Our Hospital is a Memorial to all who lost their lives in the Great War, and especially to those three hundred and twenty from the Parishes of the Rye Union whose names are given above, and which are inscribed on the Walls of the Hospital. It was entirely due to the unbounded liberality of our late President, Lady McIlwraith, that it was possible to build and maintain the Hospital as it stands. Commenced in 1920 it was completed in 1921 at a cost of £ 16,876, and opened by our Patroness H.R.H. Princess Louise, Duchess of Argyll.

The Hospital is endowed to the extent of £575 a year, but as our average cost of ordinary maintenance reaches \pounds 1,900, there is over \pounds 1,300 to be found. Payments by Private and Public Ward Patients have averaged £550, so there remains some £750 to be collected annually from Subscribers, Church Collections and Entertainments.

Our Financial Year commences the 1st January and an early payment of subscriptions is much to be desired, as it not only saves secretarial work, but it enables the Committee to regulate, to some extent, their Expenditure, according to Funds.

The signing of the Bankers' Order herewith helps, without committing the signer as it can always be cancelled if desired.

The Hon. Secretary's Report to the Annual Meeting of Governors

......

MR. MAYOR, LADIES AND GENTLEMEN,

It would seem natural for your Hon. Secretary's Report to fall into the three categories of past, present and future, and I will try and say something on each.

The past year was marked by two outstanding efforts on behalf of the Hospital. There was first the Carnival held in conjunction with the Royal East Sussex Hospital. Held on a beautiful day in August and helped by the enthusiasm of numbers of people directed into the right channels by a wise committee, it realised over £100; of which one quarter or £25/12/6 was handed over to our Hospital. The other event was the Pound Day, and this also had fine weather, and produced splendid and unexpected results. *i e.* 88 lbs. cornflower; 154 lbs. cereals; 170 lbs. dried fruit; 200 lbs. jam; 418 lbs. sugar and 118 lbs. soap. It is an opportunity which many who are grateful to the Hospital and are not in a position to subscribe appreciate. Though every part of the District helped nobly, I really think that Winchelsea organised by our Lady President, Mrs. Willeard and Mrs. Pollard would have earned top marks, and the gifts had to be sent over in a lorry.

It is hoped to repeat the experiment in June.

Repairs have been kept as low as possible, but part of the cottage had to be painted and a new cylinder put in the stokehold for the old one, which had served the Hospital since its foundation, but had got beyond repair.

A matter that is causing your Committee some anxiety is the increase in the consumption of fuel, more particularly coke. When the new cylinder was put in, it was found that the pipes were badly furred up, and it is thought that this may be the cause. It is being investigated; but the Hospital may in the near future be faced with the inconvenience and expense of having to have the pipes cleaned out. And then perhaps some one will give us a Water Softening Plant to carry us on to that millennium when water companies will soften their water before distributing it. Whether the youthful are now growing up with good tonsils and no adenoids, or it is that County Councils are becoming economical I do not know, but we are getting now very few tonsil and adenoid cases compared with formerly.

The Chairman has already touched upon the chief problem that at the present time is engaging our attention and I have nothing to add. At the moment the Hospital is quite full.

It is much easier to lose subscribers than to find new ones. A new Subscriber this last year though he will not appear as such in the Report is Mr. Inland Revenue. Through subscribers signing the seven-year covenant forms this official has subscribed no less than $f_{40/2/6}$ to our funds. I have forms here if any subscriber who has not signed would like one—and I would ask you to notice that in the next Yearly Report sent out there will be loose forms of Income Tax Covenants, Bankers' Order and of Bequest.

There are some who think the Hospital is overstaffed for the number of cases it deals with. I would ask them to remember that a Nursing Staff is not collapsible and expandible at short notice—that two-fifths of the Staff are Probationers—that the Staff run the Operating Theatre the Housekeeping and the Linen—which in a large Hospital have separate Staffs—and further that while the College of Nursing lays down 56 hours a week on duty as a maximum your nurses do $56\frac{1}{4}$ hours a week and 79 on night duty.

The question of rating of Hospitals still engages the attention of the East Sussex Regional Committees and there is a Voluntary Hospitals Commission sitting now, which is going into this subject among many others.

As regards the future: it has been decided to hold another Market Fair in the Autumn, probably on 26th August, and our noble army of helpers are asked to come forward again as in the past.

I was asked the other day to attend a Whist Drive and say something about the Hospital and mention some special want to which the profits of the Whist Drive might be devoted. I amused some and startled others by among other things mentioning a Children's Ward. It was not meant seriously perhaps but I was in the Hospital last Sunday and in each ward there was a small infant yelling its loudest— and in each ward there were patients too ill to really stand the noise, against which Providence only fortifies babies' own mothers. A room apart for the desperately ill or the dying is also something to long for, but when the Chairman's Report deals so largely with filling the Hospital I should not refer to enlarging it.

Chairman of Committee's Report to the Annual Meeting of Governors

MR. MAYOR, LADIES AND GENTLEMEN,

For some time the Management Committee have been considering the figures which appear in the Hospital report under the heading, "Average number of beds in use" last year 7.5, coupled with the fact that the number of Patients being sent to Hastings from this District increases. It is felt by those having the management of your Hospital that some of the Patients so sent, could be quite as well treated at the Rye Hospital.

There are several points to remember in considering this subject. One is, that the tendency is, and always will be for the Doctor, who more often decides the point than the Patient, to prefer the big Hospital to the small one, because in the former there is a Resident Medical Staff and more Specialists and more apparatus to deal with any complications that may occur in treating a case.

Again there are times when in your Hospital the seven beds of the women's ward say, are full for weeks on end, with a waiting list, while the seven men's beds are only sparsely occupied; and also that though the number of beds is 13, one is the Private Ward, and it is almost essential that one bed in each ward should be kept empty in case of a sudden emergency or accident. It appears therefore that 7.5 occupied beds out of ten does not seem so bad an average.

It should also be remembered that one of the reasons for founding the Hospital was to save those lives which would be gravely imperilled by the long journey to Hastings. There have been in the past year at least four cases where lives were saved because they could be operated on promptly. And another reason was for the convenience of the Patients' relatives and friends, who naturally like to be near by.

We again wish to thank our very generous supporters, and record our appreciation of the work of the Medical and Nursing Staffs. The number of Patients cured and discharged remains high, and the Matron keeps her Nurses well and cheerful.

The Linen Guild under Mrs. E. W. Skinner (Chairman) and Mrs. H. S. Ellis (Hon. Sec.) continue their good work.

The Sussex Express has helped us very much in the matter of Announcements, etc., and their Hospital Farthing Fund last year brought us \pounds_{3-3-0} . The Hospital Saving Association gave us \pounds_{10-0-0} and with the East Sussex Benevolent Fund, afford great assistance, and our thanks are due to all the Honorary Helpers of these funds.

We also thank Mr. F. C. Smith for his efficient help; the Rye Building Society for the use of their rooms; and last but not least the Mayor and Corporation for the use of this Town Hall for our Meetings.

Income Tax on Annual Subscriptions

The Income of Charities is exempt from Income Tax, and if an Annual Subscriber who is an Income Taxpayer fills up the accompanying form of agreement, he enables the Hospital further to benefit (at no additional expense to himself) by recovering Income Tax on his *future* subscription; and he can himself deduct the amount of his subscription (plus Tax) from his sur-tax return.

Examples.

Column 1. The subscriber sends a cheque say for $\pounds 5-5-0$, and a Voucher that he has paid Income Tax on the amount. (The Hospital will, after the receipt of the cheque supply the necessary form of voucher which will only require to be signed and returned).

Column 2. The Hospital recovers the Income Tax direct from the Inland Revenue Authorities.

Column 3. The contributor appears as a subscriber of $\pounds 6-15-6$ (based on Income Tax at 4/6 in the \pounds), and the contributor personally can benefit by deducting $\pounds 6-15-6$ from his return for sur-tax.
