# THE QUEEN VICTORIA MEMORIAL COTTAGE HOSPITAL,

HERNE BAY.

The Governors' Report for the Year ending December 31st, 1933.

The close of another year affords the Governors much pleasure in presenting their Annual Report of the work done in the Hospital during the year 1933.

No less than 637 patients, including all grades, were successfully treated; of these 314 were admitted as in-patients, and 323 casualties, 1,244 visits were made for dressings, etc., 292 operations were performed in the theatre, and there were 60 cases for X-Ray, and 21 for massage treatment. These figures show a notable increase on those of the previous year.

The number of beds remains the same as in previous years, but throughout the year the bed in the hut was in constant use when weather permitted, and was greatly appreciated by the patients; 15 patients passed through each bed, and the percentage of beds in constant use was 73.7. The average number of in-patients daily resident was 14.5, an excess of 3 on the previous year, and the total patients' days increased from 4,302 to 5,382.

Obviously this extra work entailed extra expenditure as is shown in the Audited Accounts, but the Statistical Tables show that the average cost of each in-patient per week was £3 3s. 6d., this is 8s. 9d. less than 1932, which not only demonstrates that careful economy was exercised by the Staff, but what good use was made of the gifts of provisions of every description.

And in respect to this relief in the cost of housekeeping, no part of the voluntary work done for the Hospital is more appreciated than that of the ladies, who, working in association with the Governors, through their Committees, have established such features as Flag Days, Pound Day, Egg Week; and their assistance is eagerly sought when Sales of Work or Fetes are organised in aid of the Funds.

This, however, gives but a small idea of their work; for many years they have, through the good offices of the Linen League, provided all the linen used in the Hospital without any charge to the funds, and so important has their splendid work become that it now forms an integral part of the management.

Turning to income, the continued support received from annual subscribers, and the donations from Churches and other sources, together with the increased amount allocated from the Contributory Scheme Fund, have enabled the Hospital to live practically within its income.

This must be gratifying to all who have the welfare of the Hospital at heart, especially the Honorary Collectors and Organiser of the Contributory Scheme who work so assiduously for this purpose.

During 1933 the scheme provided 154 in-patients with free hospital treatment. As the average total cost of each in-patient was £7 13s. 5d., these 154 patients appear to have cost approximately £950, it was, however, less than this, because there were a number of motor accident cases which, from the nature of their injuries, needed long and expensive treatment.

A great portion of the burden of these accident cases continues to fall upon the funds of hospitals, but the matter is receiving legislative attention in order to find a surer means of reimbursing the cost of these patients (as was intended in the Road Traffic Act).

Referring again to the question of beds, the percentage occupied is approximately the average of other hospitals and accommodation was found for the patients at a minimum of inconvenience, having regard to the difficulties under which we are working. This was accomplished through the foresight exercised by the Governors in the past, by adding new wards and by using the Board Room for additional beds, but every available space is now occupied and no further alterations can be made.

The Hospital was built 32 years ago from plans for 10 beds; the building is not only out of date, and does not meet modern requirements but is unsuitable in many respects for the amount work done in it.

The domestic offices are appallingly insufficient, and for the Nurses' use there is but one small room, which functions as a dining room, rest room, dispensary, and a reception room for patients' friends; and, having to sleep out, the Nurses are denied the common amenities of a bedroom when they are off duty.

On these conditions the Governors have kept a watchful eye, but, realising that the time, clouded by a world-wide financial uncertainty, was inopportune for building a new hospital, they, at the beginning of the year, appointed the New Hospital Committee to consider the most economic procedure to provide the required accommodation, and what fresh liabilities would have to be met, and so prepare a way for rapid action when a more favourable time arrives.

The Committee was given power to engage the services of an Architect of repute and experience in Hospital buildings, to assist in the evolution of a general scheme best suited for the needs of the district; and after due consideration it was agreed to have plans prepared for a hospital with 34 beds, so designed as to allow for later expansion, both for patients and staff.

Plans, prepared by Mr. Edwin A. Jackson, F.R.I.B.A., were submitted, and after adjustments made to meet the suggestions of the Medical Board, they were adopted in principle by the Governors as the plans of the proposed New Hospital for Herne Bay.

And basing the cost of the New Hospital upon that of Ashford (of which Mr. Jackson is the Architect, and which is considered to be remarkable for its low building cost), and after allowing for certain deductions arising from the fall of building prices, an estimate of the cost gives the figure £15,500; all is in readiness for action when the Governors deem that sufficient funds are in hand, or are promised to warrant the step.

The New Hospital Building Fund was further augmented by £990, and by referring to page 17 it will be seen that the Brotherhood of Cheerful Sparrows, and the Broomfield Fete per Mr. and Mrs. Lovegrove again contributed the larger amount, and in addition there are various sums from donors whose untiring efforts to raise the necessary funds are gratefully appreciated by the Governors.

The Governors are pleased to report that in May, Dr. A. B. Beresford-Jones and Dr. R. H. Lucas accepted an invitation to join the Medical Staff as Honorary Consulting Surgeons of the Hospital.

During the year the resignations of Mr. C. Hardaker and Mr. J. R. Huxtable were received, and Mr. E. R. Pitt and Mr. H. K. Davis were appointed to fill the vacancies on the Governing Board. In consequence of his leaving the town the resignation of Mr. F. R. J. Cox as Hon. Auditor was received in July, and the Governors record their warm appreciation of his services rendered to the Hospital over a long period. The Governors were fortunate in securing the services of Mr. W. J. Evershed, A.C.A., as Hon. Auditor.

It is with deep regret the Governors have to record the removal by death, in April, of the Vice-President, Mr. W. H. Randell, who received his appointment two years ago in recognition of the great support the Hospital had received from the local branch of the Brotherhood of Cheerful Sparrows, of which Mr. Randell was President since its foundation, and both institutions have lost a generous friend.

The thanks of the Governors are again given to the Members of the Honorary Medical Staff for their valuable services and to the Matron and her Staff for their care and attention to the patients. The Matron joins the Governors in their thanks for the voluntary services rendered at the Hospital by the Members of the St. John Ambulance Brigade.

Pursuant to the rules the President, the Hon. Secretary, the Hon. Treasurer, the Hon. Auditor and four Governors, Mrs. D. Biggs, Mrs. D. H. Davies, Mr. R. J. Gore and Mr. E. R. Pitt retire and are eligible for re-election.

# Treasurer's Report for the Year ending December 31st, 1933.

In view of the fact that the accounts for 1933 are presented in the form recommended as a revised uniform system for small hospitals, it has been necessary to make slight alterations in grouping some of the items under the headings formerly used, but although this will not permit a comparison with most of last year's figures, it will be quite simple to show these comparisons in future years.

Subscriptions and donations show a decrease of £123, chiefly due to the fact that special donations from patients are considerably less than last year.

Church offertories, etc., have increased by £3 while flag days and other conjections are £46 more.

Under the heading of other voluntary gifts, there is an increase of £5, and we owe a debt of gratitude to those societies and other friends of the Hospital who have been instrumental in raising a total amount of £68.

An amount of £62 was received from boxes. This is a drop of £162 on the previous year, but the success achieved by the Contributory Scheme is bound to react on some other source of revenue, and this has undoubtedly affected boxes more than any other source of income.

The Contributory Scheme continues to be a most satisfactory method of raising revenue, and during the past year there has been a net revenue of £1,135 received from this source.

An increase of £52 is shown under the heading of patients' and Approved Societies' payments, due to the increase in the number of cases treated.

Investments show a fall in revenue of £127, but this is mainly due to the conversion of War Loan from 5 per cent. to 3½ per cent., together with the fact that the bonus of £50 received on conversion is a non-recurrent amount.

With regard to the expenditure side, an analysis of some of the chief items gives the following comparisons:—

For provisions there was a total increase of £38, which is reduced to a net increase of £15 by reductions of £9 under the heading butcher, and £14 under the heading of greengrocer, the latter due to gifts of vegetables.

Drugs and medical supplies cost £83 more, and X-Ray treatment and expenses increased by £46, due in each case to a considerable increase in the number of cases treated.

Items included under the heading of domestic, cost £64 more, accounted for by increases in fuel £3, gas £49, and electric light £12.

Renewals and repairs to building and plant show a reduction in expenditure of £14.

A saving of £10 is due to the Governors making a new arrangement with regard to rent of additional nursing staff quarters.

The New Hospital Building Fund account is given in detail in the annual report, and I am pleased to report that your previous treasurer's estimate of an income of approximately £1,000 has been realised, chiefly due to the sum of £412 2s. 7d. received from the Brotherhood of Cheerful Sparrows.

Starting the year with a deficit of £116, we close with a slightly larger deficit of £146, due to the increased work done by the Hospital.

In closing this report, may I express sincere gratitude to all the willing helpers and organisers, who, by their untiring efforts, have helped to realise this satisfactory result.


