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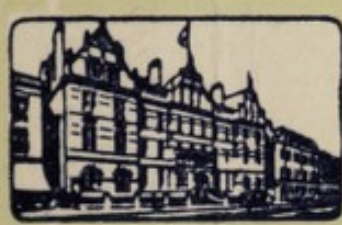

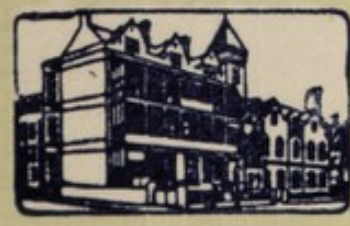

(for Private Patients)

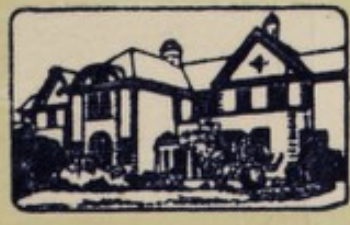

It also enables Subscribers liable to Super Tax to deduct the gross amount of their subscriptions from the income assessable for such tax.

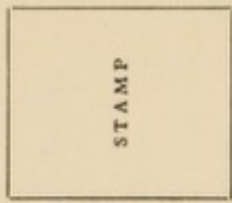

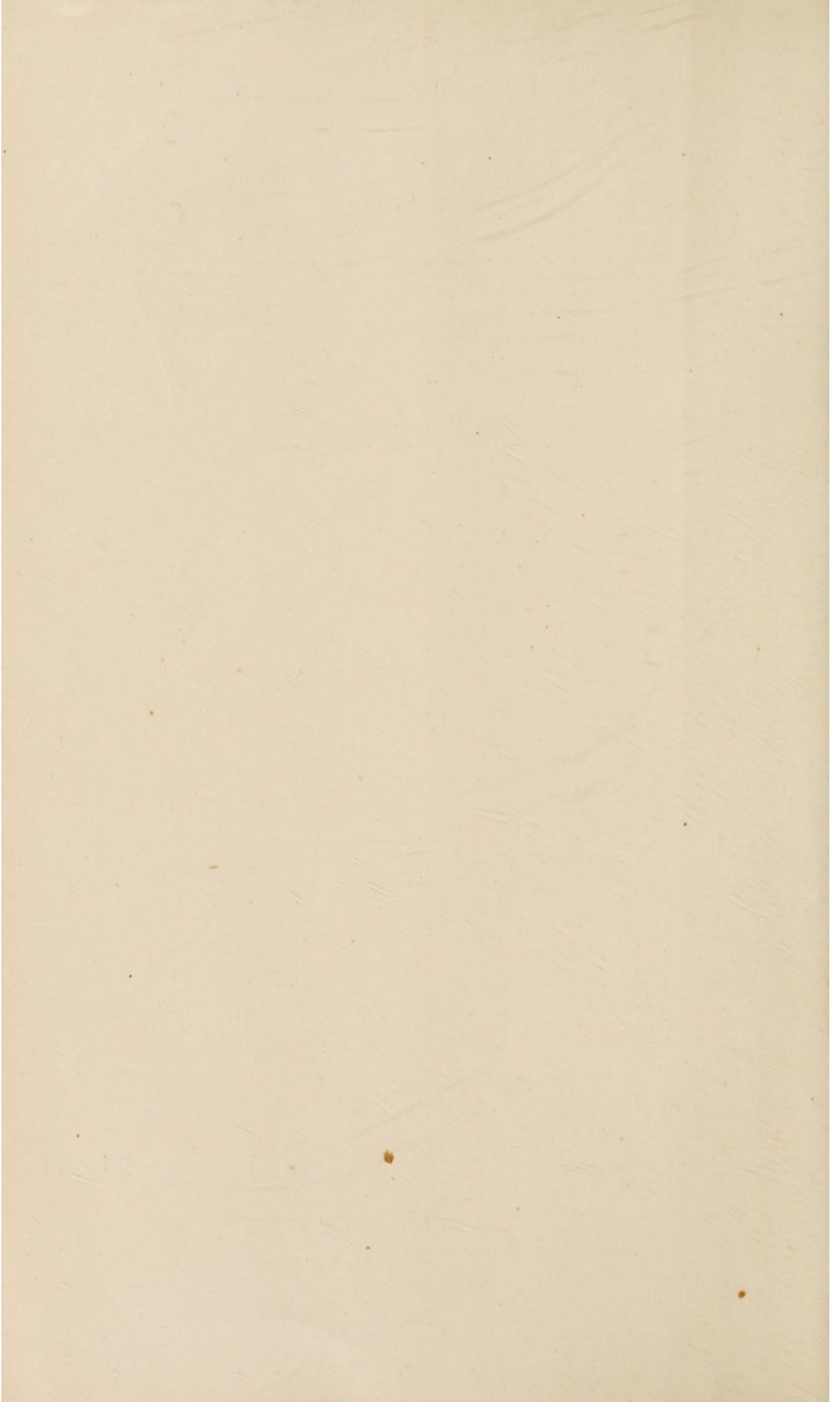

## ANNUAL REPORT

FOR THE

YEAR 1944

The Board of Management have pleasure in presenting the 89th Annual Report. They have the honour to record with deep gratification that the work for patients has been furthered by the gracious interest of Their Majesties the King and Queen, Her Majesty Queen Mary and Their Royal Highnesses The Duke and Duchess of Gloucester, from whom gifts have been received.

Throughout the year beds have continued to be reserved in the Hospital, in St. David's Wing and also at Grovelands Hospital under the Emergency Hospital Scheme for Service patients and Air Raid Casualties. Intensification of enemy bombing caused further evacuation of residents of North London and consequently the number of In and Out-Patients applying for treatment was slightly smaller than in the previous year. Nevertheless it will be seen that the volume of work accomplished in all departments clearly indicates the value to the population of the services provided by the Hospital under circumstances of great stress.

## ST. DAVID'S WING FOR PRIVATE PATIENTS

During the year 1,101 Medical, Surgical and Maternity cases were admitted including officers of H.M. Forces. Fifteen beds could not be used and many patients had to be refused admission because of the insufficiency of trained nursing staff consequent upon the direction of nurses by the Ministry of Labour and National Service into special fields of nursing, as soon as they were qualified. It is gratifying to know that the facilities provided in the Wing are always appreciated.

## FINANCE

Although the difficult times through which the country is passing have created many calls upon the public purse it is a source of pleasure to the Board to be able to record the receipt of much valued assistance both in money and in kind. Among these are included :—

In addition to the foregoing grant, King Edward's Hospital Fund, recognising the urgent need of the Hospital, generously provided a special grant of £5,000 conditionally upon the Hospital obtaining a further £10,000 in new money from its supporters. Up to the end of the year £2,750 of this gift had been claimed. The Board are grateful for this special encouragement and hope that friends will help them to qualify for the remaining part of this grant.

The Board deeply regret to record the death, at the close of the year, of Mr. C. F. Clark who, for a long period during the War, had sent from his gardens which he had extended and cultivated for the purpose of helping Hospitals, constant and substantial gifts of fresh vegetables which have been an invaluable help in providing a suitable and varied diet for both patients and staff to supplement the war-time rations. The Board are glad to know that this generous assistance will be continued by his son, Mr. C. A. Clark.

The hospital has been assisted by grants from various Contributory Schemes which have made part-payments towards the cost of maintenance of their members whilst undergoing treatment and the following are cordially acknowledged:—

Ordinary Income amounted to £139,755 and to this was transferred the sum of £12,065 from Legacies. The Expenditure was £151,730. Receipts from Legacies totalled £13,465 and £1,400 of this amount was transferred to the General Fund Capital Account for the reduction of Debt. It will be seen from Accounts of the various Branches of the Hospital that the difference between Income and Expenditure has, where necessary, been met by an apportionment of the requisite sums from the General Fund.

The value of the Hospital's Endowment at the end of the year stood at £105,613 and there was a credit balance of £30,326 for Special Funds other than Buildings Accounts. The Building Fund was increased by £3,251 and the Expenditure on essential buildings and equipment has been £157.

The Gross Debt at the end of the year amounted to £195,585. Of this sum £147,684 was in respect of accumulated Maintenance deficiencies and £47,901 on account of Land, Buildings and Equipment. In consequence of the improved War situation the depreciation on Invested Funds has decreased to £855 from £5,605 last year.

## STAFF SALARIES AND WAGES

During the year the Board adopted and put into force various national scales of salaries and conditions of service for professional and technical staffs of Hospitals, including the second half of the

Rushcliffe Committee's recommendations for Nurses and Midwives and the Hetherington Committee's recommendations for Domestic Staff. Whilst every effort has been made to keep expenditure to a minimum the adoption of these scales is reflected in the total costs of maintaining the Hospital.

The Special Appeal Fund received gifts towards Maintenance and Capital Accounts amounting to £8,823.

### **CO-OPERATING ORGANISATIONS**

The Board are mindful of the invaluable assistance received from those who assist the work of the Hospital in numerous ways by membership of various organisations. Among those to whom deep gratitude is expressed are :—

The Ladies' League, the Ladies' Association, the League of Roses, the League of Little Deeds of Kindness, the Clergy, Ministers and Congregations of various denominations, the Hospital Supply Depôt, the Barnes and East Sheen Supply Depôt and all other working parties who have been assiduous in their labours.

### **VICE PRESIDENTS AND BOARD OF MANAGEMENT**

It is with deep regret that the Board record the death of the late Mr. Philip Hill, Chairman of the Beecham Company, who founded and partially maintained the Beecham Laboratories at the Hospital which have proved of inestimable value.

### **HONORARY MEDICAL STAFF**

Cordial thanks are extended to the members of the Honorary Medical Staff of all sections of the Hospital who have continued to give, without stint, of their services in the interest of the Patients.

### **STAFF**

It is with pleasure also that the Board extend special thanks to all members of the Resident Medical, Nursing, Midwifery, Administrative, Housekeeping and other Staffs, as well as to the Chaplain and his Assistants, all of whom, through all difficulties and dangers, carried out their duties efficiently and with cheerfulness and courage during heavy bombing when large numbers of casualties had to be treated. They were splendidly supported by many Voluntary Workers, Volunteer Stretcher Bearers and the Hospital's Fire Guard teams, to whom thanks are also accorded.

### **CATERING**

Both the Ministry of Health and King Edward's Hospital Fund have urged upon Hospitals the desirability of setting up special catering staffs and improved catering facilities. This policy which the Royal Northern originated and acted upon 27 years ago is therefore

now fully justified, and the Board are encouraged by its acceptance.

### **ROYAL CHEST HOSPITAL**

The Out-Patient Department of the Royal Chest Hospital has continued to render valued services to the patients who, during the year, made 32,661 attendance. As the In-Patient section was destroyed by enemy action those patients who required admission were found accommodation at Wellhouse Hospital, Friern Emergency Hospital and Clare Hall Hospital under an arrangement with the Ministry of Health. The Income for the year was £5,644 and the Expenditure £5,684.

### **GROVELANDS HOSPITAL, SOUTHGATE**

Although on two more occasions during the year this section was damaged by bombing, it continued to play its full part in the treatment and restoration to health of the sick and injured, and during the year 1,013 patients were admitted.

The income for the year was £7,007 while the expenditure amounted to £7,844.

### **MATERNITY WARDS AND JOINT MIDWIFERY TRAINING SCHOOLS (PART I.)**

689 expectant mothers entered the Maternity Wards and 6,907 attendances were made at the Ante-Natal and Post-Natal Clinics at the Hospital.

34 Pupils were accepted for the Part 1 training of the Central Midwives Board and 28 passed the examinations.

### **MATERNITY NURSING ASSOCIATION**

857 Mothers were attended in their own homes during confinement, involving 22,272 visits by Midwives and Pupil Midwives. The mothers made 9,919 attendances at Ante-Natal, Post-Natal and Child Welfare Clinics at Myddelton Square and Camden Road Branches

64 Pupils were received for Part II examination course of training and 62 passed the C.M.B. examination.

The income of the Association was £5,362 and the expenditure was £10,059.

A full account of the work of the Association will be found in its separate report.

### **ALMERIC PAGET MASSAGE CLINIC.**

This most useful Clinic, housed in premises adjoining the Royal Chest Hospital, (the accounts of which are included with those of the Hospital), had 11,028 attendances as against 8,574 in the previous year. The Board are deeply grateful for the help rendered by the Almeric Paget Trust in providing these facilities for patients.

## THE FUTURE.

The Government's White Paper on the National Health Service did not reveal in its proposals the fundamental basis of true partnership between the Local Authorities and Voluntary Hospital Managements which had been referred to by successive Ministers of Health as an essential factor of the Scheme.

The proposals as they stand would only reduce the Voluntary Hospitals to a position of subserviance to the Local Authorities and could only constitute an impediment to progress. Happily, the Minister of Health has provided opportunities for representative consultations and the Board have given their support to the policy and action of the British Hospitals Association in pressing for suitable revisions and safeguards in any bill that may be introduced to Parliament.

## APPEAL

In conclusion, the Board express their sincere gratitude for the help, in money, in kind, and in personal service which has been given for the benefit of the Patients in all sections of the Hospital's organisation.

They confidently appeal for continued and increased support in order that the Board may undertake as soon as possible the substantial structural and decorative repairs, the replacement of out-of-date equipment and essential developments, all of which the war has made impracticable.

It is hoped that these may soon become possible, so that the treatment of patients can go on unimpeded and ever improving.

## NORTHERN TUBERCULOSIS DISPENSARY

### REPORT FOR THE YEAR 1944

During the past year there was again an increase in the amount of work carried out at the Dispensary, and it was found necessary to employ an Assistant Nurse during the Clinic hours. This proved a great benefit to the patients and staff. The steady flow of patients was facilitated.

Special Thursday and Saturday Clinics were again held for workers during the Winter months. The Thursday evening Clinic was held during the Summer.

The Islington Borough Council arranged for all the Staff of the Children's Day Nurseries to be examined at the Dispensary, and X-Rayed. These persons were given special appointments. The National Service Board continued to send male and female recruits for examination, and the Mass Radiography Units referred cases for further investigations which could only be carried out in conjunction with the Hospital Laboratory.

I have to thank the Dispensary Staff for their constant and able assistance during these busy times.

The total number of visits paid to the homes of patients, or to patients in local Hospitals, numbered 2,435.

### *Endowment and Naming of Wards and Beds*

1.—Donors of **Five Thousand Pounds** shall have the privilege of naming a Ward, at the entrance to which a tablet shall be placed stating the name of the Donor, etc. They shall be Life Governors and Members of the Council.

2.—Donors of **One Thousand Guineas** to endow a bed in a General Ward, or Donors of **Five Hundred Guineas** to endow a bed in a Contributory Ward, may give it in annual instalments of not less than One Hundred Guineas. They shall have the privilege of selecting the site of the Bed, at the head of which a brass plate shall be fixed stating the name of the Donor, etc. They shall be Life Governors and Members of the Council. Donors of **Seven Hundred Guineas** may endow a Cot in a General Ward and have in other respects the same privileges as donors of One Thousand Guineas.

3.—Donors of **One Hundred Guineas** in one sum have the privilege of naming a Bed for life, and donors of **Seventy Guineas** a Cot for life, and they shall be Life Governors and Members of the Council. Associations, Companies and Corporations naming Beds or Cots under this rule do so for a period of 15 years.

4.—Donors of **Thirty Guineas**, and persons collecting and paying over **Fifty Guineas** in one sum in any one year, shall be Life Governors and Members of the Council.



# ADMISSION OF IN- AND OUT-PATIENTS

## REGULATIONS

1.—No letters of recommendation are required, and Patients are admitted according to the urgency of the case. *Those recommended by Governors and Subscribers will at all times receive every attention.*

2.—No Articles of Food or Drink of any kind are permitted to be taken into the Wards under any pretence whatever.

3.—Patients are expected to contribute as much as they can afford towards the cost of their maintenance, medicines and surgical dressings.

Governors and Subscribers, before sending Patients who are very ill to be admitted into the Hospital, are requested to communicate with the Secretary, and to forward a Medical Certificate of the case, when they will be informed as to whether and on what day the Patient can be received.

## TRAINING FACILITIES AVAILABLE AT THE ROYAL NORTHERN HOSPITAL

### NURSES TRAINING SCHOOL

Candidates of good education, between the ages of 18 and 33, can be received into the Preliminary Training School for seven weeks' training before entering the Wards.

On completion of three years' training selected nurses have the opportunity of taking the Central Midwives' Board Examinations

### MIDWIFERY TRAINING SCHOOLS—PART II

Pupils are received for six months' training for the second Examination of the Central Midwives Board. Further details will be found under the heading "Maternity Nursing Association."

### SCHOOL OF RADIOGRAPHY

Students are accepted for training at the age of 18. The X-Ray Department is spacious with up-to-date apparatus and is recognised by the Society of Radiographers as an approved training centre. Students trained at the Hospital may therefore obtain the Society's Diploma after two years.

There is accommodation for resident women students at the rate of 25/- per week for board and lodging.

### HOUSEKEEPING COURSE

Students with a Secondary School education are accepted for practical and theoretical training in Cooking, Linen Room Work, Needlework and Store Keeping.

Students receive pocket money together with board, lodging, uniform and laundry.

A certificate is issued at the termination of the course to successful candidates who should then be qualified to accept posts as Assistant Housekeepers, Assistant School Matrons, or Assistant Cooks at a commencing salary for resident posts of from £52 to £75 a year.
