

72ND ANNUAL REPORT

OF THE BOARD OF MANAGEMENT.

The Board of Management have pleasure in submitting the Seventy-Second Annual Report of the Infirmary, together with a Statement of the Income and Expenditure for the twelve months ending 31st March, 1945.

The number of patients who received treatment and advice was 28,898, compared with 28,123 last year. The Waiting List at the close of the year was 779, compared with 750 last year.

In addition, 577 patients were treated in the Christopher Private Patients' Home, where 456 operations were performed. The demands made upon the services of the Home (which is entirely self-supporting) have been fully maintained, and at times there has been a waiting list for admission.

The very high Waiting List to a great extent is due to the Lancaster and Crawford Wards being closed for a considerable period during the year, following representations made by the Ministry of Health to curtail admissions and release nurses for service in other Hospitals. The national situation had rendered this imperative, and the Board had no option in the matter. They realised that this would involve hardships upon the local community as well as having a marked effect upon the Waiting List. We were, however, very glad to be able to bring the full complement of beds into use again during December, and since that time everything possible has been done to make up the leeway. This is borne out by the fact that the Waiting List at the end of the year only shows an increase of 29 compared with the end of the previous year.

The discussions of the British Hospitals Association representatives with the Minister of Health regarding the Government White Paper on a National Health Service are continuing, and certain proposals in connection with the administrative structure which have now been approved by the voluntary hospitals generally, are to be submitted to the Minister for consideration. The Board are keeping in close touch with any developments as they occur.

The representation of the Manchester Area Committee on the Council of the British Hospitals Association has been increased, and in this connection the Board are pleased to be able to report that the General Supt. and Secretary has been elected a member of the Council.

The First Aid Post which was established in the Out-Patients' Department on the outbreak of hostilities under the Ministry of Health Emergency Medical Services closed down in November last. The Ministry has also terminated their arrangements with the Infirmary for the reservation of beds for the reception and accommodation of cases under these services, which included the withdrawal of Haigh Hall Annexe from the Scheme. These withdrawals took effect as from April 1st, 1945.

The Board view with great concern the present method of recruitment and distribution of nurses under the direction of the Ministry of Labour and National Service. They consider this practice is calculated to interfere very seriously with the treatment of the patients and the training of the nurses. A strong protest has been made to the Ministry by the British Hospitals Association against the removal of recently qualified student nurses from the various Hospitals.

With the continuance of war-time conditions the work of the Hospital has again been carried out under many difficulties. The shortage of suitable domestic and portering staff, and the unreliable attendance of many of the non-resident domestic helpers, together with the frequent changes, have been contributing factors. With the adoption of the Hetherington Report, the Board were hoping that an adequate number of resident domestic staff would have been forthcoming. Unfortunately this has not materialised, and the position generally leaves much room for improvement.

The Infirmary Blood Transfusion Service continues with its vitally important work. Many more blood donors are very urgently needed to replace those who have been called away and to meet the increased demands. Volunteers should kindly communicate with Dr. G. A. Cary Lynch, at the Department of Pathology of the Infirmary, when the necessary arrangements for enrolment will be made. The Board would like to see a much larger rota and earnestly renew their appeal for more volunteers.

The Maintenance Account Income shows an increase of £132 3s. 4d., compared with the preceding year, and the Maintenance Account Expenditure has increased by £3,696 17s. 7d. This is mainly due to the continued increase in the cost of Hospital commodities generally, and to the further increases in the nursing and domestic staff salaries. Other outstanding items of expenditure include the purchase of various apparatus and equipment, particularly for the X-Ray and Physio-Therapy Departments, also a giant eye magnet. Important additions have also been made to the Laboratory equipment, which have been charged to the special Laboratory Account.

Cost of Occupied Bed.

The average cost per bed occupied daily during the year (after allowing for out-patients) was £265 14s. 5\frac{1}{4}d., compared with £230 8s. 7\frac{1}{2}d. during the preceding year; an increase of £35 5s. 9\frac{3}{4}d. per bed.

The Christopher Private Patients' Home, £417 6s. 101d.

Out-Patient Department.

The cost per out-patient during the year was 9s. 0\frac{3}{4}d., compared with 9s. 1d. during the preceding year; a decrease of \frac{1}{4}d. per out-patient.

Annual Subscriptions.

Annual Subscriptions totalled £2,164 18s. 6d. (last year £2,126 3s. 5d.). The Board would like to see this amount considerably increased, having regard to the wide area served by the Infirmary, and particularly appeal for new annual subscriptions of 10s. 6d. and upwards.

Subscribers wishing to increase the funds of the Infirmary are reminded of the facilities available under the Finance Acts whereby a Covenant may be given for an annual subscription over a period of years, detailed particulars of which will be found on page 58, as it enables the Income Tax on payments to be recovered and increases the amount of the subscription by the addition of the sum refunded. The amount of tax recovered last year was £238 10s. 3d.

Hospital Sunday.

The total of the Collections made in Churches, Chapels and Schools was £1,020 5s. 5d., an increase of £73 ls. 6d., compared with the previous year. The Board are most grateful for the substantial increase in the Collections, which constitute a record. For the first time the Collections have exceeded £1,000, due in no small measure to the splendid co-operation of the Clergy and Ministers of the various Churches, which is highly appreciated.

Contributory Scheme.

The amount received from the Contributory Scheme was £33,683 12s. 7d., an increase of £480 9s. 0d. compared with the previous year. The approximate number of contributors at the close of the year was 70,000.

Under the reciprocal arrangements with other Hospitals for the treatment of contributors under the Scheme payments amounting to £5,071 11s. 5d. have been received in respect of their contributors treated here, and corresponding payments amounting to £3,386 16s. 4d. have been made for the treatment of our contributors. Including these payments the total amount received was £38,755 4s. 0d. compared with £37,455 5s. 9d. the previous year.

The Board are desirous of expressing their warmest thanks to all contributors and collectors, and other voluntary workers who have materially assisted in making this excellent result possible. They are also grateful to the many employers for their kind co-operation and increased support.

During the year Miss A. M. Lopez resigned her appointment as Contributory Scheme Organiser. She was succeeded by Mr. H. S. Taylor, Assistant to Secretary, Huddersfield and District Hospitals Contributory Scheme.

Patients' Contributions.

The contributions made to the Inquiry Officer towards the cost of maintenance and treatment amounted to £953 8s. 9d. (In-patients, £695 9s. 0d.; Out-patients, £257 19s. 9d.), compared with £1,309 1s. 6d. last year. The Board are most grateful for these contributions, and appeal to those patients (not in the Contributory Scheme) where circumstances permit to help in this way.

The proceeds realised the record sum of £567 6s. 11d. The Board are most grateful for this splendid response, and extend their warmest thanks to His Worship the Mayor of Wigan (Alderman H. Dowling, J.P.), and to all who assisted him in making the event such an outstanding success. Miss A. M. Lopez again acted as Honorary Organising Secretary.

Ladies' Linen League.

The Ladies' Linen League has supplied 1001 articles during the year for the use of the patients, and the sum of £138 8s. 0d. has been expended on linen, etc.

The Board desire heartily to congratulate the members on another excellent year's work, and would again assure them how much their splendid services are appreciated. The Linen League affords an excellent opportunity to ladies who desire to render practical service to the Infirmary, and new members will be heartily welcomed.

Pathological and Bacteriological Department.

A detailed report for the year (excluding all outside work) will be found on page 56. The Laboratory work continues to increase, particularly the outside work. It is pleasing to observe that more Local Authorities are making use of the facilities available.

The Board have again been pleased to renew their arrangements with the Lancashire Insurance Committee and the Barrow Insurance Committee, to supply Stock and Autogenous Vaccines to the order of the Insurance Practitioners at an agreed scale of charges, and to report upon any material sent for examination.

With the increasing availability of Penicillin, Dr. G. A. Cary Lynch was nominated by the Regional Pathologist of the Ministry of Health to issue and control its therapeutic use in the Wigan area. A number of suitable cases have been treated with gratifying results.

Tinfoil and "Silver" Paper.

The collection of Tinfoil and "Silver" Paper has greatly declined for obvious reasons, but the large quantity of 13 tons 14 cwts. 45 lbs. has been received since the inauguration of the scheme. As a result the Infirmary has benefited to the extent of £341 6s. 5d.

Extensions and Improvements.

The Board are glad to be able to report the completion of the purchase of "Sunnyside," Southport, and are looking forward to the time when they will be able to obtain possession of these premises and bring them into use for the important purposes mentioned in the previous Report.

With the approval of the Ministry of Health, arrangements are being made for the Decontamination Unit provided by the Ministry under their A.R.P. arrangements to be adapted as a temporary gymnasium. Our facilities for rehabilitation services are very restricted, and good use can be made of the building in this manner pending its ultimate demolition.

Other useful improvements have been made, particularly in certain of the Staff quarters, where it has been possible to carry out much needed painting and other renovations which unavoidably had to be left in abeyance.

Obituary.

The Board record with deepest regret the deaths of the following: Mr. J. A. Johnson, J.P., a Vice-President; Dr. E. W. Reed, a former Radiologist; Mr. E. Taylor, J.P., for many years a member of the Board of Management.

Wigan Corporation Maternity and Child Welfare Committee.

Mr. Jas. Starr was again appointed to represent the Infirmary Board on this Committee.

Cotton Districts Convalescent Fund.

Mr. Cyril E. Marsden has been elected as the Board's representative on the Cotton Districts Convalescent Fund Board for a further period of three years.

Honorary Medical Staff.

The following changes in the Honorary Medical Staff have occurred during the year:—

Mr. James Oag resigned his appointment as an Honorary Surgeon (under Rule 93) and was appointed an Honorary Consulting Surgeon. Mr. J. Burke Ewing (Honorary Assistant Surgeon) was appointed to fill the vacancy.

Mr. F. Ronald Edwards resigned his appointment as an Honorary Assistant Surgeon. He is now specialising exclusively in chest surgery, and has consequently relinquished general surgical work.

Mr. E. H. Strach, Clinical Assistant to the Orthopædic Department, has been released from his appointment, following representations made

by the Czechoslovak Ministry of Social Welfare. He has returned to his native country, where his services are urgently needed.

The members still absent on military service are Dr. R. J. Ormsby (Honorary Physician), and Dr. W. S. Shearer (Radiologist).

Head Porter.

The Board would extend their warmest congratulations and good wishes to the Head Porter (Mr. J. Austin) on the completion of 50 years' service at the Infirmary. They much appreciate the loyal and devoted services he has rendered throughout this exceptionally long period.

Head Gardener.

We have lost the services of the Head Gardener (Mr. E. T. Vaughan) during the year, who was compelled to resign for health reasons after upwards of twenty years' excellent service. The Board trust that his health will sufficiently improve to allow him to enjoy his well-earned leisure.

Thanks.

In conclusion the Board would tender its thanks to all who have assisted the Infirmary by gifts in money or in kind, and in particular to the following:—

The British Red Cross Society (E.L.50) for their valuable nursing assistance.

The members of the St. John Ambulance Brigade, who have so readily given their services in connection with a Blood Transfusion Service, and all other blood donors.

The Wigan Branch of Toc. H., for their services in connection with working a Library for the patients.

The Wigan Girl Guides and others for their valuable help in connection with the telephone services.

The Women's Voluntary Service for transport services, who have made regular weekly journeys to Liverpool in connection with our Blood Transfusion Service.

The Police for their help in conveying messages to patients' relatives.

The local Press for their valuable assistance during the year.

The House Visitors, Clergymen, and Ministers of Religion.

The Honorary and Resident Medical Officers and the Officials and Staff of the Infirmary for their assiduous attention to their duties.
