FOR THE

YEAR 1943

The Board of Management have pleasure in presenting the 88th Annual Report which, owing to War-time conditions, has to be abbreviated. They record with deep gratification that the Hospital, in its efforts to assist the sick and injured, has received financial aid and gifts in kind from Their Majesties the King and Queen, Her Majesty Queen Mary and Their Royal Highnesses the Duke and Duchess of Gloucester.

The services rendered to patients continue to grow and much appreciation is shown of the great volume of work which the Hospital so successfully undertakes. Beds continue to be reserved, both at the Royal Northern and at Grovelands Hospital, by arrangement with the Ministry of Health for Service patients and Air Raid casualties.

Contributory Organisations continue to assist by making grants in part-payment towards the cost of maintaining their members whilst under treatment and the following payments are gratefully acknowledged :—

The ordinary Income for Maintenance amounted to £138,063 and to this was transferred the sum of £2,971 from Legacies. The Expenditure was £140,723.

The receipts from Legacies totalled £7,242 and £4,271 of this amount was transferred to the General Fund Capital Account for reduction of debt. It will be seen from the accounts of the various Branches of the Hospital that the difference between Income and Expenditure has, where necessary, been met by an apportionment of the requisite sums and from the General Fund.

The value of the Hospital's endowments at the end of the year stood at £105,540 and £27,401 stood to the credit of special funds other than Building Accounts. The Building Fund was increased by £7,001 and expenditure on essential buildings and equipment has been £694. The gross debt at the end of the year amounted to £197,437. Of this sum £149,121 was in respect of accumulated maintenance deficiencies and £48,316 on account of Land Buildings and Equipment.

The Depreciation on Invested Funds amounted to £5,605.

Every effort has again been made to keep expenditure to a minimum but the increasing cost of commodities, as well as the increased number of patients needing treatment, has incurred extra outlay. To this must be added the costs of the adoption of the Rushcliffe Scale of salaries and conditions of service for Nurses and Midwives, and the Hetherington Report for Domestic workers, as well as scales of salaries for most grades of Hospital staff arranged through the British Hospitals Association.

The Special Appeal Fund received gifts towards maintenance and capital accounts amounting to £9,229.

King Edward's Hospital Fund for London, recognising the urgent needs of the Hospital, has generously promised a special grant of £5,000 provided the Hospital can itself secure new money amounting to £10,000 before December 31st next. The Board sincerely hope that the friends of the Hospital will help them to qualify for this much needed grant.

CO-OPERATING ORGANISATIONS

It is with a sense of deep gratitude that the Board again extend to all who through membership of various Organisations have materially assisted in the work of the Hospital. Sincere thanks are extended to :—

The Ladies' League, the Ladies' Association, the League of Roses, the League of Little Deeds of Kindness, The Clergy, Ministers and Congregations of various Denominations, the Hospital Supply Depot, and all Working Parties who have been so regular and unfailing in their assistance, especially since the outbreak of War.

VICE-PRESIDENTS AND BOARD OF MANAGEMENT

It is with deep regret that the deaths are recorded of the Marquis Camden and the Earl of Lonsdale, both of whom had been Vice-Presidents for many years and had shown an unfailing interest in all that concerned the welfare of the Hospital and its patients.

It was with pleasure that the Board were able to re-elect Mr. Mitchell W. Gordon, J.P., as a member upon his return from Northern Ireland.

HONORARY MEDICAL STAFF

The Board tender renewed and cordial thanks to members of the Honorary Medical Staff who have continued to give their invaluable services to the patients.

STAFF

Warmest thanks are again accorded to all members of the Resident Medical, Nursing, Administrative, Housekeeping and other Staffs, and to the Chaplin, who have, in spite of unprecedented difficulties, successfully carried on the work of the Hospital with undiminished zeal and devotion.

ROYAL CHEST HOSPITAL

The work of the Out-Patient Department of the Royal Chest Hospital (the In-Patient Section of which was destroyed by enemy action) has continued to increase, 33,329 patients having attended for treatment, and those needing In-Patient care were transferred to Wellhouse Hospital, Clare Hall Hospital and Friern Emergency Hospital by arrangement with the Ministry of Health.

The Income for the year was £5,526 and the Expenditure £6,964.

GROVELANDS HOSPITAL, SOUTHGATE

The usefulness of this continuation Hospital for patients in the early stages of recovery is again demonstrated by the fact that 1,055 patients have been transferred during the year, thus releasing beds for the more acute cases at the Royal Northern.

The Income for the year was £7,271 while the Expenditure amounted to £7,096.

MATERNITY WARDS AND JOINT MIDWIFERY TRAINING SCHOOLS (PART I.)

743 Expectant mothers were received in the Maternity Wards and 6,480 attendances were made at the Maternity Clinics by these In-Patients.

37 Pupils were accepted for the Part I Training of the Central Midwives Board and 33 passed the examination.

MATERNITY NURSING ASSOCIATION

1,052 Domiciliary Patients were attended during confinement, involving 28,057 attendances by Midwives and Pupil Midwives in the patients' own homes. 12,000 attendances by Patients were made at the Maternity and Child Welfare Clinics.

54 Pupils were received for Part II Examination Course of Training and 49 passed the C.M.B. Examination.

The Income of the Association was £6,533 and the expenditure £8,782. Full details of the work of the Association will be found in its report.

ALMERIC PAGET MASSAGE CLINIC.

An arrangement was made with the Almeric Paget Trust for the linking up of their Clinic (which formerly had premises in Essex Road) with the work of the Hospital and this Clinic transferred to the former Nurses' Home adjoining the Royal Chest Hospital in May.

The Royal Northern Group will thus having the advantage of further up-to-date equipment for Physio-Therapeutic treatment, and the patients of the Clinic will have the benefit of close association with all Departments of the Hospital. Up to the end of the year 8,574 attendances of Out-Patients at the Clinic had been recorded.

The maintenance of the Clinic is met by the Almeric Paget Trust and the Board is grateful to the Trustees for this mutually beneficial method of co-operation.

THE FUTURE

The proposals of the Government for a "National Health Service" have now been made known in the White Paper which has been issued as a basis for discussion. The Royal Northern, in common with Voluntary Hospitals generally, is in full accord with the Government's desire to secure a properly co-ordinated Hospital Service which shall be readily accessible to the whole community, but the Board view with concern some of the Government's proposals which, if they should become Law, could in the first instance only subordinate

the Voluntary Hospitals to Local Authorities and, finally, would by stages lead to their complete elimination as independent Organisations.

The Government freely acknowledges the high standard of the pioneer services rendered by Voluntary Hospitals for generations past. They recognise that the new Health Service cannot be successful without their retention and collaboration and Ministers pledged themselves verbally to give the Voluntary Hospitals partnership with the Local Authorities in this great undertaking, yet the White Paper now suggests Administrative machinery which makes this impossible.

It is hoped by all those interested in the continuance of the Voluntary System, firstly, that the discussions to take place on the proposals will remove the fear that they are intended as the initial step towards a final State or Local Authority Service, and secondly, that the National Health Service Bill, when presented to Parliament, will give effect to what we hope is the Government's intention of so legislating that the Voluntary Hospitals will be accorded that essentially equal partnership to which they are unquestionably entitled through their contribution in the past both to the health of the Nation and to the development of Medical Science and Research.

Confidence in the belief that public opinion will insist on the independence and freedom of the Voluntary Hospitals to serve the sick in accordance with the traditions which they have so laboriously and successfully built up, encourages the Board to appeal once again for generous support of the Hospital's work in order that the "Royal Northern" may take its full and appropriate share in the provision of an efficient and complete Health Service.

REPORT FOR THE YEAR 1943

The attendances at the Dispensary again increased by 1,684 on the year 1942, and 2,685 on the year 1941. They totalled 6,143.

Special Clinics for workers were held throughout the whole year. During the Summer months, these were held on Thursday evenings, and in the Winter months on alternate Thursday and Saturday afternoons. All were well attended. Every effort was made to arrange for contacts to attend and a total of 473 such cases were seen. Of these, 27 were found to be tuberculous. A number of cases discovered by Mass Miniature Radiography were seen and advised as to treatment.

Cases attending for the first time numbered 1,376 as against 984 in 1942, and 749 in 1941.

The National Service Board continue to send both male and female recruits for consultation and X-Ray. Of these, 136 cases were seen.

The total number of visits to the homes of patients or to patients in local Hospitals numbered 2,502.

Subject to the Regulations of the Hospital, persons endowing Beds or Cots, as above, enjoy the privilege of naming such Beds or Cots.

**May be in Annual Instalments of 100 Guineas.*

Endowment and Naming of Wards and Beds

1.—Donors of **Five Thousand Pounds** shall have the privilege of naming a Ward, at the entrance to which a tablet shall be placed stating the name of the Donor, etc. They shall be Life Governors and Members of the Council.

2.—Donors of **One Thousand Guineas** to endow a bed in a General Ward, or Donors of **Five Hundred Guineas** to endow a bed in a Contributory Ward, may give it in annual instalments of not less than One Hundred Guineas. They shall have the privilege of selecting the site of the Bed, at the head of which a brass plate shall be fixed stating the name of the Donor, etc. They shall be Life Governors and Members of the Council. Donors of **Seven Hundred Guineas** may endow a Cot in a General Ward and have in other respects the same privileges as donors of One Thousand Guineas.

3.—Donors of **One Hundred Guineas** in one sum have the privilege of naming a Bed for life, and donors of **Seventy Guineas** a Cot for life, and they shall be Life Governors and Members of the Council. Associations, Companies and Corporations naming Beds or Cots under this rule do so for a period of 15 years.

4.—Donors of **Thirty Guineas**, and persons collecting and paying over **Fifty Guineas** in one sum in any one year, shall be Life Governors and Members of the Council.

ADMISSION OF IN- AND OUT-PATIENTS

REGULATIONS

1.—No letters of recommendation are required, and Patients are admitted according to the urgency of the case. *Those recommended by Governors and Subscribers will at all times receive every attention.*

2.—No Articles of Food or Drink of any kind are permitted to be taken into the Wards under any pretence whatever.

3.—Patients are expected to contribute as much as they can afford towards the cost of their maintenance, medicines and surgical dressings.

IN-PATIENT DEPARTMENT

Persons wishing to be admitted as In-Patients must attend between 10 a.m. and 4 p.m., except *Accidents* and *Urgent Cases*, which are received at all hours of the day and night.

Governors and Subscribers, before sending Patients who are very ill to be admitted into the Hospital, are requested to communicate with the Secretary, and to forward a Medical Certificate of the case, when they will be informed as to whether and on what day the Patient can be received.

PRIVATE WARDS AND CONTRIBUTORY BEDS

Beds are set apart in private rooms and cubicle wards for persons of limited incomes. Detailed Rules appear on pages 112 and 113.

TRAINING FACILITIES AVAILABLE AT THE ROYAL NORTHERN HOSPITAL

NURSES TRAINING SCHOOL

Candidates of good education, between the ages of 18 and 33, can be received into the Preliminary Training School for seven weeks' training before entering the Wards.

On completion of three years' training selected nurses have the opportunity of taking the Central Midwives' Board Examinations.

MIDWIFERY TRAINING SCHOOLS—PART II

Pupils are received for six months' training for the second Examination of the Central Midwives Board. Further details will be found under the heading "Maternity Nursing Association."

SCHOOL OF RADIOGRAPHY

Students are accepted for training at the age of 18. The X-Ray Department is spacious with up-to-date apparatus and is recognised by the Society of Radiographers as an approved training centre. Students trained at the Hospital may therefore obtain the Society's Diploma after two years.

There is accommodation for resident women students at the rate of 25/- per week for board and lodging.

HOUSEKEEPING COURSE

Students with a Secondary School education are accepted for practical and theoretical training in Cooking, Linen Room Work, Needlework and Store Keeping.

Students receive pocket money together with board, lodging, uniform and laundry.

A certificate is issued at the termination of the course to successful candidates who should then be qualified to accept posts as Assistant Housekeepers, Assistant School Matrons, or Assistant Cooks at a commencing salary for resident posts of from £52 to £75 a year.
