



REPORT.

The Rutson Hospital has provided treatment for 204 patients during the year 1927—an increase of 23 on the number of patients in the previous year.

The daily average number of patients was 12, as compared with 11.9 in 1926.

The average number of days per patient was 22, as against 20.7 for the previous year.

Road accident cases increase and are an expense to the Hospital as these cases often require a prolonged treatment and in many cases no payment is received.

The Annual Statement of Accounts is presented herewith. The statement shows a deficit of f_{194} 10s. 5d.

An appeal for further support with regard to Annual Subscriptions was issued by the Committee during the year, and the Committee greatly appreciate the action of those who responded to the appeal by becoming Annual Subscribers.

There is reduction on the Expenditure under all headings as compared with the amounts of the Expenditure of the previous year.

An extension of the hot water heating system has been carried out during 1927—the men and women's wards are now warmed by radiators and the consumption of coal is thereby considerably reduced. This extension has entailed the installing of two separate boilers for the heating and domestic supply in the place of the one boiler which was worn out. This alteration has proved satisfactory. The cost of this alteration and addition to the hot water system has been dealt with through the Capital Account.

The Committee wish to express their sincere thanks to Subscribers and Donors; to the Clergy and others who devoted Congregational Collections for the benefit of the Hospital; to the Hon. Chaplain, Honorary Medical, Dental and Dispensing Staff, the Hon. Treasurer, and District Correspondents; to Miss Shephard for her help during the holidays of the Staff; to Mrs. Foggin for her help during pound day; to Mr. F. Wilson for his assistance in carrying stretcher cases; to the Choirs who sing to the patients on Sunday evenings, and to all who have helped the Hospital in many and various ways.

The Mile of Pennies Fund continues.

Pound Day was again held and a large number of gifts in kind were most gratefully received, together with $\pounds 27$ 15s. 0d. in money, see page 21.

A valuable addition to the linen has been presented to the Hospital by the Ladies' Aid Society who have provided 24 pairs of sheets.

A list of gifts received during the year, together with a list of special Christmas gifts, will be found on pages 19, 20, and 21.

The Committee record with deep regret the death of Mrs. J. P. Yeoman, a member of the Committee and of the linen Sub-Committee. The kind interest and assistance which Mrs. Yeoman gave in all matters connected with the Hospital will be greatly missed.

The District Hospital Associations continue to give support to the Hospital.

The Hospital work continues to be ably carried out by Miss Osbourn, the Matron, and Sister Hirst.

The Hospital continues to afford treatment to four nonpulmonary tuberculosis patients. The Tuberculosis Dispensary of the County Council is held at the Hospital each Wednesday. The North Riding Education Committee Children's Eye Clinic is held there four times a year.

Under the will of the late Captain W. H. Cooper-Horsfall, one of the Trustees of the Hospital, the Hospital will receive a legacy of $\pounds 500$ 0s. 0d.

MEDICAL OFFICER'S REPORT.

The work of the Hospital during the year ended December 31st, 1927, has increased compared with previous years, and many of the cases were of a serious nature, throwing a strain on the working staff of the hospital. This proves the continued usefulness of this Institution, to the town and neighbourhood.

Judging from my almost daily visits, and from a medical point of view, the comfort of the patients in this hospital is practically all that could be expected or desired, and the patients appear happy.

The patients admitted during the year number 204, those already in the hospital at the commencement of the year 8, which makes a total of 212 patients treated during the year. This shews an increase of 20 patients for the year with which we are dealing, the number for 1926 being 192. These cases consisted of 38 medical, 111 surgical, 10 surgical tuberculosis, 11 maternity, and 23 dental cases.

Of the surgical cases, 37 were accidents, and many of these of a serious nature were due to motor accidents on the highways near. Most of these were not residents of the district. This extra work throws a strain, and often an expense, on the hospital by strangers, some of whom afford the expense of running a motor car for pleasure, but do not subscribe to the upkeep of this or any similar institution.

The number of operations performed was 71, of these 33 were major operations, and 38 of a minor nature. The deaths in the institution number 11 for the year, 6 being surgical and 5 medical.

The County Council continues to get good results from the treatment of surgical Tuberculous diseases, and by the number admitted it will be seen the department is doing useful work.

The nursing and other arrangements for the welfare of all the patients have been carried out in a manner deserving of the highest praise. The Matron, Sister and Staff, have many times been overworked, but have cheerfully carried on with their usual energy. Their kindness, consideration and sympathy is, I am sure, appreciated by the patients, and by all who have the welfare of the Rutson Hospital at heart.

The **REVISED** RULES of the

RUTSON HOSPITAL.

Approved at the Annual General Meeting of Subscribers on Monday, February 26th, 1923.

1.-The Rutson Hospital, Northallerton, is founded to afford medicines, good nursing, &c. to those residing in the town or neighbourhood, who are suffering from accident or illness and are unable to procure those benefits at their own homes.

2.-The Hospital shall be governed by a Committee consisting of twenty members, six to form a quorum; 12 to be elected by Annual Subscribers of ten shillings and Donors of five pounds, at the Annual General Meeting ; 8 to be elected annually by Patient Paying Associations, who shall have contributed not less than ten pounds to the funds of the Hospital the previous year, by payments for patients, or in any other way allocated-

- 4 to Northallerton and Romanby,
- 1 " Bedale and District,
 - " Brompton and District,
- " Osmotherley and District,
 " Newby Wiske and Ainderby Districts,

or as the Committee may from time to time determine. The Committee at their first Meeting shall appoint a Chairman, Secretary, Treasurer, Medical Officers and Dispenser, who, with the Chaplain, shall be exofficio Members of the Committee. The Committee shall have power to fill up all vacancies between Annual General Meetings.

3 .- Patients suffering from incurable diseases shall not be admitted, and no person shall be admitted without the approval of a Medical Practitioner. Cases of accident or extreme danger shall be admitted without any nomination.

4.-The Committee shall have power to make and enforce Bye-Laws, and to refuse any unsuitable Patient.

5.-Annual Subscribers for each ten shillings subscribed, shall be entitled to nominate a Patient to remain in the Hospital for one week, the Patient to contribute a further sum approved by the Committee. A Patient who remains in the Hospital longer than a week must obtain a fresh nomination. Donors of five pounds and upwards may receive undated tickets of eight shillings, entitling the bearer to Free Hospital Treatment (board, nursing, dressings and drugs) for one day, or at any other rate the Committee may determine from time to time.

6.-Forms of Nomination will be delivered to Subscribers as a receipt for their subscription and will be available for twelve months from the date of payment.

7.—Patients other than those holding Daily Tickets shall contribute to the funds of the Hospital such sums as the Committee may determine. Subscribers shall be requested to state on the Nomination Form what sum they consider the patient able to pay, and the patient or other responsible person shall be required to undertake that such sum shall be paid weekly to the Sister in Charge or other person appointed by the Committee. The payment may be remitted by the Committee in exceptional cases. Private Patients, subject to the approval of the Committee, may be received at not less than $f_{c}4$ 4s. 0d. per week, exclusive of extra nurses, special dressings, medical attendance and medicines, or at a rate to be fixed by the Committee from time to time.

8.—Patients wishing to enter the Hospital without tickets may be admitted into the General Ward on payment of $\pounds 3$ 3s. 0d. per week, or as the Committee may from time to time determine. This rate does not include medical attendance.

9.—Annual Subscriptions shall be considered as due on the 1st of January in each year.

10.—Every Congregational Collection of ten shillings and above shall entitle the Minister of the Church or Chapel where such collection is made to all the privileges of an Annual Subscriber or of a Donor.

11.—The Committee shall have power, when the number of applications for admission exceeds the accommodation, to select such cases as appear to them most urgent.

12.—The Committee shall meet at the Hospital for the transaction of general business.

13.—An Annual Report of the state of progress of the Hospital shall be issued by the Committee together with the Accounts of the preceding year.

14.—The Vicar of Northallerton shall be the Honorary Chaplain of the Hospital, but a Minister of any Denomination may visit a member of his Congregation who happens to be a Patient.

15.—These Rules shall not be altered except at the Annual General Meeting of Subscribers which shall be held in February of each year, or at a Special General Meeting called by the Committee at seven days notice for that purpose. RUTSON HOSPITAL CAPITAL ACCOUNT.
