ANNUAL REPORT

FOR THE

YEAR ENDING 31st DECEMBER, 1947

The Board of Management have much pleasure in presenting the 92nd Annual Report of the work of the Royal Northern Group of Hospitals.

It is with a deep sense of gratitude that the Board again record the continued interest of Their Majesties the King and Queen, together with members of the Royal Family, in the work of the Hospital and the welfare of its patients.

Last year attention was drawn to the continued demands on the Hospital services and the consequent problem of providing adequate accommodation; because of the development of new methods of treatment, space in which to do the work is still a vital problem, and expansion remains impossible until building is permitted by the Government.

ST. DAVID'S WING FOR PRIVATE PATIENTS

The popularity of this section for Private Patients has been maintained and the rooms available are very fully and constantly occupied.

During the year 1,303 patients were admitted.

ROYAL NORTHERN AND PRINCE OF WALES JOINT RADIOTHERAPY CENTRE

The Joint Radiotherapy Centre, run in conjunction with the Prince of Wales's Hospital, Tottenham, continues to fulfil a valuable function and, in addition to dealing with an increased number of patients, the Centre has contributed valuable data for research purposes. A separate account of its activities appears later in the Report.

RHEUMATIC RESEARCH UNIT

In order that more attention could be given to the various forms of rheumatism and their treatment the Board decided that a Research Unit should be instituted for this purpose and that it should be staffed by a team of specialists who would each bring to the problem their experience in medicine, orthopædics, gynaecology, radiotherapy and pathology.

TUBERCULOSIS DISPENSARIES

Dr. Leitch, who had been Tuberculosis Officer at the Southern Dispensary at the Royal Chest Hospital since 1920, retired in April. It was then decided that in order to have a greater uniformity of work at both dispensaries Dr. Craig should be appointed Senior Tuberculosis Officer in charge of both dispensaries with the help of a full-time and a part-time Assistant Tuberculosis Officer.

Substantial assistance has been received in grants from various contributory Schemes which have made part-payments towards the

cost of maintenance of their members while undergoing treatment and the following are acknowledged with gratitude :—

The ordinary Income for maintenance amounted to £250,891, including £3,420 transferred from Legacies. This total was more than in the previous year and included grants from the Ministry of Health under the authority given by Parliament for assistance to Voluntary Hospitals in the interim period as shown in the accounts. It was insufficient to meet expenditure which amounted to £258,085. Again the cost of salaries and Hospital commodities substantially increased the necessary expenditure involved in the treatment of patients.

The value of the Hospital's endowments at the end of the year was £113,480 and there were credits on various Funds (other than Building Funds) amounting to £27,927.

The Building Fund increased by £3,381 and the Expenditure on essential buildings amounted to £7,086.

At the close of the year the gross Debt amounted to £240,167. Of this sum £189,924 was in respect of accumulated maintenance deficiencies and £50,243 in respect of Land, Buildings and Equipment.

BOARD OF MANAGEMENT

The death of Sir William Collins, who had been a member of the Board since 1936, is recorded with deep regret.

Since the close of the year the Board have also lost Mr. Richard Moreland, who from 1921, when the Royal Chest Hospital was amalgamated with the Royal Northern Hospital, was a member of the Board. He had previously been Chairman of the Royal Chest Hospital for many years. His great assistance, both to the Royal Northern Hospital and to the Royal Chest Hospital, will be much missed.

HONORARY MEDICAL STAFF

An expression of deepest gratitude is offered to all members of the Honorary Medical and Surgical Staff for the care and skill which they have bestowed so freely upon the patients whose ever-increasing number has entailed much extra work which has been most willingly undertaken. An addition has been made to the number of Physicians and Dr. Elliott Mackworth, M.B., Ch.B., M.R.C.P., has been appointed to the vacancy.

The death of Dr. W. R. Reynell, who had been Physician in Charge of the Neurological Department since 1921, is recorded with deep regret.

CHAPLAINS, RESIDENT MEDICAL, NURSING, MID-WIFERY, ADMINISTRATIVE, HOUSEKEEPING AND OTHER STAFFS

The strain placed upon the various staffs occasioned by changing conditions, pressure of work in all departments and, in many cases, an acute shortage of personnel, has demanded redoubled efforts from those who, in many instances, have borne the burden and heat of the day for many years and the Board wish to record sincere appreciation of this loyal and devoted service.

ROYAL CHEST HOSPITAL

It is regretted that all efforts to secure permanent In-Patient accommodation to replace that destroyed by enemy action in 1940 has proved unavailing ; nevertheless the work of the Out-Patient Department has continued unabated and 32,109 attendances were made at the various Clinics, including 9,620 at the Almeric Paget Massage Clinic. The Almeric Paget Trust came to the conclusion in December that at the end of June, 1948, they would cease their activities, which for several years had been carried on in close association with the Hospital and had been much appreciated by the Patients. The Board again extend very warm thanks to the Hertfordshire County Council and to the Medical Superintendent and Staff of Wellhouse Hospital through whose kindly co-operation it has been possible to provide beds for some of the patients needing in-patient care.

The Income for the year was £6,628 and the Expenditure £8,751.

GROVELANDS HOSPITAL, SOUTHGATE

The Board is pleased to report that the Recovery Section at Southgate has again proved a valuable adjunct, and has been the means of securing a more rapid intake to the beds at the parent hospital by providing accommodation in healthy surroundings for those in the first stages of recovery.

During the year 1,095 patients were admitted. The Expenditure was £12,758.

RECKITT CONVALESCENT HOME, CLACTON-ON-SEA

Patients derive great benefit from their stay at the Reckitt Home and the Board are glad that, after so long an interval during which the buildings were under requisition by the Military Authorities, this means of completing the cure and treatment of patients is once again available. This accommodation for convalescence is particularly valuable under present conditions when so few patients are able to secure the necessary rest at home after discharge from hospital. During the year 267 patients were admitted. The Expenditure was £3,506.

MATERNITY WARDS AND JOINT MIDWIFERY TRAINING SCHOOL (Part I)

827 expectant mothers were admitted to the Wards, while 9,046 attendances were made at the Ante-Natal and Post-Natal Clinics. In the Midwifery Training School (Part I) 56 Pupil Midwives were successful in passing the Central Midwives Board Examination.

MATERNITY NURSING ASSOCIATION AND PART II TRAINING SCHOOL

1,892 mothers were attended during confinement in their own homes and 50,677 visits to homes were made by Midwives and pupils. There were 17,778 attendances at the Ante-Natal, Post-Natal and Child Welfare Clinics.

117 pupils were received for Part II training, of whom all were successful in passing the Central Midwives Board Examination.

Owing to numerous delays in completing the necessary alterations it has not yet been possible to open the Maternity Unit at Welwyn Garden City, but arrangements have been made for the staffing and administration of this Hospital on behalf of the Hertfordshire County Council as from the end of May, 1948.

The Hitchin Maternity Unit, staffed by the Association and administered by the Royal Northern Hospital on behalf of the Ministry of Health, through the Hertfordshire County Council, continues to be of service to expectant mothers from London. There were 803 confinements during 1947.

A full account of the work of the Association is contained in a separate report.

CITY OF LONDON MATERNITY HOSPITAL

On 15th April, 1947, the Royal Northern and the City of London Maternity Hospital concluded an agreement for amalgamation (awaiting legal form) and since that date have been working in close co-operation. Members of the Committees and of the Medical Staffs

of each Hospital are combined in consideration of all matters relating to Obstetrics, Gynæcology, Midwifery Training, etc., and the Gynæcological and Obstetric Staffs and the senior administrative and Midwifery Staffs have become common to both Hospitals. A separate detailed report of the City of London Maternity Hospital work is published and it is interesting to note that the combined activities in the spheres of Maternity and Midwifery Training work give the following totals—

CONCLUSION

This is the last Annual Report of the Royal Northern Group of Hospitals as a Voluntary Organisation which will be presented to the Governors and it will be understood that the Board of Management approach the "Appointed Day" for transfer with a sense of sadness that after 92 years of ever-increasing voluntary effort the management of the Hospital is passing into other hands, but it is our earnest hope that the spirit of service and human sympathy, which has been an outstanding feature of its work, will continue and that its high standards will be maintained and advanced.

We wish to record our deep appreciation of the services of all members of Committees who have given so willingly of their time, counsel and experience to ensure that the best which medical science and surgical skill could provide should be available at all times to those needing assistance. There is always present in the minds of the Management their great obligation to all the members of the Honorary and other Medical Staffs, the Nursing and Midwifery Staff and the large body of other workers, all of whom are so important in ensuring the welfare and comfort of the patients, and to everybody the Board offer a final word of profound gratitude for all that they have done to uphold the traditions and reputations of the Hospital. In passing over responsibility to the State the Board wish to express the hope that the patients of this Group of Hospitals will still benefit by the further services of those loyal Staffs in the future.

From the earliest days, when the Hospital consisted of one room in York Road, King's Cross, the Board have endeavoured to look ahead and so to enlarge the organisation that it possessed adequate means of development for future generations, and they are proud of this progressive spirit and the results which have been achieved. The Royal Northern is now the largest Voluntary Hospital Organisation in North London—it is, in fact, a miniature Hospital Service in itself—and there are a number of developments in which it has led the way for

many years. Its investments, extensive lands, buildings, medical and surgical equipment, furnishings, etc., which will be handed over to the State are worth, at present-day valuation, not less than a million pounds.

The success of the future Health Service will depend upon the willing co-operation of all those who have in the past been concerned with the care and treatment of the sick, and also upon the continuance of the sympathetic interest and personal service of voluntary workers which have always contributed so much towards the comfort of the patients. This will still be needed in the future for such purposes as are not covered by State funds. For this purpose the Board make a final appeal to all friends of the Hospital to maintain their interest in the patients and support of any special funds which may help them in the coming years.

The Reckitt Home was re-opened in December 1946, and during the year 268 patients have been sent there for convalescence. To other Homes chosen for some specific reason, we have sent 29 patients.

The care of the aged and chronic sick is becoming an ever more pressing problem. It is almost impossible to find accommodation for them in Homes or Hospitals and numbers are left alone or to the care of already over-worked relatives. A certain amount of help is organised by old people's Welfare Committees, where these exist, but much remains to be done.

With the coming into force of the new Health Service, it would seem that some of the routine work connected with the provision of instruments, glasses, etc., will disappear, and thus allow more time for case work.

TRAINING FACILITIES AVAILABLE AT THE ROYAL NORTHERN HOSPITAL

NURSES TRAINING SCHOOL

Candidates of good education, between the ages of 18 and 33, can be received into the Preliminary Training School for eight weeks' training before entering the Wards.

On completion of three years' training selected nurses have the opportunity of taking the Central Midwives' Board Examinations

MIDWIFERY TRAINING SCHOOLS—PART II

Pupils are received for six months' training for the second Examination of the Central Midwives Board. Further details will be found under the heading "Maternity Nursing Association."

SCHOOL OF RADIOGRAPHY

Students are accepted for training at the age of 18. The X-Ray Department is spacious with up-to-date apparatus and is recognised by the Society of Radiographers as an approved training centre. Students trained at the Hospital may therefore obtain the Society's Diploma after two years.

There is accommodation for resident women students at the rate of 25/- per week for board and lodging.

HOUSEKEEPING COURSE

Students with a Secondary School education are accepted for practical and theoretical training in Cooking, Linen Room Work, Needlework and Store Keeping.

Students receive pocket money together with board, lodging, uniform and laundry.

A certificate is issued at the termination of the course to successful candidates who should then be qualified to accept posts as Assistant Housekeepers, Assistant School Matrons, or Assistant Cooks.

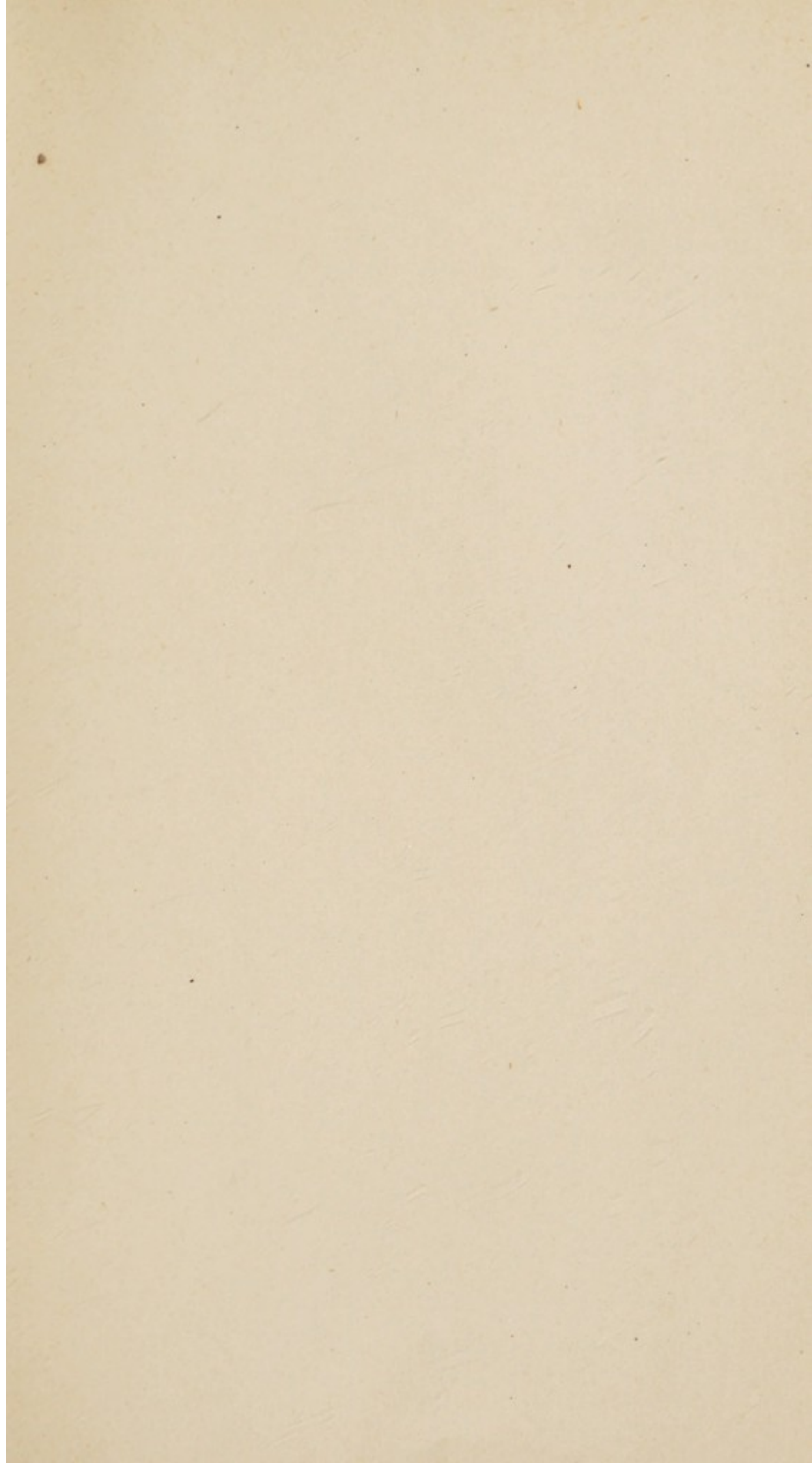

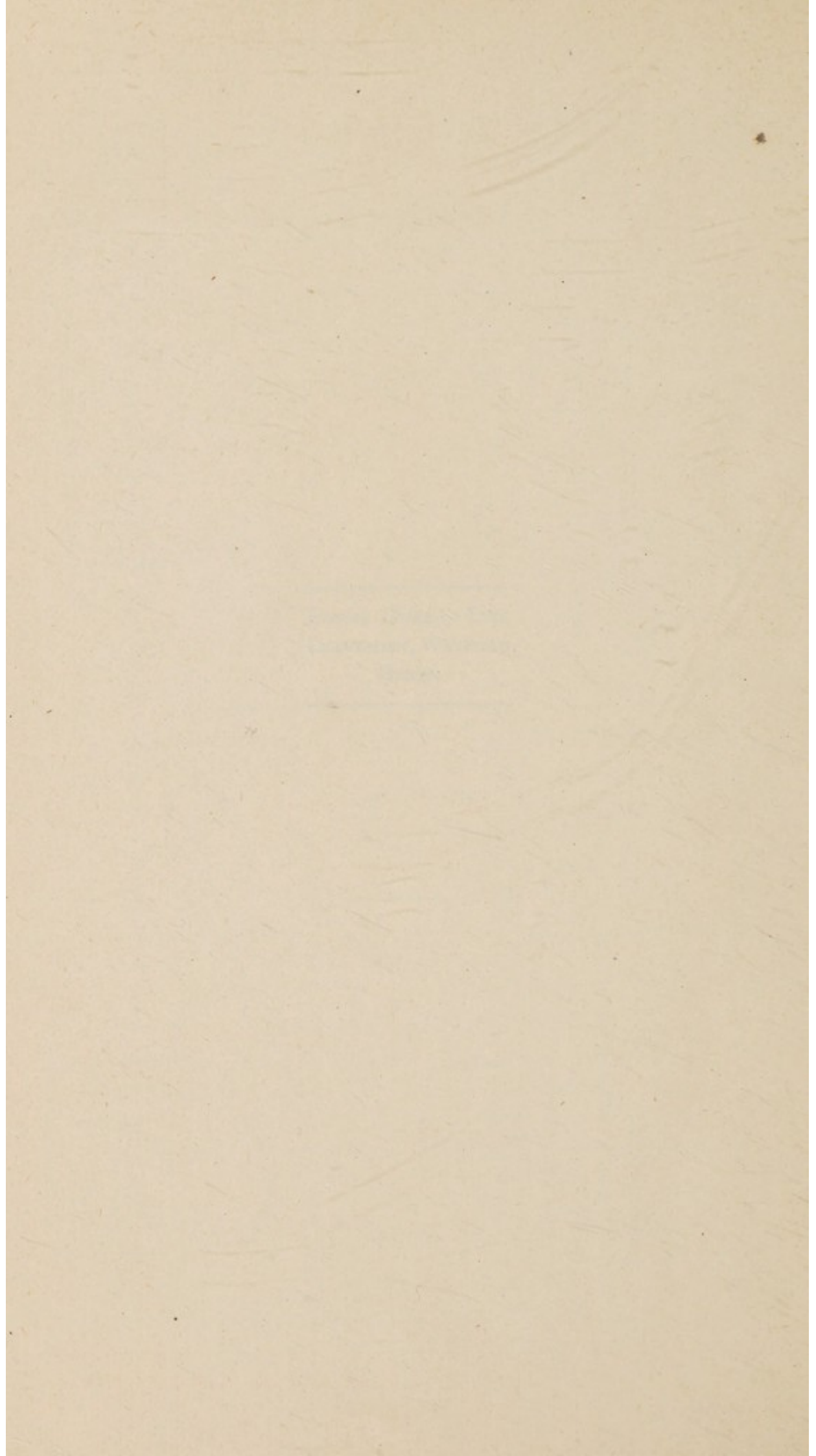

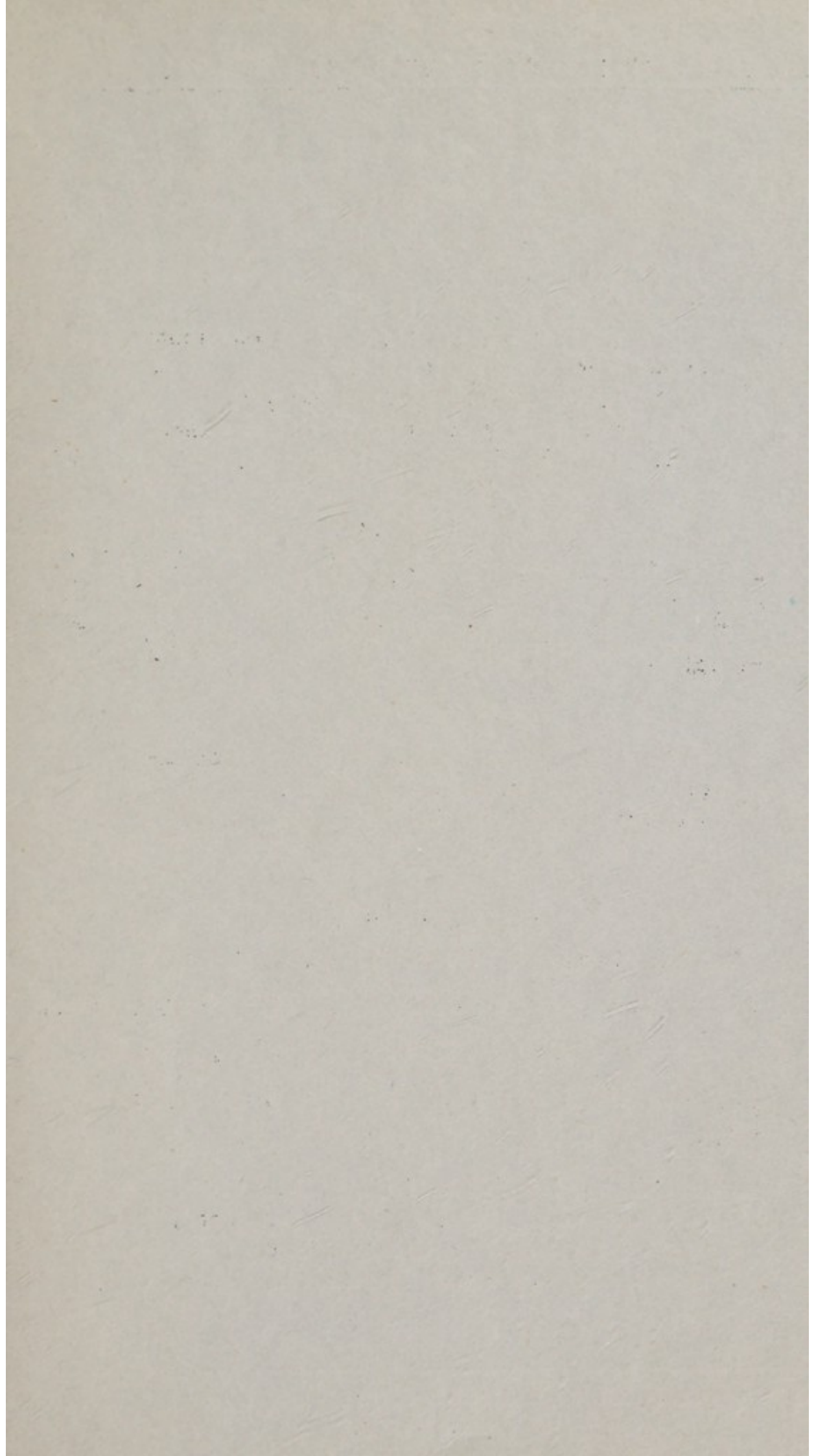
