# ROYAL CORNWALL INFIRMARY.

The Royal Cornwall Infirmary is the oldest Voluntary Hospital in the County, and owes its inception to the public spirit of Lord de Dunstanville (Sir Francis Basset), whose memory is perpetuated by a bust in the vestibule of the Hospital and by an obelisk on Carn Brea. Lord de Dunstanville called meetings at Camborne, Redruth and Truro. It was decided to build a Hospital at Truro, and the Cornwall General Infirmary was opened on August 12th, 1799, with twenty beds.

In 1800 the income was £792, the expenditure £830, and forty seven patients were admitted.

A few years later the Leper Hospital of St. Laurence de Ponteboye at Bodmin (a foundation incorporated under a charter by Queen Elizabeth in 1582) was no longer required, and was closed by an order of the Court of Chancery at the instance of Lord de Dunstanville. The property, a farm of fifty-four acres, was transferred to the Cornwall Infirmary, and was held until 1920, when it was sold and the money invested. The stone tablet on one of the buildings of the Leper Hospital was placed in the entrance of the Infirmary, and reads as follows:—

"Richard Carter of St. Columb, merchant, by his will and testament in 1582 did give £10 which sum by the consent of his executors we have employed towards the making of this house in year 1586, whose charitable and rare example in our time, God grant many to follow hereafter.

The first President was Sir William Lemon, and the first Treasurer Mr. Francis Enys. The first apothecary and secretary Mr. Bull, served the Hospital for fifty-five years. His portrait, with that of several physicians and surgeons who were on the staff many years, hangs in the Board Room. Mr. Bull's sister was Matron from 1854 to 1869. The list of Presidents contains the names of almost every well-known Cornish family. George, Prince of Wales, was the first patron, but in 1822 the Hospital was known as the Cornwall General Infirmary, and was under the Patronage of King George IV. There is no record as to when the title of the Hospital was changed to Royal Cornwall Infirmary. At this date the medical staff consisted of two physicians, two visiting and two consulting surgeons, and a surgeon apothecary or house surgeon.

The list of rules and regulations then published is interesting. For some unknown reason no dropsical patient or domestic servant was to be admitted, unless the latter was

incapable of remaining in service, and then only on the payment of six shillings a week. A useful rule was that 'no chaise, horse or cart bringing a patient to the Infirmary may return until it be known whether such patient can be admitted.'

Anyone recommending a patient must promise to defray the expenses of burial. In-patients were not to swear, behave rudely, or play at cards or dice, and on their discharge were to return thanks in their own parish Church.

At the Annual Court a sermon was to be preached to the Governors and a collection made for the use of the charity.

The Hospital continued to do good work, and in 1847 an ophthalmic department was started; and in 1854 £1,200 was spent on improvements. In 1865 the number of patients treated was 406, and the beds were increased to 60. In 1868 a north wing, and in 1887 a west wing, were built. In 1900 the operating theatre was reconstructed, and in 1905 £1,000 raised by the Hon. John Boscawen was spent on improvements. In 1905 private wards were initiated. In 1908 an X-ray department was started, and in 1911 £1,600 (raised by Col. the Hon. H. W. F. Trefusis (then President) was spent on improving the nursing staff quarters and ophthalmic departments.

During the Great War 50 beds were reserved for wounded soldiers, and after the War the Red Cross Society granted £4,500 to the Infirmary for improvements, and the Governors, under the presidency of the late Mr. Powys Rogers, collected and spent £17,000 on renovating the Hospital.

In 1919 the Hospital was recognised as a Training School for Nurses, and probationers were enabled in their four years' course to complete their training. In 1924 there were 70 beds, the number of patients admitted was 807, and a children's ward was added.

The yearly expenditure was now £6,000, double that in 1912. It was therefore necessary to ask patients to contribute to meet the extra cost, but all necessitous cases received careful consideration. The cost per bed was £2 12s. od. per week. The income was raised by subscriptions, £785; collections and donations, £1,800; investment, £1,100; and patients contributions, £1,500. The Hospital Saving Association proved to be a valuable source of income later on.

The work and responsibility of the medical and surgical staff rapidly increased. Cases were treated from all over Cornwall, and although smaller local Hospitals had been started in the county, the valuable facilities offered by the larger Hospital led to a continued increase in the number of surgical cases admitted.

In 1928 a new Nurses' Hostel was built, which is utilized for the senior nursing staff.

in 1930 an Orthopædic Ward of 14 beds was opened, together with a Consulting Out-patient department, and was associated with Orthopædic Clinics in various parts of Cornwall. This valuable work has rapidly increased.

In 1933 a new X-ray plant was installed, together with a portable set for use in the wards to save seriously injured patients the ordeal of unnecessary movement. A better mortuary chapel was arranged, and a new up-to-date laundry and boiler house built.

In 1934 it was decided to elect a Pathologist and to equip a Pathological Laboratory, an innovation of great value, both for exact diagnosis and scientific treatment. This department has rendered highly important service not only to the Hospital but to the Public Health Authorities and the Medical Practitioners of the county.

In 1936 an Ear, Nose and Throat department was opened under the care of a specialist, and has proved its value by the increasing numbers of patients sent from distant parts of the county.

In November, 1937, an experienced Radiologist was appointed in charge of the X-ray department. Notable features of 1937 were the cutting of the first sod of the extensions to the Hospital, on March 18th, by the Chairman of the County Council and the laying of the Foundation Stones of the new Nurses' Home, on December 17th, by Miss Alice Rashleigh and the Hon. Everilda Agar-Robartes.

During the year 1938 the extensions to the hospital have made great progress, and in spite of much inconvenience owing to building operations, work has been carried out as usual.

The beautifully equipped Nurses' Home, with accommodation for 42 nurses, was opened on 2nd November, 1938, by Mrs. E. H. Bolitho (the wife of the Lord-Lieutenant of the County).

Valuable adjuncts to the Infirmary are the Men's Convalescent Home at Perranporth, built in 1892, and endowed by the late Mr. Passmore Edwards, and the Women's Home, built in 1912 on land given by Mr. Enys and endowed by the late Mr. Dorrington. The Homes are usually open seven months in the year, and are generally full. The Homes are useful, not only in fully restoring the patients to health, but in relieving the pressure on the beds in the Infirmary.



# REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE OF MANAGEMENT.

The Committee of Management beg to submit their Report for the year ended 31st December, 1938.

1. The Year's Work. The number of In and Outpatients and operations performed was:—

Owing to the Building now proceeding where the new and old hospitals join, the bed accommodation has had to be temporarily decreased by six beds.

- 2. The daily occupation of beds during the year was 71 and the average stay of patients 24 days.
- 3. The average cost for In-patients for 3 years was:—

The serious increase in the cost per patient per day is mainly due to three causes:—

1. The greatly increased cost of the nursing Staff.

- 2. Expenditure in preparation for the occupation of the new building.
- 3. The increased cost of all commodities.

4 The total ordinary income amounted to £10,615 18s. 7d., and the total ordinary expenditure to £12,875 4s. 7d. The excess of expenditure over income for the year was £1,710 11s. 8d.

The sum of £1,000 received from redemption of £1,000 Canada 3% Stock was, by authority of the Governors, transferred to the Extensions Fund.

5. The Congregational Collections and Hospital Sunday Collections amounted to £702:7:9.

6. The amounts received from patients continue to increase:—

7. The receipts from the Hospital Saving Association shew a steady increase:—

As the Hospital Saving Association is ceasing its operations outside the London Area as from 1st February, 1939, your Committee, in co-operation with other Hospitals in West Cornwall, have supported the formation of Hospitals Contributory Association (Cornwall), Ltd., which will continue the contributory scheme on similar lines, and which is being supported by the Hon. Organising Secretaries and Group Secretaries, who give their voluntary service.

- 8. Extensions Fund. During the past year donations amounting to £4,136: 4: 3 have been received. The Committee gratefully thank all contributors, and also those who have furnished bedrooms in the Nurses' Home, and those who have given the cost of Beds in the Orthopaedic Ward.
- 9. Linen League. The League has supplied 1,300 articles of linen, blankets, etc., to the Hospital. It has raised £213:1:9 and expended £290:4:6 in purchases. There is a credit balance of £15:5:3. The League have already provided all the linen and blankets for the new Nurses' Home (42 rooms), and are endeavouring to equip the new wards with linen, which will cost at least £400. The committee are grateful to the members of the League for their support. The membership is now 956.
- 10. Almoner's Report. Owing to the alterations necessitated through the Extensions Scheme the number of beds available had been reduced for a part of the year, and consequently In-patients admitted were below last year's figure. The full cost of the bed had been obtained from only seven patients, while twenty-nine had been unable to contribute anything towards their maintenance. Here again, as formerly, it is noticed that the majority of these come from places at a distance from Truro. Grants have been received from the D.C.L.I., R.A,S.C., and Worcestershire Regimental Associations, towards maintenance costs of ex-service men and their dependant relatives who were in poor circumstances. It was gratifying to find quite a few patients adding a small sum to their promised contribution for their maintenance as an appreciation for the treatment and care they had received in the Wards.

Cornwall Committee for the Care of Cripples had again assisted with adult Orthopaedics, who were unable to contribute anything towards their own expenses, by making grants for four In-patients and forty-six X-Ray Out-patients. Thirty-three motor accident cases were admitted during the year, the full cost of the bed being recovered in only nine out of the twenty cases settled. Four who could sustain no claim were members of Hospital Contributory Schemes, the remaining seven paying according to their means. Emergency treatment fees have been recovered in twenty-five cases and £191:8:0 had been received in respect of old cases.

The number of H.S.A. Patients continues to increase, 240 more receiving treatment this year than last.

The Hospital Group of the H.S.A. is still growing, 55 new members having been enrolled during the year.

11. Nursing Staff.—During the past year 52 lectures have been given by the Medical Staff, followed by coaching classes. Matron and Sister Tutor have given 36 lectures and 43 Revision classes. There are 18 Probationers in training and 3 Student Nurses. Student Nurses are accepted at the age of 17 years or over, to be trained in Ward Routine, Elementary Practical Nursing and Hygiene. They are allowed to continue their studies in any subjects at the Technical Schools in the evenings if they so desire. They must pass their Educational Test Examination before commencing their training at the age of 18 years.

The Scheme of affiliation has been passed by your Committee with the Hawkmoor Sanitorium and approved by the General Nursing Council, and the first Nurses are expected on March 1st, 1939.

One Nurse entered for her Final State Examination and passed during the year. Two fully trained Refugee Nurses from Vienna have been appointed as Staff Nurses, and three Refugees have been accepted for training.

New appointments have been made in the Nursing Staff. A Home Sister in charge of the Nurses' Home and a Sister for Children's Ward and Out-patients' Departments.

The new Nurses' Home was occupied in September and the comforts for everyone have been greatly appreciated.

The old Home has been repaired and re-decorated and is now ready for occupation by the Sisters.

12. Ophthalmic Department. The Out-patient Department is increasing. Modern apparatus is being installed in the new Opthalmic Department in order that the treatment of Eye diseases may be brought up-to-date.

13. Orthopaedic Department. The work of this Department has been heavier than ever, owing to the development of Surgical Tubercular Work, of Adult Orthopaedic work and the opening of a Fracture Clinic. The number of patients treated during 1938, excluding fracture cases, are as follows:—

In-patients ... 70 Operations performed 61

The unusually large number of long-stay cases which filled our beds during the past year slowed down the rate of turn-over, and thereby forced us to reduce the number of admissions. In spite of this cases have overflowed into both the General Children's Ward and the General Surgical Wards. The waiting list of children still grows slowly, and that of adults at an alarming rate.

An Orthopaedic Out-patient Department, in association with the Fracture Clinic, was instituted on 1st June, 1938. From that date to 31st December, 1938, the number of cases dealt with were as follows:—

New Cases ... 110 Attendances ... 346

Fracture Clinic. The Fracture Clinic was opened on 1st June, 1938, and is worked in association with the Orthopaedic Department. Since that date we have been called upon to deal with many serious new cases, and with many even more serious, and extremely difficult old cases, with gross deformity. The number of cases dealt with in the Fracture Clinic from 1st June, 1938, to 31st December, 1938, are as follows:—

The new accommodation for adults and the increased space for children, which we hope to occupy in March, 1939, will, we hope greatly shorten the waiting period for patients, and simplify the working of the Department.

The Staff has again been increased to cope with the additional work and now includes a Senior qualified Laboratory Technician. Cases requiring extensive pathological investigation continue to arise in all parts of the County, a large number of these come to the Hospital for this purpose, and increasing use is also being made by the other Hospitals in the County of the facilities provided by this laboratory.

The extensive accommodation provided in the new Hospital will very greatly facilitate the work of the Department, which is now carried on under very great difficulties. New apparatus is being provided, so that in the coming year it will be possible to extend the range of the investigations undertaken, and to provide what is believed to be as complete a pathological service as is found in the largest Hospital in the country.

As in former years numerous examinations have been made for the County Coroners and Police Authorities, and the increased number of water analyses suggests that the Public Health Authorities are fully aware of the importance of keeping a check on this fruitful source of infectous diseases.

Venereal Diseases Department. The new Venereal Diseases Department is expected to open early in March; accommodation is being provided for both In-patients and Out patients and the department has been equipped with the latest apparatus and equipment for dealing with these affections.

15. Ear, Nose and Throat Department. The work of this department is increasing. Fewer operations have been performed this year owing to the shortage of bed space. A larger number of acute cases have been admitted. The waiting list is abnormally high.

16. X-Ray Department. There has been a considerable increase in the number of cases for X-Ray examination. It has been impossible to deal with all the cases sent for X-Ray examination as, at present, the same X-Ray installation has to be used for diagnoses and treatment. The superficial X-Ray treatment has been extremely successful in cases of chronic skin diseases. The short-wave diathermy is kept continuously busy.



will add greatly to the County's health amenities. New surgical wards for males and females, special wards for Ear, Nose and Throat, and Eye cases, and a very large addition to the Children's Orthopaedic accommodation are now available to the public. Special wards are provided for adult orthopaedic cases and these, together with the fracture clinic, which was established during the year, will fill a much needed want.

There is a private patients' section, which will accommodate 11 patients, and in addition several small observation wards are available. Not less important than any of the above-mentioned facilities is the provision for the first time of wards for medical cases only. Surgical wards in the old buildings will be brought up-to-date for this purpose, and there will be 6 private beds in addition. The old building will be utilized to its fullest capacity.

The Radiological Department will be given considerably more space than it has hitherto had, the main operating

theatre block will be situated there.

Accommodation for the Matron and for the House Surgeons will be provided, together with offices for the secretarial and Almoner's Department. The old Out patient Department will be remodelled and, merging into the new building, will be enlarged and brought up-to-date.




