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

ANNUAL REPORT.

The Committee of Management have pleasure in submitting their Report for the year ended 31st December, 1944; it is again presented in a very abridged form.

COMMITTEE OF MANAGEMENT

The death is recorded with regret of Mr. C. J. Barlow, who, until his later years, had been an active member of the Committee of Management since 1897.

Mr. H. A. Merriman's widely regretted death deprived the Hospital of a valued friend and a generous Hon. Solicitor, an appointment he had held for 25 years. Mr. E. L. V. Waddilove has very kindly agreed to continue Messrs. Smallpeice & Merriman's long association with the Hospital.

Another loss through death is that of Mr. F. H. Elsley, who was elected a Life Governor of the Hospital in recognition of his work in connection with raising large sums of money through the Alexandra Day collections; he was active in this work for over 45 years.

SECRETARY-SUPERINTENDENT

It was with much regret that the Committee received the resignation in May of Captain R. Edwardes, who had been Secretary-Superintendent since 1933; they wish him every success in his new appointment at the Miller General Hospital at Greenwich.

The Committee were fortunate in being able to promote Major M. Thorne, who had previously been Assistant Secretary and Accountant; his intimate knowledge of the administrative departments proved invaluable, especially at a time when exceptional demands were being made on the services of the Hospital.

NURSING STAFF

A very high standard of nursing has been maintained in spite of many wartime difficulties and the Hospital's nursing reputation has been carried to many theatres of war by members of the Nursing Staff who have joined the Navy, Army and Air Force Nursing Services. Three nurses who trained at this Hospital have given their lives on active service abroad. There is still a very urgent national demand for nurses and it is with satisfaction that the Committee can report the training of more nurses in the Hospital than ever before.

THE NATIONAL HEALTH SERVICE.

Our Hospital, along with all other voluntary hospitals, welcomes the Government's proposal to make hospital services available to all who require them.

The Government has made it clear that the voluntary hospitals are to be preserved and are, indeed, essential for the accomplishment of this aim.

The public is now realising what the thousand voluntary hospitals are actually doing; that they provide 100,000 beds, treat $6\frac{1}{2}$ million patients annually, train all the medical students, half the nurses and, in addition, conduct medical and scientific research.

The proposals in the White Paper present two threats to the future of the voluntary hospitals :

(a) that the whole of the proposed planning and administration should be vested in local authorities.

By every proper means the voluntary hospitals are seeking to secure the establishment of bodies responsible for planning and policy on which they and the medical profession would be represented with the local authorities.

(b) In the White Paper the service is alleged to be "free."


The White Paper plan proposes that the hospital service should be provided both by municipal and voluntary hospitals; and that municipal hospitals will be wholly supported from public funds, whereas the voluntary hospitals will receive partial support from public funds and will continue as before to receive voluntary income and thus retain their essential characteristics.

It is clear that, unless the voluntary hospitals continue to receive voluntary support, the amount of public funds that would have to be levied and spent would be greater than that envisaged in the White Paper.

The aims of the voluntary hospitals are :

- (1) Hospital service to be made fully available to everyone who requires it.
- (2) An increase of beds or a better distribution of beds within areas, whichever may be necessary.
- (3) Still closer collaboration between hospitals and Medical Officers of Health, School Doctors and Maternity and Child Welfare Clinics.
- (4) Closer co-ordination of activities in the more systematic development of medical research.
- (5) Means to enable all doctors to keep more closely in touch with hospital practice.
- (6) Still greater facilities for the 'rehabilitation' of the disabled and the after-care of patients generally.
- (7) Freedom for the patient to choose his hospital as well as his doctor.

In any expanded service the voluntary hospitals look forward to taking their full share, but for this it will be necessary not only to maintain but to augment their income so that they may be free to devote all their energies to the task.



DOMESTIC STAFF

Following the acceptance in 1943 of the recommendations of the Rushcliffe Committee in regard to the Nursing Staff, the Committee have now agreed to adopt similar recommendations of the Hetherington Committee, affecting the Domestic Staff; it is willingly acknowledged that standard scales of wages and conditions of service are essential, but the fact remains that this reform has added a considerable financial burden on the Hospital, without, so far, having had an appreciable effect on the short supply of suitable applicants for domestic work.

WORK OF THE YEAR

Every branch of the work of the Hospital has continued to increase and although during the time of emergency, normal admissions were restricted for a period of 181 days, the numbers of in-patients (5,351) and out-patients (20,061) are higher than they have ever been; many more civilian patients were treated than in pre-war years and, in addition, the full demands of the Emergency Medical Service of the Ministry of Health were met during a year which, owing to the invasion of north-west Europe and the subsequent bombing of the London area, was the busiest since the scheme began.

This greatly increased volume of work, carried out under difficult conditions, especially the shortage of suitable staff and accommodation, reflects great credit on the medical, nursing, domestic and administrative staffs as well as the many voluntary helpers whose continued interest and assistance in so many ways is much appreciated.

The Rehabilitation Centre, including Physical and Occupational Therapy units, is now fully staffed and equipped and is proving a valuable addition to the Hospital services in stimulating patients to take an active share in the recovery of their health.

CHAPEL

From time to time it has been suggested that the Hospital should have its own Chapel and it has been the intention of the Committee to endeavour to include its provision in any comprehensive building programme. Meanwhile, consent has been given to a proposal from the Nursing Staff that they should raise sufficient funds to build a temporary Chapel; they have already collected over f_{500} and plans are in hand to erect a building of the pre-fabricated type in the Hospital grounds.

POST-WAR PLANS

For some years it has been obvious that the accommodation in the Hospital is insufficient for present-day requirements. The most urgent and immediate needs are :

Improved and extended accommodation for the nursing staff;

Increased dining room accommodation for non-resident as well as resident staff;

Larger and modern children's wards;

An extension of the out-patients' department.

Other important requirements are :

A new private patients' block ; The modernising of general wards ; Additional office accommodation.

It is realised that building will not be possible until several years after the end of hostilities in Europe, but it is hoped that by that time plans will be completed and the problem of the cost of such an ambitious project will not be so difficult of solution as it appears at the present time.

NATIONAL HEALTH SERVICE

The Government White Paper, published early in 1944, aroused keen interest, especially among those connected with the Hospital world. Some of the proposals, particularly those concerning administration and finance, are unacceptable to Voluntary Hospitals; these matters have since been the subject of negotiation between the British Hospitals Association and the Minister of Health and it is confidently hoped that agreement will be reached which will enable Voluntary Hospitals to continue their important share in the health services of the nation. Further details of the Voluntary Hospital policy with reference to the Government proposals will be found on the enclosed leaflet.

FINANCE

Early in 1944 the Committee were reluctantly compelled to realise securities to the value of \pounds 12,000 to balance the Bank overdraft on the General Account. Contributions from the general public prove continued interest in our Voluntary Hospital as is shown by increased subscriptions and donations, record collections on Alexandra Day and a generous contribution from the West Surrey and Aldershot Hospital League, yet the ever advancing cost of hospital maintenance is such that, as the audited accounts on pages 12 to 23 show, there is a serious deficit again this year. although a substantial payment was made by the Ministry of Health for those patients for whom they accept financial responsibility.

The financial position of the Hospital is a matter of constant anxiety to the Committee, for they realise that it is probable that even without a further increase in the present ratio of expenditure to income, all available capital reserves may be exhausted before the measure of security proposed through the National Health Service can be established.

NOMINATION OF BEDS.

Any person giving a donation of $\pounds 1,000$ or a continued annual subscription of fifty guineas, may, if he chooses have a bed named and shall have the right during his lifetime to nominate an occupant for a bed in the Hospital, such patient, however, shall be subject to the rules and regulations of the Hospital, including the assessment of capacity to pay towards the cost of maintenance.


