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

Aims and Objects

OF THE

ROBERT JONES AND AGNES HUNT ORTHOPAEDIC HOSPITAL.

Extract from TRUST DEED.

To provide lectures, lantern slides, cinematographs, and generally any form of propaganda with a view to the prevention of crippling diseases.

(b) Treatment.

To provide or cause to be provided institutions, laboratories, shelters, homes, dispensaries, massage departments and other Hospital buildings, incidental to the treatment of persons suffering or likely to suffer or who may have suffered from crippling diseases.

(c) After Care.

To appoint duly qualified Orthopaedic Surgeons and Nurses in connection with the scheme of After Care, and in connection therewith to establish or cause to be established Treatment Centres, and to provide, upon payment, all splints and appliances and other mechanical aids for patients and surgical alterations to boots or other articles used by patients as may be necessary.

(d) School for Medical Men and Orthopaedic Nurses.

To establish and maintain a school for training Medical Men and Orthopaedic Nurses and preparing students for the examinations of the Chartered Society of Massage and Medical Gymnastics.


(e) Training.

To make arrangements whereby training for persons suffering from, likely to suffer, or who may have suffered from crippling diseases may be provided.

(f) Education.

To provide (in manner approved by the Board of Education) for the education of children who may be patients in the Hospital.

(g) To carry on any kind of work, whether practical or experimental, and to do all other such lawful things as are incidental or conducive to the attainment of the above-named o bjects.



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Preface

MR. CHAIRMAN, LADIES AND GENTLEMEN,

It is rather interesting to review the growth of this Hospital during the 43 years of its existence. It was born in the last year of the Boer War, and it was for children **only**; then, because the need was great, women and children were taken. Then one or two urgent cases of men were surreptitiously admitted. I remember the first man we had, a very acute tubercular knee, and I, trusting that the Committee would not come round the wards, put him in the darkest corner. Of course Miss Eliza Kenyon must needs come and after looking at him asked what age that boy was. Firmly I replied, "14 years." Her only answer was "He has a fine moustache for his age!" After that men were gradually admitted.

Then came the Great War and the Hospital grew by means of marquee tents supplied by the Military to 300 beds for men, women and children. Then Mrs. Mainwaring lent us her house for soldiers and other ladies took some in. These were visited once a week. Our transport was one borrowed ancient Ford open four-seater and one new Ford ambulance, not too comfortable. Also, the After-Care had started and had three motor cycles. Before the war ended we had 150 civilian men, women and children, 70 to 80 soldier pensioners and about 220 soldiers. So when we took over this big hospital we had no difficulty in filling the beds.

I believe we have during this last and most terrible war grown to 470 beds in the hospital, 70 at Aston and 60 at Gredington. I do, however, most sincerely hope that when it will please God to give us peace that the Hospital will diminish and not increase, because I am quite certain that a 300-bedded hospital is more efficient than a big unwieldly hospital, that would of necessity become departmental.

Forty-second Annual Report, 1942

THE Board of Management has pleasure in presenting its report for the year 1942.


Throughout the year the Hospital, its two annexes at Gredington and Aston Hall and other ancillary departments became increasingly busy, more patients being admitted to the wards and to the various clinics in the After Care area.

As in the immediately preceding years this report must be brief and be confined chiefly to statistical records.


The condition of the fabric of the five old wards and certain other buildings, the reconstruction of which was interrupted by the outbreak of hostilities, continues to cause the Board of Management considerable anxiety. We are at the present time in communication with the Ministry of Health with a view to deciding whether these buildings should be the subject of major structural repairs or piecemeal gradual reconstruction in accordance with a modified specification which has been submitted to the Ministry of Health by the Architect.

The Scheme of After Gare we are pleased to say, in spite of a restricted supply of petrol, and inability to replace old motor-cars, continues to function satisfactorily except that the visiting of patients in their homes has had to be seriously curtailed.

The number of patients needing admission into hospital, and for whose treatment no provision is made by the State, continues to increase. During the year the number of such cases dealt with by the Samaritan Fund was 698. These patients included a large number of industrial and domestic accidents; to a great extent workers in industry have made their own provision for hospital treatment through their membership of Hospital Contributory Schemes which make a contribution towards the cost of treatment, although in many cases such contibution is only a portion of the actual post. Membership of such schemes has, in our experience,







increased very considerably in recent years, and at the same time the Government had extended the provision of institutional treatment. The Emergency Medical Service of the Ministry of Health was created at the beginning of the war to provide treatment for civilian war casualties and Service This Scheme has been extended to include evacuees, cases. patients transferred from other hospitals to free hospital beds in a vulnerable area, transferred war workers, and Civil Defence Workers, Women's Land Army and fracture cases in manual workers engaged in war industry. Such patients, however, are expected to contribute towards the cost of their treatment according to their means, or if a contributor, through the agency of the Contributory Scheme. It is important to emphasise the position of other persons injured in industry not connected with the war, a large number of whom are under the mistaken impression that the cost of hospital treatment is met by the provisions of the Workmen's Compensation Act. This Act makes no provision for hospital treatment of people injured at work, but only provides weekly compensation for the injured workmen.

Except for specialised classes of people the Government provision is, in the main, for treatment of cases of fracture and there is no provision for patients suffering from other conditions. The cost of treatment of patients suffering from other orthopaedic conditions continues to fall upon the patients themselves or Hospital Contributory Schemes of which they might be members, or upon voluntary funds.

Once again we would like to express our great debt of gratitude to the Voluntary Orthopaedic Associations and Committees who continue to work throughout the year to assist patients to obtain hospital treatment, often for long periods. The Samaritan Fund could not possibly have made tinancial arrangements for these patients to receive adequate treatment if it were not for the magnificent work of the Voluntary Orthopaedic Associations; their work is invaluable not only from the financial but also from the social point of view. On behalf of the patients and the Board of Management we ask them to accept our gratitude and appreciation.

The General Income and Expenditure Account again shows an excess of income over expenditure. The surplus amounts to $\pounds 167$ 3s. 5d. after transferring $\pounds 500$ to the Building Fund Account.

A sum of $f_{16,624}$ was received from the Ministry of

Health in respect of the cost of treatment of patients under the Emergency Medical Services Scheme. This amount is subject to revision on presentation to the Ministry of the actual costs incurred by the Hospital.

The daily average number of patients was 505 which includes the patients treated at the Annexes at Gredington and Aston Hall. This figure exceeds the daily average of 1941 by 20 in-patients daily.

The number of out-patients treated at the Clinics totalled 10,325 compared with 9,667 during the previous year. Attendances totalled 26,330.

It is a pleasure to be able to report that it has been agreed, after consultation with the Shropshire Voluntary Hospitals Contributory Association, that this hospital shall become a participating hospital of the Shropshire Voluntary Hospitals Contributory Association, but that in view of its special financial policy it should not participate on the same basis of allocation as the other participating hospitals. It was agreed that distribution should be made on the basis of the number of in-patient days for which members of the Association were resident in the Orthopaedic Hospital, and that the hospital should receive as its allocation of the funds of the Association the same proportion of the cost of maintenance in the Orthopaedic Hospital as the ordinary rate of allocation bears to the cost of maintenance in the Royal Salop Infirmary in any year, with a guarantee that the amount so paid shall not be less than 6/- per diem. This agreement to be for a trial period of one year ending 31st December, 1943.

The thanks of the Board of Management are due to Mr. Menzies and the staff of the hospital who have continued to keep it in what we believe to be a high state of efficiency in spite of all the difficulties of war-time, the great expansion of the hospital, shortage of staff and materials, and increased numbers of statistical returns and forms that are necessary in these times.

My own personal thanks are due to the members of the Board of Management who have managed, in spite of transport difficulties, to continue to attend the various meetings of the Board of Management.


