REPORT FOR THE YEAR 1947.

THE Board of Management have pleasure in presenting to the Governors the 120th Annual Report of the Royal Sussex County Hospital.

National Health Service Act, 1946. The year has witnessed the clarification of many matters connected with the National Health Service Act, 1946, which His Majesty's Government proposes to put into operation on the 5th July, 1948. On that date—" the appointed day "—the Hospital will, along with almost every other Voluntary Hospital, Public Authority Hospital, Convalescent Home and similar Institution in the Country, be absorbed into a comprehensive health system.

It will be clear, therefore, that 1947 will go on record as the County Hospital's final year of the many it has served a wide area as a Voluntary Hospital. All can be justly proud of its fine achievements and confident that its traditions and high standards will provide an effective yard-stick against which to measure its future activities. Although its system of management is shortly to be changed, the Hospital's spirit, built up for over a century will remain to inspire those who will continue to care for its patients.

The Hospital has been included in the area of the South-East Metropolitan Regional Hospital Board, one of fourteen such Boards appointed under the Act to co-ordinate and administer the hospital services of England and Wales. This particular Board will be responsible for some two hundred acute, mental and chronic-sick hospitals, as well as sanatoria and convalescent homes, in Kent, Sussex and about one-fourth of London itself.

It is evident that the Royal Sussex County Hospital will have an important function to fill in this new scheme, for the area and population for which it provides acute hospital services are the largest in the Regional Board's territory outside of London.

Information is now awaited regarding the formation of the Hospital Management Committee under which the local group of hospitals will function. It is understood to be the Minister of Health's intention to afford the greatest possible measure of de-centralisation in the detailed administration of the new service, and that below the Hospital Management Committee a House Committee will be appointed to deal with the general day-to-day problems of the County Hospital, membership of which will mainly be drawn from existing members of the Board of Management.

Within such an administrative framework a personal touch, local interest and initiative can be retained, and the virtues of the voluntary system, which has achieved so much in the past, preserved to maintain a solid foundation for the future. Finance. The Hospital's financial position is clearly revealed in the Accounts appended to this report.

During the year applications for grants had to be made to the Ministry of Health. Further heavy rises in expenditure, occasioned chiefly by wage and salary increases as well as by the general upward trend of prices and the need to make up ground lost during the war years in the replacement, repair and renovation of equipment, apparatus and buildings, coupled with some diminution of voluntary income, made it evident that, without such assistance, the Hospital's work could not be maintained at the level required.

The Hospital's total ordinary expenditure for the year exceeded its ordinary income by nearly $f_{100,000}$. To offset this the Ministry of Health made grants totalling $f_{50,000}$, the balance $(f_{49,161})$ being carried forward to swell the overdraft, which, after applying the proceeds of the sale of the remainder of its unrestricted investments and the amounts received from untied legacies during the year, now stands at $f_{56,903}$.

The Hospital's Inalienable Fund will be taken over by the Ministry of Health on "the appointed day" and, after certain adjustments, will be pooled with the National Endowments Fund, an appropriate portion of which will be eventually returned to the Regional Board for the benefit of the County and other local hospitals.

The Royal Sussex County Hospital will still welcome and need gifts of money and in kind after "the appointed day." Whilst the ordinary maintenance costs of the Hospital will then be met by the Government, there will still be those "extras" to be provided to bridge the gap which will undoubtedly exist between what may be termed essential minima and that characteristic standard maintained in the past for its patients.

Appeals Department. The voluntary income for the year totalled £,14,728.

The Great One-Day Fair held at the Dome and Corn Exchange in October, under the Chairmanship of the Countess Buxton, G.B.E., and again successfully organised by Miss L. Martin, Appeals Organiser, realised £3,081.

It is gratifying that the Golden Penny League boxes are still bringing in useful sums, the total subscribed being $f_{2,595}$.

An increasing number of patients have shewn their gratitude by joining the Old Patients' Association, and £349 has been contributed towards the "Grateful Remembrance" Beds.

Apart from their customary gift of \pounds 50 to the General Funds, the Trustees of the Bernhard Baron Charitable Trust generously allocated \pounds 1,000 towards the establishment of a Resuscitation Ward in the Bernhard Baron Casualty Department.

Obituary. It is with deep regret the Board record the death of the following friends and supporters of the Hospital, whose generous services will be gratefully remembered :

Miss Joan Hodgson-a member of the Board from 1935 to 1946.

Lt. Col. R. W. McKergow, O.B.E., T.D.—Vice-President of the Hospital in 1925, and a Life Governor.

Mr. C. R. Scrase-Dickins, J.P., D.L.—a Life Governor who was an active member of the Board for twenty years and who held the offices of President in 1913, Vice-President in 1903 and 1933 and Chairman of the Board from 1906 to 1912, and 1919 to 1922.

Major R. L. Thornton, C.B.E., J.P., D.L.—President of the Hospital in 1931, Vice-President in 1907, and a Life Governor. **Board of Management.** The Hon. Mrs. Sturdy and Mr. L. L. W. Lancaster-Gaye were elected to the Board of Management during the year.

Committees. The Executive Committee has continued to shoulder the main burden of the Hospital's affairs, meeting at ten-day intervals to give detailed attention to an ever-widening variety of problems which now beset a large and busy hospital.

The Nursing Committee and the Chapel Committee have rendered splendid help in their respective important fields.

The formation as a Standing Committee of a Catering Committee has also proved useful, having accomplished an entire re-organisation of the dietary service in recent months.

Services to Patients. As the statistical tables included later in this report reveal, pressure on the Hospital's various departments has been unremitting. More In-patients were treated than in 1946 and a great many more sought admission for whom beds were not unfortunately available. The strain on the Out-patient and special departments has also been intensified. Unless additional space can be found to permit their expansion, it is difficult to visualise how they will continue to keep abreast of increasing demands for their services.

Honorary Medical and Surgical Staff. It is the Board's desire to express their appreciation of the highly-skilled and efficient services of the Honorary Medical and Surgical Staff. Their devotion to their patients and to the furtherance of the best interests of the Hospital in general evoke the highest tribute.

During the year the following new appointment was made : Dr. A. M Stewart-Wallace, M.D., M.R.C.P., D.P.M., as Neurologist.

Resident Medical Staff. The Resident Medical Staff have rendered most praiseworthy service to the Hospital and its patients, and particular mention is made of the outstanding work of Mr. J. V. Ellis during the twelve months he filled the arduous post of Resident Surgical Officer and Senior Resident Medical Officer

Nursing Staff. With the financial assistance of the Ministry of Health, two houses at 80/81, Marine Parade, Brighton, were purchased and converted into a Preliminary Training School for Nurses. Accommodation has been provided for fifty students, including commodious sitting and recreation rooms, a silence room for private study, lecture and practical demonstration rooms and a personal laundry.

Students will follow a course of eight weeks in this School before embarking on the recognised training period in the main hospital, The former Preliminary Training School is now in use as a Staff Nurses' Hostel.

Detailed consideration has been given to the Working Party's Report on the recruitment and training of Nurses; and, although it is realised that the recommendations therein will generally apply to the future, when the present wide-spread shortage of Nurses has been solved, the Board has already adopted one of the most important of these. The introduction of an eight-hour day, forty-eight-hour-week "shift" system for student nurses will, it is believed, prove equally beneficial to the students concerned, the patients and the hospital as a whole.

There has been no serious shortage of recruits to the Hospital's Training School, a situation in happy contrast to that in which so many other hospitals unfortunately find themselves and a tribute to the high reputation it enjoys.

Buildings. A number of the proposals outlined in the previous year's report for the adaptation or renovation of various parts of the buildings have been completed. A heavy programme of additional works has also been put in hand for completion with such speed as shortage of labour and materials will allow.

Among the major tasks concluded during the year are :

- (1) Exterior decoration of all main and subsidiary buildings.
- (2) Internal decoration of Defflis and Chichester Wards.
- (3) Reconditioning of the York Block.

Those on which work is still in progress include :

- (1) Modernising and enlargement of the Stephen Ralli Memorial Pathological Department.
- (2) Internal decoration and general reconditioning of Baily Ward.
- (3) Extension to the Sorting-room and conversion of the Staff Mess-room in the Laundry.
- (4) Alterations to the Pharmacy.

Work on the following will shortly be started :

- (1) Internal decoration and fitting of wash-basins in each room of the Howard Wards.
- (2) Change-over from D.C. to A.C. and the general modernisation of the electrical installation in the main building.
- (3) Reconditioning of the Lifts in the main building, Grant Ward and Nurses' Home.
- (4) Construction of a new Kitchen, Sluice, Bath and Sterilising rooms in the Donald Hall Ward.
- (5) Renovation of Egremont, Overton and Bristol Wards.

In addition, much time has been devoted to the preparation of schemes for the alteration of other parts of the building, which it is hoped to bring to fruition during 1948.

Stephen Ralli Memorial Pathological Department. At the request of the Medical Research Council, provision has been made for the establishment of a Public Health Laboratory in the grounds of the Hospital, which will run in close co-operation with the Hospital's own pathological services. Until the necessary building can be erected, the Board has sanctioned the temporary housing of a nucleus of the Public Health Laboratory's staff in the Ralli Department.

X-Ray (Diagnostic) Department. The re-organisation and re-equipment of the X-Ray (Diagnostic) Department have been embarked on after protracted consideration of the many problems involved. Following the advice of Mr. C. Morgan Davies, M.I.E.E., Consulting X-Ray Engineer, orders have been placed for three new powerful diagnostic X-Ray units, while plans are under examination for the general adaptation of the present department to allow this modern equipment to be appropriately housed and to provide a new dark room, waiting room, dressing cubicles and other essential offices.

With the consent of the Ministry of Health, the Board will shortly appoint a full-time Director of the Department. It is believed that this step, along with the new appointments of a Superintendent-Radiographer, a Deputy-Superintendent-Radiograper and dark-room technicians, made necessary by a general re-arrangement of the department's staff, will bring this unit to a high level of accomplishment and efficiency.

A completely new and more spacious department is, in fact, required ; but this must await the removal of existing building restrictions.

Radiotherapy Department. Steady progress has been made in completing the re-organisation of this section. Additional equipment has been installed, and, with the appointment of a full-time Assistant Radiotherapist, a Physicist and a Mould Technician, it can now be said to be well equipped for its task.

Thanks are extended to Dr. J. H. Wilson, Ph.D., of the Brighton Technical College, who, as Honorary Consulting Physicist, has afforded considerable help in the establishment of these facilities.

It seems certain that the Department will have an important function to perform in the future Cancer Service of the Region; and, with this possibility in view, steps have been taken to effect a closer liaison of its activities with those of a large specialist unit in London.

Equipment and Apparatus. In furtherance of their policy to hand over the Hospital to the Regional Board as well equipped as possible, the Board have incurred considerable expenditure on the purchase of many items of medical and surgical apparatus and other equipment, including : (a) an Elmqzist Electrocardiograph, (b) Operating Tables, (c) Ward Bowls and Instruments Sterilisers (d) Electrically-heated Food Trollies, (e) Epidiascope for use in the Nurses' Training School, (f) Patients' Bedside Lockers and Beds, (g) Refrigerators for Ward Kitchens, (h) Short-wave and other electro-medical machines for the Latilla Department.

Their acquisition will enable the Hospital not only to maintain but also to improve its services and so keep abreast of modern requirements.

Catering Department. A Catering Officer is now in charge of this service, and a certificated Dietitian has just taken up her duties, which will include the assessment of nutritional values of patients' and staffs' meals as well as the preparation of all special diets. The Kitchen and Dining-room staffs have also been strengthened.

The Board are gratified at the marked improvement achieved in this department in so short a time.

Plans are under discussion for enlarging the staff diningroom, providing a special dietetic kitchen and expanding the main kitchen to allow the installation of modern equipment.

Changes in Personnel. The Hospital has lost the active help of a number of long-service members of its staffs during the year due to their reaching the normal age for retirement. To each of these suitable acknowledgments of their valued work have been made by the Board, who desire to make particular mention of the following :—

Mr. L. L. W. Lancaster-Gaye, who served the Hospital for 36 years, during 28 of which he held the important appointment of Secretary-Superintendent. His contribution to the progress, efficiency and happiness of the Hospital is incalculable, and it is natural that he will be sorely missed by Committees and staffs alike. The Board have invited him to join them as one of their number.

Miss E. E. Capron, who was Assistant-Matron for 15 of the 21 years she served the Hospital, will be warmly remembered for her devotion to duty.

Miss E. M. Funnell, who was Sister Tutor for 15 years, during which she did so much to improve the Training School for Nurses.

Miss K. M. Ward, who was a member of the Hospital's staff for 21 years, for the greater part of which she held the post of Sister-in-charge of the Latilla Physical Medicine and Rehabilitation Department, leaves behind a wonderful record of achievement.

The vacancies created by these retirements were filled by the following appointments :---

Secretary-Superintendent-Mr. F. G. Dawes, formerly Secretary-Superintendent of the Royal Buckinghamshire Hospital.

Assistant Matron-Miss H. M. Deacon, formerly Home Sister, Royal United Hospital, Bath.

Sister Tutor-Miss H. Kirby, who was promoted from the Assistant-Tutorship.

Superintendent Physiotherapist—Miss L. B. Martin, who has served in the Latilla Department for $8\frac{1}{2}$ years.

The past year also witnessed the retirement of :

Miss Daisy Howell, who during 45 years rendered magnificent service as Resident Linen Room Maid.

Mr. F. Large, who for 40 years served in a number of capacities and more recently as Clerk in the Out-Patient Department.

Other Acknowledgments. Space permits the Board to name only the following amongst the many hundreds of individuals, groups and associations who have assisted in countless ways the progress and work of the Hospital :

80/81, Marine Parade, was opened as a new Preliminary Training School on Friday, 5th March, 1948. These houses provide accommodation for fifty students, including commodious sitting and recreation rooms, a silence room for private study, lecture and practical demonstration rooms and a personal laundry.

I Chapel Terrace, is now used as a Staff Nurses' Hostel.

The associated training of Nurses between King Edward VII (Eliot) Memorial Hospital, Haywards Heath, and the Royal Sussex County Hospital commenced in January, 1948. There are four Royal Sussex County Hospital Nurses at present at Haywards Heath, for a period of three months.

The introduction of a "Shift System" for an eight-hour working day for a forty-eight hour week was commenced on 1st March, for Student Nurses only. This has proved very popular, and appears to be working satisfactorily. This necessitated more Nurses, and re-organisation of the Nurses' Home.
