Our Hospital is a Memorial to all who lost their lives in the Great War, and especially to those three hundred and twenty from the Parishes of the Rye Union whose names are given above, and which are inscribed on the Walls of the Hospital. It was entirely due to the unbounded liberality of our late President, Lady McIlwraith, that it was possible to build and maintain the Hospital as it stands. Commenced in 1920 it was completed in 1921 at a cost of £16,876, and opened by our Patroness H.R.H. Princess Louise, Duchess of Argyll.

The Hospital is endowed to the extent of £570 a year, but as our average cost of ordinary maintenance reaches £1,900, there is over £1,300 to be found. Payments by Private and Public Ward Patients have averaged £550, so there remains some £750 to be collected annually from Subscribers, Church Collections and Entertainments.

Our Financial Year commences the 1st January and an early payment of subscriptions is much to be desired, as it not only saves secretarial work, but it enables the Committee to regulate, to some extent, their Expenditure, according to Funds.

The signing of the Bankers' Order herewith helps, without committing the signer as it can always be cancelled if desired.

## The Hon. Secretary's Report to the Annual Meeting of Governors

\*\*\*\*\*

MR. MAYOR, LADIES AND GENTLEMEN,

I begin this year's Report with a matter of routine. I did not this year send formal Receipts to those Subscribers who are kind enough to give a Banker's Order, and I hope this is approved of.

On the recent revaluation of property in this county the gross rateable value of the Hospital apart from the Cottage, which was not altered, was raised from £75 to £166. This meant that we should have to pay £80 per annum in rates alone. The County Valuer arrived at this figure in some mysterious way, not according to its letting value were it no longer a Hospital, but based it on calculations of its average voluntary and assured income over a period of 3 years. This was appealed against and the figure put back to £60 again. But even that is too much, and higher than would be put on it in other counties. To contend with this sort of thing a Sussex County Regional Committee of the British Hospitals Association has been formed, which it is to be hoped will bring further relief from this really uncharitable burden.

In the last Report, that of 1933, you may have noticed an asterisk against a few Subscribers' names, meaning that they have signed the seven years' covenant which enables me to recover the Income Tax paid in respect of the amount subscribed. To increase those asterisks I wrote to a number of Subscribers, with the result that Subscribers to the amount of £141-14-0, fell in with the plan, and next year over £40 will be added by this means to the Hospital's Income. It is hoped that others will follow this really helpful example.

A large number of patients have been treated from places outside the district. They number 21, and are of course the motoring accidents, and I am sorry to say that a proportion of them have thought it unnecessary to pay anything. The Road Traffic Act of 1934 will help in this to some extent.

A new feature has been the presentation to the Hospital by the Playden and the Rye Women's Institutes of two set basins, one in each ward. I think the idea may be attractive to those good people who get up things for a charitable object, and the Matron will always be pleased to say what is the outstanding need of the moment.



In the future there is to be a Pound Day, particulars of which will be made known later.

Finally may I say that criticism, especially if it is constructive, is really welcome, and does not often come. But another way in which well wishers can help is, if they hear of a story to the detriment of the Hospital going round they will inform a member of the Committee or myself, so that it can be investigated.

## Chairman of Committee's Report to the Annual Meeting of Governors

MR. MAYOR, LADIES AND GENTLEMEN,

We have ventured to make the experiment this year of holding our Annual Meeting in the morning, and it was hoped it would enable more of the Governors to attend.

I am very glad to say that I have not got as last year to record so large a number of deaths among our subscribers. We have to regret the death of Miss Anson; this lady left the Hospital a Legacy of £100, which will be received this year.

The outstanding event of the year 1934, has been the holding of the Market Fair at the end of August opened by Lady Jowitt with an excellent speech. The Market Fair realised a balance of £314-15-11, a source of great satisfaction to your Committee. The way the Fair was organised and supported was very clear evidence that the work of the Hospital is appreciated and is a very real factor in the life and health of the neighbourhood.

During the year a Legacy of £100 has been received from the estate of the late Mrs. Ross Johnson and has been invested by the Trustees.

This is the 13th Annual Meeting and it marks a stage in our history, for over 2,000 patients, precisely 2,116, have been treated since the Hospital was opened.

I should like to record our thanks to all our supporters and to the Medical and Nursing Staff for the efficient way the Hospital work is done.

We are very glad to welcome Drs. Kerr and Mitchell of Northiam and Beckley as additions to our Staff. It is naturally the hope of the Committee that the Hospital should be used by *all* the Medical Staff.

The work of the Linen Guild has been admirable under Mrs. Skinner (Chairman) and Mrs. H. S. Ellis (Secretary).

The *Sussex Express* has as heretofore helped us and earned our gratitude by inserting Hospital announcements, and during the year organised a Hospital Farthing Fund through which this Hospital benefitted to the amount of £3-3-0.

The East Sussex Hospitals' Benevolent Fund and the Hospital Saving Association are an increasing help, and we wish to thank those who give time to these organisations.

Our thanks are also due to Mr. F. C. Smith for his efficient help, to the Rye Building Society for allowing us free use of their rooms at 12 High Street, and last but not least to the Mayor and Corporation for the use of the Town Hall for Meetings.

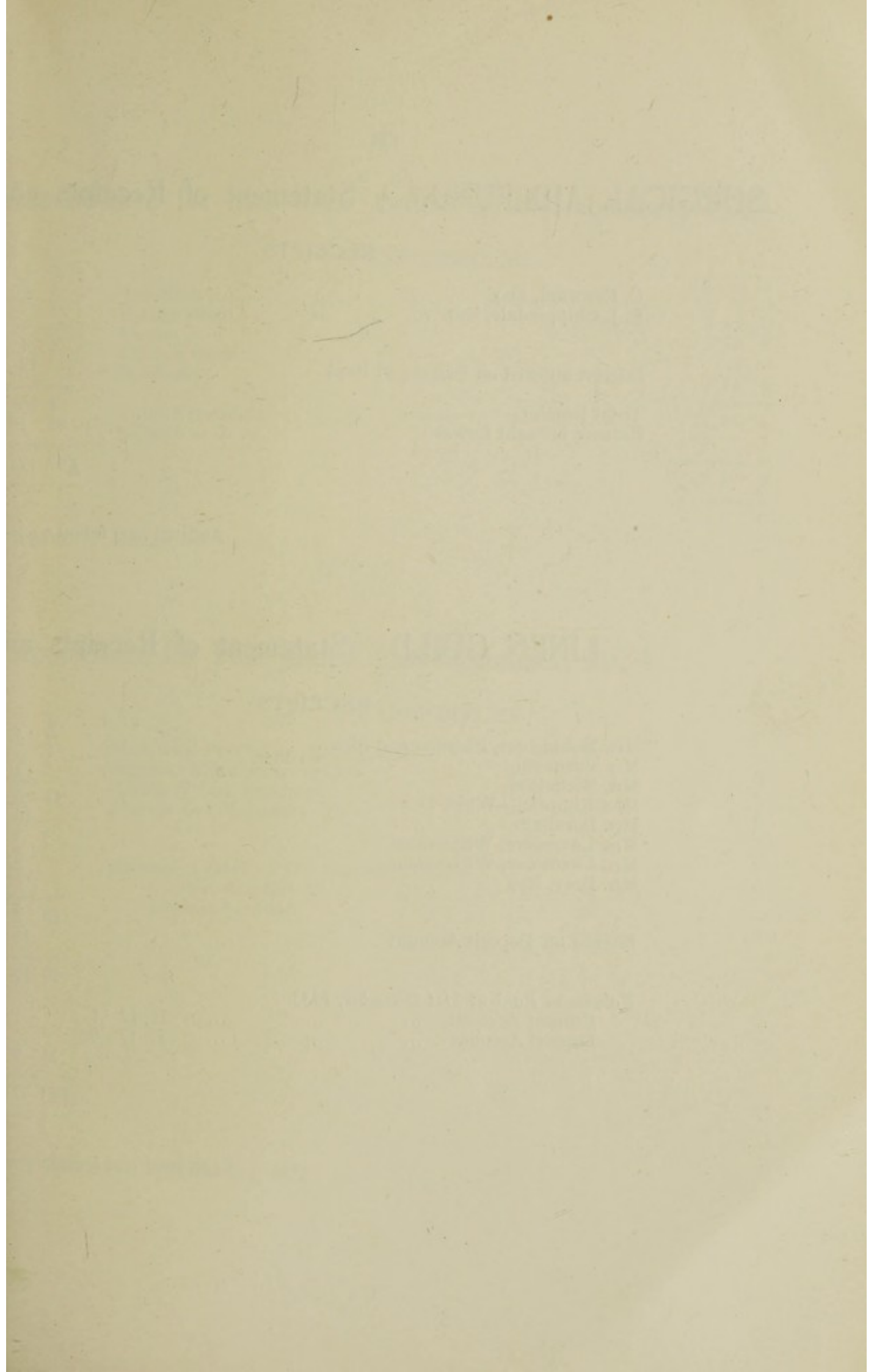

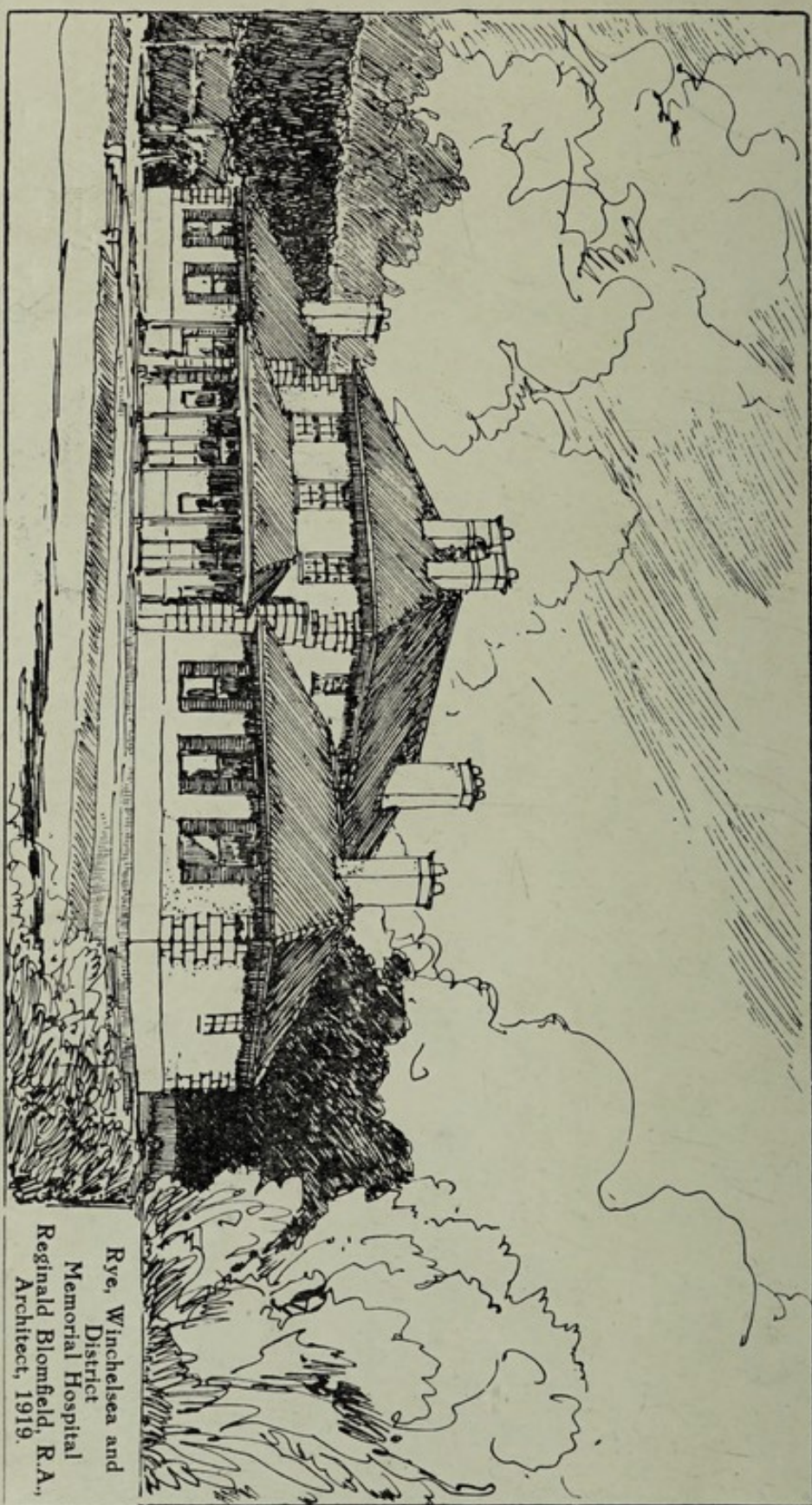
