmary.

The Committee does not assist Contributors in meeting the cost of Treatment in Private Hospitals, Maternity Homes, Nursing Homes, Sanatoriums, Mental Institutions, or Infectious Diseases Hospitals.

The Committee tender their grateful thanks to all those Employers and Collectors for their continued help, also to the Entertainment Proprietors for arranging the Annual Collections; to the Local Press for their valuable publicity they have given to matters affecting the Scheme; and to all other Subscribers, Donors, and Helpers.

Mitchell,  $\pounds$ 8 13s. 9d.; Lancaster and District Co-operative Society (quarterly subscriptions),  $\pounds$ 81 19s. 2d.; Standfast Dyers and Printers, Ltd. (contra),  $\pounds$ 50; Waring and Gillow (1932) Ltd., Accident Fund,  $\pounds$ 20; Ribble Motor Services Ltd., 25 per cent.,  $\pounds$ 16 10s. 1d.; Carnforth G.P.O. Fines, Games and Benevolent Fund,  $\pounds$ 33 2s. 7d.; Lancaster G.P.O. Benevolent Fund,  $\pounds$ 73 16s. od.; North Lancashire and District Football League,  $\pounds$ 24 10s. od.; Cot Fund,  $\pounds$ 100; Rev. S. A. Nixon,  $\pounds$ 1 1s.; H. The cost of Maintenance during 1939 was 10s. per day average per patient, but during 1940 will be very much higher.

Members treated at the Infirmary during the year were :---Men 473, women 695, children 406, Maternity Ward Private Patients 15, Semiprivate Patients 72, Public Ward 61; total, 1,722.

The number of attendances in the Out-patients' Department are as follows :—Casualties, 10,361; General Out-patients, 7,350; Orthopædic, 4,640; Ante-natal and Post-natal, 620; Orthoptic, 423; Ophthalmic, 740; Massage, 18,640; X-Ray, 4,605; Radium Services, 41; Chiropody, 58; Electrocardiograph, 3; Pathological, 1,060; Gynæcological, 1,840; total, 50,381. Average stay being 15.1 days, compared with 16.6 in 1938.
