





73RD ANNUAL REPORT

OF THE BOARD OF MANAGEMENT.

The Board of Management have pleasure in submitting the Seventy-Third Annual Report of the Infirmary, together with a Statement of the Income and Expenditure for the twelve months ending 31st March, 1946.

The number of patients who received treatment and advice was 28,484, compared with 28,898 last year. The Waiting List at the close of the year was 795, compared with 779 last year.

In addition, 545 patients were treated in the Christopher Private Patients' Home, where 436 operations were performed. The demands made upon the services of the Home (which is entirely self-supporting) have been fully maintained, and at times there has been a waiting list for admission.

The Board are extremely grateful for the splendid support the Infirmary continues to receive from all sections of the community, as will be seen from the details given in the Report. The heavy demands made upon our services have been met to the utmost of our capacity, despite many difficulties. There have been periods of acute shortage of staff, which at times compelled the work to be curtailed. The great shortage of nurses and midwives throughout the country is generally known, and it is hoped the recruitment campaign of the Ministry of Labour and National Service will result in a marked improvement in the very serious position.

During the year the war in Europe and the Far East has been brought to a successful conclusion and on the termination of hostilities the Board record with gratitude that the Infirmary has been preserved from any material damage by enemy action, which unfortunately has befallen many Hospitals, who so nobly carried on under great difficulties.

The Board would record their sincere thanks for the services rendered by the Medical and Administrative Staffs of the Infirmary throughout the very difficult war time period, particularly to the General Superintendent and Secretary and the Matron for the way in which they have met the heavy responsibilities they have been called upon to bear.

The publication of the Ministry of Health Report on the Survey of the Hospital Services of the North-Western Area has received the careful consideration of the Board, particularly the details relating to Wigan and District, and their comments thereon have been communicated to The British Hospitals Association. The Surveyors' criticisms relating to the Infirmary were on the whole favourable, and conclude with the words "This is a busy hospital which made a good impression on us." It is obvious that any future policy will have to be based upon the close co-operation and co-ordination of Hospital services in the District which will depend upon the nature of the set-up of the National Health Service.

The Government National Health Service Bill was published in March, and the views of the Board thereon have already been fully made known to the public of Wigan and District in various ways. The Infirmary is wholeheartedly prepared to play its part in a free and complete National Health Service available to every citizen, and the Board believe this could best be achieved in accordance with the alternative plan prepared by The British Hospitals Association, which in their view would best serve the interests of what we all desire.

The following is The Hospitals' Plan which has been generally approved by the voluntary hospitals, and is prompted solely by the desire that the patient shall be assured of the best possible service:—

- 1. The Minister of Health would assume general responsibility for the direction and financing of the hospital service required within the National Health Service.
- 2. A Central Hospitals Board would be appointed by the Minister to which, subject to his veto, he would delegate the major duties and responsibilities, including the framing of national policy.

This Board would be wholly or largely representative in its composition of the major agencies through which alone the Minister can design and operate the service, i.e., the medical profession, voluntary hospitals, the local authorities, the dentists, nurses and pharmacists. The Minister would therefore appoint the Board after consultation with the appropriate bodies.

3. Regional Hospital Boards would be appointed by the Minister and charged with the duty of planning and extending the hospital services so that the whole field of hospital treatment would be covered in each Region, while leaving the patient freedom of choice of hospital. One of the great medical teaching centres would be associated with each of these Regions.

The Board would decide the nature of the services required from each hospital in its Region and be vested with such executive powers as may be necessary to ensure that its plan would be put into operation.

These Boards would be appointed after consultation with the appropriate bodies including the universities and would (as in the case of the Central Hospitals Board) be wholly or mainly representative in composition.

- 4. The individual hospital therefore, through its Committee of Management, would remain entirely responsible for the internal management and general conduct of its affairs; but its first duty would be to provide the service required of it under the Regional plan.
- 5. The Voluntary Hospital would retain in trust its buildings and assets, thus preserving its entity and ensuring a reasonable degree of freedom in the interests of medical research and progress, of the service, of the patient and of the community.
- 6. Finance. So far as the voluntary hospital is concerned it would receive payment from the State for services required and rendered but would still be free to attract personal interest in its work and support for special purposes, for any activities outside the scope of the National Service, and for the general improvement of its services including the comfort of both patients and staff.

In the long run, the patient will judge the national service not on the merits of its organisation as a whole, but on the actual service which he receives from the individual hospital.

The Infirmary Blood Transfusion Service continues with its vitally important work. Many more blood donors are very urgently needed to replace those who have been called away and to meet the increased demands. Volunteers should kindly communicate with Dr. G. A. Cary Lynch, at the

Department of Pathology of the Infirmary, when the necessary arrangements for enrolment will be made. The Board would like to see a much larger rota and earnestly renew their appeal for more volunteers.

Patients' Statistics.

The Maintenance Account Income shows a decrease of £3,218 10s. 10d., compared with the preceding year, and the Maintenance Account Expenditure has increased by £1,872 19s. 3d. This is mainly due to the continued increase in the cost of Hospital commodities generally, and to the substantial increases in salaries and wages.

Cost of Occupied Bed.

The average cost per bed occupied daily during the year (after allowing for out-patients) was £266 10s. 2½d., compared with £265 14s. 5¼ during the preceding year; an increase of 15s. 9¼d. per bed.

The Christopher Private Patients' Home, £446 6s. 01d.

Out-Patient Department.

The cost per out-patient during the year was 9s. 6d. compared with 9s. 03d., during the preceding year; an increase of 54d. per out-patient.

Annual Subscriptions.

Annual Subscriptions totalled £2,114 2s. 1d. (last year £2,164 18s. 6d.). The Board would like to see this amount considerably increased, having regard to the wide area served by the Infirmary, and particularly appeal for new annual subscriptions of 10s. 6d. and upwards.

Subscribers wishing to increase the funds of the Infirmary are reminded of the facilities available under the Finance Acts whereby a Covenant may be given for an annual subscription over a period of years, detailed particulars of which will be found on page 64, as it enables the Income Tax on payments to be recovered and increases the amount of the subscription by the addition of the sum refunded. The amount of tax recovered last year was £240 11s. 1d.

Hospital Sunday.

The total of the Collections made in Churches, Chapels and Schools was £1,070 0s. 0d., an increase of £49 14s. 7d., compared with the previous year. The Board are most grateful for the increase in the Collections, which constitute a record. The splendid co-operation of the Clergy and Ministers of the various Churches is highly appreciated.

Contributory Scheme.

The amount received from the Contributory Scheme was £31,814 4s. 5d., a decrease of £1,869 8s. 2d. compared with the previous year. The approximate number of contributors at the close of the year was 60,000.

Under the reciprocal arrangements with other Hospitals for the treatment of contributors under the Scheme payments amounting to £6,306 13s. 3d. have been received in respect of their contributors treated here, and corresponding payments amounting to £4,312 11s. 11d. have been made for the treatment of our contributors. Including these payments the total amount received was £38,120 17s. 8d., compared with £38,755 4s. 0d. the previous year.

The Board are desirous of expressing their warmest thanks to all contributors and collectors, and other voluntary workers who have materially assisted in making this excellent result possible. They are also grateful to the many employers for their kind co-operation and increased support.

Patients' Contributions.

The contributions made to the Inquiry Officer towards the cost of maintenance and treatment amounted to £1,082 13s. 0d. (In-patients, £882 9s. 11d.; Out-patients, £200 3s. 1d.), compared with £953 8s. 9d. last year. The Board are most grateful for these contributions, and appeal to those patients (not in the Contributory Scheme) where circumstances permit to help in this way.

Gift of Ambulance.

The Board accord their grateful thanks to the American Ambulance, Great Britain, for their very generous gift of an Ambulance, which was handed over in excellent condition. The Ambulance will be a great asset, particularly in connection with the "Sunnyside" Annexe, Southport.

British Red Cross Society.

A further valuable gift has been received from the British Red Cross Society, through The British Hospitals Association. This consisted mainly of linen and patients' clothing, and the Board are most grateful for this splendid allocation, which is very acceptable.

Ladies' Linen League.

The Ladies' Linen League has supplied 515 articles during the year for the use of the patients, and the sum of £203 8s. 6d. has been expended on linen, etc.

The Board desire heartily to congratulate the members on another excellent year's work, and would again assure them how much their splendid services are appreciated. The Linen League affords an excellent opportunity to ladies who desire to render practical service to the Infirmary, and new members will be heartily welcomed.

Pathological and Bacteriological Department.

A detailed report for the year (excluding all outside work) will be found on page 47. The Laboratory work continues to increase, particularly the outside work. It is pleasing to observe that more Local Authorities are making use of the facilities available.

The Board have again been pleased to renew their arrangements with the Lancashire Insurance Committee and the Barrow Insurance Committee, to supply Stock and Autogenous Vaccines to the order of the Insurance Practitioners at an agreed scale of charges, and to report upon any material sent for examination.

Tinfoil and "Silver" Paper.

The collection of Tinfoil and "Silver" Paper has greatly declined for obvious reasons, but the large quantity of 13 tons 15 cwts. 103 lbs. has been received since the inauguration of the scheme. As a result the Infirmary has benefited to the extent of £341 6s. 5d.

Extensions and Improvements.

The Board are pleased to report that "Sunnyside," Southport, has been de-requisitioned by the Government and arrangements are being made for these premises to be occupied for the important purposes previously reported. It will be some time before this will be possible, as the work of rehabilitation under the arrangements with the Ministry of Works will first need to be completed. Good progress is being made in this direction, but there is much to be done in this large undertaking. The furnishings of "Sunnyside" purchased by the Board have been replaced from storage but further equipment will be required. There is no doubt that "Sunnyside" will prove to be an invaluable annexe to the Infirmary, and the Board are more than ever convinced they were extremely fortunate in being able to secure these very desirable premises. They were in use as an American Red Cross Club when de-requisitioned.

It was possible to make a commencement with the extensions to the Children's Ward during last autumn, and they should be in use in the near future. This Isolation Unit will provide six additional cots and will be a most important and necessary addition to our resources.

The holding up of the extensions resulting from the war is a matter of grave concern. The additional Operating Theatre included in the plans is a vital necessity, and as there are no immediate prospects of this being provided, it has been decided to make certain alterations to the Out-Patients' Operating Theatre in an endeavour to fill the breach as satisfactorily as possible.

Other important improvements have been carried out, including the complete renewal of the Internal Telephone Installation; the instalment of a Staff Location Lighting System, which is most efficient and saves a great amount of the staff's time; the provision of up-to-date Electric Food Conveyors which enables hot meals to be served at the bedside of the patients. Additional apparatus has also been provided for the X-Ray and Physio-Therapy Departments.

Obituary.

The Board record with deepest regret the deaths of the following: Mr. H. A. Scott Barrett, J.P., a Trustee, Vice-President, and former Chairman of the Board of Management; Mr. A. O. Smith, Mr. Sidney R. Park, J.P., Vice-Presidents; Mr. T. Mason, J.P., Mr. C. T. Naylor, Members of the Board of Management; Mr. H. Haward Bywater, Honorary Consulting Surgeon (formerly Honorary Ophthalmic Surgeon for many years). The Infirmary has sustained a severe loss by their passing, all of whom had rendered valuable service in various ways.

Board of Management.

The Board were very pleased to welcome Mr. Harold Lowe on his return after five years service in the Royal Air Force.

Wigan Corporation Maternity and Child Welfare Committee.

Mr. Jas. Starr was again appointed to represent the Infirmary Board on this Committee.

Honorary Medical Staff.

The Board extend their congratulations and good wishes to Dr. T. N. A. Jeffcoate on the honour conferred upon him by his appointment to the chair of obstetrics and gynæcology at the University of Liverpool, in succession to Professor A. Leyland Robinson. Professor Jeffcoate inaugurated the Gynæcological Department at the Infirmary, and his services as Honorary Gynæcological Surgeon during a difficult period are gratefully remembered.

- Mr. C. L. Graham resigned his appointment as an Honorary Surgeon, and was appointed an Honorary Consulting Surgeon.
- Dr. W. S. Shearer (Radiologist), has been demobilised, but will not be returning to take up his appointment at Wigan. He is desirous of taking up similar work in Edinburgh.
