# THE 107th Annual Report of the Board of Management of the ROYAL BERKSHIRE HOSPITAL

*For the Year ending 31st December, 1945.*

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With the return of peace and the prospect of release of men and women from the forces, the Hospital hopes as soon as possible to resume working on a peace-time basis.

On one occasion only during the War was heavy damage suffered in Reading as a result of enemy action, when in February, 1943, the Hospital dealt with a considerable number of casualties suffering from injury and shock, caused by high explosive bombs dropped in the course of an air-raid. Throughout the war the buildings of the main Hospital escaped damage and although the Blagrove Branch Hospital was less fortunate the damage sustained there was not extensive and no loss of life or injury resulted either to patients or staff.

The evacuation of London and many towns and villages in the South-east of England resulted in an increase of the civilian population in the area served by the Hospital, which at one time reached 50 per cent. This factor is reflected in the number of patients awaiting admission to the wards.

**PRESIDENT.**—On Tuesday, the 3rd July, at a Special Court of Governors, Mr. H. A. Benyon, the Lord Lieutenant of Berkshire, was unanimously elected President of the Hospital. In 1923 Mr. Benyon was appointed a Trustee and was elected Vice-President in 1935.

Mr. Benyon is the fourth member of his family to hold the office of President since the Hospital was opened in 1839.

Mr. H. T. Morley, who joined the Board in 1908 as representative of the Reading and District Workpeople's Hospital Fund Association, was unanimously elected a Vice-President.

**BOARD OF MANAGEMENT.**—The retirement from the Board of the Reverend J. A. G. Birch, who for fourteen years rendered valuable service as representative of the Contributory Scheme for Pangbourne, and of Mr. Eric Berry, is reported with regret.

Mr. F. F. Prosser and Mr. G. Talfourd-Cook have been elected to fill the respective vacancies.

**VISITING MEDICAL STAFF.**—Dr. G. B. Mitchell-Heggs took up his duties as Physician in charge of the Dermatological Department in August on his release from military service.

Both Dr. H. S. le Marquand and Mr. G. L. Bohn have been released from service commitments and returned to the Visiting Staff in the New Year (1946).

Mr. Cashell, Mr. F. E. Wheeler and Mr. R. H. Hunt-Williams are still serving with the forces.

The Board take this opportunity of congratulating Mr. Wheeler, who has been mentioned in dispatches and awarded the M.B.E. (Military Division) for his work with the Field Services Unit in Italy.

**ADMINISTRATIVE STAFF.**—Mr. J. O. Goss, the Chief Pharmacist, retired at the end of the year, having completed 38 years' service. The Board place on record their high appreciation of the loyal and devoted services rendered by Mr. Goss for so many years. He leaves with the good wishes of all sections of the Hospital staff.

Mr. E. A. Burton succeeds Mr. Goss as Chief Pharmacist.



In October the Hospital lost the services of Mrs. Martin, who during her tenure of the post of Catering Officer was responsible for carrying out many improvements in the feeding arrangements for both patients and staff. Miss M. Rhys, who has been appointed to succeed her, has had considerable experience in Catering and Dietetics.

Miss W. Horrell has been appointed to succeed Mrs. Heywood as Assistant Almoner, and Miss M. Cleave has been appointed to the post of Occupational Therapist.

**EXTENSIONS AND STRUCTURAL ALTERATIONS.**—The structural alterations in the Out-patients Department, to which reference was made in the last Annual Report, have now been completed, and a marked improvement in the working of the Department has resulted.

During the year the Board, on the recommendation of the Building and Planning Committee, has approved the following proposals for the extension and modernization of the Hospital buildings. Owing to the extreme urgency of improving the available accommodation in the Radiotherapy Department every effort is being made to proceed with Item 1 as soon as possible. Work on the remaining items will be put in hand as soon as the necessary permits can be obtained and labour becomes available :—

1. The erection of a permanent block of buildings in which the Radiotherapy Department will be temporarily housed and which will ultimately form a portion of the new Out-patients Department. Approximate estimated cost, £8,100.
2. The modernization of Benyon and Sidmouth Wards. Approximate estimated cost, £6,700.
3. Provision of staff lavatory accommodation. Approximate estimated cost, £390.
4. Installation of radiators in Library and Museum.

**THE OPHTHALMIC DEPARTMENT.**—Owing to shortage of staff, the Board were reluctantly compelled to close the Eye Wards at the end of July, until such time as adequate staff again becomes available.

The Royal Eye Hospital, London, and the Oxford Eye Hospital have very kindly undertaken to admit to their wards cases requiring in-patient treatment whenever accommodation is available.

**THE SHORTAGE OF NURSES.**—With the cessation of hostilities the necessity for reserving Benyon Ward for the reception and resuscitation of air-raid casualties was removed. Owing to the number of patients awaiting admission to the Hospital, the Board was anxious that the accommodation for 30 male surgical cases in this ward should be made available as soon as possible and though this would have imposed an additional burden on the already overworked surgical staff, the latter expressed their willingness to undertake the extra work in order to reduce the waiting list.

Unfortunately, owing to the acute shortage of Nursing Staff, none is available to take charge of this ward, which has therefore remained closed.

**AMBULANCE BUREAU.**—This was set up at the Hospital during the year and has worked very satisfactorily. The provision of an ambulance is guaranteed in suitable cases at any time of the day or night.

**HOSPITAL CAR SERVICE.**—At the end of July the Voluntary Car Pool organised by the Women's Voluntary Service ceased to operate. The British Red Cross Society, the St. John Ambulance Brigade and the Women's Voluntary Service have organised a Hospital Car Service whereby transport facilities are provided for sitting cases unable to provide their own transport. The Hospital is responsible for the charge of 3d. per mile which is in most cases recovered from the patients or those responsible for them.

**CONTRIBUTORY SCHEME.**—The Government's proposals in connection with a National Health Service, to which attention was drawn in the last report, have still to be made known. Throughout the past year the Scheme has carried on in an atmosphere of uncertainty as to the future. Notwithstanding this handicap they have succeeded once again in providing a larger sum than ever before to the Associated Hospitals. The Board take this opportunity of recording their congratulations and extending their thanks to the members of the Scheme Committee, Branch Committees, and especially to the many Voluntary Collectors for the outstanding success which has attended their efforts.



**SPECIAL NEEDS COMMITTEE.**—The Committee presented a sum of £700 to be devoted to the New Out-patients Department Building Fund. To all members of the Committee and their helpers the Board record their best thanks.

**A NATIONAL HEALTH SERVICE.**—All who are interested in the work of Voluntary Hospitals have for some time been deeply concerned as to the extent to which the Government's plans for a National Health Service will effect their future.

Though it will serve no useful purpose to discuss this problem until a definite statement of the Government's policy concerning the hospital services is made known, it must be clear to all that until such time as the new proposals are put into effect, responsibility for the service remains in the hands of those at present entrusted with this work.

Though the uncertainty regarding the future can only be regarded as a severe handicap, it is hoped that in the interests of the patients all sections of the community will continue to support the Hospital by every means in their power.

**THANKS.**—The Board record their sincere thanks for the services rendered by the following :—

The British Red Cross Society, Voluntary Aid Detachments, for once again servicing the Canteen in the Out-patients Department; Lady Sibly and the Reading Townswomen's Guild, for the circulation of library books to the patients; the Women's Voluntary Service, for their timely help in the kitchen during times of acute shortage of staff; the Women's Voluntary Service Car Pool, whose Reading and County Organisations gave invaluable help by transporting patients to and from the Hospital; Mrs. Benyon, for organising Egg Weeks, and to the many helpers throughout the area served by the Hospital whose efforts resulted in the collection of 10,509 eggs and a sum of £221 19s. 4d.; the members of the Ladies' Linen League, who presented articles to the value of £105, together with a sum of £275; and the League of Remembrance, which has again rendered very valuable service in making dressings and bandages for the Hospital.

In addition, the Board record their thanks to all those who by their voluntary service or generous financial help have contributed to the welfare of the patients and to all individuals and organisations who have so readily continued to support the Hospital during the past year.

To maintain a high standard of work under existing conditions of shortage of labour and supplies is a matter of ever-increasing difficulty.

The Board takes this opportunity of expressing their appreciation of the loyalty and devotion to duty with which the Medical, Nursing, Administrative and other staffs have carried out their work during the past year.

# THE TREASURER'S REPORT

*For the Year ending 31st December, 1945.*

You may remember that in the report I submitted to you last year I forecast an increase of 5 per cent. in expenditure and a fall in income from the Government under the Emergency Hospital Scheme. From this year's accounts it will be seen that my forecast was reasonably accurate. E.M.S. receipts are showing a sharp decline and, but for the purchase of a complete X-ray diagnostic set, the expenditure would have only been 5 per cent. above last year's total. However, I am glad to be able to report that the accounts for the year show a small surplus of Income over Expenditure.

## INCOME.

The total Ordinary Income for the year amounts to £117,520. £5,270 reduction in income in amounts received from the Government is almost covered by the increase in Voluntary Gifts. The gifts from Mr. Allnatt of £2,000 and from Mrs. Cornell of £500 have helped to bring the total of Voluntary Gifts to £19,164, 27.99 per cent. higher than last year's figure.

Congratulations are again due to the Royal Berkshire and Associated Hospitals Contributory Scheme for their excellent contribution towards the ordinary income of the Hospital, an amount of £45,960, and an increase of £1,267 over last year. This constitutes a record and our best thanks are due to all members of the Contributory Scheme for achieving such an excellent result. (The percentage of Scheme In-patients was 45.09 per cent. and Out-patients was 60.29 per cent.)

Dividends show an increase of £471, which is 11.96 per cent. over last year's figure.

Apart from the ordinary income we received £3,273 from Legacies; £1,372 from the New Out-Patient Building Appeal, of which Colonel W. P. Nash donated £500. Colonel W. P. Nash also gave an endowment donation of £1,000 to name a bed in memory of his wife.

## EXPENDITURE.

Total Ordinary Expenditure amounts to £115,459, an increase over last year's figure of £10,038, that is 9.52 per cent. This has been due to an increase in expenditure in all categories with the exception of Provisions.

*Provisions.*—It will be seen that the main reduction in Provisions is in Groceries, the cost of which is £631 lower than the previous year; this is mainly due to economies effected in the Catering Department.

*Surgery and Dispensary.*—The main increase under this heading has been due to the purchase of a complete new X-ray diagnostic set to replace obsolete equipment, and also a new installation of bowl and instrument sterilizers for the Main Operating Theatre.

*Domestic.*—Coal and Coke, £8,225, represents the outstanding increase under this heading, being £1,080 higher than the previous year. The price of coal having been increased, and an inferior quality supplied resulting in increased consumption.

*Salaries and Wages.*—Increases under this heading are due in most cases to higher rates of pay and not to increased number of staff. The total average number of staff being 29 less than last year, 20 of which were Nursing Staff.



The cost of treating Road Accident cases during the past year was £1,302, and the amount recovered was £1,248 (£811 under the Road Traffic Acts and £437 from the Contributory Scheme).

The cost per In-patient has increased from £14 19s. 10d. to £15 8s. 1d., and the cost per Out-patient has increased from 14/11 to 17/1. The cost per In-patient day being now 17/- and per Out-patient attendance 3/4.

"Greenlands" Private Patients Account shows a small surplus of £8, after transferring £150 to an account for Deferred Repairs.

The Out-patients Department Canteen made a profit of £273, £250 of which has been transferred to the credit of Out-patients Extension Fund. Many thanks are due to the voluntary Red Cross helpers for their splendid work in running this canteen for the needs of Out-patients whilst waiting for treatment.

Convalescent Fund shows a surplus of £197 after an expenditure of £643 on instruments, £71 on travelling and miscellaneous payments for patients, £16 for relief for patients on leaving the Hospital, and £55 for maintenance of patients in Convalescent Homes.

Laundry Account shows a decrease in expenditure of £314 (although an increase in cost of £108 for fuel, power, light and water occurred), bringing the cost per 100 pieces washed from 12/10½ to 12/2.

During the year an Inventory and Valuation of Land, Buildings and Equipment was carried out by Messrs. Hampton & Sons and Messrs. Haslam & Son for insurance purposes. The Balance Sheet figure of £236,166 for Land, Buildings and Equipment, and Invested Property of £24,860, is very much under-valued.

I think that you will all agree that the considerable alterations to the present Out-patients and Casualty Departments just completed is a great improvement, the cost of which is not expected to exceed £2,798, the amount we have in hand for the work.

We end the year in a sound financial position and have earmarked £20,000 to make a start in modernising the existing buildings and wards.

#### BUDGET, 1946.

I anticipate a decrease in revenue from the Government Emergency Hospital Scheme of £7,000. Regarding the Ordinary Expenditure I hope it will be possible to keep the total down to nearly last year's figure, say, £116,000.

The net result is that we shall require a further sum of £6,000 in order to meet our current expenditure quite apart from any Capital Expenditure. If we are to make good, therefore, we shall have to raise by voluntary effort a further £6,000. Bearing in mind that the number of people who receive treatment at the Hospital over a period of five years exceeds the total population of Reading, this should not be such a formidable task as it appears. The way in which you all worked recently to clear the Hospital of debt is proof of your appreciation of the splendid work done at your Hospital for the relief of the sick and suffering. To adopt the attitude of "wait and see" means going downhill again. Whatever changes lie ahead as a result of the Government Scheme for a National Health Service, some years are bound to elapse before the change is in full operation. In the meantime, let us see to it that the improvement and modernisation of the Hospital, and the provision of the latest types of equipment, are maintained unhampered through the lack of funds. If, and when, the need for further financial support disappears (and I think it is unlikely for several years to come) we shall have a record to be proud of.

In order to be in a better position to meet the difficulties ahead, a special meeting of Governors was held on the 3rd October, 1945, when we launched the Royal Berkshire Hospital Welfare Association Scheme, through which you are all brought in closer contact with the Hospital. Already twelve branches of this Association have been formed, and I hope in the near future to be able to report the formation of many further branches. It is possible that in time to come these branches will form the only remaining link between the Hospital and the general public by which their views can be made known to those who happen to be in authority.

## ALMONER'S REPORT, 1945.

The past year has been full of activity, particularly in the field of social work, as a result of the increase in the number of patients referred to the Department by the Medical and Nursing Staffs. As we are chiefly concerned in making it possible for patients to obtain full benefit from the treatment prescribed for them, we are once again most grateful to these Staffs for their co-operation and help.

It is not really possible to estimate the work of the Almoner's Department by statistics, but the following figures will serve to show the direction in which our activities lie.

The admission of Service patients is not part of our work, and does not appear as a separate item in the figures given. We are responsible, however, for the provision of surgical appliances, transport, arrangements for subsequent attendance in the Out-patient Department and general welfare of these patients. Once again, the assistance given by the Ministries of Health and Pensions, the British Legion and Welfare Organisations has been most valuable.

Special mention must be made of the transport service. Until July 31st, the W.V.S. Volunteer Car Pool System served us most faithfully, and there was great dismay when it was heard that this would cease to function at the end of the month. It is with gratitude I report that, owing to a scheme for a Hospital Car Service, sponsored by the joint organisations of the W.V.S., British Red Cross Society and the St. John Ambulance Brigade, we were not left in a dilemma as to the method of getting our patients to and from the hospital. This new system started on August 1st, and offered transport by car at a small charge based on mileage only. Part of the cost is recovered from the patients and other sources; the rest is borne by the hospital. As this is the only method of transport possible for many of the patients, we cannot speak too highly of the H.C.S., nor of the drivers who give up so much of their time, and I am glad of this opportunity to express my gratitude.

During the course of our work, particularly in the last six months, several problems have been brought to our notice. Amongst the most important and acute are the after-care of elderly people, the case of the unmarried mother and unwanted baby, alarming overcrowding and bad housing conditions. We have done all we can to alleviate distress, but it is often an uphill and discouraging fight. There seems little or no provision for the care of elderly people who no longer require hospital accommodation and yet have no one at home to look after them. Even when some of them are recommended for transfer to an institution it is becoming increasingly difficult to obtain vacancies owing to shortage of institutional beds and staff. For many, institutional treatment is unnecessary and, though much has been done to assist in their after-care, the problem is one of which we are acutely aware.

The Moral Welfare Workers are to be thanked for their assistance with unmarried mothers. Sometimes it has been possible to reinstate the girl in her home with the baby, or to find employment where both mother and child may be accommodated. When necessary, the adoption of the child has been arranged. In this connection, I would also like to thank the Relieving Officers and the N.S.P.C.C. for their ready assistance and co-operation.

It is no news that housing is in the forefront of to-day's social problems and, until many of our patients are better housed, we cannot hope for greater improvements in health. It is not surprising that complete recovery is retarded when a patient, whose condition



necessitates rest and quiet, must sleep in the same room as four other members of the family, or the family with a delicate child must share an already overcrowded house with one in which there is tuberculosis. Sometimes it is not possible to do more than report these cases to the Housing Department or to show the patient appreciation of the position, but we hope that the time is not far distant when it will be possible for these, and many more priority claims to be met.

Much of our home-visiting, in and around the district, has been undertaken by Welfare Officers who have given most valuable help, but we are looking forward next year to developing, in our own Department, this and the after-care side of the work.

During the year we have had visits from several sociology students eager to see an Almoner's Department at work, and perhaps I can best sum up in the words of one student, "It is quite obvious that an Almoner does not have a chance to stagnate."

In conclusion, I would like to thank all who have given so much ungrudging help on behalf of the patients for, without their assistance and co-operation, it would have been difficult to accomplish so much.

The diagnostic activities of the laboratory for 1945 show a slight increase over 1944, whether assessed by specimens examined or by units of work done.

The blood transfusion service is in process of transition from a wartime to a peace-time basis. With the cessation of hostilities in Europe the collection of blood for preparation of dried plasma ceased, and the whole of the bleeding of donors during the second half of 1945 has been for use as whole blood in the transfusion of patients in the Reading area. The volume of blood used for this purpose shows a slight increase on the 1944 consumption. Our very special thanks are due to the donors who have continued to respond to calls for blood after hostilities ceased, though most of them volunteered originally as wartime donors. It is hoped that we will in due course be able to write and thank all donors personally for wartime service, and invite them to enrol on the National Blood Donors' Register.

Our thanks are also due to voluntary helpers for much assistance, without which the service could not have been given.

Early in 1945 we received a grant of 171 milligrammes of radium on loan from the Radium Commission, as a result of which it has been possible to continue radium treatments to Carcinomas of Cervix and elsewhere through the year during the time the Hospital radium has been away for reloading.

The Hospital radium has been reloaded this year in entirely new platinum containers, and with the radium content differentially loaded to give even dosage along the entire length of each needle. We are thus the first hospital in England to have our radium stock brought into line with the latest research in this subject.

Plans have been drawn up and approved for a large new Radio-Therapy Department, including an Operating Theatre, a Mould Room and a Physics Department in addition to three Treatment Rooms, and we have been promised active help from the Radium Commission in overcoming permit and labour difficulties.

Finally, we are recognised as a centre for the treatment of cancer, in conjunction with Oxford and Northampton.

If a case be admitted for less than one week, the usual charges will be :—In a two-bed room, £1 per day; in a single-bed room, 26/6 or 30/- per day, according to the price of room. The minimum charge to be 2 guineas.

Patients undergoing an operation will be charged £2 2 0 for the use of the Operating Theatre. All cases admitted to "Greenlands" will be charged for Dressings, Drugs and Medicines.

The Committee have power to raise or lower the charges in exceptional cases.

MEDICAL FEES are a matter for arrangement between the patient's Medical Attendant and the Physician or Surgeon under whom the patient is to be admitted.

The following will be charged extra :—

Radium Treatment, Massage, Diathermy, Radiant Heat, Ionisation, Galvanic Bath, Faradism, Pathological Examinations, X-Ray Examinations or Treatment, Special Nursing, Orthoptic Treatment, and Electro-cardiography.

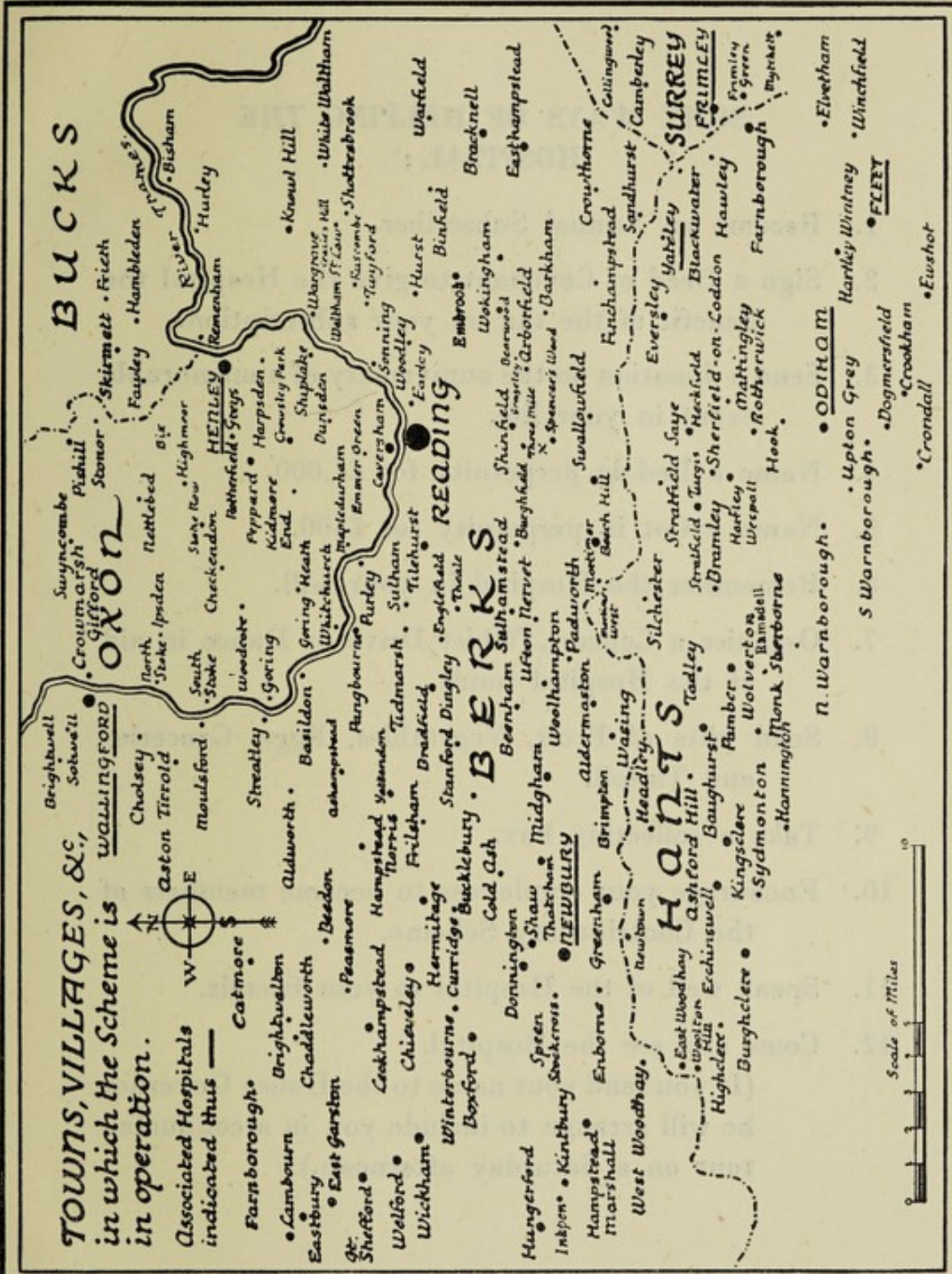

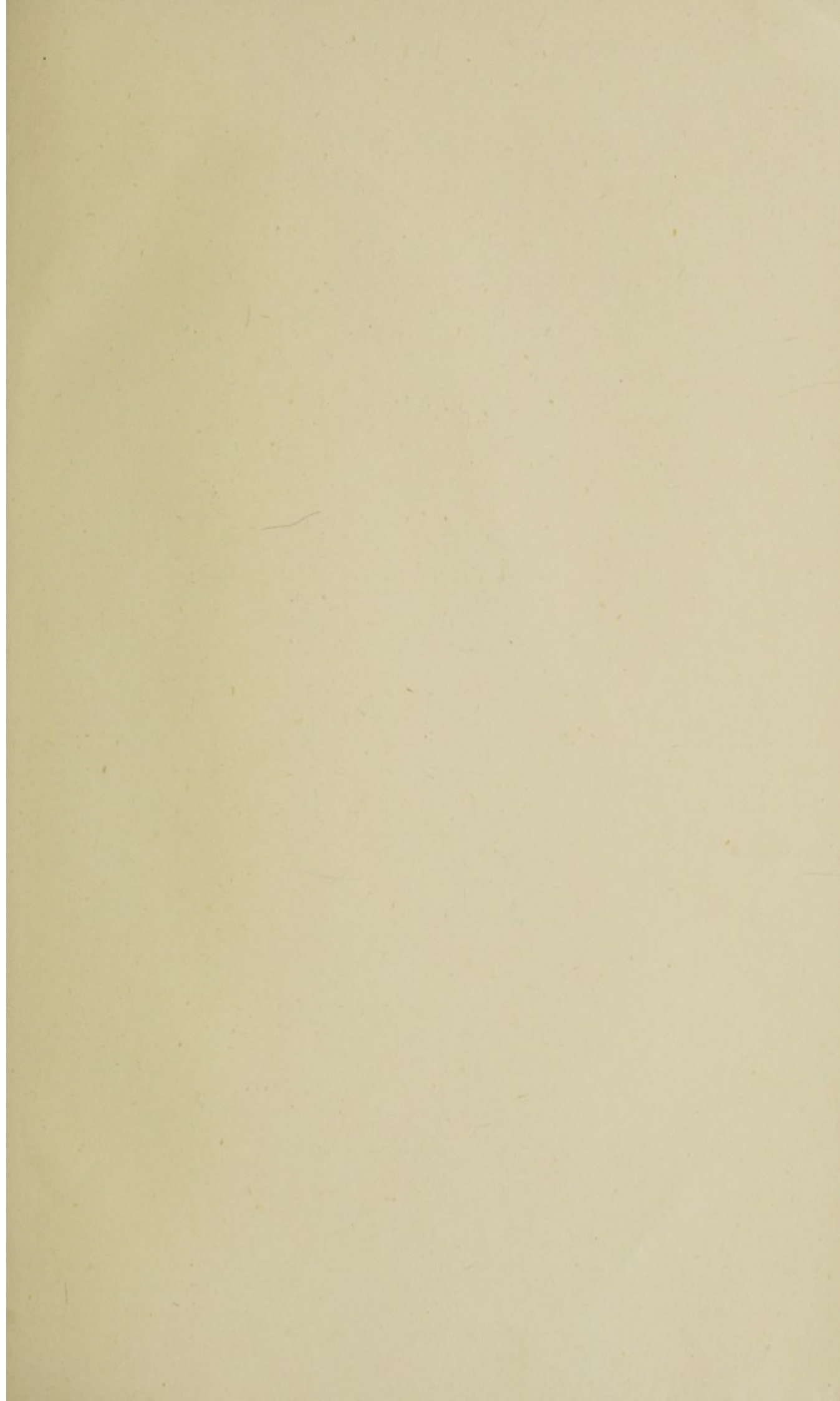
