## 71ST ANNUAL REPORT OF THE BOARD OF MANAGEMENT.

The Board of Management have pleasure in submitting the SEVENTY-FIRST ANNUAL REPORT of the Infirmary, together with a Statement of the Income and Expenditure for the twelve months ending 31st March, 1944.

The Board are most grateful for the generous support which the Infirmary continues to receive during these difficult times. In this connection a tribute should be paid to the voluntary assistance rendered at the Infirmary in various ways. This practical help, especially in the laundry and on the domestic side, is warmly appreciated.

The number of patients who received treatment and advice was 28,123, compared with 27,564 last year. The Waiting List at the close of the year was 750, compared with 466 last year.

In addition, 538 patients were treated in the Christopher Private Patients' Home, where 373 operations were performed. The demands made upon the services of the Home (which is entirely self-supporting) have been fully maintained, and at times there has been a waiting list for admission.

In connection with the Fracture Department "A" established under the Ministry of Health Emergency Hospital Scheme, the facilities for rehabilitation are being developed so far as our limited accommodation will permit. It will be realised that these developments call for the completion of the outstanding extensions as soon as ever practicable, as the greater part will be used for orthopædic purposes.

The Infirmary Blood Transfusion Service continues with its vitally important work. **Many more blood donors are very urgently needed** to replace those who have been called away and to meet the increased demands. Volunteers should kindly communicate with the Department of Pathology of the Infirmary, when the necessary arrangements for enrolment will be made. The Board would like to see a much larger rota and earnestly appeal for more volunteers.

The White Paper recently published by the Government on a National Health Service is receiving the serious consideration of the Board.

In connection with the recommendations contained in the Beveridge Report on Social Insurance, they have already stated it is their earnest desire that the voluntary hospitals should be incorporated in any national health scheme, on the lines indicated by successive Ministers of Health, always bearing in mind the outstanding objective, viz., the welfare of the patient, which has ever been the guiding principle governing the policy of the Board.

Following the publication of the White Paper, a Conference was convened by the British Hospitals Association, and after a lengthy discussion the following Resolution was carried unanimously :—

That this Conference representing the Voluntary Hospitals of Great Britain records its full sympathy with the Government's intention to secure a co-ordinated hospital and consultant service and to make such service accessible to every member of the community regardless of his or her income. That this Conference records its appreciation of the reference in the White Paper to the value of the voluntary hospitals' services and to the necessity for their retention, but views with grave concern the proposals with regard to administration and finance.

That the suggested administration does not constitute that partnership between Local Authorities and Voluntary Hospitals which has been the avowed intention of successive Ministers of Health, and which is an essential requisite to the effective participation of the voluntary hospitals and therefore to the accomplishment and efficiency of the Scheme, and does not (except partially in the case of Scotland) furnish a suitable organisation.

That the financial proposals are inconsistent and also unacceptable in that they afford part payment only to the voluntary hospitals for their services rendered under the scheme, whilst postulating that the financial gap thus caused must be filled by benefactions and other voluntary gifts; and, at the same time, by the offer of free service for all, destroy the incentive of the public as a whole either to give or contribute.

That the Minister be invited to reconsider the proposals in the light. of this resolution.

The Board have expressed their approval of the Resolution, and trust that as a result of further discussions which the Minister of Health may have with the Executive Committee of the British Hospitals Association, every consideration will be given to these matters, which are of fundamental importance.

The voluntary hospitals of this country, after eight centuries of service, look not only to the continuance of their existence and the preservation of their standards and ideals, but to an extension of their service, which at the same time will utilise all that is valuable in their tradition.

The Board have adopted the recommendations contained in the Hetherington Report on wages and conditions of employment of domestic workers in Hospitals, etc., to take effect as from April, 1944. This will entail a further very considerable increase in expenditure under this heading. The adoption of this Report means the giving of first priority by the Ministry of Labour to domestic work in hospitals, and in return, the Board considerthey are entitled to expect that an adequate supply of suitable workers will be forthcoming. The highest degree of preference has never before been given to hospital requirements, save only in respect of nursing, and it is a source of satisfaction to know that at long last the Government has taken this strong action. The position at the Infirmary for a considerable time has been a cause of much concern, owing to the shortage and uncertain attendance of the non-resident domestic helpers, and it is only with the greatest difficulty that we have, so far, avoided any curtailment of our services, which would be nothing short of a calamity. The ideal solution is an adequate number of resident domestic staff, or failing this the regular attendance of a sufficient number of non-resident domestic helpers throughout the whole of the week.

The Maintenance Account Income shows an increase of £3,688 0s. 1d., compared with the preceding year, and the Maintenance Account Expenditure has increased by £6,327 8s. 5d. This is mainly due to the continued increase in the cost of Hospital commodities generally, and to the further increases in the nursing and domestic staff salaries. Other outstanding items of expenditure include the purchase of a portable X-Ray Apparatus and a Gastroscope, the combined cost being £390. A special supply of instruments for the Ear, Nose and Throat Department have been obtained at a cost of £129 19s. 9d. These are all of great value, and their provision is much appreciated by the medical staff.

#### Cost of Occupied Bed.

The average cost per bed occupied daily during the year (after allowing for out-patients) was £230 8s.  $7\frac{1}{2}d$ ., compared with £200 7s. 1d. during the preceding year; an increase of £30 1s.  $6\frac{1}{2}d$ . per bed.

The Christopher Private Patients' Home, £398 11s. 9d.

#### **Out-Patient Department.**

The cost per out-patient during the year was 9s. 1d., compared with 8s. 2<sup>1</sup>/<sub>2</sub>d. during the preceding year; an increase of 10<sup>1</sup>/<sub>2</sub>d. per out-patient.

#### Annual Subscriptions.

Annual Subscriptions totalled  $\pounds 2,126$  3s. 5d. (last year  $\pounds 2,063$  15s. 8d.). The Board would like to see this amount considerably increased, having regard to the wide area served by the Infirmary, and particularly appeal for new annual subscriptions of 10s. 6d. and upwards.

Subscribers wishing to increase the funds of the Infirmary are reminded of the facilities available under the Finance Acts whereby a Covenant may be given for an annual subscription over a period of years, detailed particulars of which will be found on page 57, as it enables the Income Tax on payments to be recovered and increases the amount of the subscription by the addition of the sum refunded. The amount of tax recovered last year was £200 8s. 4d.

#### Hospital Sunday.

The total of the Collections made in Churches, Chapels and Schools was £947 3s. 11d., an increase of £46 8s. 9d., compared with the previous year. The Board are most grateful that the substantial increase in the Collections last year has more than been maintained.

#### Contributory Scheme.

The amount received from the Contributory Scheme was £33,203 3s. 7d., a decrease of £782 5s. 10d., compared with the previous year. The approximate number of contributors at the close of the year was 70,000.

Under the reciprocal arrangements with other Hospitals for the treatment of contributors under the Scheme payments amounting to  $\pounds 4,252$  2s. 2d. have been received in respect of their contributors treated here, and corresponding payments amounting to  $\pounds 2,415$  19s. 0d. have been made for the treatment of our contributors. Including these payments the total amount received was  $\pounds 37,455$  5s. 9d., compared with  $\pounds 37,141$  1s. 9d. the previous year. The Board are desirous of expressing their warmest thanks to all contributors and collectors, and other voluntary workers who have materially assisted in making this excellent result possible. They are also grateful to the many employers for their kind co-operation and support.

#### Patients' Contributions.

The contributions made to the Inquiry Officer towards the cost of maintenance and treatment amounted to  $\pounds 1,309$  ls. 6d. (In-patients,  $\pounds 1,060$  l6s. 3d.; Out-patients,  $\pounds 248$  5s. 3d.), compared with  $\pounds 1,078$  6s. ld. last year. The Board are most grateful for these contributions, and appeal to those patients (not in the Contributory Scheme) where circumstances permit to help in this way.

Including the above amount of £256 the Bamfurlong Hotel Voluntary Help Committee have raised £500 for the Infirmary since their formation five years ago. The untiring efforts of this most enthusiastic band of workers is warmly appreciated.

#### Alexandra Rose Day.

The proceeds realised the record sum of £477 19s. 2d. The Board are most grateful for this splendid response, and extend their warmest thanks to His Worship the Mayor of Wigan (Councillor E. Greenhalgh, J.P.), and to all who assisted him in making the event such an outstanding success. Miss A. M. Lopez again acted as Honorary Organising Secretary.

#### Ladies' Linen League.

The Ladies' Linen League has supplied 426 articles during the year for the use of the patients, and the sum of £195 12s. 0d. has been expended on linen, etc. The members also kindly made a donation of £25 to the Eastwood Memorial Fund.

The Board desire heartily to congratulate the members on another excellent year's work, and would again assure them how much their splendid services are appreciated. The Linen League affords an excellent opportunity to ladies who desire to render practical service to the Infirmary, and new members will be heartily welcomed.

### Pathological and Bacteriological Department.

A detailed report for the year (excluding all outside work) will be found on page 55. The Laboratory work continues to increase, particularly the outside work. It is pleasing to observe that more Local Authorities are making use of the facilities available.

The Board have again been pleased to renew their arrangements with the Lancashire Insurance Committee and the Barrow Insurance Committee, to supply Stock and Autogenous Vaccines to the order of the Insurance Practitioners at an agreed scale of charges, and to report upon any material sent for examination.

### Tinfoil and "Silver" Paper.

The collection of Tinfoil and "Silver" Paper has declined for obvious reasons, but the large quantity of 13 tons 6 cwts. 37 lbs. has been received since the inauguration of the scheme. As a result the Infirmary has benefited to the extent of  $\pounds 339$  4s. 4d.

#### Extensions and Improvements.

The Board have much pleasure in reporting that, after very careful consideration, they have agreed to purchase Sunnyside Mansions Hotel, Southport, to be used for the following purposes :---

(a) Convalescent Home.

(b) Post-operative cases, to assist in relieving the large waiting list for admission.

(c) Preliminary Training School for Nurses.

The Hotel is ideally situated and most suitable in every way for the purposes in view, and will undoubtedly prove to be a great asset. When the extensions are completed at the Infirmary, it is possible that we may be able to use "Sunnyside" exclusively as a Convalescent Home. It is not expected that we shall be able to obtain possession of the premises before the termination of the war. The Board feel sure their action in providing these valuable additions to our resources will receive the cordial approval and support of the Governors.

A number of minor improvements have been carried out, including the re-conditioning of the Lancaster and Crawford Bathrooms and Sluice Rooms, which had become urgently necessary.

It has been found possible to carry out various internal painting and renovations. All the wards have received attention, as they were entirely omitted during the previous year.

#### Obituary.

The Board record with deepest regret the death of Mr. Wm. Clarke, Laurel House, Lowton, who was a Life Vice-President and generous supporter of the Infirmary.

#### Appointment of Treasurer.

Mr. E. D. Smith has been appointed to succeed Mr. C. W. Waghorn as Treasurer of the Infirmary. Mr. Waghorn was keenly interested in its welfare, and the Board are grateful for his valuable help and advice.

### Wigan Corporation Maternity and Child Welfare Committee.

Mr. Jas. Starr was again appointed to represent the Infirmary Board on this Committee.

#### Wigan Consolidated Charities.

Mr. Cyril E. Marsden and Mr. Jas. Starr have been appointed as the Infirmary's representative Trustees.

#### Honorary Medical Staff.

During the year Mr. T. N. A. Jeffcoate tendered his resignation as Honorary Gynæcological Surgeon, owing to the increasing demands made upon his services in Liverpool. The Board desire to accord their warmest thanks to Mr. Jeffcoate for his splendid services during a difficult period, and their appreciation of the successful establishment of a separate Gynæcological Department in connection with his appointment. This is being continued with the appointment of Miss M. H. Mayeur, M.D. Lond., F.R.C.S.Eng., M.R.C.O.G., as Mr. Jeffcoate's successor.

The Board are very pleased to report that Mr. F. C. Dwyer, M.Ch. (Orth.), Liverpool, F.R.C.S.Eng., has been appointed to succeed the late Mr. W. J. Eastwood as Surgeon-in-charge of the Orthopædic Department. Mr Dwyer formerly assisted Mr. Eastwood and took charge when he left for military service. The high reputation and work of the Department has been admirably maintained by Mr Dwyer, but it became obvious that he was greatly in need of assistance. To meet this, the Board have been fortunate in obtaining the services of Mr. E. H. Strach (a former House Surgeon attached to the Orthopædic Department), who has been appointed Clinical Assistant to the Department.

#### Thanks.

In conclusion the Board would tender its thanks to all who have assisted the Infirmary by gifts in money or in kind, and in particular to the following :—

The British Red Cross Society (E.L.50) for their valuable nursing assistance.

The members of the St. John Ambulance Brigade, who have so readily given their services in connection with a Blood Transfusion Service, and all other blood donors.

The Wigan Branch of Toc. H., for their services in connection with working a Library for the patients.

The Wigan Girl Guides and others for their valuable help in connection with the telephone services.

The Women's Voluntary Service for transport services, who have made regular weekly journeys to Liverpool in connection with our Blood Transfusion Service.

The Police for their help in conveying messages to patients' relatives.

The local Press for their valuable assistance during the year.

The House Visitors, Clergymen, and Ministers of Religion.

The Honorary and Resident Medical Officers and the Officials and Staff of the Infirmary for their assiduous attention to their duties.

Finally, the Board would extend their best wishes to those members of the Staff now on active service, for their safe and speedy return.




AT THE

ANNUAL MEETING OF GOVERNORS

OF THE

ROYAL ALBERT EDWARD INFIRMARY & DISPENSARY, WIGAN,

June 20th, 1944.



MR. Chairman, ladies and gentlemen: The purpose of inviting me to address you to-night, I believe, is to tell you something about the White Paper. If I were to tell you all about the White Paper it would take several hours and I feel that the Chairman and myself would be the only people left in the room. It gives me great pleasure to come and talk at the annual meeting of a voluntary hospital such as this, which gives such magnificent services to the community of Wigan. I have always said and believed that the interests of the medical profession are indivisible from those of voluntary hospitals. We have all of us, at some stage in our careers, been associated with that atmosphere of clinical freedom which is fostered by voluntary hospitals, for they possess a spirit which lives in that unhampered freedom of thought so necessary for the production of original ideas. Whatever their shortcomings, the voluntary hospital at its best is unsurpassed by any other hospital agency in this country.

There are many who criticise the voluntary hospitals and desire their abolition, little realising what a chaotic condition the hospital service in this country would be in without them, for they have provided a service the State has not provided. Indeed, there are large tracts in this country where the only hospital service available is provided by voluntary hospitals. It was only yesterday that I heard the annual report of the T.U.C. given on the wireless. They paid tribute to the voluntary hospitals, but said that they wanted to abolish them—they want State hospitals. I think that if they knew all the facts they would not speak in that way.

When we speak of a hospital we think of something more than a mere building. We think of it in terms of its function as a place of healing. Of first importance is the patient, for without him there would be no need for doctors and hospitals. Second

in importance is the doctor, for without him and the patient we should not want hospitals. The importance of the doctor lies in his ability to treat the sick. Hospital buildings and equipment only provide a better means of doing it. They are his instruments. The Lay Boards of Voluntary Hospitals are well aware of this and rely on the advice of the medical staff when they are formulating medical policy. This is all to the advantage of the patient. In municipal hospitals medical boards do not exist, which means that their policy suffers through lack of medical advice. Of course, we are aware that we do not give the service we should like. There are long waiting lists, and attendance at out-patients departments often involves considerable waiting. These facts are continually being used as arguments against voluntary hospitals, yet the difficulties could be easily overcome by an increase in beds and medical staff if more money were forthcoming. I consider the Government's estimate of  $f_{13\frac{1}{2}}$  million is a gross underestimate if the service is to be improved at all.

There is a tendency in some quarters to foster the illusion there is nothing good in the free institutions and free professions of this country. This attitude is usually accompanied by a belief in organisation as a remedy for all our troubles, and so plans and planners have come to occupy a very important place. Planning can only be successful if it carries out the wishes of the people, and there is a grave danger that a plan formulated to suit the wishes of the planners only will mean the forfeiting of the peoples' freedom from unnecessary State control. To-day this country's efforts are concentrated on winning the war and it has little time to concern itself with the details of plans set out in White Papers. There may be several of you who have read the White Paper word for word, but I doubt whether there are many of you who have read it more than once. You have not, I know, the time to give to that very important problem. Yet therein lies the danger that these plans may pass into law before the wishes of the country have been ascertained, and, quite possibly, against those wishes.

It is my object, to-night, to explain to you some of the dangers which I see in the White Paper. The Government's scheme is based on the principal that a comprehensive medical service should be available as a right to all who want it, irrespective of means, and such service would be paid for from insurance, taxation, and rates, plus a not inconsiderable contribution to be made by each individual. The attitude of the profession is that this service should be available to all who need it, but that it is unnecessary for the State to make provision for those who are willing and able, and indeed in many cases prefer, to make it for themselves. Freedom is involved. This is not merely or mainly a financial issue. What is more important is that a profession which derives its emoluments wholly or mainly from State resources is likely, bit by bit, to be controlled by the State which provides its emoluments. Herein lies the danger both to the profession and the public, and indeed in the White Paper, in respect of voluntary hospitals, the statement is definitely made that these voluntary hospitals will have to look to voluntary subscriptions for a considerable proportion of their income. Further, voluntary hospitals would, when they received the majority of their income from the State, definitely lose their identity.

Do not misunderstand me. The profession have for many years advocated reforms, usually, I am sorry to say, to deaf ears, for they realise there are many people not insured under the National Health Insurance who are unable, financially, to provide medical attention for themselves. This should be rectified. The whole plan should be evolved in stages, and we have for long advocated the inclusion in National Insurance of the dependants of the insured class and the provision of hospital facilities for them. Hospital facilities are not included in National Health Insurance, but I do not think any person has ever been refused admission to a voluntary hospital on financial ground. Indeed, some ten million workers insured themselves for this purpose by joining a contributory scheme and had in fact received excellent treatment.

The policy in the White Paper tends towards a deliberate central control of individual action by the State. They propose to establish a Central Medical Board. This Board is to have power to direct a young doctor as soon as he has qualified into the service whole time, or to a particular district. We do not object to civil direction in war time—we realise it is necessary, but I do hope that it will largely disappear when this war is over.

We believe that in planning, the State should create a framework in which there is full opportunity for individual development and effort, but we are not prepared to sacrifice our opportunities for free development by being converted into civil servants. We suspect that the control of doctors may be considered a necessary part of a Social Security Scheme in order that a watch may be kept on doctors' certificates, because these certificates will entitle sick people to large benefits which will be payable by the Treasury out of its Social Security Funds.

So much for general criticism. Let me say something about the hospital service, which is my particular interest. Both the profession and the voluntary hospitals have long advocated definite reforms. We realise that there are certain districts ill supplied with hospitals and certain districts ill supplied with consultants, and we feel that that should be altered. The term regionalisation, which I do not like, came into being when the Hospitals Commission, presided over by Lord Sankey, issued its report in 1935, and later this stimulated Lord Nuffield to make a magnificent gesture by forming the Nuffield Trust.

The White Paper agrees with this principle, but the method of administration is entirely unacceptable to the voluntary hospitals. Whilst paying lip service to these free and uncontrolled institutions which give such magnificent service, its proposals mean that they will gradually lose their independence, because, firstly, no arrangements have been made for them to be effectively represented on the authorities responsible for hospital organisation. Secondly, the State does not intend to pay them a full maintenance cost (no mention is made in the White Paper of important things such as capital expenditure, new extensions, plant and equipment). This means that they will have to rely on voluntary contributions from the public, who will already be paying an all-in compulsory National Insurance to the Government. The financial position will therefore be precarious in this atmosphere of "free for all" health insurance. Thirdly, they will make contracts with local authority bodies, and as these joint hospital bodies will be the owners of the local authority hospitals the voluntary hospitals are likely to be put in a subordinate position.

The voluntary hospitals will, if the present proposals survive, be quietly but steadily submerged. The partnership between local authority and voluntary hospital, which the Government promised, is to be achieved by virtually placing the voluntary hospitals under the control of the local authority partner. What the White Paper proposals actually mean in practice is their elimination as autonomous organisations in a comparatively short space of time. These proposals will illustrate once more the urge to control even a form of voluntary organisation, which, while uncontrolled, has achieved a magnificent standard of service to the community. We all want to see the best possible hospital service. We want to see that everybody can make use of this service. Under proper conditions, I am sure the voluntary hospitals will throw in their

full weight to achieve this ideal. The British Medical Association has studied this very carefully and has put its proposals to the Government. I would like to outline these proposals to you. The British Medical Association urges the following local organisation. Pending the reform of areas and the functions of existing local government authorities which is to take place, there should be regional councils for national hospital and medical areas, not necessarily coterminous with local authority boundaries, but established by legislation, in place of the joint board structure proposed in the White Paper. These councils should be representative of local authorities, the medical profession and other vocational interests in the voluntary hospitals, the representatives to be appointed by the groups or bodies concerned. The functions of these Regional Councils would be to advise the Minister on the planning of all hospital and health services in the region, and on the disposition of centrally provided monies. Local health authorities would still continue, for the present, to own their institutions and would be required to conform to the general plan prepared by the Regional Council and approved by the Minister. Similarly, the voluntary hospitals would conform to the general plan, receiving their monies either wholly from the Minister, or partly from the local authorities, in accordance with the plan laid down by the Minister. This local organisation would go some way towards securing that true partnership we all want to see between local authorities and voluntary hospitals. The financial arrangements should be such as should make it reasonably practicable for voluntary hospitals to continue with their services and to embark on necessary extensions.

Might I remind you that the White Paper is a plan made by politicians for a service which will affect every citizen. Its proposals and implications should be studied and understood by everyone. The White Paper is not legislation. It is only a proposal for future legislation and it has to be submitted to the country for careful scrutiny. Each part of it is open to criticism and open to the public to accept or reject in part or in whole. It can only be judged on its application to the individual. Each of its proposals must stand or fall according to the degree to which it serves the needs of free individuals in a free democracy. Those of its proposals which offer an organisation to a collection of people are fundamentally dangerous, for in sickness no one conforms to a pattern and a majority rule can never be relied upon. The whole art of medicine is concentrated in the care and treatment which the doctor gives to the individual.
