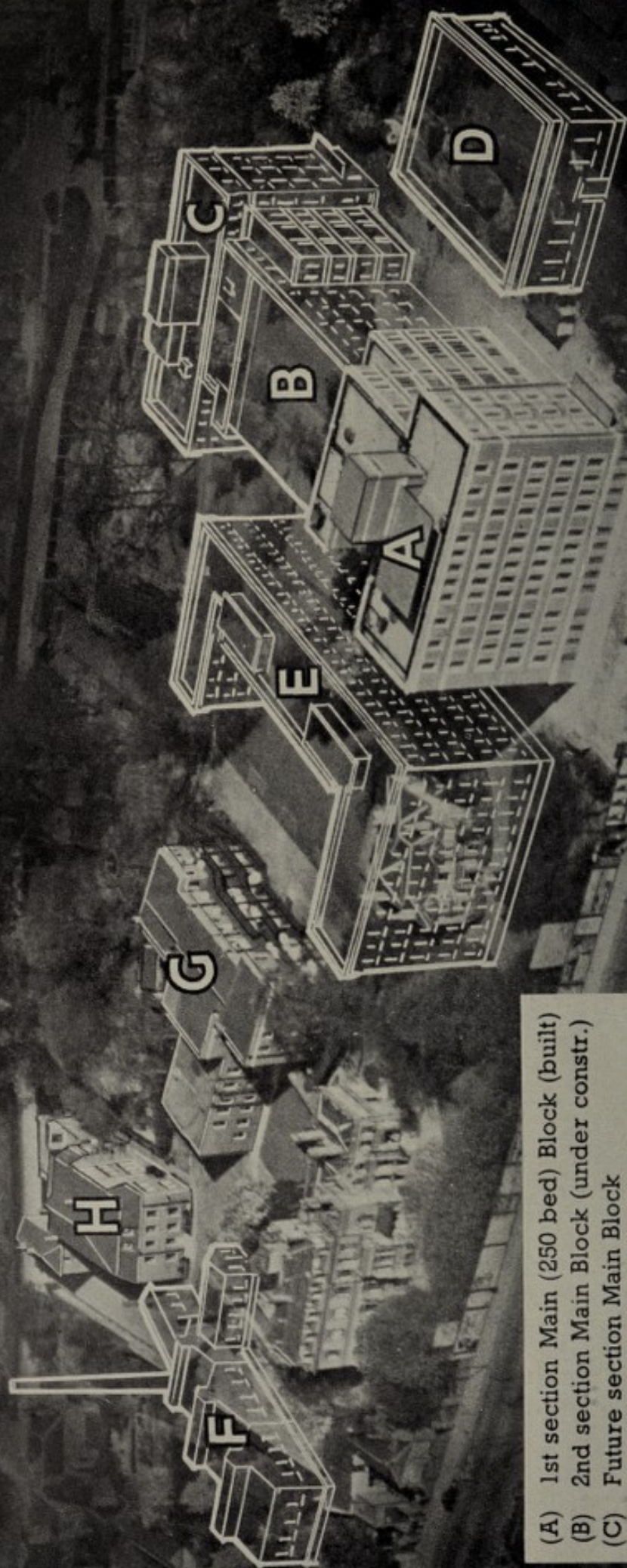

Landmarks in the History of Queen Charlotte's Hospital

- 1739. Foundation of the Charity under the title of the General Lying-In Hospital.
- 1791. The Hospital removed to Bayswater.
- 1809. His Royal Highness the Duke of Sussex became president for life, and the Hospital was re-organised and re-established under his direction.
- 1810. Her Most Gracious Majesty Queen Charlotte became Patron, and the name of the Hospital was changed from the General Lying-In Hospital to the Queen's Lying-In Hospital.
- 1813. Removal of the Hospital to Lisson Green, Marylebone.
- 1838. Her Most Gracious Majesty the Dowager Queen Adelaide became Patron of the Hospital.
- 1843. Death of His Royal Highness the Duke of Sussex.
- 1844. His Royal Highness the Duke of Cambridge became President.
- 1850. Her Most Gracious Majesty Queen Victoria became Patron.
- „ Death of His Royal Highness the Duke of Cambridge.
- 1856. Rebuilding of the Hospital on the site of the Manor House, Lisson Green.
- 1866. Her Royal Highness the Princess of Wales became Vice-Patron.
- 1869. Her Royal Highness the Crown Princess of Prussia, Princess Royal of Great Britain, visited and inspected the Hospital.
- 1879. Her Royal Highness the Crown Princess of Germany again visited and inspected the Hospital.
- 1883. Their Royal Highnesses the Princess of Wales and Princess Christian of Schleswig-Holstein visited and inspected the Hospital.
- 1885. Incorporation of the Hospital by Royal Charter.
- 1886. New Wing built and opened by their Royal Highnesses the Prince and Princess of Wales.
- 1887. Her Royal Highness Princess William of Prussia visited and inspected the Hospital.
- 1888. Her Royal Highness Princess Christian of Schleswig-Holstein again visited and inspected the Hospital.
- 1889. Third visit of Her Royal Highness Princess Christian of Schleswig-Holstein.
- 1894. Her Royal Highness the Duchess of York became a Vice-Patron.
- 1896. His Royal Highness the Duke of Cambridge, K.G., visited and inspected the Hospital.
- 1897-1900. Hospital further enlarged.
- 1899. Nurses' Home built, and opened by their Royal Highnesses the Duke and Duchess of York, who also visited and inspected the Hospital.
- 1901. Death of Her Most Gracious Majesty Queen Victoria.
Her Most Gracious Majesty Queen Alexandra became Patron.
- 1904. Death of His Royal Highness the Duke of Cambridge.
- 1908. Extension of the Nurses' Home and Residential College for Students opened by Her Royal Highness Princess Alexander of Teck.
- 1910. Her Most Gracious Majesty Queen Mary became Patron.
- 1919. Her Majesty Queen Mary visited the Hospital.
- 1921. Her Majesty Queen Alexandra visited the Hospital.
- 1925. Death of Her Majesty Queen Alexandra.
- 1927. Her Majesty Queen Mary again visited the Hospital.
- 1929. Decision to rebuild the Hospital on a new site at Goldhawk Road, Hammersmith. Foundation Stone of first block of the new hospital (the Isolation Block), laid by H.H. Princess Marie Louise.
- 1930. Isolation Block at Hammersmith opened by H.R.H. The Princess Royal.
- 1931. Research Laboratories at Hammersmith opened. Later known as Bernhard Baron Memorial Laboratories.
- 1935. His Royal Highness the Duke of York presided at the first Festival Dinner in aid of Rebuilding.
- 1938. Her Most Gracious Majesty Queen Elizabeth became Patron.

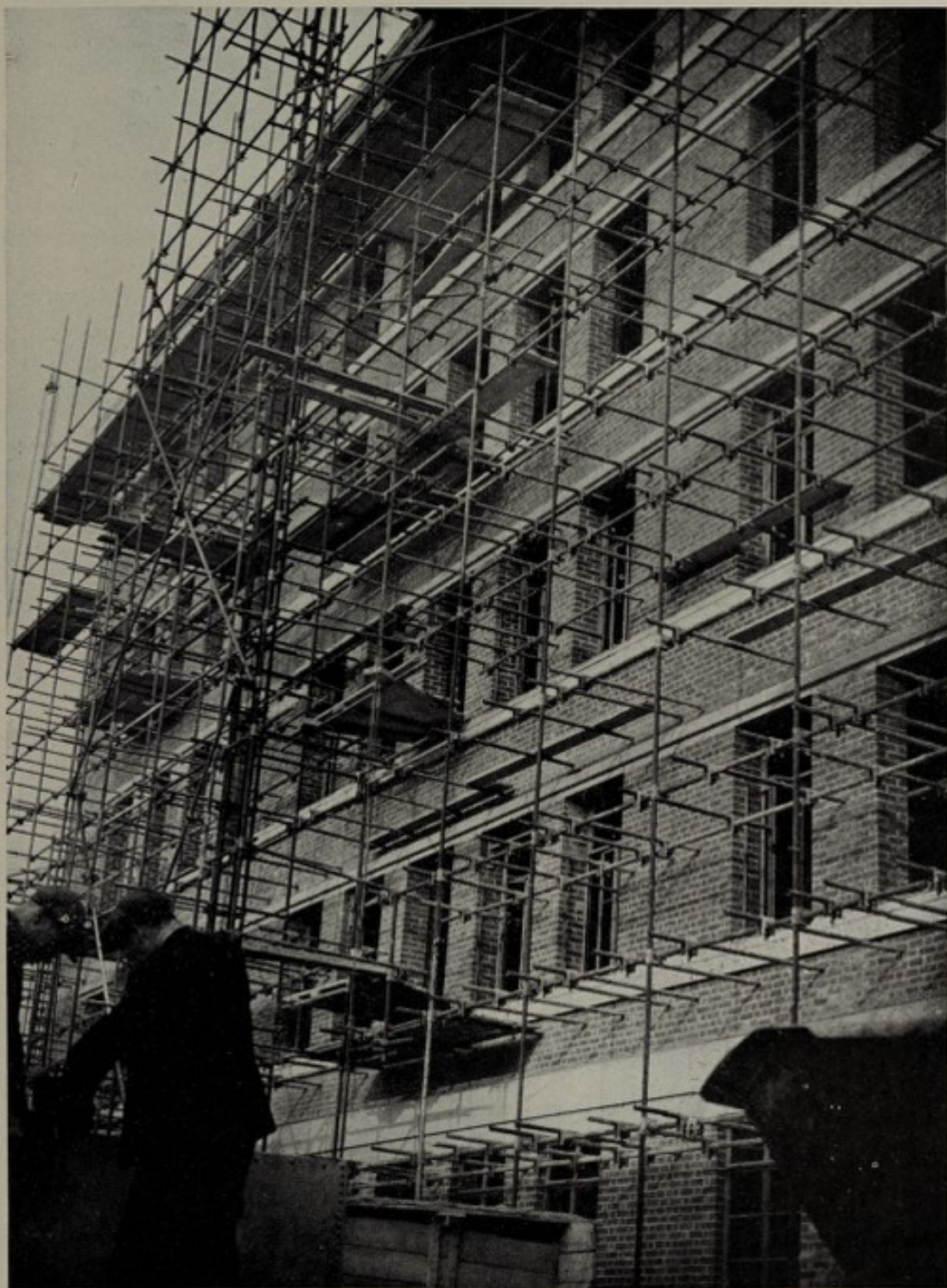
200th REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE OF MANAGEMENT

The Committee have pleasure in presenting their Annual Report for the year 1938 on the working of the Hospital.

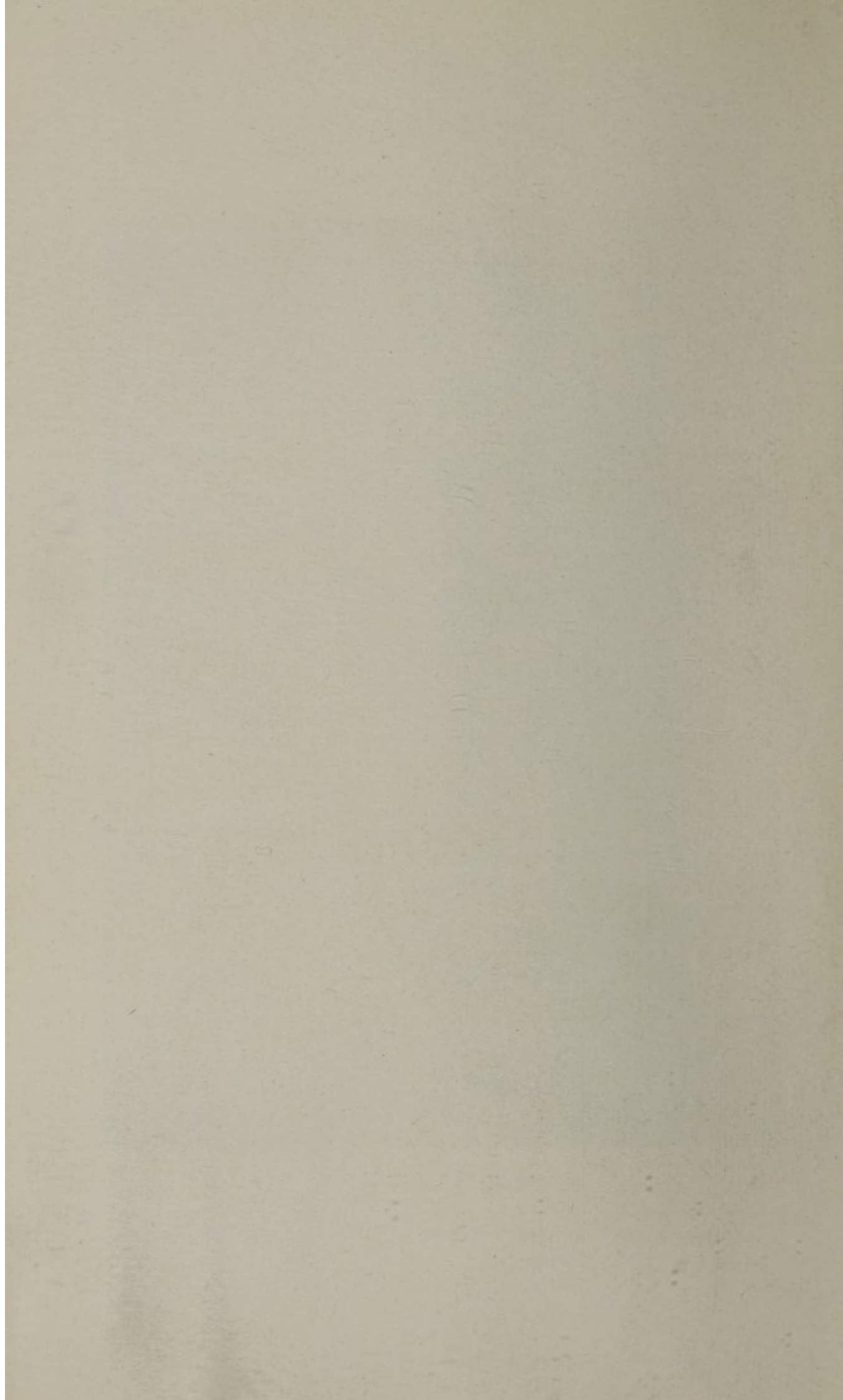
The services of the Hospital were again in heavy demand in all departments. While the demand for in-patient accommodation shows no decrease, the numbers of patients delivered on the Districts by our associated District Association has shown a satisfactory increase, due largely to the extension of our areas in Middlesex.

The year under review has not been without its anxieties. The drastic revision of the rules of the Central Midwives Board and the doubling of the period of training, coming as they have done at a time when there is a general shortage of nurses, is, as was anticipated, causing an acute shortage of pupil midwives. This has rendered it very difficult to obtain the staff necessary for the nursing of our patients, in addition to which serious financial results are now being felt, both through the heavy increase in the cost of nursing, and in substantial losses of income from training fees. It can only be hoped that the shortage may be temporary, as in 1926, though at that time the position was not complicated by a general shortage of nurses, and that it will last only so long as the improved status and conditions secured for midwives by the Midwives Act, 1936, remain unrecognised by the nursing profession. It may well be, however, that this recognition may come too late to save the Training Schools from severe financial troubles in 1939, and to ward off the imminent danger to our patients of a curtailment of services. Consultations have been proceeding between representatives of the Maternity Hospitals in all parts of the country, through the London Maternity Services' Joint Committee, and have resulted in a substantial measure of agreement. The position of these Hospitals will shortly be laid before the Ministry of Health, and it is hoped that some form of emergency assistance may be given in view of the special circumstances, which are not of their creation.

Nevertheless, in spite of the difficulties ahead, two interesting and important expansions of our work are taking place. Through the generosity of Sir Julien Cahn, who has provided the funds for equipment and a sum sufficient to cover expenses for one year, and also with the help of the National Birthday Trust Fund, a Human Milk Bureau is being established for the provision of human milk, on similar

lines to the services provided in the United States of America and Germany, although such services have hitherto never been available in this country.

We are also indebted to Sir Julien Cahn for affording the opportunity for our Matron to visit the United States of America free of cost to the Hospital. Valuable information has thereby been obtained, not only in connection with the Milk Bureau, but through the direct contacts with the most modern Hospitals in the U.S.A.

We are also making rapid strides towards the provision of analgesia to all patients on the Districts. It has long been felt to be anomalous that whereas every patient in the Hospital has for many years secured an analgesic, with no cost to the patient, a similar analgesic service has not been equally available to District patients. The problem has, in the past, been mainly one of transport of apparatus. It is hoped that this problem may now be solved by the transport of the portable gas and air apparatus by new model power-assisted cycles, which will enable the midwives to carry with them both the machine and the dressings and instruments incidental to the delivery. The National Birthday Trust Fund has most generously promised a grant of £250 per annum for three years to meet the expenditure on this service, and have also provided six gas and air machines.

REBUILDING

The work of rebuilding and extending the Hospital at Hammersmith is proceeding satisfactorily, though delays in the delivery of certain materials have, to some extent, retarded the rate of progress.

The main ward block containing 170 lying-in and antenatal beds, including 14 private rooms and 12 single rooms for patients of moderate means, together with operating and labour suites is practically complete. Work has now commenced upon the Nurses' Home, to accommodate 130 staff. It will also contain the Preliminary Training School, the main kitchens, the dining rooms and stores. It has been decided that until the full essential services are available, it would be more satisfactory to defer transfer from Marylebone Road. The work is expected to be completed early in 1940.

IN-PATIENTS

The number of patients treated during the year was the highest yet recorded, namely, 3,173. Of these, 2,779 were admitted to Marylebone Road and "Invermead," and 394 to the Isolation Block. Owing partly to the difficulty in obtaining staff, and partly to the progress of rebuilding operations, the number of patients treated at "Invermead"

was considerably lower than in previous years, 308 patients having been delivered there, as compared with 428 in 1937. As this building stands on part of the site of the new Nurses' Home, it has gradually been closed for patients, and will be shortly demolished. This auxiliary Hospital has done valuable work in the past eight years. Since its opening in 1930, 2,085 deliveries have taken place there, and during the period of eight years, only two deaths have occurred.

As in previous years, the Booked cases comprise those patients who have at any time attended the Ante-Natal Departments or have been seen by the Medical Staff, including patients sent for consultation in anticipation of complications, and subsequently delivered in the Hospital, while Emergency cases comprise patients who are sent in from outside agencies with complicated labour, and who have received no ante-natal treatment by the Hospital staffs.

DISTRICT OUT-PATIENTS

1,395 patients were delivered in their own homes on the Hospital Districts, an increase of 204 over the previous year, due mainly to the extension of the area served to the Boroughs of Brentford and Acton. In future the training of pupil midwives will be undertaken by the Queen Charlotte's District Association in the Kilburn, Kensington and Brentford and Acton Districts. 45,091 visits were paid by the Hospital midwives. No death occurred during the year.

ANTE-NATAL DEPARTMENTS

The Ante-natal Departments at the Hospital, and at the Kensington and Hammersmith District Homes were attended by 4,728 patients, whose attendances numbered 33,392. Both in- and out-patients are served by these clinics, while cases are also sent for consultation by outside doctors and midwives.

POST-NATAL DEPARTMENTS

Post-natal Clinics are also held at the Hospital for in-patients, and at Kensington and Hammersmith for out-patients. Attendances numbered 2,805.

INFANT CONSULTATION CENTRE

This centre is for children up to five years of age, and continues to provide a valuable service beside being an important adjunct to the training of pupils. Attendances numbered 2,465, though the number of children treated was slightly smaller, as those children coming from considerable distances are now being more freely referred to the local Borough Clinics where available.

ISOLATION BLOCK AND BERNARD BARON MEMORIAL RESEARCH LABORATORIES

341 cases have been admitted to the Isolation Block, of whom 140 had been delivered by Queen Charlotte's Hospital. The death-rate for the whole 341 cases has been 3.2 per cent, as compared with 5.1 per cent for 1937. The low death-rate of the previous two years for cases infected by hæmolytic streptococci and treated by sulphanilamide has been maintained (5 per cent). Bacteriological investigation of all cases in whom any rise of temperature occurred following labour has shown that of the 2,577 mothers delivered at Marylebone Road and "Invermead," only one became infected by Group A hæmolytic streptococci. This is an extremely satisfactory record—much the best for any year since laboratory investigations were instituted as a routine procedure.

On the other hand, the records for the District service are not so satisfactory. There is very little doubt that in the homes of the poor, owing to the frequency of infections such as tonsillitis, scarlet fever, middle-ear disease, septic skin diseases and septic wounds, there is a much greater chance of the mother becoming infected by the dangerous streptococci than in a properly organised modern Hospital. Much attention is now being given to tightening up the antiseptic and other precautions to prevent infections among the District mothers, but the most effective remedy will undoubtedly be the provision of more maternity beds in suitable Hospitals.

The services rendered by the laboratories to doctors, Hospitals, and maternity organisations other than Queen Charlotte's Hospital, in the examination of swabs from puerperal fever cases and maternity personnel have again been much appreciated—853 swabs having been received as compared with 441 in 1937.

Research work in connection with the prontosil group of drugs, both for the prevention and cure of puerperal fever, has been actively continued in the laboratory during 1938, and progress has been made in several directions.

MIDWIFERY TRAINING SCHOOL

The effect of the new rules of the Central Midwives Board was not felt during the year under review, though, as mentioned in an earlier part of this report, the reduction in the numbers of pupils coming forward for training under the new rules for the doubled period is causing serious difficulty. Barely one-third of the normal entries for 1939 has been booked at the time of writing.

The Report of the Midwifery Training School will be found on page 19.

PRIVATE NURSING STAFF.

The private nursing staff can again look back upon a successful year. Nurses have been supplied for 383 cases.

LADIES' ASSOCIATION.

The Ladies' Association has again actively supported the Hospital, both in the provision of linen and furniture, and in supporting the efforts of our Appeal Department. The Committee extend their sincere thanks to the Executive Committee and members for the help and thought given to further the work of the Hospital.

HONORARY MEDICAL STAFF.

The Committee record with regret the death of Mr. J. Bright Banister, M.D., F.R.C.S., F.R.C.O.G., who had been a member of the Consulting Obstetric Staff since 1924.

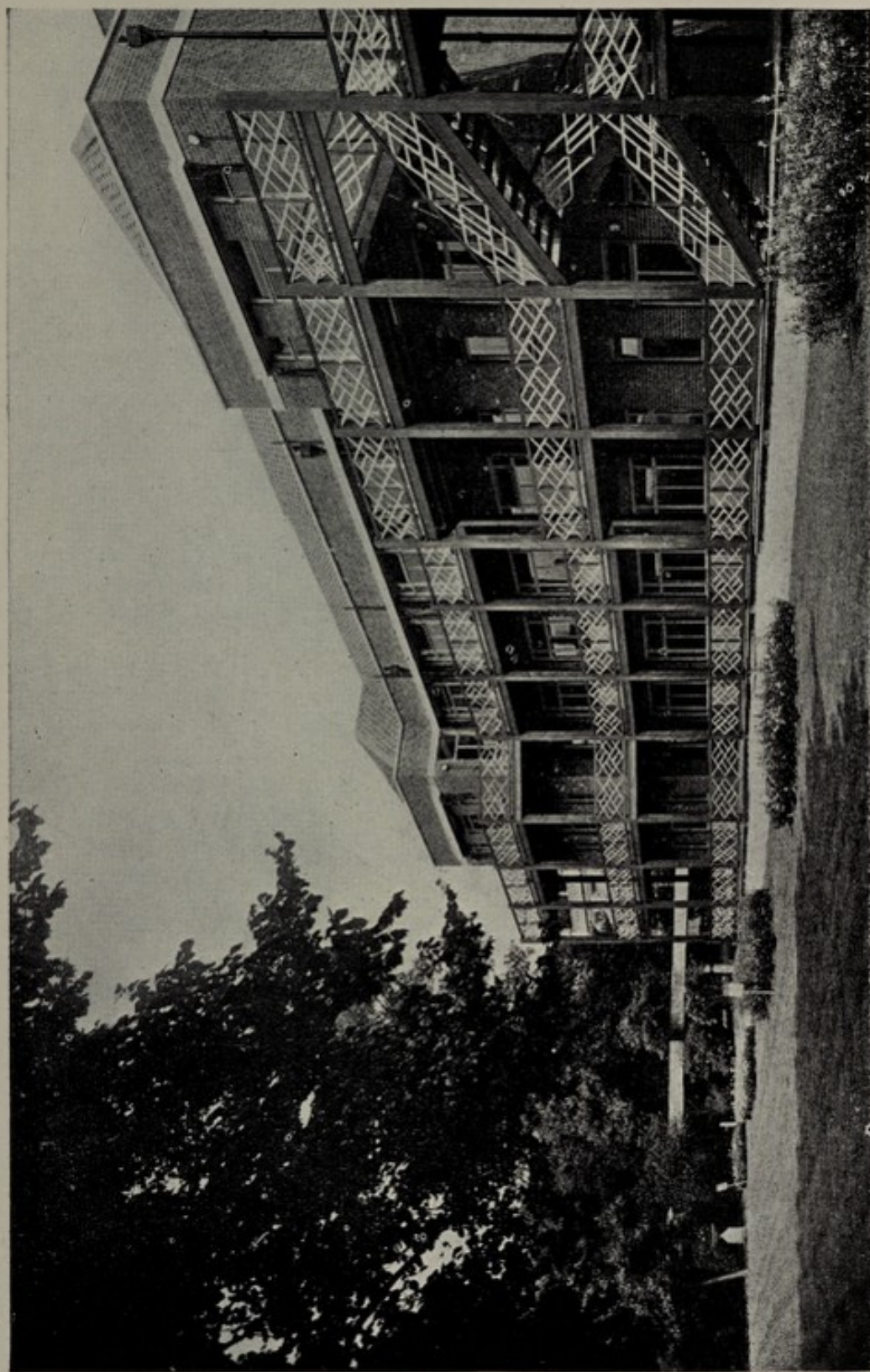

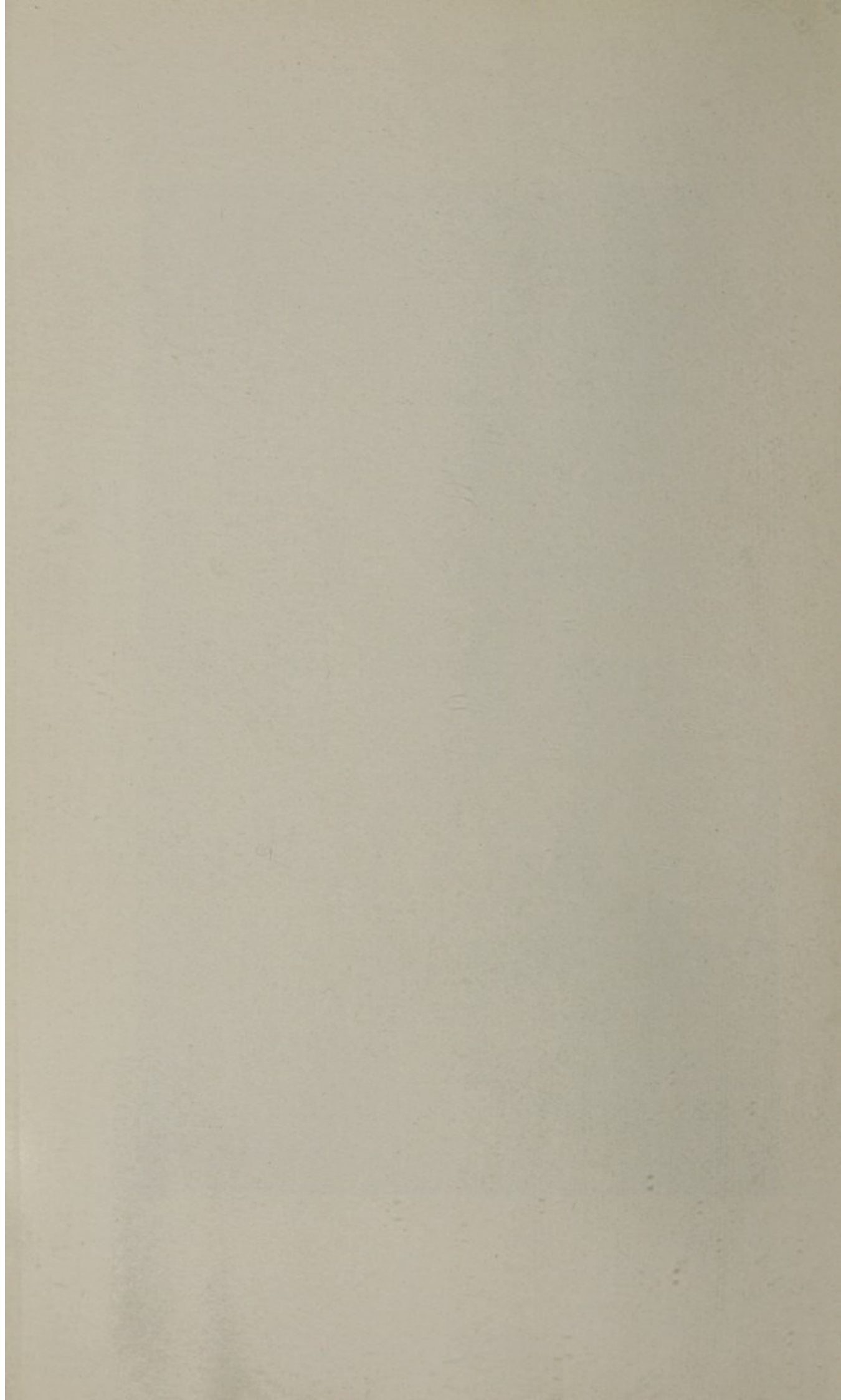

FINANCE

The Balance Sheet and Income and Expenditure Accounts will be found on pages 32–39. The Committee regret to report that for the first time for some years the accounts show a considerable excess of expenditure over income, amounting to £4,742 14s. 11d. Total expenditure at £46,250 9s. 9d. compares with £40,714 16s. 2d. in 1937, and income at £41,507 14s. 10d. with £40,765 9s. 7d. Apart from the increase in the number of patients treated, there has been a rise in the cost of treatment, notably in nursing and maintenance salaries, laundry and provisions, as will be shown by the following comparative table :—

The increase in the figure of interest paid represents the payment of mortgage interest on the building loans during construction, which must be borne by the General Fund, though as the buildings are not yet occupied, no return is obtainable from the expenditure. Nevertheless, the cost per patient has not risen proportionately to the increased expenditure. Excluding the item of interest paid, the total cost per in-patient at the Main Hospital shows an increase of 5 per cent, and at the Main Hospital and Isolation Block combined, of under 7 per cent.

On the income side, contributions from subscriptions and donations have been maintained, while contributions on account of services rendered show a substantial increase of £3,610. On the other hand, donations from Central Funds and receipts from legacies fell by £289 8s. 3d. and

£1,392 17s. 11d. respectively, and from Nurses' Fees by £811 19s. 10d. A further heavy drop in receipts from this source is anticipated during the coming year, due to the lack of pupils coming forward under the new training rules, and the prospect can only be viewed with considerable anxiety.

THANKS TO THE STAFF

The Committee again record with gratitude the great services rendered by the Honorary Medical Staff in their heavy duties, and express their thanks to the Matron and Nursing Staffs and to the Administrative Staff for their devoted work during an exceptionally heavy year.

RULES

1.—That the Association be called the "Ladies' Association of Queen Charlotte's Hospital" and consist of Ladies willing to promote the objects of the Institution by

(a) Spreading a knowledge of the claims and needs of the Hospital.

(b) Obtaining increased financial support for the Hospital.

(c) Obtaining gifts of Ward Linen, clothing for the use of mothers and infants in the Hospital, vegetables, fruit, flowers, poultry, game, eggs, etc.

2.—Candidates must be proposed by Members of the Association, and Ladies desirous of joining the Association are requested to send in their names to the Secretary.

3.—Members of the Association shall either

(a) Subscribe 5/- annually to the funds of the Association and provide some garments of regulation pattern and material for the use of the Hospital patients.

or (b) Subscribe 21/- annually to the funds of the Association.

All Subscriptions shall be paid, and all gifts of linen and clothing be sent to the Hospital not later than the 15th November in each year.

4.—If any Member shall be in arrear with her subscription for two consecutive years, after due notice has been given, she shall cease to be a Member of the Association.

5.—There shall be a President, an Honorary Treasurer, one or more Honorary Secretaries, a Secretary, and such other Officers as may be decided by the Executive Committee, and such Officers shall be elected annually.

6.—The Secretary of the Hospital for the time being shall act as the Secretary of the Ladies' Association.

7.—An Annual Meeting of Members of the Association shall be held in the month of January or February, when reports shall be made as to the subscriptions and gifts received during the year. A special Meeting may be called at any time by the President, or at the request of not less than 20 Members.

8.—There shall be an Executive Committee consisting of not more than 45 nor less than 10 Members elected annually. The Executive Committee shall have power to co-opt Members to fill vacancies that may occur. Five Members shall form a quorum.

9.—A Banking Account shall be opened at the Martin's Bank Ltd. (Cocks, Biddulph & Co. Branch), 16 Whitehall, S.W., in the name of the Ladies' Association of Queen Charlotte's Hospital and all monies received be paid into this account. All cheques shall be signed by the Treasurer and countersigned by the Secretary of the Association.

10.—The accounts of the Ladies' Association shall be audited annually and a statement be submitted to the Committee of Management as soon after the 31st December as possible, so that they may be included in the Annual Report of the Hospital.

11.—The Association shall have power to alter and add to these rules, subject to the approval of the Committee of Management.

12.—The Association and the work of Members of the Association within the Hospital shall in all respects be subject to the control of the Committee of Management.

REPORT OF THE LADIES' ASSOCIATION

The Executive Committee have pleasure in presenting their Report for the year ended 31st December, 1938.

The Annual Meeting, with Lady FitzGerald in the chair, was held at "Oakbrook," Goldhawk Road, Hammersmith, in order that the members might have an opportunity of inspecting the progress of the work of rebuilding the Hospital on the new site. At the conclusion of the meeting, parties of members and their friends were conducted round the main ward block, and the various features of the building explained to them.

The income of the Association amounted to £850 3s. 11d., compared with £1,266 9s. 9d. in 1937. The reduction in income is due mainly to the non-inclusion of the proceeds of the Cracker Sale organised by Mrs. Cecil Raphael, amounting to £299 3s. 5d., which sum will be included in receipts for 1939, having been received during that year. Mrs. Cecil Raphael again organised the Popular Ball, resulting in a profit of £277 12s. 4d. Of these proceeds, a sum of £29 8s. 11d. has been allocated to the purchase of power-assisted cycles for the use of the midwives on the Districts. This new feature of the Hospital's service is proving very successful, and has been much appreciated by the Nursing Staff on the Districts served by the Hospital.

Members actively assisted at the many depôts on Alexandra Day and again on Cradle Day. A grant of £400 was received from the Council of Alexandra Day Fund.

Gifts of linen and furniture amounting to £483 6s. were made during the year. Included in these gifts were four electric floor polishers for the wards, which have proved economical and labour-saving. The latter consideration is of importance in view of the present difficulty in staffing the various departments.

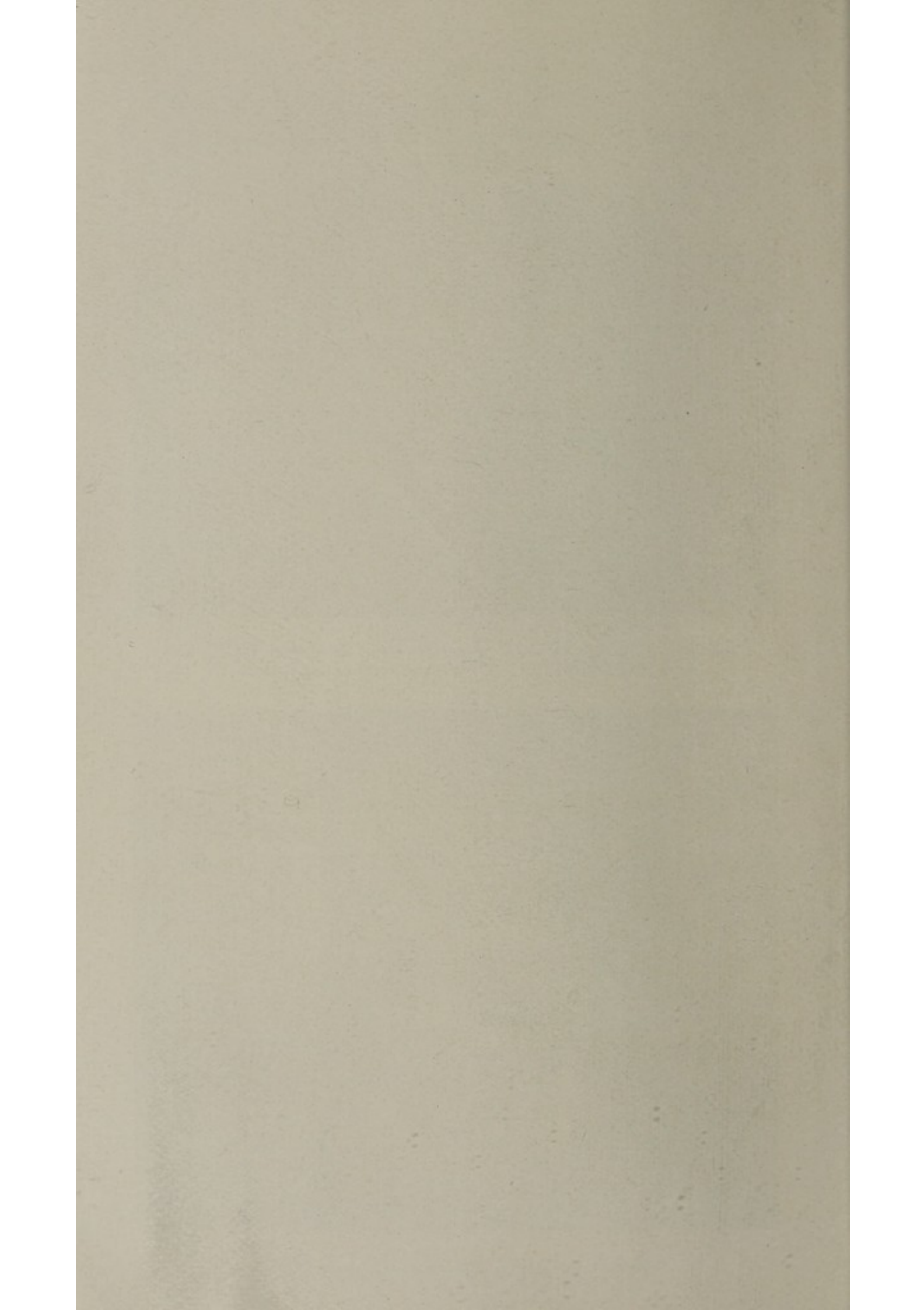

REPORT OF THE APPEAL DEPARTMENT

FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31ST DECEMBER, 1938

NATIONAL COUNCIL OF QUEEN CHARLOTTE'S HOSPITAL MOTHER-SAVING CAMPAIGN

Lady Simon most kindly lent 11 Downing Street, and received the members of the National Council at its meeting on December 7th, H.H. Princess Marie Louise presided, supported by Viscountess Snowden, the Vice-Chairman of the Council. Mr. Louis Carnac Rivett, F.R.C.S., F.R.C.O.G., Surgeon to the In-patients at Queen Charlotte's Hospital, spoke on post-graduate teaching in obstetrics and on the plans for the new building.

" OPERETTE "

We were fortunate enough to be able to make arrangements for the second night of Mr. Noel Coward's *Operette*, at His Majesty's Theatre, on March 17th, to be set aside as a special Gala Performance in aid of the Hospital. The Gala resulted in a net profit of £803 10s. 10d.

GALA CELEBRITY CONCERT

Held at Queen's Hall on April 26th, the sixth annual Gala Concert attracted a very large audience. The French-American prima donna, Lily Pons, and the Australian baritone, John Brownlee, were the artists. £782 5s. 2d. net was raised for the Hospital.

ELEVENTH QUEEN CHARLOTTE'S BIRTHDAY BALL

The eleventh Birthday Ball took place at Grosvenor House on May 9th. The Royal Cake-Cutting Ceremony was performed by H.R.H. the Duchess of Gloucester, who, with the Duke, attended the dinner preceding the Ball. Over 1,700 guests were present, and 275 1938 debutantes acted as Maids of Honour, a further 100 debutantes of 1937 acting as Maids in Waiting. The net proceeds reached the record figure of £2,276 13s. 9d.

RANELAGH POLO BALL

The highly successful series of alfresco Balls, started in 1936 with the first Ball in the Zoo, was continued in 1938 at Ranelagh, by arrangement with the Committee of the Club. It took place on July 14th, and naturally drew a great deal of support from among polo players. Perfect weather prevailed, and 800 guests were present. A net profit of £997 19s. 1d. was made.

"DON CARLOS"

On December 6th Sadler's Wells was crowded to capacity for the première in English of Verdi's opera, *Don Carlos*, organised as an Operatic Gala for the Hospital, which produced a net profit of £747 9s. 2d. It was a most memorable and successful event.

RIO BALL

Our regular Winter Ball was this year associated with South America under the designation of "The Rio Ball," and was held at Grosvenor House on December 19th. Under the patronage of the Ambassadors and Ministers of Latin-America, many of whom attended, it was widely supported by South Americans, as well as by British people with business interests in that part of the world. The net proceeds, £1,104 15s. 8d., are being devoted to the South American Bed in the new Hospital.

AUCTION OF ANTIQUES

Her Majesty the Queen, Her Majesty Queen Mary, and many other members of the Royal Family were among those who sent valuable gifts for the Auction of Antiques held at Sotheby's on June 28th, when £2,544 13s. was realised for the Hospital. The British Antique Dealers' Association co-operated whole-heartedly and obtained a great many beautiful and rare antiques. Messrs. Sotheby & Co. most generously conducted the auction entirely free of charge, while their printers, Messrs. Kitchen & Barratt, Ltd., presented the very handsome catalogues as their contribution. The illustrations in it were provided free by the Chiswick Press, Ltd., and Messrs. Waterlow & Sons, Ltd., and the Pantechnicon placed storage accommodation at our service. Even in regard to the transport of gifts from the country, no charge was made, thanks to the generosity of Messrs. Arthur G. Dixon, Ltd., and Messrs. Rogers & Co., Ltd.

The Auction was remarkable for the very high quality of every lot offered. A bed has now been established in the name of the British Antique Dealers' Association.

CRADLE DAY SECTION OF HOSPITAL WEEK

October 11th was the day appointed for the Combined Flag Day for the Special Hospitals. A large number of additional Special Hospitals were admitted for participation in 1938. This had the serious effect of reducing drastically the areas for the "old-timers" like Queen Charlotte's, in order to make space for the newcomers. Queen Charlotte's had nearly 300 fewer sellers than in 1937, but owing to the very special efforts made in the City by the debutantes and their mothers, the proceeds there shewed a substantial increase—from

£294 in 1937 to £473 in 1938. This in part offset the decrease due to fewer sellers and reduced areas elsewhere. The net share received by Queen Charlotte's was £933 5s. 1d.

RED CRADLE COLLECTIONS

The Red Cradle Collections were well maintained during 1938, £511 8s. 8d. being received from this source, practically all in coppers.

LOCAL EFFORTS

The most important single event was a Concert Performance of *Carmen* at Queen's Hall on April 4th. It was given by the Midland Bank Orchestral Society, Midland Bank Glee and Choral Society, and Midland Bank Operatic and Dramatic Society (Operatic Section), and was organised by our Kensington Social Committee with the co-operation of the Social Committees for Hammersmith and St. Marylebone. As the result, a cheque for £500 was handed to Mrs. Anthony de Rothschild, the wife of our Treasurer. Special thanks are due to Mr. F. D. Langdale Brown for his tireless exertions on the musical side.

The Hallow-e'en Market at Derry & Toms realised a profit of £107 17s.

Whist Drives, Dances and Cruises attracted wide support, while the Dinner at Hammersmith was eminently successful. The result of the New Year's Eve Dance organised by the St. Marylebone Committee will be included in their figures for 1939.

REGULATIONS FOR PATIENTS.

IN-PATIENTS

- 1.—Married women, single women with their first child only, and widows giving birth to posthumous children, irrespective of religion and nationality, are eligible for admission.
- 2.—Patients are admitted by a letter of recommendation from a Governor or Subscriber, or by direct application to the Hospital.
- 3.—Every patient must attend at the Hospital to have her name entered on the Register, and receive an order for admission, or for a midwife to attend her, as the case may be.
- 4.—A patient is only admitted when in labour, and must bring with her a suit of clothes for her child when leaving, the Hospital providing the necessary linen during her stay.
- 5.—All mothers are required, when capable, to nurse their infants whilst in the Hospital.
- 6.—All children born in the Hospital will be vaccinated before leaving, unless objection is made by the parent.
- 7.—The Visiting Day is Wednesday, between the hours of three and four p.m., when patients, if well enough, are permitted to see Visitors from the fifth day.
 Only one visitor is allowed each day, and the duration of the visit may not exceed half-an-hour. Children cannot be admitted.
 Husbands only may also see their wives on Sundays between three and four p.m., subject to the above conditions.
- 8.—No patient is admitted suffering from any infectious disease; if found to be so she is to be removed as soon as possible.
- 9.—Every patient is discharged by the Obstetric Surgeons, her length of stay in the Hospital being determined by her condition. Before leaving, the Committee satisfy themselves that each patient has had no reasonable cause of complaint.
- 10.—All patients—both In and Out—who are able to do so, shall be invited to contribute something, according to their means, towards the funds of the Hospital, subject to such Rules as the Committee of Management may make from time to time.

OUT-PATIENTS

- 1.—All married women, and widows giving birth to posthumous children, living within the Hospital District, are eligible for attendance at their own homes by a midwife.
- 2.—Every patient must attend at the Hospital after her convalescence to satisfy the Committee as to her treatment.

PRIVATE NURSING STAFF.

A certain number of certificated Maternity Nurses and Midwives trained at Queen Charlotte's Hospital reside at the Nurses' Home and are available for private cases on application to the Matron by letter, telegram or telephone.

TELEPHONE—AMBASSADOR 2266 (3 lines).

(1) The fees for the case are payable to the Nurse and in addition she must be paid her railway, cab and other travelling expenses, and an allowance of 3/6 per week for washing.

(2) Nurses must wear dresses of a washing material during the whole time of their attendance.

(3) Nurses must carefully carry out all the instructions of the Patient's Medical Attendant, and do everything possible for the comfort and well-being of the patient and infant. Everything in the sick-room should be kept scrupulously clean and orderly.

(4) Nurses are enjoined to hold sacred the knowledge they obtain of the private affairs of the family in which they are engaged and to adapt themselves as far as possible to the usages of the household.

(5) While the Committee will use every endeavour to supply only thoroughly trained and suitable nurses, they will not be responsible for any failure on the part of the Nurse to carry out her duties in a satisfactory manner.

(6) The Matron will be glad to receive reports from those engaging Nurses trained at the Hospital. Such reports will be treated as confidential.

(7) Ladies and Doctors wishing to engage the same Nurse again or to recommend her are desired to do so through the Matron of the Hospital.

Ante-Natal Department.

The Ante-Natal Department is intended for patients who are coming into the Hospital or to be attended by the Hospital in their own homes. Applicants for In-Patient or Out-Patient treatment may attend on any week-day, except Saturday, at 9 a.m.

Other patients sent by Doctors or Midwives for examination are also eligible and should attend on Tuesday, Thursday or Friday, at 9 a.m.

Post-Natal Department.

Post-Natal Clinics for In and Out-Patients are held at the Hospital on Friday at 2 p.m., Kensington Out-Patient Department on Tuesday at 3-45 p.m., and Hammersmith Out-Patient Department on Thursday at 3 p.m.

Infant Consultation Centre.

Similarly the Infant Consultation Centre is open to all children from infancy to the age of five years. The days and hour of attendance are Mondays and Tuesdays at 2 p.m.

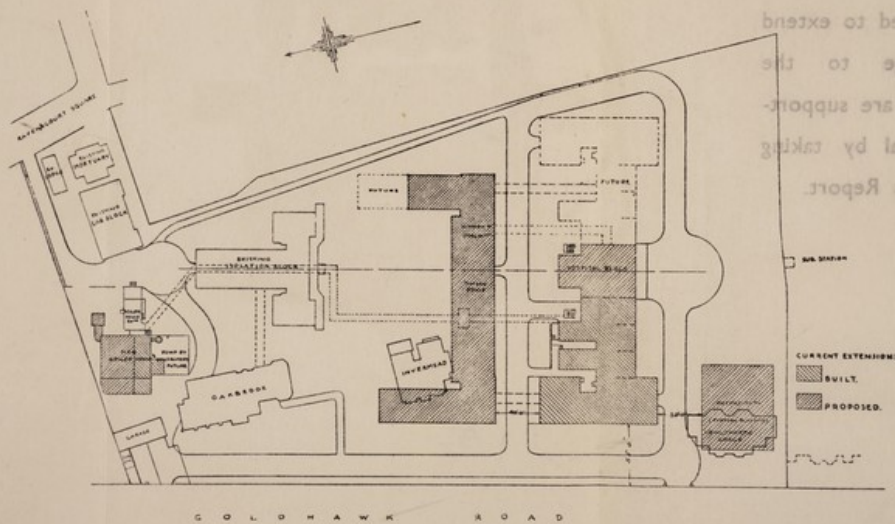
