

Annual Report of the Board of Management

of the

ROYAL BERKSHIRE HOSPITAL

For the Year ended 31st December, 1947.

The Board of Management have the honour to present their 109th Annual Report for the year ended 31st December, 1947.

On 5th July, 1948, the provisions of the National Health Service Act come into operation and on that date responsibility for the Hospital Service throughout the country passes to H.M. Government.

The Regional Hospital Boards are already established and Management Committees are now being formed to undertake the duties allocated to them under the Act.

As it is doubtful whether a report covering the period 1st January to 30th June 1948, will be published, the Board takes this opportunity of thanking all those who have continued to subscribe to the funds of the Hospital and so ensure that the service rendered to the public continues unimpaired until the "Appointed Day."

BOARD OF MANAGEMENT.—Mr. E. R. Jackson and Mr. W. H. Bale, representatives of the Reading County Borough Council, retired during the year and were succeeded by Mr. T. S. W. Smart and Mr. A. Lovell.

Dr. L. M. Jennings succeeded Dr. J. G. Bird as representative of the Honorary Medical Staff.

Vacancies were filled by the election of the following new members :-

Honorary Medical Staff.—Consulting Staff.—The deaths of Dr. Gordon Lambert, Honorary Consulting Physician, and Mr. R. P. Brooks, Honorary Consulting Ophthalmic Surgeon, are recorded with sincere regret. Their services to the Hospital were outstanding and will long be remembered.

Mr. Leslie Powell was elected Honorary Consulting Aural Surgeon on his retirement from the active staff. Mr. Powell had been in charge of the Aural Department of the Hospital since 1920 and in recording their sincere appreciation of his valuable services, the Board are glad to know that the benefit of his advice will still be available.

Mr. R. H. Hunt Williams has been appointed Honorary Aural Surgeon.

Mr. A. N. Hooper resigned from the post of Honorary Obstetrician and Gynaecologist and has been succeeded by Mr. F. E. Wheeler, M.B.E. The Board record their high appreciation of the services rendered to the Hospital by Mr. Hooper for many years.

Mr. R. G. Reid and Mr. C. Latto have been appointed Honorary Assistant Surgeons, and Mr. H. M. Archibald, Honorary Dental Surgeon.

Dr. B. P. Hill, Honorary Anaesthetist, left for service with the Forces in June. During his absence Dr. T. R. M. Bristow will act as Honorary Anaesthetist.

Dr. M. S. Howe has been appointed Honorary Assistant Anaesthetist.

ADMINISTRATIVE AND OTHER STAFF.—The Board is much indebted to Lady Hilbery for so kindly taking charge of the Occupational Therapy at the Blagrave Branch.

During the year Rev. C. Bourne resigned from the post of Chaplain to the Hospital on his appointment as Rural Dean of Reading.

Rev. E. J. Willis, Free Church Chaplain, also resigned on leaving Reading in June, and is succeeded by Rev. G. P. Smailes.

Miss M. Rhys resigned from the post of Catering Officer, and Mr. C. E. Buck has been appointed to succeed her.

Mr. F. R. Elkins left the Pharmaceutical Staff on his appointment as Chief Pharmacist at Worthing Hospital. The vacancy has been filled by the appointment of Mr. G. E. Herd.

Housing of Staff.—During the year the Board has purchased two properties which have been re-constructed to provide additional accommodation for Nurses until the extensions to the existing Nurses Home can be carried out:—

Orwell House, Craven Road ... 18 bedrooms. 56, London Road ... 10 bedrooms.

In addition three houses have been purchased and leased to members of the administrative and technical staffs on service agreements.

The accommodation provided at Joyce Grove, Nettlebed, by arrangement with the Governors of St. Mary's Hospital, London, has been used to house the Preliminary Training School for Nurses.

The marked increase in the number of nurses available for the staffing of the Wards has resulted in a corresponding increase in the number of beds available and the number of in-patients treated throughout the year.

EXTENSIONS AND STRUCTURAL ALTERATIONS.—Throughout the year work on the new block in which the Radiotherapy Department will be temporarily housed has continued. While every effort has been made to speed up the work progress has been regrettably slow and the building is not yet finished.

The re-construction of Sidmouth Ward has now been completed. Again, the modernisation which it was hoped to carry out within a short period has extended over many months, owing to the acute shortage of labour and materials. The modernisation of Benyon Ward is now in hand.

Acting under the instructions of the Board of Management, the Building and Planning Sub-Committee have considered schemes and plans submitted by the Architect for the following:—

- Nurses Home. Provision of 104 additional bed and bed-sitting rooms and new Training School for Nurses.
- 2. Modernisation of West Ward.
- 3. Hut (concrete and brick) for Orthoptic Clinic and School.
- Huts (concrete and brick) for the following Out-Patient Clinics:—Ophthalmic, Otolaryngological, Gynaecological and Physiotherapeutic.
- Pathological Laboratory—Extension.
- Provision of additional boiler and generator to provide heating, lighting and hot water services for items 1 and 4.
- 7. Re-conditioning of roads, pathways and forecourt.

Items 1, 2, 3 and 4 have received the sanction of the Board, and are now awaiting approval by the Ministry of Health.

Contributory Scheme.—Notwithstanding the fact that the Act makes no provision for the continuance of Contributory Schemes, the Royal Berkshire and Associated Hospital Scheme has, through the loyalty of its members, continued its invaluable support. To the members of the Scheme Committee and all the voluntary workers concerned, the Board convey their warmest thanks and place on record their high appreciation of their work. The Annual Meeting of Contributory Scheme workers was again held, by invitation of the Board, at "Olympia." A large number attended and were much interested in the address by Mr. G. T. W. Cashell, F.R.C.S., on "Why We Wear Glasses." The Chairman and representatives of the Board expressed their high appreciation and thanks to the members for the wholehearted support they had given to the Hospital for many years.

Hospital Car Service.—Notwithstanding the suspension of the basic petrol ration, this service has again proved of inestimable value to the large number of patients who, owing to disability and limited means, would otherwise be prevented from attending the Hospital.

During 1947 1,906 journeys were undertaken, involving a total of 30,221 miles.

THANKS.—The Board record their sincere thanks for the services rendered by the following :—

Reading University Students' Union, who collected £1,355 16s. 10d. as a result of "Rag Day"; Lady Palmer and the Ball Committee, who raised the record sum of £672 16s. 1d.; The British Red Cross Society, Voluntary Aid Detachments, for once again servicing the Canteen in the Out-Patients' Department; Mrs. Mackintosh and the Reading Townswomen's Guild, for the circulation of library books to the patients; the Hospital Car Service and the drivers who gave invaluable help by transporting patients to and from the Hospital; Mrs. Benyon, for organising Egg Weeks, and to the many helpers throughout the area served by the Hospital, whose efforts resulted in the collection of 7,688 eggs and a sum of £130 12s. 0d.; Messrs. Huntley and Palmers and Messrs. R. W. Alder, for presenting Christmas Cake for the patients; the members of the Ladies' Linen League, whose collection last year amounted to £319 15s. 4d; and the League of Remembrance, which has again rendered very valuable service in making dressings and bandages for the Hospital.

In addition, the Board once again record their thanks to all those who by their voluntary service or generous financial help have contributed to the welfare of the patients, and to all individuals and organisations who have so readily continued to support the Hospital during the past year.

In conclusion the Board record their appreciation of the services of the Honorary Medical Staff, and of the Nursing, Administrative and other staffs for their loyal co-operation.

THE TREASURER'S REPORT

For the Year ending 31st December, 1947.

I have pleasure in presenting, probably for the last time, the Annual Accounts for the Financial Year ended 31st December, 1947. The report for the year ended December, 1946, included an estimate of Ordinary Expenditure for 1947 of £140,000, which you will see from the Income and Expenditure Account has been considerably exceeded. However, when comparing the Ordinary Expenditure with that of the previous year, it must be understood that the Expenditure on Greenlands Private Patients' Block of £8,846 has been included this year in the General Income and Expenditure Account. The estimate, therefore, for the previous year has been exceeded by almost £27,700—19.78%.

INCOME.

Voluntary Gifts have kept up remarkably well notwithstanding the National Health Service Act, 1946. Subscriptions, you will notice, are £1,046 down, mainly due to the loss of three large subscriptions, and the reduction in the amount of Income Tax recovered on covenanted subscriptions.

Receipts on account of Services rendered to Patients.—The increase in this sub-heading is mainly due to the inclusion of Greenlands receipts, amounting to £7,344.

Public Authorities.—This increase is due to the provisions of the Education Act, 1944, whereby payments for the treatment of school children, both In and Out-patients, are now the responsibility of the Local Authorities. Claims have been made this year, back-dated to April, 1945, amounting to almost £22,000. Claims under the Government Emergency Hospital Scheme and the State Grant towards Rushcliffe rates of salaries are no longer being made separately in view of the financial assistance given to the Hospital by the Ministry of Health. An estimated figure has been included.

Invested Property.—The deficit when comparing this year and last year has occurred through the sale of all Free Securities.

EXPENDITURE.

After allowing for Greenlands Expenditure of £8,846, total Ordinary Expenditure has increased this year by £38,717, which is 30.02% above last year. Prices have risen in nearly every commodity, but when reviewing comparative figures in the Income and Expenditure Account, it must be borne in mind that many more beds have been available this year, resulting in a larger consumption of provisions, drugs, dressing, etc. The natural tendency is for the Hospital Medical Staff to make use of modern advances in medicine, which entails the use of special drugs involving considerable additional expense. Many Instruments which have been on order for a considerable time are now being delivered after long delays. Salaries and Wages have continued to rise during the year. We have been fortunate in securing additional Nursing Staff, so that the increase in Salaries and Wages is not only due to increased rates, but also to the cost of additional Staff. Printing, Stationery, Telephones and Insurance have all been subject to increased cost during the year. Although these figures show an exceptionally high increase in nearly every category, I am satisfied that every possible economy has been made without reducing the standard of comfort or treatment of the patients. My Finance Committee have reviewed the Expenditure with Income monthly throughout the year. The position as shown in the Income and Expenditure Account, therefore, was anticipated.

In addition, £26,440 has been spent on account of Extensions and Structural Alterations, the purchase of additional property for the housing of Nursing and other Staff, and the renewals and improvement of existing Equipment.

The large deficit shown in the Income and Expenditure Account of £46,006, to which must be added Capital Expenditure of £26,440, is clearly reflected in the Balance Sheet, and it will be readily seen that the large Cash and Security resources of the Hospital have been liquidated in meeting these items. The Free Cash and Security position at the end of 1946 was in the region of £65,000. In 1947 the Cash balance at the Bank had been exhausted, the Free Securities realised and the Cash spent, and an overdraft at the Bank of £3,596 incurred. In addition the Ministry of Health have given the Hospital special financial assistance.

The cost of treating Road Traffic cases during the past year was £2,211, the amount recovered was £2,201 (£1,880 under the Road Traffic Acts and £321 from the Contributory Scheme).

The average cost per In-patient has been reduced from £22 8s. 7d. to £21 5s. 2d., although the Daily Cost has increased from £1 4s. 6d. per day to £1 7s. 7d. (The percentage of Contributory Scheme In-patients was 50.05.)

The average cost per Out-patient has increased from 17s. 5d. to £1 3s. 1d., and the cost of each attendance from 3s. 4d. to4s. 7d. (The percentage of Contributory Scheme Out-patients was 67.60.)

Greenlands.—Due to the heavy increase in the cost of maintaining patients, the fee at Greenlands has been increased from £8 18s. 6d. to £12 0s. 0d. per week for single rooms, and from £5 15s. 6d. to £11 0s. 0d. per week for double rooms. The new charges include the use of theatre and free pathological service, etc. Previously these items were charged as extras, and amounted to an average of £2 14s. 4d. per patient, or £1 13s. 8d. per patient per week. As previously stated, the whole of the working of Greenlands has been included in the General Fund.

The Out-patients' Department Canteen Account has been transferred, with many of the unexpended Income balances of Special Funds, to the General Fund.

The Convalescent Fund Account shows an excess of Expenditure of £73 0s. 0d., after spending £21 0s. 0d. as relief to Patients, £1,147 on Surgical Appliances, £36 on the maintenance of Patients in Convalescent Homes, and £72 on Travelling Expenses.

The Laundry Account shows a decrease in the cost per 100 pieces washed from 15s. 11d. to 15s. 2d. The average number of pieces washed weekly has increased by 2,892.

Land, Buildings and Equipment.—The Professional Valuation of Land, Buildings and Equipment made in 1945 has now been brought into the Accounts, creating a Reserve on Revaluation of Land, Buildings and Equipment of £377,755, which amount can be written down if prices tend to deflate. A list is given on page 12 of the Report showing Land, Buildings, Equipment and Outside Properties valued separately, amounting to £659,312 0s. 6d.

I would particularly like to stress that every effort is being made, where materials and labour are available, to continue improving the Service, Equipment and Buildings of the Hospital.

In conclusion, may I thank all the benefactors of the Hospital for the splendid way in which they have continued their support during 1947, and for their efforts in the past, without which the many improvements in the services of our Hospital would not have been possible. I am sure even after July 5th, which we understand to be the appointed day, Personal Support will still be necessary in some form. Financial Support will also be necessary to give new Hospital Management Committees "free money" to spend on special purposes, other than the maintenance of patients.

It will still be possible for those who cherish an intimate association with a particular Hospital to ensure that their financial support goes to benefit this Hospital and no other. A suggestion as to how this may be done is shown on page 11.

MATRON'S REPORT, 1947

During the year there have been many small changes; these have allowed the extension of the Nursing Services of the Hospital. Whilst the floods were causing anxiety in March the Preliminary Training School was made ready in Joyce Grove, Nettlebed, where the second floor was rented from St. Mary's Hospital, Paddington. Here we welcomed the first Student Nurses on 25th March, and since then forty-seven Nurses have taken their first eight weeks' course in this lovely mansion.

This new accommodation made room for more staff here, and as the numbers crept up we found we were again without rooms for the Nurses to live in. During the summer months the Board of Management purchased No. 56 London Road, and the work of preparation started at once. At last it was ready, and on 27th December the first Staff Nurses moved in. There are ten bedrooms, and one has two beds, so we were able to take eleven more Nurses. I feel it will be a very happy home, although just opened and not complete the Staff Nurses who live there enjoy it greatly.

As the nursing staff increased we were able to open more wards. The opening of Joyce Grove released Huntley and Palmer Ward, which, after repainting, was opened for patients on 21st April; and Albert Ward was staffed by part-time Nurses and opened for a Tonsil Ward. The part-time Nurses have given excellent service during the year, and though they change fairly often, due to domestic ties, we have managed to fill the gaps and keep the service running.

Miss Saunders left in November, after over twenty years' service as Home Sister and Assistant Matron, to look after her parents. She was as sad to leave us as we are sorry to part with her. Miss Aldwinckle, A.R.R.C., was appointed in her stead from the post of Senior Home Sister, and this post was filled by the promotion of Miss Hosken, our Casualty Sister. Another loss, after many years' service, was felt when Miss Batt resigned the post of Sister of Sidmouth Ward, though she is still near enough to visit us. We welcomed Miss Wilson as Second Assistant Matron, and Sister Purnell as Second Home Sister, Sisters Jones and Frankenbusch to the Ophthalmic Department, Sister Blackwell to Benyon, Sister Brown to Alice, Sister Morris to Children's Ward, Sister Johnson to Casualty, and Sisters Fletcher and Hatt on night duty.

71 new Student Nurses entered for training during the year, and 14 second-year Nurses from affiliated hospitals; 22 left without completing training, 3 to be married, 4 because of failures in examinations; 2 unsuitable, and the others for various reasons, chiefly domestic.

STATE EXAMINATIONS.

In presenting the Annual Report of the Almoner's Department for 1947 I am pleased to record a year of good work and progress. The main function of an Almoner is to find a solution for all the social ills of her patients by removing their difficulties and lessening their family worries so that full benefit may be derived from the treatment prescribed for them and I wish to express my gratitude to the Staff of the Department who have so ably assisted in this work and to the Medical and Nursing Staff for their unceasing help and co-operation.

As a result of the re-opening of Wards that were temporarily closed owing to shortage of Nursing Staff, the number of patients admitted to the Wards has increased by 1,640, it will be appreciated that there has been an increase in the number of cases to be followed up and much valuable help has been given by our Home Visitor, who has visited 557 homes during the year. The assistance given in this way by the Health Visitors and Welfare Workers in the many counties and scattered rural areas from which our patients come is invaluable and, although these visits are not recorded in the figure shown in the statistics given above, I wish to express my appreciation for the service that has been rendered.

There is no limit to the variety of needs that may arise and although it is difficult to tabulate this type of work, a few instances may prove of interest and give some idea of the problems that must be solved:—

A woman was admitted to hospital as an urgent case, leaving at home three children, the youngest ten months old. Her husband, who was unable to earn a high wage owing to ill health, could not afford to take time off to look after them, or to pay someone to do it for him. No progress could be made in the mother's health until she ceased to worry about the children. The help of the Public Assistance Officer was sought and he agreed to take them into the local institution until the mother was able to look after them herself. To this arrangement the parents would not consent as they did not wish the children to go into a Home. Eventually the woman's sister agreed to take them into her home, but as she could not afford to do so without financial assistance, arrangements were made through the Public Assistance Officer for an allowance to be paid to her for their care. The result has been most satisfactory to all parties concerned and a steady progress maintained by the mother.

A woman of eighty-three, who had been living in accommodation that was filled during her stay in hospital, had nowhere to go on discharge. It was felt that, even if a room could be found anywhere for her, she should not continue to live alone, and she had no relatives to whom she could go. A vacancy was sought for her in a Home for Elderly People and, although these are almost unobtainable nowadays, an application to a Home in Plymouth was eventually accepted. As she was quite unable to travel by herself, an escort was found for her with the help of the Red Cross. Transport was arranged from the hospital to the station and from Plymouth to the Home, and seats reserved on the train. As the distance was too great for the escort to return the same day, arrangements were made with the Matron of the Home for her to be accommodated there for the night. The patient continues to write of the kindness that has been shown to her since she went there and to say how happy she in in her new home.

A woman was living on a widow's pension of fifteen shillings per week for herself and child, her married son paying the rent, which he could ill afford to do. No application for a supplementary pension had been made as she was quite unaware that she was entitled to claim one. This was eventually obtained for her and a talk with her later revealed the fact that, although she would never be able to go out to work again, she was good with her fingers and enjoyed needlework. The help of the Red Cross was enlisted and it was suggested to her that if her work proved to be of a sufficiently high standard, they would try and arrange for her to have a licence to sell goods and so augment her small income. She is now looking forward to a better future than she had thought possible.

A girl, without relatives, and entirely dependent on herself, was referred to the Out-Patient Department with a chest condition and as a poor case of general debility. She was told that she must stop working for some time and have a complete rest and extra nourishment. As this meant that she would be in receipt of National Health Insurance only and would be left with very little on which to live, after paying the rent of her one room, she felt that it was impossible for her to carry out this recommendation. A grant was obtained to help her financially and the provision of extra nourishment arranged. To enable her to get the rest she needed she was sent to a Convalescent Home for two months, part of the cost being met by application to her Approved Society, the Hospital Convalescent Fund paying the remainder of the cost and her fare, thus relieving her of any financial anxiety. On her return she reported to hospital in such an improved condition that it was not long before she was allowed to go back to work and has continued to go on satisfactorily.

A child of five had to attend the Physiotherapy Department three times a week for deformity of the spine. It was reported that her attendance there had become very spasmodic and a permanent disability would result if this were allowed to continue. A visit to the home disclosed the reason. Neither the mother, who was totally blind, nor the father, who was working out of the town, could bring her to hospital. A friend of the family came to our aid by promising to bring her once in the week and the difficulty was then discussed with the School Medical Officer, who was able to provide an escort to bring the child to hospital on the other two days, until such time as she no longer required treatment.

A man, working locally and living in lodgings, was admitted with acute gastric trouble. When the time came for him to leave hospital it was considered essential that he should return to his home where he could have regular meals, keep to his diet and, later, suitable light employment found for him. His home was in a remote part of Wales, involving four changes by rail, and he was not strong enough to stand any worry or deal with the difficulties to be met in present day travelling, nor could he afford the expenses of someone to accompany him, his financial resources being much reduced as the result of his prolonged illness. The matter was fully explained to the Stationmaster, whose magnificent helpmade it possible for the journey to be undertaken with the minimum amount of strain or anxiety to the patient. The route was planned out, details supplied of the trains involved, seating accommodation reserved, and arrangements made for the man to be met at the stations where the changes had to be made.

Three hundred and fifty-five appliances and instruments of all kinds have been supplied and 25 hearing aids, an increase of 21 on the previous year. Despite a 25 per cent. discount allowed by the firm to patients supplied through hospital channels, the cost of an aid ranges from seventeen to twenty guineas, and providing payment for these appliances calls for careful and patient enquiry and numerous applications to Benevolent Funds and charitable sources. Need, not income, however, is the decisive factor in the provision of a hearing aid and the joy experienced by those who can hear again is compensation indeed for the work entailed in obtaining assistance to make this possible.

Transport facilities have again been afforded us by the Hospital Car Service.; 1,906 journeys have been arranged and undertaken, involving a total of 30,221 miles, at a cost to Hospital of £457 17s. 3d. On October 1st the charge was increased from threepence to sixpence a mile and, although it is seldom that the patient can pay the whole of this charge, a small amount is recovered where possible and the rest borne by the Hospital. To the Area Transport Officers and to the drivers, the Hospital Authorities and the patients owe a great debt of gratitude for the service that has been rendered. Without this it would be difficult to know how treatment in so many cases could have been continued.

Our aim is to procure the maximum welfare of the patients and the success of our efforts can only be achieved by the co-operation of others. I cannot, then, end my report without paying the warmest tribute and recording my sincere thanks to the various Local and Public Authorities, Voluntary Organisations and Charitable Societies, the Members of our own Hospital Committee and to all those who have helped in any way by their willingness and ungrudging assistance to further the work of the Department.

The Committee have power to raise or lower the charges in exceptional cases.

MEDICAL FEES are a matter for arrangement between the patient's Medical Attendant and the Physician or Surgeon under whom the patient is to be admitted.

This also applies to the Radiologist.

No. extra charges will be made for the following:—
Radium Treatment, Massage, Diathermy, Radiant Heat,
lonisation, Galvanic Bath, Faradism, Pathological Examinations, Orthoptic Treatment, and Electro-cardiography.

An extra charge will be made where special nursing is required.


