

ROYAL CORNWALL INFIRMARY.

The Royal Cornwall Infirmary is the oldest Voluntary Hospital in the County, and owes its inception to the public spirit of Lord de Dunstanville (Sir Francis Basset), whose memory is perpetuated by a bust in the vestibule of the Hospital and by an obelisk on Carn Brea. Lord de Dunstanville called meetings at Camborne, Redruth and Truro. It was decided to build a Hospital at Truro, and the Cornwall General Infirmary was opened on August 12th, 1799, with twenty beds.

In 1800 the income was £792, the expenditure £830, and forty seven patients were admitted.

A few years later the Leper Hospital of St. Laurence de Ponteboye at Bodmin (a foundation incorporated under a charter by Queen Elizabeth in 1582) was no longer required, and was closed by an order of the Court of Chancery at the instance of Lord de Dunstanville. The property, a farm of fifty-four acres, was transferred to the Cornwall Infirmary, and was held until 1920, when it was sold and the money invested. The stone tablet on one of the buildings of the Leper Hospital was placed in the entrance of the Infirmary, and reads as follows:—

"Richard Carter of St. Columb, merchant, by his will and testament in 1582 did give £10 which sum by the consent of his executors we have employed towards the making of this house in year 1586, whose charitable and rare example in our time, God grant many to follow hereafter.

The first President was Sir William Lemon, and the first Treasurer Mr. Francis Enys. The first apothecary and secretary Mr. Bull, served the Hospital for fifty-five years. His portrait, with that of several physicians and surgeons who were on the staff many years, hangs in the Board Room. Mr. Bull's sister was Matron from 1854 to 1869. The list of Presidents contains the names of almost every well-known Cornish family. George, Prince of Wales, was the first patron, but in 1822 the Hospital was known as the Cornwall General Infirmary, and was under the Patronage of King George IV. There is no record as to when the title of the Hospital was changed to Royal Cornwall Infirmary. At this date the medical staff consisted of two physicians, two visiting and two consulting surgeons, and a surgeon apothecary or house surgeon.

The list of rules and regulations then published is interesting. For some unknown reason no dropsical patient or domestic servant was to be admitted, unless the latter was

incapable of remaining in service, and then only on the payment of six shillings a week. A useful rule was that 'no chaise, horse or cart bringing a patient to the Infirmary may return until it be known whether such patient can be admitted.'

Anyone recommending a patient must promise to defray the expenses of burial. In-patients were not to swear, behave rudely, or play at cards or dice, and on their discharge were to return thanks in their own parish Church.

At the Annual Court a sermon was to be preached to the Governors and a collection made for the use of the charity.

The Hospital continued to do good work, and in 1847 an ophthalmic department was started; and in 1854 £1,200 was spent on improvements. In 1865 the number of patients treated was 406, and the beds were increased to 60. In 1868 a north wing, and in 1887 a west wing, were built. In 1900 the operating theatre was reconstructed, and in 1905 £1,000 raised by the Hon. John Boscawen was spent on improvements. In 1905 private wards were initiated. In 1908 an X-ray department was started, and in 1911 £1,600 (raised by Col. the Hon. H. W. F. Trefusis (then President) was spent on improving the nursing staff quarters and ophthalmic departments.

During the Great War 50 beds were reserved for wounded soldiers, and after the War the Red Cross Society granted $\pounds_{4,500}$ to the Infirmary for improvements, and the Governors, under the presidency of the late Mr. Powys Rogers, collected and spent $\pounds_{17,000}$ on renovating the Hospital.

In 1919 the Hospital was recognised as a Training School for Nurses, and probationers were enabled in their four years' course to complete their training. In 1924 there were 70 beds, the number of patients admitted was 807, and a children's ward was added.

The yearly expenditure was now £6,000, double that in 1912. It was therefore necessary to ask patients to contribute to meet the extra cost, but all necessitous cases received careful consideration. The cost per bed was £2 12s. od. per week. The income was raised by subscriptions, £785; collections and donations, £1,800; investment, £1,100; and patients contributions, £1,500. The Hospital Saving Association proved to be a valuable source of income later on.

The work and responsibility of the medical and surgical staff rapidly increased. Cases were treated from all over Cornwall, and although smaller local Hospitals had been started in the county, the valuable facilities offered by the larger Hospital led to a continued increase in the number of surgical cases admitted.

In 1928 a new Nurses' Hostel was built, which is utilized for the senior nursing staff.

in 1930 an Orthopædic Ward of 14 beds was opened, together with a Consulting Out-patient department, and was associated with Orthopædic Clinics in various parts of Cornwall. This valuable work has rapidly increased and more beds are needed.

In 1933 a new X-ray plant was installed, together with a portable set for use in the wards to save seriously injured patients the ordeal of unnecessary movement. A better mortuary chapel was arranged, and a new up-to-date laundry and boiler house built.

In 1934 it was decided to elect a Pathologist and to equip a Pathological Laboratory, an innovation of great value, both for exact diagnosis and scientific treatment. This department has rendered highly important service not only to the Hospital but to the Public Health Authorities and the Medical Practitioners of the county.

In 1936 an Ear, Nose and Throat department was opened under the care of a specialist, and has proved its value by the increasing numbers of patients sent from distant parts of the county.

In November, 1937, an experienced Radiologist was appointed in charge of the X-ray department. Notable features of 1937 were the cutting of the first sod of the extensions to the Hospital, on March 18th, by the Chairman of the County Council and the laying of the Foundation Stones of the new Nurses' Home, on December 17th, by Miss Alice Rashleigh and the Hon. Everilda Agar-Robartes.

Valuable adjuncts to the Infirmary are the Men's Convalescent Home at Perranporth, built in 1892, and endowed by the late Mr. Passmore Edwards, and the Women's Home, built in 1912 on land given by Mr. Enys and endowed by the late Mr. Dorrington. The Homes are usually open seven months in the year, and are generally full. The Homes are useful, not only in fully restoring the patients to health, but in relieving the pressure on the beds in the Infirmary.



- 2. The daily occupation of beds during the year was 71, and the average stay of patients 21 days. The daily occupation of beds was much higher in the period from July to December, at times there were 80 patients.

4. The total ordinary income amounted to £10,354/16/4 and the total ordinary expenditure to £10,141 4s. 6d. The excess of income over expenditure for the year was £235 7s. 8d., which has reduced the debit balance on income and expenditure account to £375 2s. 6d.

The Governors have authorised the transfer of £465/6/9 received from part of the above legacies to the Extensions Fund.

The sum of £9,986 15s. 10d. has been realised from investments sold and £10,000 transferred to the Extensions Fund, this transfer has been sanctioned by the Governors.

5. The Congregational Collections and Hospital Sunday Collections have been maintained. The amount received was £816, as against £801 in 1936.

6. The amounts received from the patients shew an increase.

In and Out-patients ... £2,199 £2,742

7. The receipts from the Hospital Saving Association shew a steady increase.

There are now nearly 6,000 members in the Groups in the area. The Committee are indebted to Mr. T. J. Dotson, the Hon. Organizing Secretary, and to the Group Secretaries for their voluntary service.

- 8. Extensions Fund.—During the past year donations amounting to £6,983 6s. 11d. have been received, also £2,150 6s. 5d. in deferred payments. The Committee are especially indebted to Viscount Clifden and to those who assisted in organizing the Fete at Lanhydrock, which realised £699 7s. 9d. for the fund.
- 9. Linen League.—The League has supplied 1,037 articles of linen, blankets, etc., to the Hospital. It has raised £180 12s. 8d. and expended £144 2s. 2d. in purchases. There is a credit balance of £92 8s. 0d. The League are endeavouring to supply the linen required for the new wards. The Committee are much indebted to the subscribers in Truro and the districts adjoining for their assistance.
- 10. Almoner's Report.—During the year the full cost of the bed had been obtained in only eleven cases. Generally speaking, patients did their best to reimburse the Hospital according to their means, but there are occasionally a few who fail to realise the maintenance costs in the general wards. Difficulty sometimes arises in convincing patients that subscribers' tickets of recommendation do not exempt them from payment, except in necessitous cases, although this is clearly stated on the forms.

The Cornwall Committee for the Care of Cripples have generously assisted towards the treatment of orthopaedic adults, who were unable to meet their own expenses.

Thirty-four motor accident cases were admitted during the year, the full cost being recovered in sixteen out of the twenty-six cases settled; four patients who could sustain no claim were members of Contributory Schemes. £222 16s. 6d. was received in settlement of old cases, and emergency treatment fees were recovered in thirty cases, amounting to £18 15s. 0d.

During the last two years the number of H.S.A. patients has more than doubled, 1,374 being treated during the past year against 629 in 1935. Notice having been drawn to the cost of ultra short-wave treatment given to H.S.A. contributors, the Association now allows the Hospital the same grant for each voucher presented for this as for X-ray.

The Hospital Group of the H.S.A. continues to grow, and has now 193 names on the register. The X-ray and Massage departments again showed an increase, £162 more being received than last year.

11. Nursing Staff.—During the past year 54 lectures have been given by the Medical Staff, followed by coaching classes.

Matron and Sister Tutor have given 32 lectures and 20 revision classes. There are 16 probationer nurses in training. It is proposed to affiliate this Hospital with two others which are special training schools.

The nurses from these will have completed a two or three years' course and passed the Preliminary State Examination before they are elegible to enter this Hospital for a further two years to complete their general training. The Hospital will, in future, have a Senior Sister and a Junior Sister in each ward and department. The Junior Sister is a new appointment, taking the place of the Staff Nurse. The Committee of Management have recently revised the salaries of the Sisters and Nurses and these are now on a parallel with the salaries obtained in other Hospitals throughout the country.

During the year Miss Eden resigned on her marriage and Miss Powell was appointed as Matron.

12. Ophthalmic Department.—During the past year the work of the department has continued to increase. The following table gives the comparative figures for the last three years:—

13. Orthopædic Department.—The department has, as ever, been over-full the whole year, so that upwards of four cases at a time have had to be accommodated in the General Children's Ward. The waiting list for children remains more or less stationary, but that for adults continues to increase, and has become one of the most pressing problems. The number on the adult waiting list at the time of going to press being 41.

The Staff has been increased in order to cope with the additional work.

Cases of exceptional interest, requiring extensive pathological investigation, continue to arise, and it is noticeable that an increasingly large number of patients from all over the county are now being sent into the Hospital for this purpose.

As in former years, numerous examinations have been made for the County Coroners and Police Authorities.

15. Ear, Nose and Throat Department.—During the last year the work in the Ear, Nose and Throat Department has greatly increased. 662 out-patients have been seen, two-thirds of these being new patients.

- 210 operations have been performed, many more remain to be done The new department is badly needed, as there is more work than can be done under the present arrangements.
- 16. **X-ray Department.**—It will be seen from the figures for X-ray examinations and films taken for the year that these show a great increase over the previous years. This increase is much more marked in the latter part of the year, nearly half of the cases coming in the last four months.

The Equipment is in good order and appears to have been well looked after. It is capable of very much more work than at present, but considerations of space available necessarily limit the number of cases seen.

The Short-Wave Diathermy machine was transferred from the Massage to the X-ray department in November, and 320 treatments were given in the last two months of the year. Results were almost invariably good.

Superficial X-ray Therapy: The Tube is now installed and is working satisfactorily.

- Dr. C. F. Constant was appointed Radiologist on Nov. 1st.
- 17. Library.—The Committee desire to thank Mrs. Middleton and her five helpers for the help they gave in connection with the library, which contains over 1,000 books. Parcels of books have been received during the year from the British Red Cross Society and Order of St. John Hospital Library.
- 18. Extensions.—During the past twelve months the extensions have made rapid progress. On March 18th, Mr. Henry Toy, Chairman of the County Council, cut the first sod of the new wards. The contractors have completed the shell of the two new wings and engineers are installing electricity and pipes. A large number of local men are being employed. The Governors also sanctioned plans for the new Nurses' Home, and Foundation Stones were laid on December 17th, by the Hon. Everilda Agar-Robartes and Miss Alice M. Rashleigh. At that time a large part of the outside walls had been built. The Ceremony, attended by a number of those interested in the Extension Scheme, was short and informal, owing to the season of the year.
- Mr. C. E. H. Lloyd, Honorary Organiser, reports that the number of people coming forward to help increases very gratifyingly, and districts which have previously not sent contributions, are being added to the list of the Infirmary's oldest and best friends.

There are more than 700 names on the list of contributors, in addition to a large amount of money from entertainments and collections in which others, though nameless, have given their share. To the press a grateful acknowledgment is due for publishing weekly lists and much other kindness. Without this it would be well nigh impossible to bring our needs to the notice of the public.

To all who have helped in any way our gratitude is profound, but a reminder may well be added that further help and more money is urgently required.

- 19. Honorary Medical Staff.—Your Committee wish to record their thanks to the Honorary Medical Staff for their valuable services.


