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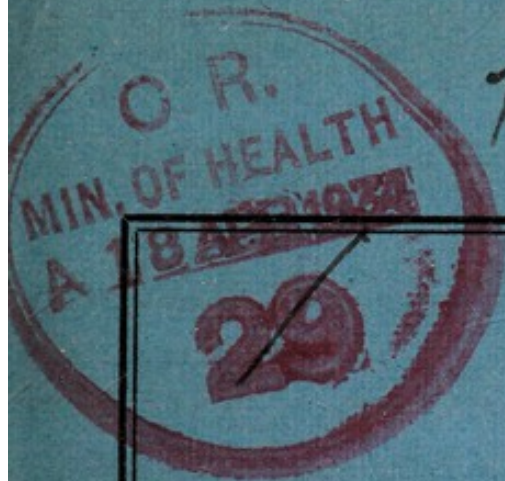
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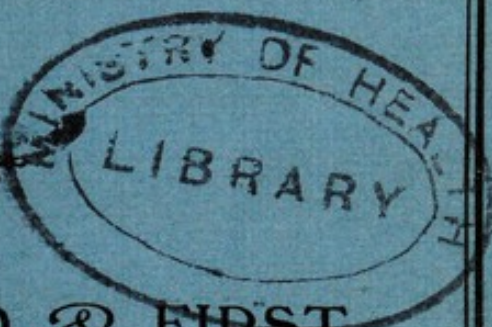

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WHAT OUR HOSPITAL DOES.

The Royal Bucks Hospital offers treatment under the following headings:—

GENERAL WARDS.

The Verney Ward for Women, the Lee Ward for Men, the Rothschild Ward for Children, the Aubrey-Fletcher Ward and the Hazell Ward for Men or Women, can accommodate a total of 67 Patients.

For particulars of Contributory Scheme see pages 63 and 64.

PRIVATE PATIENTS.

A Semi-private Ward for Men, a Semi-private Ward for Women with three beds each, at three guineas weekly, and three Private Rooms for Men or Women, at from four guineas weekly, are available. There are also a limited number of screened-off beds in the General Wards at two guineas weekly.

Four Private Maternity Wards from £5:5:0 weekly.

Information for Patients.

In-Patients must be provided with an In-Patient's Letter or a Certificate from their local Contributory Scheme Secretary, a proper change of Linen, and they must be responsible for any expenses which may be considered by the Board of Management of an exceptional character.

In-Patients who are not subscribers to the Contributory Scheme (except those proved to be quite unable to pay) will be expected to make a contribution towards the cost of their maintenance while in the Hospital.

At least two days' notice should be given to the Hospital prior to the admission of a Patient, except in cases of emergency.

The following are not admissible:—Maternity cases (except in special circumstances), persons who are suspected to have small-pox, itch, venereal or other infectious disorders; who are not free from vermin; who are suffering from advanced pulmonary tuberculosis; or who may receive equal benefit as an Out-Patient.

The Board of Management have pleasure in submitting their one hundred and first Annual Report and Financial Statement for the year ending 31st December, 1933.

Every Department of the Hospital has been working at full pressure throughout the year. The maximum number of in-patients possible with our present accommodation is being treated, but this by no means represents the maximum number that should and would be dealt with if there were more accommodation.

The Annual
Accounts.

The total ordinary income for the year amounts to £11,794, compared with £11,428 in 1932.

The total ordinary expenditure amounts to £12,009, as compared with £12,104 last year.

The income for the year was not sufficient by £215 to meet expenditure during the same period. As there has been a deficiency each year for several years the overdraft now stands at £1,310 : 11 : 9.

The Board of Management desire to thank all subscribers, donors and collectors for their generous help during the past year.

Friendly Societies.

The Aylesbury United Friendly Societies' Hospital Committee have again been most successful with their flag day and other efforts, and have realised no less than £120 during the year.

In addition, the sum of £11:0:1 was raised by the sale of Tinfoil.

The cot in the Children's Ward, distinguished with a tablet as the Tinfoil Collection Cot, is partly maintained by the proceeds of the sale of Tinfoil.

Entertainments.

The Board are very grateful to all who organised entertainments to help the Hospital during the year, and appreciate the efforts of those who are trying to make an annual event of the individual Whist Drives first organised for the Hospital during the Mayor's Appeal in 1932.

The sum of £136:5:10 from the Annual Whist and Bridge Drives and Dance organised by Mr. Albert Fisher and his friends brought the total for nine years up to £1,000, a truly remarkable achievement.

Contributory Scheme.

Several new firms have taken up the Contributory Scheme during the year, and the support from all the existing centres has been well maintained.

Endowment of Cot. The Hospital lost a true friend at the beginning of the year in the death of Major T. S. Timmis. A cot has been endowed to his memory by his brothers and sisters.

Personal Changes. Miss D. A. Lane was appointed Matron following the resignation of Miss Sturman and took up her appointment in September.

An Almoner's Department commenced at the beginning of the year, and Miss E. Lewis has been appointed Lady Almoner.

Dr. R. B. Scott, the present Resident Medical Officer, was appointed following the resignation of Dr. A. A. Miller.

Motor Ambulance Service. The demands on the Hospital Motor Ambulance continue to be heavy. The Board wish to place on record their appreciation of the valuable assistance with their ambulance rendered by the St. John Ambulance, Aylesbury Division, both at night time and in connection with urgent accidents.

Linen League. The Board of Management desire to express their grateful thanks to all the Officials and Members of the Bucks Ladies' Linen League for the way they have continued to meet the increased requirements. A separate report will be found elsewhere dealing with the invaluable work performed by this Association.

Egg Week. The response to the Egg Week appeal has been well maintained, 18,324 eggs being collected. The help of all those who contributed in any way is very much appreciated.

The Board wish to make it known that gifts of Game, Fruit, Eggs and other produce will always be gratefully received at the Hospital.

Harvest Festivals. The Annual Harvest Festival collections were made in the numerous Churches and Chapels throughout the County, and resulted in the sum of £365 being handed over to the Hospital. The Board of Management wish to thank all those who have helped in these collections.

(Revised Rules—February 1st, 1933).

Regulations of the Contributory Scheme for General Wards Patients.

1. A contributor of 1d. per week is entitled to treatment and maintenance. This applies to all persons of 16 years of age and upwards whose income is within the following limits:—

Single man or woman, £3 per week.

Married without children under 16, £4 per week.

Married with children under 16, £5 per week.

(This change only to affect present contributors after
1st January, 1936).

2. A married couple paying 2d. per week will, by payment of an extra 1d. per week (making 3d. in all), be entitled to treatment for all their children up to 16 years of age.

3. A widower or widow paying 1d. per week, will, by payment of an extra 1d. per week (making 2d. in all), be entitled to treatment for all his or her children up to 16 years of age.

4. Contributors to the Scheme will be entitled to be treated as private patients should they wish at 25 per cent. less than the usual charges for Private Beds.

5. Contributors from Towns or Villages where the Scheme has been in operation for three months or more will not be eligible for free treatment until they have been members of the Scheme for at least Three Months unless they can show some exceptional circumstances which prevented them joining sooner.

6. Non-contributors will in future be expected to contribute towards their maintenance while in the Hospital, but no payment will be expected from Old Age Pensioners or those proved to be quite unable to pay.

7. Each patient must be accepted by the Hospital doctor as suitable for Hospital treatment, and it is desirable that he should bring with him a note from his own doctor.

8. It must be understood that the Hospital Wards are for the use only of those who, owing to their financial position, cannot afford to be treated as private patients.

9. Contributors who have been members of the Scheme for three months and upwards and whose payments have been regular are entitled to—

Free In-Patient treatment in the General Wards.

Free Out-Patient treatment, including consultation by the Specialist,

provided that they bring a letter from their own Medical Attendant, and are deemed by the Hospital Medical Staff to be suitable cases. This rule also applies to In-Patients.

Contributors are *not* entitled to be supplied with Surgical Appliances *without* payment; a charge is also made for the use of the Motor Ambulance.

Children attending Elementary Schools are not entitled to treatment for Eyes, Ear, Throat and Nose or Teeth unless they are referred to the Hospital by the School Medical Officer.

10. Local Collecting Committees will be formed to give effect to the above Scheme. Contributors will pay their contributions to collectors appointed by the Local Committees. When Hospital treatment is required a contributor must show his Contribution Card to the Secretary of his Local Committee and obtain from him a form, which he must take with his Contribution Card to the Hospital. The form will entitle him to free treatment subject to the rules of the Hospital.

Note.—A patient attending for Dental or Ear, Throat and Nose treatment **MUST** bring a note from his or her Medical Attendant.

Regulations of the Contributory Scheme for Private Patients.

A contribution of 10s. 6d. per annum entitles the contributor to admission to the Private or Semi-Private Wards or Screened Beds in the General Wards at 50 per cent. below the charges for such beds, it being understood that the arrangements as regards Medical Fees for Private Patients be as at present (*i.e.*, the patients make their own arrangements with the Medical Adviser concerned).

A married couple paying 21s. per annum are both entitled to be treated as Private Patients as above, and a total payment of £1 11s. 6d. per annum will entitle the man, wife and family up to 16 years of age to be treated as Private Patients as set out above.

Each patient must be accepted by the Hospital Medical Staff as suitable for Hospital Treatment.
