THE Annual Meeting of Trustees and Subscribers was held in the Town Hall, Liverpool, on Wednesday, 25th March, 1936.

THE LORD MAYOR, Councillor R. J. Hall, presided.

THE SECRETARY read the notice convening the meeting.

The Annual Report and Accounts having been taken as read, the Rt. Hon. The Earl of Sefton, *President*, said:—

MY LORD MAYOR, LADIES AND GENTLEMEN,

Before formally moving the resolution standing in my name, I cannot refrain from mentioning the tragedy fresh in our minds—the death of His Majesty, King George V. Hospitals throughout the country owe such a tremendously deep debt of gratitude to our Royal Family that the passing of the great and universally loved Sovereign must touch us and touch all the hospitals very personally. Our late King made it very plain during his long and difficult reign that his first thought was always for the health and welfare of his subjects.

I would like to make one or two observations on the Report and Accounts for the year 1935.

It will be seen from the statistics before you that the work of the Hospital has further increased during the year. 4,133 patients were admitted to the wards, 149 more than last year, while 26,979 out-patients were treated as compared with 25,290 in 1934, an increase of 1,689. As intimated last year, extensive improvements to the Operating Theatres have had to be undertaken during the year in order to cope with the increasing work. These improvements are nearing completion.

I would like to make public acknowledgment of the zealous efforts of the News-Chronicle Wireless for Hospitals Fund which have made possible the installation of radio throughout the wards of the Hospital. (Hear, hear). There is a set of earphones at every bedside. Wireless has undoubtedly brought added comfort to the patients.

With regard to the accounts, I am very pleased to be able to record an increased Revenue. The total income from all sources amounted to £43,500, as compared with £38,727 for 1934. This figure includes a sum of £12,109 by way of free legacies. The grant from the Merseyside Hospitals Council amounted to £10,737 as compared with £10,626 for 1934. This grant represented 77% of the actual cost to the Hospital of treating members of the Penny in the Pound Fund, and the increased grant is the outcome of the agreement arrived at last year between the Hospitals and the Merseyside Hospitals Council for a basis of distribution more in accordance with the services rendered. The total receipts from patients and their societies for services rendered show an increase of £716, which is very gratifying. The big drop in receipts from Public Authorities, amounting to some £2,000 was owing to the termination in January last year of the agreement with the Liverpool Corporation for the treatment of venereal diseases. There has also been a regrettable falling off in annual subscriptions and I propose to make further reference to this later on.

On the Ordinary Expenditure side there was a net increase of £277. The Hospital's Milk bill for the year has soared still higher, but in this instance we are at the mercy of the Milk Marketing Board, who, as you know, fix the prices for this commodity. The increase under the other heads of expenditure are explained on page 18 of the Report and which, I think you will agree, were quite unavoidable.

You will also see that on the ordinary Income and Expenditure Account there was a Deficit of £5,039. The Finance Committee budgeted for a much higher deficit, but a most welcome contribution of £2,000 from the Maintenance Committee actually enabled us to show a lower deficit than last year. I must here interpose an expression of our warm appreciation of the Maintenance Committee's zealous efforts throughout the year for the benefit of the Hospital.

(Hear, hear).

I would like to draw special attention to a very pleasing feature in the Balance Sheet, that is, the substantial increase in the Hospital's reserve of free securities from £939 to over

£12,000. (Hear, hear). In other words we have been able to invest the bulk of our legacies which were received during 1935. This step accords with the set policy of the Finance Committee to invest whenever possible our free legacies with a view to re-stabilising the Hospital's financial position, instead of using them for ordinary maintenance purposes. I think, however, that we ought not to allow our good fortune of the past year to make us too sanguine with regard to the future. Legacies, are, of course, always welcome, but at the same time they are a fluctuating factor. What is needed is reliable and regular income and this brings me to my previous reference to Annual Subscriptions which you will notice are diminishing. I cannot stress too emphatically the need for more annual subscriptions. We shall remember with lasting gratitude the spontaneous response of the public which saved the "Southern." I am confident that the same spirit will be evinced when I appeal, as I do most earnestly, for more annual subscribers to maintain it. Will you, therefore, take every opportunity of interesting your friends and enlisting them as annual subscribers in order that the Hospital may continue its great work?

Finally, I wish to express on your behalf our gratitude to the Lord Mayor and to the Lady Mayoress for the sympathetic and kindly interest which they have shown in the work of our Hospital. Their visit to the Hospital at Christmas time was deeply appreciated. Also to thank you, My Lord Mayor, very sincerely for allowing us to hold this meeting in the Town Hall.

I now formally move:—

THAT THE REPORT AND STATEMENT OF ACCOUNTS BE ADOPTED, PRINTED AND CIRCULATED AMONGST THE TRUSTEES AND SUBSCRIBERS. (Applause).

Mr. T. R. W. ARMOUR, seconding the adoption of the Annual Report and Statement of Accounts, said:—My Lord Mayor, Ladies and Gentlemen,—It gives me very great pleasure to second the motion so ably proposed by our President, Lord Sefton. Lord Sefton's influence and pressing kindness has already been felt in many different directions in Hospitals, even during the short time he has been in office. (Applause).

He has referred to the improved financial condition of the Hospital. May I touch on that for a few minutes? Four years ago this Hospital was faced with a large overdraft and the bank threatened to withdraw its credit. It had three assets. It had its buildings; it had its land; and it had its reputation. With regard to the buildings, a gloomy gentleman came down from London on a gloomy day along with some gloomy friends and wrote a very gloomy report about the Hospital, saying the only thing he could do with it was to close it. A counsel of despair! And I think, My Lord Mayor, expressed the not too flattering opinion of the value of the land. So we were left with our reputation—a reputation which was established by men like John Cameron, William Carter, William Alexander, and Sir Robert Jones; and that reputation was backed up by the City of Liverpool to the tune of £40,000 in a little over four years. That £40,000 was voluntarily given, apart from the contributions received in the ordinary way. That money was not the munificence of a few, it was the support of many. In consequence we have an overdraft at the bank which, though still an overdraft, is not so much as it was four years ago, and I have not heard of the bank troubling about it lately.

We have also been able to improve the Hospital in many directions during these four years, and I have the feeling that if that gloomy gentleman came down again on a bright day he might not take such a gloomy view of the Hospital as on that day four years ago. (Applause).

Amalgamation is in the air. I expect you, yourselves, have at this present time a feeling, a kind of wish that it was a fait accompli rather than in the air. But when that day comes our Hospital will no longer be a poor relation, clinging to the coat-tails of more prosperous relatives, and hoping to get a haven of rest in that way. It will be in a position to take its full part in the amalgamation and to do its duty in the greater and wider scope that it will be called upon to do in that amalgamation. I have great pleasure in seconding the motion. (Applause).

The motion was carried unanimously.

Mr. IAN R. PARKER, *Honorary Treasurer*, said:—My Lord Mayor, Ladies and Gentlemen,—The President has already outlined for you the financial position of the Hospital, and unless any of you have questions to ask I do not think there are any other points to which I need call your attention.

I should like to reiterate, however, our great need for more annual subscribers, the number of whom have been steadily decreasing of late years.

Our President, Lord Sefton, has set an example by giving us a subscription this year of a hundred guineas. It is, perhaps, expecting too much to hope for many subscriptions such as this, but if each of you could obtain even one regular subscriber during this year you would be doing the Hospital a lasting service. I now have much pleasure in proposing the following resolution:—That the best thanks of this Meeting be given to subscribers and donors of money and gifts in kind.

Mr. H. P. MOUNSEY seconded, and the motion was carried unanimously.

Mr. J. T. MORRISON proposed, "that, as recommended by resolution of the General Committee, the alterations of the General Laws be authorised." (The amended Laws are as follow):—

#### GENERAL LAW 21.

##### Old Law:—

21. SURGEONS' QUALIFICATIONS—Candidates for the post of Honorary Surgeon at all Elections held after December 31st, 1912, must possess the Fellowship of the Royal College of Surgeons of England, Edinburgh or Ireland, and the Candidate appointed, if not possessing the Fellowship of the Royal College of Surgeons of England, shall undertake to obtain that qualification within four years of his appointment failing which his appointment shall, *ipso facto*, become terminated.

##### New Law:—

21. SURGEONS' QUALIFICATIONS—Candidates for the post of Honorary Surgeon must possess the Fellowship of the Royal College of Surgeons of England.

#### GENERAL LAW 21a.

##### Old Law:—

21a. HONORARY ASSISTANT PHYSICIANS' AND HONORARY ASSISTANT SURGEONS' QUALIFICATIONS—Candidates for the post of Honorary Assistant Physician or Honorary Assistant Surgeon must possess the qualifications necessary for the post of Honorary Physician or Honorary Surgeon respectively. In the case of the Honorary Assistant Surgeon, the candidate appointed, if not already possessing the Fellowship of the Royal College of Surgeons of England shall undertake to obtain that qualification within four years of his appointment, and, in the case of the Honorary Assistant Physician, the candidate appointed, if not already possessing the Membership of the Royal College of Physicians of London, shall undertake to obtain that qualification within four years of his appointment failing which his appointment shall, *ipso facto*, become terminated.

##### New Law:—

21a. HONORARY ASSISTANT PHYSICIANS' AND HONORARY ASSISTANT SURGEONS' QUALIFICATIONS—Candidates for the post of Honorary Assistant Physician or Honorary Assistant Surgeon must possess the qualifications necessary for the post of Honorary Physician or Honorary Surgeon respectively.

#### NEW GENERAL LAW 21c.

21c. SPECIALISTS' QUALIFICATIONS—Specialists should possess the same (or comparable) qualifications as the Honorary Physicians or the Honorary Surgeons.

Mr. A. C. TURNER seconded.

The Lord Mayor asked if there were any comments before the motion was put to the meeting.

Mr. P. C. KELLY said:—My Lord Mayor, Ladies and Gentlemen,—I do not wish to strike a discordant note, but I think it is general knowledge that many eminent surgeons have qualified at Edinburgh or Dublin Universities, and the welfare of the Hospital might be sufficiently guarded by the Laws in operation at the present moment. It is admitted, I think, generally, that the qualification F.R.C.S. (London) is the supreme qualification in the United Kingdom, but with the safeguard which already exists that within a period of four years any F.R.C.S. of Dublin or Edinburgh should acquire the British qualification, it appears to be completely safeguarded, and we might thereby not lose an extremely eminent surgeon or physician who otherwise would be eligible to perform his valuable services at the Hospital. (Hear, hear).

Mr. MORRISON said:—It is true that theoretically we are safeguarded in this direction already, but those who have known the Hospital for any length of time will realise that certain difficulties have arisen in connection with this guarantee that within four years an F.R.C.S. (London) should be obtained. There is no disqualification, of course, of those who graduate at any university in the country. Finally, it might be said that there might possibly be a shortage of suitable candidates if we insist on this very high standard. I think that those who know the situation will have no hesitation on those grounds at all.

On being put to the meeting by the Lord Mayor, the resolution was carried.

Mr. H. SUTTON TIMMIS, proposing "that, as nominated by the General Committee, the Rt. Hon. the Earl of Sefton be and is hereby elected President for the year ensuing," said:—As the Earl of Sefton is present I will spare him any eulogies.

CAPT. GORDON ROBERTSON, seconding, said:—My Lord Mayor, Ladies and Gentlemen,—I have much pleasure in seconding the proposal, we are all so glad that Lord Sefton is remaining with us. You have often told me how much you sympathise with the Voluntary Hospitals, and you will be pleased to hear that the past year, under Lord Sefton's presidency, has been most encouraging for the state of the Hospital. (Applause).

Alderman J. G. PARIS, proposing "that the members nominated to serve on the General Committee for the ensuing year be and are hereby elected," said:—My Lord Mayor, Ladies and Gentlemen,—I would like to say Liverpool has never been backward in finding men who give of themselves and who give their personal services on behalf of the sick and suffering, and it is a great delight to see that here in these gentlemen to be nominated to serve on this Committee for next year, are those that the city has every confidence in, and know that as far as the Southern Hospital is concerned its management is perfectly safe in their hands. (Hear, hear).

Mr. A. C. PROUDMAN seconded, and the motion was carried unanimously.

Mr. T. KEELING, proposing "that the Honorary Medical Officers nominated be and are hereby confirmed in their respective appointments for the year ensuing," said:—My Lord Mayor, Ladies and Gentlemen,—My continued contact with the Voluntary Hospital is making me realise that if this great Voluntary Hospital system of ours is to break down, then it will do so from a shortage of money. It will never fail from lack of whole-hearted, willing service, and those who are giving that whole-hearted, voluntary service are the honorary medical and surgical specialists attached to the Hospital. We, at the Southern Hospital, are very well served in that respect, and it is my privilege to move that the Honorary Medical Officers be appointed.

Mr. R. WATSON: I have great pleasure in seconding the proposition.

The motion was carried with acclamation.

Mr. P. C. KELLY, proposing "that the best thanks of this meeting be given to the President, Honorary Treasurer, Committee, and Honorary Medical Officers for their valuable services during the past year," said:—My Lord Mayor, Ladies and Gentlemen,—I have had the privilege of proposing this resolution on so many occasions that it is impossible for me to make any new remarks to-day. So far as our President is concerned, our appreciation of his retaining that office has been adequately expressed, and I think it would be indelicate for me to endeavour to say anything further. Our thanks certainly are due to the Honorary Treasurer. He has taken on an arduous, troublesome, and somewhat difficult task, but he has, I am glad to say, shown a large measure of success this year. The Hospital, we all know, was in a bad way. Now it is in a better position, and I trust that under his management of the finances it will continue to show increased prosperity.

To the Committee we are indeed very much indebted for the services they have given, and have given in the majority of cases for a number of years. As regards the Honorary Medical Officers I do not think too much can be said. We know what they do; we appreciate their work and self-sacrifice, and the amount of labour they put in for the patients of the Hospital will bring, if not a big reward, at least the feeling of satisfaction that a good deed well done always creates.

Mr. A. YARWOOD seconded, and the motion was carried unanimously.

Mr. A. STOTT said:—It gives me very great pleasure to propose a vote of thanks to the Resident Medical and Nursing Staffs for their careful and zealous attention to the patients during the past year. The Committee of which I am chairman have, on many occasions, owing to financial matters, had to refuse to give to the Hospital staffs and those working in the Hospital little things which might make life easier, but it is a great pleasure when, after having done so, you go down to the Hospital and you are met with smiles of happiness. It shows that the feeling, at any rate, is good and it is due very largely, I am sure, to that feeling that the Hospital is so successful. (Applause).

I would like to pay a special tribute to the staff generally, not only for the service they have given to the Hospital, but also for the great help they have given us in putting our finances in order when we were in difficult times. They have put their whole heart into helping us to get the finances right. They have made sweets and sold them, and have done all sorts of things which have helped. Finally, with the very great help of the Honoraries, their wives and friends, during the last four years, to collect the

magnificent sum of £37,000. It is a great effort because it has not been from one particular appeal, but by a lot of small appeals, and you can judge from that how much work has been put in to obtain it. I have very great pleasure in proposing the vote of thanks.

Mr. W. R. WILLIAMS:—I have much pleasure in seconding the resolution.

On being put to the meeting, the motion was carried unanimously.

Mr. A. STOTT said:—My Lord Mayor, Ladies and Gentlemen,—I am sorry to get up again. As a matter of fact I think this motion should be a seconding and not a proposal, because a proposal has already been made by the President thanking you for the use of the Town Hall and for presiding at this meeting; but I am glad of the opportunity of also thanking you on this occasion because I want also to take this opportunity of thanking you for the deep and kind interest you took in the Hospital when you visited us at Christmas time.

I was very interested to read in the paper last night your reference to the Voluntary Hospitals. I am quite sure that you are not at all anxious to have two chills, and therefore I think we as a Voluntary Hospital system can look forward to your support of that system, and I hope with that support we may very soon see in the city a state of "live and let live" for the chief Hospital services of the town. (Applause).

THE LORD MAYOR, responding, said:—It is very kind of you, Mr. Stott to propose a vote of thanks to me this morning. I did not anticipate that my sins would be cast before me at a meeting of this kind, and I was somewhat shocked when I saw Mr. Armour rising to recite my little error of judgment. I am also glad that Mr. Stott referred to my visit to the Southern Hospital because I do feel it is a subject of congratulation to those who are responsible for the management of the Hospital. I must say quite frankly that when I visited the Southern Hospital it was a very much brighter and very much more efficient Hospital than I expected to find. (Hear, hear and applause).

The work of the Hospital is simply amazing in the south end of Liverpool. The population there may increase because of the rebuilding programme which is in contemplation, and I think you might safely say that the work you are doing in the Southern Hospital is relieving the city rates of possibly erecting another hospital there. (Hear, hear). One is bound to take into consideration that notwithstanding the improved conditions of housing, the people are more Hospital-minded than they used to be, and I think that is largely due to the increased kindness which patients receive in Hospitals as compared with what they received, say 30 or 40 years ago. The service and the kindness of the Medical Officers of these Hospitals impress me very much indeed, and I think the city is rich in its voluntary services. Right from you, Lord Sefton, down, through the various agencies, everybody seems to pull their weight, and I think this Hospital derives a very great amount of encouragement from your President. His name has been honoured in Liverpool for centuries, and I cannot imagine a more useful association than for him to be linked up with this Hospital with such great traditions.

I think it is wonderful to find that Mr. Timmis, and I think, his father-in-law, represent a period of continued service of 87 years. (Applause). Really, many a Lord Mayor has never had half that record. (Laughter). They are worthy of the very highest praise, as also is Mr. Stott, and I could go through them all. Each one has a special knowledge of the south end. I congratulate you.




THE LIVERPOOL SOUTHERN AND TONTETH HOSPITAL IN 1842.




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THE ROYAL SOUTHERN HOSPITAL WHEN OPENED IN 1872.

OUT-PATIENT DEPARTMENT.—In furtherance of the principle that this Department should be used for consultative purposes only, except in cases of accident and emergency, the Out-patient Department Dispensary was closed as from 1st July, 1933. Such prescriptions as are required for out-patients are dispensed in the Hospital.

FRACTURE CLINIC.—At the instigation of the Medical Board a daily Fracture Clinic organised on the basis of the scheme outlined in the British Medical Association's Report of February, 1935, has been instituted during the year as a special adjunct to the Orthopædic Department. This Clinic has undoubtedly proved of immense benefit to the patients, affording as it does specialised attention to and closer supervision over all fracture cases, thereby expediting the patients' recovery and enabling them to return sooner to their employment. A special X-ray Print Room for the use of this Clinic has also been established.

OPERATIONS.—The number of surgical operations continues to increase both in the Hospital and the Out-Patient Department.

#### OPERATING THEATRE IMPROVEMENTS.

The Committee are pleased to report that it has become financially possible to proceed with long-needed improvements and rearrangement of the Operating Theatres to enable the Surgical Staff to cope with the increasing work. The scheme of improvements will, when completed, increase the block to three Operating Theatres to meet modern requirements, and provide a new Sterilising Room, Sterilisers, and an improved heating and ventilating system. The plans for these improvements were prepared by Mr. Gilbert Fraser, F.R.I.B.A., who has devoted considerable care and attention to every detail of his difficult task. The Committee's best thanks are also due to Mr. Ernest Griffiths, M.I.Mech.E., the Hospital's Consulting Engineer, for valuable services in connection with the heating, ventilating and water services. A contract amounting to £2,334 for carrying out the improvements was placed with Messrs. Tysons (Contractors) Ltd. In addition it has become necessary to purchase new equipment for the small Theatre and instruments at a cost of £250. It is anticipated that new equipment for the Main Theatre also will be required and this matter is at present under consideration.

**SCHOOL OF MASSAGE, MEDICAL GYM-  
NASTICS AND MEDICAL ELECTRICITY.** In order to conform with the requirements of the Chartered Society of Massage and Medical Gymnastics, students are now accepted for the full training in the Conjoint, Medical Electricity and Light and Electro-therapy, and not for the Conjoint Course only.

During 1934 the Committee investigated the increasing cost of the School of Massage and Massage Department, and decided, after very careful consideration to reorganise the Department on a more economical basis. By this means the School of Massage will be run on modified lines, whilst maintaining the same standard of training for Students and without impairing the treatment of the patients.

**CHILDREN'S DEPARTMENT.**—The work of this Department continues unabated both in the Hospital and in the Out-patient Clinics in cordial co-operation with the Liverpool Child Welfare Association and kindred bodies. 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**VENEREAL DISEASES.**—The Committee in July, 1934, received notice from the Liverpool Corporation to terminate the Agreement with the Hospital for the diagnosis and treatment of Venereal Diseases. Representations were made to the Ministry of Health urging the need for the continuance of the Agreement, but without avail. The Committee instituted a Female Clinic in connection with the Gynæcological Department.

The laboratory has continued its usefulness during the year not only to hospital patients, but also to staff and students.

Most valuable assistance is given by the Assistant Medical Officers of Health in connection with Schick testing and immunisation of the Nursing Staff against diphtheria.

The transfer of the Biochemistry room from one of the ward annexes to the new laboratory block has been of great advantage, for biochemistry is so interconnected with the other branches of clinical pathology that the laboratory can now function as an efficiently organised unit.

One of the rooms in the new laboratory—in part a museum in embryo—is equipped with apparatus for demonstrations to students, and its close connection with the other departments of the laboratory makes for more adequate teaching of clinical pathology.

### **FINANCE, 1935.**

Owing to the difficulties which have been encountered in obtaining the signature of individual Trustees for Securities to documents relating to Stock transactions, it was decided to appoint Martins Bank, Limited, as Trustees for the Hospital's investments and to transfer existing and future Hospital Securities into the name of the Bank's nominee company, Brunswick Street Nominees, Ltd.

**THE FINANCE COMMITTEE.**—As intimated in last year's Report, a Finance Committee constituted of representatives of all departments of the Hospital has been set up for the special purpose of surveying the financial position of the Hospital periodically and advising the Committee on matters entailing unusual expenditure for special purposes. In pursuance of the Committee's policy to stabilise the Hospital's financial position, the sum of £9989 4s. 3d. received during the year from free legacies has been invested in £6,100 London Electric Transport Finance Corporation, Limited, 2½% Debenture Stock and £3,944 16s. 9d. Funding Stock 3%.

This greatly improved position is most gratifying and an encouragement to the Committee in their efforts to replenish the Hospital's reserve of free securities.

The Committee are most anxious to continue this policy, and donations in the form of investments would, therefore, be most welcome.

**THE MAINTENANCE COMMITTEE.**—This Committee (which was instituted when the former Appeal Committee was dissolved at the end of 1933) has been active throughout the year, having organised many successful functions which have resulted in a net income of £1822 as compared with £1316 for 1934. The sum of £2000 was transferred to the General Fund, leaving a balance of £3704 available for maintenance purposes at the end of the year.

The Committee desire to tender to the Maintenance Committee hearty congratulations on the results of their activities during the year, with an expression of sincere gratitude for the unremitting efforts of the Sectional Committees to ensure the success of the various functions for the benefit of the Hospital.

Since May, 1932, to date, the former Appeal Committee and the present Maintenance Committee have raised over £36,000 for the Hospital. The General Committee desire to record their warm appreciation of this wonderful record of devoted service.

SUBSCRIPTIONS, DONATIONS AND RECEIPTS ON ACCOUNT OF SERVICES RENDERED.—The Committee regret to record decreases in Income from these sources, the heaviest loss being attributable to the termination by the Liverpool Corporation in January of the Agreement with the Hospital for Venereal Disease services. It is gratifying to note, however, that contributions from patients and their societies have increased by £716 10s. 3d. as detailed on page 46.

MERSEYSIDE HOSPITALS COUNCIL. The Committee wish to renew their grateful appreciation of the Grant from the Merseyside Hospitals Council, which amounted in 1935 to £10,737, as compared with £10,626 for the year 1934, an increase of £111.

During the year 1934 an agreement was arrived at between the Associated Hospitals and the Merseyside Hospitals Council for a more acceptable basis of distribution of the main part of the funds collected under the 1d. in the £ Scheme, whereby the services rendered by each Hospital are reduced to a common unit basis and the amount available for distribution in respect of services to contributors is allocated in proportion to the units of service rendered. The final Grant each year is made upon the audited accounts of the Hospitals for the preceding year. This new basis of distribution came into operation on 1st January, 1935.

ROAD TRAFFIC ACT.—The number of cases treated in the wards as the result of motor accidents was 29. The total cost to the Hospital was £254 0s. 4d., towards which £107 4s. 11d. was received from Insurance Companies in settlement of 9 claims. At the close of the year negotiations were proceeding with the Insurance Companies with regard to the other 20 cases. The sum of £116 1s. 1d. was also received from Insurance Companies in settlement of 8 claims which were outstanding at the end of 1934.

This was later sold and the proceeds together with £200 received upon redemption of a Mersey Docks and Harbour Board 5% Bond were reinvested in £10315 0s. 7d. Conversion Stock 3½%.

A holding of £675 Local Loans 3% Stock held on account of General Fund was realised and part of the proceeds invested in £575 11s. 10d. Conversion Stock 3½% a small balance of £29 13s. 4d. in cash being retained.

## SPECIAL FUNDS.

Although the Capital and Income of these funds are not available for purposes other than those for which the funds are established, they are of considerable value in that they augment the services of the Hospital in accordance with the particular needs for which they are intended to provide. The Committee's grateful thanks are given to those who have supported these funds during the year.

**CHRISTMAS FUND.**—Donations to this Fund for the year 1935, in response to the Treasurer's appeal, amounted to £186 5s. 0d. as compared with £120 3s. 6d. for 1934. The Christmas cheer provided by this Fund was greatly appreciated by both the patients and staff, and on their behalf the Committee tender sincere thanks to the numerous friends of the Hospital who sent donations. (For list of donations see pages 102 to 104.)

**JOHN RANKIN FUND FOR NURSES.** This Fund provides educational and social benefits which are greatly appreciated by the Nursing Staff. For these special advantages for the welfare of the Nurses, the Fund during the year disbursed the sum of £463 6s. 5d.

**CONVALESCENT FUND.** As a large proportion of the patients are entitled to free convalescent treatment under the 1d. in the £ Scheme, the use of this Fund is limited to those who are not in that category. It is believed, however, that new arrangements that have been made will greatly enhance the usefulness of this Fund in the very valuable work it performs. Three cases benefited during the year at the Southport Convalescent Hospital.

**"AFTER-CARE" FUND.** The auxiliary "After-care" services of the Merseyside Hospitals' Council and the Personal Service Society provide considerable benefits and this Fund is now used only for cases not assisted by those bodies. At the end of the year there was a balance of £33 18s. 6d.

**TEACHING AND RESEARCH FUND.** The important work of teaching and research has continued during the year, and the Fund provided Instruments and Appliances at a cost of £5 16s. 0d. A sum of £660 was invested in £608 18s. 0d. 3½% Conversion Loan.

**CHILDREN'S DEPARTMENT FUND.** A sum of £20 17s. 1d. was expended on two wash-basins for the Children's Ward.

**THE LIVERPOOL VOLUNTARY HOSPITALS.**  
The Report of the Liverpool Voluntary Hospitals Commission has been considered by lay representatives of the four General Hospitals and by the combined Medical Boards of those Hospitals. A Provisional Committee constituted of lay and medical representatives of the nine Teaching Hospitals of Liverpool was set up, to consider the recommendations contained in the Commission's Report regarding the formation of a Voluntary Hospitals Committee. Mr. A. Stott and Mr. Ian R. Parker (lay) and Mr. J. T. Morrison (medical) were nominated as the Hospital's representatives on the Provisional Committee.

The Voluntary Hospitals Committee (designated the Associated Voluntary Hospitals Board) was duly appointed to consider the further proposals contained in the Commission's Report, to consult with and advise the nine Teaching Hospitals in respect of their problems, policies and needs, and to negotiate with the Municipality. The Board as suggested by the Provisional Committee consists of 6 laymen, 3 medical men appointed by the Hospital Staffs Association, 1 lay and 1 medical representative of the University. Mr. A. Stott, Chairman of our Board of Management, is one of the 6 lay members of the Board.

In view of the formation of the Associated Voluntary Hospitals Board, the Liverpool General Hospitals Co-ordination Committee has been dissolved and the records of that Committee transferred to the new Board.

General agreement has also been reached among the nine Teaching Hospitals with regard to the formation of a Common Electoral Body responsible for appointments to the Honorary Staffs of such Hospitals. Pending the necessary

legal alterations in the constitutions of the Hospitals, the Associated Voluntary Hospitals Board, supplemented by two lay and two medical representatives of the Hospital where a vacancy occurs, will function as a Common Electoral Body.

#### INSTITUTION OF "CLEARANCE" WARDS.

Consequent on the termination of the Agreement with the Liverpool Corporation for the treatment of venereal diseases, the two Killick Wards have, on the advice of the Medical Board, been converted into Clearance Wards. The purpose of this scheme is to transfer to these beds patients in a convalescent stage in order that beds in the general wards may be readily available for the admission of emergency cases. The scheme entailed sanitary alterations, redecorations, new equipment and furniture at a cost of £400. The Liverpool Corporation in response to representations by the Committee made a grant of £50 towards the cost of these alterations.

**WIRELESS FOR THE PATIENTS.** The Committee desire to record their feelings of appreciation of the zealous efforts of the News-Chronicle Wireless for Hospitals Fund which have made possible the installation of Radio throughout the Wards of the Hospital. Wireless has brought to the patients no small measure of added comfort and enjoyment.

**IMPROVEMENTS.** The Hospital Towers, which were erected when the present building was constructed in 1872 have had to receive attention during the year. On the advice of the Architect, the finials and crestings which were in a dangerous condition were removed and lead cappings were substituted. The Towers were also re-tiered and the slates made secure.

**STUDENTS' CANTEEN.** For the convenience of Medical and Massage Students, a Canteen has been instituted in the Out-patient Department, where for a moderate charge a hot luncheon is provided under comfortable conditions. The fact that the Canteen is well patronised is ample evidence of its popularity.

### **PERSONNEL.**

The following changes in personnel have taken place during the year :—

ADMINISTRATION. General Committee: Professor W. Lyon Blease resigned; he had been a member for seven years.

Mr. N. J. McNamara, who succeeded Mr. S. T. Sugden as Pharmacist, resigned in August, and the vacancy was filled by the appointment of Mr. W. A. Woodard, M.P.S., of St. Thomas's Hospital, London.

MEDICAL. Mr. B. L. McFarland, F.R.C.S., was appointed Honorary Orthopædic Surgeon in succession to Mr. T. R. W. Armour, F.R.C.S., resigned.

Dr. R. W. Brookfield was appointed as Medical Officer in charge of the Cardiological Department.

Dr. R. M. B. MacKenna was appointed as Honorary in charge of the Actino-therapeutic Department.

Dr. Constance M. Tinkler was appointed as Special Clinical Assistant to the Gynæcological Department.

Mr. R. W. Doyle, F.R.C.S., was appointed as Surgical Tutor and Registrar in succession to Mr. O. Vaughan Jones, resigned.

Dr. Charles Vaillant, B.M., B.Ch. (Oxon) was appointed as Medical Tutor and Registrar in succession to Dr. G. J. Evans, resigned.

Mr. E. C. Bell Jones, F.R.C.S., was appointed as Orthopædic Registrar.

## REPORT OF MAINTENANCE COMMITTEE.

It gives the Maintenance Committee much pleasure to report that 1935, their second year of office, has yielded a gratifying increase in the amount collected.

Early in the year they were able to transfer £2000 to the General Account of the Hospital and the amount received from all sources during the year—£2186, or £509 more than in 1934, enabled them to look forward to the transfer of an even larger amount in the beginning of 1936. This would not have been possible but for the work of the Sectional Committees whose energy and skill the Committee acknowledge most gratefully.

On March 17th, 1935, a Wireless Appeal made by the Most Reverend Dr. Downey, Archbishop of Liverpool, brought in £133 8s. 6d., and the Committee wish to express their indebtedness for his great kindness on this occasion and their thanks to the B.B.C. for the broadcast and for the special facilities they allowed.

On March 23rd, the 1935 Flag Day Collection was held by kind permission of the Watch Committee and the Chief Constable. The weather was, if anything, more inclement than in 1934, but, notwithstanding this, £632 10s. 10d. was obtained. This splendid result was due to the special efforts of the Chairman and members of the Flag Day Committee, who were warmly congratulated.

A Flag Day held in Rhyl later in the year realised £22 16s. 3d. and the Committee extend their thanks to those who organised the collection in that town, to the North Wales Committee and to the Harlech Hospital League who sent a donation of £5 5s. 0d.

In June, Messrs. Lever Bros. again organised a football match between teams representing Port Sunlight and Tranmere Rovers, at their Port Sunlight Ground. £9 13s. 0d. was this Hospital's share of the amount collected and the Maintenance Committee wish to thank Messrs. Lever Bros. once more for the help they have so readily given on many occasions.

Just before Whitsuntide, a most enjoyable Dance, which was organised by the Nurses' Sectional Committee, took place on the Steam Yacht "Killarney" while she was lying in Princes Dock. This resulted in a substantial contribution to the Funds of the Summer Fête and the Committee wish to express their appreciation of the kindness and generosity of Messrs. Coast Lines Limited in placing the vessel at their disposal.

Mrs. Ebbs again kindly threw open the gardens and grounds at the "Forty Pits" in June, thereby contributing £15 to the Funds of the Hospital. The Committee are grateful to her for her kindness and continued interest.

Early in July, the second Summer Fête was held on the Training Ground of the West Lancashire Territorial Association, Aigburth. The Fete was opened by the Right Honourable the Earl of Sefton, the President of the Hospital, and lasted four days; it realised £884 18s. 10d., or £300 more than in 1934. The Committee feel that this increase justifies them in holding another Fete in 1936. They wish to record their thanks to the Lord Mayor and Lady Mayoress of Liverpool who visited the Fête, and also the Corporation for their kind assistance in many directions. They would also thank very warmly the West Lancashire Territorial Association for generous permission to use the ground and the officers and men of the different units who assisted them. On Sunday evening (the day after the termination of the Fete), an Open Air Service was organised in which Commandant Riches, Major White and Major Deans of the Salvation Army, the Reverend J. Herschall Hall, M.A., Vicar of the parish of St. Andrew's, and the Reverend G. T. Weston, Hospitalier of the Royal Southern Hospital, took part. The service was well attended and the collection realised £15. The Committee wish specially to thank the Chairman of the Churches Committee for the great trouble he took to make this Service successful.

During the week of the Fete, the Liverpool Ladies' Bowling League held a Competition on the green of the Devonshire Ladies' Bowling Club for a Challenge Cup, presented by the Chairman of the Ex-patients' Committee. This brought in £16 10s. 0d. and the Maintenance Committee wish to record their appreciation of the kindness and enthusiasm shown by the Chairman of the Ex-patients' Sectional Committee in gaining such widespread support.

On November 5th, the second Annual Carnation Ball was held at the Rialto Ballroom and was much enjoyed by all present. A sum of £85, nearly £10 more than last year, was obtained. The Committee feel that this Ball has now become an established event associated with the Hospital and propose to hold the 3rd Annual Ball next November.

In the Autumn, the Stanley Rugby Football Club devoted a special practice match in aid of the Hospital, which realised £11 3s. 9d., and for which the Committee extend their best thanks.

The Maintenance Committee wish in conclusion to thank again all those who have so loyally and generously supported them in their endeavours and express their confident hope that they will continue to give their kind assistance.

There have been special Services during the year.

The Rev. J. B. Goodliffe, Vicar of Christ Church, Toxteth Park, gave an address at one of the special Lent Services.

On May 12th, in common with other Churches throughout the country, we joined in the Jubilee Service of Thanksgiving for God's blessings to Their Majesties King George and Queen Mary.

Our Harvest Festival week-day Service was held on October 4th. Our Special Preacher on that occasion was the Rev. Canon J. H. Jordan, Vicar of Allerton.

The Rev. R. A. Marsh, Vicar of St. Mary, Wavertree, visited us on October 20th, and preached a special sermon on Medical Missions, when a collection was made for the Nurses' Missionary League.

The Chapel was well attended on the Anniversary of Armistice Day, when we renewed our thanks to Almighty God for a great deliverance, and for the devotion of those who took part in the Great War, and when we also devoted our minds and influence to peace.

It is felt that it would be a good thing to place a microphone in the Chapel to connect up with the headphones already in use in the Wards. In this way the patients unable to leave their beds could unite in the worship. We are sure that some good friend will wish to make this possible.

## REPORT OF THE NURSING COMMITTEE,

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The number of applications for training received during the year was 304 as against 342 in 1934.

The staff now numbers 108, made up as follows :—

1 Matron, 1 Assistant Matron, 1 Home Sister, 1 Sister in charge of the "Rigby Hostel," 1 Housekeeping Sister, 1 Sister Tutor, 1 Night Sister, 1 X-Ray Sister, 1 Out-patient Sister, 1 Theatre Sister, 10 Ward Sisters, 18 Certificated Nurses and 70 Nurses in Training.

Thirty-nine Probationers entered for training, 2 of whom left for health reasons, 2 as unsuitable for the work, 1 to be nearer home, 1 to be married and 3 not caring for the work.

Twenty-one nurses left on the completion of their training, 16 to take their maternity training, 1 for training in another branch of nursing, 1 accepted a sister's post in another hospital, 2 took up private nursing and 1 left to be married.

During the year the following resignations were received :—

Miss S. A. Armstrong, Sister of Margaret Ward as she had been appointed nurse on the Cunard Liners.

Miss M. E. Jones, Night Sister, as she wished to take her maternity training.

The following appointments were made :—

Miss F. L. Livingstone as Sister of Jenny Lind Ward, Sister North, the present Sister asking permission to be transferred to Margaret Ward, Miss A. Forbes, Orthopædic Sister was appointed Night Sister, Miss Parker, Sister of Sefton Ward was transferred to the Orthopædic Wards, and Miss E. C. Norris returned as Sister of Sefton Ward.

Thirty-seven nurses entered for the State Examinations, thirty of whom were successful.

Hospital examinations were also held in the Spring and Autumn. The Senior Silver Medals were awarded to Nurses Boote and Wilkinson both having obtained 72% in eight subjects.

The Junior Silver Medal was won by Nurse H. P. Jones, having obtained an average of 83.75% in six subjects.

The prizes for Hygiene were very kindly given by Mr. D. B. Cowden whose lectures on this subject have been most helpful.

Two prizes are being given annually by the Medical Board and are to be known as the “Dr. Macalister” prize and the “Sir Robert Jones” prize. The former is to be awarded for the examination in Children’s diseases and the latter for the special subject which is to be chosen each year.

The prizes were won as follows :—

Dr. Macalister Prize—Nurse Anne Davies 86%.

Sir Robert Jones Prize—Nurse I. R. Wood 80%

The subject chosen for the latter prize this year was Dermatology.

These prizes were kindly presented to the successful candidates by Mrs. Alfred Stott at an At Home held in the Massage Department in November.

Eleven nurses have been given Grants from the John Rankin Fund to enable them to take their Midwifery Training. This fund proves an invaluable help to the Nursing Staff in every possible way. Every effort is made to try

and arrange recreation for the Staff and all the Sisters last September again went for a delightful day's picnic to the Lake District.

A most enjoyable Dance was held in the Out-patient Department last May to celebrate the Jubilee of King George V. The Staff have expressed their very best thanks and appreciation to Mr. Sutton Timmis for so kindly defraying the cost of this Dance. It was unanimously agreed that it was the most enjoyable dance ever held in the Hospital.

The Sports and Dramatic Club has been very active during the year. The Nurses arranged a Christmas Concert and in addition, Debates and Socials have been arranged. It is hoped to increase the activities of the Club by interesting the Members in present day affairs, helping any good and deserving cause and sending Nurse representatives to important exhibitions of work in connection with Nursing.

The Staff have again been most willing and anxious to help the Finances of the Hospital and their loyalty and co-operation is much appreciated.

Rather more than one in twenty of the patients interviewed during the year required some adjunct to their actual medical or surgical treatment and the assistance in this direction rendered by the Merseyside Hospitals Council, the Liverpool Child Welfare Association and the Liverpool Personal Service Society and other charitable organisations and public bodies was an invaluable and inestimably beneficial service.

The Committee desire to record their sincere appreciation of the valuable co-operation of the Liverpool Convalescent Home, Woolton, in providing free convalescent treatment for necessitous poor patients.

## CONSTITUTION AND GENERAL LAWS.

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1. This Institution shall be called the "ROYAL SOUTHERN HOSPITAL," and shall be confined as much as possible to severe accidents and acute cases.

2. GOVERNMENT VESTED IN TRUSTEES.—The Government of this Institution shall be vested in Trustees, qualified as hereinafter mentioned, who shall meet on the second Monday in February every year, or as near thereto as possible. The meeting to be convened by public advertisement in two or more of the Liverpool newspapers.

3. QUALIFICATION OF TRUSTEES.—The Trustees shall be as follow—  
 (a) Every individual donor of £20 or upwards in one payment shall be a Trustee for life. Any Company, Firm, Club, Society, or Executors or Trustees of a deceased person who (or whose Testator) may give £20 or upwards in one sum, may nominate one of its members, or number, as Trustee for his or her life. (b) Every annual subscriber of Two Guineas or upwards shall be a Trustee so long as he or she continues the subscription. (c) Any Companies, Firms, Executors, or Trustees on the list of Trustees for Life, on the 1st day of January, 1899, provided that such Trustee shall vote in accordance with the Regulations of paragraph 4 hereof. (d) The members of the Appeal Committee as on the 9th day of June, 1933. (e) The Honorary Physicians and Surgeons. (f) The Honorary Consulting Officers of the Institution. The Trustees mentioned in sub-paragraphs (e) and (f) shall be ex-officio Trustees so long as they hold the qualifying office.

4. PRIVILEGES OF TRUSTEES.—Every Trustee shall have the privilege of recommending patients, and voting at elections, other than elections of Medical Officers and at all General Meetings. Mercantile and other Firms may vote by any member of the Firm, and one additional member of such Firm shall be entitled to a vote for every sum of Two Guineas annually subscribed by such Firm over and above the first Two Guineas. Corporate Bodies, Clubs, and Societies shall have one vote in respect of any annual subscription of Two Guineas or upwards, or donation of Twenty pounds or upwards in one payment, and any Officer of such Corporate Body, Club or Society nominated in writing may exercise the right of voting for one year. Executors and Trustees of deceased persons entitled to vote may vote by one of their number. Subscribers of one guinea and upwards have the privilege of recommending Patients. Any person annually collecting a sum of £5 or upwards, or any clergyman raising a like sum by a collection on behalf of the Hospital, shall have the privilege of Annual Subscribers.

5. SUBSCRIPTIONS WHEN DUE.—All Subscriptions are due in advance, on the 1st January, and are considered to be continued each current year, unless notice be given in writing to the contrary; and no person whose subscription is unpaid shall have any of the privileges of the Institution.

6. ANNUAL MEETING OF TRUSTEES.—At the Annual Meeting, the Committee shall submit their report of the state of the Hospital for the past year, and the Annual Statement of Accounts, showing the receipts and disbursements of the Hospital, signed by the Treasurer and

Auditors, which report and statement shall have the approval of the meeting prior to being printed and distributed among the Trustees and Subscribers. A Committee shall be elected for the ensuing year, consisting of a President, three Vice-Presidents, a Treasurer, two of the Honorary Medical Officers (to be nominated by the Medical Board), and not less than twenty other Trustees, at which meeting also the Honorary Medical Officers shall be subject to reappointment. The President of Committee shall, ex-officio, be a Member of every Sub-Committee (except the Medical Board), whether Ordinary or Special, appointed by the General Committee, in addition to the number of Members appointed to serve on the various Committees.

7. SPECIAL MEETINGS OF TRUSTEES.—The Committee may, at such times and on such occasions as they may consider expedient, call Special Meetings of the Trustees, and on a requisition for such meetings, signed by Twenty Trustees and addressed to the President, the Committee shall call a meeting of Trustees within one calendar month of the presentation of the requisition to the President; and in all cases of calling Special Meetings, shall give fourteen days' notice by advertisement in two of the Liverpool newspapers, stating the objects for which the meeting is called. No other business shall be taken into consideration at those meetings but that mentioned in the advertisement.

8. ALTERATION IN LAWS BY TRUSTEES.—When any new Laws are to be proposed, or any of the old Laws altered or abrogated, either at the Annual Meeting of the Trustees, or at any Special Meeting of Trustees called for the purpose, the substance of the proposed new Law, or of the existing Law as proposed to be altered or abrogated, shall be laid before the Committee at the Monthly Meeting next preceding; and at any meeting of the Committee for carrying any such proposition into effect, not less than nine members shall be present, and not less than two-thirds of the Meeting shall constitute a majority, unless such majority shall amount to more than one-half of the whole Committee.

9. DIRECTION VESTED IN A COMMITTEE.—The Members of the Committee elected by the Trustees at their Annual Meeting, and the two Honorary Medical Officers, who shall be nominated by the Medical Board out of their own body, in such order as they may judge expedient, shall form the Committee, in whom shall be vested the Direction and General Management of the Hospital.

10. COMMITTEE MEETINGS.—The Committee shall meet at the Hospital on the first Friday in every month (not less than five to form a quorum), and shall contract, by public advertisement or otherwise, for the necessary supplies at suitable periods, and shall control the whole affairs of the Institution, with power to make Bye-Laws, and to amend or suspend the operation of any of the General Laws until a Meeting of the Trustees.

11. MINUTES OF COMMITTEE PROCEEDINGS.—Minutes of the proceedings of all meetings of Trustees and of the Committee shall be recorded in a book kept for that purpose, and shall be signed by the Chairman of the Meeting.

12. BOARD OF MANAGEMENT.—The Committee shall appoint at their first General Meeting ten of their body to act as a Board of Management for the ensuing year, of which Board the Treasurer shall be one and a representative of the Medical Board shall be one (the former Board continuing their services until their successors shall be appointed). This Board of Management shall meet at least once a week, and three shall constitute a quorum. The Committee shall also elect every month two of their number to act as Visitors.

13. **DUTIES OF THE BOARD OF MANAGEMENT AND VISITORS.**—The Board shall enquire into everything relative to the economy and management of the house and patients; they shall see that the rules and regulations, in every department of the Hospital, are attended to, recording their proceedings in a book provided for that purpose. The two Visitors shall in like manner keep a book, recording in it their visits, with the dates, and any observations they may think proper to make. These books shall always remain in the Board-room, under the charge of the Superintendent, and open to the inspection of every Trustee. The proceedings of the Board of Management shall be subject to revision or confirmation by the General Committee.

14. **SPECIAL MEETINGS OF THE COMMITTEE.**—The Board of Management shall, as often as occasion may require, call Special Meetings of the Committee, stating the object for which such meeting is called. No other business to be taken into consideration at such meeting.

14a. **MAINTENANCE COMMITTEE.**—The Committee shall appoint at their first General Meeting not less than ten of the Trustees, of whom the Honorary Treasurer shall be one, to act as a Maintenance Committee of the Hospital for the ensuing year, for the purpose of raising funds towards the sum necessary to meet the annual deficit between ordinary income and ordinary expenditure of the Hospital. The Maintenance Committee shall have the right to co-opt not more than five persons who are not Trustees.

14b. **FINANCE COMMITTEE.**—The Committee shall appoint at their first General Meeting a Finance Committee to be constituted as follows:—the Honorary Treasurer, as Chairman; the Chairman of the Board of Management; the Chairman of the Maintenance Committee; the Chairman of the Massage Department Committee; the Chairman of the Medical Board; the Chairman of the Nursing Committee; and four members of the General Committee to be nominated by that Committee. The proceedings of the Finance Committee shall be subject to revision, confirmation or rejection by the General Committee.

The powers and duties of such Finance Committee shall include the following:—

- (a) To survey the financial position of the Hospital periodically.
- (b) To meet at least once a quarter.
- (c) All items of expenditure (except such as are required for the normal running of the Hospital) shall be submitted for the approval of the Finance Committee before being incurred.
- (d) To institute, if thought desirable, a system of budgetary control and costings.
- (e) To advise on the purchase or sale of investments as may be necessary.
- (f) To report after each meeting to the General Committee.

15. **TREASURER'S DUTIES.**—The Treasurer shall place the money which he may receive in such bank or banks as the Committee may recommend, in the name of the Royal Southern Hospital. He shall pay all accounts after they have been passed by the Board of Management and shall take care that an account of the receipts and disbursements of the Institution be submitted monthly to the Committee, and that an annual statement signed by the Treasurer and Auditors, be laid before the General Meeting of Trustees. All cheques or orders on the bank shall be signed by either the Treasurer and one other member of the Board of Management, or any two members of the Board of Management, and countersigned by the Superintendent.

16. **PROFESSIONAL AUDITOR.**—The Committee shall appoint annually a Professional Auditor, who shall examine and certify the Accounts prior to the Annual Meeting.

17. **MEDICAL OFFICERS.**—The Honorary Medical Officers of the Hospital shall be appointed from time to time by a Medical Officers' Election Committee. The number of Medical Officers may be increased or diminished from time to time at the discretion of the Hospital Committee. The Medical Officers' Election Committee (herein called the Election Committee) shall consist of the following:—The Committee of the Hospital; the Honorary Physicians of the Hospital; the Honorary Surgeons of the Hospital; Twenty Representatives of the Trustees, to be chosen as hereinafter provided. The twenty representative members shall be chosen by the Hospital Committee. Any Trustee who desires to serve on the Election Committee may hand in his name to the Secretary, either at the Annual Meeting, to be held in the year 1939, or within fourteen days thereafter, stating that he is willing to serve. Should the number of those desiring to serve exceed twenty that number shall be selected by the Hospital Committee by the drawing of lots. Should the number of those desiring to serve fall short of twenty, the Hospital Committee may fill the vacancies by nominating such Trustees as they think desirable. Such Election Committee shall serve for five years from the date of the Annual Meeting in 1934 to the Annual Meeting in 1939. In the event of any vacancies occurring between 1934 and 1939, either through death or resignation among the Trustees' Representatives upon the Election Committee, the Hospital Committee shall fill such vacancies by nominating other Trustees for the purpose, but such Trustees shall only hold office for the time which the Trustees originally appointed would have held office had such Trustees not died or resigned. At the Annual Meeting in 1939 a fresh Election of Trustees' representatives shall take place in the same manner as that hereinbefore provided, and so on every five years. The Election Committee shall have no other powers or functions than the appointment of Honorary Medical Officers. The Election Committee shall be conducted as follows:—In case of any vacancy in the Medical Staff an advertisement shall be issued inviting applications for the vacant appointment, and applications in writing addressed to the Chairman for the time being of the Hospital Committee shall be delivered at or posted to the Hospital within such time as the Committee may determine. On the expiration of such period the Chairman shall summon a meeting of the Election Committee giving not less than fourteen days' notice to the meeting. All applications and the accompanying documents shall be open for the inspection of any member of the Election Committee for ten days preceding the day of the meeting of the Committee. Any candidate shall be disqualified who advertises in the public papers or personally canvasses the members of the Election Committee, but candidates are to be at liberty to send to the members copies of their applications and accompanying documents as delivered to the Chairman of the Committee. The Election Committee shall proceed to the election of the Officer or Officers, which in the event of a contest shall be by ballot, to be taken in such manner as the Chairman of the meeting directs. The quorum for the meeting at which such election takes place shall be ten members personally present. If there is not a quorum present those who are present within fifteen minutes shall have power to adjourn the meeting, and so from time to time until a quorum is secured. No member shall be allowed to vote by proxy. The election shall be conducted in the manner following:—All the candidates shall first be

submitted to the vote—the candidate receiving the lowest number of votes shall be withdrawn, and the remainder be again voted for and so on in like manner until the candidates are reduced to two in number; the candidate then securing the greatest number of votes shall be elected. Each member shall have one vote for one candidate only at each voting. The Chairman shall have a casting vote. Any member of the Trustees' representatives on the Election Committee who shall cease to hold a qualification as a Trustee shall *ipso facto* cease to be a member of the Election Committee. The Secretary of the Hospital Committee shall summon a meeting of the Election Committee:— (1) Whenever he is requested to do so by the Chairman of the Committee of the Hospital. (2) Whenever not less than ten members of the Election Committee request him to do so.

The Chairman of the Hospital Committee for the time being shall be the Chairman of the Election Committee, and in case of his absence at any meeting the members of the Election Committee who shall be present shall elect one of their number to be Chairman of the meeting. The Chairman of the meeting shall have absolute power to regulate its procedure and the conduct of the ballot.

18. The Chairman of the Hospital Committee shall submit the names of the Honorary Medical Officers to each Annual Meeting of the Trustees for confirmation in each year, but the name of any Physician or Surgeon who shall have completed his sixtieth year of age on or before the day of such Annual Meeting shall not be submitted for confirmation, unless under exceptional circumstances an extended term of office be recommended by the Committee of the Hospital, but in no case shall any Physician or Surgeon continue to hold Office after attaining his 65th birthday.

18a. VACANCIES.—On the occurrence of a vacancy in the office of President, or any other Officer or Member of the Committee, such vacancy may be filled up, if deemed necessary, by the Committee.

19. CONSULTING MEDICAL OFFICERS.—A Physician or Surgeon having completed his full term of Office, shall become an Honorary Consulting Officer of the Institution.

20. PHYSICIANS' QUALIFICATIONS.—Candidates for the post of Honorary Physician must possess a Medical Degree of a British or Irish University and the Membership of the Royal College of Physicians of London.

21. SURGEONS' QUALIFICATIONS.—Candidates for the post of Honorary Surgeon must possess the Fellowship of the Royal College of Surgeons of England.

21a. HONORARY ASSISTANT PHYSICIANS' AND HONORARY ASSISTANT SURGEONS' QUALIFICATIONS.—Candidates for the post of Honorary Assistant Physician or Honorary Assistant Surgeon must possess the qualifications necessary for the post of Honorary Physician or Honorary Surgeon respectively.

21b. Each Honorary Assistant Physician and Honorary Assistant Surgeon after he shall have held that office for seven years continuously shall be styled "Honorary Physician (or Honorary Surgeon) in charge of Out-patients," but he shall continue to be subject to the Laws of the Hospital relating to Honorary Assistant Physicians or Honorary Assistant Surgeons, notwithstanding such change of title.

21c. SPECIALISTS' QUALIFICATIONS.—Specialists should possess the same (or comparable) qualifications as the Honorary Physicians or the Honorary Surgeons.

22. PHYSICIANS AND SURGEONS NOT TO HOLD OTHER OFFICES.—No Honorary Medical Officer of this Hospital shall at the same time be an Honorary Physician or Surgeon to any other General Hospital, or be a District Parochial Medical Officer for the Poor, or Physician, or Surgeon, to any Society for affording mutual relief in sickness, infirmity or old age, and if any applicant for the position of Medical Officer of this Hospital holds any such post, he must resign it not later than seven days after his appointment as Physician or Surgeon to this Hospital. If a Physician or Surgeon to this Hospital shall accept an appointment to any of the offices herein named, he shall vacate his office in this Hospital.

23. MEDICAL BOARD.—The Honorary Physicians and Honorary Surgeons, Honorary Assistant Physicians, Honorary Assistant Surgeons, and Senior Honorary Medical Officers in charge of Special Departments shall constitute a Board for the consideration of all professional subjects connected with the Hospital, and for such other matters as may be referred to them by the Committee to report thereon. Bye-laws made for the regulation of the Medical and Surgical economy of the Hospital, as well as the other proceedings of the Board shall be subject to revision and confirmation by the Committee at their Monthly Meeting. All proceedings of this Board shall be recorded in a book kept for that purpose, and shall be signed by their Chairman.

24. IMPORTANT OPERATIONS.—All regular Medical and Surgical practitioners in the town and neighbourhood shall have the privilege of attending important operations at this Hospital, with the consent of the Operating Surgeon.


25. APPOINTMENT OF STIPENDIARY OFFICERS.—The General Committee shall elect the Residents, Matron, and all the Servants of the Hospital, whom they shall also have the power to discharge summarily. The Stipendiary Medical Officers shall not absent themselves at any time, without the special permission of the Medical Board.

26. RESIDENTS' QUALIFICATIONS.—Every Candidate for the office of House Physician or House Surgeon shall possess a Registered Medical and Surgical qualification. He shall not engage in Private Practice either in or out of the Hospital, nor shall he attend to any other business than that of this Hospital.

27. PUPILS.—Such Apprentices or Pupils as are necessary for the Hospital shall be admitted by the General Committee, who shall also have power to discharge them.

28. DUTIES AND PRIVILEGES OF CHAIRMAN.—Whether at the Annual Meeting or at Special Meetings of the Trustees, the President of the Committee shall act as Chairman, and in his absence one of the Vice-Presidents, or in their absence, a qualified Trustee of the Hospital. In case there shall be an equality of votes at any meeting, the Chairman for the time being shall have a casting vote in addition to his own individual vote.

29. DEEDS AND WRITINGS.—All deeds, evidences, and writings relating to the Institution shall be kept in an iron chest and secured by two locks, the keys whereof shall be kept by the President, a Vice-President, or the Treasurer; or deposited with the Bankers, subject to the orders of the President, a Vice-President, or the Treasurer; and all property in the furniture shall be vested in the President for the time being.




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
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
